NOTICE TO MARINERS FREQUENTING ST. VINCENT'S GULFH.

On and after 1st December, 1859, a *red and white light* placed vertically (the red light being uppermost) will be exhibited nightly from the outer end of the Glenelg Jetty, in lat. 34° 59' 30" S., long. 138° 33' E., from the 1st of every month until the arrival of the English mail, which generally occurs on or about the 4th of the month.

The lights will also be exhibited on the night of the 18th of each month, or on such nights as follow the despatch of the English homeward mail from Adelaide.

Mariners will take notice that the lights *may* be exhibited on other dates than those abovementioned.

The upper or red light stands twenty-nine (29) feet above high water mark, with the bright light nine (9) feet below it. The red light will be seen about six (6) miles in clear weather. The lights exhibit themselves in all directions included in the arc of the sea horizon.

Vessels anchoring off the Glenelg Jetty should bring the lights to bear E. by N., and bring up in not less than five (5) fathoms.

Coasters may approach the end of the jetty very closely, but care should be taken to avoid a shoal patch on an oyster bank lying about a mile to the southward of the township.

Ten and a half (10½) feet will be found at the end of the jetty at low-water springs; the rise and fall is eight (8) feet.

RED LIGHT AT THE PILOT STATION NEAR PORT ADELAIDE.

On the completion of the jetty now in course of construction off the Semaphore and Pilot Station on Le Fevre's Peninsula, the red light now exhibited from the station on the sandhill will be removed to the end of the jetty, from whence it will be shown every night throughout the year, from sunset to sunrise, as usual.

ARARAT MINING DISTRICT.
No. XIV.—BYE-LAW REGULATING QUARTZ MINING IN THE DISTRICT OF ARARAT.—[7th December, 1859.]

AT a meeting of the mining board of the mining district of Ararat, begun and holden at the Mining Board Room, Ararat, in the said district, on the 7th day of December, One thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, it is ordained by the said board as follows, that is to say :-

1. *Number of party and size of claim.*—In quartz mining two miners shall constitute a party, and shall be entitled to hold a claim not exceeding one hundred (100) feet in length along the course or supposed course of reef, by a surface breadth at right angles of six hundred (600) feet, until the reef be found and payable gold obtained, when the said breadth shall be reduced to three hundred (300) feet, and defined by four (4) pegs; three months after which the claim must be fully represented (one man to every twenty (20) feet).

2. *Parallel reefs.*—All reefs or veins of quartz lying within the said three hundred (300) feet shall be deemed the property of such claimholders, whose right to follow and extract the same to any unlimited extent beyond their surface boundary shall be deemed absolute, unless a parallel reef shall dip or underlie within the said area, when it shall belong to the claimholders on such parallel reef until it intersects or joins the other; the reef after its junction shall belong to the claimholders first working either reef.

3. *Ownership of shares.*—Any holder of a miner's right may hold one or more shares in any number of claims, provided each and every share be represented in accordance with this bye-law, and by a miner holding a miner's right; but no miner shall be allowed to mark more than one claim.

4. *Protection to sleeping interests.*—No hired miner shall take possession of any interest that may be vested in his employer except under the following circumstances, viz. :- Any employer neglecting for one month the fulfilment of a written agreement for wages entered into with a miner, shall forfeit the amount of interest represented by such miner, and the interest so forfeited shall become the property of the said miner.

5. *Marking out.*—All parties marking claims shall do so by fixing two posts firmly in the ground along the course or supposed course of the reef, which must be kept visible until the claim be abandoned.

6. *Claims to be numbered.*—All claims shall be numbered consecutively north and south from the prospecting claim, which shall be No. 1.

7. *Wall to be left.*—Three (3) feet of neutral ground shall be left by the party last marking out a claim, which, if necessary for the safety or protection of miners employed in such claims, must be left standing as a wall until both parties agree to divide or otherwise dispose of the same.

8. *Penalty for not leaving a wall.*—Where any party neglects to leave the proper thickness of wall, the warden may deduct the necessary thickness from the claim last marked out, and assign it as a wall between such party and the adjoining shareholders.

9. *Oversized claims.*—Any party having marked out too much ground, the warden may curtail such claim, and assign the spare ground to any miner first claiming the same, taking the wall from the claim so overmarked.

10. *Disputed boundaries.*—In cases of disputed boundaries, the complaining parties must give at least ten (10) days' notice, in writing, to the other claimholders, of their intention to call in the warden to adjudicate, in order that they may have time to obtain an authorised or competent surveyor.

11. *Claimholders' names to be posted.*—Forty-eight hours after marking out a claim, the names of all the owners, together with the date and number of their miners' rights, written in English, shall be posted on some conspicuous part of the claim and kept visible, and any transfer of any share or shares must be duly recorded on such notice.

12. *Claims to be worked in a bonâ fide manner.*—Four days after a claim has been taken possession of it must be worked in a bonâ fide manner, unless the representatives of such claim are prevented by sickness or urgent business; any shareholder neglecting to comply with the provisions of this clause shall be subject to the penalty specified in the Gold Fields Act. Any wilful infringement shall constitute a forfeiture of the share or interest affected, but no sleeping shareholder shall be liable for the negligence or wilful infringement of his representative or a working shareholder until after receiving due notice in accordance with clause 22, he shall have failed to represent his share or interests.

13. *Amalgamation of claims.*—Holders to the extent of five (5) claims may amalgamate, by fixing on some conspicuous place near the centre of the claims a notice to the following effect:— "We hereby give notice that we have amalgamated (number of claims, extent of ground, names of shareholders, with date and number of miners' rights)."

14. *Special amalgamation.*—The warden shall be empowered to give a special amalgamation grant to the holders of any number of claims upon the water level, or for machinery purposes, provided the notice, as in clause 13, is fixed up at least seven days before the amalgamation is granted; and the grant shall remain in force as long as the requisite number of miners are employed on or about such amalgamated claim.

15. *Objections to special amalgamation.*—All parties objecting to any special amalgamation grant must do so to the warden before the required seven days have elapsed, and also give a written notice to the parties intending to amalgamate that they have lodged such objection, and if it can be proved that such amalgamation is detrimental to the proper working or prospecting of the reef it shall not be granted.

16. *Number of men on amalgamated claims.*—Six months after the discovery of the reef and the obtaining of payable gold in amalgamated claims, and twelve months in special grants for amalgamation, the full number of men must be employed (one man to each twenty (20) feet), on pain of forfeiture of the shares unrepresented.

17. *Temporary amalgamation.*—The warden may grant, when necessary, a special temporary amalgamation of any number of claims, not exceeding ten (10), for the speedy discovery of the course of any reef.

18. *Claims on the water level.*—Any claim, or claims becoming flooded, the warden shall be empowered to order all claims on the water level, whether before or after the discovery of the reef,

to be fully represented (one man to every twenty (20) feet), and the claimowners to bail their fair share of water, and in the event of their neglecting to do so, such claim shall be deemed forfeited.

19. *Suspension of work allowed.*—Any miners who have done three consecutive months *bona fide* work on a claim, may obtain a certificate from the warden authorising suspension of work for any period not exceeding three months; previous to a subsequent suspension being allowed, three additional months *bona fide* work must be done on the claim; always provided that the holders of the major portion of the interest in the claim be not opposed to such suspension. Any party not having complied with the conditions of this clause shall be liable to forfeit their claims.

20. *Application for suspension of work.*—Seven days prior to the granting of any suspension certificate, the miners requiring such suspension shall post a notice to that effect on some conspicuous part of their claim, which notice shall contain the name of each shareholder, together with the date and number of his miner's right, and unless valid objections be made by adjoining claimholders within the six days specified, it shall be lawful for the warden to grant a certificate as provided in clause 19, a copy of which certificate must be posted on the claim.

21. *Influx of water—extended suspension.*—The working of any claim being impeded by the influx of water, it shall be lawful for the warden to grant a suspension of work for any period not exceeding three (3) months, which suspension may be renewed from time to time until the owners of two (2) or more adjoining claims on the water level require its withdrawal and the active prosecution of the work.

22. *Registration.*—Any person holding any claim, interest, share, or portion of a share, in any reef, shall, within two months after the passing of this bye-law, register the same with the mining surveyor of the district, or a duly appointed deputy registrar, and such claim, interest, share, or portion of a share, in such claim, shall not be deemed relinquished or abandoned through any neglect or omission on the part of a working shareholder or hired miner employed in working it; always provided, after seven days' notice in writing to the owner or his agent, his interest be fully represented, in conformity with these bye-laws.

23. *Deputy registrars.*—The mining surveyor of the district shall register any claim, interest, share, or portion of a share, on any quartz reef, and may, at the recommendation of the mining board, appoint deputy registrars at such places as it may think fit, who shall duly forward to the surveyor a copy of the registration of each and every claim, interest, share, or portion of a share.

24. *Form of application for registration.*—To the mining surveyor (or deputy registrar): Sir,—Being in legal and undisputed possession of the (claim, share, or portion of a share) below mentioned, I request you to register my name as the holder thereof.

- Name and address.
- Date and number of miner's right.
- Name of reef.
- No. of claim.
- Extent of claim.
- Share or interest therein.
- Name and address of agent (if any).

25. *Registration books to be open to the public.*—The mining surveyor (or his deputy) shall allow any holder of a miner's right to have access to the registration book, between the hours of One and Two p.m. every lawful day.

26. *Persons leaving the district must appoint an agent.*—Any persons holding any claim, share, or interest, shall, in case of absence from the district, appoint an agent, whose acts shall be held as those of his principal, and whose name and address must be registered with the mining surveyor.

27. *Surveyor's fees.*—The scale of fees to be paid for registration shall be as follows:—

28. *Protection to stacked quartz.*—Any person wishing to retain possession of any quartz or other substance, the produce of a claim, may do so for one year by registering the same with the mining surveyor or his deputy, although the claim from which it may have been taken has been abandoned; provided the same be stacked in a proper manner upon ground not supposed to be payable for mining purposes. At the expiration of one year, if the owners still desire to retain possession, registration must be renewed every six months, failing which it shall be deemed abandoned.

29. *Prospecting.*—Any party prospecting for a reef shall be entitled to hold two hundred (200) feet along the course or supposed course of the reef by a surface breadth at right angles of eight hundred (800) feet, until the reef be found and payable gold obtained, when the breadth shall be reduced to three hundred (300) feet, and held in accordance with this bye-law, except as regards the number of men to be employed.

No second prospecting claim shall be taken up on any reef within one mile of any party engaged prospecting the same reef.

30. *Alluvial ground may be worked.*—Any miner may work alluvial ground within the claims sanctioned by this bye-law, provided the said ground can be worked without detriment to the quartz claims.

31. *Disputed claim or share.*—Any miner or miners intending to take possession of a disputed claim, or share in a claim, shall not do so without the authority of the warden.

32. *Repeal clause.*—All existing bye-laws regulating quartz mining in the district of Ararat are hereby repealed.

Order of the Board of Land and Works relative to opening a diversion of the Heidelberg road near the Darebin Creek.

16th December, 1859.—It is ordered that Mr. Thomas Wells be paid the sum of Two hundred and sixty-four pounds one shilling and threepence (£264 1s. 3d.), and Mr. William Dunn the sum of One hundred and thirty-five pounds eighteen shillings and ninepence (£135 18s. 9d.) as compensation for the land required to be taken for the purpose of opening a diversion of the Heidelberg road through their respective properties near the Darebin Creek, in the parishes of Jika Jika and Keelbundora, in the county of Bourke; and no other claims having been sent in within the period prescribed by law, the road, as described in the *Gazette* notice of the 26th of October, 1858, be opened to the public under the Act 16 Victoria No. 40, sec. 33.

The petitioners state, that they are householders of Sandridge, otherwise called Macarthur ward, of the city of Melbourne:

That they consider that the time has fully arrived for the severance of the ward from the city—firstly, because it is already geographically separated by the intervening municipality of Emerald Hill; secondly, on account of the inability of the corporation of Melbourne to provide for the wants and requirements of Sandridge; thirdly, because they believe that they are better able to understand their own wants and manage their own affairs than any other body can possibly understand or manage them:

That they desire to avail themselves of the means provided by law to share the benefits which have resulted therefrom to other localities, believing that thereby the welfare of Sandridge will be considerably advanced, and its moral and material prosperity greatly augmented.

They further state that the corporation of Melbourne are about to submit to the Legislature a Bill to define the boundaries of the city including Macarthur ward therein, a measure to which the petitioners are averse, as its effect would be to exclude them from the benefits resulting from local and separate government, which is essential to the full and free development of the capabilities of this important sea-port town.

And the petitioners pray as follows:—

“Your petitioners therefore humbly pray that your Excellency would be pleased to extend the operation of the Municipalities Acts 18 Victoria Nos. 15 and 32 and 19 Victoria No. 16 to this locality, and be pleased to proclaim Sandridge a separate municipality under the style and title of ‘The Sandridge Municipality;’ and that the boundaries of such municipality be as follow, viz.:—Commencing at the Government pier at Sandridge at high-water mark, running westerly to the junction of the River Yarra Yarra with Hobson's Bay; from the said junction up the said river at high-water mark to a point where the boundaries of the Footscray municipality strike the river on the eastern bank of the said river; thence following the boundaries of the Footscray municipality in an easterly direction to the south-east angle of the boundaries of the said municipality; thence following the said boundaries in a northerly direction to a point where the said boundaries strike the south bank of the Yarra Yarra at high-water mark; thence along the south bank of the Yarra Yarra at high water mark to the junction of Ferrars street, Emerald Hill, with the said river; thence in a south-easterly direction along Ferrars street to the south-east side of the Melbourne and Hobson's Bay Railway line; thence in a south-westerly direction along the proposed line of Bay street to a point where it strikes the present boundary line of the Emerald Hill municipality; thence following the said boundary line in a south-easterly direction to the boundary post off the Sandridge road; thence following the said boundary line to the sea-beach at high-water mark; thence in a westerly direction along high-water mark to the Government pier aforesaid, the said boundaries being colored red on the plan submitted herewith.

8. Survey of Gold street, with additional lots.
9. £1000, grant-in-aid.

In accordance with a petition of the ratepayers, application was made to Government for a "commonage," but the present law did not admit of a compliance with their request; they, however, urged the necessity of a change in the law, and were assured the subject should receive careful consideration.

The public works executed consists in the clearing High street, two chains wide, one mile and a quarter, and metalling the holes; but others are in process of being carried out, and consist of—

- Erecting a town pump,
- Erecting cattle yards,
- Erecting municipal baths.

The use of the town pump is intended to be free to the ratepayers. From the cattle yards and baths the council anticipate a handsome revenue.

The subject of a weighbridge was carefully considered, and its further consideration postponed, as it did not appear to the council that its usefulness would be so general as to warrant them in laying out about £300 in erecting it; the more so as it was calculated the expense of its management would be greater than the fees derived from its use.
