ORDER IN COUNCIL  
(Made under 21 Victoria No. 32, § 12, 13)

FOR  
REGULATING SPECIAL LEASES OF CROWN LAND  
IN THE MINING DISTRICT OF MARYBOROUGH.

At the Government House, Melbourne, the fourth day of June, 1860.

PRESENT:

His Excellency the Governor

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the twenty-first year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act for amending the Laws relative to the Gold Fields*, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor to demise to any person, for any term not exceeding ten years from the making of such lease, any auriferous Crown land for mining purposes, and also to grant water rights and other easements for such purposes, and to fix the amount to be paid by way of rent or royalty for the same respectively; and it is also enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, from time to time, to make such regulations, not being contrary to the provisions of the said Act, as shall appear to be necessary for prescribing the form of documents and leases to be issued under the said Act, the modes, times, dates, and places of the issue thereof, the conditions on which such leases shall be issued, and such regulations from time to time to alter, vary or amend: And whereas an Order of the Governor in Council was made on the tenth day of October, 1859, for regulating mining leases of auriferous Crown land in the Mining District of Maryborough: And whereas it is deemed expedient to add thereto the regulation hereinafter specified: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order make the additional regulation hereinafter set forth touching the granting of special leases of Crown land in the said mining district of Maryborough, that is to say:—

I. In addition to gold mining leases, leases of lands required for the construction of dams, or for sites for the erection of machinery, and whereon it is not proposed to mine for gold, and the areas of which shall in no case exceed ten acres, may also be granted; and such leases shall be subject to an annual rent of one pound per acre, payable half-yearly in advance; and such special lease shall not entitle the holder thereof to mine in or upon any land so leased; and if any land so leased and occupied shall afterwards prove to be auriferous, the occupiers thereof shall be liable to be removed therefrom upon payment of compensation by persons desirous of entering thereon for mining purposes, the amount of such compensation to be determined by a warden, or warden and assessors, and such lease shall thereupon be deemed to be absolutely void.

II. This regulation shall take effect and come into operation on the 5th day of June instant.

At Gisborne, once at least in every six calendar months.  
And the Honorable John Dennistoun Wood, Her Majesty's Attorney General for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the twenty-first year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act for regulating Juries*, it is enacted that in case any assizes, or any county court or court of general sessions of the peace, shall hereafter be lawfully directed or appointed to be holden at any town other than those at which the same are now holden, the clerk of petty sessions at such court town, and the clerk of petty sessions at every other town or place within the jury district of such court town, and all justices, constables, officers of police, and sheriffs, shall, within such time as the Governor with the advice of the Executive Council shall order for that occasion only, do and perform all such acts, matters and things in and towards preparing, correcting, allowing, sending and delivering the lists of men qualified and liable to serve as aforesaid, and making out the jury books for every such jury district as are thereinbefore required to be ordinarily done at a different time or period; and all such last-mentioned jury books shall be brought into use, and the persons whose names shall be therein set down shall be liable to serve immediately after the same shall have been made out by the sheriff; and the said last-mentioned books shall be used until new books shall have been prepared under the provisions thereinbefore contained: And whereas by an Order of the Governor in Council, bearing even date herewith, it is ordered that a county court shall be holden at GISBORNE, the same being a place at which a county court has not previously been holden: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order direct that a jury list shall be prepared for the jury district of Gisborne, in the manner and within the intervals hereinafter stated, that is to say:—

The clerk of petty sessions at Gisborne shall issue his warrant to prepare and make out the jury list for the jury district of Gisborne, on or before Wednesday, the thirteenth day of June instant; such list shall be prepared forthwith, and the notice prescribed by the eighth section of the said Act shall be fixed, as provided by the Act, on Sunday, the twenty-fourth day of June aforesaid, and on Sunday, the first day of July now next ensuing; the court of petty sessions at Gisborne shall revise such list on Friday, the thirteenth day of July aforesaid; such list shall be sent to the sheriff on or before Tuesday, the seventeenth day of July aforesaid; and the jury book shall be prepared and brought into use on or before Monday, the thirtieth day of the same month of July.

And the Honorable John Dennistoun Wood, Her Majesty's Attorney General for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

MUNICIPALITY OF CASTLEMAINE.  
BYE-LAW No. 41.—FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A VOLUNTEER FIRE COMPANY.

WHEREAS by an Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is empowered to make bye-laws for the prevention and extinguishing of fires: And whereas it is expedient to make effectual provision for the control and management of the necessary means and appliances for the extinguishing fire and for the protection of life and property by the establishment of a local company: Be it therefore ordered and enacted by the municipal council of Castlemaine as follows:—

First, That it shall be lawful for this council to appoint a committee to enrol the names of residents of this district for the formation of a company, under the name and title of the Municipal Fire Brigade.

Second, That the council shall appoint some fit and proper person to preside as chairman at all meetings to be convened by the brigade, and further to superintend the execution of this bye-law. This council shall also appoint a person to be secretary, and may from time to time at their pleasure remove any persons so appointed and appoint others in their stead.

Third, That the business and proceedings of the said fire brigade shall be conducted according to the following rules and regulations.

RULES.

1. *Object.*—That this company shall be established and disciplined in the use of the most available means and appliances for extinguishing fire, and in the most approved method of arresting its progress and protecting the lives and property of the occupants.

2. *Constitution.*—That the brigade shall consist of a company formed from the residents of the district, with power to choose from among themselves the necessary officers—the superintendent and secretary alone excepted, who shall be appointed by the municipal council.

3. *Duties of superintendent.*—The superintendent shall preside at all meetings of the brigade, have command of all the appliances, and the whole arrangement and management at fires and practice.

4. *Duties of secretary.*—The secretary shall keep proper minutes of all meetings, shall conduct and record all correspondence, shall call all meetings, shall explain the business to be transacted, and prepare the annual reports.

5. *Duties of first officer.*—The first officer shall see that the engine is ready for action; at a fire he shall keep near the engine to direct its working, receiving his instructions from the superintendent, and in his absence shall take the direction of the brigade.

6. *Duties of second officer.*—The second officer shall hold the branch pipe, give orders for the number of lengths of hose which may be required, and project the stream of water in the most advantageous manner.

7. *Duties of first officer's assistant.*—He is to assist the first officer in carrying out his duties, and to represent him in his absence by directing the working of the engine.

8. *Duties of second officer's assistant.*—He is to assist the second officer in carrying out his duties, and represent him in his absence.

9. *Duties of hose-men.*—The hose-men shall take their instructions from the second officer, and apply or alter the number of lengths of hose, and protect them from all obstructions and injury.

10. *Duties of pioneers.*—The pioneers shall clear away any obstruction that may impede the action of the engine, and work the engine till sufficient aid is obtained.

11. *Committee of management.*—That eight persons shall form a committee of management, to consist of the superintendent, secretary, first and second officers *ex officio*, and of four members, to be chosen from among themselves annually; any vacancy that may occur to be filled at a special meeting of members convened for the purpose.

12. *Duties of committee of management.*—The committee of management shall have the superintendence of all materials, tools and appliances at the command and control of the brigade, and generally to direct for the best use of the service all matters that are not otherwise especially provided for.

Meetings of this committee to be convened whenever the superintendent or any two members request the secretary to do so in writing, naming the business.

13. *Committee quorum.*—That four members of the committee of management shall constitute a quorum for transacting all committee business.

14. *General quorum.*—That eight members of the brigade shall constitute a quorum for transacting business at general and special meetings.

15. *Mode of elections.*—That all elections for officers and members of committee shall be by nomination and ballot; and

that no person shall be admitted as a member unless he be nominated and seconded at a monthly meeting, and duly elected by ballot at the ensuing monthly meeting.

16. *Removal of members.*—That if a notice of motion to the effect be given at a general monthly meeting, any member (exclusive of the superintendent and secretary) may be removed from the brigade by a majority of votes at the following monthly meeting, subject to the sanction of the municipal council.

17. *Monthly general meetings.*—That there shall be a general meeting of the members of the brigade held on the first Monday in each month, for the purpose of nominating and electing members, for fixing the time of meeting and practice for the current month, and for general business.

18. *Special meetings.*—That a special meeting of members for the transaction of business may be called by the committee of management whenever they consider it necessary, or may be called upon the requisition of any six members, the said requisition being transmitted to the secretary; and due notice shall be given by the secretary to each member, stating the object for which the meeting is convened.

19. *Annual meeting.*—That there shall be an annual meeting of all members on the first Monday in December of each year, for the election of officers and committee-men, and for considering the adoption of the annual report and other necessary business.

20. *Report meeting.*—That the secretary shall convene a meeting of four members not in office at least one week previous to the annual meeting, to examine and determine upon the report, and if necessary to audit accounts.

21. *Regulations at meetings.*—That at all meetings the customary forms and regulations shall be observed. That the voting on all ordinary occasions shall be by show of hands; but that any member may move that it be otherwise, in which case the sense of the meeting shall decide the point. The chairman, secretary, officers, and all members present at the meetings, shall be entitled to vote, and whenever there is an equality of numbers on a division, the chairman shall be entitled to a casting vote.

22. *Attendance of members.*—Any member absenting himself for three consecutive meetings, without satisfactory cause, shall cease to be a member.

Fourth, Any person or persons obstructing the members of the municipal fire brigade in the execution of their duty, shall, upon conviction, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Five pounds.

Fifth, That this council shall from time to time, as they may see fit, repeal any of the rules and provisions contained in this bye-law, and substitute others for those repealed, or alter and amend all or any of the said rules and provisions; and such substitutions, alterations and emendations, shall, when sanctioned by His Excellency the Governor, have the same force and effect as they would have had had they been in the original.

PROPOSED ROAD DISTRICT.

THE MARYBOROUGH MINING DISTRICT.

THE Chairman and members of the Municipal Council of Maryborough have presented a petition to His Excellency the Governor, wherein they state to the following effect; viz:—

That they reside in the mining district of Maryborough, which extends from the Deep Creek, at Carisbrook, to Mount Korong on the north, and comprises a large mining and agricultural population, as well as the important and populous gold fields of Back Creek, Lamplough, Inglewood, Sandy Creek, &c.:

That the traffic between the town of Maryborough, and various places in the mining district, is very considerable, but the roads being in a deplorable condition, and certain bridges having been carried away by floods, commercial intercourse is obstructed to the serious inconvenience and loss of the inhabitants:

That they are convinced His Excellency has it in his power to a considerable extent to remedy these evils by proclaiming the area of the mining district to be a road district.

They further state they are of opinion that under the present system the roads and bridges have not received the attention requisite to maintain open and free inter-communication, nor have the works already executed been marked by economy and despatch, results which they consider are attainable only under the management of a local board.

And the petitioners pray as follows:—  
Your petitioners therefore humbly beseech Your Excellency to grant their petition, by proclaiming the Maryborough mining district a road board district according to the power vested in Your Excellency.

No. 12. For the appropriation of the first moiety of Government grant for 1860.

No. 13. For regulating the deposits of night soil.

The council have, by petition and other means, communicated with the Government for the following objects:—

1st. For the erection of a powder magazine at Avoca.—Promised.

2nd. For payment of £500, second moiety of £1000 grant-in-aid.—Granted.

3rd. For survey of road between Avoca and Lexton.—Granted.

4th. For the repairing of the Avoca and Lexton road.—For this work the Government have placed on the estimates £1500.

5th. For the erecting a bridge over No. 1 Creek, and otherwise forming the Ararat road from Avoca bridge to Amphitheatre.—For this work the Government have placed on the estimates £2500.

6th. For a piece of ground on which to erect municipal baths.—Granted.

7th. For a piece of ground on which to erect a town pump, the site previously obtained not being suitable as containing no water.—Granted.

8th. For the proclamation of the municipal cattle yards as a public market.—Granted.

9th. For a piece of land as a public park.—The President of Land and Works, while declining to grant the piece referred to, assured the council it *should not be sold*.—Declined.

10th. For the establishment of a Court of General Sessions at Avoca.—Declined.

11th. For the upset price of land at Avoca to be reduced.—The Surveyor General courteously explained, the land regulations prevented a compliance with the request.—Declined.

12th. For the clearing of High street.—The Commissioner of Roads and Bridges regretted he could not recommend a provision on the estimates for this work in this year's estimates; the council have, however, again pressed the subject, and it is under consideration of the Government.

13th. For such an alteration of the boundaries of electoral district as would include the whole of the municipal district in the Avoca Division.—The Chief Secretary informed the council that in order to effect this an alteration of the Act of Council defining those boundaries would be necessary.

14th. For the erection of a Government post office at Avoca. Declined.

15th. For the amalgamation of the post office and telegraph office on a site in High street, between the two culverts.—Declined.

On the last two subjects the council feel called upon to make a rather detailed statement.

About November, 1859, the council begged the Postmaster General to place a sum of money on the estimates for the erection of a post office at Avoca.

This was declined on the plea that the revenue did not admit of such an outlay, and the council not deeming it proper to press the matter against such a reason for refusing their prayer, allowed the matter to drop.

In December it became known that the Postmaster General had decided on amalgamating the post office and telegraph office on a site in the camp.

The council deeming it their duty towards the public interests of the place to endeavor and prevent the post office being erected on a site so unfavorably situated for general convenience, endeavored to obtain a reversal of this decision, and on the 16th of January of the present year, they in full council arrived at the following resolution—the only dissenting member being councillor Downie:—

"That the Postmaster General having refused to recommend a sum of money for the purpose of erecting a post office at Avoca, and as having the post office removed to the camp, as contemplated by the Postmaster General, would be most inconvenient to the commercial interests of the place, he (the Postmaster General) be urged to erect both post office and telegraph office on allotment 1, section 24, situate in Rutherford and Cambridge streets."

On the subsequent meeting of the council this resolution was confirmed.

When the council recommended this site they had no alternative; it was one of six allotments which the Government had reserved for public buildings, and on the corresponding allotment the council purpose erecting their town hall; in short, all other allotments in the vicinity were the property of private individuals.

Subsequently the council ascertained that a member of its own body had got up a petition having for its object the setting aside of the beforenamed resolution of the council, and they applied to that member, in his place at the council table, to permit them to see the petition he had thus got up.

The member referred to refused to show the council either the petition or a copy of it.

The council were also refused a copy of the petition by the Postmaster General, to whom they had explained the matter.

On a further investigation of the subject, the council ascertained there was an objection on the part of some ratepayers to erect the post office at any other than a site in High street. At the same time the council received a petition, numerous signed by the ratepayers and others resident in the district, of which the following is a copy:—

"That many of us have heard with surprise and regret that a petition has been signed by a portion of our fellow residents praying to have the site of the post office fixed at the camp.

"That the said petition, being presented by one of your members for signature, was signed by some of us in error, and by others of us without consideration.

"That we consider the present locality of the post office the most suitable of any for the general convenience of the inhabitants; the site at the camp would be least convenient of any.

"That independent of those two last reasons great injustice and injury would be inflicted on the resident interests in the neighborhood of the present site by the removal of the post office to the camp.

"Petitioners therefore pray you may be pleased to apply the influence of your representative position to secure a suitable allotment for the post office in High street, between the two culverts—that is, between Bridport and Russell streets—and that you will urge the Government to erect the post office thereon," &c., &c.

Being most desirous to carry into effect the wishes of the ratepayers—so fully and clearly ascertained—the council forwarded to the Postmaster General the petition just referred to, and expressed their readiness to place at the service of the Government, for post office purposes, an allotment in the part of High street named in the petition.

In reply to this communication, the inspector of country post offices was ordered to visit Avoca and examine and report on the proposed site.

That gentleman accordingly visited Avoca, and a considerable time after his departure the council pressed for a decision on the subject, when they were curtly informed by the Postmaster General "it was decided to remove the post office to the camp."

At the request of the council, Dr. Evans, M.L.A. (who has at all times been most kindly attentive to the interests of the district), asked certain questions on the subject in his place in Parliament, and Mr. Bailey (the Postmaster General) answered him to the effect that the country inspector of post offices had reported favorably to the prayer of the council, but that he (the Postmaster General) considered the council was actuated by interested motives, and that the post office should be removed to the camp.

This council, acting as they did for the general interests of the Avoca, and being, with the exception of one dissenting member, unanimous in opposing the removal of the post office from the centre of the commercial and populated portion of the township to an inconvenient site at the camp, very much regret their efforts should have been so unavailing.

They at the same time feel the Postmaster General's attributing to them interested motives is most unwarrantable, and in a cabinet minister an unprecedented discourtesy; the whole forming a most unhappy contrast to the prompt and courteous treatment the council's representations have always met with at the hands of the other honorable members of the Government.

## PUBLIC WORKS.

The public works completed by the council have been:—1, town pump; 2, municipal cattle yards; 3, municipal baths; 4, sundry repairs to High street, Russell street, Cambridge street, and the Cemetery road.

The town pump has been found of great public convenience, fully justifying the outlay in its erection.

The municipal cattle yards were, on completion, rented to Mr. W. W. Anslow, of Ballarat; that gentleman, however,

having neglected to fulfil the conditions on which the lease was based, the council cancelled it, and have made arrangements by which it is to be leased, for three years, at a rental of £150.

Irrespective of the annual revenue thus derived, the council are sanguine that, when open, they will be of much convenience to the ratepayers.

The municipal baths were not completed until February, when they were opened for about nine weeks. The result of this short space (the remnant of the warm weather) leaves no doubt of their being in the future a favorite source of cleanliness and health to the public, and of a handsome revenue to the ratepayers.

Feeling satisfied of this, the council have made arrangements by which warm water is to be introduced to them, when it is "purposed to keep them open constantly."

Though the council were fully impressed with the public policy of providing such an institution, it is probable they would not have entered upon it at so early a stage of municipal existence, were it not apparent to them that the residents would in a very short space of time be deprived of their usual resource for bathing in the various waterholes of the Avoca River and Rutherford Creek, in consequence of the extensive mining rushes in the vicinity, a foresight which, the fact of the waterholes referred to being now in use for mining purposes, the council trusts has been justified.

In submitting the following financial statement, the council would remark on the amount set down for advertising, as it may appear excessive.

In explanation, much of the amount is incurred under the provision of the Act of Council which compels the advertising in two and three papers; and in matters of choice the council have acted on the principle that in all contracts, &c., the fullest publicity was the correct course, and they have the pleasure of adding that the competition thus induced saved the council £70 in a recent contract.

**MARYBOROUGH MUNICIPALITY.**

SIXTH HALF-YEARLY REPORT OF THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE MARYBOROUGH MUNICIPAL COUNCIL, ENDING 4TH MAY, 1860.

THE municipal council, in submitting their sixth half-yearly report, have to record with sorrow the death of their late town clerk, Mr. J. C. Hooper, a gentleman who had been identified with the municipality from its establishment, and to whose indefatigable zeal much of the prosperity of the town may be attributed. His untimely decease will long be deplored as a serious loss to the municipality.

No. 71.—JUNE 8, 1860.—4.

A vacancy in the council occurred on the 23rd March, by the resignation of Mr. Henry Levy, and an election took place on the 18th April following, which resulted in the return of Councillor Kersley.

The annual election for councillors to fill vacancies caused by termination of the period of office, took place on the 4th of May, when the retiring councillors, Messrs. D. K. Campbell, May Garland, and Daniel Christian, were re-elected by large majorities. At the meeting of the council on the 8th of May, D. K. Campbell, Esq., J.P., was unanimously re-elected chairman of the council for the current municipal year; and at the meeting on the 15th following Mr. Thomas Gardner was appointed as town clerk, in the room of Mr. J. C. Hooper, deceased.

In public works and improvements the council have had to depend entirely on the revenue derived from rates, and consequently have not been able to extend their operations beyond those works requiring immediate attention.
