## GOLD FIELDS COMMONS.

## PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

**WHEREAS** by an Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her present Majesty's reign, intitled, *An Act for regulating the Sale of Crown Lands and for other purposes*, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to proclaim that any Crown lands in the vicinity of any gold field shall be a common for the use of all holders of miners' rights, business licenses, and carriers' licenses, and other residents on such gold field, and every such holder or other resident shall, from the time of such proclamation, be entitled to depasture his horses and cattle on such common, subject to rules and regulations hereafter to be made, and such common shall be called a "Gold Fields Common;" and it is also enacted, that it shall be lawful for the mining board of the mining district within which such Gold Fields Common shall be included, with the consent of the Governor in Council, to make rules and regulations for determining how many horses and cattle every holder of a miner's right, business license, or carrier's license, or other resident on a gold field, shall be entitled to depasture on any Gold Fields Common: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim that the Crown lands in the vicinity of the gold fields hereinafter mentioned, comprised within the areas the descriptions whereof are subjoined to the names of such gold fields respectively, shall (save and except the lands hereinafter declared to be gold fields) be GOLD FIELDS COMMONS within the meaning of the said Act, for the use of all holders of miners' rights, business licenses, carriers' licenses, and other residents on such gold fields respectively: And I do further proclaim, with the advice aforesaid, that the portions of Crown lands within such areas, upon which mining or digging for gold is or shall be actually carried on now or at any time hereafter, shall be Gold Fields within the meaning of the said Act, and in the vicinity of which Gold Fields Commons may be proclaimed:—

**GOLD FIELDS COMMON FOR DISTRICT BETWEEN MARYBOROUGH AND AMHERST.**—Commencing at the north-west angle of a village reserve in the parish of Craigie, in the county of Talbot; thence by a line west thirty chains; thence by a line due north one hundred and fifty-five chains, more or less, to the municipal boundary of Maryborough; thence by said boundary line south 45° west about two hundred and forty chains; thence north 45° west fourteen chains, more or less; thence west about seventy chains; thence south about two hundred and seventy-five chains to northern boundary of main line of road from Amherst to Carisbrook; thence by said boundary line north-easterly about three hundred and fifty chains to the southern boundary line of the village reserve aforesaid in the parish of Craigie; thence by said line west about five chains; and thence by western boundary line of said village reserve due north eighty chains to the point of commencement; as shown on plan deposited in the Crown Lands Office, Melbourne. Approximate area, exclusive of all sold and appropriated lands, 6500 acres.—(61.D.5682.)

**GOLD FIELDS COMMON FOR SAGO HILL AND CAMPBELL'S GULLY.**—Commencing at the north-east corner of allotment 2 of section 16 in the parish of Cardigan, in the county of Grenville; thence by a road due west to the north-western angle of allotment 7 in same section; thence by the eastern boundary of a three-chain road, being the western boundaries of lots 7 and 6, the western and south-western boundaries of lot 5, the south-western boundary of lot 4, southerly to the south-east angle of said lot 4; thence by a line due south seventy-three chains twenty-six links to the south-east angle of lot 5, section 17, in the same parish; thence by a line due east about one hundred chains; thence north one hundred and twenty chains; thence west about sixty-nine chains seventy-five links to the north-eastern angle of lot 3, section 16; thence north forty chains to the commencing point; as shown on plan deposited in Crown Lands Office, Melbourne. ## WYNDHAM TOWN COMMON ALTERED.

## PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

**WHEREAS** by an Act of the Parliament of Victoria, passed in the session held in the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intitled, *An Act for regulating the Sale of Crown Lands and for other purposes*, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council at any time to increase,

diminish, alter, or abolish any town common, gold fields common, or farmers' common: And whereas by a Proclamation under the hand of the Governor and the seal of the colony, bearing date the twenty-second day of April in the present year, a certain area, therein described, was proclaimed to be a Town Common for the use of the inhabitants of the town of Wyndham: And whereas it is expedient to abolish the said common, and to proclaim another area in lieu thereof: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby revoke the said Proclamation; and, with the advice aforesaid, I do hereby proclaim that the Crown lands hereinafter mentioned shall be and constitute a Town Common for the use of the inhabitants of the said town of Wyndham, within the intent and meaning of the said Act, that is to say:—

**TOWN COMMON FOR WYNDHAM**, County of Grant, Parish of Mambourin.—Extent, about 320 available acres: Being allotments 1, 2, 3, 4, and 17 of section 17, and commencing at the south-east angle of allotment 2 of section 19; bounded on the west by allotment 2 aforesaid, bearing north fifty-nine chains eighty-five links to a road leading to Wyndham township; on the north by that road bearing easterly to the west boundary of that township; on the east by that boundary bearing south about thirty chains; and on the south by a road bearing west about sixty chains to commencing point.

## BUNG BONG FARMERS' COMMON ENLARGED.

## PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

**WHEREAS** by an Act of the Parliament of Victoria, passed in the session held in the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intitled, *An Act for regulating the Sale of Crown Lands and for other purposes*, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council at any time to increase, diminish, alter, or abolish any town common, gold fields common, or farmers' common: And whereas by a Proclamation under the hand of the Governor and the seal of the colony, bearing date the fourth day of March in the present year, a certain area, therein described, was proclaimed to be a Farmers' Common at Bung Bong: And whereas it is expedient to increase the said common: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby increase the Farmers' Common at Bung Bong aforesaid, and I do hereby proclaim the Crown lands hereinafter described to be an addition to the Farmers' Common for the use of the occupiers of purchased land at or near Bung Bong aforesaid, within the meaning and intent and subject to the provisions of the said Act, that is to say:—

**EXTENSION OF BUNG BONG FARMERS' COMMON.**—Commencing at a point one chain west of the north-west angle of the township reserve, in the parish of Bung Bong, county unnamed; thence by a line due west eighty chains more or less; thence south to a point due west of the south-west angle of allotment 28, in the parish of Bung Bong; thence east to the aforesaid angle to a point one chain due west of the same; and thence by the western boundary of a one-chain road due north to the point of commencement, as shown on plan deposited in the Crown Lands Office, Melbourne. Approximate area, exclusive of all sold and appropriated land, 1760 acres.—(61.C.9070.)

#### PROCLAMATION.

By JAMES A. R. MENZIES, Esquire, Superintendent of the Province of Southland.

WHEREAS His Excellency the Governor in Council has been pleased to delegate, under the *Diseased Cattle Act*, 1861, to the Superintendent of the Province of Southland, the several powers vested in the Governor by the 2nd, 4th, 5th, 7th, 9th, and 10th sections of the said Act, subject to the regulations contained in the Order in Council of 6th September, 1861:

Now therefore I, the said Superintendent, in virtue of the powers vested in me, do hereby proclaim that the Inspector of Diseased Cattle at the harbors of the Bluff and New River shall not be authorised, until further notice, to grant any certificate to land cattle, as provided under the subsections (b and d) of section 4 of the said Act, to the owner of any cattle imported from the colony of Victoria: And I further appoint as quarantine ground for any cattle landed under the provisions of subsection (d), section 4, the Peninsula on the east side of the Bluff Harbor, known by the name of Tevai's Point; such quarantine ground being bounded on the west by the Bluff Harbor; on the north by the eastern arm of the Bluff Harbor; and by a right line extending due east from its eastern extremity until it intersects the east boundary of the Campbelltown Hundred; on the east by the east boundary of the Campbelltown Hundred, from the said point of intersection to the sea coast; on the south by the ocean: And I further appoint that any cattle which may be landed upon such quarantine ground shall not be removed from thence until the owner has obtained a certificate to that effect from the said inspector.

**REGISTRAR GENERAL'S REPORT ON THE VITAL STATISTICS OF MELBOURNE AND SUBURBS DURING THE MONTH OF SEPTEMBER, AND FOR THE QUARTER ENDING 30TH SEPTEMBER, 1861.**

**A**CTUAL, Daily Mortality of persons of both sexes under and over five years of age in the Statistical District of Melbourne and suburbs, embracing a radius of ten miles, and including the Statistical Sub-districts of Melbourne Proper, East Melbourne, North Melbourne and Carlton, Fitz Roy Municipality, East Collingwood, Richmond, Jika-jika parish (exclusive of North Melbourne, Collingwood, and Richmond), South Yarra and Prahran, Emerald Hill and Sandridge, St. Kilda and Brighton, Doutta Galla and Keilor, Boroondara and Heidelberg, Cut-paw-paw parish, and the shipping in Hobson's Bay; also, the Temperature in the shade at Melbourne, deduced from the mean of twenty-four hourly observations taken at the Flagstaff Observatory on each day during the month of September, 1861:—

An unusually low rate of mortality prevailed during the month of September, the recorded deaths having amounted only to 234, and the daily average to 7.80. The previous month showed, according to the first returns, 265 deaths, or a daily average of 8.55, to which three deaths subsequently registered have since been added, bringing the number up to 268, and the daily average to 8.65. In the month of September, 1860, 259 deaths took place, or 25 more than in the month which is the subject of this report, but in the same month of 1859 the remarkably small number of 191 deaths only occurred, or 68 less than in September, 1860, and 43 less than in September, 1861. It is true that the population has increased since September, 1859, but the deaths in that month were only in the proportion of 1.49 to every thousand of the then existing inhabitants of the district, whilst in the month under review the deaths were 1.68 in a thousand of its population as ascertained by the last census.

The mean temperature of the month of September was 57.2°, against 53.8° for the same month of 1860, and against 52.5° for the same month of 1859. For the previous month the mean temperature was 49.2°. The highest point reached by the thermometer in the shade (77°) was at 1 p.m. on the 26th, and the lowest (34.6°) was at 6 a.m. on the 4th, the range for the month thus being 32.4°. The daily range of temperature will be hereafter given. The mean atmospheric pressure, as shown by the barometer, was 29.972 in. against 29.935 in. for September, 1860, and against 29.938 in. for September, 1859. The maximum height of the mercury (30.581 in.) was at 11 a.m. on the 3rd, and the minimum (29.519 in.) was at 9 p.m. on the 29th, the range of pressure for the month thus being 1.062 in.

The mean temperature, number of deaths, and daily average of mortality, for the first four weeks in September, were as follow:—

Of the 234 deaths which took place during the month, those of males numbered 145, or 63 per cent., leaving 89 or 38 per cent. of females; those of children under five years of age were 94, or only 40 per cent., whilst those of persons over that age numbered 140, or 60 per cent. In the same month last year the deaths of children under five years of age exceeded those of persons over five years of age in the proportion of 53 to 47; and considering that the mean temperature of the month under notice was 3.4° higher than that of September, 1890, it is to be wondered at that the infantile mortality should have borne so small a proportion to the total deaths, a proportion less than that of any month since the first publication of these reports, now nearly two years ago.

The maximum of daily mortality during the month was only 12, that being the number of deaths which occurred on the 3rd and 21st. In no previous month during the last two years has so small a number as 12 been the highest number shown in the returns for any one day, and in the report for August, 14 deaths was spoken of as a remarkably low maximum of daily mortality.

A male at 80 years of age died during the month of pneumonia; also a female at 81 of dropsy, and one at 79 of bronchitis.

Forty-six deaths out of the whole number (234), or about one in every five, occurred in public institutions as follow:—29 in the Melbourne Hospital, 8 in the Benevolent Asylum, 1 in the Immigrants' Home, 1 in the Melbourne Gaol, 1 in the Lying-in Hospital, and 6 in the Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum.

NOTE.—The population of the different sub-districts according to the recent census is given subject to future revision, but it is believed that when finally corrected the figures will not differ materially from the above.

Of the 94 children under five years of age who died during the month, 55 were less than a year old, 14 were between one year and two, 7 between two years and three, 5 between three years and four, and 13 between four years and five.

Excluding one adult, whose age could not be ascertained, the ages of the remaining 139 persons who died at five years old and upwards may be divided into the following quinquennial periods:—20 between five years and ten, 3 between ten and fifteen, 6 between fifteen and twenty, 12 between twenty and twenty-five, 14 between twenty-five and thirty, 16 between thirty and thirty-five, 14 between thirty-five and forty, 11 between forty and forty-five, 12 between forty-five and fifty, 8 between fifty and fifty-five, 7 between fifty-five and sixty, 5 between sixty and sixty-five, 7 between sixty-five and seventy, 1 between seventy and seventy-five, 1 between seventy-five and eighty, and 2 between eighty and eighty-five.

The disease table for the month is chiefly remarkable for the decrease in zymotic diseases, and the increase in those of the respiratory system, the former having occasioned only 24 per cent. of the total deaths, against 31 per cent. in August, and against 35 per cent. in September, 1890, and the latter having caused nearly 29 per cent. of the deaths, against 20 per cent. in August, and against 23 per cent. in September, 1890.

The reason for zymotic diseases showing diminished proportions was that deaths from scarlatina decreased since the previous month from 31 to 25, those of whooping-cough from 10 to 5, of diphtheria from 13 to 8, of diarrhoea and dysentery from 10 to 7, and of typhus fever from 6 to 3.

The increase in deaths from diseases of the organs of respiration resulted through bronchitis and laryngitis having terminated fatally in 19 instances against 9 in August, and pneumonia in 21 instances against 11. The mortality from this class of diseases would have been still greater had not a diminution taken place in deaths from phthisis or consumption, only 23 having been set down to that complaint against 31 in August.

NOTE.—The numbers for July and August are slightly in excess of those already given in the published reports for those months, in consequence of a few deaths not having been registered up to the time of the deputy registrars forwarding to this office their monthly returns from which those reports were compiled.

The deaths occurring in Melbourne and suburbs in the quarter ending 30th September of the present year numbered 770, against 917 during the corresponding quarter of 1860, and against 663 in the corresponding quarter of 1859. The mean temperature of the same three quarters was 51.0° for that of the present year, 50.2° for that of 1860, and 50.4° for that of 1859.

The deaths which took place throughout the district were in the proportion of 5.50 to every 1000 of its population according to the recent census; the numbers dying in each sub-district and the proportions to every 1000 of their populations were as follow:—Melbourne Proper, 189 deaths or 7.96 in a thousand; East Melbourne, 14 deaths or 6.92 in a thousand; North Melbourne thousand; Richmond, 51 deaths or 4.49 in a thousand; Fitz Roy, 60 deaths or 5.09 in a thousand; East Collingwood, 50 deaths or 3.95 in a thousand; Prahran, 62 deaths, or 4.81 in a thousand; Emerald Hill and Sandridge, 59 deaths or 4.76 in a thousand; South Yarra and 44 deaths or 3.91 in a thousand; Douita Galla and Keilor, 23 deaths or 7.37 in a thousand; Boroondara and Heidelberg, 20 deaths or 3.50 in a thousand; Cut-paw-paw parish, 23 deaths or 3.66 in a thousand; shipping in Hobson's Bay, 10 deaths or 5.78 in a thousand.
