A PROCLAMATION.

VICTORIA R.

WHEREAS we are happily at peace with all sovereigns, powers, and states:

And whereas, notwithstanding our utmost exertions to preserve peace between all the sovereign powers and states now at war, hostilities have unhappily commenced between His Imperial Majesty the Emperor of Austria on the one part, and His Majesty the King of Sardinia and His Imperial Majesty the Emperor of the French on the other part:

And whereas a state of war now exists between His Imperial Majesty the Emperor of Austria on the one part, and His Majesty the King of Sardinia and His Imperial Majesty the Emperor of the French on the other part, and between their respective subjects and others inhabiting within their countries, territories, or dominions:

And whereas we are on terms of friendship and amicable intercourse with all and each of these sovereigns, and with their several subjects and others inhabiting within their countries, territories, or dominions:

And whereas great numbers of our loyal subjects reside and carry on commerce, and possess property and establishments, and enjoy various rights and privileges within the dominions of each of the aforesaid sovereigns, protected by the faith of treaties between us and each of the aforesaid sovereigns:

And whereas we, being desirous of preserving to our subjects the blessings of peace, which they now happily enjoy, are firmly purposed and determined to abstain altogether from taking any part, directly or indirectly, in the war now unhappily existing between the said sovereigns, their subjects and territories, and

to remain at peace with and to maintain a peaceful and friendly intercourse with all and with each of them, and their respective subjects, and others inhabiting within any of their countries, territories, and dominions, and to maintain a strict and impartial neutrality in the said hostilities and war unhappily existing between them:

We, therefore, have thought fit, by and with the advice of our Privy Council, to issue this our Royal Proclamation:

And we do hereby strictly charge and command all our loving subjects to govern themselves accordingly, and to observe a strict neutrality in and during the aforesaid hostilities and war, and to abstain from violating or contravening either the laws and statutes of the realm in this behalf, or the law of nations in relation thereto, as they will answer to the contrary at their peril:

And whereas in and by a certain statute made and passed in the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled, *An Act to prevent the enlisting or engagement of His Majesty's subjects to serve in a foreign service, and the fitting out or equipping, in His Majesty's dominions, vessels for warlike purposes, without His Majesty's license*, it is amongst other things declared and enacted as follows:—

"That if any person within any part of the United Kingdom, or in any part of His Majesty's dominions beyond the seas, shall, without the leave and license of His Majesty for that purpose first had and obtained as aforesaid, equip, furnish, fit out, or arm, or attempt or endeavor to equip, furnish, fit out, or arm, or procure to be equipped, furnished, fitted out, or armed, or shall knowingly aid, assist, or be concerned in the equipping, furnishing, fitting out, or arming, of any ship or vessel, with intent or in order that such ship or vessel shall be employed in the service of any foreign prince, state, or potentate, or of any foreign colony, province, or part of any province or people, or of any person or persons exercising or assuming to exercise any powers of government in or over any foreign state, colony, province, or part of any province or people, as a transport or store ship, or with intent to cruise or commit hostilities against any prince, state, or potentate, or against the subjects or citizens of any prince, state, or potentate, or against the persons exercising or assuming to exercise the powers of government in any colony, province, or part of any province or country, or against the inhabitants of any foreign colony, province, or part of any province or country, with whom His Majesty shall not then be at war, or shall within the United Kingdom or any of His Majesty's dominions, or in any settlement, colony, territory, island, or place belonging or subject to His Majesty, issue or deliver any commission for any ship or vessel, to the intent that such ship or vessel shall be employed as aforesaid, every such person so offending shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall, upon conviction thereof, upon any information or indictment, be punished by fine and imprisonment, or either of them, at the discretion of the court in which such offender shall be convicted; and every such ship or vessel, with the tackle, apparel, and furniture, together with all the materials, arms, ammunition, and stores which may belong to or be on board of any such ship or vessel, shall be forfeited; and it shall be lawful for any officer of His Majesty's customs or excise, or any officer of His Majesty's navy, who is by law empowered to make seizures for any forfeiture incurred under any of the laws of customs or excise, or the laws of trade and navigation, to seize such ships and vessels aforesaid, and in such places and in such manner in which the officers of His Majesty's customs or excise and the officers of His Majesty's navy are empowered respectively to make seizures under the laws of customs and excise, or under the laws of trade and navigation; and that every such ship and vessel, with the tackle, apparel, and furniture, together with all the materials, arms, ammunition, and stores which may belong to or be on board of such ship or vessel, may be prosecuted and condemned in the like manner and in such courts as ships or vessels may be prosecuted and condemned for any breach of the laws made for the protection of the revenues of customs and excise, or of the laws of trade and navigation."

And it is in and by the said Act further enacted,—

"That if any person in any part of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or in any part of His Majesty's dominions beyond the seas, without the leave and license of His Majesty for that purpose first had and obtained as aforesaid, shall by adding to the number of guns of such vessel, or by changing those on board for other guns, or by the addition of any equipment for war, increase or augment, or procure to be increased or augmented, or shall be knowingly concerned in increasing or augmenting, the warlike force of any ship or vessel of war or cruiser, or other armed vessel, which at the time of her arrival in any part of the United Kingdom or any of His Majesty's dominions, was a ship of war, cruiser, or armed vessel in the service of any foreign prince, state, or potentate, or of any person or persons exercising or assuming to exercise any powers of government in or over any colony, province, or part of any province or people belonging to the subjects of any such prince, state, or potentate, or to the inhabitants of any colony, province, or part of any province or country under the control of any person or persons so exercising or assuming to exercise the powers of government, every such person so offending shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall, upon being convicted thereof upon any information or indictment, be punished by fine and imprisonment, or either of them, at the discretion of the court before which such offender shall be convicted."

Now, in order that none of our subjects may unwarily render themselves liable to the penalties imposed by the said statute, we do hereby strictly command, that no person or persons whatsoever do commit any act, matter, or thing whatsoever contrary to the provisions of the said statute, upon pain of the several penalties by the said statute imposed, and of our high displeasure.

And we do hereby warn and admonish all our loving subjects, and all persons whatsoever entitled to our protection, to observe towards each and all of the aforesaid sovereigns, their subjects and territories, and towards all belligerents whatsoever with whom we are at peace, the duties of neutrality; and to respect, in all and each of them, the exercise of those belligerent rights which we, and our royal predecessors, have always claimed to exercise.

And we do hereby further warn all our loving subjects, and all persons whatsoever entitled to our protection, that if any of them shall presume, in contempt of this our Royal Proclamation and of our high displeasure, to do any acts in derogation of their duty as subjects of a neutral sovereign, in a war between other sovereigns, or in violation or contravention of the law of nations in that behalf, as more especially by breaking, or endeavoring to break, any blockade lawfully and actually established by or on behalf of any, or either of the said sovereigns, by carrying officers, soldiers, despatches, arms, ammunition, military stores or materials, or any article or articles considered and deemed to be contraband of war, according to the law or modern usages of nations, for the use or service of any or either of the said sovereigns, that all persons so offending, together with their ships and goods, will rightfully incur and be justly liable to hostile capture, and to the penalties denounced by the law of nations in that behalf.

And we do hereby give notice, that all our subjects and persons entitled to our protection, who may misconduct themselves in the premises, will do so at their peril, and of their own wrong, and that they will in nowise obtain any protection from us against such capture or such penalties as aforesaid, but will, on the contrary, incur our high displeasure by such misconduct.

Given at our Court at Buckingham Palace, this thirteenth day of May, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, and in the twenty-second year of our reign.

GENERAL REGULATIONS RESPECTING PUBLIC ACCOUNTS.

22 VICTORIA No. 86.

HIS Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, hereby notifies that on and after the first day of May, 1859, the following Regulations respecting Public Accounts, framed in pursuance of the Act 22 Victoria No. 86, sec. 2, will come into operation, and the Regulations of 7th and 14th December, 1857, will thereby be repealed:—

1. Persons appointed to collect moneys on account of the "Consolidated Revenue" will be, and will be called "Collectors of Imposts," and persons appointed to receive such moneys from such collectors will be, and will be called "Receivers of Revenue," and persons appointed by His Excellency to pay accounts transmitted to them for that purpose by the Treasurer as hereinafter mentioned will be and will be called "Paymasters."

Appointment of
Collectors, Re-
ceivers, and
Paymasters.

2. Collectors of Imposts, and all other persons in the Public Service who may receive any money on account of the Consolidated Revenue, are to pay their collections to the Receivers of Revenue in the manner and at the times and places to be notified to such collectors by the Treasurer, and in the event of such notification not being made or received, they are to pay their collections on the last day of each month to the nearest Receiver of Revenue.

Duties of Collect-
ors.—C. 2 to 8
inclusive.

3. The full amount of all collections is to be paid over to the Receiver of Revenue without deduction, except as next hereinafter mentioned. Charges on the sale of public property (not being public lands,) and the share of penalties to seizing officers, informers, prosecutors or other persons, when legally payable by the Collectors out of their collections, will be paid out of and deducted from such collections; and full, true, and particular accounts of all such deductions must accompany the statement required to be delivered by the Collector of Imposts or other person to the Receiver of Revenue as hereinafter mentioned. In the event of the sale whether by auction or by tender of property belonging to Government, the payment of the proceeds into the Treasury must be accompanied by the account sales, tenders, or other documents relating to the transaction.

4. When by virtue of any legal process any monies are received by any person in the Public Service, for or on account or for the use or benefit of any other person, and shall have remained in the possession of such person for a period of seven days, he is to pay the same into a Bank at such place and in such manner as may be notified to him by the Treasurer, and whenever such moneys shall have remained in such Bank, or under his control for three months next after the time at which the person entitled thereto could and might have received the same, the amount is to be paid into the Treasury to the credit of the Trust Fund.

5. Every Collector of Imposts, and every other person who may collect money as aforesaid, at the time of paying any moneys to a Receiver of Revenue is to deliver to such Receiver a statement in the form annexed, marked **A**, signed by such Collector, or other person, of the particular heads of receipt under which such moneys came to his possession or control, and of the days of the month on which the same respectively were collected.

6. Every Collector, and other person, at the time of paying any money to a Receiver of Revenue, will obtain from such Receiver, who is to give to such Collector, and other person a discharge for such money in the form annexed, marked **B**.

7. In case any one person is a Receiver of Revenue and a Collector of Imposts, the statement and discharge respectively above mentioned will not be necessary; but in that case such person will at the time appointed for delivering or sending the "Accountable Receipt" hereinafter mentioned, deliver or send by the post to the Treasurer a statement, signed by such person, of the particular heads of receipt under which the moneys by him collected and paid, as hereinafter directed, came to his possession or control, and of the days of the month on which the same respectively were collected; and every such statement is to be in the form annexed, marked **C**.

8. Every Collector of Imposts, and every other person as aforesaid will, on or before the tenth day of every month, deliver or send by post to the Commissioners of Audit, a return of all moneys collected by him for or on account of the Consolidated Revenue during the month next preceding, and of all moneys which, by virtue of his office or employment, have been collected by him for or on account or for the use or benefit of any other person during the same period and which by any Act now or hereafter shall be directed to be paid into the Treasury, and also of all moneys which by virtue of his office or employment or of any legal process whatsoever have been collected by him for or on account or for the use or benefit of any other person or corporation, and which at any time during such period have remained in any bank or under his control for three months next after the time at which such persons and corporations respectively could and might have received the same; and every such return is to be in the form hereunto annexed, marked **D**, and is to have thereon a declaration duly made and subscribed by such Collector of Imposts, or other person as aforesaid, as shown in the said form of Return. When no money is collected during the month, the Collector is nevertheless to furnish the usual return, duly declared to, with the word "Nil" written in the place for inserting particulars.

9. Every Receiver of Revenue will pay into a bank daily, in the manner and at the places to be notified to such Receivers by the Treasurer, all moneys which shall have come into his possession or control on or before that day as a Collector of Imposts, or as such Receiver as aforesaid, and such moneys are to be paid by such Receiver to an account in such bank, to be called the "Public Account."

Duties of Re-
ceivers.—C. 9
to 10 inclusive.

10. Every Receiver of Revenue at the time of paying any money, into the said account, in such bank as aforesaid, will obtain from the banker an "Accountable Receipt" in duplicate for the same in the form hereunto annexed, marked **E**, and will forthwith after such payment deliver or send by the post to the Treasurer one of the said duplicate "Accountable Receipts," together with the statements delivered to him by the Collectors of Imposts with respect to the moneys so paid into such bank, and also a summary of the said last mentioned statements, and of the statement hereinbefore directed to be delivered or sent by himself; such summary is to be in the form hereunto annexed, marked **F**.

Duties of Paymasters.—C. 11 to 14 inclusive.

11. Every such Paymaster as aforesaid is to pay such accounts only as may be from time to time transmitted to him for that purpose by the Treasurer; and at the time of paying such accounts, and not in any case before, such Paymaster will obtain from the persons to whom the same are payable receipts under their hands for the amounts so paid, and every such receipt is to be in words at full length, and be written on the account to which it may relate.

12. When any payment is made to a person unable to write, the mark of such person is to be affixed to the account, and be vouched by a witness as having been made in his presence; and when any payment is made through an agent, such agent must produce a written order in one or other of the forms hereunto annexed, marked **G** and **H** respectively; and every receipt must be vouched by a respectable and disinterested witness.

13. Every such Paymaster as aforesaid will forthwith after the payment of such accounts as aforesaid deliver or send by the post to the Treasurer the said accounts and receipts, and also a summary of the said accounts in the form hereunto annexed, marked **I**, and the said summary must have thereon a declaration duly made and subscribed by such Paymaster, as shown in the said form **I** of summary.

14. No sum will be allowed, except on special and sufficient grounds, in the account of any Paymaster without a written voucher of the actual payment of the sum so claimed to be allowed, notwithstanding any allegation of papers having been lost or destroyed; and in case any such Paymaster is compelled to transmit to the Treasurer any voucher defective in any of its essential particulars, such defective voucher must be accompanied with a full statement of the grounds on which such voucher is claimed to be allowed, in order that such proper steps may be taken as are prescribed by the law.

What books are to be kept by persons who receive or disburse public money.—C. 15.

15. Every person entrusted with the receipt or the expenditure of public money will be required to keep a cash book in the form hereunto annexed, marked **K**, in which he will enter on the one side the sums received, and on the other the amounts paid. He must also keep a register of all accounts, relating either to the revenue or the expenditure, transmitted by him to the Treasurer or the Commissioners of Audit; and such other books as the Treasurer may from time to time direct.

How accounts are to be prepared and transmitted to Treasury.—16 to 25.

16. The financial year will be from the 1st January to the 31st December, and the printed estimates of revenue and expenditure passed by the Legislature in each year are in all cases to form the basis of the system of accounts. Care is to be taken that the heads of revenue and expenditure are the same in the accounts as in the estimates; and that no account include services forming a charge upon separate years, or upon more than one department.

17. All accounts intended to be paid through the Treasury are in the first instance to be transmitted to the Treasurer, at Melbourne, and must be certified by the chief officer of the department for which the expense was incurred; and if any account is intended for payment otherwise than by the Paymaster, Melbourne, the name of the pay office at which the account is to be paid must be stated on the face of the account. Accounts thus passed for payment can only be paid at the pay office to which they have been transmitted.

18. Accounts and vouchers for payments made out of "Advances," as hereinafter mentioned, are to be transmitted to the Treasurer by the officers who received the advances, as soon as possible after the accounts have been completed.

19. Accounts and vouchers for payments made out of advances obtained under "Abstract of Expenses" as hereinafter mentioned, are in like manner to be forwarded to the Treasurer immediately after they shall have been completed; and no subsequent advance under "Abstract of Expenses" will be made by the Treasurer until such accounts and vouchers shall have been rendered in a complete state to his office, unless sufficient and proper grounds for a deviation from this course are furnished to and accepted by the Treasurer.

20. All bills of particulars are to be made out in the prescribed forms (**L** 1 to 5 inclusive) and must clearly set forth, in the case of services performed, the exact dates or periods of service, the rates of remuneration, and the name of the place where the services were rendered; and in case of articles purchased the exact dates or periods of supply, the places of delivery, the quantities and prices of the several articles, and the purpose for which required; the accounts must also be invariably signed opposite the total amount by the claimant, and in no case by an agent on his behalf unless such agent is acting under a power of attorney, in which case the account should be prepared in the agent's name as such attorney, and be accompanied in the case of the first claim with a copy of the power of attorney, certified by the Registrar General. Every bill of particulars must show upon the face of it the number of the vote, and subdivision, and the item to which it is chargeable, also the number of the authority under which the expenditure was incurred; and, if under contract, the date and *Gazette* number of such contract; and also, if upon requisition to the Government Storekeeper, the Chief Officer of the Department of Works, or other officer, the date and number of such requisition. Accounts are to be certified by the officer incurring the expenditure (the amount to be stated in words at length), or in the case of Public Works and Buildings, by the officer superintending such works, and by the Head of the Department concerned.

21. In stating periods, the first and last day specified are both to be considered as inclusive. The amount of wages or allowances fixed according to a daily rate is invariably to be calculated on the exact number of days contained in the period for which they are charged, except in cases where the allowance given is for working days only.

22. The proportion of an annual salary for a broken period is to be computed by multiplying the amount of the monthly proportion of each salary by the number of days in the broken period, and dividing by the number of days in the month.

23. Accounts transmitted for payment in an incomplete state or vitiated in any essential particular by erasure, interlineation, or otherwise, will be returned to the department from which they were received in order that they may be completed or made out anew, as the case may require.

24. Duplicate accounts are in no case to be certified unless the word "Duplicate" be at the same time written in red ink across the face thereof, nor until it has been satisfactorily ascertained that the original accounts previously certified have not been paid, and that they cannot be obtained. Officers certifying duplicate accounts are not under any circumstances to pay them out of an advance, but to forward them to the Treasury with a special report of the circumstances.

25. Each head of department is enjoined to afford every possible facility to persons having claims against his department, to enable them to prepare their accounts in such a manner as to secure the prompt payment of their claims; and, in cases where the claimant is ignorant of the proper forms to be observed, to prepare the requisite accounts.

26. Advances for authorised expenditure, may be made to heads of departments at the discretion of the Treasurer. As a general rule, only one "advance" is to be made to any one head of department during the same year, and the amount of such advance is not, except in special cases to be decided by the Treasurer, to exceed in amount the average monthly expenditure to be defrayed by its means. In order, however, that the head of department may keep himself supplied with funds to meet expenditure during the several months of the year, such head of department will, as often as may be necessary, forward to the Treasurer accounts duly vouching for the sums paid out of such advance; and the amount of such accounts, instead of being placed by the Treasurer to the credit of the advance account will be repaid to such head of department, and so on from time to time if necessary until the 15th of December, when or not later than the 25th of the same month final vouchers duly completed to account for the expenditure of the advance, and the balance (if any) remaining unexpended of such advance, must be transmitted to the Treasurer, in order that such accounts and balance may then be placed to the credit of the advance account, and be duly brought into the Treasurer's books before the end of the year. Forms on which to apply for advances or for re-imburements will be supplied at the Treasury.

Advances how to be obtained and accounted for. C. 25 to 28.

27. Applications for advances to pay salaries and fixed money allowances must be made in the form "Abstract of Expenses" annexed, marked **VI**, and must be lodged with the Treasurer on or soon after the last day of each month, showing the salaries and fixed money allowances due for such month, and an advance of money equal to the total amount of the application so lodged in each case will be made to the head of the department concerned, for the purpose of enabling him to pay such salaries and fixed allowances; and every such head of department will forthwith after the payment of such salaries and fixed allowances transmit to the Treasurer the necessary vouchers duly completed in the manner before mentioned. The abstract for the month of December must be brought forward in sufficient time to admit of the salaries being paid on the 31st day of the month.

28. It is to be distinctly understood that payments made out of "Advances" are in every case, without exception, to be made in strict accordance with the regulations herein laid down, the same as payments made at the Treasury.

29. To enable the Treasurer to calculate the amount of moneys likely to become due and payable in each month, and to provide funds under the warrant of the Governor accordingly, each head of department will, when required by the Treasurer to do so, prepare and transmit to the proper ministerial officer, not later than the 15th of each month, a statement in the form hereunto annexed, marked **IV 1**, setting forth the amounts of moneys likely to become due and payable for the several services and establishments under his control during the ensuing month, and such statement, when duly approved by the proper ministerial officer, will be scheduled by his directions in the form annexed, marked **IV 2**, and, together with such schedule, be transmitted to the Treasurer, who will submit the same for the Governor's approval. The amounts to be set forth in such statements need not necessarily have any direct connection with any particular authority or authorities issued, or to be issued, as hereinafter described. Such statements will be required only for the information of the Treasurer, and will comprise so much of the authorities issued, or to be issued as aforesaid, as may be likely to be acted upon during the month to which such statements may relate.

Requisition for funds to meet monthly payments.

30. Authorities for incurring expenditure, and for cancelling such authorities, will be classed as follows, viz.:-

Authority how obtained.—C. 30 to 42.

- 1st. "Annual Authorities"
- 2nd. "Quarterly General Authorities"
- 3rd. "Special Authorities"
- 4th. "Cancellation Authorities"

and no expenditure is to be incurred by any officer of the public service except under the authority of the Governor.

31. "Annual Authorities," according to the annexed form, marked **O**, will be granted by the Governor, and will be communicated through the proper ministerial officer to heads of departments as soon as practicable after the passing of the Appropriation Act, for all salaries and money allowances fixed by law. A new appointment in lieu of one previously authorised, will not require the issue of a new authority for the payment of the salary, in any case in which the vote for such salary may have been previously placed under authority; but the particulars of such new appointment must nevertheless be furnished to the Treasurer and to the Commissioners of Audit.

32. For expenditure under either of the following heads of service, "Quarterly General Authorities" will be issued in the form annexed, marked **P 1**, in the following manner:—

To the Government Storekeeper—for expenditure under the following "Items," viz. (unless specially excepted):—Provisions, Forage, Fuel, Light and Water, Bedding and Clothing, Type and Printer's Furniture, Materials for repairs to Electric Telegraph lines,

Stationery, Stores, Transport, and for any other service the expenditure for which may be placed under his superintendence.

To Heads of Departments concerned,—for

Occasional Clerical Assistance,
Medical and Funeral Expenses,
Gratuities to Officers of Immigrant
vessels,
Gratuities to Masters of vessels for
carrying Mails,
Coroners' and Surgeons' Fees and
Contingent Expenses,
Printing and Advertising,
Travelling Expenses,

Wages to Day Laborers,
Erection and repair of Works including
Furniture, if the estimated cost does
not exceed £100,
Farriery and Shoeing,
Commission on Sales of Land,
Newspapers,
Incidental Expenses,
Miscellaneous Expenses of unimportant
character and amount.

33. For the sake of convenience the Government Storekeeper will make his application (in form **P 2**) to, and receive his authorities from the Treasurer, but he will not incur any expense under such authorities for departments not under the Treasurer's control, except upon the requisition or approval of the proper Ministerial Officer. Other Heads of Departments must apply (in form **P 2**) for their authorities to the Ministerial Officers respectively having control of their several departments.

34. Stores and transport, when required for any department (except Military and Naval) are to be obtained upon approved requisition to the Government Storekeeper, in accordance with the Store and Transport Regulations for the time being. As the expenditure of the items voted for these services will be under the superintendence of the Government Storekeeper, authorities for such expenditure are not to be issued to any other head of department without the concurrence of the Treasurer. It is to be distinctly understood that no head of department is to apply for or act upon any authority other than those which may relate to expenditure to be incurred under his own superintendence.

35. Before any expenditure which does not class under the head "Salaries and Fixed Money Allowances," or which is not regulated by "Quarterly General Authority," is incurred by any head of department, the Governor's "Special Authority" for such expenditure must be obtained by application being made for it through the proper officer, and every such application must set forth the nature and the amount of such expenditure as well also the grounds on which it may be considered to be necessary and proper. "Contracts," for a specific amount duly entered into by the proper officers and published in the *Government Gazette* as hereinafter mentioned, are to be considered "special authorities."

36. If the exigencies of the public service render it advisable to alter in any case the proportions assigned to the particular items comprised under any one subdivision in the Annual Supplies, a "Transfer Authority," in the form annexed, marked **Q**, will be granted, upon application of the head of department, through the proper Ministerial Officer, to transfer out of the surplus arising on any item or items a sufficient amount to meet the deficiency, on any other item or items under the same subdivision, (except salaries fixed by law) unless such subdivision shall be expressly stated to be inalterable. Transfer authority will not convey any authority to expend the amount transferred by it.

37. "Cancellation Authorities" in the form annexed, marked **R**, will be granted when required for the purpose of cancelling authorities or portions of authorities which may not be required, or which may be required to be renewed in some other form, and for correcting authorities which may have been issued in excess of the proper amount; and no authority once issued is to be limited in any way, except by means of a "Cancellation Authority" granted for the purpose.

38. "Cancellation Authorities" will be chiefly necessary in the following cases:—

1st.—Should any portion of an Annual Authority not be required for the salary or allowance of the particular person in whose favor it had been granted, and no fresh appointment is made to fill the place of such person, such portion of the authority must be cancelled.

2nd.—When a contract is taken for a fixed amount and the expenditure contemplated by such contract has been previously authorised, the authority for such expenditure will lapse and must be cancelled, and the contract in such case must be dealt with as a new authority. In cases where a contract for a fixed amount is taken in lieu of a previous contract, a cancellation authority must issue, to enable such previous contract to be discharged from the accounts, and the *Gazette* notice of such new contract must refer by number to such cancellation authority.

3rd.—Should any amount, which it may be necessary to transfer from one item to another, have been previously placed under authority, such authority, or so much of it as may be necessary, must be cancelled.

4th.—All authorities which may not be expended on the 31st December of the year following that on account of which they are issued, will finally lapse.

39. Should the authority granted in any case be found insufficient, a further authority to supply the deficiency may be issued, notwithstanding that the usual period for issuing authorities may not have arrived; but the Government Storekeeper and other heads of departments should endeavor to avoid any necessity for supplementary authorities, by applying for a sufficient amount in the first instance. No expenditure of any kind whatsoever is to be incurred without, nor in excess of, authority; and no authority for any expenditure is to be applied for, for any service, in excess of the amount voted for such service.

40. As no moneys voted by the Legislature for any year may be issued or applied in any future year unless a contract or engagement shall be entered into during such year, by which a liability to issue or apply the same according to the vote of the Legislature is incurred (in which case such sums as may be necessary for the purpose of satisfying such contract or engagement will be set apart and retained in the Treasury), heads of departments are required

to apply before the 31st December in each year for authority to incur any expenditure on account of the votes of that year. All sums of money set apart or retained in the Treasury for the purpose of satisfying such contracts and engagements, which shall not be expended during the following year, will lapse, and must not be issued or applied after the 31st December of that year.

41. Abstracts of all authorities, in the forms annexed, marked **S** 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, will be transmitted by the ministerial officers to the Treasurer and also (excepting those for transfers) to the Commissioners of Audit for their information and guidance. These abstracts are to be accompanied by schedules of particulars, showing, in the case of annual authorities, names, nature of appointment, rates of pay, &c.; in the case of quarterly and special authorities, every necessary particular not contained in the abstract itself; and in the case of a new appointment, with a schedule, showing the approval of the Governor in Council.

42. In the event of any amount, which had been previously disbursed from the Treasury, being returned, the statement or voucher which must accompany the return of such amount to the Treasury must state upon the face of it the number and year of the vote to which such amount had been previously charged, and the number of the authority under which it had been disbursed.

43. Heads of departments are enjoined to adhere strictly to the rules herein laid down respecting authorities, inasmuch as the efficient working of the system of account to be brought into operation under these regulations will, in great measure, depend upon such rules being duly observed.

44. As far as practicable tenders are to be invited, and contracts duly entered into by the officer upon whom the duty may properly devolve, for the supply during the financial year of all articles in constant requirement for the public service, such as rations of provisions and forage, fuel, light and water, medical comforts, stationery and stores.

Contracts.—C. 43
to 46.

45. In like manner tenders are to be invited and a contract taken for the construction or repair of any public work or building, the probable expenditure for which is estimated to exceed £100; and also for the supply of Furniture and stores, &c., involving an expenditure exceeding £100, except in cases where the existence of a contract for the supply of such articles as required, during the financial year, may render such a course unnecessary or unadvisable.

46. Abstracts, duly numbered in arithmetical progression, of all contracts entered into by or on behalf of the Government of Victoria, are to be published for general information in the *Government Gazette*, and duly numbered for convenient reference, and printed copies of such abstracts, as published, must be duly and regularly transmitted by the Government Printer to the Treasurer and to the Commissioners of Audit.

47. Special instructions, when necessary, will be given, in a separate form, to the Government Storekeeper, and to all other officers who may be entrusted with special duties, in respect of which the regulations herein contained may be insufficient or inapplicable.

Special instructions.—C. 47.

48. Prompt and careful attention must be given by all officers and others having the charge or control of public moneys or accounts, to the instructions they may receive from the Treasurer, the Commissioners of Audit, or other competent authority, and any information which such officers and others may be called upon in like manner to give, must be rendered as fully and accurately as possible, and without any avoidable delay.

Prompt attention to instructions.—C. 48.

49. All persons entrusted with the receipt or expenditure of public money, or who may hold any appointment under the Act first above mentioned, will be required to provide security for such sum and in such manner and form, as the Governor in Council may from time to time direct, for the due performance of their several offices, and for the due accounting for and payment of all moneys which may come to their possession or control by reason or virtue of their respective office, service, or employment.

Security to be given.—C. 49.

50. Persons holding appointments under the Act first before mentioned, who fail in the due performance of their several duties, render themselves liable to the penalties prescribed by the said Act. Heads of departments and others who may neglect to observe the rules herein laid down will render themselves liable to be surcharged by the Treasurer in the full amount of all moneys due or becoming due to them at the Treasury; and in extreme cases the Treasurer, with the approval of the Governor in Council, will surcharge all moneys due or becoming due to the department in which any such neglect may have taken place.

RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR THE GUIDANCE OF THE TREASURER
RESPECTING PUBLIC ACCOUNTS.

(ACT 22 VICTORIA No. 86.)

HIS Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, directs that on and after the first day of May, 1859, the following Rules and Regulations respecting Public Accounts are to be observed by the Treasurer, in pursuance of the Act 22 Victoria, No. 86.

1. The duty of carrying out the provisions of the Act 22 Victoria No. 86, and the General Regulations framed in pursuance thereof, is to devolve upon the Treasurer.

2. Every Collector of Imposts and other persons as mentioned in the General Regulations are to be informed of the Governor's instructions as to the time, place, and manner they are to pay over and account for their collections, and also of the name of the Receiver of Revenue to whom such collections are to be paid. In like manner every Receiver of Revenue is to be informed of the particular bank or banks into which he is to pay daily the moneys received by him from Collectors of Imposts or from other persons.

3. Copies of the General Regulations before mentioned are to be transmitted to every Collector, Receiver, and Paymaster, and to every Head of Department, or other person entrusted with the receipt or expenditure of public moneys, or in charge of public accounts, and an acknowledgment of the receipt thereof is to be obtained from each person.

4. Every person who shall be appointed to any office in pursuance of the Act 22 Victoria No. 86, and every other person in the Public Service, to whose possession or control any moneys shall come by virtue of his office or employment, must be informed of the amount of security which the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, may from time to time direct to be provided by them respectively, for the due performance of their several offices, and for the due accounting for and payment of all moneys which shall come to their respective possession or control by reason or virtue of their respective offices, services and employments.

5. Should any Head of Department or other person in the Public Service, or any person holding any office under the Act 22 Victoria No. 86, fail in the due observance of the General Regulations before mentioned, or neglect any instructions which may be issued to him in accordance with such Act and Regulations, by the Treasurer, the Commissioners of Audit, or other competent authority, all payments to him of any kind whatsoever are to be suspended until such regulations and instructions shall have been duly complied with, or until satisfactory explanations of such failure or neglect shall have been received and accepted by the Treasurer.

6. Should any Head of Department, or other person as aforesaid, incur any expense chargeable to the public account without due authority previously obtained in the manner laid down in the General Regulations, the accounts of such expenses, even should they be otherwise correct and complete, are not to be paid, except they be paid out of moneys due to such Head of Department, until a proper authority to charge it to the public account shall have been obtained.

7. Should it appear to be necessary in any case of extreme inattention or neglect to suspend all payments to the department concerned, the particulars and circumstances of the case must be brought before the Governor in Council, and His Excellency's instructions obtained respecting it.

8. Prompt measures are to be taken in accordance with the Act before mentioned for satisfying any deficiency with which the Treasurer may be surcharged by the Commissioners of Audit.

9. To enable the Treasurer to calculate the amount of moneys likely to become due and payable in each month, and to provide funds under the warrant of the Governor accordingly, he will, if he think fit, demand, each month, from Heads of Departments, through the several Responsible Ministers, statements setting forth the amount of moneys likely to be required for the service of their respective departments during the ensuing month. These statements may be revised by the Treasurer whenever he may deem it necessary or expedient to do so.

10. The instrument upon which the Governor's warrant is to be obtained, as prescribed by the Act before mentioned, is to be signed by the Treasurer, and transmitted to the Commissioners of Audit not later than the 25th of each month. The amounts set forth in such instrument should be calculated to meet the full amount likely to become due and payable during the month to which it may relate, so as to avoid if possible the necessity for preparing a second instrument in respect of payments during such month. Should the aggregate amount of the warrant exceed in any case the amount of drafts and cheques subsequently paid under its authority, the excess in such case is nevertheless not to revert to the credit of the votes to which the items comprised in such aggregate amount may have been respectively debited, until the close of the year following that for the service of which the money was voted. On the 31st December of such following year the accounts of the sums reserved, either under warrant or authority, are to be closed, and the balances thereof must lapse and be no further applied.

11. All accounts intended to be paid out of the Public Account will be transmitted to the Treasurer, and if not made payable at one or other of the country pay offices are to be paid at Melbourne. All such accounts whether payable at Melbourne or elsewhere are as a general rule, to be passed and made payable within twenty-four hours after they shall have been presented in a complete state at the Treasury.

12. The Treasurer is to adopt whatever measures may be necessary to insure the prompt and regular transmission of accounts and returns, both from and to the several offices of his department and other departments. Accounts transmitted to any of the pay offices for payment, and remaining unclaimed for the period of one month, are to be published at the close of each month in the *Government Gazette*.

13. Copy of the daily cash book, together with the several vouchers in support thereof, must be transmitted in a complete shape to the Commissioners of Audit, as soon as possible, after the close of the day to which such copy may relate; but the interval between the date of the entries in the cash sheet, and that on which it is transmitted is not to exceed four days. The vouchers must be accompanied with any explanatory documents which may have been received by the Treasurer respecting such of the said vouchers as may have been transmitted to him in an incomplete or defective state.

14. Upon the receipt of vouchers duly completed to account for and adjust any "advance," as mentioned in the General Regulations, the Treasurer is forthwith, after making the necessary entries in his books and accounts, to transmit the said vouchers to the Commissioners of Audit, accompanied with an account current, showing on the one side the date and amount of such advance, and on the other side a list of the vouchers so transmitted, together with the Treasury receipt of the balance (if any) repaid.

15. The object of making "advances" to Heads of Departments in the manner prescribed by the General Regulations is to insure the prompt payment of accounts in cases where other facilities for the purpose are wanting. Vouchers received by the Treasurer for payments made out of such advances, instead of being carried to the credit of the advance account, which would necessitate the making of a new "advance," are to be considered in the light of vouchers for expenses paid by and to be reimbursed to the Head of Department, and are to be entered in the Treasurer's book, and be otherwise dealt with accordingly. This course is to be pursued as often as necessary until the date prescribed by the Regulations for repaying or adjusting the advances, when the vouchers, as they are received, must be carried to the credit of the advance account together with the balance, if any, unexpended.

16. As a general rule, therefore, the advance account will seem to show that no more than one "advance" had been made to and accounted for by any one Head of Department during the year.

17. It will be the Treasurer's duty in view of the objects above mentioned to take care that no advance is made in any case where it is not absolutely necessary, nor for an amount in excess of the estimated amount of the average monthly expenditure to be defrayed by its means, which amount, if accounts for payments made are promptly rendered, and the amount thereof reimbursed to the officer concerned, will in most cases be sufficient to meet such expenditure during the whole of the year.

18. In order that every advance may be duly accounted for, and the accounts relating to it be brought into the Treasurer's books before the end of the year, no advance is to be made, nor expenses reimbursed for the service of such year after the 15th of December. And on or before the 25th of the same month all accounts and vouchers relating to advances are to be called in and finally dealt with in manner before mentioned.

19. Advances under Abstracts of Expenses as mentioned in the general regulations will not be subject to the particular rules above laid down respecting advances, but will be treated in the following manner:—The Abstracts of Expenses upon which advances are to be made will be deposited at the Treasury, on or soon after the last day of each month, and the amount thereof, if correct, is to be paid to the Head of the Department or to some officer of his Department authorised by him to receive it, and a receipt for the same must be taken accordingly.

20. Previous to advancing money under any Abstract of Expenses, the Treasurer must ascertain that the proper vouchers have been received in his office for the payments made out of the sum advanced for the previous month, and no further advance is to be made until such vouchers have been duly rendered.

21. The Abstracts of Expenses for the month of December in each year are to be deposited at the Treasury, and the amount thereof advanced, if possible, before the close of that month, in order that such amount may be entered in the Treasury books for such year.

22. The several Books next hereinafter mentioned together with such other Books as the Treasurer may consider to be necessary for the due keeping of the Public Accounts, are to be kept at the Treasury, Melbourne, viz. :—

1st. "Cash Book."—To be kept in the manner and form prescribed by the Act 22 Victoria No. 86, and to be balanced daily.

2nd. "Daily Abstract Book."—For posting from the vouchers daily every item of receipt or payment by the several Receivers of Revenue and Paymasters respectively, and such other entries of transactions relating thereto as may be necessary for showing correct daily abstracts of the sums debited and credited respectively in the Treasury accounts. Each item of account is to be posted under its appropriate head of Revenue or Service.

3rd. "Journal."—For journalizing monthly, upon the principle of double entry, the several entries of the Daily Abstract Book.

4th. "Ledger."—To be posted from the journal upon the principle of double entry, and to contain a separate and distinct account for each head of revenue, and for each vote or appropriation by the Legislature, and such other separate and distinct accounts as the various transactions of the Government respecting the finances of the country may render necessary or desirable.

5th. "Appropriation Book."—For keeping a separate and distinct account of each vote or appropriation by the Legislature, and such other separate and distinct accounts as before mentioned as may be necessary, to which accounts respectively must be entered on the one side the amounts of such votes or appropriations, and on the other side the sums authorised to be expended out of such votes and appropriations, with the view of

enabling the Treasurer to maintain a complete check upon, and control over, the authorisation of expenditure chargeable to such votes and appropriations.

6th. "Authority Book."—To contain a separate and distinct account for each authority, showing on the one side the amount of such authority and on the other the several sums passed for payment under it, a balance being struck in respect of each account, as often as may be desirable.

7th. "Warrant Book."—For keeping accounts between the votes, &c., and the amount of "Warrants" drawn against them.

8th. "Order Book."—For keeping an account between each "Warrant" and the accounts ordered to be paid under it.

9th. "Register of Accounts."—For registering all accounts of Expenditure received or despatched at the Treasury Office, together with all necessary particulars respecting the proceedings taken upon such accounts in the said office.

23. The books kept at the Treasury are at no time to be allowed to get in arrear. They are to be finally balanced off and closed immediately after all the necessary entries to 31st December inclusive of each year have been completed.

24. Should it be necessary to prescribe any books to be kept by Collectors, Receivers or Paymaster, or other persons having the control of public moneys or accounts, in addition to the cash book prescribed by the Regulations, the Treasurer will take care that, so far as may be consistent with the object of such books respectively, the books intended for different departments are framed on a uniform plan.

25. The object of the system of authorities laid down in the General Regulations is to enable the Treasurer to maintain at all times a complete check upon the authorisation of expenditure to be defrayed out of sums voted or otherwise appropriated for the several branches of the public service. It will be incumbent upon the Treasurer, therefore, to see that that system is properly carried out; to take care that no amount is passed for payment before it has been authorised in strict accordance with the rules applicable to the particular case; and also, in every instance in which it may be necessary that an authority should be altered in any respect, that such alteration be effected by the issue either of an additional authority or of a cancellation authority as the case may require, and in no other manner.

26. The rules laid down in the General Regulations respecting authorities, direct that no authority is to be applied for by any Head of Department, except for such votes or items of votes as are to be expended under the superintendence of such Head of Department. The items of each vote to be expended under the superintendence of the Government Storekeeper are particularised in the General Regulations, and authorities for moneys to be so expended must therefore be applied for by and be issued to him, and not applied for by or issued to any other Head of Department. With the exception of such items, and the vote for the Store Department, no vote or portion of vote is to be expended under the superintendence of the Government Storekeeper until such vote or portion of vote shall have been formally placed under his control. All authorities to the Storekeeper are to be issued by the Treasurer.

27. The due observance of the various rules laid down respecting authorities as above alluded to, will tend to prevent the double authorisation of any expenditure. Nevertheless it will be the Treasurer's duty to scrutinise the several abstracts of authorities received by him from the several responsible ministers, and should it appear to him that any authority had been issued in violation of the regulations in force for the time being, he will forthwith communicate the particulars of the case to the responsible minister concerned, in order that such responsible minister may immediately take the necessary steps for rectifying the error.

28. Every vote or portion of vote for expenditure for the public service for any year, in respect of which no contract or engagement is entered into during such year, is to finally lapse on the 31st December of such year, and must not be further issued or applied in any subsequent year. The balances reserved to meet any contract or engagement aforesaid will finally lapse on the termination of the year following that in respect of which such contracts or engagements had been incurred. As soon as possible, therefore, after the 31st December of each year, the Treasurer must ascertain and record in the proper books of his office, the several balances which shall have lapsed in consequence of the termination of such year.

29. The quarterly and annual statements of the revenue and expenditure required by the Act 22 Victoria No. 86 are to be prepared and published as soon as possible after the termination of the periods to which they may relate.

30. As soon as possible after the close of each year, and immediately after the public ledger shall have been balanced, and the statement mentioned in clause 46 of the Act 22 Victoria No. 86 shall have been completed, as required by the said Act, the Treasurer is to transmit by letter to the Commissioners of Audit, for the purpose of being audited by them, his daily abstract books, his journal and ledger, together with the statement last before mentioned, and any other books and papers which the Commissioners of Audit may require for the purposes of such audit. The Treasurer, moreover, is to afford every facility in his power, consistent with the convenience of his own department, to the Commissioners of Audit, to enable them to effect a speedy and complete audit of the Treasury accounts.

31. The Treasurer is to afford every facility in his power to the Commissioners of Audit when such Commissioners, or any of them, are engaged or intend to be engaged in inspecting accounts and stores, &c., as required of them by the Act before referred to. The authorities for expenditure for the service of the Audit Department will be obtained by the Treasurer.

32. The Treasurer will be required to prepare and submit for the approval of the Governor in Council any special regulation which it may be advisable to issue to any officer who may be entrusted with duties in respect of which the General Regulations before referred to may be insufficient or inapplicable.

For obtaining a bill for the repeal of bye-law No. 7 of the municipal council of Ballarat.

RESIGNATION, RETIREMENT BY ROTATION, AND RE-ELECTION OF COUNCILLORS.

It having been brought under the notice of the chairman in the month of February, that councillor Sweeney had absented himself from the duties of his office for a longer period than one month, and councillor McCleverty having resigned his seat, an election was held on the 5th March, 1859, when J. Dodds, Esq., was returned in the place of G. McCleverty, Esq., and W. Scott, Esq., in the place of D. Sweeney, Esq.

On the 1st of June, 1859, the following members retired by rotation:—The chairman, R. Belford, Esq., C. Dyte, Esq., and A. Anderson, Esq.; the two first named gentlemen stood for

re-election, who, together with G. Clendinning, Esq., M.D., were returned to the council, the following being the number of votes for each:—

At a meeting of the council held on the 2nd day of June, 1859, Richard Belford, Esq., was re-elected chairman of the council.

MISCELLANEOUS.

Water Supply.—During the last session of Parliament, the council obtained a bill repealing bye-law No. 7 of the municipality of Ballarat. As the subject has been under the consideration of the council from its first formation, and as the council were of opinion that the supply from the Wendouree Swamp was the best and cheapest, they spared neither time nor expense in combating and removing the unjust privilege which had been granted to the sister municipality, and which had been adhered to with a tenacity that ill befitted the justice of the case. Although the bill is not all that the council could have wished, and the present outlay will be considerable, still the fact of having the right of this district acknowledged, and the removal of an alien tax, are of such importance as to cause the community grounds for congratulation. This will be more apparent when it is remembered that under present circumstances, many of the insurance companies have declined to take risks on Ballarat East, and that by the energetic carrying out of the works in connection with a water supply, not only this great evil but others of a sanitary nature will be much modified.

Sludge and drainage difficulty.—At the request of the council and other local bodies, the Government at length consented to appoint a commission for the purpose of investigating the subject, and the best means of abating the nuisance. The council hoped that at last there was a fair prospect of the works being entered upon, but at the very outset difficulties of a monetary character were thrown in way of the commission; the Government refusing to grant more than the sum of Fifty pounds for its expenses, and thus placing the commission in a position that made it impossible for it to make any report. After much delay and several deputations and communications, the Government consented to send up Captain Pasley to report to the commission in conjunction with another engineer, whom they were instructed to engage.

On the arrival of Captain Pasley, a plan was prepared by this council for (in a temporary way) meeting the difficulty, leaving until the ensuing summer the carrying out of the permanent works. To this plan that gentleman gave a partial assent, but made it a condition that the sections should be retaken by the engineer to the commission. In this way, and in defining the claims of the various miners along the course of the channel, much time was consumed, and in the interim the rainy season having set in, the whole of the low-lying portions of the Main road were on three separate occasions flooded, and much damage was done to the property of the residents in that locality; but a greater evil than the destruction of property has resulted from one of these floods, namely, the sacrifice of a human life.

The local commission having performed all the duties intrusted to them with reference to the temporary works, and reported to the Government, there can now be no further cause for delay.

Taking this question from any point of view, it must be deemed one of the very gravest importance, and if not speedily dealt with will entail ruin on many of the inhabitants as well as laying the whole of the community open to the risk of a contagious disease, and with such reasons as these for expedition, we cannot think that any Government will longer refrain from the execution of the necessary works.

Frauds on the council.—Early in the month of May it was discovered by the council that several sums of money had been misappropriated, and it was deemed advisable to suspend the town clerk and engineer, and to appoint competent accountants to examine the books from the formation of the council. Immediately after this proceeding the town clerk absconded, and warrants being obtained for his apprehension he was eventually arrested in New South Wales, when, after a lengthened investigation, he was committed on four distinct charges, three for embezzlement and one for obtaining money under false pretences. On two of the first charges he was tried at the circuit court, and on the first acquitted; but on the second was found guilty and sentenced to five years' hard labor on the roads of the colony, the remaining charges being withdrawn at the suggestion of the legal gentleman for the prosecution.

The other officer who had been suspended by the council was also taken before the Police Bench on two charges, for conspiring with the town clerk to defraud the municipal council, but owing to a want of evidence of any moneys ever having gone into his possession, the cases were dismissed.

After a close and laborious investigation of the accounts, the auditors, in conjunction with a committee appointed from the council, reported that an apparent deficit of £1300 appeared on the face of the books, that this sum was made up of rates and fines handed over to the town clerk, of overdrafts of salary by that officer, and by deficiencies in sums that he obtained as incidental expenses, and petty cash, together with sums alleged to be drawn in favor of certain contracts for public works, but which sums were in excess of contract prices.

The laxity in the supervision of the accounts of the town clerk by the council was mainly attributable to too large an amount of confidence in his integrity, and the fact that on three previous half-years the auditors had certified that his accounts were correct. Although the discovery of the defalcations caused considerable annoyance both to the council and the ratepayers, it is hoped that the lesson of experience will be of such public advantage as to considerably lessen the feeling arising out of such an untoward and unlooked-for occurrence, and that the present loss will be more than counter-balanced by the strict supervision necessarily arising out of the previous state of things.

Donations.—The council have during the past half-year contributed a considerable sum to the Benevolent and Visiting Association, not only for the relief of indigent persons, but also to assist that body in the erection of an institution.

They have also granted a certain sum for the use of the Ballarat Fire Brigade, as that body has been of great service in extinguishing fires within the district.

Public Works.—It will be seen by a reference to the "Works completed" during the half-year, and these at present in progress, that the council are steadily proceeding with the road works under their control. No opportunity has been lost by the council in urging on the Government the carrying out of such works as are necessary for the benefit of the district; and, as much of the feeling of local jealousy which heretofore existed is fast dying out, the council hope that they have before them a future of increased usefulness.

SANDHURST MUNICIPALITY.

SEVENTH HALF-YEARLY REPORT.

REPORT of the proceedings of the Municipal Council of Sandhurst for the half-year ending 10th July, 1859.

PUBLIC WORKS.

The works completed during the past half-year or now in progress, are the formation of portions of Vine street, Lucan street, road over Golden Gully, Raglan street, Oak street continuation, Short street, Sheepwash road, widening High street B, kerbing and channelling in Williamson street, Mitchell street, Plumridge street, Irishtown, Hargreaves street, Lyttleton terrace, Bull street, Short street, and Rowan street; footpaths and drains in Napier street, Mackenzie street, High street, Bridge lane, Upper Wattle street, Forest street; the erection of an engine-house in High street B, the completion of the town hall, raising Plumridge street bridge, additional lamps, fences, with many other minor works, and the general maintenance of existing works, at a total cost of £7331 15s. 6d. A contract has been made for the excavation of a reservoir on the water reserve in Bridge street without expense to the municipality.

BYE-LAW PASSED.

No. 19.—For the further regulation of Sandhurst Market.

No. 20.—For the suppression of nuisances.

FINANCE.

The sum of £3780 10s. 7d. has been received from the Government as an instalment of the grant-in-aid. In February it was deemed advisable to allow the market inspector an additional sum of £150 per annum for the employment of a second assistant, and prevent evasion of market dues and tolls, which amount for the half-year to £1031 4s. 2d. against £642 collected last half-year.

ELECTIONS.

At the commencement of the current municipal year, Messrs. McIntyre, Simons, and Strickland, were elected councillors, in the room of the three members retiring by rotation, and councillor W. Vazie Simons was re-elected chairman of the council. In May, councillor Neale resigned, and on 17th June, 1859, councillor T. Carpenter was elected in his place by polled votes.

Mr. J. W. Townsend has been appointed rate collector, *vice* Mr. James Jamieson, resigned; and Mr. George Jarman has been elected town inspector and inspector under the local board of health, *vice* Mr. Townsend, resigned.

MISCELLANEOUS.

In consequence of the suspension of the Municipal Court of Petty Sessions by the Government in February, it was deemed advisable to send the chairman as a deputation to the Government on the subject, and the court was re-established at the new town hall. After many repeated applications, the Government has established a pound in the district.

The council have decided on the establishment of a public cattle market, and an application has been made for land for a site; on this being granted, immediate steps will be taken to make it available.

In aid of local public institutions £50 has been voted to the Sandhurst fire brigade, £100 to the Mechanics' Institute, and an annual subscription of £200 to the Bendigo Benevolent Asylum, the latter sum, however, has not been yet applied for. At the urgent request of many parties, the council have allowed miners to work on Fall Mall, which permission, although productive of some expense to the ratepayers, will set at rest the question of the auriferous nature of the ground, and prevent any wish to interfere with it when made more presentable in appearance than at present.

Two fire bells have been ordered from England. Many applications have been made to the Government in furtherance of the interest of the town:—The construction of Mount Korong road in View place, raising High street at the foot of Forest street, Police station at the Back Creek, and others, have been acceded to; the substitution of a new bridge for the old King's Bridge, forming McIvor road, straightening High street (A), and others, have been deferred.

The continued absence of regulations for maintenance of the main sludge channels has compelled the council to continue the heavy weekly expenditure in drainage works alluded to in last year's report, and no money being received from the Government during the half-year, at its termination the council had a claim for moneys expended amounting to £4576. A deputation was sent to town on the subject, and the sum of £2202 has been repaid, but the balance cannot be recovered without a special vote for the purpose. It is, however, understood that no difficulty will in future arise in obtaining payment for maintenance monthly, until the new sludge channel now about being constructed is available. The sludge maintenance account does not appear in the balance sheet, as the council have always kept it separate and distinct from the municipal funds.
