THE attention of Heads of Departments is requested to the undermentioned extracts from the Store and Transport Regulations:—

REQUISITIONS.

16. Requisitions are to be addressed to the Government Storekeeper upon the authorised form (No. 1), and are to be rendered as follows, viz.:-

Stores, on or before the 1st January, 1st April, 1st July, and 1st October, respectively.

Fuel and light, on the dates specified for stores.

Articles for building and manufacturing purposes, from time to time as required. The requisitionist must, however, give timely notice of his requirements.

All heads of departments are expressly enjoined to transmit their quarterly applications in due time. No supplies will be furnished until fourteen days after the receipt of the requisition.

19. The Government Storekeeper, unless with the especial sanction of the minister concerned, is on no account to furnish supplies to any department for which timely provision, as directed by these regulations, shall have been neglected.

BOARD OF EDUCATION.

SECULAR INSTRUCTION.

THE attention of Local Committees of Schools is called to the 11th section of the Common Schools Act, which enacts, "That in every school receiving aid from the consolidated revenue, four hours shall be set apart during each school day for secular instruction alone, and of such four hours two shall be before noon, two afternoon, and shall in each case be consecutive."

The Board of Education will not feel themselves warranted in making grants to any school in which the above provision is not complied with.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act, 1862*, it is amongst other things enacted, that when any Crown land remains unsold in or within five miles of any municipal district, or upon or within five miles of any gold field, or in or within five miles of any town not contained in any municipal district, or within any agricultural area of which at least one-fourth part has been selected, the Governor in Council may proclaim such land to be a municipal common, or a gold fields common, or a town common, or a farmers' common respectively, as the case may be; and it is also enacted that the Governor in Council may at any time increase, diminish, alter, or abolish any common proclaimed before or after the passing of the said Act: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the lands hereinafter mentioned in accordance with the above recited provisions of the said Act, that is to say:—

THE DUNKELD TOWN COMMON, for all householders in the town of Dunkeld, shall comprise the following area, viz.:—Commencing at the north-east corner of suburban allotment (Dunkeld) No. 22; thence bearing north one hundred and five chains; thence east one hundred and eighteen chains to the River Wannon; and thence by the river to the commencing point, the area being 1000 acres, more or less.—(62.E.4337.)

THE FOOTSCRAY TOWN COMMON, described in a Proclamation bearing date the third day of June, 1861, is hereby increased by adding thereto the following area, viz.:—One hundred and sixty-eight acres, more or less, county of Bourke, parish of Doutta Galla: Commencing on the north boundary of the township of Footscray at its intersection with the east bank of the Saltwater River; thence bounded on the north by the said north boundary, bearing east thirty-two chains, more or less, to the north-east angle of the township; thence on the east by the east boundary of the said township, bearing south forty-eight chains fifty links, more or less, to the north bank of the River Yarra Yarra; thence on the south by that bank, bearing westerly to its intersection with the said east bank of the Saltwater River; and thence on the west by that bank, bearing northerly to the point of commencement.—(62.E.6931.)

THE GEELONG TOWN COMMON.—The common described in a Proclamation bearing date the first day of September instant, as the municipal common for all householders in the corporate town of Geelong, is hereby increased by adding thereto the following area, viz.:—In the parish of Moolap, marked B, all that piece of ground commencing at the north-east corner of the town boundary; thence by a line bearing south forty-six chains to the north side of the Point Henry road; thence bearing eastward eighty-three chains by the north side of the Point Henry road; thence by a line bearing north to Corio Bay; thence by Corio Bay to the point of commencement. About 285 acres.—(62.E.7407.)

THE KYNETON MUNICIPAL COMMON, for all householders in the municipal district of Kyneton, shall comprise all the unappropriated Crown lands within the municipal district of Kyneton, as indicated on a plan deposited at the Office of Lands and Survey, Melbourne.—(62.F.7861.)

REGISTRAR GENERAL'S REPORT ON THE VITAL STATISTICS OF MELBOURNE AND SUBURBS DURING THE MONTH OF AUGUST, 1862.

ACTUAL Daily Mortality of persons of both sexes under and over five years of age in the Statistical District of Melbourne and suburbs, embracing a radius of ten miles, and including the Statistical Sub-districts of Melbourne Proper, East Melbourne, North Melbourne and Carlton, Fitz Roy Municipality, East Collingwood, Richmond, Joka-joka parish (exclusive of North Melbourne, Collingwood, and Richmond), South Yarra and Prahran, Emerald Hill and Sandridge, St. Kilda and Brighton, Doutta Galla and Keilor, Boroondara and Heidelberg, Cut-paw-paw parish, and the shipping in Hobson's Bay; also, the Temperature in the shade at Melbourne, deduced from the mean of twenty-four hourly observations taken at the Flagstaff Observatory on each day during the month of August, 1862:—

The returns of all the districts in Melbourne and suburbs for the month of August only show a total of 190 deaths. This is less by 17 deaths than the mortality obtaining in July, which was referred to in the report for that month as being unusually low. In August, 1861, 268 deaths, and in August, 1860, 286 deaths occurred, or an average, for the two years, of 87 deaths more than in August, 1862.

The mean temperature for the month was 50°, against 49.2° for August in 1861, and against 49.4° for August, 1860. The highest point indicated by the thermometer (73°) was at 2 p.m. on the 26th, and the lowest (33°) at 7 a.m. on the 4th; the range for the month thus being 40°. The greatest range (23.1°) occurred on the 31st, from a maximum of 59.8° to a minimum of 36.7°; and the least (3.7°) on the 11th, from a maximum of 47° to a minimum of 43.3°. The mean daily range was 13.5°. The extremes of atmospheric pressure (30.432 in. and 29.508 in.) were respectively, at 10 a.m. on the 29th and at 3 p.m. on the 11th; the range for the month being .924 in. The mean pressure of the month was 30.014 in., against 30.036 in. for August, 1861, and against 30.173 in. for August, 1860.

The mean temperature, number of deaths, and daily average of mortality for the first four weeks in August, were as follow:—

Of the 190 deaths which occurred during the month, 111 (identical with the number for July) were of males, and 79 of females, and the proportions about 58 and 42 per cent.; 81, or 43 per cent., were of children under five years of age, and 109, or 57 per

cent., of persons beyond that age; in July these latter proportions were 46 and 51 per cent., and in June the same as those shown for the month under review. It will be remarked that for the last three months the mortality of the younger portion of the community has been exceeded by that of the older.

The days of greatest mortality were the 1st, 13th, 22nd, and 30th: 10 deaths took place on the first and two latter days, and 11 on the second named day; only 2 deaths appear to have occurred on the 7th and 20th.

Five deaths of persons who had attained an advanced stage of life may be quoted, viz., 2 men each at seventy-eight years, and 3 women, whose respective ages were seventy-seven, seventy-eight, and eighty-seven. The causes which induced the deaths of these aged persons were, as regards the former, paralysis and liver disease, and the latter bronchitis, old age, and disease of the lungs.

Fifteen deaths were the result of violent or external causes, and occurred thus:—Two men, a carpenter and a laborer, aged 58 and 35, died from injuries received on railways; another laborer, of 33 years of age, died in consequence of fracture of the skull; a mariner, a turner, and a man whose occupation was not stated, were drowned, the former in Hobson's Bay, and the two latter in the Yarra, their respective ages being 40, 40, and 32; a carter, aged 23, was killed by a runaway horse; a storekeeper, aged 43, died from the effects of traumatic tetanus (or lock-jaw, the result of injury); a plasterer, aged 58, was accidentally killed; at the Australian Dock, a seaman, aged 32, died in consequence of suffocation; and a man described as a musician, and of 55 years of age, cut his throat. There were four accidental deaths to females, viz.:—A woman, aged 54, from the effects of lead poisoning; another, aged 38, from drowning in the River Yarra; and two infants, whose respective ages were 9 weeks and 12 days, from accidental suffocation. It is to be regretted that more definite particulars did not accompany the reports of many of these deaths.

The deaths which occurred in the public and charitable institutions numbered 43, or about 23 per cent. of the total mortality, and took place thus:—In the Melbourne Hospital, 24; in the Lying-in Hospital, 2; Immigrants' Home, 5; Immigrants' Hospital, 1; Yarra Bend Lunatic Asylum, 8; and in the Benevolent Asylum, 3.

The following table shows the number of persons of all ages according to the last census, the number of deaths of persons under and over five years of age, the total at all ages, and the number of deaths to every 1000 of the population during the month of August, 1862, in the Statistical District of Melbourne and suburbs, and in each of the sub-districts of which it is composed:—

Of the 81 deaths which took place among children under five years of age, 45, or nearly 56 per cent., were of males, and 36, or about 44 per cent., of females; 50 were under one year old, 16 between one and two years, 6 between two and three, 5 between three and four, and 4 between four and five years.

Of the 109 deaths of persons over five years of age, 66, or 60 per cent., were of males, and 43, or 40 per cent., of females; 6 were between five and ten years of age, 2 between ten and fifteen, 2 between fifteen and twenty, 3 between twenty and twenty-five, 13 between twenty-five and thirty, 19 between thirty and thirty-five, 10 between thirty-five and forty, 15 between forty and forty-five, 6 between forty-five and fifty, 11 between fifty and fifty-five, 7 between fifty-five and sixty, 8 between sixty and sixty-five, 1 between sixty-five and seventy, 1 between seventy and seventy-five, and 5 of seventy-five and upwards.

ANNEXATION TO SANDBRIDGE.

THE Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of the petition hereinafter set forth, signed by two hundred and forty-one householders resident within the municipal district of Sandridge, praying that an adjoining area may be united with and may form part of the said municipal district.

The petitioners state that they are householders resident within the present limits of the municipal district of Sandridge, and that they are desirous of its limits and boundaries being altered.

They represent that the district comprises only about seven hundred and sixty acres, and is considerably less in extent than the other littoral municipalities of Brighton, St. Kilda, Emerald Hill, and Williamstown; and that while these municipalities enjoy the advantages of a large sea frontage, and two of them a good river frontage also, Sandridge has no river frontage, and only sixty-two chains of frontage to the Bay, of which about fifteen and a half chains are taken up by the reserve of the Melbourne and Hobson's Bay Railway Company and another part by military works.

Lastly, they urge that the restricted area of their district debars them from many advantages, such as the carrying out of needful sanitary measures and other matters of local importance, and subjects them to numerous disabilities, among which is their inability to project a road so as to establish direct communication with the metropolis independently of the control of any other district.

And the petitioners pray as follows:—

"Your petitioners therefore humbly pray that your Excellency will be pleased to exercise the powers vested in your Excellency by the clause aforesaid [§ 2 of 18 Victoria No. 15], and alter and vary the limits of the municipal district of Sandridge so as to include the area described below, that is to say: Commencing at the south-eastern angle of the present boundary line of the municipal district of Sandridge; thence following the said boundary line in a northerly and westerly direction until it strikes the banks of the River Yarra Yarra; thence along the south banks of the said river in a westerly direction as far as to the municipal limits of Footscray; thence following said municipal limits in a southerly and westerly direction until the banks of the River Yarra Yarra are again reached; thence following the banks of said river southerly to its junction with Hobson's Bay; thence following the high-water line of Hobson's Bay in an easterly direction as far as to the commencing point, as indicated upon the plan herewith forwarded."

BYE-LAW No. 34.—TO REGULATE THE ELECTION OF MANAGERS FOR THE TOWN COMMON FOR THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF BALLAARAT.

THAT the election of managers for the town common of the municipal district of Ballarat, under the provisions of the Land Act, Victoria, 1862, shall take place at the Town Hall, on the first Monday of November in each year.

2. That one month before any such election shall take place the chairman of the municipal council shall give public notice, by two consecutive insertions in the local papers and by placards posted in the district, requiring all applications for the office to be sent in to the town clerk at least three days before the day of election; each application to be signed by the candidate, and accompanied by a recommendation signed by six resident householders within the said municipal district.

3. Should more than three applications for the office of managers be sent in, the municipal council shall proceed by ballot to the election of managers from the applications.

4. In the event of the death or resignation of any manager appointed under this bye-law, the municipal council shall at once proceed to appoint a successor in the manner provided in the 2 and 3 sections.

5. Should any charge be brought against any manager, appointed under this bye-law, of inefficiency or neglect in the discharge of his duties, it shall be competent for any member of the said council to give notice that such manager or managers shall be removed; and upon such motion being carried in the affirmative, such manager or managers shall be removed accordingly, and some other person or persons shall be elected instead thereof in the same manner as the first election. The person or persons so elected shall hold office only for the unexpired term of the manager or managers in whose stead he or they shall have been returned.

WHEREAS by the Act of His Excellency the Governor and Parliament of Victoria, 25 Victoria No. 145, intituled, *An Act to consolidate and amend the laws relating to the sale and occupation of Crown Lands*, it is amongst other things enacted, that the municipal council of any municipal district within or in the vicinity of which any town or municipal common, within the meaning of the Act of the Parliament of Victoria No. 117, is situated, shall elect annually, in such manner as they may by bye-law prescribe, three persons to be managers of such common: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council of Buninyong, by and with the assent of His Excellency the Governor in Council—

1. That the election of three persons to be managers of the Buninyong Municipal Common shall be held annually on the 8th day of October in each year, at Eight o'clock in the evening of said day.

2. That at the annual meeting, or any subsequent meeting for the election of a manager or managers for the said common, any member of the municipal council may nominate in writing the names of not more than three persons to be managers thereof, with the consent of the person or persons so nominated; and in case there shall be more persons nominated than vacancies, a ballot shall be taken of the chairman and members present at such meeting of council; and at the conclusion of the said ballot, if there shall be an equality of votes, the chairman shall have a casting vote; and the person or persons elected shall be declared to be the managers, or a manager, as the case may be, of the Buninyong Municipal Common, under the provisions of the Act aforesaid.

3. That should any manager be removed by order of the municipal council of Buninyong, a meeting for the election of a successor to the manager so removed shall be held within twenty-one days from the date of such removal; the day for holding such meeting to be appointed at the regular meeting of the council which shall be held next after the date of the removal of a manager as aforesaid; such meeting to be held at the same hour and place, and conducted in the same manner as hereinbefore provided.—(62. W. 6145.)

WHEREAS by an Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of New South Wales, 14 Victoria No. 20, intitled, *An Act for regulating the formation, drainage, and repair of Streets, Courts, and Alleys, on private Property within the City of Melbourne*, it is amongst other things enacted, that where any street, court, or alley on private property in the city of Melbourne shall not be, or shall not have been, sufficiently paved; flagged, macadamized, levelled, drained, or sewered, or otherwise completed or repaired, to the satisfaction of the council of the said city, it shall be lawful for the said council at any time, and from time to time, by any order under the hand of the mayor or town clerk of the said city for the time being respectively, to order that any such street, court, or alley, or any part thereof shall be freed from obstruction, paved, flagged, macadamized, levelled, drained, and sewered, or otherwise completed or repaired, in such manner and within such time as to the said council may appear expedient, and thereupon the owners of the tenements adjoining or abutting upon such street, court, or alley, on each side thereof, shall in such manner and within such time as shall be expressed in such order, at their respective costs, charges, and expenses, remove all obstructions, and well and sufficiently pave, flag, and macadamize, level, drain, and sewer, or otherwise complete or repair so much of the said street, court, or alley, to the centre thereof, as may be opposite to and co-extensive with their respective tenements, adjoining or abutting on such streets, courts, or alleys respectively:

And whereas the street, court, or alley enumerated in the schedule to this order annexed marked A, has not been sufficiently paved, flagged, macadamized, levelled, drained, and sewered, or otherwise completed or repaired, to the satisfaction of the council of the city of Melbourne:

Be it now ordered by the council of this the said city, that the streets, courts, or alleys enumerated in the schedule to this order annexed marked A shall, within ten days from the date of this order's coming into operation, be freed from obstruction, paved, flagged, macadamized, levelled, drained, and sewered, in such manner as is expressed in the schedule to this order annexed marked B; and it is hereby notified to the owners respectively of the tenements adjoining or abutting upon the street, court, or alley enumerated in the schedule to this order annexed marked A, that if they or any of them shall neglect or omit to remove the obstructions, and pave, flag, macadamize, level, drain, and sewer, or otherwise complete and repair the street, court, or alley on which their respective tenements adjoin or abut, in the manner and within the time expressed in this order, then the council of the said city will remove all obstructions in the said streets, courts, or alleys, and pave, flag, macadamize, level, drain, sewer, and otherwise complete or repair the same, or such parts thereof as shall not have been so done pursuant to this order; and will thereupon ascertain, determine, and charge such respective owners with their several proportionate part of the costs, charges, and expenses thereof, according to, and co-extensive with, their respective tenements adjoining or abutting on such street, court, or alley, having regard in such apportionment to the state and condition in which the pavement, flagging, macadamizing, levelling, draining, and sewerage of such street, court, or alley respectively, or any part thereof, shall or may be at the time of making this order.

SCHEDULE B, REFERRED TO IN THIS ORDER.

Manner in which the Streets, Courts, and Alleys enumerated in Schedule A, referred to in this Order, are ordered to be freed from obstruction, paved, flagged, macadamized, levelled, drained, and sewered:—

The natural soil is to be reduced or made up as the case may require, so that the longitudinal section of the whole street, court, or alley shall in no part have an inclination of less than 1 in 20, and where practicable, the entire length is to form one incline. In laying on any stuff it is to be spread in layers of not more than 1 foot thick. The transverse section of the street, court, or alley, is to show a roadway whose crown shall be 1 inch above the kerbs of the footways, and in the fall from the crown of the water-channels is to be at the rate of 1 in 25.

On either side of the roadway there is to be a water-channel 18 inches wide, consisting of two rows of bluestone pitchers, 9 inches deep, and not less than 9 inches by 14 inches on the surface, with upright sides, set in loam, and rammed with a rammer weighing 40 lb., so as to subside 4 inches.

The bottom of the channel is to be 7 inches below the top of the kerbs.

On either side of the roadway there is also to be a footway not more than 3 feet wide, and these are to be separated from the roadway by a redgum plank or kerb 10 inches by 3 inches, set on edge, and fastened with 5-inch spikes to piles 4 inches by 4 inches of redgum 3 feet long, driven into the soil.

The footways are to be covered with a coat of gravel 3 inches thick, and the surface is to fall towards the channel at the rate of 1 in 10. The roadway is to be covered with a coat of broken metal, broken to 2½ inch gauge, and laid on 7 inches thick at the channels, and 8 inches at the crown, and this, when necessary, is to be covered with a coat of loam 1½ inch thick.

Whenever private entrances lead from the streets, courts, or alleys, they are to be paved to the full width with bluestone pitchers, in the same manner as the channels. Paving is to be extended from the channels towards the line of houses or fences so as to cross the entire footway.

The whole of the work must be done under the inspection and subject to the approval of the city surveyor, who is authorized to order any deviation from these general principles which the particularities of any case may require.


