AT a meeting of the mining board of the mining district of Maryborough, begun and holden at Maryborough, in the said district, on the fifteenth day of September, One thousand eight hundred and sixty, it is ordained by the said board as follows, that is to say:—

Any party discovering a new gold field or workings in alluvial sinkings within the mining district of Maryborough more than five (5) miles distant from any other gold field within the said district, whether assisted by Government or otherwise, shall be entitled to an area of ground of four hundred (400) feet square, and if more than fifteen (15) miles distant, six hundred (600) feet square.

LAND SET APART NEAR LAKE HINDMARSH.
THE Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, in exercise of the power in him vested in this behalf, has, by an Order made on the 8th day of October, 1860, reduced the area of the land situate near Lake Hindmarsh, set apart on the 7th of November, 1859, for the Aborigines, and has sanctioned the following revised boundaries.

DESCRIPTION OF THE REVISED BOUNDARIES OF THE LAND SET APART.—Commencing at a point on the Wimmera River bearing north-westerly, and distant forty chains (more or less) from Paterson's station; thence east eighty-three chains; thence north seventy-eight chains fifty-nine links; thence east sixty-six chains forty links; thence north eighty chains; thence west twenty-three chains sixty links to the Wimmera River; thence by that river south-westerly to a point on its bank bearing north-easterly about eighty-five chains from the commencing point;

thence west one hundred and six chains fifty links; thence south seventy-eight chains fifty-nine links; thence east seventy-five chains twenty links (more or less) to the point of commencement; the total area being 1897 acres.

BYE-LAWS.

The following have received His Excellency's assent :-
Bye-law No. 22, for authorising the erection of a market hall and municipal cattle yards.
Bye-law No. 23, to prevent the nuisance arising from goats being at large in the township.
Bye-law No. 24, for authorising the raising the sum of £1000 by way of mortgage on the income of the municipal council.
The following bye-laws have not yet received His Excellency's assent :- No. 21, for regulating and licensing water carts, &c., in the municipality. For reducing burial fees in certain cases.

APPLICATIONS.

The council have made several applications for the erection of a telegraph office, a police court house, for fencing in the old cemetery, for the repair of the Government roads through the town, for grant on account of fencing new cemetery, for the repair of Daisy Hill road near the Police Camp, for various other public works, none of which applications have been granted.

The council have also used their best endeavors, by letter and deputation, to prevent the removal of the Court of General Sessions, and the Attorney General promised that full enquiry should be made, and that, at all events, the sessions would not be removed at present. The council have also applied to have the town proclaimed a market town, which has been granted. Application has also been made for a site for a cattle yard, but at present no definite answer has been given. Many applications have been made for the appointment of additional magistrates, and which have been partly complied with. The council forwarded to His Excellency, through the Hon. Mr. Rolfe, an address, congratulating His Excellency on his marriage with the daughter of Major General Pratt, and to which the council have received His Excellency's most gracious reply.

GRANT-IN-AID.

The council have, during the last half-year, received the sum of £412 only on account of grant-in-aid, but a further grant is due, and will be received in a few days.

APPOINTMENTS.

The council have appointed Constable Ryan to the office of Inspector of Nuisances, and Mr. H. C. Clarkson to the office of Receiver of Weighbridge dues.

DEPUTATIONS.

The amount of revenue arising from this district is capable of considerable increase, but there is no clue to the large quantities of gold taken to Melbourne by private escort, and no licenses are included where the moneys have been paid into the Treasury in Melbourne, or the Sub-Treasury, Sandhurst. There is also an error of £6289 10s. in the gold license return.

The amended return of expenditure showed that only £3612 8s. 9d. had been expended on roads and bridges, and of this amount only £749 4s. in Heathcote, £1200 on the Sandhurst road over the Melvor Creek, £3793 at Pyalong in the electoral and police district of Kilmore, £2093 on the Axe Creek near Sandhurst, £777 9s. on the Campaspe half way to Sandhurst.

The council were, however, satisfied with an approximate return; they, however, felt it their duty to send to the Chief Secretary a protest against the incorrect statements of the Commissioner of Roads and Bridges, who, in the face of facts, had asserted that the previous return showed more clearly the true amount expended for the sole benefit of Heathcote.
