EXPORTATION OF ARMS AND GUNPOWDER, AND OTHER WARLIKE STORES,
RESTRICTED.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the twenty-first year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act to consolidate and amend the Laws relating to the Customs*, it is amongst other things enacted, that the following goods may by Proclamation or Order of the Governor in Council be prohibited either to be exported or carried coastwise, that is to say, Arms, Ammunition, and Gunpowder, Military and Naval Stores, and any articles which the Governor shall judge capable of being converted into or made useful in increasing the quantity of military or naval stores; and if any goods so prohibited shall be exported from the colony or carried coastwise, or be waterborne to be so exported or carried, they shall be forfeited:

And whereas certain aboriginal natives of the colony of New Zealand are in arms against the Queen's sovereign authority, and it is therefore expedient that the exportation of warlike stores to such colony be prohibited: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, in exercise of the power vested in me in that behalf by the said Act, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby prohibit the exportation from any port or place in Victoria aforesaid of Arms, Ammunition, Gunpowder, Military and Naval Stores, or any articles which may be converted to a military or naval purpose, except in manner and subject to the conditions hereinafter mentioned or referred to, that is to say:—From and after the date hereof, Arms, Ammunition, Gunpowder, or other warlike stores shall and may be exported only under license, in writing, first obtained for that purpose under the hand of the Commissioner of Trade and Customs for the time being, and only at the place, in the manner, and subject to the conditions (if any) specified in such license: Provided always that nothing in this proclamation shall be construed to apply to the exportation of supplies for the use of Her Majesty's land and sea forces.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this seventeenth day of April, in the year of Our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty, and in the twenty-third year of Her Majesty's Reign.

BREAD, ETC., MEAT AND GROCERIES.

TENDERS will be received until Noon on Tuesday, the 8th May, from persons willing to supply Bread, &c., Meat and Groceries, in such quantities as may be required by the various departments of the service (except the military) in Geelong, from the 1st June to the 31st December, 1860, inclusive. Tenders for bread, &c., meat and groceries, will be accepted or rejected separately.

Printed forms of tender, with schedule of articles required, may be obtained from the Government Storekeeper, Melbourne, or from the Police Magistrate, Geelong.

The conditions of contract will be those dated 13th March, 1860, published in the *Government Gazette*, pages 477, 478.

No tender can be entertained unless accompanied by a certificate from two responsible persons that they are willing to become bound as sureties in the sum of £100 for the due fulfilment of each contract, and in the event of the tender being accepted, the bond must be executed within seven days, failing which the contract may be again advertised or another tender accepted.

The value of all packages, whether in bulk or otherwise, is to be included in the price demanded.

Tenders, endorsed, "Tender for ——" as the case may be, are to be deposited in the Box at the Government Stores, or addressed to the Government Storekeeper, Melbourne.

The Government will not necessarily accept the lowest or any tender.

The decision of the Government will be made known on or before the 15th May, 1860.

PROVISIONS AND OTHER ARTICLES.

TENDERS will be received until Noon on Tuesday, the 8th May, from persons willing to supply Provisions and other articles, in such quantities as may be required by the various departments of the public service (except the military), in Geelong, from the 1st June to the 31st December, 1860, inclusive.

Schedules of the articles required, with ration scales and forms of tender, may be obtained from the Government Storekeeper, Melbourne, or from the Police Magistrate Geelong.

The conditions of contract will be those dated 15th November, 1859, published in the *Government Gazette*, pages 2451, 2452.

No tender will be entertained unless accompanied by a certificate from two responsible persons that they are willing to become bound as sureties in the sum of £200 for the due fulfilment of the contract, and in the event of the tender being accepted, the bond must be executed within seven days, failing which the contract may be again advertised, or another tender accepted.

The tender must include the whole of the Rations and other articles; the value of all packages, whether the supplies are in bulk or otherwise, is to be included in the price demanded.

Tenders, endorsed, "Tender for Provisions, &c.," are to be deposited in the Box at the Government Stores, or addressed to the Government Storekeeper, Melbourne.

The Government will not necessarily accept the lowest or any tender.

The decision of the Government will be made known on or before the 15th May, 1860.
