NOTICE TO MARINERS.

DANGEROUS ROCK OFF THE MOUTH OF THE RIVER GLENELG.
IN May last, Mr. Walsh, master of the s. steamer *Ruby*, reported, that on his passage from this port to Port Macdonnell he had discovered a rock about four feet above water. Notice is hereby given that the Harbor Master of Portland Bay has fixed the position of this danger, by triangulation from the shore, to be in lat. 39° 6' 45" S. and long. 140° 51' E., about three miles off shore, and about twelve (12) miles to the eastward of Cape Northumberland.

Commanders of vessels and others in possession of charts of the coast between Cape Bridgewater and Cape Nelson are recommended to mark this danger on their charts as the "Ruby" rock.

MINING OPERATIONS AUTHORISED UNDER THE TOWN RESERVE, DAYLESFORD.

At the Government House, Melbourne, the twenty-second day of July, 1861.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the twenty-first year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intitled, *An Act for amending the Laws relative to the Gold Fields*, it is amongst other things enacted, that nothing thereinbefore contained shall authorise the holders of miners' rights to occupy for mining purposes any Crown land which shall have been exempted by the Governor in Council from the operations of mining, or which shall have been applied to any public use or purpose, or be lawfully and *bond fide* used as a yard, garden, or orchard, or for any race or dam, or for any house, outhouse, shed, or other building, or to cut or remove from any such Crown land any trees growing thereon, or to cut or construct any race or dam

through or upon any such Crown land; but nevertheless it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to authorise the holders of miners' rights to occupy under such miners' rights, and also to cut and construct races and dams for the purposes aforesaid, through or upon any Crown lands which may have been so exempted or applied as aforesaid, subject to such conditions and restrictions as the Governor in Council shall impose: And whereas John Addis, George Rumiston, James Wregg, John Sunderland, George S. Vowell, John Pope, Alexander Donald McTavish, William Trimble, J. W. Trimble, John Bacon, and John Conyngham McCausland, associated together for the purposes of mining, and holding miners' rights, have applied for permission to prosecute mining operations for the purpose of following a certain lead within the area reserved as a site for the town of Daylesford: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order authorise the said associated miners, being holders of miners' rights, to prosecute mining operations for the purpose of following a certain lead within the area reserved as a site for the town of Daylesford, which lead is referred to in their petition to the Governor, subject to the conditions and restrictions hereinafter prescribed, that is to say:—

1. The drives and other underground works shall be made at such a depth as to prevent injury to the surface of the ground.
2. The miners shall stop the works whenever called upon to do so by any duly authorised officer of the Government.
3. The drives shall be timbered, walled, or stowed as may be necessary to preserve the surface of the ground, or as may be ordered by any duly authorised officer of the Government.
4. The works shall be open at all times to the inspection of any duly authorised officer of the government.
5. The permission hereby accorded shall be without prejudice to the existing rights (if any) of other persons.

And the Honorable John Basson Humfray, Her Majesty's Commissioner of Mines for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

MINING OPERATIONS AUTHORISED UNDER THE RESERVOIR AT NEW INGLEWOOD.

At the Government House, Melbourne, the twenty-second day of July, 1861.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the twenty-first year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intitled, *An Act for amending the Laws relative to the Gold Fields*, it is amongst other things enacted, that nothing thereinbefore contained shall authorise the holders of miners' rights to occupy for mining purposes any Crown land which shall have been exempted by the Governor in Council from the operations of mining, or which shall have been applied to any public use or purpose, or be lawfully and *bond fide* used as a yard, garden, or orchard, or for any race or dam, or for any house, outhouse, shed, or other building, or to cut or remove from any such Crown land any trees growing thereon, or to cut or construct any race or dam through or upon any such Crown land; but nevertheless it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to authorise the holders of miners' rights to occupy under such miners' rights, and also to cut and construct races and dams for the purposes aforesaid, through or upon any Crown lands which may have been so exempted or applied as aforesaid, subject to such conditions and restrictions as the Governor in Council shall impose: And whereas certain associated miners, called and known by the name of McCubbin and party, holding miners' rights, have applied for permission to prosecute mining operations under the site set apart for a reservoir at New Inglewood: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order authorise the said associated miners, holders of miners' rights, to prosecute mining operations under the land set apart for a reservoir at New Inglewood as aforesaid, subject to the conditions and restrictions hereinafter prescribed, that is to say:—

1. That no injury be done to the water in the reservoir, or to the reservoir embankment and works.
2. That the mining operations be conducted by sinking a shaft outside the embankment, and by a drive thence under the embankment at a depth not less than forty feet from the surface of the ground.
3. That the shaft be at least twenty feet distant from the outer slope of the embankment, and that no workings other than a drive be permitted between the shaft and a point underneath the northern slope of the embankment.
4. That all the excavations be at a depth not less than forty feet from the surface of the ground.
5. That the drives be open at all reasonable hours to the inspection of any mining surveyor acting under the authority of the Commissioner of Mines, the Judge of the Court of Mines, or the warden.
6. That the drives be well and properly timbered and walled, and stowed, if deemed necessary by the mining surveyor, and all reasonable and necessary precautions taken and observed to secure the said New Inglewood Reservoir against damage or danger.
7. That McCubbin and party stop their works when requested so to do by the mining surveyor, or other authorised officer, whenever it shall appear to the mining surveyor, or other duly authorised officer, that the works are not being carried out with due precaution against any contingent damage to the said reservoir.

8. That the area to be allowed to McCubbin and party shall be the extent of ground only allowed under the Maryborough Mining Board Bye-laws.

9. That McCubbin and party deposit a sum of One hundred and fifty pounds sterling in the hands of the warden as security for the due fulfilment of these conditions; and in the event of damage of any kind to the reservoir, either by the non-fulfilment of the conditions, or by accident, the cost of repairing such damage shall be defrayed out of the moneys so deposited.

10. That the permission hereby accorded to the said McCubbin and party, to mine under the said reservoir, shall be without prejudice to the alleged rights (if any) of any other persons.

And the Honorable John Basson Humfray, Her Majesty's Commissioner of Mines for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

**PETITION UNDER THE MUNICIPAL INSTITUTIONS ACT.
ST. ARNAUD.**

IN pursuance of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of a petition addressed to His Excellency as hereinafter set forth, signed by one hundred and sixty-eight householders and landowners resident at and near St. Arnaud, praying for the erection of their locality into a municipal district.

The petitioners state that the town of St. Arnaud is situate in the centre of the large mining division of the same name, and has been surveyed and sold in part about three years; that it contains a settled mining and trading population, that large sums are being invested in permanent buildings owing to the stability and progress of its mining companies, and that its population is steadily increasing.

They further state that four sales of land have taken place at St. Arnaud, whereat town lands realized £800 per acre, and suburban lands (most of which are under cultivation) from 50s. to £5 10s. per acre, and that notwithstanding the large sums paid to Government for lands, no provision has been made for roads, bridges, or approaches to the town, or within a distance of forty miles thereof, and that the heavy traffic through the town frequently renders the thoroughfares impassable.

The petitioners accordingly are of opinion that the erection of their locality into a municipality will greatly advance its interests and prosperity, and conduce to its permanent improvement and good government; and they suggest the following boundaries, viz.:—

Commencing at a point forty chains south of the south-east angle of the St. Arnaud town boundary; thence west one hundred and sixty chains; thence north forty chains; thence west forty chains; thence north two hundred chains; thence east two hundred chains; thence south one hundred and twenty chains; thence east eighty chains; thence south twenty chains; thence by a line bearing north 71° 15' east one hundred and twenty chains; thence south sixty chains; thence south 71° 15' west two hundred and eight chains to the point of commencement.

And the petitioners pray as follows:—

"We, the undersigned householders and landowners resident within the area [above] set forth most respectfully pray your Excellency will cause the said area to be proclaimed a Municipal District in accordance with the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, under the style and title of 'The Municipality of Saint Arnaud.'"

**MUNICIPALITY OF NEWTOWN AND CHILWELL.
BYE-LAW No. 22.—FOR THE REGULATING AND CONDUCTING THE ELECTION OF MEMBERS OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL.**

WHEREAS it has been deemed expedient by the municipal council of Newtown and Chilwell, in exercise and execution of the powers to them given by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, to provide that the election of municipal councillors should for the future be conducted by ballot: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the said municipal council, that from and after this bye-law shall have received the assent of His Excellency the Governor in Council, all future elections for a member or members of the municipal council of Newtown and Chilwell shall be by ballot, and the following rules and regulations shall be for the conducting of any such election.

1. At all public meetings of ratepayers convened by the chairman of the council for the election of a councillor or councillors when a poll shall be demanded in the manner and form required by section 19 of the said Act, the chairman shall cause to be provided at the polling place named by him, such a number of enclosed desks or compartments as he may deem sufficient, such desks or compartments to be provided with pens, ink, and blotting paper, or with pencils, for the purpose of enabling the ratepayers to secretly mark the ballot papers as hereinafter provided.

2. No person other than the chairman, poll clerk, the scrutineers of the several candidates to be appointed as hereinafter provided, and the ratepayers who shall for the time be tendering

their votes, shall be entitled to be present in the balloting place or room, and any person other than such persons as aforesaid who shall intrude in such balloting place or room during the continuance of such poll, and who shall refuse to withdraw on being required by such chairman so to do, shall be liable to the penalty hereinafter stated for a breach of any of the clauses of this bye-law: Provided always, that it shall be lawful for the chairman to summon to his assistance any member or members of the police force for the purpose of preserving the public peace, quelling any breach thereof that may have arisen, and for removing from within such polling room any person or persons who may, in his opinion, be obstructing the polling or wilfully violating any of the provisions of this bye-law or of the said Act.

3. The chairman shall cause to be printed a sufficient number of ballot papers, in the form annexed, which ballot papers he shall keep in his own custody; and such chairman shall write his initials on the back of every ballot paper before delivering it to any ratepayer about to vote; and upon the delivery of each ballot paper the chairman shall check or tick off or cause to be checked or ticked off by the poll clerk, to be appointed by him, upon a printed roll, to be signed by such chairman previous to such election, the name of the person voting.

4. Each candidate shall be entitled to appoint, by writing under his hand, to be delivered to the chairman at any time before Six o'clock in the evening preceding the polling day, one person to be a scrutineer at the election.

5. The chairman, if he shall think fit, or if required by any scrutineer, shall put to any person before he shall receive his ballot paper the following questions only:—

1. What is your christian and surname?
2. Are you of the age of twenty-one years?
3. Are you the person whose name appears on the ratepayers' roll numbered ()?
4. Have you already voted at this election?

6. In case any scrutineer shall object to any person tendering his vote as provided by section 20 of the said Act, or in case the ballot paper as of any person shall have been received, and any other person shall afterwards demand his ballot paper as of the same person, the chairman, when such person shall propose to deposit his ballot paper in the ballot box, shall refuse to allow the same to be put therein, but shall receive and keep the same apart, and at the close of the election the chairman shall decide whether such person has already voted or not, and his decision shall be final and conclusive on all parties; and if it shall appear to the chairman that such ratepayer has not already voted, such vote shall be added to the number already polled, but if otherwise, such vote shall not be allowed.

7. The chairman shall be provided with a locked box (of which he shall keep the key), with a cleft or opening in such box capable of receiving the ballot papers, and such box shall be placed upon the table at which the chairman, poll clerk, and scrutineers shall preside; and the chairman shall hand to each ratepayer who shall ask for the same a ballot paper in the form in the schedule hereto annexed initialed by such chairman, and such ratepayer shall thereupon retire alone to one of the desks or compartments to be provided for that purpose, and there strike out the name or names of such candidates as he does not intend to vote for, and shall then deposit the same voting paper in the ballot box in the presence of the chairman, poll clerk, and such of the scrutineers as may then be present; and in case such ratepayer shall be unable to read, or be blind, he shall signify the same to the chairman, who shall thereupon mark or strike out the names or name of such candidates as such ratepayer shall designate; and no ratepayer shall take out of such polling room any such ballot paper either before or after he has marked the same.

8. Every ratepayer may vote for any number of candidates not exceeding the number of members to be chosen, and any ballot paper having on it a greater number of names of candidates than the number to be elected shall be absolutely rejected at the close of the poll.

9. That so soon after the close of the poll as conveniently may be, the chairman shall, in the presence of the poll clerk and scrutineers then present, count the number of votes polled for each candidate; and in the event of the number of votes being found to be equal for any two or more candidates, one or more of whom, but not all of such candidates, being by the state of the poll and the number of members to be elected, entitled to be declared elected, such chairman shall, by a casting vote or votes, as the case may be, decide which of the candidates, for whom the votes may be equal, shall be elected (provided that no such chairman shall vote at any such election, or except in the case of an equality of votes as aforesaid); and the chairman shall then, in the presence of the scrutineers or such of them as may be present, seal up all the ballot papers given out or used during the election, and also the copy or copies of the ratepayers' roll used for checking or ticking off the voters' names, and the town clerk shall safely preserve them for at least six months amongst the records of the council.

10. Any person personating or attempting to personate any ratepayer or deceased ratepayer, or who shall vote a second time on the same day, shall be deemed to be guilty of a breach of this bye-law and liable to the penalty hereinafter provided.

11. Neither the chairman, poll clerk, scrutineers, or any other person, shall attempt to ascertain for whom any ratepayer shall have voted, except as provided by clause 9 of this bye-law, or shall divulge the name or names of the candidate or candidates for whom such ratepayer shall have voted, except when requested to do so by any court having competent jurisdiction, or directly or indirectly aid in the discovery of the same; and any breach of this clause shall subject the party so offending to the penalty hereinafter mentioned for a breach of any of the provisions of this bye-law.

12. All places within which the polling is conducted shall be deemed to be public places.

13. All expenses incurred by the chairman of the council in carrying into effect this bye-law shall be paid and discharged out of the rates or other corporate funds.

14. Any person or persons committing, or causing to be committed, a breach of any of the clauses of this bye-law, shall, on conviction before any two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

PUBLIC WORKS.

THE following public works have been executed during the last half-year, viz.—

1. Completion of contract: formation and metalling of portions of Dorcas, Napier, Raglan, Little Raglan, and Cobden streets.
 2. Completion of contract: formation of Raglan street from Cecil to Clarendon street.
 3. Formation of portion of western footpath and channel of Cecil street.
 4. Formation of portion of Coventry street east and Moray place.
 5. Formation of Little Raglan street, from Moray street to the Eastern road.
 6. Fencing in the Dairy yards site.
 7. Metalling portion of the Three-chain road.
 8. Channelling portions of Bank street east, Three-chain road, Bridport street, Raglan street, and Little Raglan street.

 2. Formation of a road along portions of the south bank of the river.
 3. Formation of Clarendon place, Hotham street, Crown street, Palk street, and St. Luke street.

4. Channelling in portions of Raglan, Cobden, Clarendon, Moray, Coventry, York, Coote, Church, Park, Palmer, Nelson, Bank, and Little Bank streets, and Park place.

In order to promote the cleanliness of the district, means have been adopted for the removal weekly, free of charge, of rubbish from the premises of the ratepayers.

Making and fixing two lamp-posts in Eureka street, and repairing eight others in Main, Humffray, and Victoria streets.

Supplying and furnishing 2220 cubic yards of quartz and 915 cubic yards of tailings for maintenance of streets.

Maintaining and repairing 300 chains of roads and streets within the municipality.

Maintaining and repairing 177 chains of kerbed and planked footpaths.

Maintaining and repairing 1852 yards of water mains, branch-pipes, fire-cocks, &c.

Cutting catchwater drains, in conjunction with the Western Municipal Council, to increase the water in the Swamp.

WORKS IN PROGRESS OF EXECUTION.

Spreading 2220 cubic yards of quartz and 915 cubic yards tailings on the various streets of the municipality.

Filling, levelling, and gravelling the Peel street market.

Fixing weighbridge and toll-house in Peel street market.

MISCELLANEOUS SUBJECTS.

Fire.—The fire which in January last originated at the Montezuma Hotel, Main street, and destroyed upwards of sixty buildings, and damaged forty others, causing a loss of property estimated at £50,000, extending from the John O'Grat to the Union States Hotel, was the most disastrous that ever occurred in the district, notwithstanding every possible effort was made by the two fire brigades, assisted by the police, to extinguish it. The praise and thanks of the community are due to these bodies for their efficient services on that occasion, as the buildings on the opposite side of the street were certainly saved by their exertions, and the further extension of the fire prevented. It may be well to remark here, that it is the opinion of the council that the fire would not have extended southward from where it first broke out, had Eureka street been a chain wide, instead of thirty-three feet only; and to prevent such an evil in future, the site of the late Shakespeare Hotel has been purchased by the council for the purpose of widening the street.

Grant-in-aid.—The sum placed on the estimates and voted by the Legislative Assembly for the current year, is considerably less than that of former years. The importance of this subject caused a conference of municipal delegates to be held in Melbourne, in February last, at which it was determined to urge upon the Government the necessity of permanently endowing municipalities, by means of grants of land to gradually supersede the present uncertain and objectionable mode, viz., by votes of money out of the general revenue. To effect this object, and likewise to cause other improvements in the laws by which municipalities are governed, measures were taken to prepare a bill to be brought before parliament without delay.

Prison van.—This council, in conjunction with the western council, have contracted for the supply of a van, which in a short time will be completed, when the practice of walking prisoners through the streets will be discontinued.

Water supply.—It having been determined by the two councils that each should pay towards the cost of all works in connexion with the Swamp, and the provision and management of supply in proportion to the revenue derived from each, under a uniform scale of charges, it was deemed advisable to lease the works of each for one year, from the 1st of January last, which was accordingly done.

Peel street railway bridge.—The council deems it necessary to inform the ratepayers in reference to this subject, that from the first a bridge was promised to be built over Peel street, and it learned with surprise that it was about to be erected some considerable distance of the line of that street to the eastward. A deputation was sent to the Government to represent the objections to such plan, and succeeded in having the intended site of the bridge altered to the line of the street. Some time after this, when the building of the bridge commenced, the council was again surprised and sorry to find that the span would only be 26 feet, as up to this time it was under the belief that it was intended to span the whole width of the street, not suspecting for one moment that it would have been thought advisable by the Government so to contract the width of the traffic way. The council, however, can only regret that the efforts made to cause the span of the bridge to be increased were unsuccessful.

Watering the Main road.—In consequence of the great traffic in this thoroughfare, and the dust which in the summer season is caused thereby, to the injury of property and inconvenience of the public, the council deemed it requisite to have it constantly watered in dry weather, intending to pay the cost of so doing by imposing a special rate on the property fronting the street, but find, on submitting a bye-law framed for this purpose for His Excellency's assent, that such is beyond the power of this council.
