NOTICE TO HEADS OF DEPARTMENTS.

THE attention of Heads of Departments is requested to the undermentioned extracts from the Store and Transport Regulations :-

REQUISITIONS.

16. Requisitions are to be addressed to the Government Storekeeper upon the authorised form (No. 1), and are to be rendered as follows, viz. :-

Stores, on or before the 1st January, 1st April, 1st July, and 1st October, respectively.

Fuel and light, on the dates specified for stores.

Articles for building and manufacturing purposes, from time to time as required. The requisitionist must, however, give timely notice of his requirements.

All heads of departments are expressly enjoined to transmit their quarterly applications in due time. No supplies will be furnished until fourteen days after the receipt of the requisition.

19. The Government Storekeeper, unless with the especial sanction of the minister concerned, is on no account to furnish supplies to any department for which timely provision, as directed by these regulations, shall have been neglected.

SECULAR INSTRUCTION.

THE attention of Local Committees of Schools is called to the 11th section of the Common Schools Act, which enacts, "That in every school receiving aid from the consolidated revenue, four hours shall be set apart during each school day for secular instruction alone, and of such four hours two shall be before noon, two afternoon, and shall in each case be consecutive."

The Board of Education will not feel themselves warranted in making grants to any school in which the above provision is not complied with.

APPLICATIONS FOR COMMISSIONS IN THE ARMY.

THE Governor has directed the subjoined Despatch and Extract which His Excellency has received from His Grace the Duke of Newcastle, the Secretary of State for the Colonial Department, to be published.

(CIRCULAR.)

Downing street, 16th July, 1862.

SIR,—I had recently occasion to refer for the consideration of the Secretary of State for War an application for the grant of a Commission in the Army to the son of a Public Officer in the Ionian Islands, and as it appears from the letter from the Horse Guards relative to that case that applications are frequently made by Civil Officers in the various Colonies for Military Commissions without purchase for their sons, with which, under existing rules, it is found impossible to comply, I transmit to you an extract of so much of that letter as bears upon the subject, as it may serve to prevent, in some cases, the existence of undue expectations and consequent disappointment.

Extract of a Letter from Major-General Forster to the Under Secretary of State for War, dated Horse Guards, 10th June, 1862.

"With reference to your letter of the 6th instant, I am directed to acquaint you, for the information of the Secretary of State for War, that if the request be for a Commission without purchase, the only means of obtaining one, by recent regulation, is by the candidate passing through the Royal Military College at Sandhurst.

"I am to observe, that it frequently occurs that Officers in Civil employ in various Colonies apply for Commissions without purchase for their sons, setting forth their claims to such consideration, but, under existing rules, His Royal Highness has not the means of meeting such applications.

"There are at this moment no less than sixty young men, who have passed the requisite examination for Commissions, on the non-purchase list. The first on that list qualified upwards of two years since; and as forty Commissions annually are reserved for the Gentlemen Cadets of the Royal Military College, and some others are given to deserving Non-commissioned Officers, His Royal Highness sees no possibility of ever being able to fulfil the hopes of those on the non-purchase list who are looking to be provided for."

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

IN pursuance of an Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of the Colony of Victoria, passed in the nineteenth year of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled, *An Act to provide for the Election of Members to serve in the Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly of Victoria respectively*, I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this my Proclamation abolish the polling places already appointed for the divisions of the North-Western Province, mentioned in the first column of the schedule hereunto annexed; and, with the advice aforesaid, I do hereby appoint that the places mentioned in the second column of the said schedule shall be the polling places for the said divisions for the purpose of taking the poll at any contested election for the said province; and that all votes in respect of qualifications within the boundaries and limits referred to in the last column of the same schedule shall be taken at any election for such province at the polling places mentioned in the said second column opposite to the names of the respective divisions, that is to say:—

GIPPS LAND DECLARED A CLEAN DISTRICT UNDER THE PLEURO-PNEUMONIA ACT, No. 136.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Parliament of Victoria (Number 136), intituled, "An Act to amend an Act intituled *An Act to prevent the further spread of the disease in Cattle called Pleuro-pneumonia*," it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council may, by Proclamation which shall be published in the *Government Gazette*, declare any part of the colony in which the said disease is not known to exist, a "clean district," and shall by such Proclamation define the boundaries of every such district, and after such publication no cattle, unless certified to be free from disease by a commissioner appointed for that purpose, shall be taken into any such district until such Proclamation is revoked: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do by this my Proclamation declare the district of Gipps Land, the boundaries whereof are hereinafter defined, to be "a clean district" within the meaning and subject to the provisions of the said Act, that is to say:—

THE DISTRICT OF GIPPS LAND—Bounded on the south and east by the sea; on the north by a line running in a westerly direction from Cape Howe to the source of the nearest tributary of the Murray and the Australian Alps; again on the west by the Alps and the counties of Evelyn and Mornington.

THE UNITED TOWN AND FARMERS' COMMON OF KEILOR AND MARIBYRNONG.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act, 1862*, it is amongst other things enacted, that where there are two or more neighboring commons the Governor in Council may proclaim that the same shall be a common under the name of "The United Town and Gold Field (or, as the case may be) Common of " " for the benefit of all persons entitled to commonage on either." And whereas by a Proclamation under the hand of the Governor and the seal of the colony, bearing date the eighteenth day of February, 1861, a certain area therein described was proclaimed to be a Town Common, for the use of the inhabitants of the Town of Keilor: And whereas by another Proclamation bearing date the fifteenth day of July, 1861, one of the areas therein described as near Keilor, county of Bourke, parish of Maribyrnong, was proclaimed a Farmers' Common: And whereas it is expedient to unite the said commons: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim that the said Town Common and Farmers' Common respectively described in the Proclamations hereinbefore mentioned shall be a Common, under the name of "The United Town and Farmers' Common of Keilor and Maribyrnong," for the benefit of all persons entitled to commonage on either of the said commons.

THE Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of the petition hereinafter set forth, signed by two hundred and forty-one householders resident within the municipal district of Sandridge, praying that an adjoining area may be united with and may form part of the said municipal district.

The petitioners state that they are householders resident within the present limits of the municipal district of Sandridge, and that they are desirous of its limits and boundaries being altered.

They represent that the district comprises only about seven hundred and sixty acres, and is considerably less in extent than the other littoral municipalities of Brighton, St. Kilda, Emerald Hill, and Williamstown; and that while these municipalities enjoy the advantages of a large sea frontage, and two of them a good river frontage also, Sandridge has no river frontage, and only sixty-two chains of frontage to the Bay, of which about fifteen and a half chains are taken up by the reserve of the Melbourne and Hobson's Bay Railway Company and another part by military works.

Lastly, they urge that the restricted area of their district debars them from many advantages, such as the carrying out of needful sanitary measures and other matters of local importance, and subjects them to numerous disabilities, among which is their inability to project a road so as to establish direct communication with the metropolis independently of the control of any other district.

And the petitioners pray as follows:—

"Your petitioners therefore humbly pray that your Excellency will be pleased to exercise the powers vested in your Excellency by the clause aforesaid [§ 2 of 18 Victoria No. 15], and alter and vary the limits of the municipal district of Sandridge so as to include the area described below, that is to say: Commencing at the south-eastern angle of the present boundary line of the municipal district of Sandridge; thence following the said boundary line in a northerly and westerly direction until it strikes the banks of the River Yarra Yarra; thence along the south banks of the said river in a westerly direction as far as to the municipal limits of Footscray; thence following said municipal limits in a southerly and westerly direction until the banks of the River Yarra Yarra are again reached; thence following the banks of said river southerly to its junction with Hobson's Bay; thence following the high-water line of Hobson's Bay in an easterly direction as far as to the commencing point, as indicated upon the plan herewith forwarded."

BELVOIR TOWN COMMON.

RULES and Regulations for the management of the Belvoir Town Common.

1. The town common shall be held to include all that portion of land granted by Proclamation in the *Government Gazette* of the 6th September, 1861, together with the unalienated portions of the township, as defined by Proclamation in the *Government Gazette* of the 8th March, 1861.

2. Every resident householder within the township shall be entitled to depasture four head of cattle on the common; and in addition to this number, all householders cultivating land shall be entitled to run one head of cattle for every four acres of land cultivated by them.

3. All persons depasturing cattle upon the common shall be required to take out a license, and pay fees for same at the rate of Twelve shillings per head per annum for horses and Eight shillings per head per annum for horned cattle, payable quarterly in advance. Quarter days to be on the first of January, April, July, and October respectively.

4. The managers shall have the power to grant special licenses, as authorised by *The Land Act for 1862*, for depasturing any larger number of cattle at the same rates as above mentioned. The term or period for which such special licenses are granted to be subject to the approval of the managers.

5. Cattle under twelve months of age, the progeny of cattle depastured under license upon the common, to be free; but no bulls or entire horses over the age of nine months to be depastured upon the common without the written sanction of the managers.

6. Sheep, goats, and swine trespassing upon the common shall be dealt with as the law directs.

7. All persons placing cattle on the common shall deliver them into the charge of the herdsman, to whom they shall produce the license for depasturing same, which shall be thereupon signed by the herdsman, and a copy thereof entered in the herd book.

8. The managers shall elect a chairman and treasurer, and appoint a secretary; and they shall hold a meeting on the first Monday in every month, to examine the books, and transact any other business that may arise.

9. The secretary shall enter upon the register the names and residence of all persons entitled to depasture cattle upon the common, together with the number, brands, and description of the cattle for which licenses have been issued. He may receive the fees payable thereon, which shall be handed over to the treasurer at the next succeeding meeting of the board of managers.

10. The treasurer shall bank, on behalf of the managers, all moneys received by him. Payments are to be made by cheque only, signed by the treasurer and countersigned by the secretary.

11. The situation of herdsman to be advertised for; and before appointment he shall be required to produce satisfactory testimonials as to character and ability, and to enter into security with the managers for the safety of all cattle committed to his charge.

12. The herdsman shall be permitted to run three head of working horses upon the common free of charge. He shall be paid from the fees derivable from the common, not exceeding an amount to be determined upon by the managers; in addition to which he shall receive one half the fees derivable from the impounding of cattle from off the common lands.

13. Any surplus funds that may be at the disposal of the board to be expended in the eradication of thistles, the construction of stockyards, or for any other local purpose sanctioned by the managers, and approved of by the Board of Land and Works.

BALLAN TOWN COMMON.

RULES and Regulations for the management of the Ballan Town Common.

1. Every resident householder within the boundaries of the township shall be entitled to right of commonage.

2. That in respect of such right he shall be allowed to depasture thereon four head of cattle or two horses, or two head of cattle and one horse, or four goats, or two goats and one horse; and all stock above nine months old to be counted as per head, except goats, which shall be counted as per head over four months of age.

3. No person shall be allowed to run bulls or entire horses on the common, over nine months old, without the consent of the managers.

4. The fees to be charged for depasturing stock on the common shall be as follows:—All horse stock, fivepence per head per week; all bullocks, cows, goats, and other stock, threepence per head per week.

5. Each person previously to depasturing stock upon the common shall be required to apply at the office of the managers to have his name, with the brands and description of his stock, entered on the managers' books, and shall receive from them or their secretary a receipt for the same, together with an order to the herdsman for the reception of his stock upon the common.

6. All persons depasturing stock upon the common shall be required to produce to the herdsman his authority for so doing, which must be signed by one of the managers or their secretary,

and the herdsman shall sign the same and enter a copy of it in the herd book. All cattle and goats shall then be branded by the herdsman B.C. (the common brand), on the off rump, with pitch.

7. All persons not entitled to depasture stock upon the common, and who shall, during the summer months, be desirous of watering their stock within the boundary of the common, must first obtain permission to do so from one of the managers; and upon such permission being given in writing the person so authorised shall have his stock driven to and from the said watering place, and shall not be allowed to depasture the same on the common.

8. That if any stock belonging to the common be impounded from private land, the herdsman shall be required to pay half the fees for such impounding, the other half to be borne by the owner of such cattle so impounded; and also when any cattle, sheep, horses, or other stock are impounded by the herdsman, the fees derivable from the same shall be equally divided between the herdsman and the commonage fund.

9. That although the number of stock is limited as above to each householder, in the event of there being less than 100 head of stock on the common, any householder shall be entitled to depasture one head or more of stock on the common, in addition to what he would be entitled to by rule 2, on payment of one penny per head per week in addition to the usual fees to the commonage fund; application for such rights to be made to the managers, and such claims be admitted by priority of application, and subject also to the discretion of the managers.

10. No pigs to be allowed on the common, and no geese shall be allowed in the waterholes during the summer months when the river does not run.

11. All fees to be paid quarterly in advance to the treasurer; and in the event of fees not being paid, the horses, cattle or other stock chargeable will be impounded.



And whereas the street, court, or alley enumerated in the schedule to this order annexed marked A, has not been sufficiently paved, flagged, macadamized, levelled, drained, and sewered, or otherwise completed or repaired, to the satisfaction of the council of the city of Melbourne:

Be it now ordered by the council of this the said city, that the streets, courts, or alleys enumerated in the schedule to this order annexed marked A shall, within ten days from the date of this order's coming into operation, be freed from obstruction, paved, flagged, macadamized, levelled, drained, and sewered, in such manner as is expressed in the schedule to this order annexed marked B; and it is hereby notified to the owners respectively of the tenements adjoining or abutting upon the street, court, or alley enumerated in the schedule to this order annexed marked A, that if they or any of them shall neglect or omit to remove the obstructions, and pave, flag, macadamize, level, drain, and sewer, or otherwise complete and repair the street, court, or alley on which their respective tenements adjoin or abut, in the manner and within the time expressed in this order, then the council of the said city will remove all obstructions in the said streets, courts, or alleys, and pave, flag, macadamize, level, drain, sewer, and otherwise complete or repair the same, or such parts thereof as shall not have been so done pursuant to this order; and will thereupon ascertain, determine, and charge such respective owners with their several proportionate part of the costs, charges, and expenses thereof, according to, and co-extensive with, their respective tenements adjoining or abutting on such street, court, or alley, having regard in such apportionment to the state and condition in which the pavement, flagging, macadamizing, levelling, draining, and sewerage of such street, court, or alley respectively, or any part thereof, shall or may be at the time of making this order.

SCHEDULE B, REFERRED TO IN THIS ORDER.

Manner in which the Streets, Courts, and Alleys enumerated in Schedule A, referred to in this Order, are ordered to be freed from obstruction, paved, flagged, macadamized, levelled drained, and sewerd:—

The natural soil is to be reduced or made up as the case may require, so that the longitudinal section of the whole street, court, or alley, shall in no part have an inclination of less than 1 in 20, and where practicable, the entire length is to form one incline. In laying on any stuff it is to spread in layers of not more than 1 foot thick. The transverse section of the street, court, or alley, is to show a roadway whose crown shall be 1 inch above the kerbs of the footways, and in the fall from the crown of the water-channels is to be at the rate of 1 in 25.

On either side of the roadway there is to be a water-channel 18 inches wide, consisting of two rows of bluestone pitchers, 9 inches deep, and not less than 9 inches by 14 inches on the surface, with upright sides, set in loam, and rammed with a rammer weighing 40 lb., so as to subside 4 inches.

The bottom of the channel is to be 7 inches below the top of the kerbs.

On either side of the roadway there is also to be a footway not more than 3 feet wide, and these are to be separated from the roadway by a redgum plank or kerb 10 inches by 3 inches, set on edge, and fastened with 5-inch spikes to piles 4 inches by 4 inches of redgum 3 feet long, driven into the soil.

The footways are to be covered with a coat of gravel 3 inches thick, and the surface is to fall towards the channel at the rate of 1 in 10. The roadway is to be covered with a coat of broken metal, broken to 2½ inch gauge, and laid on 7 inches thick at the channels, and 8 inches at the crown, and this, when necessary, is to be covered with a coat of loam 1½ inch thick.

Whenever private entrances lead from the streets, courts, or alleys, they are to be paved to the full width with bluestone pitchers, in the same manner as the channels. Paving is to be extended from the channels towards the line of houses or fences so as to cross the entire footway.

The whole of the work must be done under the inspection and subject to the approval of the city surveyor, who is authorised to order any deviation from these general principles which the particularities of any case may require.

SEVENTH Half-yearly Report of the Municipal Council of Brighton, for the half-year ending 11th August, 1862.

The annual election of councillors in place of Councillors Harbison, Stone, and Milemore, whose term of office expired on the 11th February, 1862 (Councillor Milemore's seat having previously been declared vacant from non-attendance), took place on the 15th of that month, and resulted in the re-election of Councillors Harbison and Stone, and the election of Isaac Younghusband, Esq., all of whom accepted office.

The following elections were made by the council at their first meeting, on the 17th February:—
Councillor Hammond was elected chairman for the current year.

The Chairman and Councillors Harbison and Stone, the finance committee.

The Chairman and Councillors Harbison and Younghusband, the public works committee.

Councillors Rusden, Keys, and Stone, the market and also the health committee.

The Chairman and Councillors Rusden and Stone, the Legislative Committee; and Councillors Keys, Harbison, and Stone, the licensing committee.

Councillor Webb having resigned his seat on the 17th February, J. J. Blundell, Esq., was elected on the 22nd March; and Councillor Rusden having resigned on the 19th May, J. H. Were, Esq., was elected on the 28th June, both in place of the respective councillors who had previously resigned their seats; and the gentlemen so elected accepted office.

Councillor Blundell was, in place of Councillor Rusden, elected on the 9th June a member of the health committee, and on the 11th August a member of the legislative committee.

Mr. R. D. Bust having, on the 31st March, tendered his resignation as town clerk, the same was accepted by the council, as from the 17th of that month. The council advertised for candidates, and on the 28th April elected Mr. David Prophet, who accepted the office of town clerk, and entered on his duties on the 12th May.

The office of inspector of nuisances having become vacant, Sergeant Keohane, of the police, was, on the 16th of June, appointed to that office.

5. Formation at terrace on Beach road, £49.
6. Formation of Church street, £37.
7. Fencing court house reserve, £63 10s.

The works Nos. 1, 2, and 3 were completed during the half-year, but the others were at the close thereof only in progress of completion.

Other miscellaneous works were undertaken and completed during the half-year.

The following works, in progress at the close of the last half-yearly report, were completed during the half-year:—

1. Culverts and crossings in Bay street and New road.
2. Cutting, filling, and crossings in St. Andrew's street.
3. Formation, metalling, pitching, and culverts in Park street.

5. Formation and water-tables in Wellington street and Barkly street.
6. Cutting, formation, and culverts in Carpenter street.

9. Cutting and forming Cochran street (only partially completed).

In the course of the half-year the council had under consideration many plans for the drainage of the town and other works, but the more important are still in abeyance; though at the close of the half-year the council had so far determined, that they will be able now to carry out various important works.
