SUNKEN REEF OFF APOLLO BAY. WITH reference to the notice of 23rd October, 1857, respecting the Sunken Rec off Apollo Bay, the following notification is now published for the information of mariners, describing certain beacons which have been erected to mark the position of the recf in question.

By His Excellency's Command, HENRY MILLER.

1. Commanders of vessels navigating between Cape Otway and Port Phillip Heads are hereby informed that Four Pillar No. 64,-May 14TH, 1858.-1.

Beacons, each surmounted with a Bail, have been erected on the coast, to mark the position of a sunken danger, now known as Henty's Reef, lying eleven miles north 54' 30' east from Cape Otway Lighthouse, and about two miles south 40' 30' east from Cape Bunbury, which forms the south-east point of Apollo Bay. This reef has not more than eighteen feet of water over it, is steep too, having ten fathoms all round within a cable's length of its shoalest part, and as the sea only breaks on the reef occasionally in bad weather, vessels must give it a good berth in passing.

2. The abovementioned beacons are erected, two on Point Hayley, situated about nine miles north-east from Cape Otway, and two on Cape Dunbury, situated about eleven miles northeast from Cape Otway.

3. The Point Hayley beacons are painted, the inshore one white, the seaward one black; they are six hundred feet apart, and bear from each other east a quarter north, and west a quar-Beacons, each surmounted with a Ball, have been erected on

and bear from each other east a quarter north, and west a quarter south

4. The Cape Bunbury Beacons are painted, the inshore one white, the seaward one red; they are six hundred feet apart, and bear from each other south-east half south, and north-west

half north.
5. The position of the reef is marked by the intersection of two lines, the one drawn through the beacons on Point Hayley, the other through the beacons on Cape Bunbury.
6. Vessels bound to the north-east must keep the black beacon on point Hayley well open to the northward of the white one until the white beacon on Cape Bunbury opens well out to the north-east of the red beacon.
7. Vessels bound to the south-west must keep the red beacon on Cape Bunbury well open to the southward of the white one until the white beacon on Point Hayley opens out well to the southwest of the black beacon.

The petitioners state that after carefully considering the existing management and financial position of the corporation of Melbourne, they are fully convinced as to the necessity for immediate separation therefrom, and the erection of their ward into a separate municipality, for the following reasons, viz. —

1. The present revenue of the city is insufficient to meet current expenses and to keep the made streets in moderate repair, there remaining, according to the statement of the finance committee, after paying interest and the cost of management, and of cleansing streets, but £2000 for repairs throughout the city during the current year.

2. In addition to the Gabrielli loan, the corporation at present owe £20,000.

3. During 1857, a sum of over £5000 was contributed by Fitz Roy ward to the city funds, and a sum of less than £1500 was expended by the corporation on the ward.

4. During the present year the rates of Fitz Roy ward will exceed £7000, of which there is no probability that the corporation will expend more than £1500 on the ward; but, if the ward be detached from the city, there will remain, after deducting the interest on the ward's share of the Gabrielli loan, upw ards of £5000 for the use of the separate municipality.

5. The ward is both politically and geographically separated from the city.

6. The ward, containing as it does, 13½ miles of streets and

75. The ward is both politically and geographically separated from the city.

6. The ward, containing as it does, 13½ miles of streets and 12,000 inhabitants, is sufficiently important to require distinct local management. Its prosperity, too, will be greatly furthered by speedy and entire separation from the city.

7. Through the inability of the corporation to carry out the necessary works, large quantities of stagnant water have accumulated in the lower or northern parts of the ward, to the serious integral of the health and property of the inhabitants accumulated in the lower or northern parts of the ward, to the serious injury of the health and property of the inhabitants of the contiguous localities.

8. Fitz Roy ward is at present entirely destitute of market accommodation.

9. The want of a local police court and of a small debts court is felt to be a source of serious inconvenience, the Melbourne Courts being too remote.

No. I.—BYE-LAW FOR STANDING ORDERS OF THE MINING BOARD OF BALLAARAT.-[28th April, 1858.]

A T a meeting of the mining board of the mining district of Ballaarat, begun and holden at Ballaarat, in the said district, on the 28th day of April. One thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, it is ordained by the said board as follows, that is to say :-

THE ORDER OF PROCEEDINGS OF THE MINING BOARD OF BALLAARAT.

1. Business conducted with open doors.—Strangers may be excluded.—That the business of the board shall be conducted on all ordinary occasions with open doors; but any one member present may require the exclusion of strangers until it shall have been decided by the board whether any particular question pro-posed to be introduced shall be discussed with open doors.

2. Business to commence at the time appointed.—That the business of the board shall commence upon the expiration of the time of meeting, or as soon after as a quorum shall be

3. Minutes shall be taken.—That minutes of the proceedings of each meeting of the board shall be taken regularly and entered in a book.

entered in a book.

4. When there is not a quorum, names recorded.—At any time appointed for the beard to meet when there is not a quorum of the members present, or when the board is counted out, such circumstance, together with the names of the members then present, shall be recorded in the minute book.

5. Minutes of preceding meeting first business.—The minutes of any preceding meeting, not previously confirmed, shall be read as the first business at all meetings of the board, in order to their confirmation; and no discussion shall be permitted thereupon except as to their accuracy as a record of the proceedings of the board; and upon their being confirmed, or amended and confirmed, as the case may be, they shall be signed amended and confirmed, as the case may be, they shall be signed by the chairman.

6. Order of business.—At all meetings of the board the reading of the correspondence unconnected with the orders of the day, the presentation of petitions by members of the board, and the bringing up of reports of committees and notices of motions

the ornging up of reports of committees and notices of motions shall have precedence in the order of business, but shall not be introduced during the consideration of the orders of the day.

7. Orders of the day.—Orders of the day shall include all matters arising out of the proceedings of the former meetings of the board; and any business which the chairman may think fit to bring under consideration.

8. Order of orders of the day.—Orders of the day shall take precedence in the order in which they stand in the minute had.

precedence in the order in which they stand in the minute book.

ATTENDANCE OF MEMBERS.

9. Calls of the board.—Calls of the board may be made on the motion of a member duly carried, and such motion shall state the business for which such calls are made, and the day and the

- hour of meeting.

  10. Fins for non-attendance.—Should the board at any time make a special call for a full meeting of the members of the board, any member who does not attend such meeting shall be subject to a fine of Ten shillings unless he shall furnish to the board a satisfactory reason for his absence, such fine to be paid before such member shall be permitted take his seat at the board or exercise his right to vote on any question before the
- 11. Seven days notice for a call of the board.—No order for a call of the board shall be made for any day carlier than seven days from the date of such order, inclusive of the day of such
- 12. Copy of the order shall be sent to each member.—A copy of the order for a call of the board shall be forwarded to each member of the board, signed by the chairman or clerk.

13. Members to register names and addresses.—Each member

13. Members to register names and addresses.—Each member shall, upon first taking his scat at the mining board, enter his name and address in a book to be kept for that purpose.

14. Breach of order No. 10—At every special call of the board, as soon as the minutes of the previous meeting have been read and confirmed, the names of the members shall be called over, and any member not answering to his name, or being present before the expiration of the half hour provided by the Act, shall be considered to have broken standing order No. 10.

15. Attendance of members recorded.—The attendance of members shall be entered in a book at each sitting of the board.

16. Absence of a quorum, chairman may adjourn.—In the

16. Absence of a quorum, chairman may adjourn.—In the event of the board being left without a quorum of its members, the chairman be empowered to adjourn the board to a future hour on the same or another day.

NOTICES AND MOTIONS.

17. Motions introducing new matter.—When notice of motion may be given.—No member shall make any motion initiating a subject for discussion, but in pursuance of a notice openly given at a previous meeting of the board, and duly entered on the minutes; and such notices must be given either previous to the board entering upon the orders of the day, or after such orders shall have been discussed of shall have been disposed of.

18. Notices of motion shall be written and signed — Every

member in giving notice of motion shall read it aloud and deliver to the chairman a copy of such notice, fairly written, together with his name and the day proposed for bringing on

such motion.

19. Members shall not give two notices consecutively .- No member shall be entitled to give two notices of motion consecutively on the same day, unless no other member has any notice to submit.

20. One member may give notice for an absent member.—A member may give notice for any other member not then present, by putting the name of the member for whom the notice is given on the notice of motion.

21. Members who have given notice shall be present. uncless the member who has given such notice, or some one authorised by him, be present when the business is called in order. Notices not so proceeded with shall be struck out of the paper.

22. Motions not seconded shall lapse.—Any motion not seconded shall not be further debated, but shall lapse.

23. Motions proposed and seconded.—When a motion has been proposed and seconded, a question thereon shall be proposed to the board by the chairman.

24. Motions may be withdrawn.—A member who has pro-

posed a motion may withdraw the same by leave of the board, but should such motion be seconded, such leave can only be

but should such motion be seconded, such leave can only be granted provided there be no negative voice.

25 Questions may be superseded.—A question may be superseded,—1st, by the adjournment of the board on the motion of a member, "That the board do now adjourn;" 2nd, by a motion, "That the orders of the day be now read;" 3rd, by the previous question, viz., "That this question be now put," heing proposed and negatived.

26. The previous question.—If the previous question be resolved in the affirmative, the original question shall be put forthwith, without any amendment or debate.

27. Complicated questions.—The board may order a complicated question to be divided.

28. Question shall be put.—So soon as the debate upon a question shall be concluded, the chairman shall put the question

to the board in a distinct and audible manner.

29. Voting.—The question being put, shall be resolved in the affirmative or negative by the majority of voices "aye" or oa '

30. Chairman shall give his opinion.—The chairman shall state whether in his opinion the "ayes" or the "noes" have it; and, unless his opinion be acquiesced in by the minority, the question shall be resolved by a show of hands.

- 31. Questions once caried cannot be questioned again.—A question being once made and carried in the affirmative or negative, cannot be questioned again in the same mining board year during which it has been so resolved, unless a call of the board be made for that purpose.
- 32. Questions once resolved may be reversed by two-thirds of the members.—No question or amendment which is the same in substance as any question which, during the same mining board year, has been resolved in the affirmative or negative, shall be a resolution of the board unless carried by two-thirds of the mem-

bers present upon a call of the board.

33. Motions withdrawn may be made again.—A motion which has been withdrawn may be made again during the same mining

That the owner of any dray or cart engaged for hire in carting night-soil, offal, or offensive refuse, shall register his name and abode with, and pay the sum of Forty (40) shillings to the town clerk, in aid of the municipal funds, during each year he may carry on such business, and also satisfy the council that he is a fit and proper person to carry on the trade of a night-man, and shall thereupon receive a license, to be called a night-cart license, on which shall be written or printed the number of the license, the owner's name and place of abode, and also the places where it shall be lawful for him to deposit the said matter, and the hours within which such offensive matter may be removed; the number of the license to be shown on the cart; and further, it shall not be lawful for any licensed night-carter or any other person to cart or remove night-soil, offal, or any offensive matter in and through this municipal district, except after the hours of Eleven of the clock a night, and before the hour of Five of the clock in the morning, or to deposit the same in any other places than such as are assigned for that purpose by the council, and any person so offending shall be liable to the penalty hereinafter named, and to have his license cancelled; but such material may be deposited on purchased land under cultivation outside the town proper, for the purpose of being there immediately used and applied as manure.


