PROPOSED ROAD DISTRICT.
Lexton.

IT is hereby notified that a memorial has been presented to the Governor, signed by sixty-five owners and occupiers of land at and near Lexton, in the counties of Talbot and Ripon, setting forth to the following effect:—

The memorialists state that a numerous attended public meeting of the owners and occupiers of land in the vicinity of Lexton was, pursuant to public notice, held at Lexton on the 5th of October, 1859, for the purpose of considering the best means of improving the state of the roads in that locality, and that it was unanimously resolved, that the roads having become almost impassable, it is urgently necessary to take immediate steps to put them in proper repair, and that in the opinion of the meeting the best means of effecting this object is by the formation of a district road board, in accordance with the provisions of the Act 16 Victoria No. 40.

It was also agreed to suggest that the proposed road district should be designated "The Lexton Road District," and be bounded as follows, viz.:—Commencing at a point being the

north-western corner of portion number one hundred and eleven, parish of Beckworth; thence in a line bearing south along the western boundary of the Ballaarat road board district to the Ballaarat and Ararat road; thence in a westerly direction along the said Ballaarat and Ararat road as far as Beranger Creek; thence in a line in a northerly direction to the southern boundary of the township of Crowlands; thence in an eastern direction to the northern boundary line of Hodgkinson's pre-emptive section, and along the northern boundary of the said section to the junction of the Bet-Bet and Doctor's Creek; thence in a south-eastern direction home to the point of commencement.

And the memorialists pray as follows:—

"Your memorialists therefore pray that Your Excellency will be pleased to exercise the powers vested in you by the 9th clause of the Act 16 Victoria No. 40 in behalf of this district, by proclaiming and declaring the portion of the colony above described to be a road district."

CONVEYANCE OF MAILS, 1860.

Eighty-six chains re-formed and gravelled.

Four hundred and eighty-six chains gravel, carted by contractors, spread on footpath from Westgarth street to Napier street.

All the streets and channels have been repeatedly cleaned, the principal thoroughfares scraped during wet weather.

Six hundred and ten chains of channels have been lowered for better drainage, and several fresh channels cut. During dusty weather three men have been employed watering the streets. The council being of opinion one set of men was not sufficient for the requirements of the district, have ordered two more hydrants to be made, and the number of men employed for watering the streets increased, in order that every portion of the municipality may be well watered.

The question of compelling payment of a portion of the cost of constructing rights-of-way has repeatedly occupied the attention of the council. As local board of health, they have in two cases, viz., that of a right-of-way near the south end of George street and Little Gore street, north of Webb street, ordered their construction, on receiving payment of a portion of the cost from the owners of property abutting on those lanes. The council, however, are not desirous of making those cases precedents, preferring rather to judge of each application on its own merits, and the necessity there exists for its repair in a sanitary point of view. The council have ordered the erection of thirty additional lamps, and are in communication with the Melbourne Gas Company respecting an extension of their main down from Nicholson street, in order that the cross streets, to Brunswick street, north of Johnson street, may be properly lighted.

The council have repeatedly inspected the kerbing and channelling recently laid down in the principal streets, both during its progress and after its completion, and have reason to believe the work had been faithfully executed.

BYE-LAWS.

The following bye laws prepared by the legislative committee have received the approval of His Excellency the Governor in Council:—

No. 8. For regulating the erection of external projections, verandahs or awnings.

No. 9. For regulating the security of buildings in which public meetings are held and public amusements conducted.

REVENUE.

The council have received two further instalments of the grant-in-aid to municipalities, making a total of £12,375 7s. 6d. received from Government up to 30th September.

The total amount of rates collected is £9753 16s. 6d., leaving a balance of about £1054 5s. 6d. still to collect, and which is due chiefly from lands and untenanted houses.

GENERAL.

In reply to an application made by this council, the Crown Lands Office set apart that triangular portion of land lying between Napier street and the Heidelberg road and Reilly street as a site for bath-houses and for purposes of recreation.

The Government have also given permission to the Council to obtain gravel from Crown Lands near the Heidelberg road.

The council have again renewed the subject of the powers held under the Fitz Roy Ward Improvement Act: pending that arrangement being carried out, the council have solicited the Government to proceed with the erection of a court house on the market site, before the vote lapses at the close of this year.

The inhabitants of that portion of Smith Ward lying east of Nicholson street, with the concurrence of this council, presented a memorial to His Excellency, praying for the annexation of that locality to the municipality of Fitz Roy, but in consequence of receiving a counter petition from the residents of the northern portion of this district, the Executive declined to consent. Subsequently another memorial was forwarded to His Excellency, praying for an alteration in the northern boundary, so as to embrace that triangular portion of land lying between the Heidelberg road, Smith and Reilly streets, but owing mainly to the opposition of the city council, the prayer of the petitioners was not complied with.

In consequence of an invitation on the part of the Health Committee of the city council to co-operate with that body respecting the extension of the gardens in Victoria parade, the members of the Public Works Committee, to whom the matter

was referred, had an interview with the former committee. The subject eventually lapsed. Attention, however, was again directed to it, in consequence of a letter brought before the council on 31st August, from the town clerk, Melbourne, enquiring whether, in the event of the Fitz Roy Council declining to join the city corporation in carrying out the plans respecting the gardens in Victoria parade, steps would be taken to alter the southern boundary of this municipality, so as to give the city council sole control over the plantations; the question was left to the decision of the ratepayers. At a public meeting, held on 24th August, it was decided that the municipal council should be recommended to consent to the request of the city council, on the following conditions:—1st. That when the plantations were sufficiently advanced, they should be thrown open to the public generally. 2nd. That the city council join the municipal council in their endeavors to obtain annexation of the triangular portion of land above alluded to. These conditions, together with one added by the municipal council, that openings be left in the line of plantation opposite Napier, Gore, and Smith streets, were transmitted to the city council, and in this position the matter remains.

DEPUTATIONS.

A deputation from the council waited on the Commissioner of Crown Lands and Survey with reference to the completion of Reilly street drain. Owing to the representations then made, the Government have called for fresh tenders, without the bluestone lining. The council believe the work will be tendered for at an amount within the sum voted by Parliament; and if so, expect to see the works commenced forthwith. Deputations have also repeatedly waited on the Commissioners of Sewers and Water Supply, with reference to watering the streets from the fire-plugs laid down in the municipality. Owing to liability of the Commission for any damages occasioned by the bursting of the fire-plugs, permission to use them would not be granted unless the council undertook that responsibility: certain concessions having been made, the council entered into an obligation relieving the Commission of their responsibility, whereon permission was at once granted. The council believe that, with judicious care, and the insertion of brass balls in the fire-plugs, instead of those made of gutta percha, as at present in use, the risk of any accident is materially reduced.

MARKET.

The council have to state that, during the last six months, the receipts at the weighbridge amounted to £90 13s., which has not only defrayed the salary of the market-keeper for that period, but yielded a revenue at the rate of about 5 per cent. per annum on the total cost of the market sheds and weighbridge.

BENEVOLENT COMMITTEE.

The benevolent committee have had occasion to relieve several very pressing cases of poverty and distress that have occurred within this district. Every care has been taken that the laudable end the council had in view, when voting the necessary funds, should not be abused, and that none but extreme cases, and those only after investigation, should be relieved. The committee was appointed last February, and since that time (upwards of seven months) have disbursed £45 6s. in the relief of nine cases, all of which, with one exception, were women in great poverty.

PUBLIC LIBRARY COMMITTEE.

The public library committee have concluded their labors and brought up their report, which was adopted by the council, and instructions given that a bye-law be prepared by the municipal solicitor, vesting the proposed site in Smith street in the joint councils of East Collingwood and Fitz Roy, and for authorizing the appropriation of a portion of the municipal funds for the purpose of carrying out the recommendations of the committee.

CITY COUNCIL OF MELBOURNE.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of New South Wales, 14 Victoria No. 20, intitled, *An Act for regulating the formation, drainage, and repair of Streets, Courts, and Alleys, on Private Property, within the city of Melbourne*, it is amongst other things enacted, that where any street, court, or alley on private property in the city of Melbourne shall not be, or shall not have been, sufficiently paved, flagged, macadamised, levelled, drained, and sewered, or otherwise completed or repaired, to the satisfaction of the council of the said city, it shall be lawful for the said council, at any time, and from time to time, by any order under the hand of the mayor or town clerk of the said city for the time being respectively, to order that any such street, court, or alley, or any part thereof, shall be freed from obstruction, paved, flagged, macadamised, levelled, drained, and sewered, or otherwise completed or repaired, in such manner and within such time as to the said council may appear expedient, and thereupon the owners of the tenements adjoining or abutting upon such street, court, or alley, on each side thereof, shall in such manner and within such time as shall be expressed in such order, at their respective costs, charges, and expenses, remove all obstructions, and well and sufficiently pave, flag, and macadamise, level, drain, and sewer, or otherwise complete or repair so much of the said street, court, or alley, to the centre thereof, as may be opposite to and co-extensive with their respective tenements, adjoining or abutting on such streets, courts, or alleys respectively:

And whereas the streets, courts, and alleys enumerated in the schedule to this order annexed, marked A, have not been sufficiently paved, flagged, macadamised, levelled, drained, and sewered, or otherwise completed or repaired, to the satisfaction of the council of the city of Melbourne:

Be it now ordered by the council of this the said city, that the streets, courts, and alleys enumerated in the schedule to this order annexed, marked A, shall, within ten days from the date of this order's coming into operation, be freed from obstruction, paved, flagged, macadamised, levelled, drained, and sewered, in such manner as is expressed in the schedule to this order annexed, and marked B; and it is hereby notified to the owners respectively of the tenements adjoining or abutting upon the streets, courts, and alleys enumerated in the schedule to this order annexed, marked A, that if they or any of them shall neglect or omit to remove the obstruction, and pave, flag, macadamise, level, drain and sewer, or otherwise complete and repair the street, court, or alley on which their respective tenements adjoin or abut, in the manner and within the time expressed in this order, then the council of the said city will remove all obstructions in the said streets, courts, and alleys, and pave, flag, macadamise, level, drain, sewer, and otherwise complete or repair the same, or such parts thereof as shall not have been so done pursuant to this order, and will thereupon ascertain, determine, and charge such respective owners with their several proportionate parts of the costs, charges, and expenses thereof, according to and co-existent with their respective tenements adjoining or abutting on such street, court, or alley, having regard in such apportionment to the state and condition of the pavement, flagging, macadamising, levelling, draining, and sewerage in such streets, courts, or alleys respectively, or any part thereof, as shall or may be at the time of making this order.

SCHEDULE B, REFERRED TO IN THIS ORDER.

Manner in which the streets, courts, and alleys, enumerated in schedule A, referred to in this order, are ordered to be freed from obstruction, paved, flagged, macadamised, levelled, drained, and sewered:—

The natural soil is to be reduced or made up as the case may require, so that the longitudinal section of the whole right-of-way shall in no part have an inclination of less than 1 in 120, and where practicable the entire length is to form one incline. In laying on any stuff it is to be spread in layers of not more than one foot thick. The transverse section of the right-of-way is to show a roadway whose crown shall be one inch above the kerbs of the footways, and in the fall from the crown of the water-channels is to be at the rate of 1 in 25.

On either side of the roadway there is to be a water channel eighteen inches wide, consisting of two rows of bluestone pitchers, nine inches deep, and not less than nine inches by fourteen inches on the surface, with upright sides, set in loam and rammed with a rammer weighing forty pounds, so as to subside four inches.

On either side of the roadway there is also to be a footway not more than three feet wide, and these are to be separated from the roadway by a red gum plank or kerb ten inches by three, set on edge, and fastened with five-inch spikes to piles four inches by four of red gum, three feet long, driven into the soil.

The footways are to be covered with a coat of gravel three inches thick, and the surface is to fall towards the channel at the rate of 1 in 10. The roadway is to be covered with a coat of broken metal, broken to a two and a half inch gauge, and laid on seven inches thick at the channels, and eight inches at the crown, and this when necessary is to be covered with a coat of loam one and a half inches thick.

Wherever private entrances lead from the rights-of-way they are to be paved to the full width with bluestone pitchers, in the same manner as the channels. Paving is to be extended from the channels towards the line of houses or fences, so as to cross the entire footway.

The whole of the work must be done under the inspection and subject to the approval of the city surveyor, who is authorised to order any deviation from these general principles which the particularities of any case may require. No. 1543
