HARCOURT.**

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of
the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General
and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-
Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament
held in the twentieth year of the reign of Her present
Majesty, intitled, *An Act to amend the laws relative to the
vendling of fermented and spirituous liquors*, it was amongst
other things enacted, that it should be lawful for the Governor,
with the advice of the Executive Council, by Proclamation, to
declare any city, town, district, or place in Victoria, a city,
town, district, or place wherein premises for the sale of spirits
or fermented liquors, in quantities not less than two gallons,
might be registered under the authority of the Acts mentioned
in the first schedule to the said Act annexed: And whereas it
is deemed expedient to declare the town hereinafter defined to
be a district for the purpose and within the meaning of the
above recited Act: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, with
the advice of the Executive Council, do by this my Proclama-
tion declare that the town hereinafter named and defined

shall be a town wherein premises for the sale of spirits or fermented liquors in quantities not less than two gallons may be registered under the authority of the Acts mentioned in the first schedule to the above recited Act, that is to say:—

HARCOURT TOWNSHIP RESERVE:—Commencing at the south-western angle of portion 27 of section 4, in the parish of Harcourt; thence north one hundred and sixty chains; thence west eighty chains; thence south one hundred and sixty chains; and thence east eighty chains to the commencing point.

THE USE OF FISHING NETS IN A PORTION OF THE RIVER BARWON, PROHIBITED.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency **SIR HENRY BARKLY**, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the twenty-second year of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled, *An Act for the preservation of Fish in the lakes and rivers of the colony of Victoria*, it was amongst other things enacted, that if any person shall set, lay down, use, or fish with any kind of net in the *Yarra Yarra, Plenty or Saltwater Rivers*, in the said colony, or in any or either of their respective tributaries, or in any other river, lake, creek, stream, or pond, to which the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, should by Proclamation duly published in the *Government Gazette*, extend the provisions of the now-reciting clause, he shall forfeit such net, and also such sum not exceeding Ten pounds as the convicting justice shall think fit: Now I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, do, with the advice of the Executive Council, by this my Proclamation, extend the provisions of the above recited clause of the said Act to the portion of the River Barwon flowing between Buckley's Falls and the mouth of the same river.

MUNICIPALITY OF EMERALD HILL.

BYE-LAW No. 23.—A BYE-LAW FOR REGULATING THE ERECTION OF AWNINGS OVER THE PUBLIC FOOTPATHS WITHIN THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF EMERALD HILL.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of Victoria, 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is provided, that the council of any municipal district established under the provisions of the said Act shall have the care and management of the roads, public streets, and public thoroughfares, and shall and may make such bye-laws for carrying out these objects as shall to such council seem fit: And whereas it is expedient that a bye-law should be made for preventing the dangers and nuisances arising from the improper construction of awnings, shades, and other obstructions over the public footways within the municipal district of Emerald Hill: And whereas by a Proclamation of His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, dated the 26th day of May, 1855, the district of Emerald Hill was duly established a municipal district under the provisions and within the meaning of the said Act: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council for the district of Emerald Hill, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor-in-Chief of the colony of Victoria, as required by the provisions of the said Act:—

1. That any person or persons who shall erect or cause to be erected any shade, awning, or other obstruction over, upon, or across any public footpath within the said municipal district, without having first obtained in writing the consent of the town council, or town surveyor of the said municipal district, to such erection, shall, on conviction thereof before two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay for every such offence a sum not exceeding Five pounds (£5).

2. And be it further ordered and directed by the said municipal council, that every such shade, awning, or obstruction, when such consent to the erection of the same shall have been obtained as aforesaid, shall be constructed with the upright posts or pillars thereof at a distance of ten (10) feet from the surveyed building line, and that the plate, rafter, tie, or other

transverse portion of any such shade, awning, or obstruction, shall not be at a less height above the surface of such footpaths than seven (7) feet six (6) inches in the clear to the underside of such plate, rafter, tie, or other transverse portion.

3. And be it further ordered and directed, that it shall be lawful for the said municipal council to require the removal of any shade, awning, or other obstruction erected across, over or upon, any footpath of the said municipal district, except the same be in strict accordance with the plan and specification prepared by the town surveyor as aforesaid, and adopted by the said municipal council: Whether such shade, awning, or obstruction, shall have been erected prior to the date of the bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor, or subsequently thereto. And it shall further be lawful for the said municipal council, by their officer, to give notice to any owner or occupier by whom or for whom such shade, awning, or obstruction shall have been erected to remove the same, and any such owner or occupier who shall neglect or refuse to remove any such shade, awning, or obstruction within forty-eight (48) hours from the time of such notice of removal being given, shall on conviction thereof before two or more justices of the peace forfeit and pay for every such offence, neglect, or refusal, a sum not exceeding Ten (£10) pounds.

4. And it shall further be lawful for the said municipal council to require that every such shade, awning, or obstruction so erected shall be kept in good and efficient repair at all times, and any owner or occupier by whom or for whom such shade, awning, or obstruction shall have been erected, who shall neglect or refuse to repair, paint, or clean any such shade, awning, or obstruction within seven (7) days from the time of being required to do so by the authority aforesaid, and in the manner directed, shall on conviction thereof before two or more justices of the peace forfeit and pay for every such neglect or refusal a sum not exceeding Five (£5) pounds.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 23, made by the municipal council of Emerald Hill, has been assented to by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council. Gazetted on the 21st day of October, 1859, pursuant to 18 Victoria No. 15, sec. 33.

MUNICIPALITY OF FITZ ROY.

BYE-LAW No. 7.—FOR EMPOWERING THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL TO GRANT, REFUSE, OR SUSPEND CERTIFICATES OF REGISTRATION FOR PUBLIC PLACES OF AMUSEMENT.

WHEREAS by Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is enacted, that it shall be competent for the council of any municipal district to make bye-laws for the general good rule and government of such municipal district: Be it therefore enacted, that from and after the date hereof, every proprietor of any public place of amusement, to wit, skittle ground, bowling alley, shooting alley, premises used for concerts or balls, assembly room, theatre, or any other place where amusements of any description whatsoever are conducted, and to which the public have access, shall apply each year during the months of January and July to the municipal council for registration of such grounds or premises: And it shall be lawful for the said municipal council to grant or refuse such certificate of registration, or temporarily suspend the same for any period during which it may be granted, or strike off the registration book the name of any holder of said certificate; and further, the municipal council are hereby empowered to authorise their inspector, or any other officer, to visit the grounds or premises registered by the municipal council during any time he may think proper, and should such officer be refused admittance, such refusal shall be considered a breach of this bye-law: And any person neglecting or refusing to comply with the provisions of this bye-law by opening any such place of amusement as aforesaid without having first obtained the consent of the municipal council, and having obtained also a certificate of registration as set forth in schedule A attached, or keeping such place of amusement open after notice has been served upon him that his name has been struck off the registration book, or keeping such house or place open beyond the hours which shall from time to time be appointed by the municipal council, shall, on conviction thereof before two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds, as enacted by the 35th section of 18 Victoria No. 15.

CRESWICK DISTRICT ROAD BOARD.

BYE-LAW No. 1.—STANDING RULES AND ORDERS.

THE business of the board shall be conducted on all occasions with open doors.

2. The board shall commence business so soon after the time appointed as there is a sufficient number of members in attendance to constitute a quorum; but, should a quorum not be present at the expiration of half an hour after the said time appointed for meeting, the same shall be entered in the minute book, with a note of the members present, and such meeting shall lapse.

3. That special meetings shall be summoned at any time by the chairman upon receiving a written requisition signed by three members, stating the matter to be discussed at such meeting.

4. That the first business at all the meetings of the board shall be the reading of the minutes of the preceding meeting in order to their confirmation, and that no discussion be allowed thereon except as to their accuracy.

5. The reading of correspondence, presentation of petitions by members, and bringing up reports, shall have precedence of the regular business at all the meetings of this board.

6. Every communication addressed to the board shall be in proper form, and presented by one of its members, who shall be responsible for its being respectfully worded.

7. The orders of the day shall include all matters arising out of proceedings of former meetings of the board, and any business which the chairman may think fit to bring under the notice of the board.

8. Notices of motion shall be given in writing to the Secretary of the board one week previous to the making of the same, and all such notices shall be considered in the order in which they were given.

9. No notice shall be proceeded with unless the member who gave notice of it, or some other member authorised by him, be present when the business is called on, and notices not so proceeded with, shall be struck out.

10. No bye-law shall be finally passed or adopted at the meeting at which it shall have been first proposed, nor until the next meeting of the board regularly convened, and every such bye-law shall in the interim remain open for the inspection of any of the ratepayers in the office of the board free of charge.

11. No motion proposing any petition, address, bye-law, or standing order, shall be entertained unless the mover shall submit therewith a draft of such petition, address, bye-law, or standing order, and the draft so submitted shall in no case be taken into consideration until it shall have been referred to the legislative committee, who shall report thereon, and the mover of every such proposition shall be *pro hac vice* a member of such committee.

12. That no payment of any account whatever be made unless it shall be first approved and ordered to be paid by the board.

13. That the treasurer shall at every meeting lay before the board a statement of all moneys that have been paid into his hands since the previous meeting of the board, together with the deposit receipts, and also the bank book as often as required.

14. That the collectors shall not in any case distrain without the order of the board.

15. Any member, on proposing a motion or amendment, or speaking on any matter, must rise and address the chairman. No member when speaking shall be interrupted, unless called to order, when he shall sit down, in which case the member calling to order shall be heard thereon in preference to any other, and the question of order shall be disposed of by the chairman before the subject is resumed, or any other matter entered upon. The chairman, when called upon to decide a point of order or practice shall state his opinion upon the subject, and shall, if necessary, take the sense of the meeting thereupon; the decision of a majority in such case shall be final.

16. No member shall speak twice on the same motion or amendment, except in the way of explanation, or in reply upon any original motion of which he may have been the mover, or as the mover of the amendment last proposed; and the chairman shall, without waiting for the interposition of the board, call to order any member proceeding to speak a second time on the same motion or amendment. After the reply, the amendment, or the original motion, as the case may be, shall be immediately put to the vote.

17. Any member moving or seconding any motion or amendment shall be held to have spoken on that motion or amendment.

18. Any member making a motion or amendment shall put it in form, sign it, and deliver it to the secretary, who shall add the name of the seconder, and no motion or amendment shall be withdrawn without leave of this board.

19. No member shall digress from the subject matter of the question under discussion, or impute improper motives to others; and all personal reflections upon any member shall be considered as highly disorderly, and the member making use of such offensive expressions shall make any apology if required by the board to do so.

20. No motion, the effect of which, if carried, would be to rescind any motion which has already passed the board, shall

be entertained during the current year, unless a call of the whole board has been duly made for that purpose; and no such motion for rescinding any resolution of the board which shall have been negatived by the board shall be again entertained during the current year.

21. No election to any office shall take place until six clear days public notice shall have been given by advertisement in the local newspaper, inviting applications from persons properly qualified.

22. No member or officer of the board shall be allowed to tender for any work to be done for or in connection with this board, or be received as surety for any contractor for such work.

23. Any member may require the secretary to take down any particular words used by a member, immediately upon the same being used.

24. Any member may of right require the production of any of the documents of the board relating to the question or matter under discussion.

25. The board shall vote in all cases by a show of hands.

26. Upon the adoption of any amendment by the board, such amendment shall be held to have quashed the original motion; and for all purposes of subsequent discussion the amendment so carried shall be acted upon as the original motion.

27. The chairman shall, in taking the vote on any motion or amendment, put the question first in the affirmative and then in the negative, and he may do so as often as is necessary to enable him to form and declare his opinion from the show of hands as to which party has the majority.

28. One amendment only shall be discussed at one time, but if lost, another may be put before the original motion is put to the vote, but upon any amendment being carried it shall be competent for any member to move one other amendment thereon, but not more.

29. No discussion shall be allowed on any motion for an adjournment of the board, but if on the question being put the motion be negatived, the question then under consideration or the next on the notice paper shall be discussed, or any other that may be allowed precedence before any subsequent motion for adjournment shall be entertained; but if the motion for adjournment be carried, the business then undisposed of shall have precedence at the next meeting of the board.

30. That any member absenting himself three consecutive meetings of the board shall be fined in a penalty at the discretion of the chairman not exceeding Five pounds, and in default of immediate payment, shall be sued before two or more justices of the peace for the recovery of the same, unless the said member can produce satisfactory reasons to the board stating that his absence was caused by sickness or other reasons which the board may accept as apology.

31. Any member of the board may enter his protest against any resolution of this board, providing that such protest is not inconsistent with truth or disrespectful to the board. Notice of intention to protest must, however, in every case be given on the adoption of the resolution protested against; and the protest, signed by the member or members protesting, specifying the reason for protesting, must be entered before the next regular meeting of the board by the protesting member in a book to be kept for that purpose in the secretary's office, and duly referred to in the minutes of the board, the same to be considered as a part of such minutes.

32. All contracts shall be made by tender, advertised not less than three times in one of the local daily newspapers, or once in the weekly paper, each tender shall be addressed to the chairman, such tender only to be opened at the time of their consideration by the board, and which tenders shall be so considered and dealt with at the next meeting of the board which shall happen after the said tenders are required to be sent in, and when tenders are accepted a contract bond shall be entered into, signed by the contractor and his surety or sureties and by the chairman of the board, and the expense of preparing such bond shall in all cases be borne by the person or persons giving the same.

33. All moneys raised by the infliction of fines shall be handed over to the treasurer to be applied to such charitable institution as the board may think proper.

At stations where oats and bran cannot readily be procured, the tenders may be for hay or straw only; when all the supplies are included in one tender, it will, if advisable, be accepted for hay or straw, and not for the other articles.

No tender will be entertained unless accompanied by a certificate from two responsible persons that they are willing to become bound as sureties for the due fulfilment of the contract in one-third the estimated cost of the entire supply at the station tendered for; and in the event of the tender being accepted, the bond must be executed within twenty days, failing which the contract may be again advertised or another tender accepted. No bond will be required if the whole supply in value will not amount to £150.

The names and addresses of the tenderers, and of their proposed sureties, must be stated at full length.

All tenders must be enclosed in a separate envelope, marked "Tender for ——" (as the case may be), and deposited in the Tender Box at the Government Stores, King street, or if sent by post they must be addressed to the Government Storekeeper, Melbourne.

CONDITIONS.

1. The hay to be eaten, good, sound, and sweet; the straw to be wheaten, and both to be in all respects of the best quality; oats and bran also to be sound and sweet and of the best description.

2. The supplies to be delivered on the requisition of the officer in charge of the district or station, the quantities stated in the schedule being, however, only approximative, and it must be understood that the Government will draw either more or less than stated. The excess over the estimate will, however, in no case exceed 50 per cent.

3. The contracts entered into under this notice are not to be considered as being infringed or vitiated by any contracts made by the military commissariat.

4. The forage when delivered must be accompanied by an invoice of quantity, showing the gross weight, the tare, and the net weight (this should be on the back of the requisition or order), which, when signed by the officer in charge of the station for the net quantity received, will be returned to the contractor, and by him rendered in support of his account.

5. Each contractor will be required to prepare his own account, monthly, in the prescribed form, and on presentation thereof to the officer in charge of the station or district, it will be forwarded for payment at the Government Stores, Melbourne, or the Treasury Pay Office of the district, as may be indicated on the account.

6. Should forage duly ordered under these contracts not be delivered within forty-eight hours from a reasonable time to be fixed on the order, it will be competent for the department, should circumstances require it, to purchase the same at the risk of the contractor from whose account any expense over and above the contract price is to be deducted.

7. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the forage, as to quality of the same, it is to be decided by a Board of Survey, composed of persons named by the head of a department, and the decision of the board is to be considered final.

8. If the board shall decide that the forage is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra cost, if any, will be charged as in clause 6.

9. When a board of survey cannot be conveniently assembled, or when from some other cause injury would accrue either to the public service or to the contractor by waiting for a board of survey, the officer in charge will have the power to reject such supplies as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and the contractor must take back the rejected forage and supply good in its stead, failing which it will be obtained by the officer requiring it, and the expense will be charged as in clause 6.

10. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the forage, or of delay in delivering or replacing it when required, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Government Storekeeper, to such mulct, not exceeding one-fourth of the monthly account, as the Government may direct. It will also be in the power of the Government, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract forthwith.

11. It will be competent for the Government Storekeeper on behalf of the Government, or for the contractor on his own behalf, to terminate the contract by giving in writing a notice of three full calendar months to that effect, it being understood that such notice can only be given from the first day of a month, and provided that no such notice can be given before the 30th April, 1860.
