CENTRAL BOARD OF HEALTH.

GENERAL INSTRUCTION TO OFFICERS OF HEALTH UNDER THE 7TH SECTION OF THE PUBLIC HEALTH ACT, 18 VICTORIA No. 13.

IT will be the duty of officers of health to make periodical reports to the local boards at the close of each half-year in regard to the health of the districts under their supervision, and they will append thereto a statement of the numbers of births and deaths occurring in their districts, with remarks on the causes of death, rates of mortality among various classes of persons and in different parts of the locality, among infants and children, and on any other subjects in connection with the statistics of life which may have engaged their attention.

They will also report to the local boards of health any undue prevalence of disease which may occur in their districts, whether general or confined to one particular locality; and if any epidemic, endemic, or infectious disease appears, or gives indication of appearing, they will report the circumstance at once to the local board, in order to enable them to comply with the twentieth section of the Act. They will also furnish the local boards, at the close of each half-year, with a certificate for transmission with the periodical reports of the local board to the central board, in reference to the progress or otherwise of such diseases, and any other information on the subject they may be able to afford. If, however, no such diseases have been prevalent, a certificate should be sent in to that effect.

Every facility will be afforded to the local boards and their officers of health for the examination of the statistical summaries prepared by the deputy registrars, which are more specially alluded to in this board's circular to local boards of health, on the investigation of vital statistics, a subject to which the central board desire to direct the special attention of officers of health.

ABROGATION OF THE SMYTHESDALE ROAD DISTRICT.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by a Proclamation under the Hand of the Governor and the Seal of the Colony, bearing date the twenty-fourth day of September in the present year, a certain road district designated "The Smythesdale Road District" was declared and defined as therein mentioned: And whereas three several public meetings of the landowners and householders in such district have been holden, purporting to be meetings for the election of a road board for the said district: And whereas doubts are entertained as to which of such meetings has been validly holden according to law, and it is expedient to terminate the uncertainty by the abrogation of the district: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, having taken the circumstances herebefore mentioned into consideration, and deeming it advisable, in order to avert the confusion and litigation likely to arise therefrom, to abrogate the district, do hereby revoke the said Proclamation of the Smythesdale road district aforesaid.

PARISHES OF YANGARDOOK AND HOLDEN.

ARARAT MINING DISTRICT.

BYE-LAW No. 4.—SUPPLEMENTARY TO BYE-LAW No. 3, REGULATING ALLUVIAL MINING IN THE ARARAT DIVISION OF THE ARARAT DISTRICT.—[15th May, 1860.]

At a meeting of the Mining Board of the Mining District of Ararat, begun and holden at Burnside's Hotel, Pleasant Creek, in the said district, on the 15th day of May, One thousand eight hundred and sixty, it is ordained by the said board as follows, that is to say:—

1. *Protection to stacked cement, tailings, &c.*—Any person or persons wishing to retain possession of cement, tailings, or other substance for the purpose of extracting gold therefrom, may do so for three (3) months from the date of a notice posted thereon by him or them, such date to be the day of the posting thereof, containing therein the name or names and address or addresses of such person or persons, together with the number and date of the miner's right of him or each of them; provided that such substance be stacked in a proper manner upon ground not supposed to be payable for mining purposes. And if at the expiration of the said period of three months such person or persons shall wish to retain such possession for any longer period, he or they shall be at liberty so to do, provided that such substance be then forthwith registered with the officer appointed for that purpose, and that such registration be renewed at the termination of every period of three months for which such possession shall be so retained, and also provided such substance shall be kept stacked during such longer period in manner aforesaid, failing which such substance shall be deemed abandoned. When the site so occupied shall prove auriferous, the warden may order the stack to be removed, and the parties requiring the ground for mining purposes shall defray the expense incurred thereby.

The undersigned members of the said mining board concurred in making the foregoing bye-law.

ARARAT MINING DISTRICT.

BYE-LAW No. 5.—TO REGULATE ALLUVIAL MINING IN THE PLEASANT CREEK DIVISION OF THE ARARAT DISTRICT.—[15th May, 1860.]

At a meeting of the Mining Board of the Mining District of Ararat, begun and holden at Burnside's Hotel, Pleasant Creek, in the said district, on the 15th day of May, One thousand eight hundred and sixty, it is ordained by the said board as follows, that is to say:—

GENERAL.

1. *Marking claims.*—Claims shall be marked by fixing in the ground a conspicuous peg at each corner, and in such a manner as that the boundary lines which meet at any peg shall form as nearly as practicable right angles with each other, and such pegs shall be kept visible until the claim shall be abandoned.

2. *Neutral ground.*—Not less than two (2) feet nor more than three (3) feet of neutral ground shall be left between adjoining claims by the party last marking out, which neutral ground may be worked by either or any of the adjoining claimholders, provided they securely timber the same; any party neglecting so to timber the same will be liable to the conditions and penalties specified in clauses 26 and 28.

3. *Spare ground and oversized claims.*—Any miner may measure the surface area of any claim, and should there be too much ground therein may take possession of the excess on whichever side of such claim he may prefer, or of any spare ground, provided the superficial area so to be taken possession of shall not exceed the quantity allowed by this bye-law.

4. *Shepherding.*—Every miner must be present on his claim, until his shaft shall have been bottomed, every lawful day (after that on which it was taken possession of) for two consecutive hours between Nine a.m. and Twelve noon. Any miner not fulfilling this condition will be liable to forfeit his share, unless in case of dispute he can give sufficient reason to the warden for the same.

5. *Forfeiture of claims.*—Claims bottomed and left unworked for forty-eight (48) hours without permission of the warden (except where specially provided for) shall be deemed abandoned.

6. *Forfeiture of interest.*—Any miner forfeiting his interest in a claim shall not be entitled to any portion of his former partners' interest therein.

7. *Justifiable absence.*—Any miner whose absence from his claim shall be caused by illness, or attendance on a sick person or court of justice, or by urgent business, may hold his share unworked for

any reasonable time; but a majority of the other shareholders may have his place supplied by a competent miner, and he shall be responsible for any reasonable wages to the miner so employed.

8. *Disputed shares or claims.*—Any miner intending to take possession of a disputed claim, or share in a claim, must mark out or otherwise claim the same, and then obtain the authority of the warden before taking further possession thereof.

9. *Slabs.*—Any person or persons removing slabs from or taking possession of a slabbed shaft abandoned for a period of less than a month, shall be liable to pay the owner or owners of such slabs for the value of the same. Slabs left more than one month in an abandoned shaft shall be deemed forfeited.

10. *Removal of slabs.*—When slabs shall be removed from a shaft it must be immediately filled up above the level of the drift in which water occurs, by the person or persons removing them.

11. *Holidays.*—Miners may be absent from their claims on all the following days, viz.:—Good Friday to Easter Tuesday, both inclusive; 24th December to 2nd January, both inclusive; any day on which the election of a member for the legislature or mining board of this district may take place, the day before and the day after such election; and any day proclaimed a holiday by His Excellency the Governor or the warden, except as provided in clause 38.

12. *Machinery.*—Any miner intending to erect steam machinery solely for the purpose of working a claim, shall, on making a declaration to the warden to that effect within twenty-four (24) hours after having marked out the claim, be entitled to hold an additional extent of ground equal to the quantity allowed for one miner for each two (2) nominal horse power of the machinery; provided that after a reasonable time shall have been allowed for the erection of such machinery, the same must be in work on the claim, or the additional ground shall be forfeited.

13. *Accidents to machinery.*—The working of any claim being impeded by any accident to the machinery employed therein, it shall be lawful for the warden to grant a suspension certificate (a copy of which must be kept posted on some conspicuous part of the claim), specifying the time allowed for repairing the same.

14. *Owners of machinery may take possession of abandoned claim.*—Should any share or interest in a claim on which machinery shall have been erected be abandoned, the owner or owners of the machinery may take possession and continue the working of the claim by means of hired labor or otherwise; provided that within one week from the date of such abandonment the share or interest shall be commenced and from thenceforth continued to be worked by the full number of men, and in the manner prescribed by this bye-law.

15. *Protection to furnishers of machinery.*—Any person or persons supplying machinery for working a claim shall be protected in the interest he or they may hold by virtue of such machinery, and shall be entitled to the gold due to such interest.

16. *Tunnels and tramways.*—Any miner or miners cutting a race or tunnel, or laying down a tramway for the greater convenience of working his or their claim, may hold possession thereof, together with his or their claim; provided the same shall not impede the works of any other miner or miners, or obstruct roads in ordinary use.

17. *Protection to stacked cement, tailings, &c.*—Any miner or miners wishing to retain possession of cement, tailings, or other substance, for the purpose of extracting gold therefrom, may do so for three (3) months, by having a notice kept posted thereon, containing the names and addresses of the owners; provided the same be stacked in a proper manner, upon ground not supposed to be payable for mining purposes. At the expiration of which time it must be registered with the officer appointed for that purpose, and such registration must be renewed every three (3) months, failing which it shall be deemed abandoned.

18. *Sites proving auriferous.*—When the site occupied by a dam, tramway, or race, or for stacking cement, tailings, &c., shall prove auriferous, the warden may order it to be mined upon, and parties benefited by such order shall before commencing work thereon compensate the owners for any injury sustained, the amount thereof, if disputed, to be settled by the warden, or warden and assessors.

19. *Machinery claims must be registered.*—All claims sanctioned by this bye-law to be held for or in respect of any machinery, must be registered with the officer appointed for that purpose, together with a plan of the ground so held, and the name of each shareholder, and the number, date, and place of issue of his miner's right; and a statement of the nominal horse power of the machinery must be kept posted on some conspicuous part of the claim. And any miner or miners taking possession of any unoccupied share in any claim shall be liable for any reasonable amount of expense that may be due thereon.

20. *Amalgamation.*—The holders of any number of adjoining claims may amalgamate by posting, in some conspicuous place near the centre of such claims, a notice in writing, containing the number of claims amalgamated, the name of each shareholder, with the number, date, and place of issue of their respective miners' right.

21. *Conditions of holding.*—Any miner may work a quartz reef, or make a race or tramway, or erect machinery, tents, or buildings on any claim sanctioned by this bye-law, provided that the same can be done without detriment to the said claim.

22. *Presence of partners.*—It shall not be necessary for all the members of a partnership to be present at the marking out of partnership claims, or at the commencement of any work deemed to be for the interest of such partnership. The fact of their having previously associated for mining purposes shall entitle each member to an equal share in any claim marked out

by any of the partners, provided no agreement shall have been made for any unequal distribution of shares.

23. *Deceased partners.*—The surviving partners of any deceased miner may hold and work his interest for the benefit of his representative.

24. *Agreements among shareholders.*—Whatever mutual written agreements and engagements may be entered into by the shareholders of any claim for the proper working thereof, shall be binding upon anyone taking possession of a forfeited or abandoned share or interest in such claim.

25. *Effacing notices or removing pegs.*—Any person who shall wilfully efface, alter, remove, or destroy any notice posted on a claim, or the pegs thereof, shall be liable to the penalties specified in clause 28.

26. *Timbering.*—Any miner or miners neglecting to securely timber their ground shall be liable to any adjoining claimholders for any injury that may be sustained thereby.

27. *Injury to claims.*—Any person cutting a drain into a shaft, or removing earth from around a shaft without making a sufficient embankment to prevent water running into it, shall be liable for all damages resulting therefrom; and if any miner shall continue to do so after receiving notice from the warden to discontinue, such miner shall be liable for each offence to a penalty as specified in clause 28.

28. *Penalty for breach of bye-laws.*—Any person committing a breach of this bye-law, though not entailing forfeiture of their claim or interest, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds, in accordance with the Gold Fields Act.

PROSPECTING.

29. *Discovering payable gold.*—Any miner discovering payable gold shall make such discovery known to the warden without delay; any miner neglecting to do so shall not be entitled to a claim beyond the ordinary size.

30. *Protection.*—Prospectors in new ground shall be protected as long as they continue to work in a *bona fide* manner, and on obtaining payable gold shall be at liberty to mark their claim in any direction, commencing within one hundred (100) yards of their shaft, after which they shall be subject to the provisions of the bye-laws regulating the same.

31. *Number of party.*—Prospectors shall not be granted a claim for a greater number of miners than eight (8) if in dry sinking; in wet sinking the number shall be unlimited.

32. *Size of claim.*—The size of claim for one miner in new ground shall be one hundred (100) feet by one hundred (100) feet, and for two (2) or more miners seventy-five (75) feet for each miner by a uniform breadth of one hundred and fifty (150) feet.

33. *Lost leads.*—Miners prospecting for a lost lead shall be entitled to seventy (70) feet by seventy (70) feet for one miner, and for two or more miners fifty (50) feet for each miner by a uniform breadth of one hundred (100) feet.

34. *Title or grant.*—Previous to being entitled to a prospecting claim, or to the receiving of a grant from the warden, each miner shall certify on oath to the warden that he has actually been engaged in such prospecting from its commencement if in dry ground, or if in wet ground from the commencement or from such time as it became necessary that the original party should be increased in consequence of the nature of the ground and the quantity of water.

EXTENT OF ORDINARY CLAIMS IN NEW GROUND.

35. *Size of claims.*—The size of an ordinary claim for one miner shall be forty (40) feet by forty (40) feet, and for two or more miners thirty (30) feet for each miner by a uniform breadth of sixty (60) feet.

WET GROUND.

36. *Commencement of work.*—Claimholders within three claims of any claim in which water has been struck shall, without delay, commence to sink their shaft, and must continue to do so during the usual working hours of every lawful day, until the "well" shall be completed or the claim abandoned, unless the water shall prove too heavy, and work shall be struck with the consent of the adjoining claimholders; provided that three days from the date of occupation shall be allowed for making preparations for sinking. Non-compliance with this clause shall render the claim liable to forfeiture.

37. *Claims unworked.*—Any party beyond the three claims above mentioned may hold their claim unworked by fulfilling the conditions specified in clause 4.

38. *Water baling.*—The owner or owners of any claim or share neglecting or refusing, when requested by the holders of the adjoining claims, to bale their fair proportion of water during the day, or if ordered by the warden during the night, and also on holidays, shall render his or their claim or share liable to forfeiture.

39. *Injury to claims by not baling.*—Claimholders within three claims of any claim in which water shall have been struck neglecting or refusing, when requested by the holders of adjoining claims, to bale their fair proportion of water, shall be liable for any injury done thereby to adjoining claimholders.

OLD WORKINGS.

40. *Interpretation clause.*—The term "old workings" shall mean ground on which a number of shafts shall have been sunk, and which shall have been for the greater part undermined or worked out for at least three months.

41. *Size of claims.*—The extent of claim for each miner shall be two hundred (200) feet by one hundred (100) feet.

42. *Machinery or race.*—Any person or party erecting a whim, steam engine, or other machinery, or making a water race, solely for the purpose of working a claim, shall be entitled to hold an additional extent of ground of two hundred (200) feet by one hundred (100) feet for each nominal horse power so employed, or for each mile of a water race so made.

43. *Holding claims unworked.*—Claims may be held unworked while the owners are engaged erecting machinery, or making a tramway, water race, tunnel, dam, puddling machine, or other works in connection therewith; or if the supply of water be insufficient to carry on the working of claims, the owners of such claims may, by posting a notice to that effect (containing the names of such owners, and the date, number, and place of issue of their respective miners' rights) in some conspicuous place on their claims, hold the same unworked, and work other claims until sufficient water shall be obtained for the working of the claims so held unworked, within four days after which work must be resumed on such last named claims, or otherwise the same shall be liable to forfeiture.

WATER PRIVILEGES.

44. *Application for water privileges.*—Any person or persons desirous of obtaining a site for a water privilege shall make application to the warden in the following form:—I (or we) hereby request that you will grant to me (or us) the possession of (specify the site applied for) as a water privilege for mining purposes, in accordance with the bye-law of this district relating thereto (names in full of the whole party, together with the date, number, and place of issue of their miners' rights). A copy of the above notice, legibly written, must be kept posted on the site applied for, for seven days prior to the granting of the application; if no valid objection be made (in writing) to the warden within the seven days the site applied for may be granted.

45. *Extent of dams.*—The extent of dam where machinery shall be used shall not exceed one hundred (100) yards square, above the main embankment; where machinery shall not be employed the extent shall not exceed one hundred (100) feet square.

46. *Sludge.*—Where machinery shall be employed, the owner or owners thereof shall construct a second embankment for the purpose of retaining the sludge, not more than fifty (50) yards below the main embankment, except it can be more conveniently carried off by drainage, without injuring other persons or roads in ordinary use.

47. *Injury to property by dams.*—In case of any dam breaking away and injuring the property of others, the owner or owners of such dam shall be liable for any injury sustained thereby, unless it can be proved to the satisfaction of the warden, or warden and assessors, that such breaking away did not result from the faulty construction of the dam.

48. *Drains.*—In any case when sludge or water drains or runs across any road in general use, a substantial bridge, not less than fourteen feet in width, the culvert of which must be of sufficient size to carry off the said sludge or water, must be constructed and kept in repair by the owner or owners of the claim or claims from which such sludge or water proceeds.

49. *Penalty for defiling or carting away water.*—Any person driving cattle into or in any way defiling or carting away the water from any dam without the consent of the owner or owners thereof shall be liable to the penalties specified in clause 28.

50. *Forfeiture of dams.*—The site of any dam not commenced within seven (7) days from the date of the grant thereof, or not completed in a reasonable time, or any dam unoccupied for two months during sufficient supply of water, shall be deemed forfeited, and may be taken possession of by any miner by permission of the warden.

51. *Waterholes reserved.*—Waterholes, reservoirs, or springs may be reserved by the warden for domestic purposes, but no monopoly of any spring or natural waterhole shall be allowed.

52. *Repeal of former bye-laws.*—From and after the time at which this bye-law shall come into operation all former bye-laws relating to alluvial mining in the Pleasant Creek division of the Ararat district, excepting the three (viz. No. 13 of the 9th November, 1855, No. 15 of the 17th December, 1853, and No. 13 of the 6th December, 1853) relating to water rights, &c., for sluicing, shall be and are hereby repealed.

BYE-LAWS.

The following bye-laws made by the council have received the assent of His Excellency the Governor, viz.:

- Bye-law No. 15. For making an assessment and levying a rate of One shilling in the pound.
- Bye-law No. 16. For the appropriation of the first instalment of grant-in-aid for 1860.

ASSESSMENT.

The gross assessment for the current year amounted to £23,907, on which reductions were made at a court of appeal of £1342 10s., leaving a net amount of £22,564 10s.

ELECTION.

On the 8th of October Councillor Kersley tendered his resignation, in consequence of his departure for England, and on the 8th November following Councillor D. W. Virtue was elected without opposition to fill the vacant seat in the council.

FINANCE.

The debt of £461 9s. owing at the last half-yearly report to the Bank of Victoria has been paid with interest, and the council had on the 4th November a balance of £138 3s. 9d. in the London Chartered Bank.

The defalcations that appear in the accounts of the late rate collector, in consequence of his untimely decease, can only be explained by the circumstance of his having employed another person to collect rates who was not responsible to the council, and against whom the council is debarred from instituting legal proceedings.

The repayment of the debt to the bank, and the presentation of accounts of long standing for payment, has necessarily limited the expenditure on public works. The funds in hand, however, and the rates to be collected during the next half-year, will enable the council to show a larger amount expended on public works at the date of the next half-yearly report.

A rate of One shilling in the pound was struck on the 21st day of August, a portion of which for the first half-year has yet to be collected.

Owing to the small amount of rates collected during the last year, the first instalment of grant-in-aid from Government was only £592 12s. 3d., and the balance £221 6s. 5d. From the amount of rates collected, and to be collected during the current year, it is anticipated that the grant for next year will be more than doubled.

PUBLIC WORKS.

The following works have been completed, viz.:

- Clearing and forming Clarendon street, from Hospital street to Nightingale street.
- Clearing and forming Nightingale street, from High street to Clarendon street.
- Forming a portion of Clarendon street to Inkerman street.
- Cutting and forming water-tables in Clarendon street to Inkerman street.
- Clearing and forming Inkerman street from Clarendon street to High street.
- Repairs to drain in High street, corner of Inkerman street.
- Repairs to drain in High street, corner of Nolan street.

- Cutting watercourse, ten feet in width, from Inkerman street to Nolan street, and from Nolan street to Hospital street, to carry off the storm water.

ELECTIONS.

At the nomination of candidates on 28th September, 1860, for the seats of Councillors J. K. Brown, Louis Chevalier, and Geo. B. Kerferd, who retired from the council by rotation, Councillors J. K. Brown and Kerferd were again put forward, as were also Messrs. P. D. Ramsay, Richard Warren, and William Whicheloe; the show of hands being, however, in favor of the three first named, and a poll not being demanded by either of the others, Messrs. P. D. Ramsay (by twenty-five votes), J. K. Brown (by twenty-four votes), and G. B. Kerferd (by nineteen votes), were declared duly elected.

And on the 5th October, 1860, Councillor Geo. B. Kerferd, J.P., was elected chairman for the ensuing year.

WATER SUPPLY.

The Water Works Bill referred to in the previous Report, has (under the management of the council's agent, B. Cowderoy, Esq., J.P.), now passed into law.

PUBLIC WORKS.

The council have accepted contracts for the completion of the town hall, and for certain improvements in the public garden reserve, all which works are progressing satisfactorily, and will be paid out of special Government grants.

The town hall, in addition to its other purposes, will be also used as a petty sessions court house when completed.

All other necessary works in the municipality have been carried out by day labor, under direction of the town clerk, as during the previous half-year, and for the same reason as given in the last report.

GOVERNMENT ROAD WORKS.

The council having been entrusted by the Government with the improvement of the main roads between Beechworth and Chiltern, Beechworth and Bowman's Forest, and between Tarrawingee and Porepunka, the necessary works on those roads have been carried out under the direction of Mr. Superintendent Thomas Dalziel, and so far as they have proceeded, have given general satisfaction.

FREE PUBLIC LIBRARY AND READING ROOM.

The council believing that great benefit would accrue to the municipality from the establishment of a public library and reading room, purchased the Athenaeum in Loch street for that purpose, and the same is now open to the public free, under certain restrictions and regulations. The total cost of the quarter acre of land, stone building, fixtures, furniture, books, and papers, was £360. The council have received promise of Government aid to the institution, and have themselves agreed to subsidize it in proportion to the subscriptions collected.

APPLICATIONS TO GOVERNMENT.

For the expenditure in the improvement of the ranges between Beechworth and Albury of the surplus of the Murray River Bridge vote.—Reply, "Such appropriation not considered legal."

For the free grant of a fire engine.—Refused, but one offered at a valuation which the council declined.

For an unconditional grant-in-aid for public garden.—£150 granted and paid.

For the appointment of J. B. Castieau, Esq., the governor of H.M. gaol, Beechworth, as keeper of the local powder magazine. Appointment made.

That a salary may be provided for same.—Provision cannot be made until compilation of ensuing estimates.
