By His Excellency Sir Henry Barkly, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament lolden in the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled, An Act for regulating the Sale of Crown Lands and for other purposes, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, upon the petition of not less than ten occupiers of not less than five hundred acres of adjacent purchased land, to proclaim that any Crown lands within five miles of such purchased land (the area of such Crown lands not being more than three times the area of the purchased land) shall be a Common for the use of such occupiers of the said purchased land as shall cultivate at least one-fourth of his or their purchased land, and every such common shall be called a "Farmers' Common." provided that nothing in the now reciting section shall be deemed or taken to prevent any such lands from being sold under the said Act upon the application of persons desirous of purchasing the same; and it is also enacted that the Governor in Council shall have full power from time to time to make any rules and regulations for imposing any conditions or limitations

A Ta meeting of the mining board of the mining district of Ararat, begun and holden at the mining board rooms, Ararat, in the said district, on the 10th day of April, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, it is ordained by the said board as follows, that is to say:—

1. Classification of workings.—Alluvial gold mining shall be divided into two classes, viz., wet workings and dry workings. Wet workings shall comprise all ground in which, by the occurrence of water below the surface or gravel drift, slabbing of the shaft from the top to the bottom becomes necessary. Dry workings all ground in which such slabbing is not required.

2. Definition of lead.—The term lead shall be held to mean the alluvial deposits or wash-dirt containing gold, and running in a continuous course or occurring successively or repeatedly in spots or patches.

3. Frontage claims.—Marking out.—All claims in dry workings, except in cases provided for in clause headed Block claims on dry frontage leads, and except also in claims in hill surfacing and hill sinking, hereafter provided for, shall be frontage claims, and of an indefinite width, and shall be marked with a conspicuous peg at each end (the upper and the lower) on the supposed course of the lead, until the discovery of the same in the claim, within twenty-eight (28) days after which the boundaries must be defined by a peg placed at each corner of the claim, and such pegs shall be at right angles, but no such claims shall exceed eighty (80) feet in width.

4. Size of frontage claims after discovery of the lead.—The extent of claims in flats and gullies shall be (without regard to depth) for each man (not exceeding four men in a claim) twenty (20) feet along the course of the lead with full width thereof, provided such width does not exceed eighty (80) feet.

5. Block claims on dry frontage leads.—After the boundaries of a frontage claim are defined by four pegs, any person or persons not exceeding four in a claim may take up the ground on either side after leaving the distance required for the wall, three (3) feet.

6. Size of block claims.—The extent of ground for such block

To prevent shepherding.—All claims must be proceeded with within forty-eight (48) hours after the time of marking out, until the claim is abandoned, except in case of illness, attendance at courts of justice, public holidays, or in case of dispute, any other cause of absence satisfactory to the warden and assessors. A breach of this clause shall render the share or shares affected liable to forfeiture.

11. Oversized claims.—When a miner or miners have marked out, or are holding more ground than they are entitled to, the overplus may be taken possession of by any other miner or miners, on whom it shall be incumbent to sink a shaft for themselves, unless the original holders are willing to work the ground with them, but no such party must exceed the authorized number of men. The person or persons taking possession of the excess of ground marked out or held, shall be entitled to choose from which end of the claim it shall be taken.

15. To greent shepherding.—All claims in wet workings must be proceeded within forty-eight (48) hours after the time of marking out, till the claim is abandoned, except in cases of illness, attendance at courts of justice, public holidays, or in case of dispute, any other cause of absence satisfactory to the warden

and assessors except in cases provided for in the following clause. Non-compliance with this clause shall render the share or shares affected liable to forfeiture.

16. Exceptional cases.—When the depth of sinking exceeds eighty (80) feet it shall be lawful for half the number of any party, if not less than sixteen (16) men in a claim, to hold possession of, and work at the same, till the remainder are required, and the interests of the absent men in the claim shall not be prejudiced by their working in another claim for hire: provided always that the names of the sixteen (16) men, or more, together with the number and date of their miners' rights, be kept posted on a conspicuous part of the claim.

17. Oversized claims.—When a party has markal out, or is holding more than the authorised extent of ground marked out in excess), shall be entitled to be admitted into the claim; but when any miner or miners abandon their share or shares in a claim, the remaining shareholders, if any, shall be allowed seventy-two (72) hours to replace them. 18. Water baling and night work.—When the quantity of water renders constant baling necessary, it shall be compulsory on all parties holding claims below a given point on the lead (the said point to be determined by the warden and assessors) to work in sinking and baling both day and night, until the claims are worked out or abandoned, or until baling is suspended by general consent.

PROSPECTING.

19. Definition of prospectors.—Prospectors shall be held to be persons engaged in searching for a new lead, and the first party or person discovering a new lead shall be the only person or party entitled under this bye-law to a prospecting claim on the said lead.

20. Conditions are similarly for the prospection of the p

party entitled under this bye-law to a prospecting claim on the said lead.

20. Conditions required for obtaining a prospecting claim.—
All the men in a prospecting party must have been employed in the claim from the commencement thereof, unless it can be proved before the warden and assessors that greater difficulties than could be foreseen rendered an increase in the party absolutely necessary. But in no case shall any beyond the authorised number of men be recognised as entitled to a prospecting claim. Prospectors discovering a new lead must, with as little delay as possible, report the same to the warden, who may give permission to any number of miners, not exceeding six (b), to descend the shaft, to examine the course and position of the lead.

21. General protection to prospectors.—Prospectors shall be entitled to mark out and hold the extent of ground hereinafter provided for, and shall be protected against any other party for the same lead within the distances specified in the following tables, viz.:—

Hill surfacing 100 yards in every direction.

Hill sinking 150 yards in every direction.

Dry frontage leads 500 yards above and below on the supposed course of the lead.

Wet frontage leads 1000 yards above and below on the supposed course of the lead.

Any party discovering a lead within the above-mentioned distance during the time the authorized prospectors are in search for it, shall only be entitled to an ordinary claim.

22. Prospecting.—Size of claims.—Prospectors discovering a new lead shall be entitled to an extent of claim as specified in the following table, viz.:—

23. Marking out claims.—In hill sinking and in hill surfacing where there is no continuous lead, the claim must be marked by a conspicuous peg at each corner. In wet workings and dry workings in flats and gullies, a conspicuous peg must be placed at each end of the claim, the upper and the lower, and the prospectors shall be protected until the discovery of the lead, or their abandonment of the search for it, against any other party taking possession of any intermediate ground from range to range, between parallel limes drawn at right angles with their upper and lower pegs: provided always that the protection does not interfere with a lead already in work.

24. Boundaries of frontage leads.—Prospecting claims to be defined.—After the discovery of the course of the lead throughout prospecting claims on frontage leads, the boundaries must be defined by placing a conspicuous peg at each corner of the claim.

DISCOVERING A LOST LEAD.

26. Size of claims.—Any person or party discovering a lead lost for three months or more, above or below the spot where it was lost, shall be entitled to an extent of ground as follows, viz., in frontage claims on dry leads forty (40) feet along the course of the lead, with full width thereof, for each man, limited to

eight (8) men in a claim; and in wet sinking limited to eighteen (18) men in a claim, for each man, double the ordinary extent of ground along the course of the lead, with full width thereof, specified in clause 13.

27. Protection during search.—Parties searching for a lead lost for three months or more shall be entitled to mark out and hold claims in accordance with the provisions of the previous clause. After the discovery of the lead, all parties (if any) unsuccessful in recovering the lost lead, must immediately reduce their claims to the limits of an ordinary claim or ordinary claims in proportion to the number of men employed.

OLD WORKINGS.

28. Definition of old workings.—The term old workings shall mean ground in which a number of shafts have been sunk, and which has been for the greater part undermined or worked out for at least three (3) months.

29. Size of claims.—The extent of claims in old workings, without regard to number of men in a claim, shall be as specified in the following table, viz.:—

30. Marking out claims.—All claims in old workings must be marked with a conspicuous peg at each corner, such pegs to be

at right angles.

31. Regulations for working claims.—Claims in old workings shall be worked in accordance with the clauses regulating the class of mining under which they fall, except those clauses which relate to the number of men and size of claims.

32. Determining what constitutes old workings.—In case of dispute, the warden and assessors shall determine whether the ground that may be in question can be fairly held as coming under the definition of old workings.

DAMS AND PUDDLING MACHINES.

33. Dams and puddling machines.—Any person intending to erect a dam or puddling machine must post a notice, legibly written in the English language, to that effect, on a conspicuous place on the site intended, which notice must remain posted seven (7) clear days; and any person objecting to the erection of such dam or puddling machine must, within the seven (7) days, appeal to the warden, who, with assessors, shall determine whether such puddling machine may or may not be erected. The owners of dams must provide sufficient drainage for their sludge and refuse water, so as not to interfere with or injure any other dam or claim. Dams abandoned for one month or more shall be held forfeited. Any person injuring or destroying a dam shall be liable to the owner for the damage done to it. Persons washing at a dam must not allow their sludge or tailings to flow into it. to flow into it.

GENERAL REGULATIONS.

34. Position of frontage claims when the lead deviates.—When the lead changes its course from the supposed one as marked out, all claims, the boundaries of which are not defined by four (4) pegs, shall be changed with it, each claim keeping its relative position.

35. Presence of partners.—It shall not be necessary for all the shareholders to be present at the marking out of a claim; one or more may do so, and they shall not be challenged till the expiration of the forty-eight (48) hours, when all must be present at the claim and proceed to work, except in cases provided for in clause 16.

36. Hoisting the flag.—It shall be imperative on all parties on striking the lead to indicate the spot on the surface by hoisting a flag on it.

37. Timbering.—Any miner or miners neglecting to timber their ground (or the walls, should they work them) severally, shall be liable to adjoining claimholders for any injury sustained thereby.

38. Disputed share or claim.—Any miner intending to take possession of a disputed share or claim must first obtain authority for so doing from the warden.

39. Pegs.—All pegs marking the boundaries of claims must be at least two (2) feet in length above the surface of the ground, and firmly flace therein.

40. Alsence from claim.—Any miner leaving his share unrepresented by a majority of the shareholders, and he shall be responsible to the person employed for a reasonable wage for the same.

41. Drawing slabs.—Any person drawing slabs from a shaft with water standing in it, or with water in a drift puddled back must immediately afterwards fill up the shaft above the level of the water drift, so as to prevent it injuring adjoining claims. Should any damage result to adjoining claims, the person or persons drawing such slabs shall be liable to the owners of claims fujived for all and any damage sustained thereby. Slabs left for more than twenty-eight (28) days in an abandoned claim shall be held forfeited, but any person taking possession of such claim, together with the slabs, within the twenty-eight (28) days specified, shall pay the owner or owners for the slabs at a reasonable valuation.

42. Effacing notices or removing pegs.—No person shall efface, alter, remove, or destroy any notice posted on a claim, or wilfully remove the pegs thereof.

43. Ownership of shares.—Any holder of a miners' right may own one or more shares in any number of claims, provided each and every such share be represented by a man holding a miner's right and working in the claim, and such representation shall have as much force for all the purposes of this bye-law as if the owner himself were working in the claim.

44. Sale or transfer of shares.—The owner of any share or shares (holding a miner's right) may sell or otherwise dispose of them, provided they be properly represented.

45. Hired labor.—No interest or share shall be deemed abandoned through the neglect of a hired man: provided that after forty-eight (48) hours' notice be given to the owner of such interest, or share, or his authorised agent, by a miner claiming the same, the interest or share be fully represented.

46. Porfeiture of interest.—Any miner forfeiting his interest in a claim shall not be entitled to any portion of his former partner's interest therein.

47. Holidays.—Miners may be absent from their claims all the following days, viz.:—Good Friday to Easter Tuesday, both inclusive; 24th December to 2nd January, both inclusive; any day on which the election of a member of the legislature or mining board of this district may take place, the day before and the day after such election, and any day proclaimed a holiday by the warden.

48. Tailings.—Any miner wishing to retain possession of eement, tailings, or other substance, for the purpose of extracting gold therefrom, may do so for six (6) months: provided he stacks the same in a proper manner, on ground not supposed to be payable for mining purposes: and provided he also keep a notice containing his name and address posted thereon.

49. Penalty for breach of bye-laws.—In accordance with the provisions of the Gold Fields Act, any person who shall infring any bye-law of this board shall be liable, fo

I Are pursuance of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of the petition hereinafter set forth, signed by one hundred and fifty-four householders resident at Taradale, in the county of Bourke, praying for the erection of their locality into a municipal district.

The petitioners state that they reside in the district of Taradale, in the county of Bourke, and draw attention to the extensive mining operations now carried on in the neighborhood of the township, the large population engaged therein, the substantial and costly character of their dwellings, and the quantity of land under cultivation in their immediate vicinity.

They further state that no provision exists for the formation and maintenance of some of the roads and streets in the township, which consequently are sometimes nearly impassable; and they desire to impress upon His Excellency the expendiency of forming the district into a municipality, as tending greatly to advance its interests and materially aid its improvement and good government.

They suggest the following area for a municipal district, viz.:—

WHEREAS by an Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria, it was amongst other things enacted, that it shall be competent for the council of any municipal district to make bye-laws for the general good rule and government of such district: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council of Newtown and Chilwell, that from and after this bye-law shall have received the assent of His Excellency the Governor in Council, bye-law No. 4, relating to the prevention of goats being at large, shall be and the same is hereby repealed, and that the following be substituted:—

Whereas the streets and uninclosed places situate within the municipal district of Newtown and Chilwell are infested by a great number of goats, which are allowed to go at large at all hours of the day and night, to the great annoyance of the inhabitants, and very serious mischiefs have arisen and are likely to arise from such goats being allowed to go at large: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council of Newtown and Chilwell, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor, it shall not be lawful for any person to suffer or premit any goat or goats belonging to him or her, or under his or her charge, to be at large in any street or public place, or in any uninclosed place, within the said municipal district, whether the same be or be not public property; and any person who shall so offend shall, on conviction before any two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay for every such offence a sum not exceeding Twenty shillings.

And be it further ordered and directed, that in case the owner or proprietor of any goat or goats so being at large as aforesaid cannot be found, every goat found at large contrary to the provisions of this bye-law shall be liable to be seized

ELECTIONS. CELECTIONS.

Libertons.

N the 29th of September, the annual election to fill seats rendered vacant by effluxion of time, took place this year, three in number, and the same day having been appointed for the election of a member to serve in room of Councillor Mason, resigned, the issue was as follows:—Councillor Bland was reelected, and Messrs. A. J. Brown, W. Beaver, and J. Scott, were returned to fill the other three seats.

On the 3rd of October, Councillor, Bland was elected chairman for the current year.

The former town clerk, Mr. S. J. Bayly, having resigned at the expiration of the last municipal year, and the council having decided, by resolution, on amalgamating the offices of town surveyor and town clerk, applications from persons competent to fill the amalgamated offices were invited: three applications were received, and, on the 17th October, Mr. George Kelly, C.E., was elected to fill them at a salary of £300 a year, the duties of valuator and compiler of the Rate and Assessment Rolls having been super-added on the day of election, and this officer has also to perform the duties of secretary to the local board of health.

Mr. Owen Flannery was elected rate collector on the same day, having been elected from four candidates, but he resigned on the 23rd of January, and fresh applications having been invited, and two received, Mr. J. N. Kelly was elected for the current year, on the 6th of February.

On the 31st of October, the council requested the late town clerk, Mr. S. J. Bayly, solicitor, to act as their solicitor, and that gontleman having consented, the staff of officers required to enable them to carry out and execute their functions was then completed.

No. 21. For abating the nuisance of flocks of geese being allowed to wander through the streets and public thorough-fares, has been returned from the Chief Secretary's Office several times for amendment, and has not yet been gazetted.

No. 22. Consisting of regulations for the management of the bathing-house erected by the council at Boarding School Bay has not been gazetted, the opinion of the Crown Solicitor having been that the existing laws are sufficient for the protection of the bath-keepers and the management of the bathing-house.

PUBLIC WORKS AND BUILDINGS.

PUBLIC WORKS AND BUILDINGS.

During the past half-year upwards of £1000 has been expended within the municipality on public works and buildings: 30 chains of new streets 99 feet wide have been formed, 15 chains of other streets have been metalled, 10 chains of footpath and hip 30 feet wide have been formed, and 25 chains repaired, and about 23 chains of Beach street, Belfast East, have been fenced off from Mr. Burnside's allotments, for the purpose of preserving a public right-of-way at that place. The deep pitched crossings at intersection of Bank and William streets, have been bridged over, and the thoroughfare made level there. About 15 chains of the worst part of a road leading into some deep cutting and embankment was found necessary, and several other street or road works of minor importance have been carried out, including the erection and painting, &c., of some sawn-stuff fencing on the Rosebrook road, at points where such was considered necessary for the public safety.

The botanical gardens have also received a considerable share of attention; twelve garden seats, each 8 feet long, have been fixed in convenient positions, with one closet for each sex. A wateringcart has been provided, and a plan has been prepared for a summer house, but the necessary curtailment of expenditure has prevented its erection.

The council has also endeavored to supply a want long felt in Belfast, by the erection of a public bathing-house at Boarding-school Bay. When competed it was late in the season, but since then, notwithstanding, numbers of both sexes have availed themselves of it. The charges are the very lowest which could be made consistent with order and comfort, and it is hoped that the health of the townspeople will be improved by it, cleanliness promoted, and a greater number of visitors induced to come to Belfast during the bathing season to enjoy its advantages.

FINANCE.

On the 30th October, the balance of the Government grantin-aid for 1860 was received, amounting to £471 198. 6d., which, when added to the balance then in the treasurer's hands, enabled the council to proceed with the works hereinbefore referred to.

The cost of those works, and general expenditure, however, having exceeded the revenue from all sources in the month of January, it was then found necessary to provide further funds, and the members of the council gave their personal security to the bank for an advance of £500. That advance has been also expended and not yet re-paid, but the rates which are now being collected will soon have amounted to a greater sum, and leave a balance for further expenditure in the hands of the treasurer. hands of the treasurer
