REGULATING THE MANNER OF GRANTING LICENSES TO SEARCH FOR MINERALS.

THE Board of Land and Works, in exercise of the power conferred in the 63rd clause of the Act 24 Victoria No. 117, has made the subjoined regulations relative to the granting of licenses to search for minerals or metals other than gold, viz.:

1. *Duration of license and area.*—The Board of Land and Works may grant to any person desirous of searching on Crown lands for coal, iron, or any other mineral except gold, a license for one year, conferring the right to search for such minerals over a specified tract of country, provided its area does not exceed one square mile, and that if its position and extent be not defined on the public charts its boundaries be marked out on the ground at the cost of the person desirous of making the search.

2. *License fee.*—The fee for the license is to be One pound sterling (£1), payable in advance at the time when the license is issued. The payment of this fee will entitle the holder of the license to reside on the land on which he is authorised to search for minerals, and to depasture eight (8) head of working stock thereon, but will not confer the privilege of cultivating any portion of the land or of felling timber, unless for mining purposes.

3. *Security for repairing damage to Crown lands.*—The Board of Land and Works may, when deemed expedient, require from any applicant a money deposit of sufficient amount to cover the cost of refilling any shafts, excavations, or unsightly holes that may be made during the progress of the search for minerals.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the twenty-first year of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled *An Act to enable the Postmaster General to issue Money Orders in the Colony of Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted, that the Governor in Council may from time to time order and direct what shall be deemed "separate post towns or places" within the meaning of the third section of the Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of Victoria, passed in the eighteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled *An Act to amend an Act intituled An Act to amend the Law relating to the Post Office*: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order direct, that the municipalities of Hawthorn and Kew, and the townships of Flemington and Essendon (including the Moonee Ponds), shall be deemed as within the limits of the city in which the General Post Office is situated, for the purposes of the above-recited Act; and that all letters forwarded between the several post offices of Hawthorn, Kew, Flemington, Essendon, and Moonee Ponds, and between those offices and the General Post Office, or other post offices situated within the limits of the city as aforesaid, shall be subject to the town rate of postage, viz., Twopence per single rate of half an ounce, and so on in proportion.

THE MINING DISTRICT OF BEECHWORTH.—Commencing at the junction of the Ovens River and the River Murray; thence by the River Murray to its source in the Main Range at Forest Hill; thence by a line south-easterly to Cape Howe; thence by the sea-coast to Cape Patterson; thence by part of the boundary of the county of Mornington to the Gipps Land road; thence by that road to the sources of the River La Trobe; thence northwards and westwards by the Great Dividing Range and its main western spur to the sources of the Goulburn River; thence by a range running northwards to the source of the Jerusalem River; thence by that river to its junction with the Goulburn River; thence by that river to its junction with the Broken River; thence by a line north-easterly to the junction of the Broken Creek and the Back Creek; thence by the Back Creek to its source in Fuller's Range; and thence northwards by that range and a line east to the commencing point aforesaid.

Colds and coughs with sore throat are very prevalent at Williamstown, and several fresh cases of scarlatina have appeared. The mortality on the whole over all the districts is nevertheless low.

AMHERST AND CLUNES ROAD DISTRICT.

RULES and Regulations of the Amherst and Clunes District Road Board:—

1. The ordinary meetings of the board shall be held on every alternate Saturday, at Two o'clock p.m., but special meetings of the board may be called at any time by written instructions to the secretary six days before such meeting, signed by the chairman or three other members of the board, and stating the nature of the business to be transacted, on receipt of which the secretary shall, by such means as he shall deem best, acquaint each member of the board of such meeting at least two clear days previous to the meeting-being held.

2. The business of the board shall commence so soon as the legal quorum may be present; but, should such quorum not be present at the expiration of thirty minutes after the time appointed for meeting, the circumstance shall be noted and entered in the minute book, together with the names of the members present, and such meeting shall lapse.

3. The first business of every meeting of the board shall be the reading and confirmation of the minutes of the preceding meeting, and no discussion shall be allowed thereon except as to their accuracy as a record of the proceedings.

4. At all meetings of the board, the reading of correspondence, the presentation of petitions, bringing up of reports, and notices of motion, shall have precedence of the regular business.

5. Every communication addressed to the board shall be in proper form, and be presented by one of its members, who shall be responsible for its being respectfully worded.

6. Notices of motion shall be given in writing to the secretary at the meeting previous to the making of the same, and all such notices shall be considered in the order in which they were given.

7. No notice shall be proceeded with unless the member who gave such notice, or some other member authorised by him in writing, be present when the business is called on, and notices not so proceeded with shall be struck out.

8. No report of a committee shall be considered or adopted until the meeting of the board following that upon which it is brought up, and recommendations contained in such reports shall only be adopted by the sense of the board being taken separately on each.

9. No motion proposing any petition, address, or bye-law, shall be entertained, unless the mover shall submit therewith a draft of such petition, address, or bye-law, and the draft so submitted shall in no case be taken into consideration until it shall have been referred to a committee, who shall report thereon; and the mover of every such proposition shall be, if he choose, a member of such committee.

10. The orders of the day shall include all matters arising out of former meetings of the board, and any business which the chairman may think fit to bring under consideration.

11. The presiding chairman's ruling shall be final in all matters of order or practice, and he shall state the same without comment or argument.

12. Every motion or amendment shall be entered in the minutes, with the names of the mover and seconder, and on a division thereon the votes shall be recorded.

13. Any member, when proposing a motion or amendment, or discussing any matter, must rise and address the chairman, and no member shall be interrupted except by a call to order; the member calling to order shall then be heard, and the question decided before the subject is resumed or any other business called on.

14. Any member making a motion or amendment shall put it in writing, sign, and deliver it to the secretary, who shall add thereto the name of the seconder, and no motion or amendment shall be withdrawn without the leave of the board.

15. No motion or amendment shall be entertained or discussed until it is seconded.

16. If two or more members rise at the same time, the chairman shall decide which is entitled to preference.

17. The chairman or any other member of the board shall stand up when addressing the board in discussion of any question.

18. Any member may of right demand the production of any document of the board relating to the question or matter under discussion.

19. One amendment only shall be discussed at one time, but if lost, another may be moved before the original motion is put to the vote.

20. The chairman shall, on taking the vote on any motion or amendment, put the question first in the affirmative, and then in the negative, and he may do so as often as it is necessary to enable him to declare from the show of hands which party has the majority.

21. The board shall in all cases vote by show of hands.

22. No discussion shall be allowed on any motion for the adjournment of the board; but if, on the question being put and lost, the subject then under discussion, or the next on the notice paper, shall be discussed before any subsequent motion for adjournment shall be entertained; but if the motion for adjournment be carried, the business then undisposed of shall be made an order of the day for the next meeting.

23. No member shall speak twice on the same motion or amendment, except in the way of explanation or in reply upon any original motion of which he may have been the mover, or as the mover of the amendment last proposed; and the chairman shall, without waiting for the interposition of the board, call to order any member proceeding to speak a second time on the same motion or amendment. After the reply, the amendment or the original motion, as the case may be, shall be immediately put to the vote.

24. No motion, the effect of which, if carried, would be to rescind any motion which has already passed the board, shall be entertained during the current year, unless a call of the whole board has been duly made for that purpose; and no such motion for rescinding any resolution of the board which shall have been

negated by the board, shall be again entertained during the current year.

25. When a call of the whole board has been determined on, notice thereof in writing shall be delivered to each member of the board, or left at his residence, or sent by post at least six clear days previous to the meeting for which such call shall have been made.

26. No election to any office at the disposal of the board shall take place until six clear days' notice shall have been given by advertisement in one or more of the local papers, inviting applications from candidates properly qualified; and the salary shall in all cases be fixed before proceeding to the election.

27. All contracts shall be made by tender, advertised not less than twice in one or more of the local papers. Each tender shall be addressed to the chairman, and deposited in the tender-box; and such tender or tenders shall only be opened at the time of their consideration by the board. The respective amounts, together with the names of the parties tendering, shall be entered in the minutes of the board; and when any tender is accepted, a contract shall be entered into and signed and sealed by the contractor and the presiding chairman, and one other member of the board. Expense of preparing the contract to be borne by the contractor.

28. The security in all cases of contract shall be Ten pounds per cent. upon the amount of the contract paid over by the contractor to the chairman of the board, which amount shall be lodged in the bank with the other moneys of the board, and only repaid to the contractor when he obtains his final certificate that the works under such contract are satisfactorily completed.

29. No officer or member of the board shall have any pecuniary interest either directly or indirectly in any contract under the board.

30. All payments shall be made by cheque, signed by the presiding chairman and one other member of the board, and countersigned by the secretary, and no such cheque shall be given unless the account for which such cheque is given be passed at a regular meeting of the board.

31. The assessors, in making the assessment, shall be entirely guided by the provisions of the Acts of Council relating to road boards; and notice of appeal against such assessment must be given to the board within 7 (seven) days after the assessment notice has been served, when the board will appoint a day for hearing the appeals.

32. In all cases it shall be deemed sufficient for the collector to call once for payment of any amount due upon the assessment roll; and in the event of such amount not being paid to him, a notice shall be left stating that unless the amount be paid to the collector or assessor of the board before the expiration of one month from the date thereof, legal proceedings will be taken for its recovery: a duplicate of such notice to be deposited at the office of the board.

33. Any one or more of the Standing Orders may be suspended, *pro tem.*, with the consent of a majority of not less than three-fourths of the board.

The petitioners state that their locality is situated on the Main Mount Alexander road, and is fast rising in importance, being the centre of a large and increasing agricultural population.

That within the township boundary there are many large and substantial buildings, including stores, hotels, and steam flour-mills, breweries, and a large malting establishment all now in full operation, and moreover that some of the finest blue-stone quarries have been opened and are being extensively worked.

That roads, bridges, drains, and streets are required to facilitate the large and increasing local traffic, but no provision exists for these works.
