LAND RESERVED AT CHEWTON.

HIS Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has, in exercise of the power in him vested in this behalf, reserved the piece or portion of land hereinafter described, situate in the parish of Chewton, for railway purposes, viz. :—

The reserve is situate in the parish of Chewton, and is along the course of the line of railway from the eastern boundary of the parish of Castlemaine to a point thirty-four chains more or less west of the western boundary of the town of Elphinstone.

The minimum breadth of the said reserve is two chains and eighty links more or less, and the maximum breadth twenty chains more or less; the metes and bounds whereof are shown upon a plan deposited in the Surveyor General's Office, dated the 11th of August, 1859, and signed by the Engineer-in-Chief of Railways.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Sir HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the twentieth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act to amend the laws relative to the vending of fermented and spirituous liquors*, it was amongst other things enacted, that it should be lawful for the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, by Proclamation, to declare any city, town, district, or place in Victoria, a city, town, district, or place wherein premises for the sale of spirits or fermented liquors, in quantities not less than two gallons, might be registered under the authority of the Acts mentioned in the first schedule to the said Act annexed: And whereas it is deemed expedient to declare the town hereinafter defined to be a town for the purpose and within the meaning of the above recited Act: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this my Proclamation declare that the town hereinafter named and defined shall be a town wherein premises for the sale of spirits or fermented liquors in quantities not less than two gallons may be registered under the authority of the Acts mentioned in the first schedule to the above recited Act, that is to say:—

NEWSTEAD TOWNSHIP RESERVE.—Commencing at the north-eastern angle of portion 20 of section 1, in the parish of Sandon; thence north one hundred chains and forty links; thence east one hundred and sixty chains and seventy links; thence south one hundred chains and forty links; and thence west one hundred and sixty chains and seventy links to the commencing point.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this twenty-first day of October, in the year of Our Lord One thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, and in the twenty-third year of Her Majesty's Reign.

MUNICIPALITY OF NEWTOWN AND CHILWELL.

BYE-LAW No. 14.—FOR REGULATING THE PROPER WIDTH OF FOOTPATHS IN STREETS.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council No. 15, intituled, An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria, the council of any municipal district is empowered under clause No. 26 to make bye-laws for the general good rule and government of such municipal district: Be it therefore enacted by the municipal council of Newtown and Chilwell, that the sanction of His Excellency the Governor being obtained, it shall be lawful to regulate the width of footpaths in streets according to the following scale:—

Street 33 feet wide, the pathway on each side of the street to be 4 feet wide.
Street 40 to 45 feet wide, the pathway on each side of the street to be 5 feet wide.
Street 45 to 46 feet wide, the pathway on each side of the street to be 8 feet wide.
Street above 65 feet wide, the pathway on each side of the street to be 12 feet wide.

MUNICIPALITY OF BUNINYONG.

BYE-LAW No. 1.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, whereby it was amongst other things enacted, "That it should be competent for the council of any municipal district to make bye-laws for the regulation of their own proceedings:" Be it therefore enacted by the council of the municipal district of Buninyong, in council assembled, that the following shall be—

THE STANDING RULES AND ORDERS OF THE COUNCIL OF THE MUNICIPALITY OF BUNINYONG.
CHAP. I.—Order of Proceedings.

1. That the business of the council shall be conducted on all ordinary occasions with open doors; but any one member present may require the exclusion of strangers until it shall have been decided by the council whether the question proposed to be introduced shall be discussed with open doors.
 2. The council shall commence business so soon after the time stated in the summons as there is a sufficient number of members in attendance to constitute a quorum, but if at the expiry of twenty minutes from the time specified in the summons there is not a quorum present, no business shall be transacted by the council at that meeting.
 3. At all meetings of the council when there is not present three members, or when the council is counted out, such circumstance, together with the names of the members then present, shall be recorded in the minute book.
 4. The minutes of any preceding meeting not previously confirmed shall be read as the first business at all meetings of the council, in order to their confirmation; and no discussion shall be permitted thereupon except as to their accuracy as a record of the proceedings.
 5. At all meetings of the council the reading of the correspondence unconnected with the orders of the day, the presentation of petitions by members of the council, and the bringing up of reports of committees, shall have precedence of the regular business.
 6. Every communication addressed to the council shall be in proper form, and presented by one of its members, who shall be responsible for its being respectfully worded; and on the presentation of any petition, no debate shall take place thereon until notice has been given in the usual manner.
 7. Every report of a committee shall be brought up by its chairman, and, when read, he or any member of such committee may move "That it be received and considered with an order of the day," or "That its consideration be made an order of the day for the next meeting." And if in the report of a committee there are distinct recommendations contained, such report shall not be adopted until the sense of the council has been taken separately on each.
 8. The orders of the day shall include all matters arising out of the proceedings of former meetings of the council, and any business which the chairman may think fit to bring under consideration; any member of the council may, however, bring forward such business as he may consider advisable in the form of a notice of motion, such notice to be given in writing to the town clerk, three clear days previous to the meeting at which the same is to be taken into consideration; and all such notices of motion shall be considered in the order in which they were given.
 9. No motion entered on the notice paper shall be proceeded with unless the member who has given such notice, or some one authorised by him be present, when the business is called in order; notices not so proceeded with shall be struck out of the paper.
 10. No bye-law shall be finally passed or adopted at the meeting at which it shall have been first proposed, nor until the next meeting of the council, regularly convened; and every such bye-law shall, in the interim, remain open for the inspection of any of the burgesses, in the town clerk's office, free of charge.
 11. No motion proposing any petition, address, bye-law or standing order, shall be entertained, unless the mover shall submit therewith a draft of such petition, address, bye-law or standing order.
- CHAP. II.—Order of Debate.
12. Any member desirous of proposing a motion or amendment, or of discussing any matter under consideration, must rise and address the chairman; and no member when speaking shall be interrupted, unless called to order, when he shall sit down, in which case the member calling to order shall be heard thereon in preference to any other speaker; and the question of order shall be disposed of before the subject is resumed, or any other subject entered upon.
 13. Any member desirous of proposing either an original motion or amendment must state the nature of such motion or amendment before addressing the council in support thereof.
 14. Any member making a motion or amendment shall put it in form, sign and deliver it to the town clerk, who shall add thereto the name of the seconder, and no motion or amendment so made shall be withdrawn without leave of the council.
 15. No motion or amendment shall be entertained or discussed unless it be seconded; any member may, however, require the enforcement of any standing order of the council by simply noticing that such order is disobeyed.
 16. Any member moving or seconding any motion or amendment shall be held to have spoken on that motion or amendment, and members in speaking shall designate each other by their respective titles of chairman or councillor, as the case may be.
 17. If two or more members rise to speak at the same time, the chairman shall decide which is entitled to pre-audience.
 18. No member shall speak twice on the same motion or amendment except by way of explanation or in reply upon any original motion of which he may have been the mover, or as the mover of the amendment last proposed; and the chairman shall, without waiting for the interposition of the council, call to order any member proceeding to speak a second time on the same motion or amendment: after the reply, the amendment or the original motion, as the case may be, shall be immediately put to the vote.
 19. No member shall digress from the subject matter of the question under discussion, or impute improper motives to others, and all personal reflections upon any member shall be considered highly disorderly.
 20. The chairman, when called upon to decide a point of order or practice, shall state the rule or precedent applicable to the case, without argument or comment, and his decision as to what is order or explanation shall be final.
 21. The chairman shall stand up when addressing the council in discussion of any question.
 22. Any member who shall use any expression capable of being applied offensively to any other member or person, shall, if required by the council, withdraw such expression, and make a satisfactory apology to the council, under a penalty, in case he refuse or neglect to do so before the rising of the council, of not less than One nor more than Ten pounds.
 23. Any member may require the town clerk to take down any particular words used by a member immediately on the same being used.
 24. Any member may of right require the production of any of the documents of the council relating to the question or matter in discussion.
 25. One amendment only shall be discussed at one time, but if lost, another may be moved before the original question is put to the vote, but upon any amendment being carried it shall be competent for any member to move one other amendment thereon but not more.
 26. Upon the adoption of any amendment by the council, such amendment shall be held to have quashed the original motion, and for all purposes of subsequent discussion the amendment so carried shall be acted upon as an original motion.
 27. The council shall vote by show of hands, except in cases of election, when the vote shall be by ballot; any member of the council may, however, call for a division upon any question, in which case the members voting in the affirmative shall first stand up, and afterwards those in the negative, until their votes are recorded.
 28. No discussion shall be allowed on any motion for adjournment of the council; but if, on the question being put, the motion be negatived, the subject then under consideration, or the next on the notice paper, shall be discussed.
 29. Any member of the council may enter his protest against any resolution of the council, provided that such protest is not inconsistent with truth or disrespectful to the council. Notice of intention to protest must, however, in every case, be given on the adoption of the resolution protested against, and the protest signed by the member or members protesting, and specifying the reasons for protesting, must be entered before the next regular meeting of the council, by the protesting member, in a book to be kept for that purpose in the town clerk's office, and duly referred to in the minutes of council, the same to be considered also a part of such minutes.
 30. No motion, the effect of which, if carried, would be to rescind any motion which has already passed the council, shall be entertained during the same municipal year, unless a call of the whole council has been duly made for that purpose; and no such motion for rescinding any resolution of the council which shall have been negatived by the council shall be again entertained during the same municipal year.

CHAP. III.—Miscellaneous Regulations.

31. For the consideration of any bye-law, or for the raising or appropriating of money, or for the objects contemplated in Standing Order No. 30, it shall be competent for any member, without previous notice, to move for a call of the whole council for the consideration of any such subject at the next or any subsequent meeting, and upon such motion being carried, due notice thereof shall be given by inserting it in the notice paper for the day when the order of the day, or notice of motion, for which such call is made is set down for consideration, and any member not in attendance when such order of the day or notice of motion comes under consideration, or not in attendance at the voting upon such question, or any amendment thereof, whether of adjournment or otherwise, shall be liable to a penalty of One pound, unless reasonable cause for such absence be shown to the satisfaction of the council.
32. The town clerk shall have charge of the common seal of the municipality, and shall be responsible for the safe custody and proper use of the same, each impression thereof being duly verified with the signature of that officer. The town clerk shall not affix the common seal to any corporate document without the express order of the council, nor unless such document bears the signature of the chairman; but in the case of

powers of attorneys and other legal instruments, not relating to the municipality, the signatures to which require to be verified by declaration before the chairman, the said seal shall and may be affixed by the town clerk to the chairman's certificate accompanying the same.

33. Any one or more of the standing orders of the council may be suspended *pro tempore* in case of emergency, provided that five of the members present shall deem such suspension necessary, but not otherwise, except Nos. 30 and 31.

34. That every member who is absent twenty minutes after the appointed hour of meeting shall be fined Five shillings; total absence from a meeting, Ten shillings, unless a just and reasonable excuse be produced; such fines to be applied to any charitable institution, approved of by the council.

35. That the bye-laws now formed for the guidance of the council be adopted, and all previous resolutions that are not embodied in the present standing orders to be considered null and void.

9. At stations where oats and bran cannot readily be procured, the tenders may be for hay or straw only; when all the supplies are included in one tender, it will, if advisable, be accepted for hay or straw, and not for the other articles.

Contractors will be allowed to deliver a quarter's supply on the 1st January, a six months' supply on the 1st April for a winter's stock, and the remainder on the 1st October, subject to the provisions contained in clause 2, Conditions of Contract.

1. The hay to be eaten, good, sound, and sweet; the straw to be wheat, and both to be in all respects of the best quality; oats and bran also to be sound and sweet and of the best description.

2. The supplies to be delivered on the requisition of the officer in charge of the district or station, the quantities stated in the schedule being, however, only approximative, and it must be understood that the Government will draw either more or less than stated. The excess over the estimate will, however, in no case exceed 50 per cent.

3. The contracts entered into under this notice are not to be considered as being infringed or vitiated by any contracts made by the military commissariat.

4. The forage when delivered must be accompanied by an invoice of quantity, showing the gross weight, the tare, and the net weight (this should be on the back of the requisition or order), which, when signed by the officer in charge of the station for the net quantity received, will be returned to the contractor, and by him rendered in support of his account.

5. Each contractor will be required to prepare his own account, monthly, in the prescribed form, and on presentation thereof to the officer in charge of the station or district, it will be forwarded for payment at the Government Stores, Melbourne, or the Treasury Pay Office of the district, as may be indicated on the account.

6. Should forage duly ordered under these contracts not be delivered within forty-eight hours from a reasonable time to be fixed on the order, it will be competent for the department, should circumstances require it, to purchase the same at the risk of the contractor, from whose account any expense over and above the contract price is to be deducted.

7. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the forage, as to quality of the same, it is to be decided by a Board of Survey, composed of persons named by the head of a department, and the decision of the board is to be considered final.

8. If the board shall decide that the forage is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra cost, if any, will be charged as in clause 6.

9. When a board of survey cannot be conveniently assembled, or when from some other cause injury would accrue either to the public service or to the contractor by waiting for a board of survey, the officer in charge will have the power to reject such supplies as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and the contractor must take back the rejected forage and supply good in its stead, failing which it will be obtained by the officer requiring it, and the expense will be charged as in clause 6.

10. On the motion of Councillor Knight, it has been determined to send a correct chart of the harbor of Port Fairy to the best authority on the subject in Great Britain, for an opinion as to the practicability of removing the bar, and the cost of so doing.

On the motion of Councillor Huntly, application has been made to the Government to expend the balance of £2500 in hand for harbor improvements, in extending the jetty and connecting it with the wharf; and that the sum of £10,000 be placed upon the estimates for completing the jetty and improving the harbor generally.

BOTANICAL GARDENS.

Messrs. Scott and Houghton's contract to fence has been completed.

On the 6th July Mr. Henry Hedges was appointed superintendent of garden for six months, with a salary at the rate of £130 per annum. A quantity of trees, shrubs and plants have been presented by the curators of the botanical gardens of Melbourne and Adelaide, and a quantity has been purchased, and the laying out and planting of the gardens are now being proceeded with. £500 was received from the Government towards fencing and improving, and a further sum of £200 has been granted though not yet received.

MALDON MUNICIPALITY.

SECOND HALF-YEARLY REPORT OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF MALDON.

IN pursuance of the Act 18 Victoria No. 15, clause 43, the municipal council of Maldon gives the following report of its proceedings for the half-year ending 10th September, 1859.

ELECTION OF COUNCILLORS.

On the 30th August last, the nomination of candidates to fill the vacancies occasioned by the retirement, by rotation, of Councillors Wright, Subritzky, and Lawrence, took place in the Market House, Councillor Watt presiding as chairman of the election, when fourteen gentlemen were duly proposed. A poll having been demanded, it was held on the following day, when Messrs. F. Courtin, Jas. Wood, and John Robinson, received the highest number of votes, and on the same evening were declared duly elected.

At a special meeting of the council held on the 2nd day of September last, Mr. Councillor T. C. Cooper was elected to the office of chairman of the council for the ensuing year.

The following public works have been completed:—

The clearing of stumps and filling up holes and inequalities with metal, from the main road through the township and to Eagle Hawk.

The forming of Fountain street, and making footpaths therein.

The clearing of a portion of the Market square.

The supply and erection of 60 public oil lamps and posts.

The repair of Main road, near the Springs. And the Market House is in progress and near completion.

BYE-LAWS.

The following bye-laws have been approved of by His Excellency the Governor, and are now in force, viz.:—

No. 11. To prevent the erection of calico buildings in certain parts of the district.

No. 12. For the expenditure of the sum of £1000, grant-in-aid for 1858.

No. 13. To cause proper precautions to be used in the erection of buildings and opening of excavations, and to cause the same to be lighted during the night.

No. 14. To regulate the erection of shades or awnings, and to prevent obstructions on the public footpaths.

A bye-law was also prepared and brought up by the chairman to compel publicans to erect public urinals, but it was negatived by the council.

CEMETERY.

The council has been informed by the President of the Board of Land and Works that the cemetery is without the municipal boundary, and that in consequence thereof it is necessary that trustees be appointed.

The regulations prepared and sent down by the council for approval have not, consequently, been approved of.

DEPUTATIONS.

There have been two deputations during the half-year.

1. The chairman was deputed to wait upon the heads of Government departments, when in town, with respect to the requirements of the district, and his report thereon was favorable.

2. The chairman and Mr. Councillor Lawrence were deputed to wait upon the Castlemaine council and solicit their co-operation in endeavoring to obtain the sum of £12,000, to be placed on the Government estimates for next year, for making the main road between Maldon and Castlemaine. The Castlemaine council readily acceded to the request, and agreed to join this council in a memorial to the Chief Secretary for the purpose.

MEMORIALS.

1. To the Chief Secretary, in support of an application made by the inhabitants of Eagle Hawk to withdraw certain lands from sale.

2. To the Chief Secretary, applying for—

A sum of £6000 to be placed on the ensuing estimates, for making the main road through the municipality.

A sum for building and maintaining a hospital.

A sum for a powder magazine.

A sum for fencing park lands.

And a sum for the erection of a post office.

3. A joint memorial from the municipal councils of Maldon and Dunolly, for a sum to be placed on the estimates for making a bridge over the Loddon, and for clearing and making the said road on the telegraph line.

4. A joint memorial with Castlemaine as above named.

HOSPITAL.

The inhabitants of the district having raised a sufficient sum to erect a temporary hospital, applied to the council for a grant in support thereof, and after due consideration, and being desirous of rendering some assistance to so deserving an object, they voted a sum of £100 for the purpose.

PUBLIC RESERVES.

Application has been made to the Surveyor General for the Crown grants of land reserved for a market and manure dépôt, but the same have not yet been forwarded, nor has any reply been received to the application.
