WHEREAS by an Act passed in the twenty-first year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act for amending the Laws relative to the Gold Fields*, it is amongst other things enacted, that within and for every mining district therein referred to there shall be a court, to be called "The Court of Mines," and such court shall be holden at such intervals and at such places within such district as the Governor in Council shall from time to time direct: And whereas by an Order of the Governor in Council made on the seventh day of January, in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, the Court of Mines for the mining district of Maryborough was ordered to be holden at the places and times therein mentioned: And whereas it is expedient that such court should also be holden at Inglewood: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order direct, that the said Court of Mines shall be holden at the place and within the interval following, that is to say:—

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the twenty-first year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act for the more easy Recovery of certain Debts and Demands*, it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, to direct that county courts shall be holden for the recovery of debts and demands under the said Act, and from time to time, with the advice aforesaid, to direct in what towns and places a county court shall be holden, and that the judge of each court holden under the said Act shall attend and hold such court at the place where the Governor, with the advice aforesaid, shall have directed that such court shall be holden, at such times as such judge shall appoint for that purpose, so that a court shall be holden in such place once at least in such interval as the Governor, with the advice aforesaid, shall in each case direct: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order direct, that a county court shall be holden for the recovery of debts and demands under the said Act at the place and within the interval following, that is to say:—

At Inglewood, once at least in every three calendar months.

JURY LIST TO BE PREPARED FOR THE JURY DISTRICT OF INGLEWOOD.

At the Government House, Melbourne, the fifth day of November, 1860.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the twenty-first year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act for regulating Juries*, it is enacted, that in case any assizes, or any county court or court of general sessions of the peace, shall hereafter be lawfully directed or appointed to be holden at any town other than those at which the same are now holden, the clerk of petty sessions at such court town, and the clerk of petty sessions at every other town or place within the jury district of such court town, and all justices, constables, officers of police, and sheriffs, shall, within such time as the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, shall order for that occasion only, do and perform all such acts, matters, and things in and towards preparing, correcting, allowing, sending, and delivering the lists of men qualified and liable to serve as aforesaid, and making out the jury books for every such district, as are thereinbefore required to be ordinarily done at a different time or period; and all such last-mentioned jury books shall be brought into use, and the persons whose names shall be therein set down shall be liable to serve immediately after the same shall have been made out by the sheriff; and the said last-mentioned books shall be used until new books shall have been prepared under the provisions thereinbefore contained: And whereas by an Order of the Governor in Council, bearing even date herewith, it is ordered that a county court shall be holden at Inglewood, the same being a place at which a county court has not previously been holden: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order direct, that a jury list shall be prepared for the jury district of Inglewood; in the manner and within the intervals hereinafter stated, that is to say:—

The clerk of petty sessions at Inglewood shall issue his warrant to prepare and make out the jury list for the jury district of Inglewood, on or before Tuesday, the thirteenth day of November instant; such list shall be prepared forthwith, and the notice prescribed by the eighth section of the said Act shall be affixed, as provided by the Act, on Sunday, the twenty-fifth day of November aforesaid, and on Sunday, the second day of December now next ensuing; the court of petty sessions at Inglewood shall revise such list on Wednesday, the twelfth day of December aforesaid; such list shall be sent to the sheriff on or before Monday, the seventeenth day of December aforesaid; and the jury book shall be prepared and brought into use on or before Monday, the thirty-first day of the same month of December.

NEW POLLING PLACE FOR THE NORTH-WESTERN PROVINCE AND WIMMERA ELECTORAL DISTRICT.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

IN pursuance of an Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of the Colony of Victoria, passed in the nineteenth year of Her Majesty's reign, intituled, *An Act to provide for the Election of Members to serve in the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly of Victoria respectively*: I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this my Proclamation abolish the polling place already appointed for the division of the North-Western province and of the electoral district of Wimmera, mentioned in the first column of the schedule hereunto annexed; and, with the advice aforesaid, I do hereby appoint that the place mentioned in the second column of the said schedule shall be a polling place for the purpose of taking the poll at any contested election for the said province and district respectively, and that all votes in respect of qualifications within the boundaries and limits mentioned or referred to in the last column of the same schedule shall be taken at any election for such province or district at the polling place mentioned in the said second column, that is to say:—

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, passed in the sixteenth year of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled, *An Act for making and improving Roads in the Colony of Victoria*, it was amongst other things enacted, that it should be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor, from time to time, by notice in the *Government Gazette*, to proclaim and declare any such portion of the said colony as to him should seem meet, as and to be a road district for the purposes in the said Act contained, and also to define the boundaries of every road district thereby proclaimed and declared, and to give a specific name or designation to every such road district: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim and declare that the portion of the county of Bourke, hereinafter defined, shall be a road district for the purposes in the said Act contained, that is to say:—Commencing at the south-west angle of H. Matson's pre-emptive right; thence by a line due north forming the western boundary of H. Matson's pre-emptive right, and extending due north until it meets the boundary between the counties of Bourke and Dalhousie; thence north-easterly by the county boundary to Mount Diogenes; thence by a direct line to the south-west angle of block 16 in the parish of Monegetta; thence by the north-western boundaries of said block and the water reserve to the north-west angle of said reserve; thence by the north-eastern boundary of the water reserve to the eastern boundary of the Lancefield road; thence southerly by the eastern boundary of the Lancefield road until it cuts the southern boundary of block 1, parish of Bolinda; thence westerly to the south-west angle of block 1, parish of Bolinda; thence by a line bearing south-westerly to the south-east angle of the township of the Gap; thence due west to the north-western angle of section XXIII, parish of Yangardook; thence by a line bearing westerly to the south-eastern angle of H. Matson's pre-emptive right; thence by the southern boundary of H. Matson's pre-emptive right home to the commencing point; the municipality of Gisborne excepted.

And I do hereby proclaim and declare that the specific name or designation of such road district shall be "The Gisborne Road District."

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, passed in the sixteenth year of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled, *An Act for making and improving Roads in the Colony of Victoria*, it was amongst other things enacted, that it should be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor, from time to time, by notice in the *Government Gazette*, to proclaim and declare any such portion of the said colony as to him should seem meet, as and to be a road district for the purposes in the said Act contained, and also to define the boundaries of every road district thereby proclaimed and declared, and to give a specific name or designation to every such road district: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim and declare that the portions of the counties of Grenville, Grant, and Polwarth, hereinafter defined, shall be and constitute a road district for the purposes in the said Act contained, that is to say:—Commencing at a point in the centre of the River Barwon due west from the south-west angle of the parish of Whoorell, in the county of Polwarth; and thence on the west by the centre line of the River Barwon, northerly, to a point due east of the south boundary line of allotment N of section 28 in the parish of Birregurra; thence westward to the south-west angle of the last-named allotment; thence northward to the south boundary of allotment A of section 22 in the last-named parish; thence south-east along the south boundary of the last-named allotment to its south-east angle; thence due north along the eastern boundaries of allotments A, B, C, D, and E of said section 22 to the north-east angle of said allotment E; thence westward to the south-east side line of a Government road (bounding the last-named section on the north-west); thence north-east along the side line of the said road and of allotment E of section 19 in the last-named parish to a point due south of the dividing line of allotments B and C of the last-named section; thence northerly by the said dividing line (crossing the Birregurra Creek into the county of Grenville) and the dividing line of allotments B and C of section 12 in the last-named parish to the Colac road; thence north-east along the said Colac road to a point due south of the east side line of allotments 50 and 57 of the last-named parish and onwards to the south side of section 104 in the parish of Gellibrand; thence further north by the western boundaries of the parishes of Gellibrand and Hesse to the north-west angle of section 7 in the parish of Hesse; thence easterly by the northern boundaries of sections 7, 2, and 1 of the parish of Hesse to the western boundary of the parish of Murdeduke; thence northerly by the west boundary of the last-named parish to the centre of the Warrambine Creek; thence easterly by the centre line of the Warrambine Creek and the centre line of the River Barwon to a point due north of the north-east angle of the parish of Carrung-e-murnong in the county of Grant; thence southwards along the east boundary line of the parishes of Carrung-e-murnong, Lake Lake Wollard, and Tutegong, to the south-east angle of the last-named parish; thence westerly to the east boundary of the parish of Yan Yan Gurt; thence south to the south-east angle of the last-named parish; thence south-west by west to the south-east angle of the parish of Whoorell; and thence by the south boundary of the last-named parish westward home to the commencing point.

And I do hereby further proclaim and declare that the specific name or designation of such road district shall be "The Winchelsea Road District."

PETITION UNDER THE MUNICIPAL INSTITUTIONS ACT.
KEW.

IN pursuance of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of a petition addressed to His Excellency as hereinafter set forth, signed by one hundred and seventy-two householders resident at Kew, in the county of Bourke, praying for the election of their locality into a municipal district.

WILLIAM NICHOLSON.

The petitioners state that they are all householders within the meaning of the Act 18 Victoria No. 15, are more than one hundred and fifty in number, and are all resident within an area of nine square miles, containing a population of more than three hundred householders.

That they are desirous that the village of Kew and its neighborhood should be constituted a municipal district, and governed by a local council.

They propose that the boundaries of the district shall be the following, viz.:—Commencing in the centre of the Government road bounding portions 71, 72, 73, 74, and 75 of the parish

Boroondara; on the south at the junction of that road with the River Yarra Yarra, and bearing east from the said commencing point along the centre of the said road to the end thereof, and thence further east along the centre of a private road to the centre of the Government road which bounds Elgar's Special Survey on the west; thence bearing north along the centre of the last-mentioned road to portion 52 of the said parish; thence bearing east fifty-links to the south-eastern corner of the said portion 52; thence bearing north along the said eastern boundary line of the said portion to the River Yarra Yarra; and thence by the River Yarra Yarra to the commencing point."

And the petitioners pray as follows:—

"Your petitioners therefore humbly pray your Excellency that the before-mentioned boundaries may be constituted the limits of the municipal district; that your Excellency will be pleased to constitute the same under the name of 'The municipal District of Kew,' and also be pleased to issue the necessary proclamation for declaring it a municipality and defining the limits accordingly."

THE TEMPLESTOWE PUBLIC CEMETERY.

RULES and Regulations of the Templestowe General Cemetery.

1. All charges must be paid when orders are given, or before the ground or vault is opened.
2. On application for permission to make a vault or erect a monument in the cemetery being made to the trustees, a certificate of permission will be granted on payment of the fees set forth in the schedule.
3. Orders for interment to be given either to the sexton, or at the office of the trustees, on the previous day.
4. The name, age, residence, probable cause and date of death of the deceased, must be stated at the time of giving the order.
5. The charges will be remitted on the burial of any poor person in such cemetery, on a certificate of a minister of religion or other evidence proving to the satisfaction of the trustees that such person was a pauper, and that the relations of the deceased are unable to pay the usual fees.
6. The trustees will cause all common graves to be dug, but persons wanting brick graves or vaults will be required to construct them under the direction of the surveyor.
7. The time fixed for the funeral to be the time when the procession is to be at the cemetery, and the same must be punctually observed.
8. The usual hours for the performance of funerals will be from Ten a.m. to Six o'clock p.m. in the months of September to April inclusive, and from Ten a.m. to Four o'clock p.m. in the other four months, except on Sundays, when the hours for funerals will be from Two to Five o'clock p.m. throughout the year.
9. A drawing of every stone, tomb, pedestal, and plan of every monument or tablet proposed to be erected, must be submitted to the trustees for approval, who will determine the position for the same. In the erection of tablets, copper cramps must be used.
10. Wooden fences will be allowed, but if not kept in proper repair may be removed by order of the trustees.
11. Every coffin in a vault or brick grave to be bricked in, cemented, and covered by a slab of freestone, slate, or iron.
12. The ground will be open daily to the public from sunrise to sunset.
13. A plan of the cemetery, showing the situation of the purchased and other graves, is kept at the office, and may be inspected at the charge set forth in the schedule; and registers of all grants are kept by the secretary.
14. Any person who shall wantonly or wilfully destroy, or do or cause to be done any damage to, any monument, vault, tombstone, building, erection, railing, fence, shrubbery, tree, or plant, will be proceeded against as directed by the 14th section of the Act of Council.

Measles still very prevalent at Brunswick. Four deaths during the week from that disease at Collingwood. Scarlatina and measles on the increase at Flemington; they also prevail at Kew. Of the forty-eight deaths registered in Melbourne thirty-three were of children under three years of age. Three of these died from scarlatina, and thirteen from measles, or sixteen in all from those diseases only. At Richmond four fatal cases of scarlatina and measles have occurred, and both diseases are reported as on the increase. At Sandridge the measles have taken a mild and favorable form; and at Williamstown, although the malady is increasing, it has not as yet assumed a very fatal character.

CONDITIONS.

1. All the articles required by this notice are to be of the best quality of their several kinds, in the best condition, and to be delivered in sound packages.

2. The flour and bread must be the produce of prime wheat, from which on ration No. 1, twenty per cent, and on those of prisoners of the Crown, twelve per cent. has been extracted in bran and waste.

3. Fresh meat (beef and mutton), when ordered for the Lunatic Asylum, to be delivered entirely free from bone, and in all other cases to be supplied in such proportions as may be required, and when the quantity admits, to be delivered in fore and hind quarters alternately. When shins of beef form a portion of the supply, a fair proportion of the bone, not less than five inches, must have been cut off.

4. When it may be necessary to substitute one article for another, the following proportions are to be observed, viz:—

5. The above substitutions are intended for exceptional cases, and must be made whenever it may be considered advisable by the officer authorized to draw the rations, but not otherwise. Scales Nos. 3, 4, and 5 will be drawn at Pentridge, either with or without vegetables, as the officer in charge may direct.

6. The supplies are to be delivered direct to the establishment entitled thereto, on the written order of the officer in charge, except in the case of aboriginal stations, which are to be supplied under the Melbourne contract, and the several articles are to be delivered at the Government Stores.

7. Should the contractor fail to supply any articles when required, within twenty-four hours, they will be otherwise procured, and the expense, over and above the contract price, will be deducted from his account.

8. The contractor will be required to prepare his own account monthly in the prescribed form, and to forward the same in a complete state, signed by the officer by whom it was incurred, to the Government Storekeeper for examination and payment, at the Government Stores, Melbourne, or the Treasury Pay Office of the district, as the case may be.

9. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the supplies, as to the quality, the same is to be decided, in cases where the article is not of a perishable nature, by a board of survey, composed of persons named by the head of department, and the decision of the board is to be considered final.

10. If the board shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which, it will be procured by the person requiring it, and the expense charged as in clause 7.

11. In the country districts, when a board of survey cannot be conveniently assembled, and in all cases when the article is of a perishable nature, or when from some other cause injury would be sustained either by the persons to whom the rations are due, or to the contractor, in waiting for a board of survey, the head of the department, or officer in charge of the station, will have the power to reject such article or articles as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing, and that the contractor must take back the rejected article, and supply good in its stead, failing which, it will be obtained by the officer requiring it, and the expense will be charged as in clause 7.

12. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the supplies, or of delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will subject the contractor, upon report of the Government Storekeeper, to such mulct not exceeding one-fourth the amount of the monthly account, as the Government may direct. It will also be in the power of the Government, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract forthwith.

13. It will be competent for the Government Storekeeper on behalf of the Government, or the contractor on his own behalf, to terminate the contract by giving in writing a notice of three full calendar months; it being understood that such notice can be given only from the first day of a month, and within the period for which the contract is made.
