TOWNS COMMONS.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS in an Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled, *An Act for regulating the Sale of Crown Lands and for other purposes*, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to proclaim that any Crown lands in the vicinity of any town shall be a Common for the use of the inhabitants of such town, and all the inhabitants of such town and its vicinity shall, from the time of such proclamation, be entitled to depasture their cattle and horses on such Common, and such Common shall be called a "Town Common;" and it is further enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, or in case such Town Common shall be included within or adjoin the limits of any municipal district, then for the municipal council of such district, with the consent of the Governor in Council, to make rules and regulations for determining how many horses and cattle every such inhabitant shall be entitled to depasture on any Town Common: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim that the Crown lands comprised within the areas hereinafter described shall be Towns Commons within the meaning of the said Act, subject to such rules and regulations as may be prescribed, for the use of the inhabitants of the Towns of Belmont and of Newtown and Chilwell respectively, that is to say:—

TOWN COMMON FOR BELMONT, County of Grant.—Extent, about 620 acres: Commencing at the north-east angle of suburban allotment No. 3, of section 25, parish of Moorpanyal; bounded on the west by a line bearing south about 64 chains 25 links; on the south and west by suburban allotments in the parish of Corio; on the west by a line bearing south about 3 chains to the Wauru Ponds; on the south by lines bearing south 52° 2' east 15 chains, east 16 chains 70 links, north 19° 40' east 19 chains 26 chains, north 63° 41' east 11 chains 4 links, east 16 chains 72 links, north 30° west 13 chains 55 links, north 54° 20' west 4 chains 80 links, east 5 chains, and north 10 chains 60 links to the Wauru Chain of Ponds, and by the Wauru Chain of Ponds eastward to the junction of the Barwon River; and on the east and north by the Barwon River northerly and westerly to commencing point.—(61.C.2870.)

TOWN COMMON FOR NEWTOWN AND CHILWELL, County of Grant.—Extent, about 450 acres: Being suburban allotments 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, and 16, parish of Barrabool; suburban allotments 1, 2, 3, and 4, of section 15; suburban allotments 1, 2, and 3 of section 16; section 17; suburban allotment 5 of section 18; and suburban allotments 1, 2, and 3 of section 21, all in the parish of Moorpanyal.—(61.D.441.)

FARMERS' COMMON.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled, *An Act for regulating the Sale of Crown Lands and for other purposes*, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, upon the petition of not less than ten occupiers of not less than five hundred acres of adjacent purchased land, to proclaim that any Crown lands within five miles of such purchased land (the area of such Crown lands not being more than three times the area of the purchased land) shall be a Common for the use of such occupiers of the said purchased land as shall cultivate at least one-fourth of his or their purchased land, and every such common shall be called a "Farmers' Common;" provided that nothing in the now reciting section shall be deemed or taken to prevent any such lands from being sold under the said Act upon the application of persons desirous of purchasing the same; and it is also enacted that the Governor in Council shall have full power from time to time to make any rules and regulations for imposing any conditions or limitations on the exercise of the right of common upon any Farmers' Common: And whereas the occupiers of purchased land in or near the localities hereinafter mentioned have petitioned for a Farmers' Common in accordance with the said Act: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the Crown lands hereinafter described to be a FARMERS' COMMON for the use of the occupiers of purchased land within the meaning and intent and subject to the provisions of the said Act, and also

under and subject to such conditions or limitations on the exercise of the right of common as may be prescribed, that is to say:—

FARMERS' COMMON FOR AGRICULTURISTS AT SEYMOUR AND TALLAROOK, County of Anglesey.—Extent, about 3406 acres: Commencing at the north-east angle of section 39, parish of Tallarook; bounded on the east by a main 3 chains wide road from Tallarook to Avenel, bearing north 5° east about 127 chains 48 links; on the north by a line bearing west about 243 chains 44 links to the main 3 chain wide road from Avenel to Seymour; on the west by this road bearing south 21° 45' west about 136 chains 73 links to the north-west angle of section 47, parish of Tallarook; and on the south by surveyed lands in this parish, bearing east about 288 chains to commencing point.

TOLLS ON ROADS WITHIN THE WOODSTOCK ROAD DISTRICT.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the sixteenth year of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled, *An Act for making and improving Roads in the Colony of Victoria*, it was amongst other things enacted, that it should be lawful for His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, by Proclamation in the *Government Gazette*, to declare the rates of tolls to be collected by any district road board, as thereinafter mentioned: And whereas the Woodstock District Road Board deem it advisable that money should be raised by tolls on roads within their district: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby declare and proclaim that the Woodstock District Road Board may direct tools to be paid for all animals and vehicles passing or repassing through or by any toll-bars, toll-gates, or toll-houses, now or hereafter erected or built by the said board in or upon the roads within the said Woodstock Road District, at rates not exceeding the rates hereinafter declared, that is to say:—

PROPOSED ROAD DISTRICT.

PARISHES OF STRATHFIELDSAYE, SEDGWICK, MANDURANG,
ETC.

APPLICATION has been made for the constitution of a Road District, by James Cook, Esq., as Chairman of a Public Meeting, who states as follows:—

"At a public meeting of the inhabitants of this district [Emu Creek, near Sandhurst], held in the Strathfieldsaye School-house, on Tuesday evening last [16th April, 1861], the following resolutions were passed:—

"Moved by Mr. Hodgkinson, and seconded by Mr. Ritchie, That as the district comprising the parishes of Strathfieldsaye, Sedgwick, Mandurang, Lyell, Eppaloch, and Axedale, have suffered, and are continuing to suffer, through the want of proper roads, it is absolutely necessary that a District Road Board be formed with as little delay as possible.

"Moved by Mr. ———, and seconded by Mr. Somerville, That as in the opinion of this meeting it is highly desirable to form a Strathfieldsaye Road Board, including the above parishes and the portion of country lying between them and Sandhurst, the Chairman at once communicate the same to the Commissioner of Roads and Bridges, and request that the usual steps be taken in the matter."

PETITION UNDER THE MUNICIPAL ACT.

TARADALE.

IN pursuance of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of the petition hereinafter set forth, signed by one hundred and fifty-four householders resident at Taradale, in the county of Talbot,* praying for the erection of their locality into a municipal district: S.2950.

R. HEALES.

The petitioners state that they reside in the district of Taradale, in the county of Talbot,* and draw attention to the extensive mining operations now carried on in the neighborhood of the township, the large population engaged therein, the substantial and costly character of their dwellings, and the quantity of land under cultivation in their immediate vicinity.

They further state that no provision exists for the formation and maintenance of some of the roads and streets in the township, which consequently are sometimes nearly impassable; and they desire to impress upon His Excellency the expediency of forming the district into a municipality, as tending greatly to advance its interests and materially aid its improvement and good government.

They suggest the following area for a municipal district, viz:—

"Commencing at the north angle of Taradale suburban allotment No. 1, of section 12; thence running in a south-westerly direction about twenty-three chains to the western side of Melbourne main road; thence south two hundred and eighty-two chains, more or less; thence east about two hundred and ten chains along the centre of the Government road reserve between portions 54 and 55 and between portions 50 and 51 of the parish of Edgcombe to a point in the centre of the River Coliban; thence due north eighty chains, crossing portions 43, 44, 45, and 46 of the said parish of Edgcombe, and continuing up the centre of a road reserve between portions 3, 2, 1, and 4 of the parish of Metcalfe, to a distance of eighty chains, more or less; thence north 20 degrees west about one hundred and fifty-three chains to the centre of a Government road reserve running on the south side of allotment 4 of section 5, in the parish of Hawkstone; thence due west crossing the Coliban River to the Mount Alexander Railway; thence south-west to the commencing point, no one point in the described area being distant more than six miles from any other point, nor the limits or boundaries of such district embracing an area of more than nine square miles."

And the petitioners pray as follows:—

"Your petitioners therefore humbly pray your Excellency that the district so defined may be proclaimed a municipality, under the name of 'The Municipal District of Taradale,' according to the provisions of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15."

BYE-LAW No. 30.—A BYE-LAW FOR MAKING AN ASSESSMENT AND IMPOSING A RATE OF ONE SHILLING AND SIXPENCE IN THE POUND, FOR THE YEAR ENDING THE 16TH DAY OF JANUARY, 1862.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any district is empowered to assess all property in houses and lands within the limit of such municipal district according to its fair annual average value, and to impose a rate on all such properties for the current year; Be it therefore enacted by the council of the municipal district of Ballaarat, that all the several properties within the said municipal district shall be assessed for the year ending the sixteenth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, according to the several amounts of annual value respectively affixed to the same in the assessment roll or book confirmed by the said council on the seventeenth day of April, 1861, and amounting to, after the appeals have been heard and decided on, to a total sum of £71,512 12s. 6d.: And also, that a rate of One shilling and sixpence in the pound on the said annual value is hereby imposed on all the said properties for the year ending the sixteenth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, and payable in equal proportions as follows:—the first moiety thereof to be due and payable on the first day of May, the second moiety to become due and payable on the first day of October, both in the year 1861: Provided, nevertheless, where the total rate for the whole year does not exceed the sum of Ten shillings, then such rate shall be due and payable in full on the first day of June, 1861.

BYE-LAW No. 10.—TO PREVENT THE CUTTING, DESTROYING, OR INJURING OF GROWING TREES IN THE STREETS, THOROUGHFARES, AND PLACES OF PUBLIC RECREATION WITHIN THE MUNICIPALITY.

WHEREAS under 18 Victoria No. 15, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is enacted, that every municipal council shall have the care and management of the roads, public streets, public thoroughfares, botanical gardens, and other public places of recreation, and shall make bye-laws for the maintenance and management thereof: Be it therefore enacted, that from and after the passing and due publication hereof, no person shall cut down, root up, bark, or otherwise injure or destroy any growing tree, timber, sapling, or shrub upon any road, public street, public thoroughfare, or in the botanical gardens, or in any other public place of recreation, within the municipality of Buninyong, without the consent of the council thereof. And any person or persons who shall commit or assist in the commission of any act in contravention of this bye-law shall, on conviction, forfeit and pay for every such offence a sum not exceeding Five pounds.

MUNICIPALITY OF CHEWTON.
BYE-LAW No. 1.—TO REGULATE, BY MEANS OF STANDING ORDERS, THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF CHEWTON.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of Victoria, 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, section 26, it is enacted, "that it shall be lawful for the council of any municipal district to make bye-laws for the regulation of their own proceedings:" And whereas by a Proclamation of His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, dated the tenth day of December, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty, the district of Chewton was duly established a municipal district: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council of Chewton, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor the proceedings and business of the said council shall be conducted according to the following regulations only, which shall be called "The Standing Orders" of the said council, that is to say:—

CHAPTER I.

ORDER OF PROCEEDING.

1. That the sittings of this council shall, on all ordinary occasions, be open to the public, but any councillor may require the exclusion of strangers whilst the sense of the council is taken as to whether the question proposed shall be discussed with closed doors.
2. The business of the council shall commence with a quorum. If at the expiration of thirty minutes from the time of meeting there is no quorum, no business shall be transacted, and the name of the councillors present shall be recorded in the minutes.
3. The first business of each meeting of the council shall be to confirm the minutes of the preceding meeting, and no discussion shall take place thereupon, except as to the accuracy thereof.
4. At all meetings the reading of all correspondence unconnected with the business of the meeting, the presentation of petitions, and the bringing up of reports, shall have the precedence of all motions.

No. 71.—MAY 7, 1861.—2.

5. All communications by letter intended for the council shall be made and addressed to the town clerk; and all petitions, memorials, contracts, and tenders shall be addressed to the chairman and council, under cover to the town clerk, endorsed, "Petition," "Contract," or "Tender," as the case may be.

6. No motion shall be decided on at any meeting of council unless notice in writing, signed by the councillor proposing, shall have been given at the previous meeting of the council, nor shall any report of committee be decided on unless similar notice be given, unless in committee of the whole council or the whole council be present.

7. The order of the day shall include all business of which due notice has been given, and all matters arising out of former meetings of the council; the notices of motion to be considered in the order in which they were given.

8. Any motion entered on the notice paper, and the councillor having given notice of the same being absent, and no other councillor deputed to bring forward such motion when the business is called in order, such motion shall be struck out.

9. No bye-law shall be decided on without due notice (as in cases of motions), and a copy of the proposed bye-laws shall be open in the council chamber for the inspection of all ratepayers, free of charge, or of any person duly qualified to vote at elections under the Act.

CHAPTER II.

ORDER OF DEBATE.

1. Any councillor proposing a motion or amendment, or discussing any matter, must rise and address the chairman; and no councillor shall be interrupted unless by a call to order (when he shall sit down); the councillor calling to order shall then be heard, and the question of order decided before the subject is resumed or any other business.

2. Any councillor proposing a motion or amendment, must state the nature of it before addressing the council thereon.

3. No councillor shall speak twice on the same question, unless by way of explanation merely, or in reply as the mover of an original motion, or upon any amendment; and after such explanation or reply, the question shall forthwith be put to the vote.

4. If more than one councillor rise at one time, the chairman for the time being shall decide which is entitled to pre-audience.

5. No councillor shall digress from the subject under discussion, or impute motives, and all personal reflections shall be considered highly disorderly.

6. The chairman, when called upon to decide a point of order or practice, shall state the rule or precedent applicable to the case without argument or comment, and his decision, as to what is order or explanation, shall be final.

7. The chairman shall rise when addressing the council in discussion of any question.

8. Any councillor may demand the production of any of the documents of the council relating to the subjects under discussion.

9. Only one amendment shall be discussed at one time, and upon the adoption of any amendment the original motion shall be deemed rejected, and the amendment so carried shall be acted upon as an original motion.

10. The chairman shall, in taking the sense of the council, put the question first in the affirmative, then in the negative, and the votes of all councillors shall be entered on the minutes.

11. The council shall vote by show of hands, except in cases of elections, when the vote shall be by ballot.

12. No proposition once brought before the council shall be withdrawn without leave of the council, nor shall any proposition be entertained by the council until the same be seconded.

13. No discussion shall be allowed on any motion of adjournment; but if the question be negatived, the next motion or order of the day shall be considered before the question of adjournment be again entertained. Provided the motion be carried, any business left undecided shall take precedence at the next meeting of the council.

14. Any councillor may record his protest against any decision of the council, provided the same be made in writing before the next meeting of the council, and be couched in respectful language, and be consistent with truth; notice of such intention, however, must be given on the adoption of the resolution.

15. No motion, the effect of which if carried would be to rescind any motion which has already passed the council, shall be entertained during the same municipal year, unless a call of the whole council has been duly made for that purpose; and no such motion for rescinding any resolution of the council which shall have been negatived by the council shall be again entertained during the same municipal year.

16. Notices of motion to come on after the orders of the day, when the member giving a notice of motion may read it only, no comments to be made thereon.

17. Any member who shall use any expression capable of being applied offensively to any other member, shall, if required by the council, withdraw such expression, and make a satisfactory apology to the council.

18. When, in case of disorderly conduct, the chairman shall call on any member by name, such member shall withdraw as soon as he has been heard in explanation, and after such member's withdrawal the council shall at once take the case into consideration.

19. Any member may require the town clerk to take down any particular word used by a member immediately upon the same being used.

20. A question may be superseded—first, by the adjournment of the council, on the notice of a member "That the council do now adjourn;" secondly, by the previous question, viz., "That the question be now put," being proposed and negatived.

21. If a debate on any order of the day or on a motion be interrupted by the council being counted out, such order of the day or motion may be restored to the motion paper, and the debate thereupon resumed at the next meeting of the council at the point where it was so interrupted.

CHAPTER III.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS, CONTRACTS, ETC.

1. No election to any office at the disposal of the council shall take place until four clear days' notice shall have been in one or more of the local newspapers.
2. No councillor or officer belonging to the council shall be received as surety for any officer appointed by the council, or for any work to be done for the council; and in all cases in which security for the due and faithful performance of any duty or contract is required, the expense of preparing such surety shall be borne by the person or persons giving the same.
3. At all such elections and on all occasions of taking tenders or contracts the voting shall be on cards or papers to be provided for the purpose, on which each councillor shall write the name of the party or candidate he supports, and the chairman shall then declare the result of such voting.
4. Every application for appointment or tender for work shall be delivered, sealed, and endorsed outside, "Application" or "Tender," stating also the nature of the office applied or work tendered for; and no application or tender shall be received after the hour specified in the advertisement, and the number received shall be declared before opening any one of them by the chairman.
5. All contracts, specifications, bonds, or other documents relative to works to be done by or for the municipal council, must be brought up and approved of by the council before they be signed and executed.

CHAPTER IV.

MISCELLANEOUS REGULATIONS.

1. For the consideration of any bye-law, or for the raising and appropriating of money, or for the objects contemplated in the Standing Order No. 15 Chapter 2, it shall be competent for any councillor, without previous notice, to move for a call of the whole council for the consideration of any such subject at the next or any subsequent meeting; and upon such motion being carried, due notice thereof shall be given in the notice paper for the day or notice of motion for which such call is made is set down for consideration; and any member not in attendance when such order of or notice of motion comes under consideration, or not in attendance at the voting upon such question or any amendment thereof, whether of adjournment or otherwise, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Twenty shillings, unless reasonable cause for such absence be shown to the satisfaction of the council.
2. The clerk shall have the charge of the common seal of the corporation, and shall be responsible for the safe custody and proper use of the same, each impression thereof being duly verified by the signature of that officer.
3. The clerk shall not affix the common seal to any corporate document without express order of the council, nor unless such document bears the signature of the chairman.
4. Any one or more of the standing orders of the council, except No. 15 Chapter 2, and No. 1 Chapter 4, may be suspended *pro tempore* in case of emergency, provided the majority present deem it necessary.

MUNICIPALITY OF CLUNES.

BYE-LAW No. 8.—FOR THE REGULATION OF AND PREVENTION OF DAMAGE TO, WATER-COURSES, ROADS, PUBLIC STREETS, FOOTPATHS, AND PUBLIC THOROUGHFARES WITHIN THE MUNICIPALITY OF CLUNES.

WHEREAS by an Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted, that the council of any municipal district established under the provisions of the said Act, shall have the care and management of the roads, public streets, paths, public thoroughfares, &c., within such municipal district.

Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council of Clunes, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor—

1. Any person or persons who shall wilfully ride or drive, or cause to be ridden or driven, any beast of burden, or who shall wilfully drive or wheel, or cause to be driven or wheeled, any carriage, cart, barrow, or other vehicle, upon, along, across, any of the public footpaths or water-courses within the municipality of Clunes, excepting the channels in the carriage-ways at the intersections of the public streets, unless over and by means of a crossing-place formed in one or other of manners hereinafter stated, or who shall in any way wilfully cause damage or obstruction to the said public footpaths or water-courses, or any of them, shall be liable to the penalty hereinafter stated for a breach of this bye-law.
2. Every owner or occupier of any private gateway, yard, lane, &c., to which access or approach by beasts of burden, carriages, carts, or other vehicles, can be obtained only by riding, driving, or wheeling, or by causing the same to be ridden, driven, or wheeled upon or across any of the said public footpaths or water-courses, is hereby authorised, required, and directed by the municipal council of Clunes to make and maintain such crossing or crossings in one or other of the manners hereinafter mentioned over the said public footpaths or water-courses, or any of them, as may be necessary for the approach and access to any such private gateway, yard, lane, &c., at the expense of such owner or occupier: Provided that those about forming such crossing-places shall give notice in writing of such their intention, and submit a specification of the manner in which the work is to be performed to the town surveyor, who shall give permission for the same to be proceeded with as specified, provided the specified manner is not objectionable.

3. In streets where a stone or wooden kerb is now or hereafter may be laid, the crossing shall be constructed in one or other of the following methods, viz., they shall be paved with stone pavement the whole width of the footpath from the building line to the water channel, and shall be enclosed on both sides with a stone or wood kerb of the same size and description as the street kerbing, which it must join with a proper curve: Provided that in places where the water-channel is not paved, then the pavement of the crossing must extend to a distance of not less than six feet from the kerb line of the footpath, or they may be constructed by erecting wooden or other bridges of sufficient strength from the kerb to a distance of not less than seven feet into the carriage-way of the street; the inner ends of such bridges must not rest upon the kerb, but upon a sufficient support within the kerb, and a clear space of at least nine inches must be left under the bridge over the water-channel; the footpath from the kerb to the building line for the whole width of the crossing must be paved with stone pavement; the water-channel must not in any way be obstructed.

4. It shall not be lawful for the owner or occupier of any building, premises, or land, to cause or suffer any water to be discharged or to overflow from any such building, premises, or land, into, on, or over any public footpath or highway, or thoroughfare within the municipality aforesaid, and any person or persons so offending shall be liable to the penalty hereinafter stated for a breach of this bye-law: Provided that if any such owner or occupier shall make and maintain such drains leading through and under the adjoining path, highway or thoroughfare, as shall be necessary to discharge the water from such building, premises, or land, into the public water-tables, channels, or gutters, at the expense of such owner or occupier, and under the superintendence of such officer or officers as the said council may appoint for that purpose, he shall not be liable to the penalty imposed in this clause.

5. It shall not be lawful for any person or persons to remove the surface soil, or dig any hole, or sink a shaft, for any purpose whatsoever upon any of the roads or footpaths within the boundaries of the municipality aforesaid, whether the same be formed or not; and any person or persons committing either of these offences shall be liable to the penalty hereinafter stated for a breach of this bye-law.

6. For the purposes of this bye-law the terms water-course or channel in any street shall mean a space of six feet from the outer edge of the kerb of the footpath in such street, or it shall mean any channel, drain or ditch, formed or maintained by or under the direction of the municipal council aforesaid.

7. Any person or persons committing or causing to be committed a breach of any of the clauses of this bye-law shall, on conviction thereof before any one or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds (£20).
