VILLIERS AND HEYTESBURY ELECTION.

IT is hereby notified that there was presented to me on Wednesday, the 10th day of April, 1861, a Petition of which the following is a true copy.

Speaker of the Legislative Assembly of Victoria.

The Petition of RICHARD DAVIES IRELAND, of St. Kilda,
Barrister-at-law, Esquire,

RESPECTFULLY SHEWETH—

That in pursuance of an Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, passed in the nineteenth year of the reign of Her Majesty, intituled, *An Act to provide for the Election of Members to serve in the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly of Victoria respectively*, a writ was duly issued by and under the hand and seal of the Honorable the Speaker of the same Assembly, directed to F. P. Stevens, Esquire, returning officer for the electoral district of Villiers and Heytesbury, and requiring him, the said F. P. Stevens, to proceed as therein directed according to law for the purpose of procuring the return of a representative for the said district of Villiers and Heytesbury to the Legislative Assembly of Victoria.

That in accordance with the exigencies of such writ, a meeting of the electors of the said district was duly convened by the said returning officer, at Belfast, in the said district of Villiers and Heytesbury, for the purpose of nominating candidates and otherwise proceeding to such election.

That at the said meeting, which took place at Tower Hill on the 25th day of March, two candidates were nominated and proposed, that is to say, William Rutledge, Esquire, and Richard Davies Ireland, your petitioner:

That by a show of hands, then successively called for by the returning officer, it appeared to and was then declared by him

from the hustings that such show of hands was in favor of your petitioner, and thereupon a poll was demanded by the said William Rutledge:

That such poll took place on the first day of April now last past, at the following polling-places, that is to say:—Woodford, Confines of Warrnambool, Tower Hill, Yambuk, Caramut, Penshurst, Allansford, Tandarook, Confines of Belfast:

That on or about the second day of April, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, the returning officer declared the final state of the polling to be as follows:—

William Rutledge	733
Richard Davies Ireland	693

Whereupon the said William Rutledge was publicly announced and declared by the said returning officer to be duly elected as a member of the Legislative Assembly for the district of Villiers and Heytesbury:

That your petitioner has been informed and believes that the said William Rutledge is disqualified from sitting and voting as a member of the Legislative Assembly of Victoria, by reason of his having contracted, and of his being still a contractor with the Government of Victoria, for the several services herein-after mentioned:

That on or about the eighteenth day of December, One thousand eight hundred and sixty, the said William Rutledge entered into a contract with Her Majesty's Postmaster General, acting on behalf of the Government of Victoria, to carry the mails to and from Geelong and other places to Portland and other places, and that such contract subsisted and was in full force at the time of the said election for the district of Villiers and Heytesbury, and that the same still is in full force:

That on the eighth day of January, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, the said William Rutledge entered into two several contracts with the Government Storekeeper, on behalf of the Government of Victoria, for the supply of forage for the use of the Government in the districts of Warrnambool and Woodford respectively, and that the said contracts subsisted and were in full force at the time of the said election for the district of Villiers and Heytesbury, and that the same are still in full force:

That your petitioner is prepared to prove that the said William Rutledge was, at the time of the said election, and still is, a contractor with the Government of Victoria, as hereinbefore mentioned; and that the said William Rutledge was at the time of the said election, and still is, directly interested in the said several contracts hereinbefore mentioned, within the meaning of a certain Act of the Parliament of Victoria passed in the 23rd year of the reign of Her Majesty, intituled, *An Act to limit the number of persons holding offices under the Crown who may sit and vote in the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly of Victoria*; and that the election of the said William Rutledge, so far as the said William Rutledge is concerned, is absolutely null and void.

Your petitioner therefore respectfully prays that you will communicate the matter of his said petition to the Legislative Assembly of Victoria, in order that the case of your petitioner may be referred to a committee of the said Assembly, duly authorised to receive, enquire into, and report upon the same, according to law. And your petitioner further prays, that in the event of the said committee reporting that the said William Rutledge was at the time of the said election interested in the said contracts in this petition mentioned, that the Legislative Assembly will be pleased to declare the said returning officer's return void as respects the said William Rutledge, and to amend the said return to the said writ, by striking out the name of the said William Rutledge, and inserting in its place the name of your petitioner, and to declare your petitioner duly elected as a member of the Legislative Assembly for the district of Villiers and Heytesbury.

MUNICIPALITY OF BRIGHTON.
BYE-LAW No. 33.—TO ENABLE THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF BRIGHTON TO IMPOSE A RATE NOT EXCEEDING TWO SHILLINGS IN THE POUND ON THE RATEABLE PROPERTY WITHIN THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF BRIGHTON, FOR THE CURRENT YEAR, COMMENCING ON THE 10TH FEBRUARY, 1861, AND ENDING ON THE 10TH FEBRUARY, 1862.
WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the Establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the Council of any municipal district is empowered to impose a rate on all houses and lands within the limits of such municipal district, according to the fair average annual value thereof, such rate not to exceed the sum of Two shillings in the pound of such value: Be it therefore enacted by the council of the municipal district of Brighton, by and with the consent of His Excellency the Governor, that a rate for the current municipal year of One shilling in the pound on the annual value of all property in houses and lands within the limits of the said municipal district be imposed and levied, and be due and payable in equal portions on the first day of June and the first day of November, respectively, in the present year One thousand eight hundred and sixty-one.

MUNICIPALITY OF CHEWTON.
BYE-LAW No. 2.—A BYE-LAW FOR MAKING AN ASSESSMENT AND IMPOSING A RATE OF ONE SHILLING IN THE POUND FOR THE YEAR EIGHTEEN HUNDRED AND SIXTY-ONE.
WHEREAS by Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, a council of any municipal district is authorised and required to assess all property in houses and lands within the limits of such municipal district (except property belonging to Her Majesty) according to its fair average annual value, and to impose a rate on all such properties for the current year: Be it therefore enacted by the council of the municipal district of Chewton, that all the several properties within the limits of the said municipal district shall be assessed for the year 1861 according to the several amounts of annual value respectively affixed to the same in the assessment roll, confirmed by the bench of magistrates, on Wednesday, the 10th, and Thursday, the 11th days of April, 1861, and amounting to a total sum of Thirteen thousand two hundred and eighty-seven pounds four shillings; and also that a rate of One shilling in the pound of the said annual value is hereby imposed on all the properties for the year 1861, the first moiety to be due and payable on or after Monday, 29th of April, and the second moiety thereof on Tuesday, 29th of October, 1861.

MUNICIPALITY OF EMERALD HILL.

BYE-LAW No. 31. — A BYE-LAW FOR REGULATING THE DRIVING OF UNBROKEN HORSES AND CATTLE THROUGH THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF EMERALD HILL.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of Victoria, 18 Victoria, No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted that it shall be competent for the council of any municipal district established under the provisions of the said Act to make bye-laws for the suppression of nuisances, restraining offensive trades, and the general good rule and management of such municipal district: And whereas great danger to life and property arises from the practice of driving unbroken horses and cattle at all hours into or through the municipal district of Emerald Hill, and it is expedient to devise means for the prevention of the same: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council of Emerald Hill, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor-in-Chief of the colony of Victoria as required by the provisions of the said Act —

1. That it shall not be lawful for any person or persons to drive into or through the said municipal district any unbroken horses or any cattle intended for sale or slaughter, excepting between the hours of Twelve of the clock at night and Seven of the clock in the morning.

2. That no bull shall be driven into or through the said municipal district, excepting between the hours aforesaid; and no bull shall be allowed to run at large through any portion of the said district, excepting in that part thereof north of the Hobson's Bay railway.

Any person or persons acting in contravention to this bye-law shall, on conviction thereof before two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding Five pounds for every such offence.

Provided that nothing herein contained shall be held to extend to horses secured by a bridle or halter, or in harness, milch cows, nor to oxen in yoke.

THE ROTHWELL PUBLIC CEMETERY.

RULES, &c., of the Rothwell General Cemetery.

In pursuance of the sixth section of the 17 Victoria No. 12, whereby it is enacted that the trustees of any such cemetery shall have power and authority to make such rules and regulations, and to do and perform, and cause to be done and performed, all such matters and things as may be necessary and proper for any of the purposes aforesaid, and for directing the positions of all graves and vaults to be made in the said cemetery, the depths of the graves, and construction of coffins to be admitted into the vaults, and the covering of the vaults so as to prevent the escape of any noxious exhalation or evaporation in the said cemetery, and for protecting the buildings, monuments, shrubberies, plantations, and enclosures therein and thereof, from destruction or damage, and shall have power to prosecute all persons who shall or may at any time do, or cause to be done, any damage to any such buildings or monuments, tombstones, shrubberies, plantations, or enclosures. Provided that the said trustees shall not by any rule or regulation, or any act, matter, or thing at any time interfere directly or indirectly with the performance of any religious ceremony in the burial of the dead according to the usage of the communion to which the deceased may have belonged, or with the original distribution of the said lands or hereditaments made or intended by the said deed of grant or other conveyance to or amongst separate and distinct religious denominations and communions. The trustees of the Rothwell general cemetery, with the concurrence and approval of the Government, make and promulgate the following resolutions:—

1. All fees and charges for interment must be paid when orders are given or before the ground or vault is opened.

2. By the eighth section of the Cemetery Act before recited, it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the trustees of any such cemetery to permit any vault or grave to be dug or made in such cemetery, and any monument or tombstone to be erected or placed in any parts of such cemetery as they may think proper, upon payment to them by the person desiring to dig and make such vault or grave, and to erect and place such monument or tombstone, of such fees as shall from time to time be established by the said trustee; and any person so digging and making such vaults and erections, or erecting or placing such monument in such cemetery by and with such permission as aforesaid, and upon payment of the fees aforesaid, shall be entitled to have, maintain, and keep up such vault, monument, or tombstone, according to the terms of such permission, to and for the sole and separate use of such person and his representatives for ever.

3. Application for such permission to be made to the secretary. A certificate of permission, in the form set forth in schedule B hereunto annexed, will be granted to the party applying for such permission on payment of the charges fixed by the said trustees.

4. Orders for interment to be given to the secretary at the time of making application for the grave. The application for the grave to be made before Four o'clock in the evening previous to the day of interment. In case the interment is to be made in any private grave, the consent in writing of the person entitled thereto must be left with the order. The name, age, rank, late place of residence, and probable cause of death, must be stated at the time of giving the order.

5. The time fixed for the funeral to be the time when the funeral cortege is to arrive at the cemetery.

6. The charges and fees will be remitted on the burial of any poor person on the production of a certificate of a minister of religion, or other credible testimony, proving to the satisfaction of the trustees that such person was a pauper, and that the relations of the deceased are unable to pay the said fees and charges.

7. The trustees will cause all common graves to be dug, but persons requiring brick graves or vaults will be required to construct them under the superintendence of an officer appointed for that purpose; every coffin in a brick grave or vault to be bricked in, cemented, and covered by a slab of freestone, slate, or iron.

8. A sketch of every headstone, tomb, or pedestal, and a plan of every monument or tablet proposed to be erected, together with every epitaph or inscription to be printed or engraven on the same, to be submitted to the trustees for their approval previous to the erecting, engraving, or printing the same.

9. Every headstone, tomb, pedestal, monument, or tablet to be kept in proper repair and condition at the expense of the owners.

10. No catacombs or post-and-rail fencing will be allowed. Sawn timber enclosures to be kept properly painted or stained by the owners thereof.

11. The cemetery will be open to the public daily from sunrise till sunset. The usual hours for interments will be from Ten a.m. to Five p.m., except on Sundays, when the hours will be from Two to Five only.

12. The trustees reserve to themselves and their successors the right of making any alteration in these regulations and the following scale of charges.

THE SMYTHESDALE PUBLIC CEMETERY.

RULES and Regulations of the Smythesdale General Cemetery.

1. The cemetery shall be open to the public daily from sunrise to sunset.

2. All charges must be paid when orders are given, or before the ground or vault is opened.

3. The time fixed for the funeral to be the time when the procession is to be at the cemetery, and the same must be punctually observed.

4. By the 8th section of the Act, any person making a vault, or erecting and placing a monument in the cemetery by and with the permission of the trustees, under these rules, and upon the payment of the charges therein mentioned, is entitled to have, maintain, and keep a vault, monument, or tombstone, according to the terms of such permission, to and for the sole and separate use of such person and his representatives for ever.

5. Application for such permission to be made to the office of the trustees. A certificate of permission, in the form set out in schedule B, will be granted to the party applying for such permission, on payment of the charges in schedule A.

6. The charges will be remitted on the burial of any poor person in such cemetery, on the certificate of a minister of religion, or other evidence, proving to the satisfaction of the trustees that such person was a pauper, or that the relations and friends of the deceased are unable to pay the costs and charges.

7. Orders for interment to be given at the office of the trustees. Such notice to be given between the hours of Ten a.m. and Four p.m. the previous day.

8. The name, age, late place of residence, and probable cause of death of the deceased must be stated at the time of giving the order.

9. The trustees will cause all common graves to be dug, but parties desiring brick graves or vaults will be required to construct them under the direction of the trustees, or such person as they may appoint, and in case interment is to be made in any private grave or vault, the consent (in writing) of the party entitled thereto must be left with the order.

10. Until otherwise ordered, the usual hours fixed for the performance of funerals shall be from Ten o'clock a.m. to Six o'clock p.m. in the months of September to April inclusive, and from Ten a.m. to Four p.m. during the other four months.

11. Every coffin in a vault or brick grave to be bricked in, cemented, and covered by a slab of freestone, slate, or iron.

12. No servant or other person employed by or engaged in duty on behalf of the trustees will be permitted to receive any gratuity for the discharge thereof.

13. A plan of the cemetery, showing the situation of the purchased ground and other graves, is kept at the office, and may be inspected at the charge set out in schedule A; and registers of all grants are kept by the secretary.

14. The trustees reserve the right to recommend alterations from time to time in these charges and regulations.
