WHEREAS by an Act passed in the eighteenth year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled, *An Act to amend an Act intituled An Act to amend the law relating to the Post Office*, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, to make, or cause to be made, arrangements with the authorities of any British possession for the appointment, determining, and collection of postage and rates of postage upon letters, packets, and newspapers conveyed between Victoria aforesaid and such possession, and for the exemption of such letters, packets, and newspapers from all or any rates: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order direct, that under an arrangement with the authorities in New South Wales, unstamped and unpaid ship letters arriving in Victoria, on and after the date hereof addressed to any part of the said colony of New South Wales, shall be exempted from Victorian postage, and may be forwarded to their destination.

And the Honorable George Samuel Evans, LL.D., Her Majesty's Postmaster General for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the twenty-first year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled, *An Act to enable the Postmaster General to issue Money Orders in the Colony of Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted, that the Governor in Council may from time to time order and direct what shall be deemed "Separate Post Towns or places" within the meaning of the third section of the Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of Victoria, passed in the eighteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled, *An Act to amend an Act intituled An Act to amend the Law relating to the Post Office*: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order direct that the Municipality of Williamstown shall be deemed to be within the limits of the city in which the General Post Office is situated, for the purposes of the above-recited Act; and that all letters forwarded by post between the Municipality of Williamstown and the Post Offices within the limits of the city aforesaid, shall be subject to the town rate of postage, viz.:—Twopence per single rate of half an ounce, and so on in proportion.

AMENDED SCALE OF TOLLS ON GOVERNMENT
ROADS.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by a Proclamation under the Hand of the Governor and the Seal of the Colony, bearing date the twenty-fourth day of June in the present year, the Board of Land and Works was authorised to collect rates of tolls not exceeding the rates therein mentioned, for all animals and vehicles passing through or by any toll-gates or bars on roads under the charge of the said Board: And whereas it is expedient to alter the said Proclamation in manner hereinafter mentioned: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby revoke the title "Tolls for Vehicles on Springs" prefixed to the second division of the scale of tolls contained in the said Proclamation, and also the title "Tolls for Vehicles not on Springs" and the words "not constructed on springs" severally prefixed to and employed in the third division of the said scale.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, passed in the sixteenth year of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled, *An Act for making and improving Roads in the Colony of Victoria*, it was amongst other things enacted, that it should be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor, from time to time, by notice in the *Government Gazette*, to proclaim and declare any such portion of the said colony as to him should seem meet, as and to be a road district for the purposes in the said Act contained, and also to define the boundaries of every road district thereby proclaimed and declared, and to give a specific name or designation to every such road district: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim and declare that the portion of the county of Bourke hereinafter defined shall be a road district for the purposes in the said Act contained, that is to say:—

Commencing at a point in the centre of the Deep Creek road where it is intersected by the northern boundary of the municipality of Essendon; thence northerly by the western boundary of the Broadmeadows Road District to the junction of the Deep Creek and Konagaderr Creek; thence north-westerly by the Konagaderr Creek, being part of the eastern boundary of the parish of Bolinda, to the north-east angle of the said parish; thence west by the northern boundary of the parish of Bolinda to the northern boundary of the parish of Buttlejork; thence westerly by the northern boundary of the said parish of Buttlejork to the eastern boundary of the parish of Gisborne; thence south by the said eastern boundary of the parish of Gisborne and a direct line to the centre of the Mount Alexander road; thence by the centre of the said road to a point in its centre due west of the north boundary of the township of The Gap; thence by a direct line east to the eastern boundary of the Mount Alexander and Murray River Railway; thence southerly by the eastern boundary of the said railway to its point of intersection with the centre of the Mount Alexander road; thence south-easterly by the centre of the said road to its point of intersection with the Saltwater River; thence by the Saltwater River to the north-eastern boundary of the Braybrook Road District; thence by the said boundary of the Braybrook Road District eastward to the western boundary of the municipality of Essendon; thence by the western and part of the northern boundary of the said municipality to the commencing point.

And I do hereby further proclaim and declare that the specific name or designation of such road district shall be "The Bulla Road District."

THE ST. ARNAUD ROAD DISTRICT ALTERED.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by a Proclamation under the Hand of the Governor and the Seal of the Colony, bearing date the seventeenth day of June, in the year One thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, the boundaries of "The St. Arnaud Road District" were defined as therein mentioned: And whereas it is expedient to alter the said district by excluding therefrom the Municipal District of St. Arnaud: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby revoke the boundaries specified in the said Proclamation; and, with the advice aforesaid, I do hereby proclaim and declare that the said St. Arnaud Road District shall comprise the area hereinafter described, that is to say:—

Commencing at the northern boundary of the Natte Yallock pre-emptive section on the River Avoca; thence by a line west to the eastern boundary of the Stavell Road District at the township of Navarre; thence by the north-east boundary of the Stavell Road District and the Wimmera River to the divergence of the Yarrambiack Creek; thence northerly by the Yarrambiack Creek to the southern margin of Lake Corrong; thence east to the southern margin of Lake L'Albert; thence south by the L'Albert Creek and the River Avoca to the point of commencement; excepting the municipality of St. Arnaud.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, passed in the sixteenth year of Her present Majesty's reign, intitled, *An Act for making and improving Roads in the Colony of Victoria*, it was amongst other things enacted, that it should be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor, from time to time, by notice in the *Government Gazette*, to proclaim and declare any such portion of the said colony as to him should seem meet, as and to be a road district for the purposes in the said Act contained, and also to define the boundaries of every road district thereby proclaimed and declared, and to give a specific name or designation to every such road district: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim and declare that the portion of the county of Bourke hereinafter defined shall be a road district for the purposes in the said Act contained, that is to say:—

Commencing at a point in the centre of the River Plenty where the said river is intersected by the centre of the road running westward from the Yan Yean Reservoir to Woodstock; thence proceeding westward along the centre of the said road to the eastern boundary of the Woodstock Road District; thence southward along the eastern boundary line of the Woodstock Road District and the Epping Road District to the junction of the Plenty road and the Epping road; thence eastward along the line separating section 137, parish of Koelbandora, from section 138 of the said parish, to the centre of the Darabin Creek; thence northward by the centre of the said creek to the southern boundary line of section 10, parish of Koelbandora; thence eastward by the said boundary line to the south-east angle of the said section; thence northwards by the eastern boundary line of the said section to the southern boundary line of the Greensborough Road District; thence westward by the said southern boundary line to its western extremity; thence north-eastward by the western boundary line of the said Greensborough Road District to the centre of the River Plenty; and thence northward by the centre of the said river to the commencing point.

And I do hereby further proclaim and declare that the specific name or designation of such road district shall be "The Upper Plenty or Morang Road District."

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, passed in the sixteenth year of Her present Majesty's reign, intitled, *An Act for making and improving Roads in the Colony of Victoria*, it was amongst other things enacted, that it should be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor, from time to time, by notice in the *Government Gazette*, to proclaim and declare any such portion of the said colony as to him should seem meet, as and to be a road district for the purposes in the said Act contained, and also to define the boundaries of every road district thereby proclaimed and declared, and to give a specific name or designation to every such road district: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim and declare that the portion of the county of Bourke hereinafter defined shall be a road district for the purposes in the said Act contained, that is to say:—

Commencing at the point of junction of Toolern Toolerne Creek and Werribee River; thence by a portion of the western and by the northern boundaries of the Braybrook Road District to the Saltwater River; thence by the Saltwater River to its point of intersection with the centre of the Mount Alexander road at Keilor; thence north-westerly by the centre of Mount Alexander road to a point where it is intersected by the western boundary of the Mount Alexander and Murray River Railway; thence northerly by the western boundary of the said railway to the north-east angle of the township of Sunbury; thence by a direct line west to the Djerriwarrah Creek; thence southerly by the said creek to its junction with the Werribee River; thence by the Werribee River to the commencing point.

And I do hereby further proclaim and declare that the specific name or designation of such road district shall be "The Melton Road District."

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act, 1862*, it is amongst other things enacted, that when any Crown land remains unsold in or within five miles of any municipal district, or upon or within five miles of any gold field, or in or within five miles of any town not contained in any municipal district, or within any agricultural area of which at least one-fourth part has been selected, the Governor in Council may proclaim such land to be a municipal common, or a gold fields common, or a town common, or a farmers' common respectively, as the case may be; and it is also enacted that the Governor in Council may at any time increase, diminish, alter, or abolish any common proclaimed before or after the passing of the said Act: And whereas by a Proclamation under the hand of the Governor and the seal of the colony, bearing date the fifteenth day of April, 1861, the area therein described was proclaimed as the Carisbrook Town Common: And whereas it is expedient to abolish the said town common, and to proclaim another area as a municipal common: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby abolish the said town common; and, with the advice aforesaid, I do hereby proclaim the lands hereinafter mentioned to be a Municipal Common, that is to say:—

THE MUNICIPAL COMMON FOR ALL HOUSEHOLDERS IN THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF CARISBROOK—Being all the unappropriated Crown land within the municipal district of Carisbrook, as indicated on a plan deposited in the Crown Lands and Survey Office, Melbourne.—(62.E.5520.)

THE MUNICIPAL COMMON FOR ALL HOUSEHOLDERS IN THE CORPORATE TOWN OF GEELONG—County of Grant, approximate area, 1865 acres, more or less: Commencing at the south-east angle of the Botanic Garden Reserve; thence by the eastern boundary thereof northerly to the shore of Corio Bay; thence by the shore of Corio Bay easterly about fifty-nine chains in a direct line; thence south to the Point Henry road about fifty-two chains; thence by the last-named road westerly to the eastern boundary of the town of Geelong; thence by that boundary southerly to the Barwon River, bearing westerly and north-westerly to Garden street; thence by the last-named street northerly to the south-west angle of the Botanic Garden Reserve, by the southern boundary thereof easterly to the point of commencement: deducting from above-described area all sold or otherwise appropriated land.—(62.F.5565.)

MUNICIPALITY OF AMHERST.

BYE-LAW No. 19.—BYE-LAW FOR THE ELECTION OF MANAGERS OF THE AMHERST TOWN COMMON.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 25 Victoria No. 145, section 69, it is provided that the municipal council of any municipal district shall elect annually, in such manner as they may respectively by bye-law prescribe, three persons to be managers of any town common, and may at any time remove any one or more of such managers and elect others in their stead: Be it therefore enacted by the municipal council of Amherst, that from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor of this colony, the election of managers of the Amherst Town Common shall take place in the following manner:—

That the annual election of managers for the Amherst Town Common shall take place in the month of August in each year.

That no person shall be nominated or elected to fill the office of manager without his assent in writing, which assent shall be given to the chairman at least seven days before the meeting of the council at which the election of a manager or managers is to take place.

All meetings of the council for the election of managers shall be specially convened for that purpose.

That such election shall take place by ballot; and in the event of an equality of votes, the chairman, in addition to his own, shall have a casting vote.

That the votes, so soon as recorded, shall be counted in the presence of the members by the chairman, who shall be assisted by the town clerk; and the chairman, upon ascertaining the result of such election, shall declare the names of the successful candidates to the council as being duly elected, and shall thereupon direct the town clerk to enter such declaration in the minute book, and acquaint, in writing, the persons elected to fill the office of managers of such circumstance.

On the removal by the council of any such manager, the council shall elect another in his stead, and the person so elected shall hold such office for the remainder of the term his predecessor would have been entitled to have held the same unless removed by the council.

The foregoing Bye-law No. 19, made by the municipal council of Amherst, has been assented to by the Governor in Council.

MUNICIPALITY OF AVOCA.

BYE-LAW No. 19.—A BYE-LAW TO REGULATE THE ELECTION OF MANAGERS FOR THE AVOCA TOWN COMMON.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 25 Victoria No. 145, section 69, it is provided that the municipal council of any district within or in the vicinity of which any town common, within the meaning of the Act of Parliament of Victoria No. CXVIII., or any municipal common, is situated, shall elect annually, in such manner as they may by bye-law prescribe, three persons to be managers of such town or municipal common:

Be it therefore enacted by the Avoca Municipal Council, that the election of managers of the Avoca Town Common shall take place in the following manner:—

The names of all parties to be proposed as managers, with their written consent to act, if elected, shall be given in writing

to the town clerk at least seven days before the meeting of the council at which a manager or managers is to take place.

All meetings of the council for the election of managers shall be specially convened for that purpose.

Each member of the council may propose the names of, or vote for, as many persons to be managers as there are vacancies.

In the event of there not being more persons proposed than there are vacancies, then those persons shall be declared to be elected; but if there be more persons proposed than there are vacancies, then the chairman shall take a show of hands for each person proposed, and shall decide in whose favor such show of hands may be; and the person or persons in whose favor the show of hands shall have been decided, shall thereupon be declared to be the manager or managers of the Avoca Town Common.

If the result of the voting shall be that two or more persons shall have an equality of votes, the chairman shall have a casting vote.

The first election of managers shall take place within twenty-one days after His Excellency the Governor's assent to this bye-law being gazetted.

The foregoing Bye-law, No. 19, made by the municipal council of Avoca, has been assented to by the Governor in Council.

MUNICIPALITY OF BALLAARAT EAST.

BYE-LAW No. 32.—FOR AN ASSESSMENT OF HOUSE AND LAND PROPERTY WITHIN THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF BALLAARAT EAST, AND FOR IMPOSING AND LEVYING A RATE OF ONE SHILLING AND SIXPENCE IN THE POUND THEREON, FOR THE MUNICIPAL YEAR ENDING THE FIRST DAY OF JUNE, 1863.

WHEREAS by an Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 16, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is empowered to make an annual assessment of all property in houses and lands within the limits of such municipal district according to its fair annual value, and to impose and levy a rate thereon: Be it therefore enacted by the council of the municipal district of Ballarat East, that all the several properties within the said municipal district shall be assessed for the year ending the first of June, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, according to the several amounts of annual value respectively affixed to the same in the assessment roll or book made by the said council on the 15th day of August, 1862, and confirmed (after hearing the appeals against the same) by the justices of the peace in petty sessions assembled, numbering 2713 properties, amounting to the total annual value of £280,244; and also that the rate of One shilling and sixpence in the pound on the said annual value is hereby imposed on all the said properties for the year commencing the first day of June, 1862, and ending the first day of June, 1863, and payable in equal proportions, as follows: the first moiety thereof to be due and payable on the 30th day of September, 1862, and the second moiety to be due and payable on the 31st day of January, 1863; provided nevertheless that where the total rate for the whole year does not exceed the sum of Twenty shillings then such rate shall be due and payable in full on the 30th day of September, 1862.

The foregoing Bye-law No. 32, made by the municipal council of Ballarat East, has been assented to by the Governor in Council.

MUNICIPALITY OF BUNINYONG.

BYE-LAW No. 14.—FOR THE SUPPRESSION OF THE NUISANCE ARISING FROM GOATS AND PIGS BEING ALLOWED TO GO AT LARGE WITHIN THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF BUNINYONG.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 16, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is authorised to make bye-laws for the suppression of nuisances, &c.: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council of Buninyong, that, from and after the date of this bye-law coming into operation, it shall not be lawful for the owner of any goat or pig to allow the same to be at large in any street or public place within this municipality; and any person or persons, for any neglect or breach of this bye-law, shall, on conviction before two or more justices of the peace, forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding Forty shillings (40s.).

The foregoing Bye-law No. 14, made by the municipal council of Buninyong, has been assented to by the Governor in Council.

MUNICIPALITY OF CARISBROOK.

BYE-LAW No. 31.—TO REPEAL BYE-LAW No. 26, INTITULED, "RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR DEPASTURING HORSES AND CATTLE ON THE CARISBROOK TOWN COMMON;" AND TO PRESCRIBE THE MANNER IN WHICH MANAGERS OF SUCH COMMON SHALL BE ELECTED.

WHEREAS by a bye-law of the municipal council of Carisbrook, assented to by His Excellency the Governor in Council, intitled, "Bye-law No. 26. Rules and Regulations for depasturing horses and cattle on the Carisbrook Town Common," reciting therein the Act of Parliament 24th Victoria, No. 117,

sec. 70, and that certain lands had been proclaimed a town common for the town of Carisbrook, it was enacted that it should be lawful for all the inhabitants of the said town to depasture on the said common, or on any other land which might thereafter be proclaimed a common for the said town, according to a scale therein set forth: And whereas it is by an Act of Parliament, 25 Victoria No. 145, sec. 69, provided that the municipal council of any municipal district within or in the vicinity of which any town common, within the meaning of the Act of Parliament of Victoria No. 117, is situated, shall annually elect, in such manner as they may by bye-law prescribe, three persons to be managers of such common: And whereas it is expedient to repeal the said bye-law, and to make provision for the election of managers of the said common in accordance with the said Act of Parliament 25th Victoria No. 145: Be it therefore enacted by the municipal council of Carisbrook, with the assent of His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, as follows:—

1st. That from and after the assent of His Excellency the Governor to this bye-law the said recited bye-law No. 26 shall be and the same is hereby repealed.

2nd. That the election of three persons to be managers of the Carisbrook Town Common shall take place at the next general meeting of the municipal council after this bye-law shall be published in the *Government Gazette*.

3rd. That at such meeting, or any subsequent meeting for the election of a manager or managers of the said common, any member of the council may propose the names of not more than three persons to be managers thereof; and in case there shall be more persons proposed than vacancies, the chairman shall call for a show of hands for each person, and shall decide in whose favor such show of hands was, and the persons or person in whose favor the show of hands shall have been decided shall thereupon be declared to be the managers or manager of the said common, under the provisions of the Act of Parliament 25th Victoria No. 145; and the votes of the members shall be entered on the minutes of their proceedings.

The foregoing Bye-law No. 34, made by the municipal council of Carisbrook, has been assented to by the Governor in Council.

BYE-LAW No. 23.—TO FIX THE TIME AND MANNER OF ELECTION OF MANAGERS OF THE DUNOLLY MUNICIPAL COMMON.

WHEREAS by section 69 of *The Land Act of 1862*, 25 Victoria No. 145, it is enacted that the council of any municipal district within or in the vicinity of which any town or municipal common is situated, shall elect annually, in such manner as they may by bye-laws prescribe, three persons to be managers of such town or municipal common, and may at any time remove any one or more of such managers and elect others in their stead: And whereas by a Proclamation of His Excellency the Governor of Victoria, dated the 21st day of May, 1858, the district of Dunolly was duly established a municipal district, under the provisions and within the meaning of the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15: Be it therefore ordered and enacted by the municipal council of Dunolly, that, from and after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor, the election of managers of the Dunolly Municipal Common shall be held and conducted at the time and in the manner following, viz:—

That the election for the appointment of managers of the Dunolly Municipal Common shall be held annually at the Town Hall, Dunolly, on the second Wednesday in October in each year, at eight o'clock in the evening of said day; but if at the expiration of thirty minutes after the hour above named there is not a legal quorum of the said municipal council of Dunolly present, then the election shall take place at the first subsequent general meeting of the said municipal council of Dunolly at which a legal quorum shall be present.

2. That the election shall be conducted by ballot.

3. That should any one or more managers be removed by order of the said municipal council of Dunolly, a meeting for the election of a successor or successors to the manager or managers so removed shall be held within one month from the date of such removal, the day for holding such meeting to be appointed at the regular meeting of the said municipal council which shall be held next after the date of the removal of a manager or managers as aforesaid; such meeting to be held at the same hour and place, and conducted in the same manner, as at the annual meeting for the election of managers as hereinbefore provided.

The foregoing Bye-law No. 23, made by the municipal council of Dunolly, has been assented to by the Governor in Council.

1. That so soon as this bye-law shall have received the sanction of His Excellency the Governor in Council, the council of South Barwon shall elect three persons to be the managers of the Belmont Town Common in manner following:—At the meeting of the council at which this election shall be one of the orders of the day, cards shall be provided for the purpose of voting, on which the councillors voting shall write the name or names of the person or persons voted for, and sign them with their own names, and no voting card shall be received at any election which is not so signed; and the result of such election, with the names of the voters, shall be inserted in the minutes of the day, and the voting cards shall be kept in the town clerk's office for the twelve months next ensuing the day of election.

2. The managers when so elected shall, unless removed, hold office for one year from the date of the election, at the expiration of which period a fresh election shall take place in the same manner.

3. If at any time during a current year a vacancy or vacancies shall occur in such managers, the council shall, as speedily as possible, elect in the same manner a person or persons to fill such vacancy or vacancies, and such person or persons shall hold office, unless removed, during the remainder of the year.

The foregoing Bye-law No. 21, made by the municipal council of South Barwon, has been assented to by the Governor in Council.

Smith, Esq., M.L.A., and the other representatives of the district, in obtaining from Government the sum of £10,000, with a grant of the dam known as Kirk's dam, purchased by the Government at a cost of £3000, and which is now being raised 20 feet, out of the vote passed for supplying the gold fields with water for 1861.

The conditions of the grant to the municipal councils are, that they, within two years after the £10,000 has been expended, shall, out of the local revenue of the districts, expend the sum of £15,000 to complete the works. From the circumstances that the Swamp, from whence a population of upwards of twenty thousand persons (20,000) are now dependent for water, was, during last summer, almost exhausted, the municipal council felt assured the advantages that will be derived by the inhabitants of Ballarat, for mining and domestic purposes, when the works are completed, cannot be too highly estimated.

WATER WORKS.

The municipal council of this district have laid down pipes for supplying the railway station with water; the cost of the pipes and laying the same was £312 18s. 7d.

OPENING OF THE GEELONG AND BALLAARAT RAILWAY.

The Geelong and Ballarat Railway was opened by His Excellency the Governor, Sir Henry Barkly, K.C.B., on the 10th of April, 1862.

The municipal council on that occasion entertained at a banquet His Excellency, the members of the Executive Council, the members of the Legislative Council, the members of the Legislative Assembly, and the chairmen of most of the municipal institutions in the colony.

The municipal council feel confident, should the Government adopt a liberal scale of rates for passenger and goods traffic, it would tend to develop the many advantages arising from railway communication with the capital, and be the means of advancing the commercial prosperity of Ballarat and the surrounding districts.

ANNUAL ASSESSMENT.

The valuator's return for the year ending 16th January, 1863, shows the net value of land and buildings, £661,772; the annual valuation, £83,721 10s.

GRANTS-IN-AID TO MUNICIPALITIES.

The municipal council views with apprehension the diminution in the annual grant-in-aid to municipal institutions, and strongly recommends for the consideration of the municipal councils in the colony the necessity of using their influence to obtain an endowment of land.

RATE COLLECTOR'S RESIGNATION.

Mr. A. Dimant, on the 7th of June, sent in his resignation as rate collector. The auditors' report, in consequence of some of the block receipts of the rate collector not being produced, there is an amount of £157 17s. 13d. received and entered, but they are unable to say if the same is correct.

APPOINTMENT.

Mr. Adam Roxburgh was appointed rate collector and valuator on the 23rd of June, 1862.
