NOTICE TO MARINERS.—ROMAN ROCK LIGHT, FALSE BAY, CAPE OF GOOD HOPE.

The bearings are by compass and the distances in nautical miles.

Notice is hereby given that a light will be exhibited from the new lighthouse on the Roman Rocks on the 16th September next, which will supersede that shown at the light-vessel now moored a cable's length north of the rocks. It will be a revolving white light, showing a bright face for the space of twelve seconds twice every minute, which will serve to distinguish it from the Cape Point light in thick weather, as that light revolves only once every minute. The light will be fifty-four feet above the sea, and visible in clear weather from a ship's deck thirteen miles distant.

The light-tower is forty-eight feet high, the lower half of which will be painted black and the upper half white. From the lighthouse, Noah's Ark bears S. 56° W. $\frac{1}{2}$ miles, and the Dock Yard clock W. by N. 1.65 miles.

N. N. E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ cables from the lighthouse lies the *Castor Rock*, with only fifteen feet on it at low water springs; its position is marked by a beacon with a flag having the word "rock" painted on it. There are patches of nineteen and twenty-four feet between the *Castor Rock* and the lighthouse, which renders it necessary for large ships to give the lighthouse a berth of at least three and a half cables, when passing to the N. E., before hauling in for Simon's Bay.

In sailing for Simon's Bay, by keeping the lighthouse in line with Eley Peak, bearing N. $\frac{1}{2}$ W., a ship will pass midway between the Whittle Rock and Miller's Point.

THE HEATHCOTE AND WARANGA ROAD DISTRICT.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, passed in the sixteenth year of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled, *An Act for making and improving Roads in the colony of Victoria*, it was amongst other things enacted, that it should be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor, from time to time, by notice in the *Government Gazette*, to proclaim and declare any such portion of the said colony as to him should seem meet, as and to be a road district for the purposes in the said Act contained, and also to define the boundaries of every road district thereby proclaimed and declared, and to give a specific name or designation to every such road district: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim and declare that the portion of the said colony hereinafter defined shall be a road district for the purposes in the said Act contained, that is to say:—

Commencing at a point in the centre of the River Campaspe opposite the north boundary of the parish of Runnymede, and thence along the said boundary and in continuation of the same line to its junction with the west boundary of allotment 47, in the parish of Burambort; thence along the western boundaries of allotments 47, 48, and 49, in the said parish, to the north-west angle of allotment 49; thence along the northern boundaries of allotments 49, 50, 51, 66, and 67, to the north-east angle of allotment 67, in the said parish; thence in a direct line bearing east to the north-east angle of allotment 16, in the parish of North Murchison; thence by the north-east boundary of said allotment and a continuation of the same line to a point in the centre of the River Goulburn; thence by the River Goulburn southerly to its junction with Sunday Creek; thence by the centre of Sunday Creek southerly to its junction with Sugar Loaf Creek; thence by the centre of Sugar Loaf Creek southerly to its junction with Mollison's Creek; thence by the centre of Mollison's Creek and the Granite ranges westerly to the south-east corner of allotment 2, in the parish of Baynton; thence by Pohlman's Creek north-westerly to the north boundary of the said parish of Baynton; thence by the north boundary of the said parish westerly to the north-west angle of allotment 16, in the said parish; thence by a direct line bearing easterly to the centre of Piper's Creek, at the south-west corner of allotment 3, in the parish of Glenhope; thence northerly by the centre of Piper's Creek to its junction with the Campaspe River; thence by the said River Campaspe northerly to the southern boundary of the parish of Axedale; and thence by a portion of the southern, the eastern, and a portion of the northern boundaries of the parish of Axedale to the centre of the River Campaspe; and thence by the centre of the River Campaspe northerly to the commencing point.

And I do hereby further proclaim and declare that the specific name or designation of such road district shall be "The Heathcote and Waranga Road District."

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS it is expedient that a common and public highway should be created in the direction hereinafter described within the municipal district of Belfast, and within the area called and known as "Atkinson's Special Survey;" and whereas in the Crown grant of the said land the necessary areas for roads are specially reserved: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim and order that the piece or portion of land hereinafter described shall at all times hereafter be a common and public highway or road for all the liege subjects of Her Majesty to go, return, pass and repass, on foot and on horseback, and with horses, carts, and carriages, every year, at all times of the year, at their free will and pleasure, that is to say:—

DESCRIPTION OF MOUNT NAPIER ROAD, IN THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF BELFAST:—Commencing at a point being the junction of the north side of Regent street with the west side of a section road one chain wide leading towards Rosebrook from Regent street west of the Benevolent Asylum, at which point the road is one chain and fifty links wide; thence by a straight line to a point bearing west (magnetic) twelve chains and eighty-three links; thence by a curve the chord of which bears north seventy-eight degrees forty-five minutes and thirty seconds west (magnetic) seven chains and eighty-four links and two-thirds of a link, at which point the road narrows to one

chain in width; and thence by a line bearing north sixty-seven degrees thirty-one minutes west (magnetic) sixty-nine chains and seventy-five links to the boundary (western) of the municipality, the aforesaid lengths and bearings being those respectively of the northern side of the road.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this sixth day of May, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, and in the twenty-fifth year of Her Majesty's reign.

LANDS TO BE PERMANENTLY RESERVED.

IT is hereby notified, in pursuance of the 4th section of the Act 24 Victoria No. 117, that, upon the expiration of one month from the undermentioned dates, it is the intention of the Governor in Council to permanently reserve from sale the lands hereinafter described, for the several purposes specified in connection with each description.

BUNINYONG DISTRICT ROAD BOARD.

BYE-LAW No. 2.—TO REPEAL CLAUSE 3 OF BYE-LAW TO REGULATE THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE BOARD, AND MAKE OTHER PROVISION FOR THE SAME.

WHEREAS a bye-law was made by the Buninyong District Road Board to regulate by means of standing orders their proceedings, and was assented to by His Excellency the Governor in Council, and gazetted on the 8th day of February, 1861: And whereas it has been found that the third clause of the said bye-law has proved a hindrance to the general conducting of the business of the board, for which cause it is considered desirable to repeal the same and to make another in lieu thereof: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the Buninyong District Road Board, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, the said third clause of the said bye-law shall be and is hereby rescinded and repealed, and the following shall be and is substituted:—

At all meetings of the board when there are not three members present, or when the board is counted out, such circumstance, together with the names of the members then present, shall be recorded in the minute book.

PROPOSED ROAD DISTRICT.

APPLICATIONS have been made by the parties hereinafter mentioned for the creation of a Road District, the proposed area of which, as specified by each party, is circumscribed by boundaries nearly identical, viz.:-

The Secretary of the town management committee, Moonambel (Alexander Melville, Esq.), by direction of the committee, in a letter dated 20th September last, states as follows:—"I have the honor to hand you tracing of the proposed boundary lines for the Moonambel road district, as sanctioned by the town management committee, and am instructed respectfully to request you will cause the same to be proclaimed at as early a date as possible. The proposed boundaries of the Moonambel road district are as follows: On the south by the boundaries of the Lexton and Ararat road districts; on the west by the boundary line of the Stawell road district; on the north by the St. Arnaud road district and by a line bearing eastward from Nattyalock to the western boundary of the Bet-bet road district; and on the east by the boundaries of the Bet-bet, Tullaroop, and Amherst road districts."

The Town Clerk of the municipal district of Avoca (in a letter dated the 25th of September last), by direction of the municipal council, adverts to previous correspondence on the subject of a road district for Avoca, and urges the propriety of its being named "The Avoca Road District."

A memorial bearing date the 30th of September last, signed by the Chairman of the municipal council of Avoca, the Chairman and Secretary of the Redbank Progress Association, and by five other persons resident at Avoca, sets forth as follows:—"We, the undersigned, representing the portions of this district opposite our respective names, beg leave to represent to you that the roads of communication between the several towns of the district are in a most unsatisfactory condition, and that it is the desire of its residents that a district road board should be established, the road district comprising the area within the following boundaries, and indicated on a plan [which accompanied the memorial], viz.: Commencing at a point being the north-east corner of the Stawell road board district (township of Navarro); thence easterly by the south boundary of the St. Arnaud road board district to its south-east corner (Nattyalock); thence northerly by the Avoca river to a point due west of the north-west corner of the Bet-bet road district; thence to the said corner; thence southerly by the Bet-bet, Tullaroop, and Amherst road districts to the intersecting point of the latter with the Lexton road district; thence westerly by the northern boundary of the last-named district and that of Ararat to its intersection of the eastern boundary of the Stawell road district; and thence northerly by that boundary to the point of commencement. We therefore respectfully beg you may be pleased to cause the district herein described to be proclaimed a road district, under the title of the 'Avoca Road District.'

"We especially beg the district may be named as above, for the reason that Avoca is an old-established township, and is centrally positioned in reference to Lamplough, Amphitheatre, Homebush, Redbank, and Moonambel."

PETITION UNDER THE MUNICIPAL INSTITUTIONS ACT.
INGLEWOOD.

IN pursuance of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of a petition addressed to His Excellency as hereinafter set forth, signed by one hundred and fifty-seven householders resident at Inglewood, praying for the erection of their locality into a municipal district.

The petitioners state that they reside within the area hereinafter defined.

That the town of Inglewood is in the centre of a large mining district, and that it contains a mining and trading population who have invested large sums in permanent buildings.

That the land in the township has been lately sold, some of it at a high price, and notwithstanding the large sums paid by the inhabitants to the Government no provision has been made for roads or approaches to the town, and that the streets are now almost impassable.

That the township contains over three hundred householders. They further state that they are of opinion that the erection of their locality into a municipal district will greatly advance its interests and prosperity and conduce to its permanent improvement and good government, and they suggest the following boundaries for the district, viz.:—Commencing at the south-west angle of the Inglewood township reserve; thence by a line bearing north one hundred and sixty chains; thence by a line bearing east one hundred and sixty chains; thence by a line bearing south one hundred and sixty chains; and thence by a line bearing west one hundred and sixty chains to the commencing point.

And the petitioners pray as follows:—

"We, the undersigned householders and landowners resident within the area above set forth, most respectfully pray your Excellency will cause the said area to be proclaimed a municipal district, in accordance with the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, under the style and title of 'The Municipality of Inglewood.'"

Smith having resigned. Councillors John Fynn and James Routledge were elected 17th September, and Councillor George Smith was elected *vice* John I. Carter retiring by rotation.

Councillor James Routledge was elected chairman for the ensuing year.

23rd July, William Blaney Walshe was elected town surveyor, *vice* Johnston Hughston, resigned.

Messrs. Campbell and James were appointed auditors of the half-yearly accounts.

By-law No. 5, to regulate the depasturing of cattle, &c., on the town common, was passed 12th September, and forwarded for approval.

PUBLIC WORKS.

The council have fenced the frontage of unoccupied lands where the footpaths were made, to prevent trespass, and have altered the fence in front of the camp, and fenced in the old cemetery. Pohlman street has been cleared, and a drain with bridge constructed in Playne street; whilst the council have been frequently compelled to repair the bridges crossing the creek and main road, when damaged by floods.

The council intend forming the footpaths to sections 1, 2, 5, 10, on the east side of High street, to section 15 on the west side; and from Last street to Cameron's on the west side of the Kilmore road. The work has been delayed on account of the Government not furnishing the necessary levels.

144 chains of the main road are now being formed, and the council have been promised from the Government that the balance of this year's grant (viz., £1386) shall be expended between Last street and the south of Brightwell's hill.

Application has been made to the Government for £3000 to construct sludge drains, £1000 to build Mechanics' Institute in conjunction with Town Hall and Court House, £1200 to erect bridge and approaches over McIvor Creek, and £250 to fence in park lands.

The mining surveyor is engaged in surveying the district for a site for a reservoir, which works will be commenced at an early date.

The council have pressed on the attention of the Government the deplorable state of the Kilmore road, and have by deputation visited Melbourne, and hope they have succeeded in procuring a just recognition of the claims of the district to a larger share of the public grants.
