## ARARAT MINING DISTRICT.

No. XI.—BYE-LAW RELATING TO OCCUPATION OF SITES UNDER  
A BUSINESS LICENSE AND A MINER'S RIGHT.—[11th October,  
1858.]

AT a meeting of the mining board of the mining district of Ararat, begun and holden at the Shamrock Hotel, Barkly street, Ararat, in the said district, on the 11th day of October, One thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, it is ordained by the said board as follows, that is to say:—

1. That in order to ensure regularity in the formation and occupation of business sites, the warden shall cause all streets to be marked out straight, and running parallel with each other, such streets to be not less than ninety-nine (99) feet in width, and intersecting at intervals and at right angles with other streets of the same width, and in such manner as he may direct. Any person or persons building any tent, store or other building on any street marked out as aforesaid shall, on receiving notice from the warden or other proper authority, immediately remove the same, and should any person refuse to do so, the warden or other authorised person may order such building to be removed at the owner's expense.

2. Every holder of a business license shall be entitled to hold a business site, having a frontage of thirty-six (36) feet to any street marked out as aforesaid by a depth of one hundred (100), which must be marked out with a post at each extreme corner; and all parties marking out the same shall, within forty-eight (48) hours of the time of marking out, commence in a *bona fide* manner to erect a building thereon, and shall continue to do so until the same be completed and in use for business purposes, or the ground forfeited.

3. A block of neutral ground having twelve (12) feet frontage by a depth of one hundred (100) feet, shall be left between all adjoining business sites, by the last party marking out, for mining purposes, which in no case shall be built upon; and in all cases where such neutral ground has not been left, the warden or other proper authority shall cause same to be deducted from the business site of the last party marking out, and order it to be set apart for the aforesaid purpose.

4. Every holder of a miner's right shall, in addition to his claim for mining, be entitled to occupy for the purpose of residence, or residence and cultivation, twenty (20) perches of land, which may be occupied in any form he may select, provided the length thereof in no case exceeds three times its breadth; and in like proportion any two or more miners may amalgamate their ground in order to economise fencing and labor.

5. Every holder of a business license who locates himself in any part of the mining district of Ararat, with a view of supplying travelling miners and others with rations, house accommodation, or other necessities of life, shall be entitled to occupy twenty (20) perches of Crown Lands, which may be taken in any form or place he may select, provided such selection shall in no way interfere with the laying out of any business street or any existing right.

6. In no case shall the holder of any business license or miner's right, under any circumstances whatever, be entitled to occupy

for any of the aforesaid purposes ground on any lead, or in the course of any lead, tract, or deposit of gold; and if occupied, the party in possession thereof shall in no way have any right to interfere with parties wishing to mine thereon: Provided always no shaft shall be sunk within ten (10) feet of any store or other building except on neutral ground, and that in all cases where stores or other buildings are undermined, the parties so doing shall securely prop the same.

7. None except the holders of business licenses shall have any right to occupy a site on streets marked out as aforesaid, always excepting those who may be in possession prior to the time of the warden declaring such to be a business stand; and any person taking up business sites for the purpose of sale or barter shall for every such offence be liable for any penalty not exceeding Ten pounds (£10), besides forfeiting all right and title thereto.

8. The warden may declare any ground not held as aforesaid to be forfeited, and shall settle all disputes that may arise through and by the occupation of business sites or sites for residence, and shall protect parties cultivating a garden from trespass by miners, or otherwise authorise miners to mine thereon under such arrangements as he may deem to be just to both parties.

[The Gold Fields Act, 21 Victoria No. 32, clause 6, enacts, that every business license shall entitle the holder thereof, during the continuance of such license, to occupy on any gold field for the purpose of residence and carrying on his business, so much of the Crown Lands not exempted, applied, or used as aforesaid as may be prescribed under the foregoing bye-law, so that such occupation may not be on any land within one quarter of a mile of land situate in any township and previously advertised or specified as about to be offered for sale, and the property in such land shall be deemed a chattel interest, and may be assigned either by transfer of the existing, or by creation of a new interest.]

#### ARARAT MINING DISTRICT.

No. XII.—BYE-LAW RELATING TO THE OCCUPATION OF DAMS, WATER-PRIVILEGES, ETC.—[12th October, 1858.]

At a meeting of the mining board of the mining district of Ararat, begun and holden at the Shamrock Hotel, Barkly street, Ararat, in the said district, on the 12th day of October, One thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, it is ordained by the said board as follows, that is to say:—

1. The sale and exclusive use and possession of any dam, waterhole, or other water-privilege, held or enjoyed by any duly authorised miner or miners in the district of Ararat, shall be held and enjoyed after the following manner, and subject to the following conditions, that is to say:—

2. *Form of application for a dam or other water-privilege.*—Any person or persons as aforesaid desirous of obtaining a grant for the exclusive right to any site for the construction of a dam, race, or other water-privilege, for the purpose of puddling or washing any auriferous earth, or any other substance supposed to be auriferous, by the aid of machinery or by means of a sluice, shall make application for the aforesaid purpose to the warden of the division, by forwarding to said warden a notice in the following form, that is to say:—

I [A. B.] or We [A. B. C. D., &c.] hereby request that you will grant to me [or us] the possession of [specify the site applied for] as a water-privilege for puddling purposes, in accordance with the bye-law of this district relating thereto [here follow the names in full of the whole party, together with dates and numbers of miners' rights], and a copy of the above notice shall be legibly written and posted on the site applied for at least seven days prior to the granting or refusal of such application.

3. *Mode of making objections to the granting of water privileges.* It shall be lawful for any miner or miners, or for the holder of any business license having premises adjacent to the proposed site of any dam, water-privilege, &c., or for the owner of any claim adjacent to the aforesaid site, to object to the granting of such privilege, &c., and to make such objections to the warden of the division within seven days of the date on which the aforesaid notice is posted; such objections to be made in writing.

4. *Objections proved to be valid, application not granted.* A grant shall constitute title.—In the event of any person or persons as aforesaid being able to prove to the satisfaction of the warden, or warden and assessors, that the granting of the exclusive right to any water privileges, &c., as before mentioned, would be an injury to the miners, whether regarded as a monopoly of the water, as the means of preventing auriferous ground from being worked, or in any other way, or to the injury of the owner of any claim, or generally to the injury of the public, such application shall be refused; but when no objections as aforesaid have been made, it shall be lawful for the warden to grant or to refuse such application as he in his discretion may determine. And any application granted as aforesaid shall constitute the title of the owner of such grant to a "puddling or sluicing claim."

5. *Ground occupied by a dam, &c., being auriferous, or preventing adjacent mining operations, to be drained.* Compensation to owners.—In the event of any dam or reservoir for puddling purposes being proved to occupy auriferous ground, or to render the working of alluvial or quartz mining in the immediate neighborhood thereof impracticable, it shall be lawful for the warden and assessors to cause the water in such dam or reservoir to be drained off, so as to allow the ground to be worked: Provided always that the owners of the claim or claims benefited by such arrangement compensate the owner or owners of such dam or reservoir for the actual loss sustained.

6. *Dam, &c., in preparation, how forfeited.*—Seven (7) days dating from the day on which any application as aforesaid is granted shall be allowed to any party obtaining such grant, for the purpose of preparation; but on the expiration of the said period, such party shall commence operations in a *bona fide* manner, and shall continue the work all and every lawful day until the works be completed; but in the event of these conditions not being complied with for forty-eight (48) hours consecutively, such privilege, &c., shall be deemed to be forfeited, and such dam, &c., may be taken possession of by any other duly authorised person or persons, subject, however, to the approval of the warden and to a fair valuation to be paid to the previous owner or owners for the work already done,—such valuation must be paid by the party previous to taking possession.

7. *Construction of dam and tail-race, and injury to property by dams.*—Every dam as aforesaid shall be constructed in a workmanlike and substantial manner, and a tail-race commencing as far above the main embankment as the nature of the ground will permit, shall be cut of sufficient depth and width to carry off the superfluous water in case of a flood; and in the event of any dam breaking away and thereby injuring the property of others, the owner or owners of such dam or reservoir shall be liable for any injury so sustained, unless it can be proved to the satisfaction of the warden and four (4) assessors, that such breaking away is not the result of the faulty construction in such dam or reservoir.

8. *Extent of puddling dam.*—The extent of a puddling dam where machinery is used shall, except where specially provided for otherwise, in no case exceed two hundred and fifty feet (250) feet above the main embankment.

9. *Sludge, refuse water, &c., to be embanked or carried off.*—A second embankment for the purpose of retaining the sludge, refuse water, &c., shall be constructed, such second embankment to be not more than one hundred (100) feet below the main embankment, excepting in those cases where the sludge, &c., can be more conveniently carried off by means of a drain or drains.

10. *Dam abandoned, forfeited.*—Any puddling dam which has been left unoccupied for the space of one month shall be deemed to be abandoned, excepting in cases where there is not a sufficiency of water to carry on operations, or where some reasonable cause can be assigned for the stoppage of the work, and any dam so abandoned may be taken possession in the manner and subject to the foregoing conditions.

11. *Penalty for defiling or carting away water from a dam.*—Any person driving horses or cattle into any dam, or in any way defiling or carting away the water from such dam, without the knowledge and consent of the owner or owners thereof, shall be liable to be fined in any sum not exceeding Ten pounds (£10).

12. *Extent of dam for puddling without machinery.*—Any miner or miners requiring a dam for puddling without the aid of machinery, shall make application for the same as specified in clause two (2); and no dam held under this clause shall exceed in extent one hundred (100) feet above the main embankment.

13. *Waterholes reserved.*—Waterholes, whether natural or artificial, may be reserved for domestic purposes on application to the warden.

14. *Monopoly of springs not allowable.*—All natural springs required and suitable for domestic purposes shall be reserved for these purposes, and no monopoly of such springs shall in any case be allowed.

15. *Special grants of greater extent of dams, &c., on recommendation of mining board.*—Special grants to companies of greater extent, and subject to different conditions than any provided in this bye-law, may be granted by the warden on the recommendation of this mining board.

16. *Dams and water-privileges subject to certain fees.*—All puddling dams and water-privileges in the district of Ararat shall be held subject to any periodical fees which may be hereinafter imposed on such grants, privileges, &c., by this mining

board, and such fees shall be collected and disbursed in such manner as the board may authorise.

#### HEIDELBERG ROAD. PROPOSED DEVIATION.

NOTICE is hereby given that a map and survey plan, describing the exact course and bearings of, and the admeasurements required for, a deviation in the Heidelberg road, in the parishes of Keelbundora and Jika-jika, in the county of Bourke, proposed to be made by the Board of Land and Works, together with a description of the lands through which the same is proposed to pass, and the names of the owners and occupiers thereof, so far as known, and also an estimate of the expense of the said work, have been deposited at the Public Lands Office, Melbourne, the particulars of which are as follow:—

DESCRIPTION OF DEVIATION OF THE HEIDELBERG ROAD THROUGH SECTION 1, PARISH OF KEELBUNDORA, AND SECTION 121, PARISH OF JIKA-JIKA, IN THE COUNTY OF BOURKE:—Commencing at a point on the north side of present road, which point is 10 chains westerly from the north corner of the Darebin Hotel; from thence by a curve 960 links radius, 345 links in length, bearing N. 52° E.; thence 700 links to the Darebin Creek, N. 31° E., the road is one chain wide and contains an area of 1a. 0r. 9p., the property of Thomas Wills; thence with the same bearing 805 links to the boundary between the property of Mr. Dunne and Mrs. Hordern, the road passes through the property of Mr. Dunne, and contains an area 3r. 8p.; thence by a line, being the N.W. boundary of the road, 500 links to a point 320 links from the north boundary of Mrs. Hordern's property, and will contain an area of 23p.

The estimated cost of effecting the said work is £268.

All persons affected by the proposed road are requested to set forth in writing, addressed to the President of the Board of Land and Works, Office of Roads and Bridges, Melbourne, within forty days from the first publication of this notice, any well-grounded objections that they may have to the said road, failing which they will be thereafter precluded from making any such objections or claiming any compensation whatsoever.

#### PROPOSED ROAD DISTRICT. CRESWICK.

IT is hereby notified that certain householders and land-owners (forty-four in number) residing in the parishes of Glendaruel, Addington, Ascot, Bullarook, Spring Hill, Smeaton, Dean, and other places, in the county of Talbot, have petitioned His Excellency the Governor to constitute their locality a road district.

The petitioners state that they have long desired to establish a district road board at Creswick; that several of them, though compelled to pay assessments to the Ballaarat district road board, have derived no benefit therefrom; that many of the roads in the district are frequently impassable, and that a local board is necessary to ensure the due application of the money raised in their district; lastly, that within a short period large quantities of land have been sold in their district, and a large portion of the said land is cleared and under cultivation.

And the petitioners pray that the several parishes comprised within the following boundaries may be proclaimed a road district, under the name of "The Creswick Road District," that is to say:—"Commencing at the source of the Bullarook Creek in the Dividing Ranges, and from thence by a line in the south-westerly direction along the boundary of the county of Talbot to the source of McCallum's Creek in the parish of Addington; and from thence along McCallum's Creek to McCallum's home station; and from thence following the road leading from Lexton to Mount Franklin, bearing east to McLoughlin's Creek; thence by McLoughlin's Creek to its source; and from thence by a line bearing south to the source of Bullarook Creek, the commencing point."

**MUNICIPALITY OF MALDON.**  
**BYE-LAWS FOR STANDING ORDERS.**

**WHEREAS** by an Act of the Lieutenant-Governor and Legislative Council of Victoria, 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, section 26, it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for the council of any municipal district to make bye-laws for the regulation of their own proceedings: And whereas by Proclamation of His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, dated the sixth day of August, A.D. 1858, the district of Maldon was duly established a municipal district: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council of Maldon, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the senior Military Officer administering the Government of Victoria, the proceedings and business of the said council shall be conducted according to the following regulations only, which shall be called the Standing Orders of the said council.

**CHAP. I.—Order of Proceeding.**

1. That the sittings of the council shall on all ordinary occasions be open to the public, but any councillor may require the exclusion of strangers while the sense of the council is taken as to whether the question proposed shall be discussed with closed doors.
2. The business of the council shall commence with a quorum. If at the expiration of thirty minutes from the time of the meeting there is no quorum, no business shall be transacted, and the names of the councillors shall be recorded in the minutes.
3. If the chairman be not present one quarter of an hour after the time appointed for the meeting of the council, a councillor shall be elected to preside as chairman for the time being.
4. The chairman of the council, or the chairman for the time being, may take part in all the proceedings of the council, and in case of an equality of votes upon any division shall give a casting vote.

**ORDER OF BUSINESS.**

- i. Confirmation of minutes of last meeting.
  - ii. Reading of copies of letters sent by authority of council.
  - iii. Reading letters received, and considering and ordering thereon.
  - iv. Reception and reading of petitions and memorials.
  - v. Reading and ordering on reports of permanent committees.
  - vi. Reading and ordering on reports of select committees.
  - vii. Reading and ordering on reports of deputations.
  - viii. Special payments.
  - ix. Special business not classified.
  - x. Order of the day, including subjects arising from proceedings of former meetings.
  - xi. Motions of which previous notice has been given.
  - xii. Notices of motions.
5. The first business of each meeting of the council shall be to confirm the minutes of the preceding meeting, and no discussion shall take place thereupon except as to the accuracy thereof.
  6. All communications by letter intended for the council shall be made and addressed to the town clerk; and all applications and memorials shall be addressed to the chairman, under cover to the town clerk.
  7. No motion shall be decided on at any meeting of council unless notice in writing, signed by the councillor proposing, shall have been given at the previous meeting of the council.
  8. The order of the day shall include all business of which due notice has been given, and all matters arising out of former meetings of the council.
  9. Any motion entered on the notice paper, and the councillor having given notice of the same, being absent, and no other councillor deputed to bring forward such motion when the business is called in order, such motion shall be struck out.
  10. No bye-law shall be decided on without due notice (as in cases of motions) and a copy of the proposed bye-laws shall be open in the Council Chamber for the inspection of all ratepayers, free of charge, or of any person duly qualified to vote at elections under the Act.

**CHAP. II.—Order of Debate.**

1. Any councillor proposing a motion or amendment or discussing any matter must rise and address the chairman, and no councillor shall be interrupted unless by a call to order (when he shall sit down); the councillor calling to order shall then be heard, and the question of order decided before the subject is resumed, or any other business.
2. Any councillor proposing a motion or an amendment must state the nature of it before addressing the council.
3. No councillor shall speak twice on the same question unless by way of explanation merely, or in reply as the mover of an original motion, or upon any amendment, and after such explanation or reply, the question shall be forthwith put to the vote.
4. If more than one councillor rise at one time, the chairman for the time being shall decide which is entitled to pre-audience.
5. No councillor shall digress from the subject under discussion, nor impute motives, and all personal reflections shall be considered highly disorderly.
6. The chairman, when called upon to decide a point of order or practice, shall state the rule or precedent applicable to the case without argument or comment, and his decision as to what is order or explanation shall be final.
7. The chairman shall arise when addressing the council in discussion of any question.

8. Any councillor may demand the production of any of the documents of the council relating to the subject under discussion.

9. Only one amendment shall be discussed at one time, and upon the adoption of any amendment the original motion shall be deemed rejected, and the amendment so carried shall be acted upon as an original motion.

10. The chairman shall, on taking the sense of the council, put the question first in the affirmative, then in the negative, and the votes of all councillors shall be entered on the minutes.

11. The council shall vote by show of hands, except in cases of elections.

12. No proposition once brought before the council shall be withdrawn without leave of the council, nor shall any proposition be entertained by the council until the same be seconded.

13. No discussion shall be allowed on any motion of adjournment; but if the question be negatived, the next motion or order of the day shall be considered before the question of adjournment shall be again entertained: provided the motion be carried, any business left undecided shall take precedence at the next meeting of council.

14. Any councillor may record his protest against any decision of the council, provided the same be made in writing before the next meeting of the council, and couched in respectful language, and be consistent with truth. Notice of such intention, however, must be given on the adoption of the resolution.

15. No motion, the effect of which, if carried, would be to rescind any motion which has already passed the council, shall be entertained during the same municipal year, unless a call of the whole council has been duly made for that purpose; and no such motion for rescinding any resolution of the council, which shall have been negatived by the council, shall be again entertained during the same municipal year.

16. All notices of motions shall be dated and numbered and given by the intended mover at the close of the meeting of council to the town clerk, who shall file the same for the municipal year.

**CHAP. III.—Elections.**

1. No election to any office at the disposal of the council shall take place until four clear days' notice shall have been given in one or more of the local newspapers, inviting applications for the same; and the salary of such office shall in all cases be fixed for the municipal year before proceeding to the election.

2. No councillor or officer belonging to the council shall be received as security for any officer appointed by the council, or for any work to be done for the council; and in all cases in which security for the due and faithful performance of any duty or contract is required, the expense of preparing such security shall be borne by the person or persons giving the same.

3. At all such elections the voting shall be (except at that of chairman of council) on cards or paper to be provided for the purpose, on which the voter shall write the name of the candidate he supports, and sign his own; no others will be received; and the town clerk shall preserve the same as a record.

**CHAP. IV.—Miscellaneous Regulations.**

1. For the consideration of any bye-law, or for the raising or appropriating of money, or for the objects contemplated in the standing order No 15, chap. 11, it shall be competent for any councillor, without previous notice, to move for a call of the whole council for the consideration of any such subject at the next or any subsequent meeting; and upon such motion being carried, due notice thereof shall be given in the notice paper of the day, or notice of motion for which call was made, is set down for consideration; and any member not in attendance when such order of the day or notice of motion comes under consideration, or not in attendance at the voting upon such question, or any amendment thereof, whether of adjournment or otherwise, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding five shillings, unless reasonable cause for such absence be shown to the satisfaction of the council.

2. The town clerk shall have the charge of the common seal of the corporation, and shall be responsible for the safe custody and proper use of the same, each impression thereof being duly verified by the signature of that officer.

3. The town clerk shall affix the municipal seal to contracts, bonds and licenses requiring the same, and to all bye-laws, and addresses to the Governor, passed by the council; but he shall not affix it to any other municipal document without the authority of the council.

4. The town clerk shall not affix the common seal to any corporate document without the express order of the council, nor unless such document bears the signature of the chairman.

5. Any one or more of the standing orders of the council, except No. 15 chap. 11, and No. 1 chap. 4, may be suspended *pro tempore* in case of emergency, provided that the majority present deem it necessary.

#### CONDITIONS.

All the articles required by this notice are to be of the best quality of their several kinds in the best condition, and to be delivered in sound packages.

The flour and bread must be the produce of prime wheat, from which 20 per cent. has been extracted in bran and waste.

Fresh beef and mutton are to be supplied in such proportions as may be required, and when the quantity admits, to be delivered in fore and hind quarters alternately.

When it may be necessary to substitute one article for another, the following proportions are to be observed, viz.:

The above substitutions are to be made whenever it may be considered advisable by the officer authorised to draw the rations, but not otherwise.

The supplies are to be immediately placed on board by the contractor by day or night if so required, on the written order of the officer in command, failing which, they will be otherwise procured, and the expense, over and above the contract price, will be deducted from the contractor's account.

The contractor will be bound to put on board rations either for one day or one month, or more or less, as may be required.

When the vessel shall be in any harbor of the colony except Hobson's Bay, the officer in command shall be at liberty, without reference to this contract, to procure provisions in such manner as he may be empowered by the Government.

The contractor will be required to prepare his own account monthly in the prescribed form, and on the presentation thereof in a complete state, and signed by the officer in command, to the Government Storekeeper for examination, it will be forwarded for payment at the Treasury Pay Office.

In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the supplies, as to quality, the matter is to be decided by a Board of Survey, composed of persons named by the officer in command, and the decision of the Board is to be final; but if, from the perishable nature of the goods, this course cannot be adopted, the officer in command will have power to reject such article or articles, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing.

It will be competent for the Government Storekeeper on behalf of the Government, or the contractor on his own behalf, to terminate the contract by giving a notice in writing of one calendar month to the opposite party; it being understood that such notice can be given only from the first day of a month, and within the period for which the contract is made.

#### CONDITIONS.

1. The hay to be eaten, good, sound and sweet; the straw to be wheaten, and both to be in all respects of the best quality; oats and bran also to be sound and sweet, and of the best description.

2. The supplies to be delivered on the requisition of the officer in charge of the district or station, the quantities stated in the schedule being, however, only approximative; and it must be understood that the Government will draw either more or less than stated. The excess over the estimate will however in no case exceed 50 per cent.

3. The contracts entered into under this notice, are not to be considered as being infringed or vitiated by any contracts made by the Military Commissariat.

4. The forage when delivered must be accompanied by an invoice of quantity, showing the gross weight, the tare, and the net weight (this should be on the back of the requisition or order), which, when signed by the officer in charge of the station for the net quantity received, will be returned to the contractor, and by him rendered in support of his account.

5. Each contractor will be required to prepare his own account monthly, in the prescribed form, and on presentation thereof to the officer in charge of the station or district, it will be forwarded through the Government Storekeeper, for payment at the Treasury Pay Office, Melbourne, or the Pay Office of the district, as may be indicated on the account.

6. Should forage duly ordered under these contracts not be delivered within forty-eight hours, from a reasonable time, to be fixed by the officer in charge of the station or district, it will be competent for the department, should circumstances require it, to purchase the same at the risk of the contractor, from whose account any expense over and above the contract price is to be deducted.

7. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the forage, as to quality of the same, it is to be decided by a board of survey, composed of persons named by the head of a department, and the decision of the board is to be considered final.

8. If the board shall decide that the forage is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which, it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra cost, if any, will be charged as in clause 6.

9. When a board of survey cannot be conveniently assembled, or when from some other cause injury would accrue either to the public service or to the contractor by waiting for a board of survey, the officer in charge will have the power to reject such supplies as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and the contractor must take back the rejected forage and supply good in its stead, failing which, it will be obtained by the officer requiring it, and the expense will be charged as in clause 6.

10. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the forage, or of delay in delivering or replacing it, when required, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Government Storekeeper, to such mulct, not exceeding one-fourth the monthly account, as the Government may direct. It will also be in the power of the Government, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract forthwith.

11. 2. The flour and bread must be the produce of prime wheat, from which on ration No. 1, twenty per cent., and on those of prisoners of the Crown, twelve per cent. has been extracted in bran and waste.

3. Beef and mutton to be supplied in such proportions as may be required, and when the quantity admits of it, to be delivered in fore and hind quarters alternately. When shins of beef form a portion of the supply, a fair proportion of the bone, not less than five inches, must have been cut off.
