WHEREAS by an Act passed in the twenty-first year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act for amending the Laws relative to the Gold Fields*, it is amongst other things enacted, that nothing thereinbefore contained shall authorise the holders of miners' rights to occupy for mining purposes any Crown land which shall have been exempted by the Governor in Council from the operations of mining, or which shall have been applied to any public use or purpose, or be lawfully and *bona fide* used as a yard, garden, or orchard, or for any race or dam, or for any house, outhouse, shed, or other building, or to cut or remove from any such Crown land any trees growing thereon, or to cut or construct any race or dam through or upon any such Crown land; but nevertheless it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to authorise the holders of miners' rights to occupy under such miners' rights, and also to cut and construct races and dams for the purposes aforesaid, through or upon any Crown lands which may have been so exempted or applied as aforesaid, subject to such conditions and restrictions as the Governor in Council shall impose: And whereas certain submerged land called the Wendouree Swamp, situate at Ballarat West, in the mining district of Ballarat, has been reserved for the purpose of saving the water, and is exempt from mining operations accordingly: And whereas a copartnership or association of miners, called and known by the name and style of the Southern Cross Company, has applied for permission to prosecute mining operations under the said submerged land: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order authorise the said Southern Cross Company to mine under the Wendouree Swamp aforesaid,

subject to the conditions and restrictions hereinafter prescribed, that is to say:—

1. That the drives be at a depth of not less than three hundred and thirty feet from the surface of the said Wendouree Swamp.

2. That the drives be open at all reasonable hours to the inspection of any mining surveyor acting under the authority of the Commissioner of Mines, the Judge of the Court of Mines, or the Warden.

3. That the drives be well and properly timbered and walled in, places also stoned if deemed necessary by the inspecting mining engineer, and all reasonable and necessary precautions taken and observed to secure the said Wendouree Swamp against damage or danger.

4. That the company stop their works when requested so to do by the mining inspector, or other authorised person, whenever it shall appear to the mining inspector, or other duly authorised person, that the works are not being carried out with due precaution against any contingent damage to the said Wendouree Swamp.

5. That the area to be allowed to the said company shall be the extent of ground only allowed under the Ballarat Mining Board's bye-laws.

6. That the permission hereby accorded to the said company to mine under the said water reserve shall be without prejudice to the alleged rights of any other existing mining company.

And the Honorable John Basson Humfray, Her Majesty's Commissioner of Mines for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

THE MALDON PUBLIC CEMETERY.

REGULATIONS made by the Trustees of the Maldon Cemetery for the management thereof, pursuant to the 18 Victoria No. 15, section 27, and in conformity with the Act 17 Victoria No. 12.

1. All charges must be paid when orders are given, or before the ground or vault is opened.

2. Any person making a vault or erecting or placing a monument in the cemetery, by and with the consent of the trustees, under these rules, and upon the payment of the charges hereinafter set forth, is entitled to have, maintain, and keep a vault, monument, or tombstone, according to the tenor of such permission, to and for the sole and separate use of such person or persons and his or their representatives for the term of fifty years from the date of such permission being given.

3. Application for such permission to be made to the said trustees. A certificate of permission, in the form set out in the schedule hereunder written, will be granted to the party applying for such permission, on payment of the charges set forth in the said schedule for that purpose.

4. The charges will be remitted for the burial of any poor person in such cemetery, on the certificate of a minister of religion, president for the time being of the Maldon Hospital, or other evidence proving to the satisfaction of the said trustees that such person was a pauper, or that the relatives or friends of the deceased are unable to pay the costs and charges.

5. The said trustees will cause all common graves to be dug, but parties wanting brick graves or vaults will be required to construct, under the direction of the trustees or their surveyor; and in case interment is to be made in any private grave or vault, the consent (in writing) of the party entitled thereto must be left with the order.

6. The time fixed for the funeral to be the time when the procession is to be at the cemetery, and the same must be punctually observed.

7. Until otherwise ordered, the usual hours fixed for the performance of funerals will be from Ten a.m. to Six p.m. in the months of September to April inclusive, and from Ten a.m. to Four p.m. in the other four months, except on Sundays, when the usual and only hours for funerals will be from Nine a.m. to Five p.m. throughout the year.

8. All monuments, vaults, graves, and gravestones to be kept in repair and proper condition at the expense of the owners.

9. Every coffin in a vault or brick grave to be bricked in, cemented, and covered by a slab of freestone, slate, or iron.

10. A drawing of every stone; tomb, pedestal, and plan of every monument or tablet proposed to be erected to be submitted to the trustees for approval, who shall determine and fix the position of any unobjectionable monument according to the description, size, or character thereof, having reference to the general plan for ornamenting the said cemetery in an appropriate manner. In the erection of tablets copper cramps must be used.

11. The plan of all the fences to be submitted to the said trustees.

12. No servant or other person employed by or engaged in any duty on behalf of the said trustees will be permitted to receive any gratuity for the discharge thereof.

13. The ground will be opened daily to the public from sunrise to sunset.

14. A plan of the cemetery, showing the situation of the purchased and other graves, shall be kept at the secretary's office and at the cemetery, where it may be inspected at the charge set out in the said schedule.

15. Any person who shall wantonly or wilfully destroy or attempt to destroy, or do or cause to be done any damage to any monument, vault, tombstone, building, erection, railing, fence, shrubbery, tree, or plant, shall, on conviction before any two or more of the justices of the peace for the said district, forfeit and pay a sum as a penalty (or damages) of not exceeding Twenty pounds.

16. Any person erecting any monument, headstone, fence, &c., &c., who shall injure or damage in any way whatsoever any existing monument, headstone, fence, &c., &c., shall be liable to such damage or injury as may be assessed by the trustees.

17. The trustees reserve the right to make any alterations from time to time in these charges and regulations.

18. No dogs will be allowed to enter the cemetery, or will smoking be permitted.

19. The certificate form in schedule B to be signed by the chairman of the trustees and countersigned by the secretary.

REGISTRAR GENERAL'S REPORT OF THE VITAL STATISTICS OF MELBOURNE AND SUBURBS DURING THE MONTH OF APRIL, 1861.

The deaths recorded as having taken place in Melbourne and suburbs during the month of April, numbered 346, or a daily average of 11.53. Steps having been taken to secure henceforth a complete return in time for each month's report of all the deaths occurring during the month to which the report refers, including cases of inquests, which hitherto were frequently delayed, it is hoped that in future the figures given will represent the actual mortality within the district, without requiring subsequent modification. The returns above given may consequently be considered as very nearly accurate, and may thus be fairly compared with the corrected numbers of previous months. Those for March, with after-registrations added, amounted to 354 deaths, or a daily average of 11.42; a fractional daily increase (11) being thus observable upon the mortality of that month. The figures for April, 1860, with similar corrections, showed 329 deaths, or 10.97 daily, indicating an increase against the month at present under review of 17 deaths, or 56 per day.

The mean temperature in the shade was 59.3°, against 65.8° for March, and against 65.0° for February. The reading for the corresponding month of 1860, was 58.8°. The days of highest and lowest temperature were the 5th and the 25th, on the former of which the thermometer in the shade, at 3 p.m., stood at 81.8°, and on the latter, at 6 a.m., it stood at 40.1°. The greatest range of temperature (28°) was shown on the 27th, from a maximum of 69.9° to a minimum of 41.9°, and the least (6°) on the 11th from a maximum of 67.1° to a minimum of 60.5°. The range between the highest and the lowest of the month being 41.7°, and the mean daily range 18.07°. The mean atmospheric pressure during the month was 29.979 in. against 29.927 in. for March, and against 29.923 in. for April, 1860. The highest point reached by the barometer was 30.473 in. at 9 a.m. on the 20th, and the lowest was 29.317 in. at 6 a.m. on the 25th, the range for the month thus being 1.156 in.

For the first four weeks in April the mean temperature, number of deaths, and daily average of mortality, were as follow:—

Subjoined are the relative proportions to the 346 deaths which occurred during the month, of males and females, and of children under and over five years of age. Males 178 or 51·4 per cent.; females 168 or 48·6 per cent.; children under five years of age 201 or 58·1 per cent.; persons over that age 145 or 41·9 per cent. The proportion of either sex to the total does not differ much from the average, but a favorable decrease is observable in that of children under five, it having been 65 per cent. in March, and in February 63 per cent. of the total mortality.

The days on which the largest number of deaths occurred were the 12th and 14th, on each of which 18 took place; 17 persons also died on the 15th, and 16 on the 4th and 10th. The greatest number dying in any one day during March was 18, and during April, 1861, the largest number was also 18.

Forty-nine deaths took place in charitable or public institutions, apportioned thus:—Melbourne Hospital 23, Benevolent Asylum 13, Immigrants' Home 2, Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum 4, Western Gaol 1, Lying-in Hospital 1. The aggregate being 14 per cent., or about a seventh, of the total number of deaths.

The following table shows the number of persons of all ages at the time of the census of 1857, the number of deaths of persons under and over five years of age, and the daily average of deaths at all ages during the month of April, 1861, in the Statistical District of Melbourne and suburbs, and in each of the sub-districts of which it is composed:—

NOTE.—The returns of the recent census not having been yet compiled, those of the previous one are still given, which present a guide, rather to the probable relative proportions, than to the actual numbers of the persons now inhabiting the several sub-districts.

Of the 201 children who died during the month, 98 or 48·8 per cent. were males, and 103 or 51·2 per cent. were females: 97 were under one year, 41 between one and two years, 28 between two and three, 16 between three and four, and 16 between four and five.

Of the 145 persons who died at ages above five, 80 or 55·2 per cent. were males, and 65 or 44·8 per cent. were females: 33 were between five and ten years, 5 between ten and fifteen, 2 between fifteen and twenty, 10 between twenty and twenty-five, 16 between twenty-five and thirty, 18 between thirty and thirty-five, 17 between thirty-five and forty, 13 between forty and forty-five, 10 between forty-five and fifty, 7 between fifty and fifty-five, 2 between fifty-five and sixty, 4 between sixty and sixty-five, 1 between sixty-five and seventy, 1 between seventy and seventy-five, and 1 at upwards of seventy-five.

On comparing the above table with the similar one for the month of March, it is observed that deaths from zymotic diseases have decreased from 45 to 41 per cent. of the total, the diseases showing diminished numbers being scarlatina from 68 to 62 deaths, diphtheria from 10 to 5, and diarrhoea and dysentery from 51 to 41. Those exhibiting increase are measles, showing 4 deaths against 3 in March, whooping-cough showing 9 against 7, croup showing 7 against 1, and typhus showing 11 against 8. Under the head of diseases of the zymotic class, the death of a South Sea Islander, from glanders, is reported to have occurred in the Melbourne Hospital.

Of sporadic diseases, those of uncertain seat have diminished in their proportions to the total from 16 to 13 per cent., atrophy and debility in infants, however, presenting 35 deaths, being the same number as in the month of March. An increase appears in diseases of the nervous system from 12 to 14½ per cent. of the total, and in those of the respiratory system from 12 to 16½ per cent.; of this latter class phthisis shows an increase of from 18 to 28 fatal cases. No deaths from old age occurred during the month.
