NOTICES OF INTENTION TO GRANT LANDS WITHOUT PURCHASE.

IT is hereby notified, in pursuance of the 87th section of the Act 24 Victoria No. 117, that, upon the expiration of one month from the date hereof, it is the intention of the Governor to grant the lands hereinafter described to trustees, in accordance with the 5th clause of the said Act, viz.:—

OLD BURIAL GROUND RESERVE AT DUNOLLY.—Commencing at the north-east angle of allotment 35 of section B, township of Dunolly; thence south 20 degrees east three chains ten links along a road; thence west two chains fifty links; thence north 20 degrees west three chains ten links; thence east two chains fifty links to the commencing point. Area, 2 roods 36 perches.—(60.B.8143.)

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

IN pursuance of an Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, passed in the nineteenth year of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled, *An Act to provide for the Election of Members to serve in the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly of Victoria respectively*: I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this my Proclamation appoint that the place mentioned in the second column of the schedule hereto annexed shall be the polling place for the Belfast division of the Western Province for the purpose of taking the poll at any contested election for the said province, and that all votes in respect of qualifications within the boundaries and limits of the said division shall be taken at any election for such province at the polling place mentioned in the said second column, that is to say:—

REGULATIONS FOR THE INTRODUCTION OF IMMIGRANTS.

THE Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to direct that from this date the following Revised Regulations for the Introduction of Immigrants shall be adopted in lieu of those dated 15th April, 1861, and published in the *Government Gazette* of the 17th idem, page 777.

No. I.—REMITTANCE REGULATIONS.

- Persons desirous of bringing their relatives and friends from the United Kingdom to Victoria may apply to the officers named in clause 10 for "Passage Warrants," which will be granted under the following conditions:—
- The persons to be brought to this colony shall be British subjects, of sound mind, in good health, and of good character.
- The names, ages, relation to the applicant, married or single state, occupation, address, and place of nativity, of the persons for whom passages are requested, must be furnished by the applicant according to the accompanying form:—

- The applicant will then be informed of the amount to be paid to entitle him or her to a "Passage Warrant," and upon payment of this sum he will receive a "Passage Warrant," which he can forward to his friends by post or otherwise.
- The following sums shall be in all instances paid by the applicant in advance, in respect to intending emigrants of the various classes, prior to the issue of the Passage Warrants:—

- The person named in the Passage Warrant (except in the case of unprotected single females) may, upon receipt thereof, engage his or her passage by any ship sailing from any port in the United Kingdom to any port in the Colony of Victoria, tendering the Passage Warrant to the ship owner or agent as payment for the sum marked thereon; but the Passage Warrant is only available in aid of a steerage or second class passage.

- Masters of ships arriving in this colony with immigrants, introduced under these Regulations, shall report in writing to the Immigration Officer on boarding, the number and names of such immigrants, who shall then be produced by the master for identification; and if found to correspond with the description upon the warrant, such warrant shall be endorsed by the said Immigration Officer.

- The master of each ship, if the immigrant desire, may be required to maintain passengers introduced under these Regulations for a clear space of seven days after arrival at the port of destination; and upon satisfactory proof being tendered to the Immigration Agent that the conditions specified upon the back of the warrant have been faithfully performed, the Passage Warrant will be countersigned by him, and shall then be paid upon presentation at the Treasury in Melbourne.

- Passage Warrants shall not be issued for children under fifteen years of age unless accompanied by some suitable person who will take charge of them during the voyage.

Where application forms (A), and also every information, will be furnished and the deposits received. Form (A) should then be filled in by the applicant, signed by him, and left with the officer. He will then be informed of the amount required to be paid (form B). So soon as the amount mentioned shall have been paid to the Assistant Immigration Agent; or Receiver and Paymaster (as the case may be), the money, or a Treasury receipt for it, is to be sent to the Immigration Agent in Melbourne, with the application form (marked C). The Immigration Agent will then transmit Passage Warrants for the persons nominated, either to the office at which the money was paid, or to such address as the applicant may request. The Passage Warrant must be sent by the applicant to his friends in the United Kingdom.

- Persons residing at a distance from any of the places not mentioned in the list appended to clause 10, may obtain the application form (A) at the nearest Post Office; this form, after having been duly filled up and signed, should be transmitted to the Immigration Agent in Melbourne; by whom every information will be furnished. The amount required can be sent to the Immigration Agent in Melbourne by cheque, or order on a bank, by bank notes in a registered letter, or by post office money order. Upon receipt of this remittance, the usual warrant (if approved) for the passages of his friends will be forwarded to the depositor, to be transmitted by post to their address in the United Kingdom.

12. Should the persons specified in the Passage Warrant decline or be unable to emigrate, the money paid towards their passages will not be refunded to the nominator, but, unless the nominator requires the Passage Warrant to be made non-transferable, the nominee, having first obtained the consent of Her Majesty's Colonial Land and Emigration Commissioners, may by endorsement transfer such warrant. Should the nominee be dead, the Passage Warrant may be exchanged upon application to the Immigration Agent in Melbourne.

13. If the nominator wilfully misrepresent particulars respecting the persons nominated, or if the transferor wilfully misrepresent particulars respecting the person to whom he proposes to transfer the Passage Warrant, or if any person known by the nominator to be under indenture be nominated, then the Commissioner of Trade and Customs, or Her Majesty's Colonial Land and Emigration Commissioners, may cancel the said Passage Warrant, and the deposit shall be forfeited, notwithstanding that the nominee or transferee may have been introduced into Victoria previous to the disqualification being discovered.

14. Persons resident in Victoria desirous of introducing single females from the United Kingdom, under this system, may do so upon depositing with the Immigration Agent, Melbourne, the sum required by the scale set forth in the fifth clause of these Regulations. A Passage Warrant will then be issued to that effect, which should be transmitted to the nominee. Upon receipt of such warrant, if the nominee desires to emigrate in a Government ship, she must apply to the Commissioners in London, who will grant a passage in one of the vessels chartered by them on behalf of the Government of Victoria: Provided always, that all single women introduced in ordinary passenger ships under these Regulations shall be accompanied by their relatives or a family of friends, otherwise they must be introduced in Government vessels, or the warrant will not be recognised.

15. Persons preferring Government ships for the introduction of their families must state the same on application for the Passage Warrants, and every nominee preferring to be introduced in Government ships must surrender to Her Majesty's Colonial Land and Emigration Commissioners the Passage Warrant when making application for a passage.

16. No Passage Warrant shall be issued, and no transfer of any warrant will be permitted, in favor of or to any person who has already been in Victoria.

No. II.—REGULATIONS FOR THE INTRODUCTION OF SINGLE FEMALES.

Persons resident in this Colony desirous of introducing single females (their relatives or friends) from the United Kingdom under this Regulation may apply to the Immigration Agent for a free passage; and upon nominee named being approved of by the Immigration Agent, her name will be forwarded to Her Majesty's Colonial Land and Emigration Commissioners for a free passage to this colony, in a Government ship chartered by Her Majesty's Commissioners.

No. III.—REGULATIONS FOR THE INTRODUCTION OF VINEDRESSERS INTO VICTORIA.

Persons resident in this Colony desirous of introducing under this Regulation natives of the Continent of Europe, being Vinedressers and others skilled in the production of wine and oil and the preservation of fruit, shall be at liberty to make application to the Immigration Agent for permission to do so; which application shall state the number and description of the persons. On the requisite permission being granted, the applicant shall be at liberty to instruct his agent to make the necessary selection and to provide for the passages; and each of the nominees shall be furnished with a certificate signed by the magisterial authority of the district from which he has been selected, guaranteeing him to be of good character and a laborer of the description applied for. On the arrival of the immigrants in the colony, and having been approved of by the Immigration Agent, an order will be issued on the Treasury in favor of the person for whose service they have been introduced for the payment of Ten pounds sterling for each statute adult.

REGISTRAR GENERAL'S REPORT ON THE VITAL STATISTICS OF MELBOURNE AND SUBURBS DURING THE MONTH OF JUNE, AND FOR THE QUARTER ENDING 30TH JUNE, 1861.

ACTUAL Daily Mortality of persons of both sexes under and over five years of age in the Statistical District of Melbourne and suburbs, embracing a radius of ten miles, and including the Statistical Sub-districts of Melbourne Proper, East Melbourne, North Melbourne and Carlton, Fitz Roy Municipality, East Collingwood, Richmond, Joka-joka parish (exclusive of North Melbourne, Collingwood, and Richmond), South Yarra and Prahran, Emerald Hill and Sandridge, St. Kilda and Brighton, Doutta Galla and Keilor, Boroondara and Heidelberg, Cut-paw-paw parish, and the shipping in Hobson's Bay; also, the Temperature in the shade at Melbourne, deduced from the mean of twenty-four hourly observations taken at the Flagstaff Observatory on each day during the month of June, 1861:—

NOTE.—In spite of the precautions alluded to in the report for April, a small number of the deaths which occurred were not registered in time for the April and May reports; these have now been added, and cause the totals for those months, as shown in the above table, to be somewhat in excess of the ones formerly published.

The number of deaths recorded in the month of June was 280, or a daily average of 9.33. This is a smaller rate of mortality than that of any month since the commencement of the year, and is 2 deaths a day less than the average of the two previous months. It is remarkable that the total mortality of the month is precisely the same as that of June, 1860; the divisions, however, as to age and sex were different, the 280 deaths in June this year being composed of 152 males and 128 females, and in the same month last year of 169 males and 111 females; or this year of 142 persons under and 138 over five years of age, against 137 under and 143 over for 1860. With reference to the mean temperature, that for June, 1860, was nearly a degree (0.8°) lower than that of the month under review. It is worthy of remark that this is the first month in the present year of which the mortality has not been considerably higher than that of the corresponding month of 1860.

The mean temperature of the month, as recorded at the Flagstaff Observatory, was 50.5° against 52.7° for May, and against 49.7° for June, 1860. The highest point reached by the thermometer in the shade was 64.1° at 1 p.m. on the 11th, and its lowest was 34.6° at 6 a.m. on the 29th, the range for the month thus being 29.5°. The daily range of temperature is treated of in a subsequent portion of this report. The extremes of atmospheric pressure (30.359 in. and 29.362 in.) were at 10 a.m. on the 5th, and at 7 p.m. on the 22nd, the mean pressure for the month being 29.832 in., and the range .997 in., against 29.893 in. for the mean, and .835 in. for the range, during June, 1860.

For the first four weeks in June, the mean temperature, number of deaths, and daily average of mortality, were as follow:—

Of the 280 deaths which occurred during the month, 152 or 54.3 per cent. were of males, and 128 or 45.7 per cent. were of females; 142 or 50.7 per cent. were of children under, and 138 or 49.3 per cent. were of persons over, five years of age. The relative proportions of the sexes correspond within a fraction with those of the previous month; but the decrease which has been noticed for several months past, in the proportion of deaths of children under five to the total mortality, is again apparent in the month under consideration, to the further extent of 2.4 per cent.

The day of greatest mortality was the 1st, on which 17 deaths occurred; on no other day during the month was a larger number than 13 deaths recorded.

The month under notice was rather fatal to old people, the mortality of the class resulting in the deaths of three octogenarians, two of whom were males aged 81 and 82 years respectively, and the other a female at 82 years, also of two females each aged 78 years.

The deaths occurring in charitable and penal institutions numbered 43, or 15·4 per cent of the total deaths; of these 29 took place in the Melbourne Hospital, 4 in the Benevolent Asylum, 1 in the Immigrants' Home, 6 in the Yarra Bend Asylum, 1 in the Collingwood Stockade, 1 in the Western Gaol, and 1 in the hulk *Success*.

The following table shows the number of persons of all ages at the time of the recent census, the number of deaths of persons under and over five years of age, the total at all ages, and the number of deaths to every 1000 of the population during the month of June, in the Statistical District of Melbourne and suburbs, and in each of the sub-districts of which it is composed:—

NOTE.—The totals of the different sub-districts, according to the recent census, are given, subject to future revision, but it is believed that when finally corrected they will not differ materially from the above.

The ages of the 142 children under five, who died during the month, were as follow:—63 under one year, 23 between one year and two, 22 between two years and three, 16 between three years and four, and 13 between four and five years.

Of the 138 persons who died at five years old and upwards, the ages may be divided into the following periods:—26 between five years and ten, 5 between ten and fifteen, 5 between fifteen and twenty, 8 between twenty and twenty-five, 18 between twenty-five and thirty, 16 between thirty and thirty-five, 11 between thirty-five and forty, 16 between forty and forty-five, 9 between forty-five and fifty, 8 between fifty and fifty-five, 6 between fifty-five and sixty, 1 between sixty and sixty-five, 3 between sixty-five and seventy, 1 between seventy and seventy-five, 2 between seventy-five and eighty, and 3 between eighty and eighty-five.

It was mentioned in the report for May that deaths from zymotic diseases had declined in their proportion to the total mortality for several consecutive months, this declension was still continued in June, the reduction being from 33·92 to 32·14 per cent. of the deaths from all causes. Referring to the diseases under this head, deaths from diarrhoea and dysentery decreased from 19 to 10, and those from croup, from 9 to 2; deaths from diphtheria, whooping-cough, and typhus, each also showed slightly diminished numbers, and measles in a fatal form seems to have been almost extinct, only 2 deaths having been recorded from it throughout the district. Scarlatina, however, still continued to rage with unabated vigor, no less than 53 deaths having resulted from its fatal prevalence.

Cases of death from sporadic diseases of uncertain seat diminished in June as compared with May, from 51 to 31, or to the extent of 4 per cent. of the deaths generally, which is principally attributable to the falling off from 39 to 21 cases of the various diseases so fatal to infantine life throughout the summer months, which are generally tabulated under the heads of atrophy and debility; deaths of diseases of the nervous system also diminished nearly 2 per cent. of the total, or in numbers from 53 to 38; those from diseases of the respiratory system decreased in actual numbers from 67 to 56 cases, but increased slightly in their proportion to the total deaths; phthisis, the most fatal disease of this class, showed a diminution of from 44 to 25 cases, but pneumonia increased from 11 to 19; diseases of the circulatory system increased from 4 to 15 cases; 15 deaths during the month were the result of accidental causes or violence.

QUARTER ENDING 30TH JUNE, 1861.

During the quarter ending 30th June, the recorded deaths in Melbourne and suburbs amounted to 971, which is a proportion of nearly 7 (6.94) deaths to every 1000 of the population according to the recent census. The deaths in the previous quarter numbered 1169, and in the corresponding quarter of 1860, 917.

The following table shows the causes of the deaths of persons of both sexes, under and over five years of age, and the proportions per cent. of deaths from each cause, in Melbourne and suburbs, during the quarter ending 30th June, 1861:—

The disease table of the past quarter, as compared with that of the previous one, shows a falling off in the number of deaths from those complaints which are usually termed zymotic, in which are included all diseases of an epidemic, endemic, contagious, or infectious character, this class showing a reduction of from 525 to 350 fatal cases; but as compared with the corresponding quarter of 1860 an increase of 57 cases is exhibited, respecting which it may be observed, that had it not been for the increase in this class of diseases, the mortality returns of the past quarter would have shown a decrease of three deaths upon the same returns for the June quarter of 1860, instead of an increase of 54 deaths, as was actually the case.

With reference to diseases of a sporadic or isolated type, the following classes show an increase in their fatal results as compared with those of the previous quarter: diseases of the respiratory and circulatory systems, and of the urinary and generative organs, the principal increase being in the first-mentioned class, of which the numbers in the two quarters were 142 and 177, phthisis alone showing an increase of 23 cases. As compared with the corresponding quarter of 1860, the same classes, with the addition of complaints of the nervous system, show an augmentation, the increase in diseases of the organs of respiration being however very slight, as phthisis, which increased by 21 cases, was more than compensated by a diminution of 25 in the numbers dying from pneumonia. Only 3 deaths were returned from old age during the past quarter, which is a remarkably small result, but 39 deaths were attributed to external causes, which is in excess of the average.

PETITION UNDER THE MUNICIPAL INSTITUTIONS ACT.
ST. ARNAUD.

IN pursuance of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of a petition addressed to His Excellency as hereinafter set forth, signed by one hundred and sixty-eight householders and landowners resident at and near St. Arnaud, praying for the erection of their locality into a municipal district.

The petitioners state that the town of St. Arnaud is situate in the centre of the large mining division of the same name, and has been surveyed and sold in part about three years; that it contains a settled mining and trading population, that large sums are being invested in permanent buildings owing to the stability and progress of its mining companies, and that its population is steadily increasing.

They further state that four sales of land have taken place at St. Arnaud, whereat town lands realized £900 per acre, and suburban lands (most of which are under cultivation) from 50s. to £5 10s. per acre, and that notwithstanding the large sums paid to Government for lands, no provision has been made for roads, bridges, or approaches to the town, or within a distance of forty miles thereof, and that the heavy traffic through the town frequently renders the thoroughfares impassable.

The petitioners accordingly are of opinion that the erection of their locality into a municipality will greatly advance its interests and prosperity, and conduce to its permanent improvement and good government; and they suggest the following boundaries, viz.:

Commencing at a point forty chains south of the south-east angle of the St. Arnaud town boundary; thence west one hundred and sixty chains; thence north forty chains; thence west forty chains; thence north two hundred chains; thence east two hundred chains; thence south one hundred and twenty chains; thence east eighty chains; thence south twenty chains; thence by a line bearing north 71° 15' east one hundred and twenty chains; thence south sixty chains; thence south 71° 15' west two hundred and eight chains to the point of commencement.

And the petitioners pray as follows:—

"We, the undersigned householders and landowners resident within the area [above] set forth most respectfully pray your Excellency will cause the said area to be proclaimed a Municipal District in accordance with the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, under the style and title of 'The Municipality of Saint Arnaud.'"

3. Fifty-nine pounds for improving road at Hewitt's Hill.
4. Ten pounds for improving road leading to Police Camp.
5. Eighty-three pounds for forming footpaths.
6. One hundred pounds for improving road between the Northumberland Arms and the northern boundary of the municipality.

Commencing at a point being the junction of the north side of Regent street with the west side of a section and chain line wide leading towards Rosebrook, from Regent street west of the benevolent Asylum, at which point the road is one chain and fifty links wide; thence by a straight line to a point bearing west (magnetic) twelve chains and eighty-three links; thence by a curve the chord of which bears north seventy-eight degrees forty-five minutes and thirty seconds west (magnetic) seven chains and eighty-four links and two-thirds of a link, at which point the road narrows to one chain in width; and thence by a line bearing north sixty-seven degrees thirty-one minutes west (magnetic) sixty-nine chains and seventy-five links to the boundary (western) of the municipality, the aforesaid lengths and bearings being those respectively of the northern side of the road.
