IT is pointed out for the guidance of Poundkeepers that no claim preferred by persons impounding cattle for damages in excess of the gazetted rates allowed by the Governor can be legally received or entertained by the poundkeeper.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

LIGHTSHIP OFF GELLIBRAND'S POINT, PORT PHILLIP.

THE following intimation respecting the establishment of a Lightship off Gellibrand's Point, in lieu of the Lighthouse at that place, is published for general information.

Masters of vessels and others navigating Port Phillip Bay, are hereby informed that on and after the twenty-fifth day of July next, a *temporary Lightship* will be moored in four and a half fathoms water, in the position at present occupied by the Black Perch Buoy, off Gellibrand's Point.

This lightship will exhibit *two white fixed lights twenty-four feet apart*, and forty feet above the level of the water.

These lights will be seen at a distance of ten miles, allowing ten feet for the height of the eye, and at lesser distances according to the state of the atmosphere.

On and after the exhibition of these lights, the *red light* at present shown from the tower at Gellibrand's Point will be extinguished.

SAILING DIRECTIONS FOR THE PORT OF LAUNCESTON, TASMANIA.

Leading Towers at the entrance of the River Tamar.

As it is not generally known that two towers have been erected on the south end of Lagoon Beach, as leading marks into the western channel at the entrance of the River Tamar, the following directions are published by order of the Launceston Marine Board:—

These towers are built of stone, and were completed in the year 1849, of a circular form, and at an elevation of thirty feet from the ground, and as they are kept perfectly white, can be seen more than two leagues at sea.

Commanders of vessels when running for the port, and approaching within two leagues of the entrance, should bring the lighthouse on the Low Head to bear E.S.E. by compass until the towers on Lagoon Beach are plainly visible; then bring them in line, and keeping them in one, steer boldly in. This course will clear the east end of the Hebe Reef three cables length. Enter the western channel midway with the black buoy off the western edge of the Middle Ground on the port hand, and the white buoy off the Yellow Rock on the starboard, still keeping the towers in one; proceed under easy sail to good anchorage in nine fathoms abreast of Lagoon Beach.

The towers bear from each other E.S.E. and W.N.W. by compass, and the purpose of their erection is that strangers arriving off the port in bad weather, when pilots cannot get outside, might be able to enter with safety.

In order to effect this by one line of bearing it was necessary to pass near the east end of the Hebe Reef, but by paying attention to the leading marks there is no danger.

Commanders of vessels will be therefore careful not to open the inland or eastern tower to the southward of the western or outer one.

When the weather will not permit the pilots to proceed outside, the boat will be lying in mid-channel with a flag flying.

These Sailing Directions, in connection with those already published in the Australian Directory, will be found useful; and it is recommended as a rule that strangers never attempt the eastern channel without a pilot, as this port is at present difficult to enter at night even to those who are well acquainted with it.

It is in contemplation to place lights on these towers, of which due notice will be given.

June, 1859, it is ordained by the said board as follows, that is to say:—

1. *Interpretation clause.*—For the purposes of this bye-law, the term "intermediate mining" shall mean when water is struck, but when continuous bailing is unnecessary, and the applicability of this term to a lead or any portion of a lead will be determined by the warden.

2. *Size of intermediate claims.*—

4 miners, 57 feet square.

6 miners, 70 feet square.

8 miners, 80 feet square.

3. *Marking out claims.*—Claims shall be marked out with a peg, to be kept visible and firmly fixed in the ground one foot above the surface at each extreme corner of the claim.

4. *Neutral ground.*—Not less than three nor more than four feet of neutral ground shall be left between adjoining claims by the party last marking out, which may be worked by either or both of the adjoining claimholders, provided it be securely timbered.

5. *Forfeiture of claims.*—Claimholders within three (3) claims of any claim in which water has been struck, shall commence to sink their shafts without delay, and shall continue to sink such shafts during the usual working hours of every lawful working day until the same shall have been bottomed or abandoned: Provided always that three days from the date of occupation be allowed for making the necessary preparations for sinking such claims.

6. *Forfeiture of claims.*—Claimholders beyond three (3) claims from any claim in which water has been struck may hold their claims unworked, provided they are all present at their claims on every lawful working day not less than two (2) consecutive hours between the hours of nine a.m. and noon. Any miner not fulfilling this condition will be liable to forfeit his share in such claim, unless in case of dispute he can give a good and sufficient reason to the warden for the same.

7. *Forfeiture of claims.*—Claims which have been bottomed, if left unworked for forty-eight (48) hours without permission of the warden, will be deemed abandoned.

8. *Forfeiture of slabs.*—Slabs when left more than one month in an abandoned shaft become forfeited.

9. *Value of slabs to the owners.*—Any person removing slabs from a shaft abandoned less than a month, is liable for the amount of the value thereof to the owners.

10. *Removal of slabs.*—When slabs are removed from a shaft in which water has been struck, the shaft shall be immediately filled up above the level of the drift.

11. *Injury to claims by not bailing.*—Claimholders within three claims of any claim in which water has been struck, neglecting or refusing to bail their fair proportion of water, shall be liable for any injury done thereby to adjoining claimholders.

12. *Injury to claims by removing the earth from the top of shaft.*—Any person removing pipeclay or other substance from around the top of a shaft, without making an embankment sufficient to prevent water running into said shaft, is liable to the amount of all damages arising therefrom to the adjoining claimholders.

13. *Injury to claims by cutting a drain into the shaft.*—Any person cutting a drain into a shaft, is liable to the amount of all damages arising therefrom to the adjoining claimholders.

14. *Absence from claim.*—Any miner being absent from or neglecting his claim without sufficient reason, is liable to have his place supplied by a competent miner selected by a majority of the shareholders, and such absentee or negligent shareholder is responsible for all reasonable wages accruing to such substitute.

15. *Authority from warden to occupy forfeited claim.*—Any miner intending to take possession of a forfeited or disputed claim or share in any claim, shall first obtain the authority of the warden.

16. *Repeal of former bye-law.*—From and after this bye-law shall come into operation, the bye-law No. xiv. for intermediate wet sinkings of the Ararat Mining Board, 9th November, 1858, shall be, and the same is hereby repealed.

PARTICULARS.

James Watson, alias James Wilson Wallace, 30 years of age, 5 feet 5½ inches high, fresh complexioned, brown hair, hazel eyes, scar over right eye, scar on forehead, cut on upper lip under the left nostril, a bruise inside of left arm, JW on right arm, a seaman, native of St. Andrew's, per ship *Duchess of Northumberland*, 1849, free. This man was committed for trial for shooting at a detective constable with intent, &c., on the morning of the 22nd May, 1859; also for a robbery under arms, on the night of the 21st May, 1859, at Back Creek. He was also a ticket-of-leave holder illegally at large from his district.

James Brady, 42 years of age, 5 feet 6½ inches high, fresh complexion, light brown hair, grey eyes, broad nose and chin, medium mouth, scar over left eyebrow, a laborer, native of Liverpool, per ship *Asia*, 1830, free. This offender was arrested on the 21st May, 1859, for stealing a bag of corn, and sentenced to six months imprisonment, on 23rd May, 1859, for same. He was also a ticket-of-leave holder illegally at large from his district.

John Hewson, 31 years of age, 5 feet 7 inches high, ruddy complexioned, light brown hair, sandy whiskers and moustache, stout built, dressed in moleskin trousers, monkey jacket, and plaid cap. This man was arrested on the 18th May, 1859, on a charge of horsetealing, and was on remand at the time of his escape.

James Hompton, 33 years of age, 5 feet 7 inches in height, fair complexioned, light brown hair, beard under chin, dressed in a blue serge shirt, moleskin trousers, and Panama hat, and wore a black silk neckerchief. Hompton was arrested on the 21st May, 1859, for stealing a piece of sawn timber, and remanded for further evidence.

John Phelps, 40 years of age, 5 feet 10 or 11 inches high, slight built, thin features, light brown hair, small whiskers, an Englishman, dressed in moleskin trousers, brown frock coat, and black wideawake hat. This offender was arrested on the 18th May, 1859, for horsetealing, and remanded to 24th May, 1859.

PROPOSED ROAD.

COUNTY OF BOURKE.

PETITION FOR MUNICIPAL INSTITUTIONS.

DAYLESFORD.

IN pursuance of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of a petition addressed to His Excellency as hereinafter set forth, signed by One hundred and sixty-one householders at Daylesford, in the county of Talbot, praying for the erection of the said township into a municipal district.

The petitioners state, that they are all householders resident in and around the township of Daylesford, and within the district hereinafter described:

That such district contains a large quantity of land under cultivation, and that extensive mining operations of a permanent character are being carried on therein and in the neighborhood:

That at a public meeting, held on the 18th of May, 1859, a resolution was carried unanimously, that the establishment of a municipal council would be beneficial to the township and district in general:

That they are of opinion that the district hereinafter described should be created a municipality, its area containing a population of more than 300 householders, and not exceeding nine square miles, wherein no point is distant more than six miles from any other point, with the following boundaries, viz.:

Beginning at the north-east corner of allotment 9, section 7, parish of Glenlyon; from thence west 77 chains to a creek unnamed; from thence along the said creek south to the north-west corner of allotment 1, section 7, parish of Wombat; from thence south 39 chains; from thence west 56 chains; from thence south 40 chains; from thence due west 175½ chains; from thence due south 243 chains; from thence east 128 chains; from thence north 86½ chains, east 25½ chains, north 55½ chains, east 76 chains, north 23½ chains, west 4 chains, north 70 chains, east 27 chains, north 39½ chains, east 14 chains, and north 97 chains, to the commencing point aforesaid.

And the petitioners pray as follows:—

"And your petitioners therefore pray that the said district so defined may be proclaimed a municipality under the name of 'The Municipal District of Daylesford,' according to the provisions of the Act of Council, 18 Victoria No. 15."
