NOTICE TO MARINERS.

GABO ISLAND LIGHTHOUSE.

IN accordance with a Notice to Mariners, issued from this office on the 6th day of May, 1862, the old fixed light on Gabo Island was extinguished, and a *first order catadioptric fixed white light* was exhibited from the new tower, on the evening of the twentieth instant, which will continue lit from henceforth between sunset and sunrise.

The new lighthouse stands S. 46° E. twelve hundred yards from the old one, about one cable's length N.W. h. W. from the S.E. point of Gabo Island; its approximate position is latitude 37° 34' 5" S., longitude 149° 55' 7" E. The tower is circular, built of grey granite, and remains its natural color; the light-room and top of lantern are painted light grey.

The light is one hundred and seventy-four feet above the level of the sea, and is visible to seaward, in ordinary clear weather, at a distance of twenty miles from about N.N.E. round by E. and S. to W. $\frac{1}{2}$ S., allowing ten feet for the height of the eye.

The new lighthouse being further to the S.E. than the old lighthouse, vessels from the northward will see it over the shoulder of Cape Howe about three-quarters ($\frac{3}{4}$) of a point further to the south-east than the old light was visible, consequently the new light will be seen by them sooner and show more in shore than the old one did.

Vessels to the westward of Gabo Island, and standing to the northward between it and Mallagoota Point, will avoid the low island of Tallaburga and the reef to the southward of it by not shutting in the light, which is screened towards Tallaburga and the mainland on a W. $\frac{1}{2}$ S. and E. $\frac{1}{2}$ N. bearing.

The petitioners state that they are householders residing in the township of Rutherglen, and that it is in the centre of a large and important mining and agricultural district, the population of which, according to the census returns, is over four thousand.

They further state, that the town contains more than three hundred householders; that the buildings are, for the most part, well and substantially constructed; and that at the earnest wish of the townspeople the land in the township has recently been sold; but that as at present no means exist for effecting local improvements otherwise than by private enterprise, the streets and roadways are unformed, and in winter partially impassable.

Application to the Honorable the Commissioner of Lands and Survey for a set of lithographic plans of lands in this district, for the use of the Council Chambers, as those in the Court House were destroyed by the late fire.—Complied with.

Bye-law No. 28, for the election of managers for managing the Kilmore Town and Municipal Common.—Assented to and gazetted.

Application to the Honorable the Commissioner of Public Works for a further grant of £844 for conducting the water by pipes from the reservoir into the town.—£600 granted conditionally for that purpose.

Application to the Government that when a new Court House was about to be built, a more suitable and central site than the former one might be chosen, on or near to the main street.—Favorably received; yet under consideration.

Application to the Honorable the Postmaster General that three receiving letter boxes, for the public convenience, might be placed in various parts of the municipality, to be cleared once a day.—Granted.

Application for the establishment of a Receipt and Pay Office here.—Reply, that the application could not at present be complied with.

Application to the Government Botanist for the supply of a selection of rare trees, shrubs, plants, and seeds for the use of the Botanic Gardens here.—Granted.

Application for the first instalment of the grant-in-aid to this municipality for 1862.—Received.

Returns, accompanied with the required statutory declaration to claim the whole of the grant-in-aid for 1862.—Not yet passed for payment.

The half-yearly report of the local board of health here (the municipal council) in reply to the sanitary questions of the Central Board of Health, has been forwarded to Melbourne.

Application to the Honorable the Commissioner of Lands and Survey for the appropriation of a site for municipal quarries.—Under consideration.

The reservoir is now completed, and measures will soon be taken for conducting the water into the town for the supply of the inhabitants and at fires. Two large buildings have been destroyed during the past half-year, in a great measure owing to the short supply of water procurable.
