SECTIONS V. TO X. OF TOWN AND COUNTRY POLICE ACT EXTENDED TO THE TOWNSHIP OF BELVOIR.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Sir HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, passed in the eighteenth year of the Reign of Her present Majesty, intitled, "*An Act to provide for the Management of Towns and other places in Victoria*," it was amongst other things enacted that so many of the provisions of the said Act as relate to the good order of towns and other populous places, being sections numbered V., VI., VII., VIII., IX. and X., in the said Act, should extend to and be in force in such cities, towns, districts, and places as the Lieutenant Governor might by Proclamation in the *Government Gazette* declare to come under the operation of the same respectively, or any of them, and that it should be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor to define the limits of such places: Now I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby declare that the township of Belvoir, situated on the river Murray, shall come under the operation of the sections of the said Act, numbered respectively V., VI., VII., VIII., IX. and X.:

And I do hereby define the limits of the said township of Belvoir to be as follow, that is to say:—Commencing at the north-west angle of allotment 1 section B, in the parish of Belvoir; thence by the northern boundary of that allotment and a line bearing east to the Wodonga Creek; thence by the south-western side of the said creek to the bridge; thence by

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the north-eastern and eastern sides of High street to Wodonga street; thence by the north-eastern side of the last named street to Hovel street; thence by the south-eastern side of that street to its junction with the main Melbourne road; thence by the eastern side of the said road 28 chains and 50 links, more or less; thence across the said road to the south-east angle of suburban portion 7; thence by the southern boundary of the said portion and by a line bearing west 93 chains and 40 links, more or less; thence by a line bearing north, being for a portion of the distance the western boundary of the cemetery, to the commencing point.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this twentieth day of July, in the year of Our Lord One thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, and in the twenty-second year of Her Majesty's Reign.

FIFTY POUNDS REWARD.—FREE PARDON TO AN APPROVER.

PETITION FOR MUNICIPAL INSTITUTIONS. MALDON.

IN pursuance of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of a petition addressed to His Excellency as hereinafter set forth, signed by one hundred and sixty-eight householders resident at and near Maldon, praying for the erection of the said township into a municipality.

The petitioners state that at a public meeting held at Maldon, on the 19th of May last, a resolution to the effect that it is desirable to erect Maldon into a municipality, was carried;
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and that they are impressed with the conviction that such a step is advisable, for the better government and improvement of Maldon and its vicinity.

The petitioners suggest that the proposed municipal district should be circumscribed as follows, viz.:—Commencing at a point one chain and a half west from the north-west corner of allotment 12, section 2, suburban lots, north of Maldon (i.e., allowing for a road on the west side of allotment 12); thence north one mile; thence east two miles and a quarter; thence south four miles; thence west two miles and a quarter thence north three miles to the commencing point.

They further state that the area of the proposed district does not exceed nine square miles; that it contains more than three hundred householders; and that no one point therein is distant more than six miles from any other point.

And the petitioners pray as follows:—

"Your petitioners therefore humbly pray that your Excellency may declare the said district a municipal district, under the name of 'The Maldon Municipality,' pursuant to the provisions of the Act 18 Victoria No. 15, &c."

GREAT BRIGHTON ROAD DISTRICT.

SIR,—Whereas there appeared in the *Government Gazette* of the colony of Victoria, No. 89, published on the 9th day of July instant, a Proclamation of which the following is a copy:—

GREAT BRIGHTON ROAD DISTRICT.

Proclamation by His Excellency Sir Henry Barkly, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

Whereas by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, passed in the sixteenth year of Her present Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act for making and improving Roads in the Colony of Victoria," it was amongst other things enacted, that it should be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor, from time to time, by notice in the *Government Gazette*, to proclaim and declare any such portion of the said colony as to him should seem meet, as and to be a road district for the purposes in the said Act contained, and also to define the boundaries of every road district thereby proclaimed and declared, and to give a specific name or designation to every such road district: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim and declare that the district hereinafter defined shall be a road district for the purposes in the said Act contained, that is to say:—That portion of the Brighton Special Survey west and south-west of the main road from Melbourne to Frankston: Commencing at the intersection of the said main road and the northern boundary of the Special Survey; thence west by the northern boundary of the said Survey to the Bay; thence southwards by the Bay to the southern boundary of the said Survey; thence west by the southern boundary of the said Survey to the intersection of the main road from Melbourne to Frankston; and thence by that main road to the commencing point.

And I do hereby further proclaim and declare that the specific name or designation of such road district shall be "The Great Brighton Road District."

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this ninth day of July, in the year of Our Lord One thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, and in the twenty-second year of Her Majesty's Reign.

And whereas by the provisions contained in section 10 of the Act of Council above referred to, it is, among other things, provided that it shall be lawful for any number not less than five landholders and five householders in any such proclaimed road district of the colony of Victoria to present to any justice of the peace resident within such road district a requisition in writing, requesting such justice to convene a meeting of the landholders and householders in such road district to form a district road board, for the purpose of superintending, providing for, and completing the construction, repair, and maintenance of the roads in such road district, and for carrying out therein the provisions of the said Act, and that upon such requisition being presented such justice of the peace shall convene such meeting accordingly, and shall fix the time and place for the holding thereof; provided that such meeting shall be holden within the said road district, and that notice of the objects and purposes thereof, and of the time and place fixed for the holding of the same, shall be inserted in the *Government Gazette*, and at least three consecutive times in some of the public newspapers published nearest to the said road district, ten clear days before the day of holding such meeting, nor unless a like notice shall have been affixed on the door of one or more police offices or courts of petty sessions or other public buildings within such road district:

And whereas by section 11 of the said Act it is provided, among other things, that at such meeting of the landholders and householders in said road district, those who may be present may elect from amongst the landholders and house-

holders residing within such road district any unequal number, not being less than five or more than nine, as and to be members of and form a district road board for the purposes of the said Act:

And whereas by section 27 of said Act the landholders and householders who shall be present at such meeting are required to fix the rate of assessment to be chargeable upon and paid by the several owners and occupiers of land, messuages, tenements, and dwelling-houses within such road district:

Now, then, therefore we, the undersigned, being more than five landholders and more than five householders in the said Great Brighton road district, in the colony of Victoria, do hereby request you, as a justice of the peace resident in the said Great Brighton road district, to convene a meeting of the landholders and householders in the said road district, for the purpose of forming a district road board for the said Great Brighton road district, for the purpose of and to enable the said district road board, when formed, to superintend, provide for, and complete the construction, repair, and maintaining of the roads in said Great Brighton road district, and to carry out therein the provisions of the said Act of Council: And that at the said meeting the said landholders and householders may proceed to elect from among the landholders and householders residing within the said road district, any unequal number, being not less than five nor more than nine, as and to be members of and form the said Great Brighton district road board, for the purposes of the said Act: And also that the landholders and householders within the said road district who shall be present at such meeting shall fix the rate of assessment to be chargeable upon and paid by the several owners and occupiers of land, messuages, tenements, and dwelling-houses within such road district.

Construction of a wooden bridge, with stone abutments, over the Caledonian Creek, Esmond street.

Construction of a wooden bridge over the Caledonian Creek, Pennyweight road.

Removing the weighbridge from its former site on the Main road, to Specimen Hill, in close proximity to the proposed market reserve.

Plans and specifications are being prepared for the following works:—

The completion of the footpaths to the police station on the plank road.

The repair of Brown Hill road, and erection of bridge thereon.

The repair of Eureka street to the town boundary.

The repair of the Pennyweight road.

The footpaths of the Main road, being a total length of 2 miles, will be completed this month.

It is confidently expected that the sites for town hall, public markets, recreation and other reserves, will be gazetted forthwith.

The municipality has suffered much loss and inconvenience owing to the dilatoriness of the Board of Land and Works

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in the department of roads and bridges and public lands respectively.

Four months were allowed to elapse after the necessary sums had been placed upon the estimates, before tenders were called for metalling the main road and constructing the culverts and channels. Pools of stagnant water in the roadways and natural channels, and culverts choked with sludge, have been allowed to remain for a considerable time, to the serious detriment of the sanitary condition of the municipality, while our cross streets have not been defined up to the present time, notwithstanding that in reply to frequent applications made to the Government, assistance for that purpose was promised to be rendered to the district surveyor.

BYE-LAWS.

The following bye-laws, passed by the council, have been assented to by His Excellency the Governor, viz.:—

No. 4. For the appropriation of the sum of £3000, first instalment of grant-in-aid.

No. 9. To compel owners and occupiers to keep the water-channels, footpaths, and rights-of-way bounding their premises free from sweepings, rubbish, offal, or any offensive matter.

No. 10. To compel owners and occupiers to keep their premises free from offensive matter, and for restraining noisome and offensive trades.

The undermentioned bye-laws are in the hands of the executive:—

No. 5. For regulating and licensing public vehicles, public carterers, water drawers, &c.

No. 6. For regulating and licensing persons to slaughter certain animals.

No. 7. For regulating the driving of unbroken horses, &c.

No. 8. For regulating the formation of crossings for wheeled vehicles over footpaths, and for protecting the footpaths and water-channels.

No. 11. For the management of water-courses, drains, &c.

APPLICATIONS TO GOVERNMENT.

For a temporary police court in Ballaarat East; the whole of the expenses of building, stationery, &c., up to the present, having been defrayed by the council.

For the appointment of a clerk of petty sessions.

For the appointment of a water commission.

For the haymarket site to be gazetted.

For the expenditure, in this district of the sums nominally placed upon the estimates for that purpose.

For the appointment of a stipendiary magistrate.

For compensation to the occupants of culvert and drain reserves.

For a ground reserve for a stone quarry.

For the removal of drain obstructions.

For the sanction of the Board of Land and Works to the site selected by the council for a police court.

RESIGNATION, RETIREMENT BY ROTATION, AND RE-ELECTION OF COUNCILLORS.

Councillor Isaacs resigned on the 4th and councillor Wilson on the 5th May. Councillors Rodier (chairman), Scrase and Jones, retired by rotation on the 1st June, and councillors Rodier and Scrase having allowed themselves to be put in nomination were returned to the council on that day; councillors Sweeney, Anderson and Dyte, were also elected, the five members appearing on the poll in the following order:—

At a meeting held on the 31st May, 1858, in accordance with the 18 Victoria No. 15, clause 10, for the purpose of nominating candidates for the council, it was determined by a majority of ratepayers present that the chairman for the ensuing year should receive a salary at the rate of £300 per annum.

APPOINTMENTS.

Messrs. Coote and Andrews having resigned the office of municipal engineers on the 5th January, Mr. John Gwynneth received that appointment on the 26th January.

Dr. Leman has been recommended to the Governor, by the Central Board of Health, for the office of public vaccinator and health officer.

GRANT-IN-AID.

On the £4000 was received as a second instalment of the grant-in-aid.

COLLECTION OF TOWN RATES.

In consequence of the delay in appointing a clerk to the court of petty sessions, the rate collector could not commence his duties until the 11th January. The appeals against a-

sessment were disposed of at a court held for that purpose on the 22nd December.

The amount of town rates collected up to 3rd June was £4055 12s. 9d.

VISIT OF THE GOVERNOR.

His Excellency the Governor having accepted invitations from the councils of both municipalities, arrived on Ballaarat on the 19th January, being met at their respective boundaries by the members of the eastern and western councils. The occasion was observed as a public holiday, and during his stay the Governor received congratulatory addresses from the various local bodies. His Excellency also attended at a public banquet given in honor of his first visit to Ballaarat, and expressed himself much gratified at the unanimity of feeling testified in his reception, and acknowledged that from the facts brought under his notice this district up to the present time had not received a fair share of the general revenue.

REGISTRATION OF PARLIAMENTARY VOTES.

No registrar having been appointed in this municipality, the council employed several deputy registrars, and by this means caused 5596 names to be inserted upon the electoral roll, in addition to those obtained by the other local bodies.

BENEVOLENT AND VISITING ASSOCIATION.

The moieties of police court fines accruing to the council were handed over to this institution in the months of March, April and May, but in consequence of the increasing number of applications for pecuniary assistance, and the ascertained general utility of the association, a resolution was carried to the effect that on and after the 1st June the sum of £30 per month be paid into the funds of the Ballaarat Benevolent Association.

BOARD OF HEALTH.

In the month of April considerable alarm was excited by a rumor that the small-pox had made its appearance here. A strict medical investigation was instituted, and the Central Board of Health, with an alacrity worthy of imitation in the other Government departments, immediately extended the Public Health Act to Ballaarat East, and expressed its willingness to afford every assistance to preserve the hitherto healthful condition of the municipality.

WATER SUPPLY.

The only cheap water supply for domestic uses having been vested in the municipal council of Ballaarat prior to the formation of this council, and that body having refused to join this council in making the supply available for both municipalities, steps were taken to obtain a professional report on the Wendouree Swamp (the source of supply referred to), and that report being favorable to the opinion that by a small expenditure sufficient water might be stored in the Swamp to serve the population the whole year round, the council caused a bill to be prepared for the repeal of the bye-law under which the Swamp was held by the municipal council of Ballaarat. The bill was entrusted to J. B. Humfray, Esq., M.L.A., but owing to the number of ministerial changes that occurred during the last session of the Assembly, it was never fairly placed before the House. Mr. Humfray has, however, given notice that early in the next session he will ask for leave to introduce the bill. The council have also applied to the Government to reserve certain lands on Gong Gong Creek for a reservoir, and to guarantee interest on the expenditure of a Water Commission for Ballaarat.

STATISTICS OF THE MUNICIPALITY.

The following extract from *Facts and Figures*, in connection with Ballaarat, prepared by the committee of the local bodies, will serve to show the manner in which this district has been neglected hitherto in appropriation of the estimates, and may not be considered out of place in this report:—

"Beginning at the commencement of the history of this gold field, we find that in the years 1851 and 1852, the revenue contributed by the population of Ballaarat in indirect taxation, was, £7608 14s. 5d. During the same period the sums paid for business and miners' licenses were £38,422 10s. The total was £46,031 4s. 5d. For the same years the amounts voted for roads leading from the seaboard—for internal roads and for public works, were nil. But in those years Melbourne had £22,677 appropriated for her benefit, and Geelong £15,854.

"In the year 1853 the revenue contributed from Ballaarat by indirect taxation was £37,948 19s. 5d., the amount paid for licenses, £98,071, the total being £156,019 19s. 5d. In the same year the gold produced from this gold field was worth at least £1,405,499. The total amount voted for the roads and public works connected with the district was £5000—for roads from the seaboard £7000. The proportion of expenditure to revenue was as 1 to 13, and to the value of the produce as 1 to 117. The yield of gold for Castlemaine and Bendigo for this year may be valued at £6,461,340, but the amount voted for the joint districts was, for public works £37,669, and for roads from the seaboard £307,637, making a total of £345,306. The proportion of expenditure to produce was as about 1 to 19. The revenue contributed from those districts, calculated on the same data as those adopted in the estimate for Ballaarat, amounted that year in round numbers to £678,866. The expenditure, therefore, was more than one-half of the revenue. When can such a circumstance be found in the history of Ballaarat? In this year the sum voted for public works and buildings in Melbourne was £422,967—for like purposes in Geelong £111,815.

"In the year 1854 the revenue from Ballaarat, in the shape of indirect taxation, was in round numbers £135,937. The

gold licenses may safely be taken as nearly equalling those of the preceding year, or £90,000. The total would be £225,937. The value of her gold produce for that year was £2,625,704. In the same year the sum voted for public works in the district was £6000, and for roads from the seaboard £40,000, making a total of £46,000, hence the proportion of expenditure to revenue was nearly as 1 to 5, and to value of produce as 1 to 57. The amount voted to Bendigo and Castlemaine this year for public works, &c., was £32,500, and for roads from the seaboard £130,000, the total being £162,500. The value of their produce was in round numbers £4,000,000. The proportion of expenditure to value of produce was as 1 to 24. In this year, 1854, the sums voted for Melbourne amounted to £683,950, and to Geelong £155,532. The two took more than one-fourth of the entire revenue of the colony, and four-sevenths of the sum expended on all its public works.

"In 1855 the revenue from Ballaarat, through indirect taxation, was £121,562; for licenses it may be taken at £35,000; and the duty of 2s. 6d. per oz. on gold would amount in that year to £81,315, the total being £237,877. The total value of her gold produce during that year was £3,528,009. The sum voted for public works in the district was £5000, for roads from the seaboard £60,000, the total being £65,000. The proportion of expenditure to revenue was as 3 to 11, and to value of produce as 1 to 54. The joint yield of Castlemaine and Bendigo that year may be calculated at £3,780,756. The sum voted for their public works was £16,000, for roads from the seaboard £100,000, the total being £116,000. The ratio of expenditure to produce was as 2 to 65. In the same year the amount appropriated to Melbourne was £730,150, to Geelong £206,000, the total being £936,150, not much less than one-third of the revenue of the colony, or about thirteen-twentieths of the total sum expended for all its public works, which in that year was £1,490,397.

"In the year 1856 the indirect revenue from Ballaarat was £123,750, the duty upon her gold not less than £142,045, and the licenses £20,974, the three being £286,769. The gold yield cannot be valued at less than £4,544,648. The amount voted for public works in the district was £24,662, for roads from the seaboard £114,976, the total being £139,638. The ratio of expenditure to revenue was as 2 to 5, and to produce as 2 to 65. In this year the gold produce of the united districts of Castlemaine and Bendigo may be estimated at £4,276,784. The sums voted for public works amounted to £41,084, and for roads £114,976, the total being £156,060. The ratio of expenditure to produce was as 2 to 55. In that year Melbourne had voted for it £402,554, and Geelong £67,555, making altogether £470,109, or one-sixth of the revenue of the colony.

"In 1857 the indirect revenue from Ballaarat was in round numbers £121,000. The duty on her gold produce may be taken at £104,660. The licenses (probably not quite equalling the preceding year) at £18,000, the total being £243,660. The value of the gold was not less than £3,349,116. The appropriation for public works in the district was £27,093, and for roads from the seaboard £85,500, the total being £112,593. The proportion of expenditure to revenue was therefore nearly as 1 to 2, and to produce 1 to 30. The value of the gold produce from the joint districts of Castlemaine and Bendigo may be taken at £3,305,868. The sums voted for their public works was £96,072, and for roads from the seaboard £102,000, the total being £198,072, or in proportion to the produce as 1 to 17. In the same year the sums voted for Melbourne amounted to £431,708, and for Geelong £151,050, together £582,758, or rather more than one-sixth of the entire revenue of the colony.

"There is, however, another view to be taken of this matter. Hitherto we have been treating the amount expended for the roads as solely for the benefit of Ballaarat, and have confined the revenue to that from the population resident within the boundaries of the two municipalities. As respects the first, Ballaarat has, as yet, from the incomplete condition of the roads, been less benefited than might have been anticipated. On the Geelong line, the outlay has tended as much or more to advance the districts near to that town than Ballaarat itself, and of the total expenditure certainly not more than half should fairly be charged to the latter place. And again as to the population, the inhabitants of the outlying districts are now, and have for the last four years, been equal on the average to those within the municipal boundaries. These two circumstances taken together would seriously affect the case and heighten the injustice of which we complain. Let the land revenue from the district of Ballaarat be added, and it will be for the public to say how far we are justified in our indignation at the manner in which we have been treated. A short summary will suffice:—

"On public works, grants to municipalities, every form of public disbursement save official salaries and their appendant outlay, only £69,755 has been expended, and assuming that one-half of the road cost, or £128,750, is fairly chargeable to Ballaarat, the total being £298,505, would be scarcely one-eighth of the revenue derived from it. And this proportion is aggravated by the fact that while we have contributed one-eighth of the total revenue of the whole colony during the last seven years (the figures being £17,233,862 and £2,078,778 respectively), we have been directly benefited by only one sixty-fourth of the expenditure. During the same period £2,694,006 has been devoted to Melbourne, and £707,808 to Geelong, the total being £3,401,814, or very close upon one-fifth of the whole revenue of the colony for the last seven years."
