In the proposed area they state that there are more than three hundred householders.

#### MUNICIPALITY OF BEECHWORTH.

BYE-LAW No. 18.—TO PREVENT NUISANCES ARISING FROM BADLY-CONSTRUCTED CESSPOOLS, AND TO PROVIDE FOR THE PROPER ERECTION OF PRIVIES AND THE OTHERWISE NEEDFUL REGULATION OF SAME.

WHEREAS great nuisances are arising in this municipality, and great detriment is accruing to the public health thereof, from the use of badly constructed cesspools and the improper erection of privies: Be it and it is hereby enacted by the municipal council of Beechworth, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, the following regulations shall be observed throughout the said municipality, viz. :—

1. That no cesspool or privy shall be placed at a less distance than three feet from any fence or boundary, nor less than fifteen feet from any dwelling-house, nor be differently constructed than is hereinafter provided, except when otherwise specially permitted (in writing) by the council or their duly authorised officer or agent under particular circumstances, to be set forth in writing by the persons requiring the deviation from rule.

2. That when any cesspool is sunk within fifteen feet of any dwelling or existing well, or in such place as it shall be deemed absolutely necessary by the council or their said officer or agent, it shall be built of brick, stone, or other material as may be approved by the council or their beforementioned officer or agent, closely set, so as to prevent as much as possible the contents from percolating into and saturating the adjoining premises.

3. That every person about to erect a privy or sink or otherwise construct a cesspool, shall at least forty-eight (48) hours before commencing any such work, leave at the town clerk's office a notice in writing of his intention so to do, such notice to describe the intended site for the said work, so that it may be inspected.

4. That if upon inspection and enquiry the council or their officer or agent beforementioned shall determine such proposed privy or cesspool or the intended site for same to be contrary to any of the provisions of this bye-law, the person desirous of so carrying out such work shall desist therefrom, and proceed with same only in accordance with the requirements of this bye-law (unless otherwise permitted under the exception to the provisions of the first (1) of these regulations. And be it, and it is hereby also further enacted by the municipal council aforesaid, that any person or persons violating this bye-law or any of its provisions or regulations, shall upon conviction before any two or more justices of the peace forfeit and pay for every such offence a sum or penalty not exceeding Ten pounds. And any person neglecting or omitting to rectify any error committed in any of the above points or respects, after having received twenty-four (24) hours notice in writing from the said council or their aforesaid officer or agent so to do, shall upon conviction (if obtained within fifteen days of the service of such notice) forfeit and pay for every such omission, neglect, or delay, a sum or penalty at the rate of Twenty shillings per day for every day of the continuance of such error unremedied.

#### MUNICIPALITY OF CARISBROOK.

BYE-LAW No. 3.—FOR THE FORMATION AND MAINTENANCE OF CROSSING-PLACES FOR WHEELED VEHICLES OVER FOOTPATHS AND DRAINS, AND FOR THE PRESERVATION THEREOF.

AND whereas it is expedient and necessary to preserve the drains and footpaths that are or may be formed by order of the council out of the public moneys: Be it therefore ordered and enacted that all persons having or who may have roadways for carts or other wheeled vehicles across the footpaths or drains now formed, or which may hereafter be formed by the council within the municipality of Carisbrook, shall at their own costs provide, construct, and maintain a crossing-place over the water channel and footpath in manner following:

In streets where a stone or wood kerb is now or may hereafter be laid the crossing shall be paved with stone or broken metal the whole width of the footpath from the building line to the water channel, and shall be enclosed on both sides with a stone or wood kerb of the same size and description as the

street kerbing, which it must join with a curve closely; the water channel must not in any way be altered or obstructed, but must be maintained at all times in good repair by the persons having the crossing.

In streets where a footpath and channel are or may hereafter be formed, and where no kerbing is laid, suitable wooden bridges shall be provided of wood, plank, or scantlings, and fixed over the water channel so as to leave a free passage for the water underneath, such bridges to project into the public roadway not less than four feet nor more than five feet from the outer edge of the footpath, and the crossing-place over the footpath shall be paved, metalled, or gravelled in such manner as to be always as clean and as dry as the adjoining footpath itself, or the water channel may be pitched with large metal to its proper level.

The materials used for such crossings and kerbing, and the manner of laying the same, shall be subject to the approval of the municipal council or of their surveyor or other officer, and in cases where such work in any respect whatever shall be deemed objectionable by the said council or their officer, it shall be lawful for the said council on and after seven days from the day of giving notice of objection to the persons forming or causing to be formed any such crossing-place to proceed as hereinafter provided against any party or parties refusing or neglecting to comply with the provisions of this bye-law.

All persons about forming crossing-places over footpaths or water channels shall give notice thereof in writing and submit a specification of the work to the council, or their surveyor or other officer, who shall give permission for the same to be proceeded with, provided the specified manner be not objectionable.

All persons crossing any formed water channel, drain or footpath, or causing such to be crossed by any cart or other wheeled vehicle, excepting the channels in the carriage or roadways at the intersections of the public streets, unless over and by a crossing-place formed in manner as herein stated and according to the provisions of this bye-law, shall, on conviction before two or more justices of the peace, for every such offence forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

#### MUNICIPALITY OF EMERALD HILL.

BYE-LAW No. 17.—A BYE-LAW FOR THE REGULATION OF WOOD CARTERS WITHIN THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF EMERALD HILL.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of Victoria, 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, "An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria," it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be competent for the council of any municipal district, established under the provisions of the said Act, to make bye-laws for the regulation and licensing of carters, water drawers and public vehicles: And whereas by a Proclamation of His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, dated the 26th day of May, 1855, the district of Emerald Hill was duly established a municipal district under the provisions and within the meaning of the said Act: And whereas it is expedient to make a bye-law for the regulation of wood carters within the municipal district of Emerald Hill: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council for the district of Emerald Hill, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, as required by the provisions of the said Act:

1. That the places named in the schedule hereunto annexed be and are hereby appointed as the only places within the town of Emerald Hill at which it shall be lawful for any wood carriers or other persons engaged in the sale of firewood to draw up and remain with their carts, drays or other vehicles containing such firewood, for the purpose of offering the same for sale, and that no person so engaged shall draw up and stand with any such cart, dray or other vehicle containing such firewood in any other portion of the streets and thoroughfares of said town.

2. That all such persons shall arrange and draw up their carts, drays or other vehicles, in a single row or line alongside the outer edge of the water channel of the street or portions thereof named in such schedule.

3. Any person offending against the provisions of this bye-law shall, on conviction of such offence before two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding Five pounds.

#### SCHEDULE OF PLACES APPOINTED AS STANDS FOR WOOD CARTERS.

1. The south side of Coventry street, between the east building line of Clarendon street and the east building line of Yarra street.

2. The west side of Clarendon street, between the north building line of Raglan street and the south building line of Napier street.



- 3. The west side of Cecil street, between the north building line of Coventry street and the south building line of York street.

THE FIRST HALF-YEARLY REPORT OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF CARISBROOK, MADE IN PURSUANCE OF THE 43RD SECTION OF THE MUNICIPAL INSTITUTION ACT, 18 VICTORIA No. 15, ENDING THE 9TH DAY OF MARCH, 1858.

#### FORMATION OF MUNICIPALITY.

THE district of Carisbrook was duly constituted a municipality by Proclamation to that effect by His Excellency Sir Henry Barkly, K.C.B., and a public meeting of the resident householders and landowners within the said district was duly held for the purposes prescribed in the Municipal Institutions Act, of which meeting His Excellency appointed Edwin Vickery, Esq., president.

The meeting elected Hector Norman Simson, Esq., and Mr. James Bernard Rhodes, to act as assessors, and decided that the council should consist of seven members, who should not receive pecuniary remuneration. Several candidates were proposed and seconded, for whom, on the 8th day of September, 1857, a poll was taken, when the following gentlemen were elected:—

William Fox  
Charles Moir  
Thomas Major  
Henry Meadway  
Frederick George Hull  
Henry Chalk

The first meeting of the council took place on the 10th day of September, when Richard Southee, Esq., M.D., was elected chairman.

Smith and Rhodes, valuers, 17th of September, 1857; and Mr. George Reed, collector, 12th of November, 1857.

#### MUNICIPAL BOUNDARIES.

The boundaries of the municipality, as proclaimed, are defined as follows:—Commencing at the north-east angle of section 24, in the parish of Carisbrook; thence west by the northern boundary of sections 24 and 4, in the said parish, and by a line west to the western side of a Government road, forming the eastern boundary of sections 5 and 6 in the said parish; thence south by the western side of that road one mile; thence west sixty chains; thence south 3 miles and 46 chains; thence east 1 mile and 10 chains, more or less, to the Mount Greenock Creek; thence northwards by the Mount Greenock Creek to the south-west angle of section 15 in the parish aforesaid; thence east by the south boundary of the said section 15 to the south-east angle thereof; and thence by a line bearing north, being the eastern boundary of sections 15, 16 and 17, the town reserve of Carisbrook, and sections 22, 23 and 24, to the commencing point.

To set out the public footpaths and carriage-ways.—Granted.

For the erection of survey office.—Not granted.

To have the racecourse vested in council.—Declined.

For grant of £5000 for new bridge.—Declined at present.

For proclaiming the lock-up a gaol for municipal district.—Granted.

That the clerk of the bench be appointed for this bench only, he having been ordered to Maryborough, whereby the magisterial business of the municipality was stopped.—Granted.

For additional magistrates.—Granted.

For grant of land for manure depot.—Four acres granted.

For grant of land for new cemetery.—Ten acres granted.

For the application of the sum of £2000 for the immediate erection of a court house.—Under consideration as to the site.

For the repair of Simson street and Bucknall street, being Government roads.—Not yet answered.

For the appointment of extra police for the township.—Not yet answered.

For grant of land for municipal chambers.—Not yet answered.

The council are indebted to Mr. Councillor Hull for the use of a room used as the court house for the holding of the municipal meetings until council chambers are erected.

The council procured a design for a corporate seal, which was approved by the Governor, and the same is now in the hands of the engraver.

Mr. Charles Moir resigned his office of councillor, and a public meeting for the election of his successor has been duly convened for the 8th day of April next.

In consequence of the small number of ratepayers and the generally low assessments put upon property in the municipality, the council were compelled to levy a rate of One shilling and sixpence in the pound, but this the council confidently hope will be reduced in the ensuing year.

The council have used every exertion to keep the expenses of the municipality low, and to forward the interests and improvement of the town.

In conclusion, the council hope shortly to secure to Carisbrook all the advantages of municipal institutions, their organization having become settled and their work fairly commenced.





