KERRIT BAREET FARMERS' COMMON.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her present Majesty's reign, intitled, *An Act for regulating the Sale of Crown Lands and for other purposes*, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, upon the petition of not less than ten occupiers of not less than five hundred acres of adjacent purchased land, to proclaim that any Crown lands within five miles of such purchased land (the area of such Crown lands not being more than three times the area of the purchased land) shall be a Common for the use of such occupiers of the said purchased land as shall cultivate at least one-fourth of his or their purchased land, and every such common shall be called a "Farmers' Common;" provided that nothing in the now reciting section shall be deemed or taken to prevent any such lands from being sold under the said Act upon the application of persons desirous of

purchasing the same; and it is also enacted that the Governor in Council shall have full power from time to time to make any rules and regulations for imposing any conditions or limitations on the exercise of the right of common upon any Farmers' Common: And whereas the occupiers of purchased land at or near the locality hereinafter mentioned have petitioned for a Farmers' Common in accordance with the said Act: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the Crown lands hereinafter described to be a FARMERS' COMMON for the use of the occupiers of purchased land within the meaning and intent and subject to the provisions of the said Act, and also under and subject to such conditions or limitations on the exercise of the right of common as may be prescribed, that is to say:—

FARMERS' COMMON FOR AGRICULTURISTS AT KERRIT BAREET, County of Grant.—Extent about 1600 acres: Commencing at a point on the western branch of the Moorarbool River being the south-west angle of Urquhart's pre-emptive section, parish of Kerrit Bareet; bounded on the north by this pre-emptive section and a line bearing east together about three miles ten chains to the western boundary of Ballan Farmers' Common; on the east by part of the western boundary of Ballan Farmers' Common bearing south about sixty chains to a road from Ballarat to Melbourne; on the south by this road bearing south-easterly to the north-east angle of allotment 33, parish of Kerrit Bareet, and by allotments 33, 32, 17, 16, and 1, bearing south 81° 20' east about two and a half miles to the western branch of the Moorarbool River; and on the west by this branch of the Moorarbool River bearing northerly to commencing point.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this tenth day of June, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, and in the twenty-fourth year of Her Majesty's reign.

CASTLEMAINE MINING DISTRICT.

BYE-LAWS.—[3rd May, 1861.]

AT a meeting of the mining board of the mining district of Castlemaine, begun and holden at the Board Room, Camp, Castlemaine, in the said district, on the 3rd day of May, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, it is ordained by the said board as follows, that is to say:—

That the bye-law for standing orders, passed by the board on the 28th day of June, 1858, and gazetted on the 13th day of July of the same year, shall be and the same is hereby repealed, and the following bye-law for standing orders, contained in eighty-five sections, substituted in lieu thereof.

1. *Business conducted with open doors.*—Strangers may be excluded.—That the business of the board shall be conducted on all ordinary occasions with open doors; but any one member present may require the exclusion of strangers until it shall have been decided by the board whether any particular question proposed to be introduced shall be discussed with open doors.

2. *Business to commence at the time appointed.*—That the business of the board shall commence upon the expiration of the time of meeting, or as soon after as a quorum shall be present.

3. *Minutes shall be taken.*—That minutes of the proceedings of each meeting of the board shall be taken regularly, and entered in a book.

4. *When there is not a quorum, names recorded.*—At any time appointed for the board to meet, when there is not a quorum of the members present, or when the board is counted out, such circumstance, together with the names of the members then present, shall be recorded in the minute-book.

5. *Order of proceedings.*—That at each meeting of the board the business shall be proceeded with in the following order:—

- 1st. The minutes shall be read, and errors (if any) corrected, after which the minutes shall be confirmed and signed by the chairman.
- 2nd. Correspondence.
- 3rd. Petitions presented by members of the board.
- 4th. Reports of committees.
- 5th. Incidental business.
- 6th. Orders of the day (to mean all matters arising out of the proceedings of former meetings, and any business which the chairman shall think fit to bring under consideration).

6. *Course of proposed bye-laws.*—Notice shall be given to move for leave to introduce, alter, or amend a bye-law. If leave shall be obtained, it shall be read a first time without discussion, and a time fixed for its second reading. If read a second time, it shall be passed into committee, brought up, read a third time, and finally passed.

7. *Order of orders of the day.*—Orders of the day shall take precedence in the order in which they stand in the minute-book.

8. *Calls of the board.*—Calls of the board may be made on the motion of a member duly carried, and such motion shall state the business for which such calls are made, and the day and the hour of meeting.

9. *Fine for non-attendance.*—Should the board at any time make a call for a full meeting of the members of the board, any member who does not attend such meeting shall be subject to a fine of Ten shillings, unless he shall furnish to the board a satisfactory reason for his absence; such fine to be paid before such member shall be permitted to take his seat at the board or exercise his right to vote on any question before the board.

10. *Four days' notice for a call of the board.*—No order for a call of the board shall be made for any day earlier than four days from the date of such order, inclusive of the day of such order.

11. *Copy of the order shall be sent to each member.*—A copy of the order for a call of the board shall be forwarded to each member of the board, signed by the chairman or clerk.

12. *Members to register names and addresses.*—Each member shall, upon first taking his seat at the mining board, enter his name and address in a book to be kept for that purpose.

13. *Attendance-book.*—An attendance-book shall be kept by the clerk of the board, and the names of only those members shall be inserted who take their seats at the board at or before half-past Ten o'clock, after which time the appearance-book shall be closed.

14. *Motions introducing new matters.*—When notice of motion may be given.—No member shall make any motion initiating a subject for discussion, but in pursuance of a notice openly given at a previous meeting of the board, and duly entered on the minutes; and such notices must be given either previous to the board entering upon the orders of the day, or after such orders shall have been disposed of.

15. *Notices of motion shall be written and signed.*—Every member in giving notice of motion shall read it aloud, and deliver to the chairman a copy of such notice, fairly written, together with his name and the day proposed for bringing on such motion.

16. *Members shall not give two notices consecutively.*—No member shall be entitled to give two notices of motion consecutively on the same day, unless no other member has any notice to submit.

17. *One member may give notice for an absent member.*—A member may give notice for any other member not then present, by putting the name of the member for whom the notice is given on the notice of motion.

18. *Members who have given notice shall be present.*—No motion entered on the notice paper shall be proceeded with unless the member who has given such notice, or some one authorised by him, be present when the business is called in order. Notices not so proceeded with shall be struck out of the paper.

19. *Motions not seconded shall lapse.*—Any motion not seconded shall not be further debated, but shall lapse.

20. *Motions proposed and seconded.*—When a motion has been proposed and seconded, a question thereon shall be proposed by the board to the chairman.

21. *Motions may be withdrawn.*—A member who has proposed a motion may withdraw the same by leave of the board.

22. *Questions may be superseded.*—A question may be superseded—1st, by the adjournment of the board, on the motion of a member "That the board do now adjourn;" 2nd, by a motion "That the orders of the day be now read;" 3rd, by the previous question, viz, "That this question be now put," being proposed and negatived.

23. *The previous question.*—If the previous question be resolved in the affirmative, the original question shall be put forthwith without any amendment or debate.

24. *Complicated questions.*—The board may order a complicated question to be divided.

25. *Question shall be put.*—So soon as the debate upon a question shall be concluded, the chairman shall put the question to the board in a distinct and audible manner.

26. *Questions once carried cannot be questioned again.*—A question being once made, and carried in the affirmative or negative, cannot be questioned again in the same mining board year during which it has been so resolved, unless a call of the board be made for that purpose.

27. *Questions once resolved may be reversed by two-thirds of the members.*—No question or amendment which is the same in substance as any question which during the same mining board year has been resolved in the affirmative or negative shall be a resolution of the board, unless carried by the majority of the members present upon a call of the board.

28. *Motions withdrawn may be made again.*—A motion which has been withdrawn may be made again during the same mining board year.

29. *Questions may be amended.*—A question having been proposed may be amended by leaving out certain words, or by inserting or adding words.

30. *Amendments not seconded.*—An amendment proposed, but not seconded, will not be entertained by the board nor entered in the minutes.

31. *Amendment to leave out words.*—When the proposed amendment is to leave out certain words, the chairman shall put a question, "That the words proposed to be left out stand part of the question," which shall be resolved in the affirmative or negative, as the case may be.

32. *Amendment to substitute words.*—When the proposed amendment is to leave out certain words in order to insert or add other words, the chairman shall put a question, "That the words proposed to be left out stand part of the question," which if resolved in the affirmative will dispose of the amendment; but if in the negative, and there is no motion before the board for amending the proposed amendment, another question shall be put, "That the words of the amendment be inserted or added instead thereof," which shall be resolved in the affirmative or negative, as the case may be.

33. *Amendment to insert or add words.*—When the proposed amendment is to insert or add certain words, the chairman shall put a question, "That such words be inserted or added," which shall be resolved in the affirmative or negative, as the case may be.

34. *No amendment shall be made to a question, after a later part has been amended.*—No amendment shall be proposed in any part of a question after a later part has been amended or has been proposed to be amended, unless the proposed amendment has been withdrawn by leave of the board.

35. *Words resolved may not be amended.*—No amendment shall be proposed to be made in any words which the board has resolved shall stand part of a question, or shall be inserted in or added to a question, except the addition of other words thereto.

36. *Amendment may be withdrawn.*—A proposed amendment may be by leave of the board withdrawn.

37. *Amendments may be amended.*—Amendments may be proposed to a proposed amendment as if such proposed amendment were an original question.

38. *Amended questions.*—When amendments have been made, the main question as amended shall be put.

39. *Amendments not carried.*—When amendments have been proposed but not carried, the question is put as originally proposed.

40. *Debate.*—Members shall rise to speak.—Every member desiring to speak shall rise in his place uncovered, and address himself to the chairman.

41. *Members may not speak during a division.*—Members can only speak while the board is dividing by permission of the chairman, and then only to a point of order.

42. *Members may not speak to a question after the votes have been taken.*—No member may speak to any question after the same has been put by the chairman, and the votes have been given in the affirmative and negative thereon.

43. *When two members rise to speak.*—When two or more members rise to speak, the chairman shall call upon the member who in his opinion first rose in his place.

44. *Motion for a member to be heard.*—A motion may be made that any member who has risen "be now heard," or "do now speak."

45. *Members may speak.*—A member may speak to any question before the board or upon any amendment proposed thereto, or upon a question or amendment to be proposed by himself, or upon a question of order arising out of the debate, but not otherwise.

46. *Members may explain matters of a personal nature.*—By the indulgence of the board, a member may explain matters of a personal nature, although there be no question before the board, but such matters may not be debated.

47. *Members may not speak twice.*—No member may speak twice to a question before the board, except in explanation or reply, or in committee of the whole board.

48. *A member who has spoken may again be heard.*—A member who has spoken to a question may again be heard to explain himself in regard to some material part of his speech, but shall not introduce any new matter.

49. *A member may reply.*—A reply shall be allowed to a member who made a substantive motion to the board, but not to any member who has moved an order of the day, an amendment, or an instruction to a committee.

50. *To propose or second is to speak.*—That any member proposing or seconding a resolution or amendment shall be held to have spoken.

51. *A point of order.*—That any member rising to a point of order shall be allowed simply to direct attention to the point complained of, and submit it to the decision of the chairman.

52. *Member may not allude to a previous debate.*—No member shall allude to any debate of the same mining board year, upon a question or bye-law not being then under discussion, except by the indulgence of the board for personal explanations.

53. *Member may not reflect on any vote of the board.*—No member shall reflect upon any vote of the board, except for the purpose of moving that such vote be rescinded.

54. *Member may not use offensive words against legislation.*—No member shall use offensive words against any mining legislation of this district, unless for the purpose of moving for its repeal.

55. *Member may not apply offensive words to any member.*—No member shall use offensive or unbecoming words in reference to any member of the board.

56. *Members using objectionable words shall apologise.*—Any member having used objectionable words, and not explaining or retracting the same, or offering an apology for the use thereof to the satisfaction of the board, will be censured by the board, and shall not be allowed to hold his seat or vote on any question before the board until the offensive words shall have been retracted by him, and an apology rendered to the satisfaction of the board.

57. *Rules shall be observed in committees of the whole.*—The several rules for maintaining order in debate shall be observed in every committee of the whole board.

58. *When the chairman rises during a debate.*—Whenever the chairman rises during a debate, any member then speaking, or offering to speak, shall sit down, so that the chairman may be heard without interruption.

59. *Charges against members.*—Every member against whom any charge has been made, having been heard in his place, shall withdraw while such charge shall be under debate.

60. *Members must vote.*—Every member present at the board when the question is put will be required to vote.

61. *Show of hands.*—Strangers to withdraw.—Previously to any show of hands, strangers shall, if ordered, withdraw.

62. *In case of confusion.*—In case of confusion or error concerning the number of votes, unless the same can be otherwise corrected, the board shall proceed to another show of hands.

63. *Committees of the whole.*—Committee appointed by resolution.—A committee of the whole board will be appointed by resolution, "That this board do now resolve itself into a committee."

64. *Chairman of committees.*—A member shall be appointed chairman of committees of the whole board, and shall continue to act as such during the pleasure of the members of the board.

65. *Quorum of committees.*—The quorum of the committees of the whole shall be the same number as required for a quorum of the board.

66. *Matters to be considered.*—Committees shall consider such matters only as have been referred to them by the board.

67. *Members may speak more than once.*—In committee members may speak more than once to one question.

68. *Chairman's casting vote.*—Every question in committee shall be decided by a majority of votes, and in case of an equality of votes, the chairman of committee shall give the casting vote.

69. *Instruction to report progress.*—At any stage of a measure in committee the chairman may be instructed to report progress, and ask leave to sit again at a future day.

70. *If any disorder arise.*—If any disorder arise in committee, the chairman of the board may resume his seat without any question being put.

71. *No quorum present.*—If while in committee there should not be a quorum, the chairman will resume his chair, and adjourn the board to a future day.

72. *Business disposed of.*—When matters referred to a committee of the whole have been considered, the chairman of committees shall report the same to the board.

73. *Motion to report progress.*—A motion may be made during the sittings of a committee, "That the chairman do now report progress and ask leave to sit again."

74. *Reports of committees.*—Every report of a committee of the whole board shall be brought up without any question being put.

75. *Resolutions of committees may be recommitted.*—Resolutions agreed to by a committee of the whole may be affirmed or negatived by the board; if negatived they must be recommitted for further consideration in committee.

76. *Petitions.*—When petitions may be presented.—No petition shall be presented during any debate, nor after the board shall have proceeded to the notices of motion or orders of the day, unless petitions referring to the questions before the chair, which may be received immediately upon the reading of the order of the day or notice of motion.

77. *Member to acquaint himself with the contents.*—It shall be incumbent on every member presenting a petition to acquaint himself with the contents thereof, and to ascertain that it does not contain language disrespectful to the board.

78. *Member shall prefix his name.*—Every member presenting a petition to the board shall write his name at the beginning thereof.

79. *Petitions must be in conformity with rules.*—Every member presenting a petition shall take care that the same is in conformity with the rules and orders of the board.

80. *Petition shall be respectful.*—Every petition shall be respectful, decorous, and temperate in its language.

81. *Petition shall be presented by a member.*—Petitions can only be presented to the board by a member.

82. *Petitioner shall not present petition from himself.*—A member cannot present a petition from himself.

83. *Member's duty when presenting petition.*—Every member offering to present a petition to the board shall confine himself to a statement of the parties from whom it comes, of the number of signatures attached to it, and of the material statements contained in it, and to the reading of such petition.

84. *Petitions may not be discussed.*—No discussion shall take place upon petitions at the time of their presentation, except by special permission of the board, by a motion proposed, seconded, and duly carried to that effect.

85. *Suspension of standing orders.*—Standing orders may be suspended.—It shall be competent, by a vote of the majority of the members present, for the board to suspend any standing order herein contained, provided the effect of such suspension shall not be the rescinding of any resolution previously adopted by the board.

PETITION UNDER THE MUNICIPAL ACT.

MALMSBURY.

IN pursuance of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of a petition addressed to His Excellency as hereinafter set forth, signed by one hundred and ninety-three householders resident at and near Malmsbury, in the counties of Dalhousie and Talbot, praying for the erection of their locality into a municipal district.

The petitioners state that their locality is situated on the Main Mount Alexander road, and is fast rising in importance, being the centre of a large and increasing agricultural population.

That within the township boundary there are many large and substantial buildings, including stores, hotels, and steam flour-mills, breweries, and a large malting establishment all now in full operation, and moreover that some of the finest blue-stone quarries have been opened and are being extensively worked.

That roads, bridges, drains, and streets are required to facilitate the large and increasing local traffic, but no provision exists for these works.

They urge upon His Excellency the expediency of forming their locality into a municipal district, as tending greatly to advance its interests and materially aid its improvement and good government, and suggest the following boundaries for such district, viz.:—Commencing at a point in the south boundary line of the township of Malmsbury where the said south boundary line of the said township of Malmsbury is cut by the River Coliban; thence in a line bearing west about eighty-five chains to the south-west corner or angle of the said township of Malmsbury; thence in a line at right angles to the last line, bearing north up the western boundary of the said township about one mile to the north-west corner or angle of the said township; thence in a line at right angles to the last line, bearing east about three miles and three-quarters to the north-east corner or angle of lot 23, parish of Edgcombe; thence in a line at right angles to the last line, bearing south, following a Government road one chain wide, about three-quarters of a mile to where the said Government road cuts the River Campaspe; thence following the centre of the said River Campaspe about three miles to the junction of the Boggy Creek; thence in a line bearing south-west about a quarter of a mile, running along the south-west boundary of lot 177, parish of Lauriston, to where the said line cuts the eastern boundary fence of the Melbourne, Mount Alexander, and Murray River railway; thence following the said eastern boundary fence of the said Melbourne, Mount Alexander, and Murray River railway, bearing north-westerly about three miles till the said western boundary line of the said Melbourne, Mount Alexander, and Murray River railway cuts the southern boundary line of allotment 290, parish of Lauriston; thence in a line bearing west about half a mile to the centre of the River Coliban; thence following the centre of the said River Coliban about a quarter of a mile home to the starting point."

And the petitioners pray as follows:—
 "Your petitioners therefore humbly pray your Excellency, that the district so defined may be proclaimed a municipality, under the name of 'The Municipal District of Malmesbury,' according to the provisions of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15."

Separate tenders will be received for each schedule, but they must include the whole of the articles therein mentioned, and one price must be stated for each article. The value of all packages, whether bulk be broken or not, must be included in the prices demanded.

No tender will be entertained unless accompanied by a certificate from two responsible persons that they are willing to become bound as sureties in the sum specified above for the due fulfilment of the contract; and in the event of the tender being accepted, the bond must be executed within ten days, failing which the contract will be again advertised or another tender accepted.

The names of the tenderers and their proposed sureties together with their addresses, must be stated at full length.

All tenders must be enclosed in a separate envelope, marked "Tender for ——" (as the case may be), and be deposited in the Tender Box at the Government Stores, King street; or, if sent by post, they must be addressed to the Government Storekeeper, Melbourne.

The Government will not necessarily accept the lowest or any tender.

The decision of the Government will be made known on or before the 12th July, 1861.

CONDITIONS.

1. The supplies are in all cases to be of the best quality and description, and should articles of any particular manufacture be ordered, the same are to be furnished at the rates set forth in the contract.

2. All orders for supplies under these contracts must issue from the Government Storekeeper's Department, and unless otherwise specially ordered, the supplies must be delivered to the Government Stores. When ordered, they are to be delivered free of charge to any part of Melbourne, and in the case of Ship Chandlery and Oil for Lighthouses, at the Marine Yard, Williamstown.

3. The contracts entered into under this notice are not to be considered as being infringed or vitiated by the importation of stores for the Government service, or by any contracts made by the military commissariat, or by other departments of the public service. When desirable, raw material will be ordered for the manufacture in the penal establishments of articles required by the Government Storekeeper.

4. All supplies when delivered must be accompanied by the order, which will be receipted, must be rendered with the contractor's account. No goods will be received unless accompanied by the order.

5. In the event of supplies ordered under these contracts not being delivered within forty-eight hours, it will be competent for the Government Storekeeper, should circumstances require it, to purchase the same at the risk of the contractor, from whose account any expense over and above the contract price will be deducted.

6. Each contractor will be required to prepare his own account monthly in the prescribed form, and present the same to the Government Storekeeper for payment.

7. In the event of a difference of opinion between the contractor and the head of the department requiring the supply, as to the quality, the same is to be decided by a board of survey, composed of persons named by the Government, and the decision of the board is to be considered final. Any expense incurred on account of the rejection of supplies by a board of survey, will be charged to the contractor.

8. If the board shall decide that the article is not of proper quality, it must be immediately replaced by the contractor failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra expense, if any, will be charged as in clause 5.

9. The Government Storekeeper will have power to reject such article or articles as are obviously of inferior quality, it being understood that he will be responsible to the Government for so doing, and the contractor must take back the rejected article, and supply good in its stead, failing which it will be procured elsewhere, and the extra expense, if any, will be charged as in clause 5.

10. A repetition of irregularity in the quantity or quality of the supplies, or of delay in delivering or replacing them when required, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Government Storekeeper, to such mulct, not exceeding one-fourth the amount of the monthly account, as the Government may direct. It will also be in the power of the Government, upon such repetition, to terminate the contract forthwith.

11. It will be competent, either for the contractor, on his own behalf, or for the Government Storekeeper, on behalf of the Government, to terminate the contract by giving a notice in writing of three full calendar months to the opposite party, it being understood that such notice can be given only from the first day of a month, and within the period for which the contract is made.

ELECTION OF CHAIRMAN.

AT the first meeting of the council on the 18th December, 1860, Councillor J. D. Moore was re-elected chairman for the ensuing year.

ASSESSMENT.

According to the assessment made by the municipal assessors, 555 house and land holders were duly assessed, the annual value of which property amounted to £14,779, which was reduced on appeal to £14,756.

The town common for Ararat, containing 2800 acres, and capable of depasturing about one hundred and fifty head of cattle, has been the subject of frequent complaints by the council to the Government, but they have only succeeded in obtaining a promise, that if it is found to be too small, it can afterwards be enlarged.

The desire of the council to clear off the overdraft at the bank, and thus save to the municipality the amount annually paid as interest, have prevented them from undertaking more public works than were absolutely required during the past half-year. They hope by the end of the present municipal year to be free of debt, and in a position to proceed with every necessary work.

MEETINGS.

Eighteen ordinary and four special meetings of the council have been held, and two meetings lapsed for want of a quorum. The Chairman (Councillor Wilson), attended 19; Councillor Keuworthy, 19; Councillor Menzies, 19; Councillor Scott, 20; and Councillor Hargreave, 18 meetings; and Councillors Kelly and Perkins each attended three meetings, being the only ones held since their election. The council now hold fortnightly meetings only.

PUBLIC WORKS.

Footbridge at Rogers and Harper's ford, painted.
 Plan for laying out the botanical gardens adopted, and the fencing of the river side of the gardens in progress.

The metalling of Wedge street, from Piper street to Baynton street, in progress.

APPLICATIONS TO THE GOVERNMENT.

For unconditional grant of money out of the vote for 1860, for improving the botanical gardens.—£120 granted.

For a grant for a similar purpose, out of the vote for 1861.—Under consideration.

For half an acre of land fronting Mollison street, as an addition to market site, and for weighbridge.—Granted.

For site for manure depôt.—Granted.

To raise the Mollison street bridge seven feet higher than contracted for.—Under consideration.

For the Government grant-in-aid for current year.—A portion will shortly be received.

MISCELLANEOUS.

Councillor Wilson was elected chairman of the council for the current year.

On the 4th April last, Councillors Fitzgerald and Dickinson resigned, and Councillors Kelly and Perkins were elected in their stead.

The late town surveyor, valuator, and collector, Mr. Donnelly, was dismissed for inattention to his duties, and Mr. G. Fleck has been appointed in his stead as town surveyor and valuator, and Mr. C. H. Orr as collector. The salaries of the officers have been considerably reduced.

Owing to the defective state of the law, the council have found it impracticable to obtain for the public the full advantages of the commonage proclaimed for the town, consisting of 1333 acres.

Efforts have been made to establish a general market, and by way of experiment, the Agricultural Show yards were temporarily obtained for the purpose, but the council regret to state that the project met with very little encouragement, and the yards are now closed.

A bye-law has been passed prohibiting the slaughter of large cattle in the municipality, and making other provisions for the cleanliness of the town. An inspector of nuisances has also been appointed, and Dr. Geary has accepted the office of hon. officer of health.

The valuation of the municipality for the current year, after all appeals heard, amounts to £26,462, producing a rate, at 1s. in the pound, of £1323 2s., the first moiety of which is now in course of collection.
