THE DIVISIONS OF THE MINING DISTRICT OF ARARAT.

At the Government House, Melbourne, the twenty-first day of January, 1862.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the twenty-first year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act for amending the Laws relative to the Gold Fields*, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to split any mining district as thereinbefore mentioned into any number of divisions, and to define the limits and boundaries thereof respectively, and also to determine the number of members of the mining board of such district which shall be elected within and for every such division, and from time to time to alter any such division and the limits and boundaries thereof, and to vary the number of members which shall be elected within and for every such division, but so that the total number of members elected for such district shall in no case exceed or be less than ten: And whereas by two several Orders of the Governor in Council, made on the fourth day of January, 1858, and the fourth day of April, 1859, the mining district of Ararat was split into the divisions therein mentioned: And whereas it is expedient to subdivide the said district into four divisions: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order split the said mining district of Ararat into the four divisions named in the first column of the schedule hereunto annexed, and doth define the limits and boundaries of each such division to be those set opposite thereto respectively in the last column of the same schedule, and doth determine that the number of members of the mining board of such district which shall be elected within and for every such division shall be that set immediately under the name of each such division, that is to say:—

THE SCHEDULE.

The Names of the Four Divisions, &c.	The Limits and Boundaries of the Divisions.
ARARAT Four members	Commencing at a point on the Grampians due west of Hall's Gap; thence by a line easterly to the south-west corner of Allanvale pre-emptive right; thence by the southern boundary of that pre-emptive right and a line north-easterly to Mount Jambour in the Great Dividing Range; thence by the Great Dividing Range to the most western source of the Fieri Creek; thence by the range separating the waters of the Fieri Creek and the River Hopkins and a line south to Lake Holoko; thence by the eastern shores of that lake and the southern boundary of the county of Ripon to the Serra Range; and thence northwards by that range and the Grampians to the commencing point aforesaid.
PLEASANT CREEK Two members	Commencing at the bifurcations of the River Wimmera; thence easterly by the Wimmera main road to the western boundary of the town of Navarre; thence by the western boundary of that town to the Wattle Creek; thence by that creek and the River Wimmera to its junction with the Mount Cole Creek; thence by that creek to its most southern source in the Great Dividing Range; thence by that range to Mount Jambour; thence by a line south-westerly to the south-east corner of Allanvale pre-emptive right; thence by the southern boundary of that pre-emptive right and a line westerly to a point on the Grampians due west of Hall's Gap; thence by the Grampians Range to Brigg's Bluff; thence by a line north-east to the River Wimmera; and thence by that river to the commencing point aforesaid.
RAGLAN Two members	As described in the Order of the Governor in Council of the fourth day of January, A.D. 1858.
BARKLY Two members	Commencing at the most southern source of the Mount Cole Creek; thence by that creek and the River Wimmera to the Wattle Creek; thence by that creek to the western boundary of the town of Navarre; thence by the western and southern boundaries of that town and a line east to the Dividing Range separating the waters flowing to the Wimmera and Avoca; thence southwards by that range and the Pyrenees Range to the Great Dividing Range; and thence by that range to the commencing point aforesaid.

THE TOWN OF TALBOT.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled, *An Act for regulating the Sale of Crown Lands and for other purposes*, it is amongst other things enacted, that the Governor in Council shall have full power from time to time by proclamation to define what shall be considered Towns within the meaning of the said Act: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby order and declare that the area hereinafter defined shall be considered to be the TOWN OF TALBOT, within the meaning of the said Act, that is to say:—

THE TOWN OF TALBOT.—Extent, two square miles: Commencing at a point one chain due north from the north-east corner of allotment 33, section 7, parish of Amherst; bounded on the west by part of the municipal boundary line and the east boundary lines of allotments 45 and 44, section 2, one hundred and ten chains to the north-east corner of the last-named allotment; on the north by a line bearing east one hundred and sixteen chains thirty-six links; on the east by the municipal boundary line, bearing south one hundred and ten chains; and on the south by the municipal boundary line, bearing west one hundred and sixteen chains thirty-six links to the commencing point.—(62 C.79.)

DISTRICT BROUGHT UNDER THE GUNPOWDER ACT.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Parliament of Victoria, passed in the session held in the twenty-first year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act to regulate the importation carriage and custody of Gunpowder*, it is amongst other things enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to proclaim any town, township, or municipal district, not being a sea-port town, as a district into which no gunpowder shall be brought unless for deposit in a public or licensed magazine; and if any person shall bring more than One hundred pounds of gunpowder into any such district, and shall not forthwith deposit the same in a magazine as aforesaid, it shall be forfeited: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the municipal district hereinafter mentioned to be a district within the meaning and intent and for the purpose mentioned in the above-recited clause of the said Act, that is to say:—

The Municipal District of Inglewood.

CIRCULAR.

SIR,

At the request of the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade, I have to call your attention to the 242nd section of the Merchant Shipping Act of 1854 (Clause 5).

That section prescribes the cases in which the Board of Trade may cancel or suspend a master or mate's certificate for misconduct, and it distinctly provides that in the case of any investigation made by any court or tribunal authorised by the

Legislative authority in any British possession to enquire into the conduct of masters and mates, the report of the court is to be confirmed by the Governor or person administering the government of such possession.

I am led to advert to this subject from the circumstance, that in a recent instance the Board of Trade were unable to cancel a certificate in consequence of an omission on the part of a Governor to confirm the report of a marine court.

PLEURO-PNEUMONIA.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY EDWARD FOX YOUNG, Knight Companion of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Tasmania and its Dependencies.

A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS the infectious disease known or described as Pleuro-pneumonia has appeared amongst cattle in certain parts of the neighboring colony of Victoria, and it is necessary to take measures to prevent the introduction into this colony of such disease: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Edward Fox Young, Knight Companion of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief as aforesaid, with the advice of the Executive Council, and in pursuance of the provisions of the Act of Parliament of Tasmania, 25 Victoria No. 4, do, by this my proclamation, prohibit the introduction into this colony, or into any port thereof other than the port of Hobart Town and the port of Port Arthur, of any cattle whatever, from any part of the colony of Victoria, excepting cattle from the district of Port Albert, and shipped from the port of Port Albert: And I do further notify and proclaim that all cattle introduced into this colony contrary to this proclamation will be seized and forfeited to the Crown: And I do further notify and proclaim that, at the said ports of Hobart Town and Port Arthur, for the purposes of this proclamation, the following restrictions and regulations are to be observed, namely:—All cattle arriving in the said ports of Hobart Town and Port Arthur from any part of the colony of Victoria, excepting the port of Port Albert, are to be landed at the nearest place to the sheds appropriated for the inspection of such cattle so soon as such sheds shall be erected, and in the mean time at such place or places as may from time to time be in that behalf appointed; and immediately upon the landing of such cattle they are to be removed to such sheds, or to such other place or places as may from time to time be in that behalf appointed, and are to be forthwith inspected by the person in that behalf appointed; and such cattle as shall, upon such inspection by such person so to be appointed as aforesaid, be found and declared by him to be infected with the said disease of pleuro-pneumonia shall be immediately destroyed, and their carcasses disposed of in such manner as the Governor shall direct; and all such cattle as shall, upon such inspection, be found and declared by such person so to be appointed as aforesaid, not to be infected with the said disease, shall be immediately removed to the slaughter yards at the said ports of Hobart Town and Port Arthur, as the case may be, there to remain until they shall be slaughtered.

WHEREAS by section number nine of the *Diseased Cattle Act*, 1861, it is enacted, that "If at any time it shall be made to appear to the Governor that any infectious or contagious disease has broken out in any district out of the colony, it shall be lawful for the Governor, by Order in Council, to declare that such district is infected within the meaning of this Act, and from time to time to make such Regulations as to him shall seem fit, for prohibiting the importation of cattle into the colony from such district, and the landing or driving of such cattle, and for destroying cattle imported, landed, or driven contrary to such Regulations;" and by section ten of the same Act it is also enacted, that "If at any time it shall be made to appear to the Governor that any infectious or contagious disease has broken out amongst cattle in any district of the colony, it shall be lawful for the Governor, by Order in Council, to declare that such district is infected within the meaning of this Act, and from time to time to make such Regulations for destroying diseased cattle therein, and for prohibiting the removal or transportation of cattle from one part of the colony to another, and for preventing the further spread of such disease as to him shall seem fit;" and it is by the same Act also enacted that the Governor in Council may, by warrant under his hand, from time to time delegate to the Superintendent of any province within the colony, all or any of the powers vested in the Governor, or Governor in Council, by the said Act, subject to such Regulations as he may think fit, and may from time to time rescind such delegation: And whereas the Governor hath with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of New Zealand, delegated to Isaac Earl Featherston, Esquire, so long as he shall hold the office of Superintendent of the province of Wellington, the several powers vested in the Governor by the second, fourth, fifth, seventh, ninth, and tenth sections of the said Act, subject to being rescinded as in the said Act is provided, and subject to the Regulations issued by the Governor in Council on the first day of October, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, and to any other Regulations to be from time to time duly made:

Now therefore I, the said Isaac Earl Featherston, by virtue of the powers vested in me in this behalf, do hereby proclaim and declare—First, that after the date hereof the several colonies of Australia, that is to say, the colony of Victoria, the colony of New South Wales, the colony of Queensland, the colony of South Australia, and the colony of Western Australia, as well as the colony of Tasmania, and the colony Cape of Good Hope, and the islands of Great Britain and Ireland, shall be deemed to be infected districts within the meaning and for the purposes of the abovementioned Act, and that no cattle after the date hereof, until further notice, shall be imported into the province of Wellington from such districts: Provided however that the Superintendent of the province may allow any cattle to be landed from vessels from the islands of Great Britain and Ireland, subject to such conditions and restrictions as he may deem expedient and the circumstances of any case may require. And I do also proclaim and declare, that after the date hereof the province of Otago and the province of Southland, in the colony of New Zealand, shall be deemed to be infected districts within the meaning of the said Act, and that no cattle shall be imported into the province of Wellington from either of the said provinces.

subject to be rescinded as in the said Act provided, and subject to the Regulations of even date herewith, and to any other Regulations to be from time to time duly made.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

REGULATIONS RESPECTING DELEGATION OF POWERS TO SUPERINTENDENTS UNDER "DISEASED CATTLE ACT, 1861."
At the Government House at Auckland, the first day of October, 1861.

PRESENT:

His Excellency the Governor in Council.

WHEREAS by Warrants under the hand of His Excellency the Governor, bearing date the first day of October, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, the Governor has, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of New Zealand, delegated to the Superintendents respectively of the provinces of Auckland, Taranaki, Wellington, Hawke's Bay, Nelson, Marlborough, Canterbury, Otago, and Southland, certain powers conferred on him by the *Diseased Cattle Act*, 1861, subject to certain Regulations to be made by the Governor in Council, under the recited Act: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of New Zealand, by virtue of the authority given to him by the 14th section of the above-recited Act, doth hereby make and ordain the following Regulations:—

1. The delegation of powers under the said Warrants shall continue to be in force for the period of one year from this date, subject to be rescinded according to the provisions of the above-recited Act.

2. Each Superintendent shall, immediately after exercising any of the delegated powers, notify the same to the Governor; and he shall transmit to the Governor particulars of all appointments and copies of all regulations made by him.

3. He shall, so soon as conveniently can be, notify all regulations made by him to the Colonial Secretary, or Chief Secretary of each of the Australian colonies, and cause the same to be published in England in the *Times* newspaper.

4. In the exercise of powers delegated under the 9th section of the said Act, the Superintendent of any province may, either in the first instance or afterwards from time to time, by proclamation in the *Government Gazette* of the province, except out of any district proclaimed as infected under the said Act any port or place within the limits of such district, and every such excepted port and place shall be deemed not to be within the proclaimed district; and the Superintendent may also from time to time, by proclamation as aforesaid, rescind any proclamation of an infected district wholly or as to any part thereof, and also the proclamation of any such exception as aforesaid.

5. In the exercise of powers delegated under the 10th section of the Act, the Superintendent of any province may prohibit the importation, either by land or by sea, of cattle into such province from any other province, or any particular port or place in any other province, or across the borders of a province, or any particular part thereof.

6. In all such last-mentioned cases, such Superintendent shall cause notice as speedily as possible of such prohibition to be given to the Superintendent of the province from which importation shall be prohibited, and also to the Governor.

7. The Superintendent of any province may, in his discretion, suspend or forbear to exercise all or any of the powers delegated to him under the said Act.

8. The Superintendent of each province shall, as soon as can be after the commencement of each sitting of the Provincial Council of such province, lay before such council copies and particulars of all appointments, regulations, acts, and proceedings whatever issued, made, or done by him under the delegated powers of the said Act.

9. If the Provincial Council of any province shall by resolution declare their dissent from all or any of such appointments, regulations, acts, and proceedings, such resolutions shall be forthwith transmitted by the Speaker to the Governor for his consideration.

That the remainder of the Pleasant Creek road be cleared. Partly done.

That the Avoca road be cleared as far as the Three-mile Creek, and that a bridge be erected over said creek. Under consideration.

That a bridge be built on the Ballaarat road, at Chalicum Creek; that the formed portions of said road be blinded, and that the worst places of the unmade portion be formed. Partly done.

That a permanent post office be erected. Granted.

That the Ararat Survey district be enlarged. Refused.

That a number of suburban allotments be surveyed and sold. Granted.

That a site for botanical gardens be granted in the vicinity of the municipal dam. Accorded to.

That prison labor be allowed for cultivating botanical reserve. Granted conditionally.

BYE-LAWS.

Regulating the number of horses and cattle allowed to be depastured on the town common.—Passed.

For reducing the scale of fees charged at the municipal weigh-bridge.—Passed.

The market bye-law, No. 23, has not yet received the assent of His Excellency, but the Government have promised to gazette it on certain alterations being effected.

MISCELLANEOUS.

An arrangement has been entered into with the Volunteer Fire Brigade, by which the council defrays the whole of the working expenses of that body. An engine-house has been leased by the council for the use of the brigade.

Owing to misrepresentations having been made to the late Government, a proclamation appeared in the *Government Gazette* of the 10th May, curtailing the area of our Circuit Court and General Sessions districts to a very great extent, transferring to the Maryborough district the whole of the McKinnon's, Navarre, and Redbank gold fields, and actually taking from our district the township of Crowlands, a place only thirteen miles distant. Owing to the exertions of this council, and to a memorial numerously signed by the inhabitants of the abovementioned places, protesting against such a change, being presented to the Honorable the Attorney General, the proclamation was rescinded on the 29th of the same month, and our original boundaries were thus restored.
