## MUNICIPALITY OF AMHERST.

BYE-LAW No. 11.—FOR THE BETTER PREVENTION OF FIRE WITHIN THE MUNICIPALITY OF AMHERST.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is empowered to make bye-laws for the prevention and extinguishing of fires: Be it therefore enacted by the municipal council of Amherst, from and after the passing of this bye-law:

1. That no person shall light or have any fire burning within or upon any yard or premises, whether enclosed or not, for any purpose whatsoever, without first having obtained license or permission from the said council, or their duly authorised officer, except such fire be made in a properly constructed fireplace.

2. That no person shall be allowed to set fire to any stubble, scrub, furze, or other inflammable material, until notice in writing be given to the parties owning or occupying property adjacent to the place where such fire shall be made twenty-four hours previous to such fire being made, and that no fire shall be made and continued excepting between the hours of Eight a.m. and Four p.m.

3. That no person shall be permitted to keep any stacks of hay, corn, or straw on their premises, unless the same be under cover of a shed or building of which no exterior part or covering shall be of canvas or calico, or other textile fabric, or at a distance of fifty feet from any adjoining building, or twenty feet from any adjoining property, not belonging to, or in the occupation of the owner of such stack of hay, corn, or straw.

4. That no person shall erect any tent, store, or dwelling, or other building of calico, canvas, or other textile fabric, or renew with the like material any roof, or any other exterior part of any tent, store, or building now existing in any of the proclaimed streets of the municipality of Amherst, except the same be situated at a distance of thirty clear feet from any other building.

5. Any person committing any act against the provisions of this bye-law, or refusing or neglecting to comply with any direction or regulation contained therein, shall, on conviction before two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds (£20).

## MUNICIPALITY OF HAWTHORN.

BYE-LAW No. 3.—TO REGULATE, BY MEANS OF STANDING ORDERS, THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE COUNCIL FOR THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF HAWTHORN.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted that it shall be competent for the council of any municipal district to make bye-laws for the regulation of their own proceedings (18 Vic. No. 15, sec. 26): Be it therefore ordered and directed by the council of the municipal district of Hawthorn, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor, the proceedings and business of the said municipal council shall be conducted according to the following regulations only, which shall be and be called the "Standing Orders" of the said council, that is to say:—

## CHAPTER I.

That in all cases not hereinafter provided for, resort shall be had to the rules, forms, and usages of Parliament, which shall be followed, so far as the same are applicable to the proceedings of this council.

## Order of Proceedings.

1. The business of the council shall be conducted on all ordinary occasions with open doors; but a majority of the councillors present may require the exclusion of strangers until it shall have been decided by the council whether the questions proposed to be introduced shall be discussed with open doors.

2. At all meetings of the council the business shall commence so soon after the time stated in the summons as a legal quorum is present; but should a quorum not be present at the expiration of twenty minutes, such circumstance shall be noted (with the names of the councillors present) in the minute book, and the business on the notice paper shall be postponed to the next meeting of the council.

3. At every regular meeting of the council the first business thereof shall be the reading and putting for confirmation the minutes of any preceding meetings; and no discussion shall be permitted thereon except as to their accuracy as a record of the proceedings. The minutes, when confirmed, shall be signed by the chairman for the time being.

4. That after the confirmation of the minutes, the order of business shall be as follows, or as near thereto as may be practicable; but for the greater convenience of the council at any particular meeting thereof, it may be altered by resolution to that effect.

## Order of Business.

1. Reading of copies of letters sent by authority of the council.
2. Reading letters received, and considering and ordering thereon.
3. Reception and reading of petitions and memorials.
4. Reading and ordering on reports of permanent committees.
5. Reading and ordering on reports of special committees.
6. Reading and ordering on reports of deputations.
7. Orders of the day, including subjects arising from proceedings of former meetings.
8. Motions of which previous notice has been given.

5. Every communication being a petition or memorial addressed to the council, shall be presented by one of its members who shall be responsible for its being respectfully worded.

6. On the presentation of a petition, memorial, or other similar communication, no debate shall take place thereon until notice has been given in the usual manner, and the only questions that shall be entertained on the occasion of its presentation shall be that it shall be received, and if necessary that it be referred to a committee.

7. Every report of a committee shall be brought up by its chairman, and when read he or any member of such committee may move "that it be received, and considered with an order of the day," or "that its consideration be made an order of the day for the next meeting." And if in the report of a committee there are distinct recommendations contained, such report shall not be adopted until the sense of the council has been taken separately on each.

8. The orders of the day shall include all matters arising out of the proceedings of former meetings of the council, and any business which the chairman may think fit to bring under consideration; any councillor may, however, bring forward such business as he may consider advisable in the form of a notice of motion, such notice to be given in writing to the town clerk, at least three clear days previous to the meeting at which the same is to be taken into consideration; and all such notices of motion shall be considered in the order in which they were given.

9. No motion shall be proceeded with unless the councillor giving notice, or one of the council, authorised by him in writing, be present to proceed with the same when called upon.

10. The notice paper shall be prepared by the town clerk, and caused to be delivered to each councillor two clear days previous to each council meeting.

11. No motion the effect of which would be to rescind any previous resolution of the council shall be entertained during the same municipal year, unless a call of the whole council has been duly ordered for that purpose; and no motion for rescinding any resolution of the council shall be again entertained during the same municipal year, unless by consent of at least five members of the council.

12. No bye-law shall be finally passed or adopted at the meeting at which it shall have been first proposed, nor until the next meeting of the council regularly convened; and every such bye-law shall in the interim remain open for the inspection of any of the ratepayers free of charge.

13. No motion proposing any petition, address, bye-law, or standing order, shall be entertained unless the mover shall submit therewith a draft of such petition, address, bye-law, or standing order, and the draft so submitted shall in no case be taken into consideration until it shall have been referred to the legislative committee, who shall report thereon, and the mover of every such proposition shall be for that occasion a member of such committee.

14. The original manuscript of any motion or amendment that is submitted to the council shall be preserved until the minutes of the meeting at which the same has been disposed of are confirmed in the usual way.

## CHAPTER II.

## Order of Debate.

15. Any councillor desirous of making a motion or amendment shall rise and address the chairman, and shall not be interrupted unless called to order, when he shall sit down until the councillor calling to order shall have been heard thereon, and the question of order disposed of, when the councillor in possession of the chair shall proceed with the subject.

16. Any councillor desirous of proposing either an original motion or amendment must state the nature of such motion or amendment before addressing the council in support thereof; and when making a motion or amendment shall put it in form, sign, and deliver it to the town clerk, who shall add thereto the name of the seconder; and no motion or amendment so made shall be withdrawn without the leave of the council.

17. No motion or amendment shall be entertained or discussed unless it be seconded; any councillor may, however, require the enforcement of any standing order of the council by simply noticing that such order is disobeyed.

18. A councillor moving a motion shall be held to have spoken thereon, but a councillor merely seconding a motion without remark shall not be held to have spoken upon it.

19. The councillors in meeting of council shall designate each other by their official titles, namely that of chairman or councillor.

20. If two or more councillors rise to speak at the same time, the chairman shall decide which is entitled to priority.

21. No councillor shall speak twice on the same question unless by way of explanation merely, or in reply as the mover of an original motion, or upon any amendment; and after such explanation or reply the question shall be forthwith put to the vote.

22. The chairman shall rise in addressing the council to discuss any question.

23. The presiding chairman shall, without waiting for the interposition of the council call to order any councillor proceeding to speak a second time on the same question, unless entitled to reply, or in explanation where he has been misrepresented or misunderstood.

24. The presiding chairman when called upon to decide a point of order or practice, shall state the rule or precedent applicable to the case without argument or comment, and his decision as to what is order or explanation shall be final for that occasion in each case.

25. No councillor shall digress from the subject matter of the question under discussion, and all imputations of improper motives, and all personal reflections on councillors shall be considered highly disorderly.

26. Any councillor who shall use any expression capable of being applied offensively to any other councillor shall, if required by the council, withdraw such expression and make a satisfac-

tory apology to the council, under a penalty in case he refuse or neglect to do so before the rising of the council, of not more than Ten pounds.

27. When, in consequence of disorderly conduct, the chairman shall call upon any councillor by name, such councillor shall withdraw as soon as he has been heard in explanation, and after such councillor's withdrawal the council shall at once take the case into consideration.

28. Any councillor may require the town clerk to take down any particular words used by a councillor immediately upon the same being used.

29. Any councillor may of right require the production of any documents of the council relating to the question or matter in discussion.

30. One amendment only shall be discussed at one time, but if lost, another may be moved before the original question is put to the vote; but upon any amendment being carried such amendment shall be held to have quashed the original motion, and for all purposes of subsequent discussion the amendment so carried shall be acted upon as an original motion, and it shall be competent for any councillor to move one other amendment thereon, but not more.

31. A question may be superseded, 1st by the adjournment of the council on the motion of a councillor, "That the council do now adjourn;" 2nd, by the previous question, viz., "That this question be now put," being proposed and negative.

32. The chairman shall in taking the sense of the council, put the question first in the affirmative, then in the negative, and the votes of all councillors (if a division be called for) shall be entered in the minutes.

33. The council shall vote by show of hands, except in cases of elections.

34. No discussion shall be allowed on any motion for adjournment, but if the question be decided in the negative the motion then under discussion, or the next motion or order of the day shall be considered before the question of adjournment shall be again entertained; but if the motion of adjournment be carried, any business left undisposed of shall have precedence at the next meeting of the council.

35. In the consideration of any matter of detail it shall be competent for the council to resolve itself into a committee of the whole.

36. Any councillor may enter his protest against any resolution of council, provided that such protest is not inconsistent with truth, or disrespectful to the council; notice of intention to protest must, however, in every case be given on the adoption of the resolution protested against, and the protest signed by the councillor or councillors protesting, and specifying the reasons for protesting must be entered before the next regular meeting of the council, by the protesting councillor in a book to be kept for that purpose in the town clerk's office, and duly referred to in the minutes of council, the same to be considered also a part of such minutes.

#### Lapsed Questions.

37. That if a debate on any motion moved and seconded, or on any order of the day be interrupted by the council being counted out, such debate may be resumed at the point where it was so interrupted on motion upon notice.

38. That if the discussion of any question in a committee of the whole council be interrupted for want of a quorum, the council may order the resumption of such committee on a future day, on motion upon notice, and the discussion of such question shall then be resumed at the point at which it was so interrupted.

#### CHAPTER III.

##### Committees—Permanent.

39. There shall be at least four permanent committees, consisting of three or more councillors each, two to form a quorum, formed under the following heads:—

1. Public works and lighting,
2. Finance and rates,
3. Markets and licensing,
4. Health and legislation,

which committees shall be elected annually by voting papers by the council.

40. Every committee, at the first meeting after its appointment, shall elect one of its members to be chairman for the municipal year, and in his absence shall elect a chairman for the time being.

41. The chairman of the council, when appointed on any permanent committee, shall be the chairman thereof. When special committees are appointed for a merely temporary purpose, the councillor proposing such committee shall be the chairman thereof, and the standing orders of the council shall be observed in all committees except as to the number of times limited for speaking.

42. Special committees shall not consist of less than five councillors, three to be a quorum, and shall be subject to the same regulations as they apply, so far as permanent committees.

43. If there shall not be a quorum of councillors present within twenty minutes after the time fixed for the meeting of any committee, such meeting shall lapse, but it may be competent for the chairman of such committee, if necessary, to convene another meeting at a future day.

44. Any member of a committee absenting himself without leave from three consecutive meetings, duly convened, shall cease to be a member thereof.

45. The council shall, if it thinks fit, on the requisition of any councillor, discharge him from serving on a committee; and all vacancies, as they occur, shall be filled up by the council.

46. All questions shall be decided by a majority of votes, and whenever the votes are equal the chairman shall have the casting vote.

47. The meetings of all committees shall be held at the council chamber.

48. The finance committee shall be liberty, at their discretion, to authorise disbursements for current expenses to an amount not exceeding Five pounds in any one week.

49. The town clerk shall convene every permanent committee within ten days of its first appointment, and every select committee within five days of the same, or at any other time thereafter by order of the council, or the written order of the chairman, or on that of any two members of such committee; and of all committee meetings the town clerk shall give each councillor at least twenty-four hours' notice.

#### CHAPTER IV.

##### Miscellaneous Regulations.

50. For the consideration of any bye-law, or for the raising or appropriating of money, or for the objects contemplated in standing order No. 11, or for any other important business, it shall be competent for any councillor, without previous notice, to move for a call of the whole council for the consideration of any such subject at the next or any subsequent meeting; and upon such motion being carried, due notice thereof shall be given in the notice paper for the day, when the order of the day or notice of motion for which such call was made is set down for consideration. And any councillor not in attendance when such order of the day or notice of motion comes under consideration, or not in attendance at the voting upon such question or any amendment thereof, whether of adjournment or otherwise, shall be liable to a penalty of One pound, unless reasonable cause for such absence be shown to the satisfaction of the council.

51. No election to any office at the disposal of the council shall take place until not less than five clear days' notice have been given in one or more Melbourne daily newspaper, and a local newspaper, if any, inviting applications for the same, and the salary or other remuneration of such office in all cases be fixed before proceeding to the election.

52. At all elections for officers at the disposal of the council the voting shall be by ballot.

53. No councillor or officer of the council, or any auditor of the municipality of Hawthorn, shall be received as a surety for any officer appointed by the council or for any work to be done for the council. In all cases of security being given for the faithful performance of any duty or contract, the expense of preparing such security shall be borne by the person providing the same.

54. No councillor shall have directly or indirectly, by himself or his partner, any share or interest in any contract or employment with or by the council, except he be a shareholder in any public company or corporation with which this council may contract.

55. The town clerk shall have the custody of the common seal of the municipal council, and be responsible for the same, and the proper use thereof.

56. The common seal shall not be affixed to any corporate document without the express order of the council, nor unless such document bears the signature of the chairman and town clerk, but in the case of powers of attorney, and other legal documents not relating to the corporation, the signatures to which require to be verified before the chairman by declaration, and in any such case the said seal shall and may be affixed by the town clerk to the chairman's certificate accompanying the same, on the receipt of a fee of ten shillings and sixpence for each attestation, said fee to be given to the town clerk as a prerequisite.

57. Any one or more of the standing rules and orders may be suspended *pro tem* in case of emergency, with the consent of a majority of the council.

#### MUNICIPALITY OF SANDRIDGE.

BYE-LAW No. 1.—TO REGULATE, BY MEANS OF STANDING ORDERS, THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF SANDRIDGE.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of Victoria, passed in the 18th year of the reign of Her present Majesty, and numbered 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted, in the 26th clause of said Act, that it shall be competent for the council of any municipal district to make bye-laws for the regulation of their own proceedings, such bye-laws to have force and effect in accordance with the 33rd section of said recited Act; And whereas by proclamation of His Excellency the Governor-in-Chief of the colony of Victoria, bearing date the 11th day of July, A.D. 1860, Sandridge was duly established a municipal district: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council of Sandridge, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor-in-Chief of Victoria, the proceedings and business of the said council shall be conducted according to the following regulations only, which shall be called the Standing Orders of the said council, that is to say:—

#### CHAPTER I.

##### Order of Proceedings.

1. The business of the council shall be conducted on all ordinary occasions with open doors; but any two councillors present may require the exclusion of strangers, until it shall have been decided by the council whether the question proposed to be brought forward shall be discussed publicly or otherwise.

2. The chairman or any three councillors shall have power to call a special meeting of the council, by written instructions to the town clerk, provided that the notice be given two clear days before such meeting shall be held; and at all meetings of the council the business shall commence as soon as the legal quorum shall be present, but if at the expiration of twenty minutes after the appointed hour of meeting there shall not be a quorum present, then no business shall be transacted at such meeting, but a note of the circumstance, with the names of the members present, shall be entered in the minute book.

3. The first business at each meeting of the council shall be to confirm the minutes of the preceding meeting, and no discussion shall take place thereupon except as to the accuracy thereof.

4. That after the confirmation of the minutes, the order of business shall be as follows, or as near thereto as may be practicable, but such order may at any time be altered by resolution passed to that effect.

*Order of Business.*

1. Reading copies of letters sent by authority of the council.
  2. Reading letters received, and considering and ordering thereon.
  3. Reception and reading of petitions and memorials.
  4. Reading reports of permanent committees, and ordering thereon.
  5. Reading reports of special committees, and ordering thereon.
  6. Reading reports of deputations, and ordering thereon.
  7. Orders of the day, including subjects arising out of proceedings of former meetings.
  8. Motions of which previous notice has been given.
5. Every communication addressed to the council and presented by one of its members, shall be in proper form, and the member presenting the same shall be held responsible for its being respectfully worded.
6. On the presentation of a petition, memorial, or other similar communication, no debate shall take place thereon until notice has been given in the usual manner, and the only questions that shall be entertained on the occasion of its presentation shall be that it be received, and if necessary that it be referred to a committee.
7. The orders of the day shall include all matters arising out of the proceedings of former meetings of the council, and any business which the chairman may think fit to bring under consideration. Any councillor may, however, bring forward such business as he may consider advisable, in the form of a notice of motion, such notice to be given at the meeting previous to that at which the same is to be taken into consideration. All such notices of motion to be considered in the order in which they shall have been given.
8. No bye-law shall be finally adopted at the meeting at which it shall be first proposed, nor until the next meeting of council, and every such bye-law shall, in the interim, remain open for the inspection of any of the ratepayers, in the town clerk's office, free of charge.

**CHAPTER II.**

*Order of Debate.*

9. Any councillor when proposing a motion or amendment, or discussing any matter, must rise and address the chairman, and no councillor shall be interrupted unless by a call to order, when he shall sit down. The councillor calling to order shall then be heard upon such point of order, and the question decided before the subject is resumed or any other business entered upon.
10. Any councillor desirous of proposing either an original motion or amendment must state the nature of such motion or amendment before addressing the chair in support thereof; and when making a motion or amendment shall write it in form, sign and deliver it to the town clerk, who shall add thereto the name of the seconder; and no motion or amendment once brought before the council shall be withdrawn without leave of the council, nor shall any motion be entertained by the council until the same be seconded.
11. The members of council in meeting assembled shall designate each other by their official titles, namely, that of chairman or councillor.
12. If more than one councillor rise at the same time, the chairman for the time being shall decide which is entitled to pre-audience.
13. No councillor shall speak twice on the same question, unless by way of explanation merely, or in reply as the mover of an original motion, or upon any amendment; and after such explanation or reply the question shall be forthwith put to the vote, but councillors merely seconding any motion shall not be held to have spoken upon it.
14. No councillor shall digress from the subject under discussion, or impute motives, and all personal reflections shall be considered highly disorderly.
15. The presiding chairman's decision shall be final on all questions of order or practice, and he shall state the same without comment or argument.
16. The presiding chairman shall rise when addressing the council.
17. Any councillor who shall use expressions capable of being offensively applied to any other councillor, shall, if required by the chairman, withdraw such expressions to the satisfaction of the council, under a penalty of not more than ten pounds.
18. Any councillor may require the town clerk to take down any particular expressions immediately on their being used.
19. Any councillor may of right demand the production of any documents of the council bearing on the question under discussion.
20. Only one amendment shall be discussed at one time, and upon the adoption of any amendment the original motion shall be deemed rejected, and the amendment so carried shall be acted upon as an original motion.
21. The chairman shall, in taking the sense of the council, put the question first in the affirmative, then in the negative; and the votes of all councillors (if a division be called for) shall be entered in the minutes.
22. The council shall vote by show of hands, except in cases of elections; any councillor may, however, call for a division upon any question, in which case the councillors voting in the affirmative shall stand up, and those in the negative shall retain their seats, until the vote is recorded.

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23. No discussion shall be allowed on any motion for adjournment; but if the question be decided in the negative, the motion then under discussion, or the next motion or order of the day, shall be considered before the question of adjournment shall be again entertained; but if the question of adjournment be carried, any business left undisposed of shall have precedence of all other business at the next meeting of the council.

24. Any councillor may record his protest against any decision of the council, provided the same be made before the next meeting of the council (in writing) and be couched in respectful language; notice of such intention, however, must be given on the adoption of the resolution.

25. No motion the effect of which would be to rescind any previous resolution of the council shall be entertained during the same municipal year, unless a call of the whole council be duly made for the purpose.

**CHAPTER III.**

*Committees.*

26. There shall be three permanent committees of the council, to be called respectively—

1. The public works committee,
2. The finance and rate committee,
3. The legislative committee,

which shall be chosen annually, at the meeting of council next after the annual election of chairman. The public works committee shall consist of four members, the other committees shall consist of three members each; three to be a quorum at the public works committee, and two to form a quorum at the other committees: Provided, nevertheless, that the council shall be at liberty at any time to fill up occasional vacancies.

27. The town clerk shall convene every committee within seven days of its first appointment, and at any time by order of the council, or the written order of the chairman, or of any two members of such committee.

28. The chairman, if appointed a member of any of the permanent committees, shall be chairman thereof; in committees of which the chairman is not a member, the committee shall elect a chairman. When special committees are appointed, the member proposing such committee shall be chairman thereof.

29. The standing orders of the council shall be observed in committees of the whole council, except the rule limiting the number of times of speaking.

30. The finance committee shall be at liberty, without the express authority of the council, to authorise disbursements for current expenses to an amount not exceeding Five pounds in any one week, and shall report the same to the council at its next sitting.

31. The chairmen of committees shall have their reports fairly written out by the town clerk, on paper of uniform size provided by the council, so as to admit of their being bound up at convenient intervals.

32. If there shall not be a quorum of members present within twenty minutes after the time fixed for the meeting of any committee, such meeting shall lapse; but it may be competent for the chairman of such committee, if necessary, to convene another meeting under order No. 27.

**CHAPTER IV.**

*Elections.*

33. No election to any office at the disposal of the council shall take place until four clear days' notice shall have been given in at least two or more newspapers, published in Melbourne or the vicinity, inviting applications for the same; and the salary of such office shall in all cases be fixed before proceeding to the election.

34. At all such elections the voting shall be (except at that of chairman of the council) on cards or paper, to be provided for the purpose, on which the voter shall write the name of the candidate he supports.

35. No councillor shall have, directly or indirectly, by himself or his partner, any share or interest in any contract or employment with or by the council (except he be a shareholder in any public company or corporation with which this council may contract), nor shall be received as surety for any officer; nor shall any auditor or other officer become security for any employé of the council, or for any work to be done for the council; and in all cases where security shall be required the expense of preparing the same shall be borne by the party giving the same.

**CHAPTER V.**

*Miscellaneous Regulations.*

36. For the consideration of any bye-law, or for the raising or appropriating of money, or for the objects contemplated in standing order No. 23, it shall be competent for any member, without previous notice, to move for a call of the whole council for the consideration of any such subject at the next or any subsequent meeting; and upon such motion being carried, due notice thereof shall be given in the notice paper for the day when the order of the day, or notice of motion for which such call is made, is set down for consideration; and any member not in attendance when such order of the day or notice of motion comes under consideration, or not in attendance at the voting upon such question, or any amendment thereof, whether of adjournment or otherwise, shall be liable to a penalty of not more than One pound sterling, unless reasonable cause for such absence be shown to the satisfaction of the council.

37. The town clerk shall have the custody of the common seal of the municipal council, and shall be responsible for the same, and for the proper use thereof, each impression of the seal being verified by the signature of that officer.

38. The town clerk shall not affix the common seal to any corporate document without the express order of the council, nor unless such document bear the signature of the chairman, but in the case of powers of attorney, and other legal documents not relating to the municipality, the signatures to which require to be verified before the chairman by declaration, and in any

such case the said seal shall and may be affixed by the town clerk to the chairman's certificate accompanying the same, on the receipt of a fee of Ten shillings and sixpence for each attestation.

39. All plans and specifications for the formation of any street, or portion thereof, shall be laid before the council at least six days prior to the same being considered and ordered upon, and be open for inspection by any ratepayer during that time.

40. Any one or more of the standing orders may be suspended *pro tempore* in case of emergency, with the consent of a majority of the council.

#### MUNICIPALITY OF SANDRIDGE.

BYE-LAW No. 2.—FOR REGULATING PROCEEDINGS AT THE ELECTION OF CHAIRMAN AND AT ELECTIONS OF MEMBERS OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL AND PUBLIC MEETINGS OF THE RATEPAYERS.

WHEREAS it has been deemed expedient by the municipal council of Sandridge, in exercise and execution of the powers to them given by the Act of Council, 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, to make provisions for regulating proceedings at elections of chairmen and of members of the said council, and for conducting public meetings of the ratepayers within the municipal district of Sandridge: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the said municipal council, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor-in-Chief of Victoria, the following shall be the method of conducting the several matters herein referred to, that is to say:—

1. Written declarations of vacancies in the council, resulting from disqualification by absence or otherwise, may be made by the chairman and one or more councillors, and countersigned by the town clerk.

2. Voluntary resignation of membership of council shall be made in writing, addressed to the chairman of the council, and be presented by him to the council at the next meeting thereafter, for their ordering on the same.

3. The chairman of the council shall be annually elected in the following manner:—Each councillor being supplied by the town clerk with a voting-paper, containing the names of the whole of the members of council, shall mark that of the councillor for whom he votes, and deposit the paper in the urn or voting-box. On the delivery of the whole of the papers (it being obligatory upon every member of council present to vote), if the whole council be present, otherwise, after one hour, the chairman shall announce the name of each councillor voted for, the number of such votes, and declare the name of the one who has a majority of votes to be duly elected the chairman of the council for the ensuing municipal year, who shall then and there take the chair accordingly.

4. If the result of voting for chairman should be that the highest number of votes is held equally by two or more councillors, then another voting shall take place for those councillors only holding such equality of votes until a majority is recorded, the then chairman giving a casting vote in addition to his own in case of an equality of votes on the final division.

5. Upon the resignation or disqualification of the chairman of the council, at the next meeting of the council thereafter the senior councillor then present shall take the chair *pro tempore*, and immediately after the confirmation of the minutes of the preceding meeting shall proceed to the election of a chairman of council for the residue of the municipal year in manner prescribed by this bye-law, and in the event of an equality of votes being recorded shall have a casting vote in addition to his own.

6. In determining the seniority of councillors for the purposes of this bye-law, it shall be understood to mean those councillors who shall have held office for the longest period without re-election, and having the greatest number of votes when elected.

7. At any election for members of council it shall be lawful for the chairman to appoint under his hand such and so many persons as may seem necessary to the council to act as poll clerks, and to appoint such and so many places within the municipal district as may seem to the council necessary to be the polling-places.

8. If at any election for members of council a poll shall be demanded, in the manner and form required by clause 19 of 18 Victoria No. 15, the chairman shall cause to be provided at the polling-place or places a sufficient number of enclosed desks or compartments, each of which shall be provided with pens, ink, and blotting paper, or with pencils, for the purpose of enabling the electors to secretly mark the ballot-papers as hereinafter provided. And the chairman shall also cause to be erected a barrier to divide the part of such room used for taking the poll from the other part thereof.

9. No person other than the chairman, town clerk, poll clerk or clerks, the scrutineers, and the electors who shall for the time being be tendering their votes, shall be entitled to be at the polling side of the barrier; and any person other than such persons as aforesaid who shall intrude in such part of the room during the continuance of such poll, and being required by the chairman to withdraw, shall refuse to do so, shall, on conviction thereof before two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay a sum or penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds: Provided always that it shall be lawful for the chairman or the town clerk to summon to his assistance any member or members of the police force, for the purpose of preserving the public peace, quelling any breach thereof that may have arisen, and for removing from within such barrier or from the polling-room any person or persons who may in his or their opinion be obstructing the polling, or willfully violating any of the provisions of this bye-law or of the said Act.

10. The chairman shall cause to be printed and stamped with the municipal seal a sufficient number of voting-papers in the form set forth in the schedule to this bye-law, which voting-papers he shall have in his own custody, and shall write his initials on the back of every voting-paper before it shall be delivered to any ratepayer about to vote; and upon the delivery of each ballot-paper the chairman shall check, or cause to be checked, off upon a printed roll, signed by the chairman, the voter's name, and such check shall be *prima facie* evidence of the identity of the elector whose name shall appear on the roll, and the fact of his having voted at the election at which such ballot-paper was delivered.

11. Each candidate shall be entitled to appoint, by writing under his hand, to be delivered to the chairman at any time before Six o'clock of the evening preceding the polling, one scrutineer on his behalf in each polling-room.

12. It shall be lawful for the chairman, at the request of any candidate or scrutineer, to put to any person before he shall receive his voting-paper the following questions only:—

1. What is your christian name and surname?
2. Are you of the age of twenty-one years?
3. Are you the person whose name appears on the ratepayers' roll numbered —?
4. Have you already voted at this election?

And if any person shall wilfully give a false answer to any of the questions aforesaid, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence within the meaning of this bye-law, and on being convicted thereof before two or more justices of the peace, shall forfeit and pay a sum or penalty not exceeding Fifty pounds.

13. In case any candidate or ratepayer shall object to any person tendering his vote, as provided by clause 20 of 18 Victoria No. 15, or in case the voting-paper as of any person shall have been received, and any other person shall afterwards demand his voting-paper as of the same person, the chairman, when such person shall propose to deposit his voting-paper in the ballot-box, shall refuse to allow the same to be put therein, but shall receive and keep the same apart, and at the close of the election decide whether such person has already voted or not; and for the purpose of such decision it shall be lawful for the chairman of the council to take evidence on oath or affirmation, and such decision shall be final and conclusive on all parties; and if it shall appear to the chairman that such elector has not already voted, such vote shall be added to the numbers already polled, but if otherwise such vote shall not be allowed.

14. The chairman in each polling-room shall be provided with a locked box (of which he shall keep the key), with a cleft or opening in such box capable of receiving the voting-papers, and which box shall stand upon the table at which the chairman, poll clerks, and scrutineers shall preside; and each elector shall receive a voting-paper in the form in the schedule hereunto annexed, and shall thereupon retire alone to a desk or compartment provided for that purpose, and there strike out the name or names of such candidate or candidates as he does not intend to vote for, and deposit the same in the ballot-box, in the presence of the chairman, poll clerks, and such of the scrutineers as may be then present. And in case such elector shall be unable to read, or be blind, he shall signify the same to the chairman, who shall thereupon proceed with such elector to a desk or compartment as aforesaid, and there strike out the name or names of such candidate or candidates as such elector shall designate. And no elector shall take out of such polling-room any such voting-paper, either before or after he has marked the same. Any person wilfully infringing any of the provisions of this clause, or obstructing the polling by any unnecessary delay in performing any act within the polling-room, shall be deemed guilty of an offence within the meaning of this bye-law, and on being convicted thereof before any two or more justices of the peace, shall forfeit and pay a sum or penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds.

15. Every elector may vote for any number of candidates not exceeding the number of councillors to be chosen, and any ballot-paper recording a greater number of votes shall be absolutely rejected at the close of the poll.

16. At the close of the poll the chairman shall, as soon after as conveniently may be, in the presence of the poll clerks and scrutineers then present, count the number of votes polled for each candidate. And in the event of the number of votes being found to be equal for any two or more candidates, one or more of whom, but not all of such candidates, being by the state of the poll and the number of members to be elected entitled to be declared elected, the chairman shall, by a casting vote or votes, as the case may be, decide which of the candidates for whom the votes may be equal shall be elected. And the chairman shall then, in the presence of the scrutineers, seal up all the voting-papers given out during the poll, together with the copy or copies of the ratepayers' roll used for marking off the voters' names; and the town clerk shall safely preserve them for at least six months amongst the records of the council.

17. Any person personating, or attempting to personate, an elector or deceased elector, or who shall vote a second time on the same day, shall, on conviction thereof before two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay a sum or penalty not exceeding Fifty pounds.

18. Neither the chairman, poll clerks, scrutineers, or any other person, shall attempt to ascertain for whom any elector shall have voted, except as provided by clause 15 of this bye-law, or shall divulge the name or names of the candidate or candidates for whom such person shall have voted, except when required to do so by any court having competent jurisdiction, or directly or indirectly aid in the discovery of the same. Any breach of this clause shall subject the party so offending, on conviction thereof before two or more justices of the peace, to forfeit and pay a sum or penalty not exceeding Fifty pounds.

19. All places within which the polling is conducted shall be deemed to be public places.

20. All expenses incurred by the chairman of the council in carrying into effect this bye-law shall be paid and discharged by the municipal council out of the rates or other corporate funds.

Mr. Thomas Symons was proposed by Mr. Blake, seconded by Mr. Lambie.

Mr. Henry Thomas was proposed by Mr. Burnett, seconded by Mr. Lambie.

Mr. William Rose was proposed by Mr. Dickson, seconded by Mr. Weickhardt.

Mr. William Gubbins was proposed by Mr. Hick, seconded by Mr. Wallace.

The supplies to be delivered on the requisition of the officer in charge of the district or station, the quantities stated in the schedule being, however, only approximative, and it must be understood that the Government will draw either more or less than stated. The excess over the estimate will, however, in no case exceed 50 per cent.

3. The contracts entered into under this notice are not to be considered as being infringed or vitiated by any contracts made by the military commissariat.

4. The forage when delivered must be accompanied by an invoice of quantity, showing the gross weight, the tare, and the net weight (this should be on the back of the requisition or order), which, when signed by the officer in charge of the station for the net quantity received, will be returned to the contractor, and by him rendered in support of his account.

5. Each contractor will be required to prepare his own account, monthly, in the prescribed form, and on presentation thereof to the officer in charge of the station or district, it will be forwarded for payment at the Government Stores, Melbourne, or the Treasury Pay Office of the district, as may be indicated on the account.

6. Should forage duly ordered under these contracts not be delivered within forty-eight hours from a reasonable time to be fixed on the order, it will be competent for the department, should circumstances require it, to purchase the same at the risk of the contractor, from whose account any expense over and above the contract price is to be deducted.

7. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the officer receiving the forage, as to quality of the same, it is to be decided by a board of survey, composed of persons named by the head of a department, and the decision of the board is to be considered final.

8. If the board shall decide that the forage is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra cost, if any, will be charged as in clause 6.

9. When a board of survey cannot be conveniently assembled, or when from some other cause injury would accrue either to the public service or to the contractor by waiting for a board of survey, the officer in charge will have the power to reject such supplies as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing; and the contractor must take back the rejected forage and supply good in its stead, failing which it will be obtained by the officer requiring it, and the expense will be charged as in clause 6.

10. The total payments on account of public works amount to (including above) £2262 13s. 2d., the balance being paid for works ordered during last half-year, but not being completed at its termination, were paid for during the period included in this report.

The following works have been performed by day labor, employed by the council, at a cost of £133 7s. 1d.:—

The swamp between Napier and Smith streets drained, and George street raised and constructed across it, and Gore street partially so.

The footpaths of the following streets have been formed and gravelled, and the channels cleared and generally repaired:—

Reilly street, east of Brunswick street, Webb street, west end of Argyle street, Reid street, Shindorth street, and the east end of Westgarth street; the three latter streets being formed and metalled also. Victoria parade metalled where required, and the Fitz Roy half of the gardens therein put in order. The footpaths in Young, Hanover, Charles, Fene, George, Spring, Henry, Nicholson, and Atherton streets formed and gravelled. Several rough crossings have been constructed, and cube ditto

repaired; streets have been watered by two gangs of men. All the streets, thoroughfares, rights-of-way, &c., scavenged, cleaned, and accumulations of filth removed. 1700 loads of metal, and 1000 loads of gravel have been carted throughout the district; twenty-seven fire-plugs have been lowered and put into working order.

At the suggestion of some members of the council, tenders were called for the scavenger and cleansing work required in the district; the lowest eligible tender amounted to £573 12s., which was declined, as it exceeded the estimated cost of performing that work by day labor.

## REVENUE.

The sum of £7650 has been received on account of the grant-in-aid; the council anticipate a further payment of about £3000. (Final payment received on 8th October, £3295 11s. 11d.) The receipts from rates amount to £3532 18s. 6d. Of the rates due on 1st October, 1853, and 1st April, 1853, amounting altogether to £10,821 10s. 6d., the sum of £10,339 1s. 6d. has been collected, leaving a balance of £492 9s. (equal to about 4½ per cent.) still to collect; of which £191 alone are due from lands of disputed and trust-titles; and £30 from unknown proprietors. Of the rates due on 1st October, 1859, amounting to £4700 5s. 9d., the sum of £4339 11s. 3d. has been collected, leaving a balance of £310 14s. 6d. (equal to about 7 per cent.) still to be collected, a large portion of which can be accounted for as above.

## FIRE BRIGADE.

On the 10th of May last a letter was received from the Collingwood and Fitz Roy Volunteer Fire Brigade, intimating their intention of disbanding on 18th of June following. A vote of thanks was unanimously accorded by the council for the valuable and efficient services they had rendered to the district. The council, being of opinion the protection of the property in their municipality from fire would be better secured by the formation of a local brigade, under their direct and sole control, declined the proposal of the East Collingwood council for co-operative action. The United Insurance Companies having offered the sum of £50 per annum for defraying the expenses incurred for the suppression of fire, the council, on 11th July last, agreed to the suggestion of the Public Works Committee for the formation of a Fitz Roy Fire Brigade, composed principally of the men employed in watering the street, who, with the others, would only be paid for actual services rendered at fires. Under the superintendence of Mr. Geo. Rushall, the brigade has been efficiently drilled, and though their services have not yet been required in Fitz Roy, they have attended and suppressed two fires in East Collingwood, for which they have been paid by the United Insurance Companies.

## BYE-LAWS.

On the 10th of May last, the objections of the Crown law officers to certain restrictions contained in bye-laws Nos. 11 and 12 were read to the council. The former bye-law, No. 11, "For licensing Hawkers of Vegetable Produce and Firewood," contained a clause for charging a moderate fee for the license. To this the Government objected, although it was urged that the form and mode of issuing the license had been assimilated to a bye-law which had previously received the approval of the present law officers of the Crown. Considering there would be no advantage gained by granting licenses free of charge, the council declined taking any further steps in the mean time.

The objection taken against bye-law No. 12, "For the Regulation of public Carriers, Carters, and Drivers of public Vehicles," was, that it imposed restrictions on private vehicles, over which the Government asserted the council had no control. These restrictions compelled the use of a chain for locking wheels for the prevention of accident, to which private as well as public vehicles were equally liable; and provided also that all descriptions of vehicles should be driven at a walking pace past places of public worship during hours of service. Owing to the objections raised affecting the main objects of the bye-law, no further action has been taken.

## ANNEXATION OF THE QUARRIES.

The committee formed towards the close of last half-year to take active measures for obtaining the rejection of a bill for repealing the 4th, 5th, and 6th clauses of 18 Victoria, No. 15, were glad to find their exertions successfully terminated by the carrying by a majority of three of Mr. Don's motion for the consideration of the above bill that day six months. The council take this opportunity for acknowledging the valuable services rendered by the members for Collingwood in the Legislative Assembly during the protracted struggle for the annexation of the Quarries. On the 3rd of August a proclamation appeared in the *Government Gazette*, annexing that portion of Smith ward east of Nicholson street to this municipality, being an area of about 480 acres, estimated at a value of £200,000.

## COURT HOUSE.

In answer to the communication forwarded to the Chief Secretary on 21st March last, calling attention to the delay in the erection of the Court House, a reply was received on 18th April from the Crown Law Officers, stating that the indemnity given by the Fitz Roy council on 27th December, 1859, which, previous to execution, had been approved by that department, was imperfect and objectionable, and at the same time forwarding draft of a fresh bond for approval. This document contained provisions with which the council could not agree, for reasons submitted by their municipal solicitor to the law officers. The replies given in the Legislative Assembly to the inquiries of Dr. Embling respecting the cause of delay in the expenditure of the vote, led the council to solicit a joint interview with the Attorney-General and Commissioner of Public Works, which was granted. It was then explained by the latter member of Government that the existing legal difficulties would be removed by the passing of the Fitz Roy Ward Improvement Act Amendment Bill, and a promise given that steps would be taken to prevent the vote lapsing. On the 5th of September, the council again corresponded with the Chief Secretary, stating that the bill then only waited His Excellency's assent, and urgently

representing the necessity of the work being commenced without delay. In reply, it was stated that the communication had been transferred to the Crown law officers, from whom no information relative to the question has been yet received.

## FITZ ROY WARD IMPROVEMENT ACT AMENDMENT BILL.

Several moot points connected with the provisions of this bill, raised by the city corporation, having been satisfactorily settled at an interview between the mayor and the chairman of the Fitz Roy council, the bill passed both houses of the legislature without further opposition, and received His Excellency's assent on 18th September, 1860. A vote of thanks was unanimously accorded by the council to Dr. Embling for his valued services in conducting the bill through the Legislative Assembly.

## PUBLIC HEALTH.

The health officer has reported favorably upon the sanitary condition of the municipality. The council's attention having been directed to the injurious effects arising from improperly secured cesspools, caused a survey to be made of those existing in one of the best portions of the municipality. The report thereon disclosed the fact that even in that locality several water-closet cesspools were not built in or otherwise secured; and as most disastrous consequences might arise from their poisonous and putrid exhalations, the council at once caused notices to be served on the proprietors to take proper means for prevention of the evils complained of, by the construction of properly secured cesspools. From the Report of Public Works it will be observed the council are proceeding with the construction of the rights-of-way in the district; most of those that were in the worst condition are now constructed and channelled.

## BEATING THE BOUNDS.

On 31st August, 1860, the chairman, councillors, and officers, accompanied by a large number of the scholars attending the public schools in the district, beat the bounds of the municipality.
