DEPOSITS BY CONTRACTORS FOR ROADS AND BRIDGES, ETC.

THE Governor in Council has confirmed the following Regulation of the Board of Land and Works relative to the payment of preliminary deposits by contractors under the Department of Roads and Bridges, viz.:-

Contractors tendering for works under this department, who may reside in Melbourne or its vicinity, are requested to be in attendance personally or by agent at the Board Room, La Trobe street west, at the time of opening the tenders, for the purpose of paying the preliminary deposits and signing the preliminary agreements.

Persons resident in the country districts must transmit with their tenders bank drafts, in favor of the Assistant Commissioner of Roads and Bridges, for the amount of the requisite preliminary deposit, namely, for tenders under £1000, Ten pounds; for tenders exceeding £1000, Twenty-five pounds; and for tenders for annual maintenance of roads contracts, two and a half per cent. on the amount of such tender.

It is requested that preliminary deposits may not be remitted in cash.

Cheques, marked or unmarked, will not under any circumstances be accepted.

The attention of contractors is at the same time drawn to the General Regulations of the Board of Land and Works, dated 13th May, 1863, respecting contracts.

THE PUBLIC HEALTH ACT EXTENDED TO CERTAIN MUNICIPAL DISTRICTS.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session held in the eighteenth year of Her present Majesty's reign (number 13), intituled, *An Act for promoting the Public Health in populous places in the Colony of Victoria*, it was amongst other things enacted, that the said Act, or any clause or section thereof, should apply to such city, town, district, or place in Victoria as the Lieutenant Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, might by Proclamation see fit to direct: And whereas by a Proclamation under the hand of the Governor and the seal of the colony, bearing date the seventh day of July, One thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, the said Act was extended to the municipal district of Sandhurst, as defined by certain boundaries therein referred to: And whereas the said boundaries have been altered, and it is expedient to extend the said Act to the said municipal district in general terms, and also to extend the said Act to the municipal districts of Brown's and Scarsdale, Eaglehawk, and Woodend: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, do, with the advice of the Executive Council, hereby revoke the said Proclamation; and, with the advice aforesaid, I do hereby declare and direct that the said Act shall apply, and be in force within the undermentioned municipal districts, that is to say:-

The municipal district of Brown's and Scarsdale.
The municipal district of Eaglehawk.
The municipal district of Sandhurst.
The municipal district of Woodend.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this twenty-second day of September, in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, and in the twenty-sixth year of Her Majesty's reign.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the eighteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty (Number 14), intituled, *An Act to provide for the Management of Towns and other places in Victoria*, it was amongst other things enacted, that so many of the provisions of the said Act as relate to the good order of towns and other populous places, being sections numbered V., VI., VII., VIII., IX., and X., in the said Act, should extend to and be in force in such cities, towns, districts, and places as the Lieutenant Governor might by Proclamation in the *Government Gazette* declare to come under the operation of the same respectively, or any of them; and it should be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor to define the limits of such places, and to vary and alter such limits and revoke any such Proclamation; and all the other provisions of the said Act except the last (being numbered XXXIX.) should extend to and be in operation throughout Victoria and its dependencies from and after the passing thereof: And whereas by a Proclamation under the hand of the Governor and the seal of the colony, bearing date the twenty-

ninth day of May, One thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, sections V. to X. of the said Act were extended to the municipal district of Sandhurst, as defined by certain boundaries therein referred to: And whereas the said boundaries have been altered, and it is expedient to extend the said sections to the said municipal district in general terms: Now I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby revoke the said Proclamation; and, with the advice aforesaid, I do hereby declare that the municipal district of Sandhurst shall come under the operation of the sections of the said Act numbered respectively V., VI., VII., VIII., IX., and X.

GOD SAVE THE QUEEN!

DISTRIBUTION OF PLANTS, ETC., FROM THE MELBOURNE BOTANIC GARDENS.

THE Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has approved of the subjoined Regulations in reference to the distribution of Plants, Cuttings, and Seeds from the Botanic Gardens of Melbourne, viz.:-

1. Government departments may be supplied with any plants, cuttings, or seeds (fruit trees excepted), as far as such can be made conveniently available without undue abstraction of labor from the general establishment.

2. For the gardens or reserves of public institutions, plants, cuttings, and seeds shall be supplied as far as they are conveniently available, but exclusive of avenue trees or fruit trees.

3. Donors, or gentlemen who have rendered services to the Botanic Garden, may, on their special request, be supplied in a proportion not exceeding the approximate value of their contribution, or in a ratio approximate to the service rendered, with plants, cuttings, seeds, or out flowers, but cannot obtain plants of the ordinary kinds of florists' flowers, or pines, avenue and fruit trees, from the garden.

4. Cut flowers may be supplied for benevolent or artistic purposes, or for public festivals.

5. Plants needed in a fresh state may, when available, be supplied for medicinal purposes.

Plants or seeds of any species promising to be of extensive utility to the colony, may, when available, be distributed in small quantities to private gardens, without restrictions.

7. Interchanges with public and private gardens beyond the colony may be carried on unlimited by the above rules.

The petitioners state that they are householders resident within the present limits of the municipal district of Sandridge, and that they are desirous of its limits and boundaries being altered.

They represent that the district comprises only about seven hundred and sixty acres, and is considerably less in extent than the other littoral municipalities of Brighton, St. Kilda, Emerald Hill, and Williamstown; and that while these municipalities enjoy the advantages of a large sea frontage, and two of them a good river frontage also, Sandridge has no river frontage, and only sixty-two chains of frontage to the Bay, of which about

fifteen and a half chains are taken up by the reserve of the Melbourne and Hobson's Bay Railway Company and another part by military works.

Lastly, they urge that the restricted area of their district debars them from many advantages, such as the carrying out of needful sanitary measures and other matters of local importance, and subjects them to numerous disabilities, among which is their inability to project a road so as to establish direct communication with the metropolis independently of the control of any other district.

And the petitioners pray as follows:-

"Your petitioners therefore humbly pray that your Excellency will be pleased to exercise the powers vested in your Excellency by the clause aforesaid [§ 2 of 18 Victoria No. 15], and alter and vary the limits of the municipal district of Sandridge so as to include the area described below, that is to say: Commencing at the south-eastern angle of the present boundary line of the municipal district of Sandridge; thence following the said boundary line in a northerly and westerly direction until it strikes the banks of the River Yarra Yarra; thence along the south banks of the said river in a westerly direction as far as to the municipal limits of Footscray; thence following said municipal limits in a southerly and westerly direction until the banks of the River Yarra Yarra are again reached; thence following the banks of said river southerly to its junction with Hobson's Bay; thence following the high-water line of Hobson's Bay in an easterly direction as far as to the commencing point, as indicated upon the plan herewith forwarded."

WHEREAS by an Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of New South Wales, 14 Victoria No. 20, intitled. *An Act for regulating the formation, drainage, and repair of Streets, Courts, and Alleys, on private Property within the City of Melbourne*, it is amongst other things enacted, that where any street, court, or alley on private property in the city of Melbourne shall not be, or shall not have been, sufficiently paved, flagged, macadamized, levelled, drained, or sewered, or otherwise completed or repaired, to the satisfaction of the council of the said city, it shall be lawful for the said council at any time, and from time to time, by any order under the hand of the mayor or town clerk of the said city for the time being respectively, to order that any such street, court, or alley, or any part thereof shall be freed from obstruction, paved, flagged, macadamized, levelled, drained, and sewered, or otherwise completed or repaired, in such manner and within such time as to the said council may appear expedient, and thereupon the owners of the tenements adjoining or abutting upon such street, court, or alley, on each side thereof, shall in such manner and within such time as shall be expressed in such order, at their respective costs, charges, and expenses, remove all obstructions, and well and sufficiently pave, flag, and macadamize, level, drain, and sewer, or otherwise complete or repair so much of the said street, court, or alley, to the centre thereof, as may be opposite to and co-extensive with their respective tenements, adjoining or abutting on such streets, courts, or alleys respectively:

And whereas the street, court, or alley enumerated in the schedule to this order annexed marked A, has not been sufficiently paved, flagged, macadamized, levelled, drained, and sewered, or otherwise completed or repaired, to the satisfaction of the council of the city of Melbourne:

Be it now ordered by the council of this the said city, that the streets, courts, or alleys enumerated in the schedule to this order annexed marked A shall, within ten days from the date of this order's coming into operation, be freed from obstruction, paved, flagged, macadamized, levelled, drained, and sewered, in such manner as is expressed in the schedule to this order annexed marked B; and it is hereby notified to the owners respectively of the tenements adjoining or abutting upon the street, court, or alley enumerated in the schedule to this order annexed marked A, that if they or any of them shall neglect or omit to remove the obstructions, and pave, flag, macadamize, level, drain, and sewer, or otherwise complete and repair the street, court, or alley on which their respective tenements adjoin or abut, in the manner and within the time expressed in this order, then the council of the said city will remove all obstructions in the said streets, courts, or alleys, and pave, flag, macadamize, level, drain, sewer, and otherwise complete or repair the same, or such parts thereof as shall not have been so done pursuant to this order; and will thereupon ascertain, determine, and charge such respective owners with their several proportionate part of the costs, charges, and expenses thereof, according to, and co-extensive with, their respective tenements adjoining or abutting on such street, court, or alley, having regard in such apportionment to the state and condition in which the pavement, flagging, macadamizing, levelling, draining, and sewerage of such street, court, or alley respectively, or any part thereof, shall or may be at the time of making this order.

SCHEDULE B, REFERRED TO IN THIS ORDER.

Manner in which the Streets, Courts, and Alleys enumerated in Schedule A, referred to in this Order, are ordered to be freed from obstruction, paved, flagged, macadamized, levelled, drained, and sewered:—

The natural soil is to be reduced or made up as the case may require, so that the longitudinal section of the whole street, court, or alley, shall in no part have an inclination of less than 1 in 20, and where practicable, the entire length is to form one incline. In laying on any stuff it is to spread in layers of not more than 1 foot thick. The transverse section of the street, court, or alley, is to show a roadway whose crown shall be 1 inch above the kerbs of the footways, and in the fall from the crown of the water-channels is to be at the rate of 1 in 25.

On either side of the roadway there is to be a water-channel 18 inches wide, consisting of two rows of bluestone pitchers, 9 inches deep, and not less than 9 inches by 14 inches on the surface, with upright sides, set in loam, and rammed with a rammer weighing 40 lb., so as to subside 4 inches.

The bottom of the channel is to be 7 inches below the top of the kerbs.

On either side of the roadway there is also to be a footway not more than 3 feet wide, and these are to be separated from the roadway by a redgum plank or kerb 10 inches by 3 inches, set on edge, and fastened with 5-inch spikes to piles 4 inches by 4 inches of redgum 3 feet long, driven into the soil.

The footways are to be covered with a coat of gravel 3 inches thick, and the surface is to fall towards the channel at the rate of 1 in 10. The roadway is to be covered with a coat of broken metal, broken to 2½ inch gauge, and laid on 7 inches thick at the channels, and 8 inches at the crown, and this, when necessary, is to be covered with a coat of loam 1½ inch thick.

Whenever private entrances lead from the streets, courts, or alleys, they are to be paved to the full width with bluestone pitchers, in the same manner as the channels. Paving is to be extended from the channels towards the line of houses or fences so as to cross the entire footway.

The whole of the work must be done under the inspection and subject to the approval of the city surveyor, who is authorised to order any deviation from these general principles which the particularities of any case may require. No. 1563




