MUNICIPALITY OF CARISBROOK.

BY-LAW No. 10.—FOR THE APPROPRIATION OF THE SUM OF TWO THOUSAND FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, GRANTED OUT OF THE PUBLIC REVENUE FOR THE YEAR 1857 TO THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF CARISBROOK.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the Establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted, that every work proposed to be executed by any municipal council by funds raised by aid from the Government, whether by endowment or otherwise, shall be the subject of a distinct and separate bye-law: And whereas the sum of Two thousand five hundred pounds has been granted to the municipal council of Carisbrook out of the public revenue for One thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven: Be it therefore enacted by the council of the municipal district that One thousand two hundred and thirty-four pounds, part of the said sum of Two thousand five hundred pounds, shall be expended in the metalling and repairing of the several streets in Carisbrook, One hundred pounds in fencing-in the public cemetery, and One thousand one hundred and sixty-six pounds, the residue thereof, towards the erection of a town hall in Carisbrook.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 10, made by the municipal council of Carisbrook, has been assented to by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council.

MUNICIPALITY OF DUNOLLY.

BY-LAW No. 8.—A BY-LAW FOR LEVYING A RATE OF ONE SHILLING IN THE POUND FOR THE CURRENT YEAR.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is empowered to impose a rate on all houses and lands within such district, according to their fair average annual value, such rate not to exceed Two shillings in the pound: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council of Dunolly, that a rate of One shilling in the pound for the current year be levied on all property in houses and lands within this municipal district, one moiety to be collected on and after twenty days from the issue of the notices, and the other on and after the 12th December, 1858.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 8, made by the municipal council of Dunolly, has been assented to by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council.

MUNICIPALITY OF KYNETON.

BY-LAW No. 4.—FOR THE APPROPRIATION OF THE FIRST PORTION OF THE GOVERNMENT GRANT IN AID FOR THE YEAR 1858.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of every municipal district is authorised and appointed to pass bye-laws for the execution of any works by funds raised by aid from Government: Be it therefore enacted by the municipal council of Kyneton, That the sum of One thousand pounds, being the first moiety or instalment of the grant in aid received by this council, be appropriated in the formation of footpaths and other improvements in connection therewith within the municipality.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 4, made by the municipal council of Kyneton, has been assented to by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council.

LIGHTS AND SIGNALS ON THE RUSSIAN COASTS.
THE accompanying notices respecting Lights and Fog Signals on the Russian Coasts are published for general information, in compliance with a request from the Russian Government.

The Hydrographic Department of the Imperial Ministry of Marine informs commanders of vessels—

1st. That from the commencement of the present year (1858) the lighthouses of the Gulf of Finland, extending from Cron-
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stadt to Hochland, and further towards the west along the southern coast of the Gulf (excepting the lighthouse of Sourup), as well as the lighthouses of the Gulf of Riga, and those of the Baltic as far as Lüsérort, will continue to be lighted during the summer nights, that is to say, from the 16 | 28 May, until the 1 | 13 July, which according to the old regulation has not hitherto been done.

It has not yet been possible to apply this new measure to the lighthouses placed along the coast of Finland, and of the rocks from Glasholm to Aland; these lighthouses will therefore not be lighted during the period above mentioned. If, nevertheless, such lighting during the summer nights should be also established, a special notification would immediately be issued.

2nd. That in consequence of the repairs which are about to be made to the lighthouse of Sourup, near Reval, that lighthouse will not be lighted *this present year* during the two months summer nights from the 16 | 28 May to the 16 | 28 July.

3rd. That during this summer floating lights will be placed as follows:—

(a) On the southern coast of the bank of Kalbodegrund (which is to the south of the lighthouse of Glasholm) this light will be a red light in a lantern of eight lamps placed on the top of the central mast. During the day the vessel may be recognised from its yellow flag with a blue cross, both diagonal and rectangular, and similar to the flag used for all the floating lights, and which is hoisted upon the main-top-mast. In case of fog a bell will strike single strokes every three seconds for twenty minutes, after which the striking will be suspended for ten minutes.

(b) To the north of Revelstein (near Reval) the lighthouse will have three white lights placed on the three masts in reflecting lanterns having each also eight lamps; during the day this light will also have at the main-top-mast a yellow flag with a rectangular blue cross.

In case of a fog a bell will strike with intervals of five minutes.

Special notifications will make known the period at which these lights will be established during next summer, and also the period when they shall be removed.

The Hydrographic Department, in order to complete the notification of the 28th April of the present year, informs commanders of vessels that all the lighthouses of Finland (with the exception of that of Logsker, which is being re-built) will be lighted at night during the summer of the present year, 1858, from the 16 | 28 May to the 1 | 13 July.

The Hydrographic Department of the Imperial Ministry of Marine informs commanders of vessels, that the reconstruction of the lighthouse of Kokscheren, in the Gulf of Finland, a little to the east of the meridian of Reval, being completed, that lighthouse will be lighted from the 15 | 27 May of the present year. It carries a *Fresnel* apparatus of the second class with a continuous white light. The provisional lighthouse which was lit until now, will no longer be lit. The height of the lantern of the new lighthouse is 97 English feet above the land, and 111 feet above the horizon of the sea. The focus of the light is 100 feet above the level of the sea, consequently its mathematical horizon is 11½ miles; lastly, the eye of the observer being at the height of 60 feet above the level of the sea, the continuous white light of the lighthouse will be visible, in fine weather, from all points of the horizon at a distance of 20 Italian miles and even more.

The base of the lighthouse is broad, built of stone and white-washed; the upper part is of iron, painted red; the lantern and the roofing are painted green.

All the articles required by this notice are to be of the best quality of their several kinds in the best condition, and to be delivered in sound packages.

The flour and bread must be the produce of prime wheat, from which 20 per cent. has been extracted in bran and waste.

Fresh beef and mutton are to be supplied in such proportions as may be required, and when the quantity admits, to be delivered in fore and hind quarters alternately.

The contractor will be bound to put on board rations either for one day or one month, or more or less, as may be required.

When the vessel shall be in any harbor of the colony except Hobson's Bay, the officer in command shall be at liberty, without reference to this contract, to procure provisions in such manner as he may be empowered by the Government.

The contractor will be required to prepare his own account monthly in the prescribed form, and on the presentation thereof in a complete state, and signed by the officer in command, to the Government Storekeeper for examination, it will be forwarded for payment at the Treasury Pay Office.

In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the supplies, as to quality, the matter is to be decided by a Board of Survey, composed of persons named by the officer in command, and the decision of the Board is to be final; but if, from the perishable nature of the goods, this course cannot be adopted, the officer in command will have power to reject such article or articles, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing.

During the past half-year the permanent levels of the Punt road have been agreed upon with the corporation of Melbourne, and a proposition made by the city surveyor to form and metal that portion of the road between the Domain road and Gardiner's Creek road, was accepted by the municipal council, since which no action has been taken by the corporation of Melbourne, in consequence, it is said, of the want of funds. The municipal council is prepared to carry out this most desirable improvement immediately; but as this cannot be done without the co-operation of the corporation of Mel-

bourne, it remains for the ratepayers on the city side of the road to take such steps as may appear necessary to obtain this object.

ATTENDANCE OF MEMBERS.—COUNCIL MEETINGS.
