## ADDITIONAL RULES OF THE PILOT BOARD.

55. The sea pilot, before anchoring any vessel in Hobson's Bay, shall ascertain from the master whether he intends having his vessel taken alongside any of the wharves or piers, or moored in the inner harbor, as the vessel's final destination; if so, he shall not leave any such vessel until she has been properly moored in the berth determined on by the master, except the vessel has to break bulk, or should have gunpowder to discharge, in which case he shall anchor her in such berth as may be in accordance with the rules of the port.

56. The sea pilot shall also, as a general rule, pilot all ships proceeding to the outer anchorage, also ships bound direct to sea, from the berth they may occupy at any pier or wharf, or from any berth in the inner harbor.

57. The harbor pilot shall take charge of such inward bound vessels, on their arrival, as, from having gunpowder on board, or from other reasons, may not be prepared to go to their final destination; and on receiving orders from the master or officer in charge, shall berth and moor the same in such situation in the inner harbor as the master or such officer may direct, subject to the regulations of the port. He shall also remove all vessels in the inner harbor not included in the sea pilot's duty.

## MUNICIPALITY OF BUNINYONG.

BYE-LAW No. 12.—FOR IMPOSING A RATE OF ONE SHILLING IN THE POUND ON THE RATEABLE PROPERTY OF THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF BUNINYONG FOR THE CURRENT YEAR.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is empowered to impose a rate on all houses and lands within the limits of such municipal district according to the fair average annual value thereof, such rate not to exceed the sum of Two shillings in the pound of such value: Be it therefore enacted by the council of the municipal district of Buninyong, that a rate for the current year of One shilling in the pound on the annual value of all property in houses and lands within the limits of the said municipal district be imposed and levied, and be due and payable on the 21st day of October, in the present year 1861.

**PETITION UNDER THE MUNICIPAL INSTITUTIONS ACT.  
MOONAMBEL.**

IN pursuance of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of a petition addressed to His Excellency as hereinafter set forth, signed by one hundred and fifty-four householders resident at Moonambel, praying for the erection of their locality into a municipal district.

The petitioners state the township of Moonambel is the centre of an extensive mining district; that it contains upwards of three hundred resident householders, and that the dwellings are of a substantial character and have been erected at considerable expense, but no provision exists for the formation and main-

tenance of the roads and streets, which are consequently nearly impassable, and heavy merchandise, &c., has to be carried over them at great risk and expense.

They are therefore of opinion that the formation of the township into a Municipal District will tend greatly to advance its interests and materially aid its improvement and good government, and suggest the following boundaries for such district, viz:—From the south-west angle of McKinnon's pro-cumpte right to a point bearing south half a mile; thence by a line bearing west three miles; thence by a line bearing north two miles; thence by a line bearing east three miles; and thence by a line bearing south one mile and a half to the starting point.

And the petitioners pray as follows:—

"Your petitioners therefore humbly pray that the district as above defined may be proclaimed a Municipality, under the name of 'The Municipal District of Moonambel,' according to the provisions of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15."

The deaths recorded as having occurred in Melbourne and suburbs during the month of August numbered 265, or a daily average of 8.55, which number and daily average exactly correspond with those of the previous month. The rate of mortality is more favorable than that obtaining in the month of August, 1860, when 286 deaths were returned, but less so than that in August, 1859, when the number of deaths was 221, at which same rate, allowing for the increased population, the deaths in the month under review should have numbered only 242, or 23 less than actually took place.

The mean temperature during the month was 49.3°, against 46.6° in July, against 49.4° in August, 1860, and against 51.3° in August, 1859. The highest point reached by the thermometer (67.1°) was at 3 p.m. on the 29th, and the lowest (34.2°) was at 7 a.m. on the 7th, the range for the month thus being 32.9°. The greatest daily range of temperature (25.1°) was on the 26th, from a maximum of 60.3° to a minimum of 35.2°, and the least (8.1°) was on the 14th, from a maximum of 52.0° to a minimum of 44.8°; the mean daily range for the month being 16.3°. The mean height of the barometer during the month was 30.036 in., against 30.173 in. for August, 1860. The maximum pressure (30.364 in.) was at 11 p.m. on the 31st, and the minimum (29.543 in.) was at 4 p.m. on the 22nd, the range of pressure for the month thus being .821 in.

It has been already stated that the same number of deaths (265) occurred in August as in the previous month. On referring to the July report, it is found that the deaths in that month were thus divided:—Males, 151, or 57 per cent.; females, 114, or 43 per cent. In August the relative proportions of the sexes did not differ greatly from these, the males having numbered 147, or 55.5 per cent., and the females 118, or 44.5 per cent. of the total. The divisions as to age were, as regards children under five years, July, 132, or 49.8 per cent.; August, 129, or 48.7 per cent.; and with respect to persons above five years, July, 133, or 50.2 per cent., August, 136, or 51.3 per cent.; the numbers at the latter period thus having exceeded those at the former, in July by one death, and in August by seven deaths.

The days showing the greatest number of deaths were the 11th and 13th, on each of which fourteen appear in the returns. Since February, 1860, in which fourteen was also the highest number occurring in any one day, no month has shown so low a maximum of daily mortality.

Three persons above 80 years of age died during the month, viz., one at 86, one at 85, and another at 83 years. One person aged 76 and another aged 75 also died. These five persons were all females. In the report for July, the six persons dying at advanced ages, of whom special mention was made, were all males.

In charitable institutions, penal establishments, and barracks, the following deaths occurred.—36 in the Melbourne Hospital, 3 in the Benevolent Asylum, 1 in the Immigration Hospital, 6 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 2 in the New Military Barracks, 1 in the Melbourne Gaol, 1 in the Western Gaol, and 2 in the penal hulk *Success*, making in all 52, or about a fifth of the deaths in the district.

Of the persons who died under five years of age, 63 were less than a year old, 34 were between one year and two, 12 between two years and three, 11 between three years and four, and 9 between four years and six.

Of those who were above five years of age, 19 were between five and ten, 2 between ten and fifteen, 4 between fifteen and twenty, 11 between twenty and twenty-five, 23 between twenty-five and thirty, 18 between thirty and thirty-five, 17 between thirty-five and forty, 12 between forty and forty-five, 8 between forty-five and fifty, 8 between fifty and fifty-five, 4 between fifty-five and sixty, 1 between sixty and sixty-five, 3 between sixty-five and seventy, 1 between seventy and seventy-five, 2 between seventy-five and eighty, 1 between eighty and eighty-five, and 2 between eighty-five and ninety.

The conditions for comparing the month which is the subject of this report with previous one, are more than usually favorable, as the two months are not only of equal length, but the same number of deaths occurred in each. Referring first then to zymotic diseases, in which a decrease of nine deaths, or in relation to the total deaths, of 3 per cent., is observed, it is found that this diminution resulted chiefly from fatal cases of scarlatina having decreased from 41 to 31, those of diarrhoea and dysentery from 14 to 10, and those of typhus from 11 to 6. The only important increase under the zymotic head was in whooping-cough, from which 4 deaths occurred against 10, and in diphtheria from which 10 deaths occurred against 13.

Sporadic diseases of uncertain seat occurring in August, showed a decrease of 5 deaths in their results as compared with July; those of the nervous system remained unchanged, 36 deaths having occurred from them in either month. Those of the respiratory system increased from 48 to 54, phthisis showing 31 and pneumonia 11 deaths against 27 and 7 in July. Deaths from diseases of the digestive organs increased by 1; the same number of deaths from old age occurred in both months, and deaths from accidents or violence increased from 13 to 16.

## FINANCE.

The municipal council received from the Government the first instalment of the grant-in-aid to this district, amounting to £1964 12s. 5d. The annual value of the houses and lands, according to the returns of valuers, amounts to £72,953, upon which a rate of 1s. 6d. in the pound was levied, giving the local rates for the year £5401.

The sum of £100 has been apportioned for the Ballarat Botanic Gardens. On the urgent representations of Mr. W. C. Smith, M.L.A., of the claims of this district, a further sum of £100 has been promised by the Government.

## PUBLIC WORKS.

The municipal council of Ballarat have gravelled 20½ miles of footpath. The stumps from the streets on Soldiers' Hill have been grubbed; and 132 chains of drains cut in different portions of the municipal district (see "Details of Public Works.")
