## MUNICIPALITY OF AMHERST.

BYE-LAW No. 4.—FOR THE SUPPRESSION OF THE NUISANCE ARISING FROM GOATS AND PIGS BEING ALLOWED TO GO AT LARGE WITHIN THE TOWNSHIP OF AMHERST.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is authorised to pass bye-laws for the suppression of nuisances, &c.: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council of Amherst, that all owners of goats and pigs within the municipality be enjoined to keep all such animals from grazing or from being at large within the township of Amherst, under a penalty not exceeding Five pounds (£5) for each offence against this bye-law: Provided always that pigs and goats may be allowed to graze or to be at large upon land the property of those to whom the said pigs and goats may belong.

## MUNICIPALITY OF ARARAT.

BYE-LAW No. 1.—A BYE-LAW TO REGULATE BY MEANS OF STANDING ORDERS THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF ARARAT.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of Victoria, 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, section 26, it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for the council of any municipal district to make bye-laws for the regulation of their proceedings: And whereas by a Proclamation of His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, dated the 20th day of September, 1858, the district of Ararat was duly established a municipal district: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council of Ararat, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency Sir Henry Barkly, then administering the Government of the colony of Victoria, the proceedings and business of the said council shall be conducted according to the following regulations only, which shall be called the Standing Orders of the said council, that is to say:—

## CHAP. I.—Order of proceedings.

1. That the chairman shall take the chair at the hour appointed, and shall commence business at each meeting as soon as the legal quorum is present: but if at the expiration of thirty minutes after the appointed hour of meeting there be not a quorum, the chairman shall adjourn the council to the next day of sitting, and the names of the councillors present shall be recorded in the minutes.

2. The first business at each meeting of the council shall be to confirm the minutes of the preceding meeting, and no discussion shall take place thereupon except as to the accuracy thereof.

3. That in the absence of the chairman at a meeting of the council, the members present shall appoint one of their own number to preside, and the member so appointed shall at such meeting hold and exercise the powers of chairman.

4. At all meetings the reading of correspondence unconnected with the business of the meeting, the presentation of petitions, and the bringing up of reports, shall have precedence of all motions.

5. No motion shall be discussed or decided upon at any meeting unless notice in writing, signed by the councillor proposing the same, shall have been given three clear days previous, or at the previous meeting of the council, nor shall any report of committee be decided on unless similar notice be given, and the town clerk shall furnish each councillor with a list of notices of motion received two days before the meeting for which the same are given, and no motion so made shall be withdrawn without leave of the council.

6. That the reports of committees appointed by the council shall be always brought up at the first meeting succeeding their appointment, unless some satisfactory reason be assigned for delay.

7. The order of the day shall include all business of which due notice has been given, all matters arising out of former meetings of council, and any business the chairman may think fit to bring under consideration.

8. Any motion entered on the notice paper, and the councillor having given notice of the same being absent, and no other councillor deputed to bring forward such motion when the business is called in order, such motion shall be struck out.

9. That any member may, during the discussion of a subject, demand the call of the council to decide thereon, unless four members then present shall object to such call being made.

10. That no order for a call of the council shall be made for any day earlier than seven days, and notice of such call shall be served within twenty-four hours of such order being made.

11. That any member not attending in compliance with an order for a call of the council without reasonable excuse shall be held guilty of contempt.

12. No bye-law shall be decided on without due notice (as in the case of motions), and a copy of the proposed bye-law shall

be open in the town clerk's office for the inspection of all rate-payers, or of any person duly qualified to vote at elections under the Act free of charge.

## CHAP. II.—Order of debate.

1. In connection with a motion one amendment only shall be discussed, but if lost, another may be proposed before the original question is put to the vote. Upon an amendment being carried, it shall be acted upon as an original motion, and one other amendment may be proposed thereon, but not more, and the names of the councillors voting for and against the question shall be recorded, and the votes of all councillors shall be entered on the minutes.

2. Any member may of right require the production of any of the documents of the council relating to the subject under discussion.

3. That each or any of the following acts, words or omissions shall constitute and be a breach of order, punishable as a contempt, unless the offending member, upon being called to order, do make a satisfactory apology to the council.

Addressing the council in other than a standing posture, without permission of the chairman.

Interrupting another member while addressing the council, except upon a point of order.

Presenting to the council a petition disrespectfully worded. Refusing to cease speaking when interrupted by a call to order.

Making a verbal and unwritten motion or amendment.

Addressing the council as proposer of a motion or amendment, without previously stating the nature thereof.

Speaking more than once on the same motion or amendment, except through the chairman in explanation, or in reply as the mover of the original motion; but members merely seconding a motion shall not be considered to have spoken upon it.

Digressing from the subject matter of the question under discussion.

Using offensive language, imputing improper motives or making personal reflections on a member.

4. The chairman, in deciding a point of order, shall state the rule applicable to the case, and his decision thereon shall be final.

5. If more than one councillor rise at one time, the chairman for the time being shall decide which is entitled to precedence.

6. Any member may require the town clerk to take down in writing any words used by another member immediately on the same being used.

7. No discussion shall be allowed on a motion for adjournment of the council; and should such motion be carried, the business then undiposed of shall have precedence at the next meeting of council.

8. The chairman shall arise when addressing the council in discussion of any subject.

9. No motion, the effect of which, if carried, would be to rescind any motion which has already passed the council, shall be entertained during the same municipal year, unless a call of the whole council has been duly made for that purpose.

## CHAP. III.—Elections.

1. No election to any office at the disposal of the council shall take place until four clear days' notice shall have been given in one or more of the local newspapers, inviting applications for the same; and the salary of such office shall in all cases be fixed for the municipal year, and inserted in the advertisement.

2. Except in cases of election, which shall be decided by ballot, the council shall vote by show of hands, each question being put first in the affirmative and afterwards in the negative.

3. No councillor or officer belonging to the council shall be received as surety for any officer appointed by the council; and in all cases in which security for the due and faithful performance of any duty or contract is required, the expense of preparing such surety shall be borne by the person or persons giving the same.

## CHAP. IV.—Miscellaneous regulations.

1. The clerk shall have the charge of the common seal of the corporation, and shall be responsible for the safe custody and proper use of the same, each impression thereof being duly verified by the signature of that officer.

2. The town clerk shall not affix the common seal to any corporate document without the express consent or order of the council, nor unless such document bears the signature of the chairman.

3. Any member who shall wilfully disobey any lawful order of the council, and any member or other person who shall wilfully or vexatiously interrupt the orderly conduct of the business of the council, shall be held guilty of contempt.

4. That any member or other person adjudged by the council, for any of the causes hereinbefore mentioned, guilty of contempt, shall be fined in any sum not exceeding Ten pounds sterling.

(Under 18 Victoria No. 15.)

WHEREAS by an Act of Council, 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that it shall be competent for the council of any municipal district to make bye-laws for the regulation of their own proceedings, the conducting of public meetings, &c.: And whereas by the making of bye-law No. 13 by the municipal council of Belfast for taking elections by ballot, it is necessary and expedient to rescind clauses 4, 5, 6, 7 and 8 of bye-law No. 9, made by the said council, assented to by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, and gazetted on the 8th day of December, 1857, pursuant to 13 Victoria No. 15, section 33: Be it therefore hereby enacted that the aforesaid clauses 4, 5, 6, 7 and 8 of said bye-law No. 9 be and they are hereby rescinded.

BYE-LAW No. 2.—FOR EMPOWERING THE CHAIRMAN OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF FITZ ROY, FROM AND AFTER THE DATE HEREOF, TO TAKE ELECTIONS BY BALLOT TO SUPPLY VACANCIES FROM TIME TO TIME IN THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF FITZ ROY.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that it shall be competent for the council of any municipal district to make bye-laws for the regulation of their own proceedings, the conducting of elections: And whereas it is expedient from and after the date hereof that the chairman of the municipal council of Fitz Roy, or his deputy or deputies, be hereby severally empowered to take elections by ballot to supply vacancies occurring from time to time in the municipal council of Fitz Roy, in like manner as far as the same may apply as elections by ballot are now from time to time taken to supply vacancies in the Legislative Council and Assembly of Victoria, according to the provisions to that effect in the Act of Council 19 Victoria No. 12, *An Act for the Election of Members, &c.*: Be it therefore hereby enacted that such elections to supply vacancies in the municipal council of Fitz Roy be taken by ballot from and after the date hereof.

## MUNICIPALITY OF KILMORE.

No. 18.—A BYE-LAW TO REGULATE THE CONDUCTING OF THE ELECTION OF MEMBERS OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of Victoria, 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted, that the council of any municipal district established under the provisions of the said Act may make bye-laws for the conducting of elections: And whereas by a Proclamation of His Excellency the Officer administering the Government, dated the 14th day of July, 1856, the district of Kilmore was duly established a municipal district under the provisions and within the meaning of the

said Act: It is therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council of the district of Kilmore, that from and after this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, as required by the provisions of the said Act:—

1. If at any election the chairman of the municipal council for the time being shall be a candidate for re-election, or shall be incapacitated from presiding at such election either from illness, absence from the district, or any other cause, it shall be competent for the remaining members of the municipal council (being a quorum) to appoint some one of themselves to act as chairman for the purpose of carrying out such election; and it shall be lawful for the chairman, upon a vote of the council, to appoint, under his hand and seal, such and so many persons as to the council may seem necessary to act as deputy chairman or chairmen, poll clerk or poll clerks, and to appoint such and so many places within the municipal district as may seem to the said council necessary to be the polling place or places.

2. If at any election a poll shall be demanded in the manner and form required by the said Act, the chairman shall cause to be provided at the polling place or places a sufficient number of stalls or compartments, together with ink and pens or pencils, for the purpose of enabling the electors to mark the voting papers as hereinafter provided, in any which polling place no person other than the chairman, the town clerk or his deputy, scrutineers, and electors who may be tendering their votes, who shall intrude behind the barrier, and on being required to withdraw by the chairman shall refuse so to do, shall be deemed guilty of an offence within the provisions of this bye-law, and upon being convicted thereof before any two or more justices of the peace acting in and for the district, shall forfeit and pay a sum or penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds.

3. The chairman in each polling place shall cause to be provided for the purpose of such election a locked-up box, of which he shall keep the key, with a cleft or opening therein capable of receiving the voting papers, and which box shall stand upon the table in front of the chairman; and each elector shall receive from the chairman a voting paper signed by him in the form in the schedule hereunto annexed, and shall thereupon retire to a stall or compartment provided for that purpose and there strike out the name or names of such candidates as he does not intend to vote for, and deposit the same in the ballot box folded in such a manner that the signature of the chairman may be seen; and in case such elector shall be unable to read or be blind he shall signify the same to the chairman, who shall thereupon mark or strike out the names of such candidate or candidates as such elector shall designate, and no elector shall take out of such polling place any such voting paper either before or after he has marked the same; and any person wilfully infringing any of the provisions of this clause, or obstructing the polling by any unnecessary delay in performing any act within the polling place, shall be deemed guilty of an offence within the meaning of this bye-law, and on being convicted thereof before any two or more justices of the peace acting in and for the district, shall forfeit and pay a sum or penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds.

4. Each candidate shall be entitled to appoint, by writing under his hand, to be delivered to the chairman at any time before Eight o'clock in the morning of the polling day, one scrutineer to be present on his behalf in the polling place.

5. It shall be lawful for the chairman, or for any candidate or scrutineer, to put to any person before he shall have received his voting paper the following questions only:—

1. What is your christian and surname?
2. Are you of the age of twenty-one years?
3. Are you a ratepayer on the ratepayers' roll of the municipal district of Kilmore?
4. Have you paid all rates levied upon you, except such as shall have become payable by you within six months before this election?
5. Have you already voted at this election?

And if any person shall wilfully give a false answer to any of the questions aforesaid he shall be deemed guilty of an offence within the meaning of this bye-law, and on being convicted thereof before any two or more justices of the peace acting in and for the district shall forfeit and pay a sum or penalty not exceeding Fifty pounds.

6. At every election, it shall be the duty of the town clerk or his deputy to provide himself with the ratepayers' roll, and as each elector comes forward to demand his voting paper to see whether the name of such elector appears upon the roll as a ratepayer within the meaning of the said Act, and as each elector deposits his voting paper within the ballot box to mark off such elector's name as having voted at such election.

7. In case the voting paper as of any person shall have been received, and any other person shall afterwards demand his voting paper as of the same person, the chairman, when such person shall purpose to deposit his paper in the ballot box, shall refuse to allow the same to be put therein, but shall receive and keep the same apart, and at the close of the election decide whether such person has already voted or not; and for the purpose of such decision, it shall be lawful for the chairman to take evidence on oath or affirmation, and such decision shall be final and conclusive on all parties; and if it shall appear to the chairman that such elector has not already voted at such election, such vote shall be added to the number already polled, but if otherwise such vote shall not be allowed.

8. At the close of the poll, or as soon after as conveniently may be, the chairman, in the presence of the scrutineers, shall count the number of votes polled for each candidate, and if on the state of the poll being announced the number of votes shall have been found to have been equal for any two or more candidates, one or more of whom, but not all, shall, by the state of the poll and the number of members to be elected, be entitled to be declared to be elected, the chairman shall, by a casting vote or votes, as the case may be, decide which of the candidates for whom the votes may be equal shall be elected, but no chairman shall be entitled to vote at any election except in the case of an equality of votes.

### MUNICIPALITY OF EMERALD HILL.

REPORT OF THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE COUNCIL FOR THE HALF-YEAR ENDING 31ST DECEMBER, 1858.

#### PUBLIC WORKS.

THE following works have been completed during the half-year, viz.:

The formation of Moray street, between Bank and Coventry streets, also the extension of Moray street 40 feet in width from York street to the Sandridge road.

The following streets have been formed, metalled, and kerbed, viz.:—Union street, Emerald street, Queen street, Clarendon street from Park to Napier streets, and Cecil street from Dorcas to Park street.

A cube crossing has been laid in Clarendon street, at the intersection of Coventry street, and channelling has been laid down in Union street, Emerald street, and Queen street.

Blue gum kerbing has been laid down in Coventry street east, Dorcas street east, Ferrars street, portions of Clarendon street, and contracts have been entered into for a supply of timber and laying down all kerbing that may be required during the remaining six months of the municipal year.

Several important improvements have been effected in Clarendon street, between Dorcas street and the Sandridge road.

Footpaths and water channels have been formed in portions of Park street west, Bridport street, Raglan street, Napier street, Clarendon street south, Cobden street, Church street, Little Raglan street, Little Park street, Napier place, and Cecil place.

A considerable quantity of additional bluestone metal has been laid down in Clarendon, Cecil, and Ferrars streets; also on the tables in other streets of the township.

Commodious bathing houses for females, with residence for attendants, have been constructed, and are leased for the remainder of the bathing season, a small fee only being exacted for the use of the baths.

Twenty additional lamps have been erected within the township, and a contract entered into for lighting and maintenance of same.

An application made to the Government for the extension of Ferrars street from Sandridge road to the River Yarra has been granted, and the street proclaimed.

Two new streets have been laid out by the Government on block 8, and have been named St. Luke street and Palk street respectively.

An order has been transmitted to England for 20,000 square feet of Yorkshire flagging, similar to that laid down in Cecil street. The parcel is expected to arrive in March, and will be laid down before the setting in of the wet season.

The council contemplate forming a crossing over or under the railway in the line of the three chain road: a plan has been prepared by the town surveyor, with a report showing the relative merits and cost of the two modes.

The subject of water supply continues to occupy the careful attention of the council, and it is expected that the Yan Yean supply will be extended shortly. The Government geologist was communicated with with a view to ascertaining the possibility of supplying the district with water by means of Artesian wells, but that officer declared the scheme impracticable.

The subject of gas supply is still under consideration of the council, also the erection of public markets within the township.

A contract has been entered into for the completion of Dorcas street from Cecil to Moray street; the extension of Moray street will shortly be increased to the width of 99 feet.

An application has been forwarded to the Government for the extension of the South Park northward to the following limits, viz., the Sandridge road on the north, the Brighton road on the east, and the boundary of the town proper of Emerald Hill on the west, such additional land to be planted and otherwise ornamented.—The Government have promised to give the matter their consideration.

Plans and specifications were adopted for the formation of an embankment along the south edge of the River Yarra as the nucleus of a road, but as many difficulties presented themselves it has been deemed advisable to abandon the idea, and provide passenger accommodation along the bank on some other plan.

The council have followed up with untiring energy the matter of the proposed bridge over the Yarra Yarra at the Falls. The co-operation of the city council and the chamber of commerce has been obtained, and the subject has been repeatedly urged on the Government; these and other means will, no doubt, ere long, secure the construction of this much required and desirable work.

The council regret to state that the assent of Her Majesty has been withheld from the *Crown Explanations Act*, although a petition signed by 2600 inhabitants praying that such assent should be given was forwarded to the Home Government; the long pending dispute between the council and the Railway Company, respecting the extension of Clarendon street to the Yarra, is therefore still in abeyance.

#### SANDRIDGE ROAD.

Several improvements have been effected during the half-year. The small bridge near the toll house has been removed and the road formed to the uniform width. Twenty-four addi-

tional lamps have been erected, and a contract entered into for lighting, &c. The road has been metalled wherever necessary, and the contract for the repairs and maintenance of the road renewed. The necessary arrangements are being entered into for the formation of the remainder of the footpaths, kerbing same, and for the erection of a handsome post and chain fence on each side of the road. The tolls were re-let on 1st January for 1859 for the sum of £5105.

#### GOVERNMENT GRANT.

During the half-year the council have received the balance of the Government grant-in-aid, amounting to £3436 13s. 9d.

#### ASSESSMENT.

An assessment has been duly made, and a rate of One shilling in the pound struck for the municipal year 1858-9. The net valuation amounts to £62,303.
