MAURITIUS DECLARED INFECTED.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS information has been received by the Government that the disease called the Small Pox is prevalent in the island of Mauritius: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, in exercise of the power vested in me in this behalf, do, with the advice of the Executive Council, by this my Proclamation, notify that the island of Mauritius is infected with the disease called Small Pox, and that it is probable such disease may be brought from the said place to this colony: And with the advice aforesaid I do order and direct that no ships or vessels arriving in Port Phillip Bay from or having touched at Mauritius aforesaid shall be permitted to proceed to their destinations in Port Phillip Bay aforesaid; and that no person or persons shall be allowed to land from such ships or vessels until the permission of the Health Officer at the Heads shall have been first duly obtained.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this fourteenth day of April, in the year of Our Lord One thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, and in the twenty-second year of Her Majesty's Reign.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the fifteenth year of the Reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act to make provision for the better administration of Justice in the colony of Victoria*, it is lawful for the Governor, by any orders to be by him, with the advice of the Executive Council, from time to time made and proclaimed, to define the times at which Circuit Courts shall be holden, and the said times to alter and vary as he shall, with the advice aforesaid, deem necessary: And whereas it is expedient to alter the time at which the next Circuit Court for Portland has been directed to be holden: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order direct that the time appointed for holding the next Circuit Court at Portland shall be postponed as follows, that is to say:—From Saturday, the twenty-third day of April instant, to Wednesday, the twenty-seventh day of April instant.

And the Honorable Henry Samuel Chapman, Her Majesty's Attorney General for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

MINING DISTRICTS OF MARYBOROUGH AND ARARAT ALTERED.

At the Government House, Melbourne, the fourth day of April, 1859.

PRESENT:

His Excellency the Governor

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the twenty-first year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act for amending the Laws relative to the Gold Fields*, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time to erect any portion of the colony into a mining district, and to give to such district some distinguishing name, and to define the limits and boundaries thereof, and also again to abolish any such district, and from time to time to alter and vary such limits and boundaries: And whereas by an Order of the Governor in Council, bearing date the fourth day January, in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, the several districts therein mentioned were erected into mining districts: And whereas it is deemed expedient to alter the limits of the mining districts of Maryborough and Ararat: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order alter and vary the mining districts of Maryborough and Ararat, and doth define the limits and boundaries thereof respectively as follows, that is to say:—

THE MINING DISTRICT OF MARYBOROUGH.—Commencing at a point on the River Loddon due east of the southern shores of Lake Hindmarsh; thence by a line bearing west to the Yarriambiack Creek; thence southwards by the Yarriambiack Creek to the bifurcations of the Wimmera; thence eastwards by the main road to the town of Navarre; thence by the southern boundary of the town reserve of Navarre and a line east to the Dividing Range separating the waters flowing to the Wimmera and the Avoca; thence southwards by that range and the Pyrenees Range to the Main Dividing Range; thence by the Main Dividing Range to the source of the Mount Greenock Creek; thence northwards by the Mount Greenock Creek, and thence by a line east to the junction of the Bullarook and Tullaroop Creeks; thence northwards by the Deep Creek to the parish of Carisbrook; thence by the southern, eastern, and northern boundaries of that parish, and again by the Deep Creek to the River Loddon; and thence northwards by the River Loddon to the commencing point aforesaid.

THE MINING DISTRICT OF ARARAT.—Commencing at the bifurcation of the River Wimmera; thence by the River Wimmera and a line south-west to Brigg's Bluff; thence by the Grampians and the Serra Range to the southern boundary of the county of Ripon; thence eastwards by that boundary to the Emu Creek; thence northward by the Emu Creek to the Main Dividing Range; thence westward by the Main Dividing Range to the Pyrenees Range; thence northwards by the Pyrenees Range and the range dividing the waters flowing to the River Wimmera and the River Avoca to a point due east of the southern boundary of the town of Navarre; thence west to that boundary; thence by that boundary to the main road leading to the Wimmera; and thence westerly by that road to the commencing point.

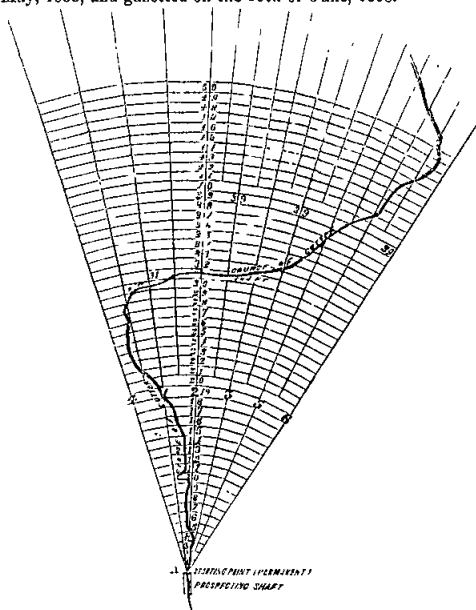
BALLAARAT MINING DISTRICT.
No. VIII. BYE-LAW.—[14th February, 1859.]

At a meeting of the mining board of the mining district of Ballaarat, begun and holden at Ballaarat, in the said district, on the 14th day of February, One thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, it is ordained by the said board as follows, that is to say:—

That the plan marked A, referred to in section 3 of bye-law No. III. of the mining board of Ballaarat means and shall be interpreted to mean the plan previously registered in the local court of Ballaarat, and now duly registered and in the possession of the aforesaid mining board; and such plan shall be considered to have been in effect from the date of its registration in the aforesaid local court.

PLAN A.

Referred to in the local court rule No. 3 of the district of Ballaarat, gazetted on the 14th of December, 1857; and also referred to in section 3 of bye-law No. 3 of the mining board of Ballaarat, passed by the said board on the 14th day of May, 1858, and gazetted on the 15th of June, 1858.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the eighteenth year of the
reign of Her present Majesty (Number 14), intitled,
*An Act to provide for the Management of Towns and other places
in Victoria*, it was amongst other things enacted, that so many
of the provisions of the said Act as relate to the good order of
towns and other populous places, being sections numbered V.,
VI., VII., VIII., IX. and X., in the said Act, should extend to
and be in force in such cities, towns, districts and places as
the Lieutenant Governor might by Proclamation in the *Government
Gazette* declare to come under the operation of the same
respectively, or any of them, and it should be lawful for the
Lieutenant Governor to define the limits of such places, and to
vary and alter such limits and revoke any such Proclamation;
and all the other provisions of the said Act except the last
(being numbered XXXIX.) should extend to and be in operation
throughout Victoria and its dependencies from and after the
passing thereof: Now I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor
of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby
declare that the township of Gisborne, in the county of Bourke,
the limits whereof are hereinafter defined, shall come under the
operation of the sections of the said Act numbered respectively
V., VI., VII., VIII., IX. and X.

And I do hereby define the limits of the said township of
Gisborne to be the following, viz.:—Commencing at the south-
east corner of the Police Office Reserve, and bounded on the
south by Howey street, bearing west eighty chains; on the
west by a line bearing north eighty chains; on the north by a
line bearing east eighty chains, and on the east by a line bearing
south eighty chains to the commencing point.

MUNICIPALITY OF BALLAARAT EAST.

BYE-LAW No. 19.—FOR THE REGULATION OF SHADES OR AWNINGS OVER OR ACROSS THE PUBLIC FOOTPATHS WITHIN THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF BALLAARAT EAST.

WHEREAS it is expedient to regulate and control the erection of shades or awnings over, across, or adjoining the public footpaths in the fronts of shops, dwelling-houses, or other premises within the municipality of Ballaarat East, so as to prevent such erections becoming public nuisances: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the council of the municipal district of Ballaarat East, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor, pursuant to 18 Victoria No. 15, sec. 33, &c., any person or persons who shall erect, or cause to be erected, any shade or awning over or across any public footpath within the municipality, without having first obtained in writing the consent of the said municipal council to such erection, shall, on conviction thereof before two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay for every such offence a sum not exceeding Ten pounds.

And be it further ordered and directed by the authority aforesaid, that every such shade or awning, when such consent to the erection of the same shall have been obtained, shall be erected with the upright post or pillars thereof immediately at the outside of the kerbstone or other boundary of the footpath in front of any shop, dwelling-house, or other premises to which such shade or awning shall be attached; and that no plate, rafter, or tie of any such shade or awning shall be of a less height above the surface of such path than nine feet at least in the clear to the underside of such plate, rafter, or tie.

And be it further ordered and directed that it shall be lawful for the said council to direct and require the removal of any shade or awning erected across, over, or adjoining any public footpath within the said municipality, except the same be in strict accordance with the foregoing directions, whether such shade or awning shall have been erected prior to the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor, or subsequently thereto: And it shall be further lawful for the said council to give notice to remove any such shade or awning, by means of the surveyor or other officer of such council, to any owner or occupier by whom or for whom such shade or awning shall have been erected; and any such owner or occupier who shall refuse or neglect to remove such shade or awning within seven days from the time of such

notice of removal being given, shall, on conviction thereof before any two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay for every such offence, refusal, or neglect, a sum not exceeding Ten pounds.

MUNICIPALITY OF BRUNSWICK.

BYE-LAW No. 11.—FOR DETERMINING THE VALIDITY OF DISPUTED ELECTIONS IN RETURNING MEMBERS TO SERVE IN THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF BRUNSWICK.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council in any municipal district has the power to regulate their own elections: Be it therefore ordered and enacted by the municipal council of Brunswick, with the consent of His Excellency the Governor:—

1. That the proper authority for determining the validity of any disputed election shall be a committee of the whole council (the member or members whose election is disputed excepted), three to form a quorum, at which the chairman of the council, or if he be absent the senior councillor present, shall preside, and in all cases of equality of votes shall, besides his own, have a casting vote.

2. The committee shall meet in the council chamber on days not appointed for the holding of council meetings, and be attended by the town clerk, who shall record the minutes of every such meeting.

3. The chairman of his own authority may, or on the written request of three members to him to that effect shall, convene meetings of committees of elections, &c.

4. The committee shall have power to regulate their proceedings and to adjourn their meetings, which shall be held with open doors, unless during special deliberations.

5. The Ratepayers' Roll shall be assumed to be correct, and the committee shall enquire into the identity of the electors, and whether the votes were *bona fide*; if proved to the satisfaction of the committee that persons by fraud, force, menace, or undue influence by or on the part of any candidate or his agent gave their votes, such votes shall be struck off.

6. All petitions presented to the council against the validity of any election shall, on being received, be referred to the committee aforesaid, and such committee shall be summoned on as early a day as convenient afterwards, and shall take the allegations of such petition into consideration, receiving evidence thereon if necessary, and determine accordingly.

7. The acts of authorised agents shall be regarded as those of the principal, if it be proved to the satisfaction of the committee that they were performed with his knowledge, power, or consent.

8. The person determined by the committee to be duly elected, shall be declared so to be by the chairman, or a new election may be appointed by the same authority, the former being declared null and void.

9. All petitions complaining of an undue election must be signed by a candidate, or by not less than six ratepayers, and be presented within seven days after the election complained of.

BYE-LAW No. 6.—FOR THE SUPPRESSION OF THE NUISANCE ARISING FROM GOATS AND PIGS BEING ALLOWED TO GO AT LARGE WITHIN THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF CRESWICK.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is authorised to make bye-laws for the suppression of nuisances, &c.: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council of Creswick, that from and after the date of this bye-law coming into operation, it shall not be lawful for the owner of any goat or pig to allow the same to be at large in any street or public place, or in any unenclosed place, within this municipality, whether the same be or not public property; and any person or persons who shall so offend shall, on conviction before two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay for every such offence a sum not exceeding Forty shillings (40s.)

WHEREAS by Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is empowered to pass bye-laws for the general good thereof, &c.: Be it therefore ordered and enacted by the municipal council of Maldon, that it shall not hereafter be lawful for any roof or other exterior covering of canvas, duck, drill, calico, or any such material, to be placed upon or on the outside of any buildings that may hereafter be erected within the boundaries hereinafter set forth, namely:—From a point commencing at the Cumberland Hotel, High street, to the Tarrangower Hotel in High street aforesaid; and from the junction of the road in High street aforesaid, to the Bee Hive Store, Eagle Hawk, nor in Fountain street, nor Chapel street, all in the said municipality, unless such building or erection shall stand and be twenty clear feet apart from any dwelling-house, store, or other building whatsoever: And any person who shall infringe upon the provisions of this bye-law shall, on conviction thereof, before two or more justices of the peace acting in and for the said district, forfeit and pay a penalty or sum not exceeding Twenty pounds.

The foregoing By-law, No. 11, made by the municipal council of Maldon, has been assented to by His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council.

FITZ ROY PETITION FOR EXTENSION.

IN pursuance of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of a petition addressed to His Excellency as hereinafter set forth, signed by two hundred and ninety-nine inhabitants of the municipal district of Fitz Roy, in the county of Bourke, praying for the annexation of a contiguous locality to the said municipal district.

The petitioners state that they are desirous that the northern boundary of the municipal district should be extended so as to include the triangular portion of land embraced by the Heidelberg road, Smith street, and Reilly street.

They are of opinion that the portion of the Heidelberg road extending from the north end of Brunswick street to the north end of Smith street is the natural boundary of the district on the north, inasmuch as all the leading streets east of Brunswick street are continued to and terminate thereon. But the present boundary line extending along Reilly street deprives the municipal authorities of the power to construct, repair, or control the continuations of those streets that extend in a northerly direction towards the Heidelberg road, and hence these continuations of the leading thoroughfares of the district will be neglected to its manifest injury.

They are also of opinion that the city corporation can lay no just claim to the portion of land sought to be annexed, inasmuch as the expenses incurred in laying out and forming the portions of the streets that intersect it were duly credited to them in the adjustment of amounts at the period of separation.

And the petitioners pray as follows:—

"Your memorialists therefore pray that your Excellency will be pleased to proclaim the northern boundary of this municipality as follows—from a point where the centre of Reilly street intersects the centre of Nicholson street, along the centre of Reilly street to Brunswick street; thence in a north-easterly direction along the south-eastern side of the Heidelberg road to Smith street, and along the centre of Smith street to the present boundary line."

The petitioners state that they are all householders resident in and around the township of Buninyong, and within the district proposed to be erected into a municipality.

That a public meeting was held on the 7th of March last, whereat a resolution was passed to the effect that the meeting was of opinion that the establishment of a municipal council would be beneficial to the township and the district in general.

That the township of Buninyong is the oldest inland township in the western district, and the proposed municipal district contains a population of about 5000.

That there is within the proposed district a considerable quantity of land under cultivation, and that extensive mining operations of a permanent character are being carried on therein and in the neighborhood.

That within Buninyong division of the mining district there are 40 engines employed in mining, 78 puddling machines, 4 steam quartz-crushing machines, and 40 whims, besides 4 steam saw-mills, and fellmongery and other works.
