## BEECHWORTH MINING DISTRICT.

BYE-LAWS.—[16th March, 1859.]

At a meeting of the mining board of the mining district of Beechworth, begun and holden at Beechworth, in the said district, on the 16th day of March, One thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, it is ordained by the said board as follows, that is to say:—

95. *Extent of ordinary claims.*—Bye-laws numbered 3, 4, and 75, shall be and the same are hereby repealed and annulled, and the following substituted in lieu thereof:—In ordinary claims the greatest extent of ground that may be occupied by one claimholder shall (except where bye-laws of the mining board otherwise provide) be to each claimholder eighty feet by eighty feet (80 ft. x 80 ft.), it being imperative upon the claimholder to keep constantly employed at least four men upon such claim where the full extent of claim is occupied, but where any less quantity is taken up the proportion of men engaged shall be in the scale following, viz.:—

Where one man only is employed, 40 feet by 40 feet.

Where two men only are employed, 40 feet by 80 feet.

Where three men only are employed, 60 feet by 80 feet.

Where four men are employed, 80 feet by 80 feet.

96. *Extent of claim in wet or flooded ground.*—Bye-law No. 5 shall be and the same is hereby annulled and repealed, and the following substituted in lieu thereof:—The extent of a claim in wet or flooded ground, other than in the beds of creeks or rivers, where the sinking shall not be over fifty feet, shall not exceed eighty yards square, it being imperative upon the claimholder to employ at least one man for every twenty (20) yards frontage comprised in such claim; the frontage to be taken to the creek or across the gully as the claim may happen to be situated.

97. *Extent of claim in old worked and abandoned ground.*—Bye-law No. 6 shall be and the same is hereby annulled and repealed, and the following substituted in lieu thereof:—In old worked and abandoned ground not actually on the bed of the creek, a claim not exceeding one hundred yards square may be occupied by each claimholder, the length or frontage to be taken parallel to the creek, it being imperative upon the claimholder to keep one man constantly employed upon the claim for every twenty-five (25) yards of frontage measurement.

98. *Extent of a surfacing claim.*—Bye-laws Nos. 9 and 55 shall be and the same are hereby annulled and repealed, and the following substituted in lieu thereof:—The extent of a surfacing claim shall not exceed sixty (60) yards in width by one hundred and sixty (160) yards back measurement, irrespective of depth of sinking, in the Yackandandah and Omeo divisions; in the Woolshed division the depth to be limited to five feet; and in the Three-mile, Nine-mile, and Spring Creek divisions, the depth to be limited to three feet; but in the Buckland division the claim shall be limited to eighty (80) yards in width, with sixty (60) yards back measurement, irrespective of depth of sinking; it being imperative upon the claimholder in all cases to keep employed at least one man for every twenty (20) yards of frontage width in the claim.

99. *Extended area of claim.*—Bye-law No. 16 shall be and the same is hereby annulled and repealed, and the following substituted:—Any person cutting an expensive tail race, or erecting expensive machinery for the purpose of working old or abandoned ground, shall be entitled to hold in reserve four entire claims, in addition to the claim he would be entitled to occupy under any bye-law, until such tail race be completed or such machinery be erected, when he shall be entitled finally to occupy the whole of such area, or any less portion thereof proportionate to the expense incurred on such tail race or machinery.

100. *Registration with the warden of claims other than ordinary and frontage claims.*—Bye-laws Nos. 18 and 20 shall be and the same are hereby annulled and repealed, and the following substituted in lieu thereof:—It shall be imperative upon all persons occupying any description of claim other than ordinary claims and frontage claims to register the same with the warden of the division in which such claim is situated; and in the event of any person in whose name a claim stands registered, except in ordinary and frontage claims, transferring his interest in such claim, it shall be imperative upon the person claiming under such transfer to register the same with the warden of the division, and in either case any person failing or neglecting so to do shall be deemed guilty of a breach of the bye-laws of the board.

101. *Tailings to be kept clear in water-channels.*—Bye-law No. 42 shall be and the same is hereby annulled and repealed, and the following substituted in lieu thereof:—Any person sluicing or gold washing in the bed of a creek or flood race, or the occupier of any tail race which runs into the bed of any creek or flood race, shall keep his tailings clear, so that the side springs of the creek as well as the rights of other parties may not be injured or interfered with.

102. *Extent of claim in bed of creek.*—Bye-law No. 54 shall be and the same is hereby annulled and repealed, and the following substituted in lieu thereof:—The extent of claim in the beds of creeks or rivers shall be to each claimholder one hundred yards in length by one hundred and fifty yards in width; but in places where the breadth of the creek may be less than one hundred and fifty yards, the breadth shall be taken to extend from bank to bank; it being imperative upon the claimholder in new and unworked ground to keep employed at least one man for every sixteen and two-thirds yards contained therein, and in old and abandoned ground at least one man for every twenty-five yards contained therein, except in the Buckland and Omeo divisions,

where it shall not be imperative to keep more than one man employed for every twenty-five yards contained in the claim, whether the same is on new or old and abandoned ground.

103. *Allowance of extra area to prospectors.*—Bye-laws Nos. 84 and 85 shall be and the same are hereby annulled and repealed, and the following substituted in lieu thereof:—Any person prospecting for a new lead, quartz reef, or other gold workings, shall be entitled to occupy in reserve, where practicable, areas of ground according to the following scale:—

Not exceeding 100 feet, 300 yards by 300 yards	
Feet.	Feet. Yards. Yards.
Exceeding 100 and not exceeding 200,	450 by 450
Exceeding 200 and not exceeding 300,	600 by 600
Exceeding 300 and not exceeding 400,	750 by 750
Exceeding 400 and not exceeding 500 and upwards,	900 yards by 900 yards

such occupation to hold good against all other persons until a discovery has been made and reported and a prospect claim laid off, or until the claim shall have been forfeited or abandoned. After such claim shall have been bottomed and the lead or other workings shall have been discovered, the person discovering the same shall be entitled finally to occupy four times as large an area of ground as the bye-law having reference to such particular workings permits one claimholder to occupy, except in quartz reefs, where the discoverer shall be only entitled to twice as large an area as he would otherwise be entitled to occupy.

104. *Where gauge may be placed in Buckland and Omeo divisions.*—In the Buckland and Omeo divisions it shall be permitted to the occupiers of races to fix the gauge box in the race at any convenient distance below the spot where the race receives its last supply, provided always that in so doing no existing right is in any way prejudicially affected.

105. *Claimholder may absent himself from claim when same is fairly opened.*—Where any claim shall have been fairly opened and in working order, the claimholder, or any representative of any part thereof, may absent himself for any time not exceeding forty-eight (48) hours, by posting a notice to that effect on the claim; but should he or they wish to absent themselves longer, the claimholder must obtain a written permission from the warden; the time to be specified on such permission, and copy thereof posted on such claim during absence.

106. *Occupation of claims under frontage system.*—All claims in new alluvial ground, other than in the beds of creeks or rivers, where the depth of sinking exceeds fifty feet, shall be occupied under a frontage system, namely, a specified distance along the supposed course of the lead, and an indefinite width across such lead until the course of the lead shall have been determined within the claim.

107. *Occupant of frontage must mark out and register claim.*—On the occupation of a frontage claim it shall be imperative upon the claimholder immediately to mark out the frontage measurement thereof by firmly fixing two pegs, one at each extremity of the measurement; such measurement to be subject to adjustment by the surveyor appointed for the division. All claims to be registered with the surveyor within twenty-four hours of occupation.

108. *Duties of the surveyor with respect to frontage claims.*—It shall be the duty of the mining surveyor appointed for the division in which the lead is situated to register all frontage claims, define the frontage measurement upon occupation, alter and vary the metes and bounds of frontage claims where rendered necessary by the course of the lead, and finally to determine the bounds of each claim as the course of the lead becomes defined.

109. *Days on which the surveyor shall attend on the ground.*—The mining surveyor shall appoint by public notice in writing, conspicuously posted at his office, at least two days in each week on which he shall attend upon the ground to mark out the frontage measurements of claims which may have been registered at his office during the time intervening between each day so appointed.

110. *Notice to surveyor of lead having been struck.*—Immediately upon the lead being struck in any frontage claim, it shall be imperative upon the person in whose name the claim stands registered, without any unnecessary delay, to give notice thereof in writing to the surveyor appointed for the division, who shall thereupon finally determine the boundaries of such claim in accordance with the frontage rules.

111. *When claims may be occupied adjoining to frontage claims.*—Immediately upon the boundaries of a frontage claim being finally determined by the surveyor, claims may be occupied on either side of such frontage claim, of the same dimensions and subject to the same conditions as finally determined adjoining frontage claims.

112. *Limitation of width of frontage claim.*—Upon the course of the lead in any frontage claim being determined, the width of such claim shall be taken as limited to twice the length of the frontage allowed to the claim.

113. *Extent of frontage that may be occupied.*—The extent of frontage measurement that may be occupied by each claimholder shall be on the course of the lead. In ordinary workings, where the prospect shaft exceeds fifty feet in depth, a measurement of sixty feet along the supposed course of the lead, and for every ten additional feet of sinking over fifty feet in the prospect shaft, three feet additional length of frontage measurement may be occupied. In wet or flooded ground, where the prospect shaft exceeds fifty feet in depth, a measurement of ninety feet along the supposed course of the lead, and for every additional ten feet depth of sinking in the prospect shaft over

fifty feet, an additional four and a half feet of frontage measurement may be occupied. It being imperative upon the claimholder in either description of ground to keep four men constantly employed upon the claim.

114. *Additional measurement down the lead.*—Commencing at and measuring from the prospect claim in the direction of the dip or down the lead, each claimholder shall be entitled to occupy an additional foot of frontage measurement in excess of the claim immediately preceding him.

115. *Surface measurement to determine measurement of lead beneath.*—The surface measurement of any claim shall be taken to cover or include any length of gutter or lead within the claim in excess of such surface measurement.

116. *Notice of transfer of interest to be given to surveyor.*—In the event of the person in whose name any frontage claim is registered transferring his interest in such claim, notice of such transfer having been made shall at once be given to the surveyor of the division in which such claim is situated by the person claiming under such transfer; and any person failing or neglecting so to do shall be deemed guilty of a breach of bye-law of the mining board.

117. *Power to occupy under subsequent bye-laws.*—All persons who may have occupied claims under any bye-law then in force, shall be permitted to occupy and work their claims with the same number of men in proportion to the size of claim as would be necessary to hold the same extent of ground under any subsequent bye-law.

118. *Right of entry upon claim given to the surveyor.*—It shall be imperative upon the claimholder in all cases when required to permit the mining surveyor or his agents and assistants to enter upon the claim, descend and examine the shaft, and measure off the workings, and shall when required thereto by the surveyor render him all reasonable assistance in so doing; and any claimholder declining or refusing to comply with the spirit of the bye-law, or in any way obstructing the surveyor in the discharge of his duties, shall be deemed guilty of a breach of the bye-laws of the mining board.

119. *Duty of surveyor to register transfers and amalgamations, and fees chargeable thereon.*—It shall be the duty of the mining surveyor to receive and register all notices of transfers and notices of amalgamation of frontage claims situated within the division for which he may be appointed, and he shall be entitled to demand and receive a fee of Two shillings and sixpence upon every such registration.

120. *Duty of surveyor to register claims under the frontage system, and fees chargeable thereon.*—Upon the registration of a frontage claim the surveyor shall be entitled to receive from the person registering the claim the sum of Ten shillings by way of fee, but no further payment shall be demanded or received for measuring out, altering, varying, or finally determining the bounds of the claim.

121. *How frontage system is to be applied in certain cases.*—Where the sinking in any claim in alluvial ground not previously occupied under the frontage system shall exceed fifty feet in depth, notice thereof shall be given to the surveyor by the occupier of such claim, and should the surveyor find that a series of five (5) consecutive shafts running in the same direction exceed the depth of fifty feet, and indicate a continuous dip, he shall proclaim a lead in that direction, and all new ground in that direction shall be taken up under the frontage system, the centre shaft of the five before-mentioned shafts to constitute the prospect shaft for the purpose of defining the length of such frontage claim.

Immediately upon the depth of sinking being found to exceed fifty feet upon any lead which has had its source in workings where the depth of sinking was less than fifty feet, the surveyor shall, commencing at the prospect shaft, namely, the first shaft in excess of fifty feet in depth, mark off parallels in accordance with the frontage regulations, and the block claim (if any) which was first occupied within each parallel shall be entitled to all the spare ground within such parallel, subject to the rights of block claimholders already in occupation; but should any block claim happen to be situated upon the boundary line of two parallels, it shall be deemed for the purposes of this bye-law to be within the parallel nearest to the prospect shaft.

The undersigned members of the said mining board concurred in making the foregoing bye-laws.

He wore, when last seen, a white under-flannel, moleskin trousers, and black felt hat.

It has been ascertained that he came to this colony from California, and is also known by the name of George Carpenter. He stated, sometime prior to the murder, that he had been barman at the United States Hotel, Ballarat, for eighteen months, and was formerly in the employment of a Mr. Young, at the Barrabool Hills.

He was last seen leaving the hut where the murder was committed on the morning of the 16th of February, and is believed to have proceeded towards the coast with the intention of escaping by sea.

FOOTSCRAY PETITION.

IN pursuance of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of a petition addressed to His Excellency as hereinafter set forth, signed by one hundred and seventy-two householders, resident at and near Footscray, in the county of Bourke, praying for the erection of their locality into a municipal district.

The petitioners state that they are all householders within the meaning of the Act above referred to, and resident within the area hereinafter described; that such area is less than nine square miles, that no one point therein is distant six miles from any other point, and that it contains the number of householders required by the said Act.

## MALDON MUNICIPALITY.

## FIRST HALF-YEARLY REPORT OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF MALDON.

IN pursuance of the Act 18 Victoria No. 15, clause 43, the Municipal Council of Maldon makes the following report of its proceedings for the half-year ending 10th March, 1859.

On the 10th September, 1858, the council held its first meeting, at which the whole of the members were present. Councillors Wright and Cooper were nominated as candidates for the chair, and on the votes being taken, the result was, that councillor Wright was elected and declared to be the chairman for the ensuing year.

The council at the same meeting appointed the following committees for the year, all the members of the council being placed on each committee:—

Finance Committee.	Legislative Committee.
Public Works Committee.	Rate Committee.

The council, on the 17th September last, appointed Mr. Young as town clerk, at a salary of £200 per annum, who acted as such until the 24th November, when, on his resignation, Mr. Bailey was appointed to the joint offices of town clerk, municipal inspector and rate collector, at a salary of £300 per annum.

The council also appointed a town surveyor at a salary of £100 (since increased to £200) per annum; and an inspector of nuisances at £30 per annum.

## BYE-LAWS.

The following bye-laws have been approved of by His Excellency the Governor, and are now in operation, namely:—

1. For standing orders.
2. To enforce the cleansing of chimney flues.
3. To prevent the nuisance arising from cattle wandering in the streets.
4. To prevent the erection of tents in the principal streets in the township.
5. For an assessment on the annual value of property for the year ending 10th September, 1859.
6. To impose a rate of One shilling and sixpence in the pound for the current year ending 10th September, 1859.
7. For the prevention of nuisances arising from the deposit of offensive matters in any street or public place.
8. For conducting public meetings and elections.
9. For the control over and cleansing of places used for slaughtering small animals.
10. To compel persons keeping swine to pave or flag their swine styes.

And the following bye-laws have been made by the council, but have not yet received the assent of His Excellency:—

11. To prevent the erection of calico buildings in certain parts of the district.
12. For the expenditure of the sum of £1000, grant-in-aid for 1858.

The council has also passed a code of regulations for the

management of the General Cemetery, but the same has not yet been approved of.

## DEPUTATIONS.

There has been four deputations appointed by the council during the past half-year.

First.—To wait upon the Government with respect to a portion of the grant for 1858 being paid as early as possible. The sum of £1000 was at once granted and paid into the bank.

Second.—A deputation to wait upon the Honorable the Chief Secretary, at Maryborough, during his tour, in September last, for the purpose of inducing him to visit Maldon, when he stated that his engagements would not allow him to do so at present, but that he would endeavor to make an early visit, and that in the meantime he would give every attention to any representation in writing forwarded by the council.

Third.—A deputation to meet the municipal council of Dunolly with respect to making a direct road through Maldon to that place. This matter still remains in abeyance.

Fourth.—A deputation to Melbourne to wait upon the heads of government departments, to represent the requirements of the district, more especially with respect to the appropriation of £4200 for making the main road through the township. Owing to the application being made at so late a period in the session, it was refused, but a promise was given that the amount should be included in the next estimates.

## WATER SUPPLY.

Owing to the serious inconvenience arising from the want of water, the question of a permanent water supply has employed much of the attention of the council. Advertisements offering a premium for the best mode of obtaining water were issued, but as no plan sent in was considered to meet the requirements of the district, the amount has not been awarded. Many places have been visited, and the quantity of water obtainable in twenty-four hours tested, but without arriving at any satisfactory result. The council has therefore concluded to wait until some step shall be taken by the Government with respect to a supply of water for the gold fields generally. The council, however, hopes to obtain an available supply of water in case of fire in the meantime.
