MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF NEWTOWN AND CHILWELL.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, passed in the eighteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, "An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria," it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, notwithstanding any Act, law, or statute to the contrary, to declare as a municipal district as therein mentioned, or to include within the limits and boundaries of any municipal district to be declared as aforesaid, any locality now included within the corporate limits of the corporation of the city of Melbourne or town of Geelong, and upon the publication of any proclamation defining the limits of any such municipal district, the locality included within such limits shall cease to be a portion of or to be or be deemed to be within the corporate limits of either of the said corporations, or to be in any manner subject thereto, and shall belong solely to the municipal district described in such proclamation, provided that no liability existing at the time of any such proclamation for any rate or the means of enforcing the same shall be affected by the said Act or such proclamation: And whereas a petition numerously signed by the ratepayers and householders of the districts of Newtown and Chilwell, situate within the corporate limits of the town of Geelong, has been presented to the Governor, praying for the separation of the said districts from the said town and the erection thereof into a municipal district, the substance and prayer of which petition have been published in accordance with the said Act: And whereas the Governor, with the advice aforesaid, has, in exercise of the powers conferred by the said Act, determined the proportion of the entire liability to be borne by such municipal district for the loan contracted by the corporation of the said town as and to be as follows, viz., the portion of such loan expended on works within such municipal district, together with the interest thereon paid by the corporation of the said town, and two-thirteenth parts of the working expenses of such corporation during the three years ended on the thirty-first day of December One thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven inclusively, subject to deduction in respect of the amount of interest repaid by the Government for the said portion of such loan so expended within such municipal district, and subject also to the deduction of the amount of rates collected by such corporation within such district during the three years aforesaid: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, do by this my proclamation, in pursuance of the provisions of the said Act, with the advice of the Executive Council, declare that the district hereinafter described and

named shall be a municipal district within the meaning of the said Act, that is to say:—

THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF NEWTOWN AND CHILWELL.—Commencing at a point on the north bank of the river Barwon, being the centre of La Trobe terrace; thence north by a line passing through the centre of La Trobe terrace to Aberdeen street; thence west by a line passing through the centre of Aberdeen street to a government road forming the western boundary of portions 1 and 2, section 3, parish of Moorparryal; thence north by a line passing through the centre of that road to a government road forming the northern boundary of portions 7 and 8, section 13, in the said parish; thence west by a line passing through the centre of that road to a government road forming the western boundary of portions 8, 9, and 10, section 13, in the parish aforesaid; thence south by a line passing through the centre of that road to the north bank of the river Barwon; thence by a line bearing south to the centre of the stream; thence southward and eastward by a line passing through the centre of the river to a point due south of La Trobe terrace; and thence by a line bearing north to the commencing point.

And I do hereby, with the advice aforesaid, direct that the council of the said municipal district shall be called by the name and style of "The Municipal Council of Newtown and Chilwell."

CONEWARRE ROAD DISTRICT ALTERED.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by a Proclamation under the hand of the Governor and the seal of the colony, bearing date the eighth day of October, in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, a certain district was declared as and to be a road district by the name of "The Conewarre Road District," and the boundaries thereof were defined: And whereas it is deemed expedient to alter the boundaries of the said road district: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, in pursuance of the authority vested in me in this behalf, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby revoke so much of the said Proclamation as defines the boundaries of the said Conewarre road district, and I do hereby proclaim and declare that from henceforth the said Conewarre road district shall consist of the portion of the said colony comprised within the following boundaries, that is to say:—

Commencing at a point on the south bank of the Waura Chain of Ponds being the north-east angle of the parish of Dunced; thence south by the boundary of that parish to Thomson's Creek; thence westerly by Thomson's Creek to the north-western angle of the parish of Puebla; thence south by the eastern side of a Government road and a line bearing south to Spring Creek, the northern boundary of the parish of Jan-jac; thence by that creek north-easterly and easterly to

the sea-coast; thence north-easterly to the sea-coast to the mouth of the River Barwon; thence westerly and north-westerly by the River Barwon; the eastern shores of Lake Conewarre, and again by the River Barwon to the Waurin Chain of Ponds; and thence south-westerly by the Waurin Chain of Ponds to the commencing point.

PETITION FOR MUNICIPAL INSTITUTIONS.

DUNOLLY.

IN pursuance of the Act of Council, 18 Victoria No. 15, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of a petition addressed to His Excellency, as hereinafter set forth, signed by one hundred and fifty-one householders resident in the district of Dunolly.

The petitioners state that they are deeply impressed by the conviction that necessity exists for the erection of Dunolly into a municipal district, and that its incorporation will tend to the improvement and good government thereof; and they suggest that the boundary line should commence at the Junction Hotel, Burnt Creek, and be continued thence due north five miles and 1298 yards, so as to include the property in the occupation of William Fenwick, Esquire, the warden of the district; the other boundaries to be such as to enclose an area not exceeding nine square miles, within which no spot shall be distant six miles from any other spot. In the proposed area they state that there are more than three hundred householders.

And they pray as follows:—

"Your petitioners therefore humbly pray that Dunolly may be proclaimed a municipal district according to the provisions of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15."

MEMORIAL FOR A ROAD DISTRICT, GREAT BRIGHTON.

THE substance and prayer of a Memorial to His Excellency the Governor, containing resolutions agreed to at a public meeting of the landholders and householders of Great Brighton, held at the Devonshire Inn, on Saturday, the 20th ultimo, and representing the expediency of constituting their locality a road district, to be styled "The Great Brighton Road District," are published below for general information.

The memorialists represent that considering the present bad condition of many of the public roads in and about Brighton, the numbers and position of its inhabitants, &c., it is highly important that a road district be formed, and they suggest that the boundaries thereof be as follow:—"Starting from the Elsternwick Hotel, proceed along the right hand side of the red metal road to the Plough and Harrow; thence at a right angle by the boundary road to the beach; thence along the beach to the boundary of the St. Kilda Municipality; and thence in a direct line to the starting point."

And the memorialists pray as follows:—

WILLIAMSTOWN CEMETERY.

REGULATIONS made by the municipal council of the district of Williamstown, for the management of the Public Cemetery established there, pursuant to the 18 Victoria No. 15, section 27, &c., and in conformity with Act 17 Victoria No. 12, clauses 6, 8, &c.

1. All charges must be paid when orders are given or before the ground or vault is opened.

2. Any person making a vault, or erecting and placing a monument in the cemetery, by and with the permission of the municipal council, under these rules, and upon the payment of the charges hereinafter set forth, is entitled to have, maintain, and keep a vault, monument or tombstone, according to the tenor of such permission, to and for the sole and separate use of such person or persons and his or their representatives for ever.

3. Application for such permission to be made to the said municipal council. A certificate of permission in the form set out in the schedule will be granted to the party applying for such permission, on payment of the charges in the schedule.

4. The charges will be remitted on the burial of any poor person in such cemetery, on the certificate of a minister of religion, or other evidence proving to the satisfaction of the said council that such person was a pauper, or that the relatives and friends of the deceased are unable to pay the costs and charges.

5. The said council will cause all common graves to be dug, but parties wanting brick graves or vaults will be required to construct them under the direction of the said council or their surveyor, and in case interment is to be made in any private grave or vault, the consent (in writing) of the party entitled thereto must be left with the order.

6. The time fixed for the funeral to be the time when the procession is to be at the cemetery, and the same must be punctually observed.

7. Until otherwise ordered, the usual hours fixed for the performance of funerals will be from 10 a.m. to 6 o'clock p.m. in the months of September to April inclusive, and from 10 a.m. to 4 o'clock p.m. in the other four months, except on Sundays, when the usual and only hours for funerals will be from 9 a.m. to 5 o'clock p.m. throughout the year.

8. All monuments, vaults, graves, and gravestones to be kept in repair and proper condition at the expense of the owners.

9. Every coffin in a vault or brick grave to be bricked in, cemented, and covered by a slab of freestone, slate, or iron.

10. A drawing of every stone, tomb, pedestal, and plan of every monument or tablet proposed to be erected, to be submitted to the said council for approval, who shall determine and fix the position of any unobjectionable monument according to the description, size and character thereof, having reference to the general plan for ornamenting the said cemetery in an appropriate manner. In the erection of tablets copper cramps must be used.

11. The plans of all fences to be submitted to the said council. All wooden fencing must be after a mode to be seen on application.

12. No servant or other person employed by or engaged in any duty on behalf of the said council will be permitted to receive any gratuity for the discharge thereof.

13. The ground will be open daily to the public from sunrise to sunset.

14. A plan of the cemetery, shewing the situation of the purchased and other graves, shall be kept at the office, and may be inspected at the charge set out in the schedule.

15. Any person who shall wantonly or wilfully destroy, or do or cause to be done any damage to any monument, vault, tombstone, building, erection, railing, fence, shrubbery, tree, or plant, shall on conviction before any two or more of the justices of the peace for the said district, forfeit and pay a sum or penalty of not exceeding twenty pounds.

16. The council reserve the right to make any alterations from time to time in these charges and regulations.

17. No dogs will be allowed to enter the cemetery.

18. The certificate form in schedule B, to be signed by the chairman of the council, and countersigned by the town clerk.

MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF PORTLAND.

STATEMENT OF THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE COUNCIL FOR THE SIX MONTHS ENDING ON THE 31ST DAY OF JANUARY, 1858.

PUBLIC WORKS.

THE council have continued to expend the funds at their command in the improvements of the principal streets, chiefly in Percy street, Julia street, Henty street, Hurd street, Gawler street, and Otway street. Some improvements have also been made in South Portland. The approaches to the jetties are also in the course of formation under the direction of the council, the expense of which will be borne by a special appropriation of the sum of £950 at the disposal of the Central Road Board.

The council have to regret that the new jetty, which has been so long in construction, has not yet been completed, but as the council have no control whatever over that work, and there is no engineer or other officer in Portland in charge, the delay is not to be wondered at, nor can the council be blamed. The consequence of the delay is that the jetty could not be used during the busy season of the year.

ENDOWMENT.

The council have petitioned the Governor to recommend to the Legislature a liberal permanent endowment of the municipalities within the colony. Nothing permanent has, however, been yet decided on, but a grant has been made for the ensuing year, based on the amount of local assessment collected, but the amount has not yet been declared.

BOTANICAL GARDEN.

In the latter end of September last, the sum of £300 was appropriated for the purpose of improving the botanical gardens, but with an injunction that the whole of the money must be spent before the 25th December. The council accordingly applied themselves to expending the money as speedily as they could, and to the best advantage that the limited time would allow, and, acting on the suggestion of the superintendent of the Botanical Gardens in Melbourne, obtained the services of Mr. Alexander Elliott (then employed in the Melbourne Gardens) in forming walks in the eastern portion of the gardens; which has been fenced off from the remainder, from which it was decided to raise some revenue by letting it for a grazing paddock. While the works were in progress the sum appropriated was increased from £300 to £500, and the restriction as to the time in which the money was to be spent removed, but too late, however, as to the £300, which was by that time nearly spent, the walks being completed. The council have suspended their proceedings in consequence of the difficulties attending the receipt of the money appropriated, none of which has yet been received, although, within the last few days, an order has been made for the payment of the money (not to the council but to the chairman and the police magistrate), but as the latter has no instructions on the subject, the council are still unable to get repaid the sum they have expended in anticipation of the grant. It is hoped, however, that time may overcome the difficulties in the way, and that the full amount may ultimately be available for the public benefit.

FIRE-ENGINE.

An efficient fire-engine for the use of the town has been ordered from London, and its arrival may be expected shortly.

In consequence of a communication from the Central Board of Health of the prevalence of small-pox in Melbourne and

other parts of the colony, the council took such steps as appeared necessary to be prepared in case that disease should appear in Portland.

The attention of the council having been directed to the bills now before Parliament for the alteration of the electoral districts of the colony, and which appeared highly detrimental to the western portion of the colony, the council adopted a petition to the Legislative Assembly against the bill, which was presented by Mr. Hughes, M.P. for the town, and has been followed by several other petitions from different parts of the western district and other places in the colony.

A vacancy in the council having been caused by the sudden death of Mr. Bell, an election of a successor took place on the 4th December, when Mr. Thomas Finn, a former member of the council, was elected without opposition.

At the end of the municipal year, Messrs. Crouch, Learmonth, and Fitzgerald retired from the council by rotation, and Messrs. Fitzgerald, Learmonth, and John Browning (a former member of the council) were duly elected to fill the vacancies in the council.
