REGULATIONS FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF THE
PATENT SLIP, WILLIAMSTOWN.

ALL vessels over 200 tons register will be charged 1s. 6d. per ton for the hauling up and launching, and at the rate of 9d. a ton for every day or part of a day they lay on the slip. All vessels under 200 tons and over 100 tons will be charged 2s. a ton for the hauling up and launching, and 1s. a ton for every day or part of a day they lay on the slip.

2. All sailing ships are to be charged fees on their register tonnage, and steamboats on their register tonnage, with the additional tonnage of the space occupied by their machinery.

3. The superintendent will receive and register all applications for the use of the slip, and that every such application be attended to in rotation, provided that the fee for hauling up and launching be paid to the superintendent at the time of registering, and the fees for vessels lying on the slip be paid to such superintendent within twenty-four hours after launching.

4. All Government vessels and royal mail ships carrying mails shall have a preferential claim.

5. Every vessel using the slip shall require to have on board a sufficient crew, such number to be decided by the superintendent, to warp the vessel between the platforms and to steady her over and on the cradle, as directed by the superintendent.

6. Immediately any vessel is hauled up she shall be left to the owners, captain, or agents, at their risk, to effect the necessary repairs, they leaving her seated on the cradle (as they received her) ready for launching.

7. All necessary stage planks, shores, bearers, blocks, and wedges for shores, shall be supplied by the Government; but any damage accruing to the same to be made good or charged to the ship, the owners, or agents, in addition to the fees already mentioned.

8. If it is necessary to release the cradle from under a vessel to effect repairs, the same shall be done at the expense of the vessel repairing, but under the supervision of the superintendent of the yard.

9. If it is necessary to remove the cradle from under a vessel undergoing repairs, for the purpose of hauling up another vessel, then the same shall be removed by and at the expense of the Government, and the time occupied by the removal and replacing the cradle shall be deducted from the fees charged for "lay days."

10. Any keel or bilge blocks on the cradle, that may be split or otherwise destroyed, shall be made good at the ship's expense; and all shores, blocks, stage planks, and bearers lent by the Government, shall be removed and stacked, to the satisfaction of the foreman of the yard, previous to the vessel being launched.

11. The cradle may remain under any vessel repairing, if not required by the Government for the purpose of hauling up another ship.

12. A second vessel can be taken on the slip, provided a bond is given to effect the repairs in such time as shall cause no delay to the first vessel.

13. No fires to be kept in the yard, excepting between the hours of Six a.m. and Six p.m., unless previously approved by the superintendent.

14. The gates to be opened at Six a.m. and closed at Six p.m. Any further time beyond Six p.m., if required, to be paid for at the rate of 1s. per hour.

15. Any matters not being provided for shall be subject to such rules and regulations as the superintendent, with the sanction of the President of the Board of Lands and Works, shall consider necessary to enforce for the safety or convenience of the vessels and slip during the time the same shall be in use.

MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF AMHERST.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, passed in the eighteenth year of the Reign of Her present Majesty, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it was amongst other things enacted, that any district of the colony of Victoria, the area whereof should not exceed nine square miles, and which should contain a population of householders not less than three hundred, might, subject to the provisions of the said Act, be constituted a municipal district as thereinafter mentioned, provided that no one point in any such area should be distant more than six miles from any

other point; and it was further enacted that it should be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, on the receipt of a petition signed by not less than one hundred and fifty householders resident within any such district, praying that such district might be declared a municipal district under the said Act, to cause the substance and prayer of such petition to be published in the *Government Gazette*, and (if no counter petition, signed by an equal or greater number of householders resident within such locality, should have been delivered at the office of the Colonial Secretary within one month from the date of such publication) the Lieutenant Governor, with the advice aforesaid, might, if he should think fit, declare by Proclamation such locality a municipal district by a name to be mentioned in such Proclamation, and also by the same or any other Proclamation might define the limits and boundaries of such municipal district, and such limits and boundaries at any time thereafter in the same manner, on receipt of a similar petition, might vary and alter, but so as in no case save as thereinafter mentioned to include within the limits or boundaries of such municipal district an area of more than nine square miles; and upon the publication of any such Proclamation in the *Government Gazette*, such locality so defined should be deemed and taken to be a municipal district within the meaning of the said Act: And whereas a petition has been presented to His Excellency the Governor by certain householders and landowners in the town and parish of Amherst, in the county of Talbot, the substance and prayer of which petition have been published as directed by the said Act: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, do, by this my Proclamation, with the advice of the Executive Council, declare that the district hereinafter named and defined shall be a municipal district within the meaning of the said Act, that is to say:—

THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF AMHERST.—Commencing at the north-western angle of the town reserve of Amherst; thence by a line bearing east to the north-eastern angle of allotment 18, section 4, parish of Amherst; thence by a line bearing south to the north-eastern angle of allotment 7, section 5; thence west by the northern boundaries of allotments 7 and 8, section 5, in the said parish, to the north-western angle of the said allotment 8; thence by a line bearing south to a point due east of the south-eastern angle of allotment 14, section 7, in the said parish; thence by a line bearing west to the south-western angle of allotment 25, section 7, in the said parish; thence by a line bearing north, being the western boundary of allotments numbered respectively 25, 23, 43 and 42, to a point on chain due north of the north-western angle of allotment 42, section 6, in the said parish; thence by a line bearing west, being the southern boundaries of sections 2 and 8, in the said parish, to the south-western angle of the said section 8; and thence by a line bearing north to the commencing point aforesaid.

And I do hereby, with the advice aforesaid, direct that the council of the said municipal district shall be called by the name and style of "The Municipal Council of Amherst."

PROPOSED ROAD DISTRICT.

CRESWICK.

IT is hereby notified that certain householders and landowners (forty-four in number) residing in the parishes of Glendaruel, Addington, Ascot, Bullarook, Spring Hill, Smeaton, Dean, and other places, in the county of Talbot, have petitioned His Excellency the Governor to constitute their locality a road district.

The petitioners state that they have long desired to establish a district road board at Creswick; that several of them, though compelled to pay assessments to the Ballarat district road board, have derived no benefit therefrom; that many of the roads in the district are frequently impassable, and that a local board is necessary to ensure the due application of the money raised in their district; lastly, that within a short period large quantities of land have been sold in their district, and a large portion of the said land is cleared and under cultivation.

And the petitioners pray that the several parishes comprised within the following boundaries may be proclaimed a road district, under the name of "The Creswick Road District," that is to say:—Commencing at the source of the Bullarook Creek in the Dividing Ranges, and from thence by a line in the south-westerly direction along the boundary of the county of Talbot to the source of McCallum's Creek in the parish of Addington; and from thence along McCallum's Creek to McCallum's home station; and from thence following the road leading from Lexton to Mount Franklin, bearing east to McLoughlin's Crecek; thence by McLoughlin's Creek to its source; and from thence by a line bearing south to the source of Bullarook Creek, the commencing point."

Her clothing consisted of the following articles, viz.:—A child's calico chemise, a long calico night-dress, a long frock with worked front, two flannel wrappers, a napkin, two calico baby chemises, two calico belts, and a small calico chemise, the whole wrapped round with a blanket or flannel petticoat, which was tied round with a checked silk (female's) handkerchief, and weighted with a stone of about 3 lb. to sink the body.

INCENDIARISM.

TWO HUNDRED POUNDS REWARD.

The above substitutions are to be made whenever it may be considered advisable by the officer authorised to draw the rations, but not otherwise.

The supplies are to be immediately placed on board by the contractor by day or night if so required, on the written order of the officer in command, failing which, they will be otherwise procured, and the expense, over and above the contract price, will be deducted from the contractor's account.

The contractor will be bound to put on board rations either for one day or one month, or more or less, as may be required.

When the vessel shall be in any harbor of the colony except Hobson's Bay, the officer in command shall be at liberty, without reference to this contract, to procure provisions in such manner as he may be empowered by the Government.

The contractor will be required to prepare his own account monthly in the prescribed form, and on the presentation thereof in a complete state, and signed by the officer in command, to the Government Storekeeper for examination, it will be forwarded for payment at the Treasury Pay Office.

In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the supplies, as to quality, the matter is to be decided by a Board of Survey, composed of persons named by the officer in command, and the decision of the Board is to be final; but if, from the perishable nature of the goods, this course cannot be adopted, the officer in command will have power to reject such article or articles, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing.

It will be competent for the Government Storekeeper on behalf of the Government, or the contractor on his own behalf, to terminate the contract by giving a notice in writing of one calendar month to the opposite party; it being understood that such notice can be given only from the first day of a month, and within the period for which the contract is made.

8. If the board shall decide that the forage is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which, it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra cost, if any, will be charged as in clause 6.

9. When a board of survey cannot be conveniently assembled, or when from some other cause injury would accrue either to the public service or to the contractor by waiting for a board of survey, the officer in charge will have the power to reject such supplies as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and the contractor must take back the rejected forage and supply good in its stead, failing which, it will be obtained by the officer requiring it, and the expense will be charged as in clause 6.

10.
