INVERLEIGH TOWN COMMON.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act*, 1862, it is amongst other things enacted, that when any Crown land remains unsold in or within five miles of any municipal district, or upon or within five miles of any gold field, or in or within five miles of any town not contained in any municipal district, or within any agricultural area of which at least one-fourth part has been selected, the Governor in Council may proclaim such land to be a municipal common, or a gold fields common, or a town common, or a farmers' common respectively, as the case may be: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the land hereinafter described to be a Town Common for all householders of the town of INVERLEIGH, that is to say:—

PARISH OF DOROQ, COUNTY OF GRENVILLE.—Estimated area, 450 acres: Being all the unappropriated Crown lands within the township of Inverleigh.—(62.P.5930.)

The petitioners state that they are householders residing in the township of Rutherglen, and that it is in the centre of a large and important mining and agricultural district, the population of which, according to the census returns, is over four thousand.

They further state, that the town contains more than three hundred householders; that the buildings are, for the most part, well and substantially constructed; and that at the earnest wish of the townspeople the land in the township has recently been sold; but that as at present no means exist for effecting local improvements otherwise than by private enterprise, the streets and roadways are unformed, and in winter partially impassable.

They therefore believe that the establishment of a municipality will greatly conduce to the prosperity and permanent welfare of the town, and suggest the following municipal boundaries, viz. :—Commencing from a point sixty-seven chains south-east (magnetic) from the south-eastern angle of allotment No. 7, section 20, parish of Carlyle; bearing thence due west one mile; bearing thence due north two miles; bearing thence due east one mile; bearing thence due south two miles to the commencing point.

And the petitioners pray as follows:—

"Your petitioners therefore humbly pray that the district as above defined may be proclaimed a municipality under the name of 'The Municipal District of Rutherglen,' according to the provisions of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15."

MUNICIPALITY OF ARARAT.

BYE-LAW No. 28.—TO REGULATE THE ELECTION OF MANAGERS FOR THE ARARAT TOWN COMMON.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Legislature of Victoria, 25 Victoria No. 145, intituled, *An Act to consolidate and amend the laws relating to the sale and occupation of Crown Lands*, section 69, it is enacted, that the municipal council of any municipal district within or in the vicinity of which any town or municipal common is situated, shall elect annually, in such manner as they may by bye-law prescribe, three persons to be managers of such common, and may at any time remove any one or more of such managers and elect others in their stead: And whereas by a proclamation of His Excellency the Governor in Council, dated the twenty-eighth day of January, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, and made under the provisions of the Act of the Parliament of Victoria No. 117, intituled, *An Act for the sale of Crown Lands and for other purposes*, the boundaries of the Ararat town common are duly gazetted: Be it therefore ordered and enacted, by the municipal council of Ararat, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor in Council, the election for managers for the Ararat town common shall be conducted in the following manner, that is to say:—

1st. Before any election under this bye-law, the chairman of the Ararat municipal council shall cause to be given to each member thereof written notice of the day on which it is proposed that the election of the managers for the town common shall be held, such notices to be delivered at least fourteen days prior to the day of election; and any member of said council desirous of nominating one or more candidates shall, within eight days of the receipt by him of said notice, do so by giving to the town clerk, in writing, the name of such candidate or candidates. The names of the candidates thus handed in shall be publicly read by the chairman of the council at the general meeting held previous to that on which the election shall take place.

2nd. If the number of candidates nominated as aforesaid shall not exceed the number of managers to be elected for said common, the chairman of said council shall declare such candidates to be duly elected, and they shall be deemed to be duly elected accordingly; but if the number of candidates shall exceed the number of managers to be appointed, the council shall proceed to the election by ballot in whatever way they may determine, and the three candidates who shall have the largest number of votes shall be declared duly elected; and if two or more candidates shall have received an equal number of votes, the chairman aforesaid shall, besides his own vote, have the casting vote.

3rd. Should any complaints be made to the council touching the conduct of any manager or managers, or should it appear to the council that any manager or managers have been neglecting or overstepping their duty, it shall be competent for any member of said council, upon giving due notice thereof, to propose that such manager or managers shall be removed; and upon such motion being carried in the affirmative, such manager or managers shall be removed accordingly, and some other person or persons shall be elected instead thereof, in the same manner as the first election. The person or persons so elected shall hold office only for the unexpired term of the manager or managers in whose stead he or they shall have been returned.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 28, made by the municipal council of Ararat, has been assented to by the Governor in Council.

MUNICIPALITY OF MALMSBURY.

BYE-LAW No. 5.—TO ENABLE THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF MALMSBURY TO ELECT MANAGERS FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF THE MALMSBURY TOWN OR MUNICIPAL COMMON, TO FIX THE TIME AND MANNER OF THEIR ELECTION, AND TO REMOVE SUCH MANAGERS AND TO ELECT OTHERS IN THEIR STEAD.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of Victoria, 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted, that the council of any municipal district may make bye-laws for the conducting of elections: And whereas by an Act of His Excellency the Governor and Parliament of Victoria, intituled, *An Act to consolidate and amend the laws relating to the sale and occupation of Crown Lands*, 25 Victoria No. 145, section 69, power is given to the municipal council of any municipal district within or in the vicinity of which any town or municipal common is situated, to elect annually, in such manner as they may by bye-laws prescribe, three persons to be managers of such town or municipal common, and may at any time remove any one or more of such managers, and elect others in their stead: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council of Malmesbury, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor, the election of managers for the management of the Malmesbury municipal common shall be held and conducted at the time and in the manner following:—

1. That the election for the appointment of managers for the management of the Malmesbury municipal common shall be held annually in the Municipal Council Chambers, Malmesbury, on the third Thursday of December in each year, at Eight o'clock in the evening of said day.

2. That the election shall be conducted by ballot.

3. That should any manager be removed by order of the municipal council of Malmesbury, a meeting for the election of a successor to the manager so removed shall be held within one month from the date of such removal, the day for holding such meeting to be appointed at the regular meeting of the council

which shall be held next after the date of the removal of a manager as aforesaid; such meeting to be held at the same hour and place, and conducted in the same manner as provided for at the annual meeting for the election of managers as hereinbefore provided.

4. That at the next regular meeting of the council ensuing after notice of the assent by His Excellency the Governor to this bye-law has been received, a day shall be fixed for holding a meeting to appoint managers for the management of the Malmesbury municipal common, such managers to serve until the day named for the annual election as provided by this bye-law, and such meeting to be held at the same hour and place, and conducted in the same manner as provided for at the annual meeting for the election of managers as hereinbefore provided.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 5, made by the municipal council of Malmesbury, has been assented to by the Governor in Council.

MUNICIPALITY OF MARYBOROUGH.

BYE-LAW No. 22.—FOR THE ELECTION OF MANAGERS FOR THE TOWN COMMON OF THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF MARYBOROUGH.

WHEREAS by the Act of His Excellency the Governor and Parliament of Victoria, 25 Victoria No. 145, intituled, *An Act to consolidate and amend the laws relating to the sale and occupation of Crown Lands*, it is amongst other things enacted, that the municipal council of any municipal district within or in the vicinity of which any town common within the meaning of the Act of the Parliament of Victoria No. 117 is situated, shall elect annually, in such manner as they may by bye-law prescribe, three persons to be managers of such common: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council of Maryborough, by and with the assent of His Excellency the Governor in Council:—

1. That the election of three persons to be managers of the Maryborough town common shall be held annually on the first Tuesday of September in each year, at Eight o'clock in the evening of said day.

2. That at the annual meeting, or any subsequent meeting, for the election of a manager or managers for the said common, any member of the municipal council may nominate in writing the names of not more than three persons to be managers thereof, with the consent of the person or persons so nominated; and in case there shall be more persons nominated than vacancies, a ballot shall be taken of the chairman and members present at such meeting of council; and at the conclusion of the said ballot, if there shall be an equality of votes, the chairman shall have a casting vote; and the person or persons elected shall be declared to be the managers, or a manager, as the case may be, of the Maryborough town common, under the provisions of the Act aforesaid.

3. That should any manager be removed by order of the municipal council of Maryborough, a meeting for the election of a successor to the manager so removed shall be held within twenty-one days from the date of such removal; the day for holding such meeting to be appointed at the regular meeting of the council which shall be held next after the date of the removal of a manager as aforesaid; such meeting to be held at the same hour and place, and conducted in the same manner as hereinbefore provided.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 22, made by the municipal council of Maryborough, has been assented to by the Governor in Council.

MELBOURNE AND GEELONG CORPORATIONS ACTS AMENDMENT BILL.

NOTICE is hereby given, that application is intended to be made in the next session of the Parliament of Victoria for leave to bring in a Bill, intituled, *A Bill to further alter and amend the Laws relating to the Corporations of the City of Melbourne and of the Town of Geelong respectively, and to extend and apply other existing Acts thereto.* And notice is hereby given, that by such bill it is intended to apply for powers to

adopt the ballot in the election of councillors, auditors, and assessors; to forbid the holding of such elections in public houses; to appoint branch polling places, arranged alphabetically; to limit the tenure of office by aldermen to four years; to disqualify members of the council absent from meetings for two months; to disqualify persons convicted of treason, felony, personation at elections, or other infamous offence, for election as members of the council; to elect the mayor for each ensuing year on the ninth day of October, the mayor then elected to assume office on the ninth day of November, and to be in the interim styled the mayor elect, and be, ex officio, a justice of the peace within the corporate limits; to empower the town clerk in certain cases to convene meetings of the council; to render the annual election of treasurer and other officers unnecessary; to compel officers receiving money for the corporation to pay same to the treasurer within seven days at farthest, and treasurer to lodge all money received by him in bank to credit of town fund within four days at farthest, under liability of prosecution for misdemeanor; to limit the number of advertisements requisite for the publication of bye-laws, and for the declaration of rates; to extinguish the exemption of untenanted premises from rating, save in respect to buildings unoccupied for three months; to empower the assessment and rating for town and lighting rates of lands, buildings, tenements, and places beneficially occupied, and to declare and enforce such rates, and notify and recover arrears; to enrol as citizens or burgesses freeholders of property on which rates are paid, and to enable the revision court to strike off freeholders' names in case of non-payment of rates; to collect fees for licenses and registrations of bowling-saloons, concert-rooms, places for pastime, and from porters, drivers, and others, and to pay one-half of the net amount of license fees collected from drivers resident in other municipal limits to the council of the district; to establish additional cattle markets, and collect tolls therein; to lease corporate lands and buildings, and the tolls and dues arising therefrom; to erect public baths and washhouses, and make bye-laws for the management thereof, and for charging for admission thereto; to extend to Geelong the Melbourne Hackney Carriage Act, and empower the town council to issue and charge fees for licenses to hackney carriages, and the owners, drivers, and conductors thereof; also the Act 16 Victoria No. 38, and thereby to enable the town council to cause lands to be filled up to the level of adjacent streets, and private streets to be drained; also the Acts 14 Victoria No. 17 and 18 Victoria No. 18, and thereby to enable the town council to erect public abattoirs, and charge dues for the use thereof; to enable the corporate councils of Melbourne and Geelong to authorize the construction and use of street railways, and to regulate the fares to be charged for travelling thereupon; to enable the said councils to collect from adjoining owners a moiety of the cost which shall be incurred in flagging footways; to define more clearly the meaning of words and terms used in the Acts 14 Victoria No. 20 and 14 Victoria No. 35, with regard to formation and repair of streets, courts, and alleys, on private property; to protect streets and ways already formed or used from encroachment; to confer, vary, or extinguish other rights or privileges as in the said bill mentioned.
