## BEECHWORTH MINING DISTRICT.

BYE-LAWS.—[14th July, 1860.]

**A**T a meeting of the Mining Board of the Mining District of Beechworth, begun and holden at the Office of the Mining Board, Camp, Beechworth, in the said district, on the 14th day of July, One thousand eight hundred and sixty, it is ordained by the said board as follows, that is to say:—

167. *Area of prospecting claim in alluvial workings.*—Bye-law numbered (138) one hundred and thirty-eight of the Beechworth mining board, in the following words, "Any person or persons mining for the purpose of making a discovery," &c., be and the same is hereby annulled and repealed, and the following substituted in lieu thereof:—Any persons prospecting for new alluvial gold workings shall be entitled to hold, in addition to the claim held under any bye-law, five claims of the same description as that held under such bye-law, with an additional claim for every five miles such prospecting claim is distant from any previously discovered gold workings.

168. *Area of prospecting claim on quartz reefs.*—Any person or persons searching for or having discovered a new reef, or the supposed continuation of any discovered reef, shall be entitled to occupy as a prospecting claim an extent of ground not exceeding one hundred and sixty yards on the line of the reef by a width at right angles to said line of one hundred and fifty yards, both horizontal measurement: Provided that no portion of the boundaries of such prospecting claim be within the distance of 560 yards from any portion of the boundaries of any other claim occupied on the said supposed line of reef.

169. *Extension of time for prospecting quartz claim.*—Bye-law numbered (72) seventy-two of the Beechworth mining board, in the following words, "If at the expiration of the period allowed for the prospecting of quartz claims," &c., be and the same is hereby annulled and repealed, and the following substituted in lieu thereof:—If at the expiration of the period allowed for the prospecting of quartz claims the holder of any quartz claim shall not have sufficiently prospected the same, and shall require further time for that purpose, possession of the claim may be lawfully held by the occupier of such claim duly registering with the warden his intention of further prospecting the same, and the said claim shall be protected thereby for one month, and from month to month, so often as such intention shall be registered, and during which period it shall not be incumbent upon the occupier of the claim to employ thereon any greater number of men than that prescribed by the bye-law as necessary for holding possession of the same during the time allowed for prospecting the same.

170. *Extent of claim on quartz reefs.*—Bye-law numbered (136) one hundred and thirty-six of the Beechworth mining board, in the following words, "The extent of claim on quartz reefs shall not exceed eighty yards," &c., be and the same is hereby annulled and repealed, and the following substituted in lieu thereof:—The extent of claim on quartz reefs shall not exceed eighty yards on the line of the reef by a width at right angles to such line of one hundred and fifty yards, both horizontal measurement, it being imperative upon the claimholder to employ at least one man for every ten yards comprised in the length of such claim, except during the first four months subsequent to the registration by such claimholder, which time is allowed for prospecting, and during which period two men shall be deemed sufficient to hold the entire claim.

171. *Transfer of quartz reef claim to be notified to the mining surveyor.*—Bye-law numbered (116) one hundred and sixteen of the Beechworth mining board, in the following words, "In the event of the person in whose name any frontage claim is registered," &c., be and the same is hereby annulled and repealed, and the following substituted in lieu thereof:—In the event of the person in whose name any frontage or quartz reef claim is registered transferring his interest in such claim, notice of such transfer having been made shall at once be given to the surveyor of the division in which such claim is situated, by the person claiming under such transfer, and any person failing or neglecting so to do shall be deemed guilty of a breach of a bye-law of the mining board.

172. *Quartz reef claims to be registered with the mining surveyor.*—Within forty-eight hours after the occupation of any claim on a quartz reef, the same shall be registered with the mining surveyor for the division in which such claim is situated.

173. *Duties of the mining surveyor.*—Bye-law numbered (163) one hundred and sixty-three of the Beechworth mining board, in the following words, "It shall be the duty of the mining surveyor appointed for any division," &c., be and the same is hereby annulled and repealed, and the following substituted in lieu thereof:—It shall be imperative upon the mining surveyor appointed for any division in which the frontage system is carried out to define the length, width, and position of any frontage claim; and the surveyor for any division shall, when called upon, define the length, width, and position of any quartz claim situate in that division, in accordance with the bye-laws of the Beechworth mining board, and generally carry out the provisions of such bye-laws as relate to his duties.

174. *Fees to surveyors.*—Bye-law numbered (164) one hundred and sixty-four of the Beechworth mining board, in the following words, "The fees which surveyors shall be entitled to demand shall be," &c., be and the same is hereby annulled and repealed, and the following substituted in lieu thereof:—The fees which surveyors shall be entitled to demand shall be, for registering and laying off a frontage claim and all operations connected therewith, together with marking the reduced width of the same, Ten shillings; for the registration of a quartz claim, Twenty shillings and sixpence, and laying off a quartz claim, Twenty shillings; for the registration of a union of claims, Two shillings and sixpence, and for registration of the notice of a transfer, Two shillings and sixpence. When the surveyor is required to lay off a quartz claim distant more than three miles from his office, he may demand and receive a mileage of Five shillings per mile one way for every additional mile.

175. *Warden may define boundaries of beds of creeks in worked ground.*—It shall be competent and lawful for a warden to define and prescribe what are the boundaries of the beds of creeks in worked and abandoned ground, notwithstanding the same may have been previously defined at any time or times.

176. *Protection to residence and business sites.*—Any person being in lawful possession of a residence or business site, and having erected thereon a dwelling or place of business, may absent himself for thirty consecutive days; and provided he gives written notice to the warden of the division of his intention to absent himself, he may be absent for any space of time not exceeding six months from the date of giving such notice, without forfeiture of the right to such site and building: Provided always that a copy of such notice to the warden shall be posted upon some conspicuous part of the building.

177. *Protection to claims during absence of claimholder.*—Bye-law numbered (105) one hundred and five of the Beechworth mining board, in the following words, "Where any claim shall have been fairly opened and in working order," &c., be and the same is hereby annulled and repealed, and the following substituted in lieu thereof:—When any claim is fairly opened and in working order, the holder of such claim, or the representative or representatives of any part or parts thereof, may absent himself or themselves from such claim for any time not exceeding one week; but should he or they wish to absent himself or themselves for any longer period, a written permission from the warden must be obtained, and the time and reasons of such absence must be specified in such written permission, and a copy thereof must be posted on some conspicuous part of such claim during absence; and under such circumstances such claim, or any part thereof, shall not be deemed forfeited or abandoned by reason of such absence.

178. *Protection to claims during floods, &c.*—Bye-law numbered one hundred and forty-nine of the Beechworth mining board, in the following words, "When at any time claims which are in working order shall become unworkable," &c., be and the same is hereby annulled and repealed, and the following substituted in lieu thereof:—When at any time claims which are in working order shall become unworkable from the failure of the usual and necessary supply of water (such supply being sufficient for at least three months in each year), or in consequence of floods, excessive drainage, or any other unavoidable cause, the warden may grant, in writing, a suspension of all working for such time as he shall think necessary (during which time the claim shall not be liable to forfeiture), and may from time to time extend and enlarge such suspension at his discretion. A registry of all such suspensions to be kept by the warden granting them.

179. *Forfeiture of claim.*—Bye-law numbered (86) eighty-six of the Beechworth mining board, in the following words, "Wherever under any bye-law a claimholder is required to keep engaged upon his claim," &c., be and the same is hereby annulled and repealed, and the following substituted in lieu thereof:—Wherever under any bye-law a claimholder is required to keep engaged upon his claim either a specified number of men or a man for every specified measurement contained in his claim, or where any specified number of miners hold an extent of claim in the nature of an ordinary claim, and shall not, after the expiration of one week from the occupation of the same, proceed to work and continue the working of the claim with the requisite number of miners in a *bond fide* and workmanlike manner, such claim, or any portion thereof not duly represented, as the case may be, shall be deemed forfeited and abandoned, except in cases specially provided for under any bye-law of the Beechworth mining board; but in cases where any lawful occupant of the claim may happen to be incapacitated by illness, or called away to attend under process issuing out of any court of law, or upon any urgent business, notice to that effect shall be posted upon the claim and shall be deemed a sufficient protection. Upon any dispute arising, the onus of proof of the facts contained in such notice to rest with the person posting the same.

180. *Amalgamation of claims.*—Bye-law (148) one hundred and forty-eight of the Beechworth mining board, in the following words, "The holders of adjoining claims may unite," &c., be and the same is hereby annulled and repealed, and the following substituted in lieu thereof:—When any number of claims shall be so united as hereinafter mentioned, such several claims may be amalgamated into one claim (except on that portion of the Woolshed Creek commencing at a point known as the upper boundary of Kneebone's claim and terminating at the junction of the said creek with the Ovens River). The union required by this bye-law to allow of this amalgamation, where two claims only are sought to be amalgamated, is, that each claim shall adjoin the other in half its length or width; and wherever any greater number than two claims are sought to be amalgamated, every claim in excess of such number shall adjoin two claims with which it is sought to be amalgamated in half their respective lengths or widths: Provided that the same number of men shall be kept constantly employed within the limits of the united claims, or in connection therewith, as would have been necessary for the occupation of the same extent of ground if the claims had been wrought singly; but should any less number of men be employed thereon or in connection therewith, a portion of such claim proportionate to the deficiency in the number of men employed thereon or in connection therewith shall be deemed to be forfeited. All such unions to be registered with the warden of the division in which such claims are situated, except in the case of frontage and quartz reef claims, the unions of which shall be registered with the mining surveyor of the division in which such claims are situated: Provided always that where a creek claim is united to one or more claims of a different class, the water privileges of such creek claim shall not extend further than if such creek claim had not been united to any other.

181. *Claims which must be registered with the warden.*—Bye-law numbered (100) one hundred of the Beechworth mining board, in the following words, "It shall be imperative upon all persons occupying any description of claim," &c., be and the same is hereby annulled and repealed, and the following substituted

tuted in lieu thereof:—It shall be imperative upon all persons occupying any description of claim other than ordinary claims, frontage claims, and quartz reef claims, to register the same with the warden of the division in which such claim is situated; and in the event of any person in whose name a claim stands registered, except in ordinary, quartz reef, and frontage claims, transferring his interest in such claim, it shall be imperative upon the person claiming under such transfer to register the same with the warden of the division, and in either case any person failing or neglecting so to do shall be deemed guilty of a breach of the bye-laws of the board.

182. *Interpretation bye-law.*—Bye-law numbered (166) one hundred and sixty-six of the Beechworth mining board, in the following words, "In the construction and for the purposes of the bye-laws of the Beechworth mining board, the following terms," &c., be and the same is hereby annulled and repealed, and the following substituted in lieu thereof:—In the construction and for the purposes of the bye-laws of the Beechworth mining board, the following terms shall, if not inconsistent with the context or subject matter, have the respective meanings hereby assigned to them, that is to say, that

1. The words "payable ground" shall mean the alluvial deposit or wash dirt containing gold running in a continuous course, or occurring successively and repeatedly in spots or patches.
2. The word "lead" shall mean the surface of the ground under which the payable ground is supposed to be situated.
3. The words "wet ground" (only as applied to frontage claims) shall mean all ground where the quantity of water which requires to be raised from the bottom of the shaft to the surface shall exceed 1200 gallons per twenty-four hours.
4. The words "partially wet ground" (only as applied to frontage claims) shall include all frontage claims where the quantity of water which requires to be raised from the bottom of the shaft to the surface does not exceed 1200 gallons per twenty-four hours.
5. The words "constantly employed" shall mean employment during usual working hours.
6. The words "person" or "persons," or "claimholder" or "claimowner" shall only have reference to persons legally entitled to mine upon the waste lands of the Crown.
7. The words "tail race" shall mean any description of race cut for the purpose of draining any claim or claims, or for carrying off the water used for sluicing or any other mining purpose.
8. The word "race" shall mean any channel made for the purpose of conveying water for mining purposes.
9. The word "surveyor" or "mining surveyor," shall mean the mining surveyor appointed by the Governor in Council.

The undersigned members of the said mining board concurred in making the foregoing bye-laws.

#### THE COURT OF MINES AT WARANGA DISCONTINUED.

At the Government House, Melbourne, the fifth day of November 1860.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the twenty-first year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intitled, *An Act for amending the Laws relative to the Gold Fields*, it is amongst other things enacted that within and for every mining district therein referred to there shall be a court to be called "The Court of Mines," and such court shall be holden at such intervals and at such places within such district as the Governor in Council shall from time to time direct: And whereas by an Order of the Governor in Council made on the seventh day of January, in the year One thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, the Court of Mines within and for the mining district of Sandhurst was ordered to be holden at Waranga, in the said mining district, once at least in every three calendar months: And whereas it is deemed expedient to discontinue the holding of such court at Waranga: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order direct that the said Court of Mines within and for the said mining district of Sandhurst shall, from and after the date hereof, be no longer holden at Waranga aforesaid.

And the Honorable John Dennistoun Wood, Her Majesty's Attorney General for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

#### THE AMHERST AND CLUNES ROAD DISTRICT.

##### PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, passed in the sixteenth year of Her present Majesty's reign, intitled, *An Act for making and improving Roads in the Colony of Victoria*, it was amongst other things enacted, that it should be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor, from time to time, by notice in the *Government Gazette*, to proclaim and declare any such portion of the said colony as to him should seem meet, as and to be a road district for the purposes in the said Act contained, and also to define the boundaries of every road district thereby proclaimed and declared, and to give a specific name or designation to every such road district: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim and declare that the portion of the county of Talbot, hereinafter defined, shall be a road district for the purposes in the said Act contained, that is to say:—Commencing at the north-east angle of section 112, parish of Spring Hill; thence in a direct line northerly to the south-east angle of section 3, parish of Rodborough; thence due west to the south-west angle of section 2 of the said parish; thence due north to the north-west angle of said section; thence due west in a direct line to the north-east angle of section 7, parish of Amherst; thence due north to a point where the northern side of the Amherst and Carisbrook road cuts the western boundary of the parish of Craigie; thence in a direct line westward to a point where the centre line of McNeill's Creek cuts the north side of town reserve, parish of Bunz Long; thence by the centre line of the said creek to a point where it cuts the northern boundary of Hodgkinson's pre-emptive right; thence by the northern boundary of said right to its north-east angle; thence in a direct line south-easterly to the north-west angle of block III, parish of Beckworth; thence by the western boundary of the parish of Beckworth to the north-west angle of the parish of Addington; thence easterly by the northern boundaries of the parishes of Addington and Glendarnel and a direct line to the commencing point excepting the municipalities of Amherst and Clunes.

And I do hereby further proclaim and declare that the specific name or designation of such road district shall be "The Amherst and Clunes Road District."

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this twenty-second day of October, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty, and in the twenty-fourth year of Her Majesty's reign.

Measles and scarlatina still prevail at Boroondara and Kew, but no fatal cases are reported. At Brunswick these diseases are said to be of a malignant type, and two deaths of children under four have been registered during the week. Of the 23 deaths at Collingwood, fifteen were of children under three, and measles constituted seven cases and scarlatina four cases to the total mortality. At Flemington these diseases are on the decrease. At Melbourne fifty-two deaths were registered, and forty of these were of children under five, there being nine cases of measles and eight of scarlatina. Several fatal cases of these diseases have also occurred at Emerald Hill and Richmond. It will be observed in the above table that the deaths exceed the registered births in five districts, and in comparing the total births and deaths their numbers are nearly equal.

They propose that the boundaries of the district shall be the following, viz.:—"Commencing in the centre of the Government road bounding portions 71, 72, 73, 74, and 75 of the parish Boroondara; on the south at the junction of that road with the River Yarra Yarra, and bearing east from the said commencing point along the centre of the said road to the end thereof, and thence further east along the centre of a private road to the centre of the Government road which bounds Elgar's Special Survey on the west; thence bearing north along the centre of the last-mentioned road to portion 52 of the said parish; thence bearing east fifty-links to the south-eastern corner of the said portion 52; thence bearing north along the said eastern boundary line of the said portion to the River Yarra Yarra; and thence by the River Yarra Yarra to the commencing point."

And the petitioners pray as follows:—

"Your petitioners therefore humbly pray your Excellency that the before-mentioned boundaries may be constituted the limits of the municipal district; that your Excellency will be pleased to constitute the same under the name of 'The Municipal District of Kew,' and also be pleased to issue the necessary proclamation for declaring it a municipality and defining the limits accordingly."

1. All the articles required by this notice are to be of the best quality of their several kinds, in the best condition, and to be delivered in sound packages.

2. The flour and bread must be the produce of prime wheat, from which on ration No. 1, twenty per cent., and on those of prisoners of the Crown, twelve per cent. has been extracted in bran and waste.

3. Fresh meat (beef and mutton), when ordered for the Lunatic Asylum, to be delivered entirely free from bone, and in all other cases to be supplied in such proportions as may be required, and when the quantity admits, to be delivered in fore and hind quarters alternately. When shins of beef form a portion of the supply, a fair proportion of the bone, not less than five inches, must have been cut off.

4. When it may be necessary to substitute one article for another, the following proportions are to be observed, viz.:—

Wheaten flour, 1 lb., or	} equal to $\frac{1}{4}$ lb. of bread.
Best wheaten biscuit, 1 lb.

5. The above substitutions are intended for exceptional cases, and must be made whenever it may be considered advisable by the officer authorized to draw the rations, but not otherwise. Scales Nos. 3, 4, and 5 will be drawn at Pentridge, either with or without vegetables, as the officer in charge may direct.

6. The supplies are to be delivered direct to the establishment entitled thereto, on the written order of the officer in charge, except in the case of aboriginal stations, which are to be supplied under the Melbourne contract, and the several articles are to be delivered at the Government Stores.

7. Should the contractor fail to supply any articles when required, within twenty-four hours, they will be otherwise procured, and the expense, over and above the contract price, will be deducted from his account.

8. The contractor will be required to prepare his own account monthly in the prescribed form, and to forward the same in a complete state, signed by the officer by whom it was incurred, to the Government Storekeeper for examination and payment, at the Government Stores, Melbourne, or the Treasury Pay Office of the district, as the case may be.

9. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the supplies, as to the quality, the same is to be decided, in cases where the article is not of a perishable nature, by a board of survey, composed of persons named by the head of department, and the decision of the board is to be considered final.

10. If the board shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which, it will be procured by the person requiring it, and the expense charged as in clause 7.

11. In the country districts, when a board of survey cannot be conveniently assembled, and in all cases when the article is of a perishable nature, or when from some other cause injury would be sustained either by the persons to whom the rations are due, or to the contractor, in waiting for a board of survey, the head of the department, or officer in charge of the station, will have the power to reject such article or articles as are obviously or inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing, and that the contractor must take back the rejected article, and supply good in its stead, failing which, it will be obtained by the officer requiring it, and the expense will be charged as in clause 7.

12. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the supplies, or of delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will subject the contractor, upon report of the Government Storekeeper, to such mulct not exceeding one-fourth the amount of the monthly account, as the Government may direct. It will also be in the power of the Government, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract forthwith.

13. It will be competent for the Government Storekeeper on behalf of the Government, or the contractor on his own behalf, to terminate the contract by giving in writing a notice of three full calendar months; it being understood that such notice can be given only from the first day of a month, and within the period for which the contract is made.

The total payments on account of public works amount to (including above) £2262 13s. 2d., the balance being paid for works ordered during last half-year, but not being completed at its termination, were paid for during the period included in this report.

The following works have been performed by day labor, employed by the council, at a cost of £134 7s. 1d.:—

The swamp between Napier and Smith streets drained, and George street raised and constructed across it, and Gore street partially so.

The footpaths of the following streets have been formed and gravelled, and the channels cleared and generally repaired:—

Reilly street, east of Brunswick street, Webb street, west end of Argyle street, Reid street, Shadforth street, and the east end of Westgarth street; the three latter streets being formed and metalled also. Victoria parade, metalled where required, and the Fitz Roy half of the gardens therein put in order. The footpaths in Young, Hudson, Charles, Ferie, George, Spring, Henry, Nicholson, and Atherton streets formed and gravelled. Several rough crossings have been constructed, and cube ditto

repaired; streets have been watered by two gangs of men. All the streets, thoroughfares, rights-of-way, &c., scavenged, cleansed, and accumulations of filth removed. 1700 loads of metal, and 1000 loads of gravel have been carted throughout the district; twenty-seven fire-plugs have been lowered and put into working order.

At the suggestion of some members of the council, tenders were called for the scavenger and cleansing work required in the district; the lowest eligible tender amounted to £273 12s., which was declined, as it exceeded the estimated cost of performing that work by day labor.

#### REVENUE.

The sum of £7650 has been received on account of the grant-in-aid; the council anticipate a further payment of about £3000. (Final payment received on 8th October, £3295 11s. 11d.) The receipts from rates amount to £3532 18s. 6d. Of the rates due on 1st October, 1858, and 1st April, 1859, amounting altogether to £10,821 10s. 6d., the sum of £10,339 1s. 6d. has been collected, leaving a balance of £492 9s. (equal to about 4½ per cent.) still to collect; of which £191 alone are due from lands of disputed and trust-titles; and £30 from unknown proprietors. Of the rates due on 1st October, 1859, amounting to £4700 5s. 9d., the sum of £4389 11s. 3d. has been collected, leaving a balance of £310 14s. 6d. (equal to about 7 per cent.) still to be collected, a large portion of which can be accounted for as above.

#### FIRE BRIGADE.

On the 10th of May last a letter was received from the Collingwood and Fitz Roy Volunteer Fire Brigade, intimating their intention of disbanding on 18th of June following. A vote of thanks was unanimously accorded by the council for the valuable and efficient services they had rendered to the district. The council, being of opinion the protection of the property in their municipality from fire would be better secured by the formation of a local brigade, under their direct and sole control, declined the proposal of the East Collingwood council for co-operative action. The United Insurance Companies having offered the sum of £60 per annum for defraying the expenses incurred for the suppression of fire, the council, on 11th July last, agreed to the suggestion of the Public Works Committee for the formation of a Fitz Roy Fire Brigade, composed principally of the men employed in watering the street, who, with the others, would only be paid for actual services rendered at fires. Under the superintendence of Mr. Geo. Rushall, the brigade has been efficiently drilled, and though their services have not yet been required in Fitz Roy, they have attended and suppressed two fires in East Collingwood, for which they have been paid by the United Insurance Companies.

#### BYE-LAWS.

On the 10th of May last, the objections of the Crown law officers to certain restrictions contained in bye-laws Nos. 11 and 13 were read to the council. The former bye-law, No. 11, "For licensing Hawkers of Vegetable Produce and Firewood," contained a clause for charging a moderate fee for the license. To this the Government objected, although it was urged that the form and mode of issuing the license had been assimilated to a bye-law which had previously received the approval of the present law officers of the Crown. Considering there would be no advantage gained by granting licenses free of charge, the council declined taking any further steps in the mean time.

The objection taken against bye-law No. 12, "For the Regulation of public Carriers, Carters, and Drivers of public Vehicles," was, that it imposed restrictions on private vehicles, over which the Government asserted the council had no control. These restrictions compelled the use of a chain for locking wheels, for the prevention of accident, to which private as well as public vehicles were equally liable; and provided also that all descriptions of vehicles should be driven at a walking pace past places of public worship during hours of service. Owing to the objections raised affecting the main objects of the bye-law, no further action has been taken.

#### ANNEXATION OF THE QUARRIES.

The committee formed towards the close of last half-year to take active measures for obtaining the rejection of a bill for repealing the 4th, 5th, and 6th clauses of 16 Victoria, No. 15, were glad to find their exertions successfully terminated by the carrying by a majority of three of Mr. Don's motion for the consideration of the above bill that day six months. The council take this opportunity for acknowledging the valuable services rendered by the members for Collingwood in the Legislative Assembly during the protracted struggle for the annexation of the Quarries. On the 3rd of August a proclamation appeared in the *Government Gazette*, annexing that portion of Smith ward east of Nicholson street to this municipality, being an area of about 480 acres, estimated at a value of £200,000.

#### COURT HOUSE.

In answer to the communication forwarded to the Chief Secretary on 21st March last, calling attention to the delay in the erection of the Court House, a reply was received on 18th April from the Crown Law Officers, stating that the indemnity given by the Fitz Roy council on 27th December, 1859, which, previous to execution, had been approved by that department, was imperfect and objectionable, and at the same time forwarding draft of a fresh bond for approval. This document contained provisions with which the council could not agree, for reasons submitted by their municipal solicitor to the law officers. The replies given in the Legislative Assembly to the inquiries of Dr. Embling respecting the cause of delay in the expenditure of the vote, led the council to solicit a joint interview with the Attorney-General and Commissioner of Public Works, which was granted. It was then explained by the latter member of Government that the existing legal difficulties would be removed by the passing of the Fitz Roy Ward Improvement Act Amendment Bill, and a promise given that steps would be taken to prevent the vote lapsing. On the 5th of September, the council again corresponded with the Chief Secretary, stating that the bill then only waited His Excellency's assent, and urgently

representing the necessity of the work being commenced without delay. In reply, it was stated that the communication had been transferred to the Crown law officers, from whom no information relative to the question has been yet received.

#### FITZ ROY WARD IMPROVEMENT ACT AMENDMENT BILL.

Several moot points connected with the provisions of this bill, raised by the city corporation, having been satisfactorily settled at an interview between the mayor and the chairman of the Fitz Roy council, the bill passed both houses of the legislature without further opposition, and received His Excellency's assent on 18th September, 1860. A vote of thanks was unanimously accorded by the council to Dr. Embling for his valued services in conducting the bill through the Legislative Assembly.

#### PUBLIC HEALTH.

The health officer has reported favorably upon the sanitary condition of the municipality. The council's attention having been directed to the injurious effects arising from improperly secured cesspools, caused a survey to be made of those existing in one of the best portions of the municipality. The report thereon disclosed the fact that even in that locality several water-closet cesspools were not built in or otherwise secured; and as most disastrous consequences might arise from their poisonous and putrid exhalations, the council at once caused notices to be served on the proprietors to take proper means for prevention of the evils complained of, by the construction of properly secured cesspools. From the Report of Public Works it will be observed the council are proceeding with the construction of the rights-of-way in the district; most of those that were in the worst condition are now constructed and channelled.

#### BEATING THE BOUNDS.

On 31st August, 1860, the chairman, councillors, and officers, accompanied by a large number of the scholars attending the public schools in the district, beat the bounds of the municipality.
