DISTRICT BROUGHT UNDER THE GUNPOWDER ACT.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Parliament of Victoria, passed in the session held in the twenty-first year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act to regulate the importation, carriage, and custody of Gunpowder*, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to proclaim any town, township, or municipal district, not being a sea-port town, as a district into which no gunpowder shall be brought unless for deposit in a public or licensed magazine; and if any person shall bring more than One hundred pounds of gunpowder into any such district, and shall not forthwith deposit the same in a magazine as aforesaid, it shall be forfeited: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the municipal district hereinafter mentioned to be a district within the meaning and intent and for the purpose mentioned in the abovesaid clause of the said Act, that is to say:

The Municipal District of Maldon.

THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF MOONAMBEL.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, passed in the eighteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted, that any district of the colony of Victoria, the area whereof should not exceed nine square miles, and which should contain a population of householders not less than three hundred, might, subject to the provisions of the said Act, be constituted a municipal district, as thereinafter mentioned, provided that no one point in any such area should be distant more than six miles from any other point; and it was further enacted that it should be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, on the receipt of a petition signed by not less than one hundred and fifty householders resident within any such district, praying that such district might be declared a municipal district under the said Act, to cause the substance and prayer of such petition to be published in the *Government Gazette*, and (if no counter-petition, signed by an equal or greater number of householders resident within such locality, should have been delivered at the office of the Colonial Secretary within one month from the date of such publication) the Lieutenant Governor, with the advice aforesaid, might, if he should think fit, declare by Proclamation such locality a municipal district by a name to be mentioned in such Proclamation, and also by the same or any other Proclamation might define the limits and boundaries of such municipal district, and such limits and boundaries at any time thereafter in the same manner, on receipt of a similar petition, might vary and alter, but so as in no case, save as thereinafter mentioned, to include within the limits or boundaries of such municipal district an area of more than nine square miles, and upon the publication of any such Proclamation in the *Government Gazette*, such locality so defined should be deemed and taken to be a municipal district within the meaning of the said Act: And whereas a petition for the purposes aforesaid has been presented to the Governor by the householders and landowners resident at and near Moonambel, the substance and prayer of which petition have been published as directed by the said Act: And whereas no

counter-petition has been delivered at the office of the Chief Secretary: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this my Proclamation declare that the district hereinafter described and named shall be a municipal district within the meaning of the said Act, that is to say:—

THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF MOONAMBEL, ON MOUNTAIN CREEK.—Commencing at the south-west angle of McRinnon's pre-emptive section; thence bounded on the east by a line bearing south half a mile; thence on the south by a line bearing west three miles; thence on the west by a line bearing north two miles; thence on the north by a line bearing east three miles; and thence again on the east by a line and by the west boundary of the said pre-emptive section, bearing south one and a half miles to the point of commencement.

And I do hereby, with the advice aforesaid, direct that the council of the said municipal district shall be called by the name and style of "The Municipal Council of Moonambel."

LANDS TO BE PERMANENTLY RESERVED.

PETITION UNDER THE MUNICIPAL INSTITUTIONS ACT... INGLEWOOD.
 IN pursuance of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of a petition addressed to His Excellency as hereinafter set forth, signed by one hundred and fifty-seven householders resident at Inglewood, praying for the erection of their locality into a municipal district.

The petitioners state that they reside within the area hereinafter defined.
 That the town of Inglewood is in the centre of a large mining district, and that it contains a mining and trading population who have invested large sums in permanent buildings.
 That the land in the township has been lately sold, some of it at a high price, and notwithstanding the large sums paid by the inhabitants to the Government no provision has been made for roads or approaches to the town, and that the streets are now almost impassable.
 That the township contains over three hundred householders. They further state that they are of opinion that the erection of their locality into a municipal district will greatly advance its interests and prosperity and conduce to its permanent improvement and good government, and they suggest the following boundaries for the district, viz.—Commencing at the south-west angle of the Inglewood township reserve; thence by a line bearing north one hundred and sixty chains; thence by a line bearing east one hundred and sixty chains; thence by a line bearing south one hundred and sixty chains; and thence by a line bearing west one hundred and sixty chains to the commencing point.
 And the petitioners pray as follows:—
 We, the undersigned householders and landowners resident within the area above set forth, most respectfully pray your Excellency will cause the said area to be proclaimed a municipal district, in accordance with the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, under the style and title of 'The Municipality of Inglewood.'

MUNICIPALITY OF EMERALD HILL.
 BYE-LAW No. 33.—A BYE-LAW FOR LEVYING A RATE OF ONE SHILLING AND THREEPENCE IN THE POUND FOR THE CURRENT MUNICIPAL YEAR.
 WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of Victoria, 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is empowered to impose a rate on all property, works, houses, tenements, or lands within such district, according to its fair average annual value, such rate not to exceed Two shillings in the pound: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council for the district of Emerald Hill, that a rate of One shilling and threepence in the pound for the current municipal year be levied on all property in works, houses, tenements, or lands within the said district, to become due and payable on and after the first day of November, 1861.

MUNICIPALITY OF NEWTOWN AND CHILWELL.

BYE-LAW NO. 26.—FOR BORROWING THE SUM OF TWO THOUSAND FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, AND APPROPRIATING IT TO A PUBLIC WORK OF A PERMANENT CHARACTER.

WHEREAS by the Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, 18 Victoria number 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, power is given to any municipal council to borrow, by way of mortgage or otherwise, on the credit of land, funds, or income to which it may be entitled, any sum or sums of money that may be required for the purpose of making, carrying on, or completing any permanent improvements that may directly benefit the municipal district for which such council has been elected, but in no case is the sum or sums so borrowed to exceed in the whole the estimated revenue of such municipal corporation for the period of three years: And whereas the municipal council of Newtown and Chilwell deem it desirable to make, carry on, and complete a bridge over the River Barwon, at the end of the West Melbourne road, and the approaches thereto from St. Mary's terrace on the one side of the river, and from the Barabool Hills road on the other side of the river, which work will be a permanent improvement that will directly benefit the said municipal district: And whereas the sum of Three thousand five hundred pounds is the estimated cost of making, carrying on, and completing the said work or permanent improvement, and the sum of Twelve thousand pounds is the estimated revenue of the said municipal district for the period of three years: And whereas it is proposed to make, carry on, and complete the said work or permanent improvement by funds partly to be raised on mortgage, and the said council is desirous of exercising the said power, and of borrowing, under the provisions of the said recited Act, the sum of Two thousand five hundred pounds, at a rate of interest not exceeding Ten pounds per centum per annum, by way of mortgage or otherwise, on the credit of the whole or some part of the lands, funds, or income to which the said municipal council may be entitled: Be it therefore ordered and enacted by the municipal council of Newtown and Chilwell, that from and after the express sanction of His Excellency the Governor and Executive Council being given to this bye-law, it shall be lawful for the said municipal council of Newtown and Chilwell to borrow for or towards the above purpose the sum of Two thousand five hundred pounds, subject to and in conformity with the provisions contained in the said recited Act, and to commence, carry on, and make the said work or permanent improvement.

PUBLIC NOTICE.

THE largely increasing immigration to this Province from the adjacent colonies, notwithstanding the appearance both in Australia and in Dunedin of such accounts of the gold field as should have induced intending immigrants to act with greater caution, and to await the fuller development both of the character and extent of the Otago Gold Field, makes it imperative on the part of the Government, as they are anxious to prevent the inevitable consequences of so injudicious a movement, to come forward with an authoritative declaration.

The Government cannot doubt the existence of a valuable gold field, of considerable extent, capable of affording remunerative wages to a large population; but they desire that it should be known that, owing to a scarcity of wood for fuel and for slabbing purposes in many localities, considerable difficulties and expenses will have to be encountered in the prosecution of the miner's occupation. It should, at the same time, be remembered, that the greater portion of the gold hitherto extracted has come from one or more gullies, which may shortly be exhausted, and though the amount brought by escort continues to increase, it must be considered that the mining population, almost trebled within the last week or two, is spread over a much larger area than formerly, and that the diggings are mostly of a shallow alluvial character, very few nuggets exceeding an ounce in weight having been found, and but little gold imbedded in quartz.

In presenting these considerations to the public, which the Government have abstained from publishing in a strictly official form until in the possession of information of a more decisive and reliable character, they consider it a duty to protest against those exaggerated statements which are represented to have been in circulation in Australia, and which are likely to be productive of so much suffering. The Government have every confidence in the auriferous capability of the Province. They feel assured that for many years it will afford a highly remunerative yield to capital and labor. They will warmly welcome their fellow-countrymen to these shores (there being abundance of available land in the market, and the country being well adapted, both as regards climate and soil, for agricultural and pastoral pursuits, presenting many attractions to a settled mining population, and offering a reasonable prospect of employment to laborers on public works); but they cannot, even tacitly, sanction a movement which, arising from delusion, may terminate in suffering.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of New South Wales, 14 Victoria No. 85, intituled, *An Act for regulating the formation, drainage, and repair of Streets, Courts, and Alleys on private property within the Town of Geelong*, it is amongst other things enacted, that where any street, court, or alley on private property, in the town of Geelong, shall not be or shall not have been sufficiently paved, flagged, macadamized, levelled, drained, and sewered, or otherwise completed or repaired to the satisfaction of the council of the said town, it shall be lawful for the said council at any time, and from time to time, by any order under the hand of the mayor or town clerk of the said town for the time being respectively, to order that any such street, court, or alley, or any part thereof, shall be freed from obstruction, paved, flagged, macadamized, levelled, drained, and sewered, or otherwise completed or repaired, in such manner and within such time as to the said council may appear expedient; and thereupon the owners of the tenements adjoining or abutting upon such street, court, or alley on each side thereof, shall, in and thereupon the owners of the tenements adjoining or abutting upon such street, court, or alley, and expenses, remove all such manner and within such time as shall be expressed in such order, at their respective costs, charges, and expenses, remove all obstructions, and well and sufficiently pave, flag, macadamize, level, drain, and sewer, or otherwise complete or repair so much of the said street, court, or alley to the centre thereof as may be opposite to and co-extensive with their respective tenements adjoining or abutting on such streets, courts, or alleys respectively: And whereas the streets, courts, and alleys enumerated in the schedule to this order annexed, marked C, have not been sufficiently paved, flagged, macadamized, levelled, drained, and sewered, or otherwise completed or repaired to the satisfaction of the town council of Geelong: Be it now ordered by the council of the said town, that the streets, courts, and alleys enumerated in the schedule to this order annexed, marked C, shall, within twenty days from the date of this order coming into operation, be freed from obstruction, paved, flagged, macadamized, levelled, drained, and sewered, in such manner as is expressed in the schedule to this order annexed, marked D; and it is hereby notified to the owners respectively of the tenements adjoining or abutting upon the streets, courts, and alleys enumerated in the schedule to this order annexed, marked C, that if they or any of them shall neglect or omit to remove the obstructions, and pave, flag, macadamize, level, drain, and sewer, or otherwise complete or repair the street, court, or alley on which their tenements respectively adjoin or abut, in the manner and within the time expressed in this order, then the council of the said town will remove all obstructions in the said streets, courts, and alleys, and pave, flag, macadamize, level, drain, sewer, and otherwise complete or repair the same, or such parts thereof as shall not have been so done pursuant to this order; and will thereupon ascertain, determine, and charge such respective owners with their several proportionate parts of the costs, charges, and expenses thereof, according to and

co-extensive with their respective tenements adjoining or abutting on such street, court, or alley, having regard in such apportionment to the state and condition of the pavement, flagging, macadamizing, levelling, drainage, and sewerage in which such streets, courts, or alleys respectively, or any part thereof, shall or may be at the time of making this order.

SCHEDULE D, REFERRED TO IN THIS ORDER.

Specification of manner in which the Streets, Courts, and Alleys, enumerated in Schedule D, referred to in this Order, are ordered to be freed from obstruction, paved, flagged, macadamised, levelled, drained, and sewered, in the Town of Geelong.

The natural soil is to be reduced or made up, as the case may require, so that the longitudinal section of the whole right-of-way shall in no part have an inclination of less than one foot in one hundred and thirty-two feet; and where practicable, the entire length is to form one incline. The transverse section of the right-of-way is to show a roadway whose crown shall not be more than three inches above the kerbs of the footway; and the fall, from the crown to the water-channels, is to be at the rate of one foot in twenty-four feet. On either side of the roadway there is to be a water-channel two feet wide, consisting of three rows of bluestone pitchers eight inches deep and eight inches wide, made square on the ends, with upright sides, set in sand, and well rammed, so as to subside two inches; the bottom of such channel is to be six inches below the top of the kerbs.
