ALTERATION IN POLLING PLACES FOR THE NORTH-WESTERN PROVINCE.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander
of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General
and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-
Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

IN pursuance of an Act of the Governor and Legislative
Council of the Colony of Victoria, passed in the nineteenth
year of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled, *An Act to pro-
vide for the Election of Members to serve in the Legislative
Council and Legislative Assembly of Victoria respectively*: I,
Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of
the Executive Council, do by this my Proclamation abolish the
polling places already appointed for the divisions of the North-
Western Province, mentioned in the first column of the
schedule hereunto annexed; and, with the advice aforesaid, I do
hereby appoint that the places mentioned in the second column
of the said schedule shall be polling places for the said divisions
for the purpose of taking the poll at any contested election
for the said province, and that all votes in respect of qualifica-
tions within the boundaries and limits referred to in the last
column of the same schedule shall be taken at any election for
such province at the polling places mentioned in the said second
column, that is to say:—

TOWNS COMMONS.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander
of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General
and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-
Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament
holden in the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of
Her present Majesty's reign, intituled, *An Act for regulating
the Sale of Crown Lands and for other purposes*, it is amongst
other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor
in Council to proclaim that any Crown lands in the vicinity of
any town shall be a Common for the use of the inhabitants of
such town, and all the inhabitants of such town and its vicinity
shall, from the time of such proclamation, be entitled to depasture
their cattle and horses on such Common, and such Common
shall be called a "Town Common:" and it is further enacted,
that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, or, in case
such Town Common shall be included within or adjoin the
limits of any municipal district, then for the municipal council
of such district, with the consent of the Governor in Council, to
make rules and regulations for determining how many horses
and cattle every such inhabitant shall be entitled to depasture
on any Town Common: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the
Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council,
do hereby proclaim that the Crown lands in the vicinity of
the towns of Hotspur and Terang, comprised within the areas
the description whereof is subjoined to the names of such towns

respectively, shall be TOWNS COMMONS within the meaning of
the said Act, subject to such rules and regulations as may be
prescribed, for the use of the inhabitants of such towns respec-
tively, that is to say:—

HOTSPUR TOWN COMMON.—County of Normanby and parish
of Hotspur, consisting of allotments 11, 15, 16, and that portion
of allotment 17, parish of Hotspur, described as follows: Com-
mencing at the north-west corner, bounded on the west by
allotment 16, bearing south twenty-four chains fifty links;
thence on the south by a line bearing east twenty-two chains
sixty links; thence on the east by a line bearing north twenty-
four chains fifty links; thence on the north by the south side
of a road bearing west twenty-two chains sixty links to the
point of commencement.

TERANG TOWN COMMON.—Area about ninety acres; county
of Hampden, parish of Terang: Commencing at the north-east
angle of allotment 4, section 16, parish of Terang; thence north
ten chains; thence by a line a north-westerly direction to a
point on the east side of the main road to Darlington due east
of the north-east angle of allotment 4, section 8, parish of
Terang; thence southerly along the east side of said road to a
point on the west side of allotment 1, section 16, parish of
Terang; thence along west side of last-named allotment to its
north-west angle; thence by the northern boundaries of allot-
ments 1, 2, 3 and 4 of section 16, bearing S. 82° 30' E. to the
north-east angle of allotment 4, section 16, the point of com-
mencement.

PETITION UNDER THE MUNICIPAL ACT.

TARADALE.

IN pursuance of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of the petition hereinafter set forth, signed by one hundred and fifty-four householders resident at Taradale, in the county of Bourke, praying for the erection of their locality into a municipal district.

The petitioners state that they reside in the district of Taradale, in the county of Bourke, and draw attention to the extensive mining operations now carried on in the neighborhood of the township, the large population engaged therein, the substantial and costly character of their dwellings, and the quantity of land under cultivation in their immediate vicinity.

They further state that no provision exists for the formation and maintenance of some of the roads and streets in the township, which consequently are sometimes nearly impassable; and they desire to impress upon His Excellency the expediency of forming the district into a municipality, as tending greatly to advance its interests and materially aid its improvement and good government.

They suggest the following area for a municipal district, viz.:—
“Commencing at the north angle of Taradale suburban allot-

ment No. 1. of section 12; thence running in a south-westerly direction about twenty-three chains to the western side of Melbourne main road; thence south two hundred and eighty-two chains, more or less; thence east about two hundred and ten chains along the centre of the Government road reserve between portions 54 and 55 and between portions 50 and 51 of the parish of Edgecombe to a point in the centre of the River Coliban; thence due north eighty chains, crossing portions 43, 44, 45, and 46 of the said parish of Edgecombe, and continuing up the centre of a road reserve between portions 3, 2, 1, and 4 of the parish of Metcalfe, to a distance of eighty chains, more or less; thence north 20 degrees west about one hundred and fifty-three chains to the centre of a Government road reserve running on the south side of allotment 4 of section 5, in the parish of Hawkstone; thence due west crossing the Coliban River to the Mount Alexander Railway; thence south-west to the commencing point, no one point in the described area being distant more than six miles from any other point, nor the limits or boundaries of such district embracing an area of more than nine square miles.”

And the petitioners pray as follows:—

“Your petitioners therefore humbly pray your Excellency that the district so defined may be proclaimed a municipality, under the name of ‘The Municipal District of Taradale,’ according to the provisions of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15.”

NOTE.—The totals for January and February are in excess of those already given in the published reports for those months by a few deaths, principally infant cases, which had not been registered up to the time of the Deputy Registrars forwarding to this office their monthly returns from which those reports were compiled.

The number of persons recorded to have died during the month of March, in Melbourne and suburbs, amounted to 337, being a daily average of 10.87, against 363, or 13 daily, for the previous month. This comparison is not altogether a fair one, as the latter numbers have been subjected to the corrections referred to in the note above. The figures which appeared in the published

report for February were 345, or 12.32, with which those given for the month under review may fairly be compared, which would show a decrease of 1.45 a day in favor of that month. The deaths which occurred in March last year (uncorrected for after registrations) were 332, or 10.7 a day; the two corresponding months thus presenting a very close analogy in their rate of mortality.

The mean temperature in the shade during the month was 65.3°, against 65° for the month of February, and against 66.6° for the month of March, 1860. The greatest heat was experienced on the 12th, at 2 p.m., when the thermometer stood at 96.1°, and the least on the 29th at 6 a.m., when the reading was 44.1°; the range for the month thus being 52.0°. The greatest daily range (35.8°) was on the 16th, from a maximum of 85.6° to a minimum of 49.8°, and the least (3.7°) on the 19th, from a maximum of 63.0° to a minimum of 59.3°, and the mean daily range was 19.3°. The mean height of the barometer for the month was 29.927 in., against 29.878 in. in the same month, 1860. The greatest atmospheric pressure (30.266 in.) was at 9 a.m. on the 27th, and at the same hour on the 28th, and the least (29.466 in.) was at 3 p.m. on the 4th, the range of pressure for the month thus being .8 in.

For the four weeks in March the mean temperature, number of deaths, and daily average of mortality, were as follow:—

Of the 337 deaths which occurred during the month, 181, or nearly 55 per cent., were of males, and 153, or about 45 per cent., were of females; 219, or 65 per cent., were under, and 118, or 35 per cent., were over five years of age. The relative proportions, both of males and females, and of persons under and over five years of age, to the total, are about the average ones, and differ but slightly from those of the mean of the twelve months of 1860. The 9th day of the month presented the largest amount of mortality, the deaths numbering 18; 16 took place on the 23rd, and 15 on the 11th. In February the largest number of deaths in any one day was 20, and in January it was 30. The death of one octogenarian, a male aged 83, is reported.

The deaths which occurred in charitable or public institutions during the month were as follow:—Melbourne Hospital 42, Benevolent Asylum 4, Immigrants' Home 4, Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum 2, Protestant Orphan Asylum 1, Spencer street Barracks 2, Prince's Bridge Barracks 1, Western Gaol 1, making a total of 57, or 17 per cent. of the number of deaths recorded. In February it was about 13 per cent., and in January about 9½ per cent.

The following table shows the number of persons of all ages at the time of the census of 1857, the number of deaths of persons under and over five years of age, and the daily average of deaths at all ages during the month of March, 1861, in the Statistical District of Melbourne and suburbs, and in each of the sub-districts of which it is composed:—

NOTE.—The returns of the recent census not having been received, those of the previous one are still given, which present a guide, rather to the probable relative proportions, than to the actual numbers of the persons now inhabiting the several sub-districts.

The number of children that died during the month under the age of five years, was 219, of whom 113, or 51.6 per cent., were males, and 106, or 48.4 per cent., were females; 102 were of less than a year old; 46 between one year and two, 26 between two years and three; 26 between three and four, and 19 between four and five.

Of the persons who died at ages above five years, 66, or 56 per cent., of the total number (118) were males, and 52, or 44 per cent., were females; 28 were between the ages five and ten, 6 between ten and fifteen, 2 between fifteen and twenty, 7 between twenty and twenty-five, 14 between twenty-five and thirty, 13 between thirty and thirty-five, 16 between thirty-five and forty, 8 between forty and forty-five, 4 between forty-five and fifty, 8 between fifty and fifty-five, 1 between fifty-five and sixty, 4 between sixty and sixty-five, 2 between sixty-five and seventy, 0 between seventy and seventy-five, and 5 upwards of 75 years old.

The following table shows the causes of the deaths of persons of both sexes under and over five years of age, and the proportions per cent. of deaths from each cause, during the month of March:—

cases. Diarrhoea and dysentery showed a decrease in the month under notice, and the number of deaths arising from croup and whooping-cough was nearly identical. This latter remark will also apply to deaths occurring in the two months from the various classes of diseases grouped under the term "sporadic."

QUARTER ENDING 31ST MARCH, 1861.

Upon examining the summary of the three months under review, it appears that the number of deaths occurring in Melbourne and suburbs was 1169; being a daily average of 12.98, which, compared with the preceding quarter, is a decrease of 236, or 2.29 daily, and in regard to the same months in 1860 is an increase of 103, or 73 per diem.

Reviewing the diseases which proved most fatal during the past quarter and the one immediately preceding it, a decrease is observable in the group termed zymotic, the figures standing thus:—Past quarter, 525, or 44.98 of the total deaths; previous quarter, 638 or 45.41 of the total. When issuing the report for the quarter terminating 31st December, occasion was taken to notice the great increase in this description of complaints as compared with the results of the quarter ending the 31st September. A glance at the figures will show, that although in common with the deaths generally, the actual numbers of this class have been reduced in the month under review, yet their high proportion to the total has suffered but little diminution. The number of deaths caused by measles is considerably less than that shown by the last quarterly report, being only 24 against 214; while scarlatina appears to maintain its fatal sway, there being merely a difference of 15, and that in favor of the former quarter. Dysentery and diarrhoea, taken collectively, present an increase of 45 fatal cases since the commencement of the year. There is a diminution of 8 in the number of deaths from whooping-cough, but diphtheria shows an increase of 6. It was stated in the last quarter's report, when noticing sporadic diseases, that a favorable change was apparent in the mortality occurring from affections of the respiratory system; a still more favorable result is seen in this return, the numbers being 142 against 218. The remaining diseases remain nearly the same in their respective proportions.
