SECTIONS V. TO X. OF THE TOWN AND COUNTRY POLICE ACT EXTENDED TO THE TOWNSHIP OF CHILTERN.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Sir HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the eighteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty (Number 14), intituled, *An Act to provide for the Management of Towns and other places in Victoria*, it was amongst other things enacted, that so many of the provisions of the said Act as relate to the good order of towns and other populous places, being sections numbered V., VI., VII., VIII., IX. and X., in the said Act, should extend to and be in force in such cities, towns, districts and places as the Lieutenant Governor might by proclamation in the *Government Gazette* declare to come under the operation of the same respectively, or any of them; and it should be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor to define the limits of such places, and to vary and alter such limits and revoke any such Proclamation; and all the other provisions of the said Act except the last (being numbered XXXIX.) should extend to and be in operation throughout Victoria and its dependencies from and after the passing thereof: Now I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby declare that the township of Chiltern, the limits whereof are hereinafter defined, shall come under the operation of the sections of the said Act numbered respectively V., VI., VII., VIII., IX. and X.

And I do hereby define the limits of the said township of Chiltern in manner following, viz.:—County unnamed, parish of Chiltern, on the Black Dog Creek, Murray District: Commencing at a point on the east boundary of the township reserve, bearing east forty chains from the bridge over the Black Dog Creek; bounded on part of the east by a line bearing north forty chains; on the north by a line bearing west eighty chains; on the west by a line bearing south eighty chains, crossing the Black Dog Creek; on the south by a line bearing east eighty chains, again crossing the Black Dog Creek; and on the remainder of the east by a line bearing north forty chains, crossing the Dry Creek, to the point of commencement.

PUBLIC ROAD FROM WHITTLESEA TOWARDS MOUNT DISAPPOINTMENT.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Sir HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by a Proclamation under the hand of the Governor and the seal of the colony, bearing date the twelfth day of March in the present year, and also by a Notification bearing the same date, a common and public highway leading from Whittlesea towards King Parrot Creek, was created in the direction therein described: And whereas it is deemed expedient to amend the description of the said highway: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby revoke the description of the said highway or road contained in the said Proclamation and Notification; and with the advice aforesaid I do hereby order and proclaim that there shall be a common and public highway or road in the direction hereinafter described for all the liege subjects of Her Majesty to go, return, pass and repass, on foot and on horseback, and with horses, carts, and carriages, every year, at all times of the year, at their free will and pleasure, that is to say:—

AMENDED DESCRIPTION OF THE ROAD (ONE CHAIN WIDE) LEADING FROM WHITTLESEA TOWARDS MOUNT DISAPPOINTMENT, PASSING THROUGH SECTIONS 5 AND 12 IN THE PARISH OF TOOROURONG:—Commencing at a point on the north boundary of the town reserve of Whittlesea, bearing west seven chains eighty-three links, more or less, from the east side of Mason street; thence north 17 degrees 45 minutes east seven chains sixty-nine links; thence north 19 degrees 45 minutes east ten chains fifty links; thence north 33 degrees 10 minutes east twenty-eight chains fifty links; thence north 45 degrees 46 minutes east ten chains fifty-three links; thence north 46 degrees 39 minutes 12 seconds east fifty-six chains sixteen links; thence north 39 degrees east five chains thirteen links; thence north 50 degrees 40 minutes east two chains sixty-five links; thence north 60 degrees 40 minutes east four chains fifty-one links; thence north 21 degrees east seventeen chains two links; thence north 17 degrees 50 minutes east, until it intersects the eastern boundary of portion 12. The above distances refer to the centre of the road.

PETITION UNDER THE MUNICIPAL ACT.

CLUNES.

IN pursuance of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of a petition addressed to His Excellency as hereinafter set forth, signed by one hundred and fifty-nine householders of the township of Clunes, praying for the erection of their locality into a municipal district.

The petitioners state that mining operations of an extensive and permanent character are now being carried on in the township by large companies, involving a great outlay of capital and employing a large population, and that the most efficient quartz crushing works in the colony are located there.

That the dwellings of the inhabitants are of a substantial character, and have been erected at considerable cost.

That there is also much land under cultivation in the immediate neighborhood.

That no provision exists for the formation and maintenance of the roads and streets in the township, which consequently are sometimes nearly impassable, and over which very heavy machinery and merchandise have to be carried at great risk and expense.

That the creation of the district into a municipality will tend greatly to advance its interests and materially aid its improvement and good government.

The petitioners suggest the following municipal area, viz.:—Commencing at a point 120 chains south of the south-east corner of the post office reserve, by a line running west 120 chains; thence north 240 chains; thence east 240 chains; thence south 240 chains; thence west 120 chains to the commencing point; such area containing a population of more than three hundred householders, and not exceeding nine square miles, wherein no point is distant more than six miles from any other point.

And the petitioners pray as follows:—

"Your petitioners therefore humbly beseech your Excellency that the district so defined may be proclaimed a municipality, under the name of 'The Municipal District of Clunes,' according to the provisions of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15."

**GLENLYON DISTRICT ROAD BOARD.
RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE GLENLYON DISTRICT
ROAD BOARD.**

THE board meetings may at all times be attended by the inhabitants and ratepayers of the district, but no individual except the members will be allowed to take any part whatever in the business; and any person interrupting the proceedings shall be requested by the chairman to retire.

2. The order of business shall be—

- 1st. The minutes of last meeting read and confirmed, but no discussion upon them allowed except as to their accuracy.
- 2nd. Any correspondence with the board shall be read, petitions or reports handed in, but no discussion upon either shall be permitted until due notice has been given. They may, however, be read, and the member presenting them shall, if he so wishes, call for their consideration after the motions given notice of at last meeting are disposed of.
- 3rd. The chairman may then bring before the board any business he may consider necessary, after which any member of the board may do the same in the form of notice of motion. No such motion, however, shall be decided at any meeting of the board unless the same has been placed in the hands of each member at least four clear days before such meeting.
- 4th. The business, notice of which was entered upon the notice paper of the last meeting, shall then be called on in their order upon the list, none of which, however, can be proceeded with in the absence of the mover unless some other member has a written authority from such mover to take it up. Notices not so proceeded with shall be struck out.
3. Every communication addressed to the board shall be in proper form, and presented by one of its members or by the secretary, who shall be responsible for its being respectfully worded.
4. No report handed in by any committee appointed by the board shall be considered or adopted on its presentation, nor till due notice shall be given; all such reports shall be read and received *pro forma*, and then lie upon the table for the perusal of the board, and if in the report so given there are distinct recommendations contained, such report shall only be adopted by the sense of the board being taken separately on each.
5. No bye-law shall be finally passed or adopted at the meeting at which it is first proposed, nor until the next meeting of the board regularly convened, and every such bye-law shall in the interim be fixed up in the office for the inspection of any of the ratepayers.
6. The mover of any motion which may be referred to a committee shall be, if he so choose, a member of such committee.
7. It shall be the duty of the secretary to give notice to any member of the board that may be absent from any meeting of the board, the date fixed for the next meeting, and also to state the nature of the business to be then brought forward.

ORDER OF DEBATE.

1. Any member when proposing a motion or amendment, or discussing any matter, must address the chairman, and no member shall be interrupted except by a call to order. The member calling to order shall then be heard, and the question decided before the subject is resumed or any other business called on.
2. No member shall speak twice on the same question except by way of explanation, or in reply, as the mover of an original motion, and upon such explanation or reply the question shall be put to the vote.
3. The presiding chairman's decision shall be final on all questions of order and practice, and he shall state the same without comment or argument.
4. Any member making a motion or amendment shall put it forth, sign, and deliver it to the secretary, who shall add thereto the name of the seconder; and no motion or amendment shall be withdrawn without the leave of the mover.
5. Any member desirous of proposing either an original motion or amendment must state the nature of such motion or amendment before addressing the board in support thereof.
6. No motion or amendment shall be entertained or discussed unless it be seconded; any member may, however, require the enforcement of any standing order of the board by simply noticing that such is disobeyed.
7. If two or more members rise to speak at the same time the chairman shall decide which is entitled to pre-audience.
8. No member shall digress from the subject under discussion, or impute improper motives to others, and all personal reflections upon any member shall be considered highly disorderly.
9. Any member who shall use expressions capable of being applied offensively to any other member, shall, if required by the board, withdraw such expression and make a satisfactory apology to the board.
10. Any member may of right require the production of any documents of the board relating to the question or matter of discussion.
11. The chairman or any other member of the board shall stand up when addressing the board in discussing of any question.
12. One amendment only shall be discussed at one time, but if lost, another may be moved before the original motion is put to the vote.
13. Upon the adoption of any amendment by the board, such amendment shall be held to have quashed the original motion, and for all purposes of subsequent discussion the amendment so carried shall be acted upon as an original motion.
14. The board in all cases shall vote by show of hands.
15. The chairman shall in taking the vote on any motion or amendment, put the question first in the affirmative and then in the negative, and he may do so as often as is necessary to enable him to declare from the show of hands which party has the majority.

16. No discussion will be allowed on any motion for the adjournment of the board, but if on the question being put and lost, the subject then under consideration, or the next on the notice paper, shall be discussed before any subsequent motion for adjournment shall be entertained; but if the motion for adjournment be carried, the business then undisposed of shall have precedence at the next meeting of the board.

17. No motion the effect of which if carried would be to rescind any motion which has already passed the board shall be entertained during the same year, unless a call of the whole board has been made for that purpose; and no such motion for rescinding any resolution of the board which shall have been negatived by the board, shall be again entertained during the same year.

18. No election to any office at the disposal of the board shall take place until six clear days' public notice shall have been given by advertisement in one or more of the local newspapers, inviting applications from candidates properly qualified.

19. The salary or allowance attached to all offices and places at the disposal of the board shall be fixed in all cases before proceeding to the election.

20. The security that shall be accepted for any officer of the board shall be that of the Guarantee Society, Melbourne.

RELATING TO CONTRACTS.

1. No member shall be allowed to contract directly or indirectly, or be received as security for any officer or contractor, nor shall any auditor or other officer become surety for any other employé of the member, or for any work to be done for the board; and if any member shall contract indirectly, satisfactory proof of the same being made to the board, the contract or contracts so made shall, on the motion of any member, be rescinded, and of no effect; and in all cases where security shall be required, the expense of preparing the same shall be borne by the party giving the same.

2. All contracts shall be made by tender, advertised not less than twice in the two nearest local papers, each tender to be deposited in the tender box, addressed to the chairman, and such tender only be opened at the time of their consideration by the board, and the contractor may also be present; the respective amounts, together with the names of the parties tendering, to be entered in the minutes of the board; and when tenders are accepted a contract bond shall be entered into and signed by the contractor and the chairman of the board, the seal of the board being attached thereto.

3. The security in all cases of contracts shall be Ten pounds per cent. upon the amount of the contract, paid over by the contractor to the chairman of the board, which amount shall be lodged in the bank with the other moneys of the board, and only repaid to the contractor when he attains his final certificate that the works under such contract are satisfactorily completed.

PAYMENT OF MONEYS.

All payments of money on behalf of the board shall be by cheque, signed by the chairman and one member of the board.

LOCAL ASSESSMENTS.

The surveyor, in making the assessment roll, shall be wholly and entirely guided by the provisions of the Act of Parliament relating to road boards and their powers; and all appeals must be given notice of to the board, who will sit to hear and decide upon the same.

2. In all cases it shall be deemed sufficient for the collector to call once for payment of any amount due upon the assessment roll, and in the event of such amount not being paid to him a notice shall be left stating that unless the amount be paid to the secretary of the board, before the expiration of one month from the date thereof, legal proceedings will be taken for its recovery, a duplicate of such notice to be deposited in the office of the board.

3. All moneys raised by way of assessment, together with the share of the grants-in-aid, shall be expended in the immediate vicinity of the parish in which the same is raised.

Any one or more of the foregoing rules may be suspended *pro tem* in case of emergency, with the consent of the majority of the board.

The foregoing rules and regulations were passed by the Glenlyon District Road Board, on the 1st day of September, 1860.
