NEW ZEALAND CUSTOMS REGULATION ACT, 1858.

(21 and 22 Victoria No. 40, sec. 32.)

"If any goods enumerated or described in the following table of prohibitions shall be imported or brought into New Zealand, then and in every such case such goods shall be forfeited, and shall be destroyed or otherwise disposed of as the Commissioner may direct.

A TABLE OF PROHIBITIONS INWARDS.

Goods absolutely prohibited to be imported.

Books, wherein the copyright shall be first subsisting, first composed, or written or printed in the United Kingdom, or in New Zealand, and printed or reprinted in any other part of the world, as to which the proprietor of such copyright or his agent shall have given to the commissioner a notice in writing that such copyright subsists, such notice also stating when such copyright will expire.

Coin, viz., false money or counterfeit sterling.

Coin of the realm, or of any British possession, or any money purporting to be such, not being of the established standard in weight or fineness.

Indecent or obscene prints, paintings, books, cards, lithographic or other engravings, or other indecent or obscene articles.

All such infected cattle, sheep, or other animals, and hides, skins, horns, hoofs, or any other part of cattle or other animals as the Governor in Council shall at any time prohibit in order to prevent any infectious or contagious distemper or disease.

Spirits (not being perfumed or medicinal spirits), unless in ships of forty tons burden at least, and in casks or other vessels capable of containing liquids, each of such casks or other vessels being of the size or content of fourteen gallons at the least, and duly reported, or in glass bottles or stone bottles not exceeding the size of three pint bottles, and being really part of the cargo of the importing ship, and duly reported.

Snauff or tobacco, unless in ships of forty tons burden at least, and in whole and complete packages, each containing not less than sixty pounds nett weight, and not containing any other goods, and unless into such ports as are or may be approved by the Governor for the importation of tobacco.

Cigars, unless in ships of forty tons burden at least, and in packages containing not less than sixty pounds nett weight, or not less than ten thousand in number each, and not containing any other goods, and unless into such ports as are or may be approved as last aforesaid.

Opium, unless in ships of forty tons burden at least, and in whole and complete packages, each containing not less than forty-five pounds nett weight, and not containing any other goods, and unless into such ports as may be approved by the Governor for the importation of opium.

BYE-LAWS OF THE COMMISSIONERS OF SEWERS AND WATER SUPPLY.

WHEREAS by an Act of Council passed in the sixteenth year of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, No. 39, intituled, *An Act to establish a board of commissioners, for the better sewerage and drainage of the city of Melbourne, and for supplying water thereto, and to the suburbs thereof*, the said commissioners are authorised (section 13) from time to time to make, alter, and repeal bye-laws for the following amongst other purposes, viz., for regulating the amount of assessment and collection of rates, charges and contributions, the forms of rates, and the mode and period of and for appeal from rates and charges for default, and to impose such penalties as they may think fit, not exceeding twenty pounds for each breach thereof: Provided that no bye-law shall be of any force or effect until the same be submitted to and approved of by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, and published in three consecutive numbers of the *Government Gazette*.

And whereas by an Act of the Parliament of Victoria passed in the twenty-first year of the Reign of Her said Majesty

Queen Victoria, No. 59, intituled, *An Act to amend An Act intituled An Act to establish a board of commissioners, for the better sewerage and drainage of the city of Melbourne, and for supplying water thereto, and to the suburbs thereof*.

The said commissioners are authorized under section 13, in addition to the purposes directed by and under the provisions of the said *Melbourne Sewerage and Water Act, &c.*, to make, alter, and repeal bye-laws for regulating the mode, form, strength, material, construction and arrangement of pipes and other works, supplying water from the pipes of the board to adjacent premises, and regulating the time of doing the same, and the notices to be given, the superintending thereof, the making good ground which may be displaced thereby, and for inspecting all services whether within or without any buildings, at all reasonable times, and to regulate the construction, disposition, custody, and inspection of meters, and for classifying the several tenements to be supplied with water, and determining the rate to be paid by each class, either according to the annual value, or the number of rooms in such tenements or otherwise, and for making and levying such rate, and for regulating the passage of carriages and traffic upon and over the tramway, and for preventing and removing nuisances and obstructions thereon, and for preventing the waste or misuse of water supplied by the board, and for causing persons using the same to keep their pipes and other apparatus in proper repair, and for preventing any tampering with or altering such pipes without notice to the board, and for repairing such pipes and apparatus so as to prevent the waste of water and recovering the cost of such repairs, and for preventing any person from allowing any other person not having agreed to be supplied by the board to use the water, and for preventing such person from using the same, and for preventing any person from wilfully or carelessly breaking, injuring or opening any lock, cock, valve, pipe, work or engine belonging to the board, and from doing any other wilful act whereby such water may be wasted, and for imposing penalties for breaches of such bye-laws: Provided the surveyor or other person appointed for that purpose by the board may, between the hours of Nine o'clock in the forenoon and Four o'clock in the afternoon, enter into any house or premises supplied with water by the board, in order to examine if there be any waste or misuse of such water, and if such surveyor or other person at any such time be refused admittance into such dwelling-house or premises for the purpose aforesaid, or be prevented from making such examination as aforesaid, the board may turn off the water supplied by them from such house or other premises; and provided no penalty shall be imposed for the breach of any such bye-law, greater than the penalty specified in the said Act.

Now in execution of the said powers the said commissioners do make the bye-laws following:—

1. A valuation shall be made from time to time if the commissioners think fit, of the annual value of all houses and tenements opposite or convenient to which pipes for the conveyance of water shall have been laid by the said commissioners.

2. Notice of the amount of such valuation shall be given to the person liable to pay water rate for the same.

3. Such persons may appeal to the commissioners against such valuation, on giving notice, in writing, of such appeal to the secretary of the commissioners within fourteen days of the service of such notice.

4. The commissioners may either confirm the valuation or make a new one, and in the event of the parties not acquiescing in the award of the commissioners, they may appeal to two justices of the peace, by whom the same shall be determined.

5. All persons applying for and receiving water from the said commissioners shall pay for the same, until further notice be given by the said commissioners of any alteration in their rates, at the following rates, viz:—

1. On houses of £50 annual value and under, a rate of Five pounds per centum on the valuation.

2. On houses above £50 and under £300 annual value, a rate of Four pounds ten shillings per centum on the valuation.

3. On houses of £300 annual value and upwards, a rate of Four pounds per centum on the valuation.

4. Houses, stores, manufactories, or premises in which the quantity of water consumed, or likely so to be, would be greater or less than the average consumption of private houses of equal value, shall be subject to such special rate on the annual value as the said commissioners may think fit to impose, and as may be agreed to by the owners, in addition to or in deduction from the abovenamed rating at their annual value.

6. All such rates shall be paid in advance, by equal quarterly payments, at Christmas-day, Lady-day, Midsummer-day, and Michaelmas-day in every year; but the first payment for any portion of a quarter shall be made at the time when the pipe by which water is supplied is made to communicate with the pipes of the commissioners, or at the time when the agreement to take water from the commissioners is made.

7. Any person receiving water from the commissioners who shall supply any other house or premises with water than that for which he is himself liable, or who shall allow any person not subject to water rate to be supplied, or who shall allow water to be taken from his premises to be consumed elsewhere,

shall be liable to a rate in respect of the premises so supplied, or to a penalty of Five pounds for each case in which water shall be so supplied by him, as to the said commissioners may seem most fit.

8. If any person shall neglect to pay such rate as may be chargeable against him, the commissioners may stop the water from flowing into his premises by cutting off the pipe to such premises, or by such means as the commissioners may think fit; and any person from whose premises such supply shall have been cut off by reason of neglect to pay such rate as may be chargeable against him, shall be liable to a penalty of Five pounds.

9. Any person who shall open any ground so as to uncover a pipe of the commissioners, or who shall lay any leaden or other pipe to communicate with any such pipe, without giving to the commissioners fourteen days' notice of his intention so to do, or who shall make any pipe to communicate with the pipes of the commissioners without giving to them two days' notice of the day and hour when such pipe is intended to be made to communicate with the pipe of the commissioners, or who shall make such communication without the superintendence, or contrary to the directions of the officer appointed by the commissioners, unless he shall fail to attend at the time mentioned in such notice, or who shall lay any leaden or other pipe to communicate with the pipes of the commissioners of a strength and material not approved of by the commissioners, shall forfeit for each offence a sum not exceeding Twenty pounds.

10. In all cases where a stand pipe is erected for the supply of the houses and tenements in any right-of-way, lane, or other place, any person not occupying a house in any such right-of-way, lane, or other place who shall take water from such stand pipe shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Four pounds, unless he or she shall have received a written permission from the commissioners to take water from any such stand pipe.

11. Any person supplied with water who shall wilfully or negligently allow the same to run to waste, shall be liable for each offence to a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

12. All persons requiring to remove or alter the position of any meter, shall give six days' notice, in writing, to that effect to the secretary of the commissioners, in order that the registration of the quantity of water used may be taken; and any person who shall remove or alter the position of any such meter without giving such notice as aforesaid, shall forfeit to the commissioners a sum not exceeding Twenty pounds for each offence, over and above the damage which he may be found liable to pay in any action at law at the suit of the commissioners.

13. All owners and occupiers shall, at their own expense, keep and maintain their meters in good working condition, to the satisfaction of such officer as may be appointed by the board; and in the event of any repair being required, notice, in writing shall be immediately given to the secretary of the board, and a registration taken before such repair shall be effected.

14. And any person who shall neglect to comply with these conditions shall, for every offence, be liable to a penalty of not less than Twenty pounds.

MUNICIPAL INSTITUTIONS.
AVOCA PETITION.

IN pursuance of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of a petition addressed to His Excellency as hereinafter set forth, signed by one hundred and sixty-six householders and landholders resident at Avoca, praying for the erection of their locality into a municipal district.

The petitioners state that Avoca is one of the oldest townships on the gold fields; that in addition to its gold field, it is in the centre of a rich agricultural district; that it is well watered and wooded; that it has always been the head-quarters of the district, and that it is on the main road to Adelaide, and sixteen miles distant from any other town of importance.

That in the absence of a recognized or municipal body to watch over its affairs, its interests have suffered seriously, all property being thereby deteriorated in value, and its mineral resources scarcely developed.

That the creation of a municipality would be a certain means of remedying the evils before stated, and rendering Avoca one of the first townships on the gold fields.

The petitioners suggest that the proposed municipal district be as follows, viz. :— "From a point at the south-west corner of allotment 137 of country allotments south-west of Avoca; thence north three miles; thence east three miles; thence south three miles; thence west three miles to the point of commencement;" such area not containing more than nine square miles, in which no one point is distant more than six miles from any other point, and there being three hundred house and land holders therein.

And the petitioners pray as follows :—

"Your memorialists therefore pray your Excellency may be pleased to cause the above district to be proclaimed a municipality under the provisions of the 18th Victoria No. 15, by the name of the Avoca Municipality."

BRIGHTON—SECOND PETITION.

IN pursuance of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of a petition addressed to His Excellency as hereinafter set forth, signed by one hundred and sixty-five householders and landholders resident at Brighton, in the county of Bourke, praying for the erection of their locality into a municipal district.

The petitioners solicit that Brighton may be proclaimed a municipal district, and state that the area prayed for does not exceed nine square miles, that it contains a population of householders of between three and four hundred, and that no one point therein is distant more than six miles from any other point.

That the persons who have signed the petition exceed in number one hundred and fifty, all of whom reside within the proposed district.

And the petitioners pray as follows :—

"Your petitioners pray that the limits and boundaries of the said municipal district may be as follows, viz. :—On the west side commencing at the south-west corner of the south boundary road of the special survey and the beach along the beach between the north and south boundary roads of the said special survey; thence eastwardly along the northern boundary road of the said special survey to a road running at right angles therewith, which road is generally called and known as Tucker's road; thence southwardly along the said Tucker's road to its intersection with the red metal road, or more properly called the road from Melbourne to Frankston; thence along the said last-named road to the Plough and Harrow Hotel; and thence at right angles in a westerly direction along the south boundary road of the said special survey to the place of commencement;" and further, "that your Excellency will be pleased to appoint some fit and proper person to preside as chairman at any meeting of the said householders to be hereafter convened, and at all adjournments thereof."

MEDICAL ATTENDANCE ON PRISONERS IN PENAL HULKS.

TENDERS will be received until Noon on Monday, the 29th day of November, from legally qualified medical practitioners willing to contract for the supply of medical attendance and the necessary medicines for the prisoners on board the Penal Hulks in Hobson's Bay during the year 1859.

The service required is the provision of medicines and medical attendance for the female prisoners and children (averaging about 100 in number) on board the hulk *Sacramento*; and the prisoner seamen in the hulk *Lysander* (numbering from about 12 to 50), for the period stated. Arrangements will be made by which the medical contractor can be conveyed to and from the hulks.

Tenders are to be made at so much per annum, and one sum is to be named for the performance of the entire service.

Tenders are to be endorsed, "Tender for Medical Attendance on Prisoners in Hulks," and forwarded to the Chief Medical Officer, Melbourne.

The lowest or any tender will not necessarily be accepted.

The decision of the Government will be made known on the 14th December next.

CONDITIONS OF CONTRACT.

1. To give medical attendance and the necessary medicines to such persons on board the hulks named above as may require the same, for one year from the 1st January, 1859. The contractor will be required to attend for the above purpose on board each hulk regularly twice in each week, on such days as may be fixed, and as often otherwise as he may be required in cases of emergency.

2. To forward to the Chief Medical Officer all such returns, reports, &c., as may be required, and to follow all instructions given by that officer with reference to the performance of the contract.

The contract will be terminable by one month's notice, either from the contractor, or from the Chief Medical Officer on behalf of the Government, such notice to be given from the 1st of any month within the period for which the contract is made.

6. For extending the Yan Yean water to Williamstown. The application has been so far complied with that the pipes have been ordered from England.
7. For materials and a site for the erection of a morgue. Complied with, upon the understanding that the building be erected at the expense of the council.
8. For the walks around the Battery, to be open for public recreation on Sundays. Complied with.
9. For a reduction of the postage on letters to twopence to this town. Could not be entertained.
10. For a road, to be set out from the Melbourne road in continuation of Yarra street to the Cemetery. No reply.
11. For a grant of land for the erection of a Trades Hall. Granted.
12. For the eradication of thistles. Complied with.
13. For the erection of a bridge over the railway in Cole street. A reply has been received that the bridge will be commenced forthwith.
14. For fencing in the watch-house and police reserve. Complied with.
15. For granting quarrying licenses. Under the consideration of the Chief Commissioner of Crown Lands.
16. For materials for the erection of a Mechanics' Institute. Refused.

Applications have also been made for moneys to be placed on the Estimates for 1859, for the following purposes:—

1. For running out a wharf at the end of Stevedore street.
2. For extending the Yan Yean waterworks to this town.
3. For widening and extending the old pier.
4. For a grant in aid of public gardens.
5. For a grant in aid of the cemetery.
6. For the erection of a post office.
7. For the erection of police barracks.
8. For extending the Ann street jetty.

BYE-LAWS.

The following bye-laws have been passed by the council, of which five have received the assent of His Excellency the Governor.

- No. 31. To enable the council to cause all the buildings within the district to be numbered. Gazetted 11th June, 1858.
- No. 35. To enable the council to inflict a fine of not exceeding £20 on any member resigning his seat during the currency of any municipal year. Returned, with an intimation that the council had exceeded its powers in framing it.
- No. 36. To regulate the conducting of the election of members of the municipal council. Gazetted 3rd of August, 1858.
- No. 37. To impose a rate of one shilling in the pound for the current municipal year, ending 7th April, 1859.—Gazetted 7th July, 1858.
- No. 38. To alter and amend clause No. 10 of bye-law No. 20. Gazetted 17th August, 1858.
- No. 39. For compelling the inhabitants of the municipality to keep their premises free from offensive and unwholesome matter, and for restraining noisome, offensive and unhealthy trades, and for otherwise preserving the public health. Gazetted 24th August, 1858.

PUBLIC WORKS.

The following roadworks have been executed during the half-year, viz:—

1. Completion of Ferguson street from Douglas parade to the railway.
2. Rosseau street.
3. Douglas parade, from John street to Yarra street
4. Thompson street, from Hammer street over the railway to Osborne street.
5. Cemetery road, from Ferguson street crossing.
6. Dover place.

The length of pathways formed and partly metalled during the same period is upwards of three and a-half miles, making the total length of pathways now formed fourteen miles and fifty-eight chains.

The council, being impressed with the necessity which existed for making some improvement to the old wharf, by which proper accommodation could be afforded for pedestrians and vehicles, have caused approaches to be made from Nelson place, and a path to be formed on the east side, for which purpose a portion of the kerbstones have been used which were obtained for kerbing the streets. The centre of the wharf has been metalled, and the stones which have so long been dangerous to persons using the wharf after nightfall have been removed.

ASSESSMENT.

The public works committee caused an estimate to be made of the probable amount required for new works and repairs during the current year, amounting to £18,674. In terms of the Act an assessment was then made on all property and lands within the district. The council having held four special general meetings to revise the assessment, finally adopted it, when it represented 1542 rateable properties, of the aggregate value of £69,387. On the 23rd June a rate was struck on this amount of one shilling in the pound, payable on the 1st August and 1st December, 1858; of this rate £859 11s. 6d. has been collected up to the 11th October.

APPEALS.

Courts of appeal were held in both the municipal and district courts, when the total number of appeals made were sixty-eight, and the amount of reductions for the entire assessment was £618, leaving an assessment balance of £68,769, a result which the council consider highly satisfactory.

FINANCE.

The third half-yearly instalment of £500, in part repayment of the £5000 loan, was duly paid to the English, Scottish and Australian Chartered Bank, on the 6th September, 1858.

The second instalment on account of the legislative grant has been received, amounting to £2692, during the half-year, and since then a further sum of £1480 17s. 5d. has been reduced, making a total sum of £5922 17s. 5d.

CEMETERY.

Considerable progress has been made towards the improvement of the cemetery, the fencing has been completed and laborers have been constantly employed in laying out the ground in accordance with the plan prepared by the municipal surveyor, and contracts have been entered into for shell to metal the paths. Much greater improvements might have been made had assistance been obtained from the Government for the present year; but the application for a grant having been made too late (although dated 19th April, 1858), was refused. The council has therefore advanced such sums as have been necessary for carrying on improvements. Thirty-nine interments have been made.

PUBLIC GARDENS.

The council has resumed the management of the public garden and caused a plan to be prepared for laying out the grounds. A voucher for the sum of £500, being the amount of the Government grant voted for the purpose, has been duly signed by the chairman, and it is anticipated that the amount will be received in a few days, when operations will be immediately commenced.

MISCELLANEOUS.

An application was made to the council by Mr. William Harvey, for permission to lay down a tramway along Ann and Hammer streets, connecting the Ann street jetty with the railway; the council being of opinion that the tramway as proposed to be constructed would interfere with the ordinary traffic of the town, refused the application sought, although sensible of the advantages to be derived from the formation of tramways, such as could be used by ordinary vehicles. The surveyor is now preparing a plan showing the extent of pier accommodation which might be made available within the municipality, with tramways connecting the piers with the railway.

The council, impressed with the necessity which exists for lighting the town during the winter months, has entered into a contract for thirty iron lamp columns, to be shipped at Liverpool, and anticipates having them erected within the next six months. Subsequently, an offer was made by a Melbourne firm to furnish plant and apparatus for the supply of gas for 2000 lights, with metres, street lamps, rims and posts, implements, &c., complete, for £3440. This offer the council declined, not having the necessary funds at its disposal; at the same time, the council is fully alive to the advantages to be derived from the introduction of gas into the town, and is of opinion that the formation of a gas company would prove highly remunerative.

A meeting of the municipal conference was held in Melbourne in the beginning of last June. Councillor Verdon was elected the delegate from this council, and was appointed chairman of the conference. The question of municipal endowment was considered, and a resolution passed in favor of endowment by land. The Municipal Act, together with several others relating to municipal government, were considered, and amendments proposed in them, with a recommendation in favor of the consolidation of all the laws referring to municipal government.
