PLEASANT CREEK GAOL.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, passed in the sixteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act to make provision for the better control and disposal of Offenders*, it was amongst other things enacted, that all buildings, erections, houses, and premises thereafter to be erected, built, purchased, enlarged, or maintained at the public expense, as and for public gaols, prisons, houses of correction, and penal establishments within the said colony, which should from time to time be proclaimed by the Lieutenant Governor of the said colony, by notice in the *Government Gazette*, as such public gaols, prisons, houses of correction, or penal establishments, should, from and after the publication of such notice, be severally deemed and taken to be the public gaols, prisons,

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houses of correction, and penal establishments respectively of the place or district where the same are or shall be situated within the said colony, and should be subject to the several provisions made for the regulation, discipline, management, and care of the public gaols, prisons, houses of correction, and penal establishments already erected in the said colony, and of the prisoners confined within the same: And whereas a certain building originally constructed as a lock-up for police purposes has been recently removed from its late site and re-erected in the locality known as "Commercial street," Pleasant Creek, and it is expedient to proclaim the same in accordance with the said Act: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the building situate in Commercial street, Pleasant Creek, to be the gaol, prison, and house of correction, of Pleasant Creek aforesaid, for the purposes and within the meaning of the said Act.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this third day of October, in the year of Our Lord One thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, and in the twenty-third year of Her Majesty's Reign.

MUNICIPALITY OF ARARAT.

BYE-LAW No. 14.—TO REGULATE THE CONDUCTING OF THE ELECTION OF MEMBERS OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF ARARAT.

WHEREAS by an Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is enacted, that it shall be competent for the council of any municipal district to make bye-laws for the regulation of their own proceedings, the conducting of elections, determining the validity of disputed elections, conducting of public meetings of ratepayers, &c. &c.: Be it therefore enacted by the Ararat municipal council, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor of Victoria:—

1. That all elections of councillors for the municipal district of Ararat shall be conducted by ballot.

2. That at all public meetings of ratepayers convened by the council or chairman for the election of councillors, the chairman, or in his absence the senior municipal councillor then present, shall preside, and in case of an equality of votes shall have a casting vote.

3. If at any election the chairman of the municipal council shall be a candidate for re-election, or shall be incapacitated from presiding at such election, either by illness, absence from the district, or any other cause, it shall be competent for the remaining members of the municipal council (being a quorum) to appoint some one of themselves to act as chairman for the purpose of carrying out such election. And it shall also be lawful for the chairman to appoint under his hand such and so many persons as to the council may seem fit to act as deputy chairmen and poll clerks, and to appoint such and so many places within the municipal district as may appear necessary to the council to be the polling places.

4. If at any election a poll shall be demanded in the manner and form required by the said Act, the chairman shall cause to be provided at the polling place or places a sufficient number of stalls or compartments, to be provided with ink and pens or pencils for the purpose of enabling the electors to secretly mark the ballot papers as hereinafter provided.

5. No person other than the chairman, deputy chairman, town clerk, poll clerk or clerks, the scrutineers, and the electors who shall for the time being be tendering their votes, shall be entitled to be, or be at, the polling side of the barrier; and any person other than such persons as aforesaid who shall intrude in such part of the room during the continuance of such poll, and being requested by the presiding chairman to withdraw, shall refuse so to do, shall on conviction thereof before two or more justices of the peace forfeit and pay a sum or penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds; provided always that it shall be lawful for the chairman or deputy chairman to summon to his assistance any member or members of the police force for the purpose of preserving the public peace, quelling any breach thereof that may have arisen, or for removing from within such barrier, or from the polling room, any person or persons who may in his opinion be obstructing the polling, or wilfully violating any of the provisions of this bye-law or of the said Act.

6. The chairman shall cause to be printed and stamped with the municipal seal a sufficient number of voting papers in the form annexed, which he shall have in his own custody, and shall deliver to each deputy chairman such number thereof as shall be sufficient for the number of ratepayers likely to poll at such polling place, taking a receipt for the exact number so delivered, and the chairman or deputy chairman shall write his initials on the back of every voting paper before it shall be delivered to each ratepayer to vote.

7. At every election it shall be the duty of the town clerk or his deputy to provide himself with the ratepayers' roll, and as each elector comes forward to demand his voting paper, to see whether the name of such elector appears on the roll as a ratepayer within the meaning of the said Act, and as each elector deposits his voting paper in the ballot box, to mark the name of such elector as having voted at such election.

8. Each candidate shall be entitled to appoint by writing under his own hand, to be delivered to the chairman at any time before the commencement of the polling, one scrutineer on his own behalf in each polling room.

9. It shall be lawful for the presiding chairman to put to any person before he shall receive his voting paper the following questions only, viz.:—

1. What is your christian and surname?
2. Are you of the age of twenty-one years?
3. Are you the person whose name appears on the ratepayers' roll numbered ?
4. Have you already voted at this election?

And if any person shall wilfully give a false answer to any of the questions aforesaid, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence within the meaning of this bye-law, and being convicted thereof before two or more justices of the peace shall forfeit and pay a sum or penalty not exceeding Fifty pounds.

10. In case any candidate or ratepayer shall to any person tendering his vote as provided by the 20th section of the said Act, or in case the voting paper as of any person shall have been received, and any other person shall afterwards demand his voting paper as of the same person, the chairman or his deputy, when such person shall propose to deposit his voting paper in the ballot box, shall refuse to allow the same to be put therein, but shall receive and keep the same apart, and at the close of the election decide whether such person has already voted or

not; and for the purpose of such decision it shall be lawful for the chairman of the council to take evidence upon oath or affirmation, and such decision shall be final and conclusive on all parties; and if it shall appear to the chairman that such elector has not already voted, such vote shall be added to the numbers already polled, but if otherwise such vote shall not be allowed.

11. The chairman in each polling room shall be provided with a locked box, of which he shall keep the key, with a cleft or opening in such box capable of receiving the voting papers, which box shall stand on the table at which the chairman, with the poll clerks and scrutineers shall preside; and each elector shall receive a voting paper in the form set forth in the schedule hereunto annexed, and shall thereupon retire alone to a stall or compartment provided for that purpose, and there strike out the name or names of such candidates as he does not intend to vote for, and deposit the same in the ballot box, folded so that the name or names of the candidates shall be unseen, in the presence of the chairman; and in case any elector shall be unable to read, or be blind, he shall signify the same to the chairman, who shall thereupon strike out the names of such candidates as such elector shall designate. And no elector shall take out of the polling room any such voting paper, either before or after he has marked the same. And any person wilfully infringing any of the provisions of this clause, or obstructing the polling by unnecessary delay in performing any act within the polling room, shall be deemed guilty of an offence within the meaning of this bye-law, and on being convicted thereof before any two or more justices of the peace, shall forfeit and pay a sum or penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds (£20).

12. Every elector may vote for any number of candidates not exceeding the number of members to be chosen, and any ballot paper recording a greater number of votes shall be absolutely rejected at the close of the poll.

13. At the close of the poll the deputy chairman or chairmen shall bring the box or boxes containing the ballot papers polled at his or their booth or booths to the chairman, who shall as soon after as may be, in the presence of the poll clerks and scrutineers then present, count the number of the votes polled for each candidate. And in the event of the number of the votes being found to be equal for any two or more candidates, one or more of whom, but not all of such candidates, being by the state of the poll entitled to be declared elected, the chairman shall, by a casting vote or votes, as the case may be, decide which of the candidates for whom the votes may be equal shall be elected. And the chairman shall then, in the presence of the scrutineers, seal up all the voting papers given out during the poll, together with a copy or copies of the ratepayers' roll used for marking off the voters' names; and the town clerk shall safely preserve them for at least six months amongst the records of the council.

14. Any person personating or attempting to personate any elector or deceased elector, or who shall vote a second time on the same day, shall on conviction thereof before two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay a sum or penalty not exceeding Fifty pounds (£50).

15. Neither the chairman, deputy chairman, poll clerk, nor scrutineers, nor any other person, shall attempt to ascertain for whom any elector shall have voted, except as provided by clause 11 of this bye-law; nor shall divulge the name or names of the candidate or candidates for whom such person shall have voted, except when required to do so by any court having competent jurisdiction, nor directly nor indirectly aid in discovery of the same. Any breach of this clause shall subject the party so offending, on conviction thereof before two or more justices of the peace, to forfeit and pay a sum or penalty not exceeding Fifty pounds (£50).

16. All places within which polling is conducted shall be deemed to be public places.

17. All expenses incurred by the chairman of the council in carrying into effect this bye-law shall be paid and discharged by the municipal council out of the rates or other corporate funds.

SCHEDULE.

The voter is to strike out the name or names of the candidate or candidates for whom he does not intend to vote, by drawing a line through the same with a pen or pencil.

He must be careful not to leave uncancelled more names than are capable of being returned at this election, otherwise his ballot paper will be invalid.

The ballot paper so marked is to be dropped into the ballot box.

The voter is not permitted to take his ballot paper out of the polling booth.

BYE-LAW No. 15.—FOR DETERMINING THE VALIDITY OF DISPUTED ELECTIONS, AND REGULATING THE PROCEEDINGS AT THE ELECTION OF CHAIRMAN.

WHEREAS it has been deemed expedient by the Ararat municipal council in the exercise and execution of the powers given them by an Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, to make a bye-law for the determining of the validity of disputed

elections, and for the election of chairman: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council of Ararat—

1. That for determining the validity of disputed elections, the whole council (the member or members whose election is disputed excepted) shall be a committee of elections and qualifications, three to form a quorum, at which the chairman of the council, or, if absent at the commencement of the proceedings, the senior councillor shall preside, and in all cases of equality of votes shall have a casting vote.

2. The committee shall meet in the council chambers on days not appointed for the holding of council meetings, and be attended by the town clerk, who shall record the minutes of such meetings.

3. The chairman, of his own authority, may, or, on the written request of three members of council to that effect, shall convene meetings of committees of election, &c.

4. The committee shall have power to regulate their proceedings, and to adjourn their meetings, which shall be held with open doors, unless during special deliberations.

5. Each member of committee present shall be required to vote.

6. The ratepayers' roll shall be assumed to be correct, and the committee shall enquire into the identity of the electors, their retention of qualification, and whether the votes were *bona fide*. If proved to the satisfaction of the committee that persons by fraud, force, menace, or any undue influence by or on the part of any candidate, or his agents, committee-men, or partisans, or any of them, gave or were prevented from giving their votes, such votes shall be struck off or recorded, as the case may be established.

7. The acts of authorised agents shall be regarded as those of the principal, if it be proved to the satisfaction of the committee that they were performed with his knowledge, power, or consent.

8. The person determined by the committee to be duly elected shall be declared so to be by the chairman.

9. All petitions against the validity of any election must be signed by a candidate, or by not less than six ratepayers, and be presented to the council within twenty-one days after the election complained of.

10. Ratepayers may be admitted to defend the election or support the petition, if it be abandoned by the person or persons originally presenting it.

11. Written declarations of vacancies in council, resulting from disqualification by absence or otherwise, may be made by the chairman and one or more councillors, countersigned by the town clerk.

12. Resignation of membership of council shall be made in writing, addressed to the chairman of the council, and be presented by him to the council at the next meeting thereafter for their ordering on the same.

13. The chairman of the council shall be annually elected by ballot (it being obligatory upon every member of council present to vote), if the whole council be present, otherwise, after one hour the chairman shall announce the name of each councillor voted for, the number of such votes, and declare the name of the one who has a majority of votes to be duly elected chairman of the council for the ensuing municipal year, who shall take the chair accordingly.

14. If the result of voting for chairman should be that the highest number of votes is held by two or more councillors, then another voting shall take place for those councillors only holding such equality of votes until a majority is recorded, the chairman giving a casting vote in addition to his own in case of an equality of votes on the third division.

15. Upon the resignation or disqualification of the chairman of the council, at the next meeting of the council thereafter the senior councillor then present shall take the chair *pro tem.*, and immediately after the confirmation of the minutes of the preceding meeting shall proceed to the election of a chairman of the council for the residue of the municipal year in manner prescribed by this bye-law, and in the event of an equality of votes being recorded shall have a casting vote in addition to his own.

16. In determining the seniority of councillors for the purposes of this bye-law, or for the purposes of bye-law No. 14, it shall be understood to mean those councillors who shall have held office for the longest period without re-election, and have had the greatest number of votes when elected.

BYE-LAW No. 3.—FOR REGULATING THE SECURITY OF BUILDINGS IN WHICH PUBLIC MEETINGS ARE HELD AND PUBLIC AMUSEMENTS CONDUCTED.

WHEREAS by Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 19, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is enacted that it shall be competent for the council of any municipal district to prepare bye-laws for the good government of such municipal district: Be it therefore enacted, that from and after the date hereof the municipal council of Fitz Roy shall appoint, from time to time, such person or persons as they may deem fit for the purpose of inspecting and certifying regarding the security of any buildings within the municipal district in which public meetings are held or public amusements conducted; further, be it enacted that all proprietors, lessees, tenants, or agents, of or for any building, of whatsoever description, shall, previous to permitting any public meeting or assembly being held therein, apply annually to the said council, in writing, for a license, in form according to Schedule A, hereto attached. And any person or persons permitting any public meeting or assembly to be holden within premises of which he is the ostensible proprietor, lessee, tenant, or agent, without having obtained a license as aforesaid, or refusing to admit and render every assistance to such person or persons as the council may appoint to inspect his or their premises, shall be deemed guilty of an infringement of this bye-law, and shall, on conviction thereof before two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds.

BYE-LAW No. 5.—FOR THE CONDUCTING OF PUBLIC MEETINGS OF THE RATEPAYERS, AND OF ELECTION OF MEMBERS OF COUNCIL.

ALL public meetings of the ratepayers convened by the council or chairman, for the election of councillors or other municipal business, the chairman, or in his absence, the senior councillor then present, shall preside, and in case of an equality of votes shall have the casting vote.

2. If at any election the chairman of the municipal council for the time being shall be a candidate for re-election, or shall be incapacitated from presiding at such election from any other cause whatsoever, it shall be competent for the remaining members of the council (being a quorum) to appoint some one of themselves to act as chairman for the purpose of carrying out such election.

3. If at any election a poll shall be demanded in the form required by the 19th section of 18 Victoria No. 15, the chairman shall cause to be provided at the polling place a sufficient number of stalls or compartments, together with ink and pens, for the purpose of enabling the electors to mark the voting papers as hereinafter provided, in which polling place no person other than the chairman, the town clerk or his deputy, scrutineers, and electors who shall for the time being be tendering their votes, shall be entitled to be present. And any other person than such chairman, town clerk, or his deputy, scrutineers, and electors, who shall for the time being be tendering their votes, who shall intrude behind the barrier, and upon being required to withdraw by the chairman shall refuse to do so, shall be deemed guilty of an offence within the provisions of this bye-law; provided always that it shall be lawful for the chairman, town clerk or his deputy, to summon to his assistance in any such room or compartment any member or members of the police force for the purpose of preserving the public peace, quelling any breach thereof that may have arisen, and for removing out of such room any person or persons who may in his opinion be obstructing the polling, or wilfully violating any of the provisions of this bye-law, and upon being convicted thereof before two or more justices of the peace, shall forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds.

4. The chairman, in the polling place, shall cause to be provided, for the purpose of such election, a locked-up box, of which he shall keep the key, with a cleft or opening therein capable of receiving the voting papers, which box shall stand in front of the chairman; and each elector shall receive from the chairman a voting paper in the form in the schedule hereunto annexed, and shall thereupon retire to a stall or compartment provided for that purpose, and there strike out the name or names of such candidate or candidates as he does not intend to vote for, and then deposit the same in the ballot-box in the presence of the chairman, town clerk or his deputy, and scrutineers; and in case such elector shall be unable to read, he shall signify the same to the chairman, who shall thereupon strike out the name or names of such candidate or candidates as such elector shall designate; and no elector shall take out of such polling place any such voting paper, either before or after he has marked the same; and any person wilfully infringing any of the provisions of this clause, or obstructing the polling by any unnecessary delay in performing any act within the polling place, shall be deemed guilty of an offence within the meaning of this bye-law, and on being convicted thereof before two or more justices of the peace shall forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds.

5. Each candidate shall be entitled to appoint by writing under his hand, to be delivered to the chairman any time before Eight o'clock in the morning of the polling day, one scrutineer to be present on his behalf in the polling room.

6. It shall be lawful for the chairman *per se*, or at the request of any scrutineer, to put to any person before he shall have received his voting paper the following questions only.

1. What is your name and surname?
2. Are you of twenty-one years of age?
3. Are you a ratepayer on the ratepayers' roll of this municipality?
4. Have you paid all rates levied upon you, except such as shall have become payable by you within six months before this election?
5. Have you already voted at this election?

And if any person shall wilfully give a false answer to any of the questions aforesaid, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence within the meaning of this bye-law, and upon being convicted thereof before two or more justices of the peace, shall forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds.

7. At every election it shall be the duty of the town clerk or his deputy to provide himself with the ratepayers' roll, and as each elector comes forward to demand his voting paper, to see whether the name of such elector appears on the ratepayers' roll as a ratepayer within the meaning of the said Act, and as such elector deposits his voting paper within the ballot box, to mark off such elector's name as having voted at such election.

8. In case the voting paper as of any person shall have been received, and any other person shall afterwards demand his voting paper as of the same person, the chairman, when such person shall propose to deposit his voting paper in the ballot box, shall refuse the same to be put therein, but shall receive and keep the same apart, and at the close of the election decide whether such person is entitled to vote at such election, and whether such person has already voted or not; and for the

purpose of such decision it shall be lawful for the chairman to take evidence upon oath or affirmation, and such decision shall be final and conclusive on all parties. And if it shall appear to the chairman that such person is entitled to vote at such election, and has not already voted, such vote shall be added to the number already polled, but if otherwise such vote shall not be allowed.

9. At the close of the poll, or as soon after as conveniently may be, the chairman, in the presence of the scrutineers, shall count the number of votes polled for each candidate, and if on the state of the poll being announced the number of votes shall have been found to have been equal for any two or more candidates, one or more of whom, but not all, shall, by the state of the poll and the number of members to be elected, be entitled to be declared elected, the chairman shall, by a casting vote or votes, as the case may be, decide which of the candidates for whom the votes may be equal shall be elected; but no chairman shall be entitled to vote at any election except in case of an equality of votes. And the chairman shall then, in the presence of the scrutineers, seal up all the voting papers given during the election, and safely preserve them amongst the records of the council until next election.

10. In determining the seniority of councillors for the purposes of this bye-law, it shall be understood to mean those councillors who shall have held office for the longest period without re-election, and having the greatest number of votes when elected.
