ORDER IN COUNCIL
(Made under 21 Victoria No. 32, sec. xii.)

FOR
REGULATING THE ISSUING OF MINING LEASES OF
AURIFEROUS CROWN LANDS IN THE MINING
DISTRICT OF SANDHURST.

At the Governor's

Government House, Melbourne, the twenty-fourth day of
January, 1859.

PRESENT:

His Excellency the Governor,

Major-General Macarthur, C.B.,
Mr. O'Shanassy,

WHEREAS by an Act of the Parliament of Victoria, passed in the 21st year of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, No. 32, it was made lawful for the Governor to grant certain leases for any term not exceeding ten years, for mining purposes, of any auriferous Crown land: AND WHEREAS by the same Act it was also made lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time to make such regulations, not being contrary to the said Act, as should appear to be necessary for prescribing the form of documents and leases to be issued under the same Act, the modes, times, dates, and places of the issue thereof, and the conditions on which such leases should be issued: AND WHEREAS it appears to be necessary, in reference to all leases which the Governor may grant as aforesaid of any auriferous Crown land being in the mining district of Sandhurst, to make the regulations hereinafter expressed: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth hereby, in reference to all leases which the Governor may grant as aforesaid of any auriferous Crown land being in the mining district of Sandhurst, make the regulations next following:—

WHAT LANDS MAY BE LEASED.

All auriferous Crown land in the mining district of Sandhurst may be applied for on lease under these regulations, except—

1. The whole or any part of any claim held by any person other than the applicant;
2. The whole or any part of any land which any holder of a miner's right other than the applicant is entitled to occupy, and actually does occupy *bonâ fide*, for mining purposes and for residence;
3. The whole or any part of any land through or upon which any holder of a miner's right, other than the applicant, is entitled to cut, construct and use roads, races or dams, for mining purposes;
4. The whole or any part of any land which any holder of a business license, other than the applicant, is entitled to occupy, and does actually occupy *bonâ fide*, for the purpose of residence and of carrying on his business;
5. The whole or any part of any land in or over which any person other than the applicant has any interest or authority other than those above mentioned which he may lawfully use or exercise for mining purposes.

REQUIREMENTS PRELIMINARY TO THE ISSUE OF LEASES.

1. Any person applying for a lease of auriferous Crown land in the mining district of Sandhurst, shall apply for such lease by addressing and forwarding to the nearest Warden of that district an application in duplicate in the form in schedule hereunto appended marked A., and the Warden shall, as soon as it may conveniently be done, enter or cause to be entered, in a book to be kept for the purpose, such application, numbered according to the order in which it shall have been received, and shall thereupon and upon receipt of the deposit in the application referred to, give to the applicant a certificate and receipt in the form in schedule hereunto annexed marked B., and the priority of every application shall be determined according to the time at which it was so received and entered as aforesaid.

2. At the time of applying as aforesaid for a lease, the applicant must (in addition to the charges of survey) deposit the sum of ten pounds, as a guarantee for payment of any expenses which may be incurred by reason of any objection to such application being allowed. And whether any such objection shall be allowed or not any surplus which may remain over and above the expenses incurred shall be returned to the applicant.

Printed copies of the forms A., B., and C. will be issued at the offices of the Wardens of the district, free of expense.

OFFICIAL SURVEY.

Upon receipt of such application and money aforesaid, a surveyor will be directed by the Warden to proceed to the land applied for, as soon after such application as possible, for the purpose of surveying the said land, and reporting thereon, as to area, boundaries, and description thereof, to the Warden, for transmission to the Chief Secretary.

When the surveyor shall have made a survey of the land applied for, he shall place at each corner of such land a post, firmly fixed in the ground, and standing three feet in height from the surface thereof; and shall affix upon some conspicuous place within the boundaries of the land applied for, a notice dated on that day, setting forth in the form in the schedule hereunto annexed, marked C., the description of the land so applied for and surveyed as aforesaid, the address of the applicant, and the steps to be taken by any persons desirous of objecting to the issue of such lease.

OBJECTIONS.

1. Any person objecting to the issue of such lease to the applicant, shall within eight days after the date of this notice posted on the land as aforesaid, forward to the Warden to whom the application for the lease shall have been made, and also to the applicant at the address stated in such notice posted as aforesaid, full notice of any objection against the issue of such lease to the applicant.

Every person so objecting shall deposit with the Warden the sum of ten pounds, as security for the due prosecution of any objection, and in satisfaction of all expenses to which the applicant may be put by such objection; and if such objection should not be prosecuted, or shall fail, so much of such sum shall be handed over to the applicant as may by the Warden be declared necessary to defray the expenses of the applicant, and the balance (if any) shall be refunded to the person objecting.

INQUIRY INTO APPLICATIONS AND OBJECTIONS.

After the expiration of the eight days allowed for objections a Warden will proceed to hold, at a time and place to be named by him, an inquiry into the truth of the particulars stated by the applicant and the validity of the objections made by each objector.

At such inquiry the Warden will receive such information as the parties may offer, and as he may think pertinent to his inquiry; and immediately after such inquiry, or, should there be no objection raised, immediately after the expiration of the eight days aforesaid, he shall forward to the office of the Chief Secretary the application and the objections thereto, if any, and his report thereon.

LEASES.

All leases to be applied for shall be considered under the following classification:—

1. *Leases of Alluvial Land.*—These will embrace all lands where gold is found in the drift, without respect to depth.
2. *Leases of Quartz Ground.*—These will relate to ground containing reefs or veins of quartz.

The Governor may issue to any applicant who has complied with such of these regulations as refer to his application, a lease of the land applied for after the time prescribed by the eleventh section of the Gold Fields Act, viz., One month after notice of the intention to grant the same shall have been published in the *Government Gazette*.

Every lease will bear date the day of the execution thereof, and may be obtained at the office of the Warden, who shall deliver the same to the applicant, or such person as shall be duly authorised to receive the same, upon receipt of a fee of £1.

The parcel of land of whatever kind demised by any lease will be described therein, by such area, and metes and bounds, as shall have been reported by the surveyor to the Warden, and approved by the Chief Secretary.

The term of the lessee in the land demised cannot in any case exceed ten years.

The areas of leases shall be, except in special cases hereinafter provided for—

1. For leases of alluvial lands, an area not less than two acres, nor more than twenty; and no parcel of alluvial land will be demised except in the form of a rectangular parallelogram, the length of which shall not exceed twice the breadth.

2. For leases of quartz ground an area in the form of a rectangular parallelogram, the length of which shall not exceed four hundred and forty yards, nor be less than one hundred yards, by a uniform width of eighty yards.

3. The rent reserved shall be at the rate of five pounds per acre of alluvial land, and five pounds for every one hundred yards in length of any quartz ground demised pursuant to these regulations, and the said rents shall be made payable half-yearly in advance during the entire term, and the day of execution of the lease shall be deemed to be the day upon which the first payment shall be made.

In special cases where it shall be shown that a departure from the foregoing areas or rents would be for the public advantage the same may be altered, extended, or otherwise increased by the Governor in Council, and such covenants, conditions, and stipulations may be imposed, and such rents and royalties reserved, as by the said Governor in Council may be considered necessary; provided that the Warden shall not entertain any application for a greater extent of alluvial land or of quartz ground than the maximum quantity hereinbefore stated, without a special order from the Chief Secretary.

MUNICIPALITY OF ST. KILDA.

BYE-LAW No. 18.—TO REPEAL PART OF BYE-LAW No. 13, AND TO MAKE OTHER REGULATIONS FOR CONDUCTING THE ELECTION OF MEMBERS OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF ST. KILDA BY BALLOT.

WHEREAS it has been deemed expedient by the municipal council of St. Kilda, in exercise and execution of the powers to them given by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the Establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, to provide that the election of municipal councillors should for the future be conducted by ballot: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the said municipal council that from and after this bye-law shall have received the assent of His Excellency the Governor—

1. So much of the bye-law No. 13 as refers to the election of municipal councillors shall be, and the same is hereby repealed and that the following be substituted:—

2. At all public meetings of the ratepayers convened by the council or chairman for the election of councillors, the chairman, or in his absence the senior municipal councillor then present, shall preside, and (in case of an equality of votes) shall have a casting vote.

3. If at any election the chairman of the municipal council shall be a candidate for re-election, or shall be incapacitated from presiding at such election, either by illness, absence from the district, or any other cause, it shall be competent for him to appoint, by writing under his hand, a deputy for the purpose of carrying out such election. And it shall also be lawful for the chairman to appoint under his hand such and so many persons as may seem necessary to the council to act as deputy chairmen and poll clerks, and to appoint such and so many places within the municipal district as may seem to the council necessary to be the polling places.

4. If at any election a poll shall be demanded in the manner and form required by section 19 of the said Act, the chairman shall cause to be provided at the polling place or places a sufficient number of enclosed desks or compartments, each of which shall be provided with pens, ink and blotting paper, or with pencils, for the purpose of enabling the electors to secretly mark the ballot papers, as hereinafter provided. And the chairman shall also cause to be erected a barrier to divide the part of such room used for taking the poll from the other part thereof.

5. No person other than the chairman, deputy chairman, town clerk, poll clerk or clerks, the scrutineers, and the electors who shall for the time being be tendering their votes, shall be entitled to be at the polling side of the barrier; and any person other than such persons as aforesaid who shall intrude in such part of the room during the continuance of such poll, and being required by the presiding chairman to withdraw, shall refuse so to do, shall on conviction thereof before two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay a sum or penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds: provided always that it shall be lawful for the chairman or deputy chairman to summon to his assistance any member or members of the police force for the purpose of preserving the public peace, quelling any breach thereof that may have arisen, and for removing from within such barrier or from the polling room any person or persons who may in his opinion be obstructing the polling or wilfully violating any of the provisions of this bye-law or of the said Act.

6. The chairman shall cause to be printed and stamped with the municipal seal a sufficient number of voting papers in the form annexed, which he shall have in his own custody, and

shall deliver to each deputy chairman such number thereof as shall be sufficient for the number of ratepayers likely to poll at such polling place, taking a receipt for the exact number so delivered, and the chairman or deputy chairman shall write his initials on the back of every voting paper before it shall be delivered to any ratepayer about to vote, and upon the delivery of each ballot paper the chairman shall check or cause to be checked off upon a printed roll signed by the chairman, the voter's name, and such check shall be *prima facie* evidence of the identity of the elector whose name shall appear on the roll, and of the fact of his having voted at the election at which such ballot paper was delivered.

7. Each candidate shall be entitled to appoint by writing under his hand, to be delivered to the chairman at any time before Six o'clock in the evening preceding the polling day one scrutineer on his behalf in each polling room.

8. It shall be lawful for the presiding chairman, at the request of any candidate or scrutineer, to put to any person before he shall receive his voting paper the following questions only:—

1. What is your Christian and surname?
2. Are you of the age of twenty-one years?
3. Are you the person whose name appears on the ratepayers' roll numbered —?
4. Have you already voted at this election?

And if any person shall wilfully give a false answer to any of the questions aforesaid, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence within the meaning of this bye-law, and on being convicted thereof before any two or more justices of the peace, shall forfeit and pay a sum or penalty not exceeding Fifty pounds.

9. In case any candidate or ratepayer shall object to any person tendering his vote as provided by section 20 of the said Act, or in case the voting paper as of any person shall have been received, and any other person shall afterwards demand his voting paper as of the same person, the chairman or his deputy, when such person shall propose to deposit his voting paper in the ballot box, shall refuse to allow the same to be put therein, but shall receive and keep the same apart, and at the close of the election decide whether such person has already voted or not; and for the purpose of such decision it shall be lawful for the chairman of the council to take evidence on oath or affirmation, and such decision shall be final and conclusive on all parties; and if it shall appear to the chairman that such elector has not already voted, such vote shall be added to the numbers already polled, but if otherwise such vote shall not be allowed.

10. The chairman in each polling room shall be provided with a locked box (of which he shall keep the key), with a cleft or opening in such box capable of receiving the voting papers, and which box shall stand upon the table at which the chairman, poll clerk, and scrutineers shall preside; and each elector shall receive a voting paper in the form in the schedule hereto annexed, and shall thereupon retire alone to a desk or compartment provided for that purpose, and there strike out the name or names of such candidates as he does not intend to vote for, and deposit the same in the ballot box in the presence of the chairman, poll clerk, and such of the scrutineers as may be then present; and in case such elector shall be unable to read, or be blind, he shall signify the same to the chairman, who shall thereupon mark or strike out the names of such candidates as such elector shall designate. And no elector shall take out of such polling room any such voting paper,

either before or after he has marked the same. Any person wilfully infringing any of the provisions of this clause, or obstructing the polling by any unnecessary delay in performing any act within the polling room, shall be deemed guilty of an offence within the meaning of this bye-law, and on being convicted thereof before any two or more justices of the peace shall forfeit and pay a sum or penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds.

11. Every elector may vote for any number of candidates not exceeding the number of members to be chosen, and any ballot paper recording a greater number of votes shall be absolutely rejected at the close of the poll.

12. At the close of the poll the deputy chairman or chairmen shall bring the box or boxes containing the voting papers polled at his or their booth or booths to the chairman, who shall, as soon after as conveniently may be, in the presence of the poll clerks and scrutineers then present, count the number of votes polled for each candidate. And in the event of the numbers of votes being found to be equal for any two or more candidates, one or more of whom, but not all of such candidates, being by the state of the poll and the number of members to be elected entitled to be declared elected, the chairman shall, by a casting vote or votes, as the case may be, decide which of the candidates for whom the votes may be equal shall be elected. And the chairman shall then, in the presence of the scrutineers, seal up all the voting papers given out during the poll, together with the copy or copies of the ratepayers' roll used for marking off the voters' names, and the town clerk shall safely preserve them for at least six months amongst the records of the council.

13. Any person personating or attempting to personate an elector or deceased elector, or who shall vote a second time on the same day, shall, on conviction thereof before two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay a sum or penalty not exceeding Fifty pounds.

14. Neither the chairman, deputy chairman, poll clerk, scrutineers, or any other person shall attempt to ascertain for whom any elector shall have voted except as provided by clause 10 of this bye-law, or shall divulge the name or names of the candidate or candidates for whom such person shall have voted, except when required to do so by any court having competent jurisdiction, or directly or indirectly aid in the discovery of the same. Any breach of this clause shall subject the party so offending, on conviction thereof before two or more justices of the peace, to forfeit and pay a sum or penalty not exceeding Fifty pounds.

15. That all places within which the polling is conducted shall be deemed to be public places.

16. All expenses incurred by the chairman of the council in carrying into effect this bye-law shall be paid and discharged by the municipal council out of the rates or other corporate funds.

SIXTH HALF-YEARLY REPORT.

REPORT of the proceedings of the Municipal Council of Sandhurst for the half-year ending 10th January, 1859.

PUBLIC WORKS.

The works completed during the past half-year, or now in progress, are the formation of Oak street, Lily street, Forest street, Bernal street, Dowling street, Bayne street, and Arnold street; kerbing and channelling portions of Mitchell street, McCrae street, Lyttleton terrace, and Arnold street; flagging footpaths in Pall Mall; bridges over Commissioner's Gully and at the White Hills; tanks in View place and High street; additional lamps, with many other minor works, and the general maintenance of existing works.

The intention of the council, alluded to in last half-year's report, of providing a building suitable for public offices, municipal police court, &c., is being carried out by the erection of the town hall as designed by Mr. Fletcher, and which is now rapidly approaching completion.

BYE-LAWS PASSED.

- No. 15. For establishing vote by ballot.—Assented to.
- No. 16. For legalizing the rate and assessment.
- No. 17. For establishing additional polling places.
- No. 18. For legalizing the appropriation of the grant-in-aid received from Government.

FINANCE.

The assessment for 1858 comprises 2762 properties, giving a total annual value of £115,614, on which a rate of ninepence in the pound has been levied. The market and weighbridge dues for the past half-year have amounted to £642; the sum collected being in a great measure owing to the energy and application of the market inspector, Mr. Ryan.

MISCELLANEOUS.

In the absence of any regulation for the maintenance of the sludge channels (which had been constructed and maintained

with the £4000 before obtained from the Government by the council) to save the town and low auriferous lands from destruction, the council were obliged to undertake a constant heavy weekly expenditure in drainage works, trusting that the Government would refund the amount. It being found, however, at the outset that the Government refused to acknowledge any expenditure in excess of the £4000 before alluded to, a deputation was sent from the council, who succeeded in obtaining a promise from the Honorable the President of the Board of Land and Works that an expenditure of at least £50 a week until the Sludge Commission report was received, should be refunded. The total amount expended to the end of 1858, is £1589. This sum does not appear in the corporation account, as the council hope to recover the whole amount from the Government.

To bring the Botanic Garden reserve into use in the most economical manner, an agreement has been made with a practical gardener to lay out the ground, and plant and maintain any trees or shrubs the council may provide, in return for the use and occupation by himself of a portion of the ground as a market garden.


