THE ARARAT POLICE LOCK-UPS DISCONTINUED AS A GAOL.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by two several Proclamations under the Hand of the Governor and the Seal of the Colony, bearing date respectively the ninth day of October, 1857, and the twenty-third day of August, 1859, certain buildings called and known as the Police Lock-ups, situate at Ararat, were declared to be and constitute a gaol, prison, and house of correction, within the meaning of the Act passed in the sixteenth year of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled, *An Act to make provision for the better control and disposal of Offenders*: And whereas it is expedient to discontinue the use of the said premises for the confinement of prisoners under sentence: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby revoke the two several Proclamations hereinbefore mentioned, and do hereby notify that the said premises shall cease to be a gaol, prison, and house of correction.

THE BROADMEADOWS ROAD DISTRICT ALTERED.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by a Proclamation under the Hand of the Governor and the Seal of the Colony, bearing date the twenty-eighth day of April, in the year One thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, the boundaries of "The Broadmeadows Road District" were altered as therein mentioned: And whereas it is deemed necessary and advisable again to alter the boundaries

of such district: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby revoke so much of the said Proclamation as defines the boundaries of the said district; and, with the advice aforesaid, I do hereby proclaim and declare that the said Broadmeadows Road District shall be and comprise so much of the county of Bourke as is included within the area hereinafter specified, that is to say:—

Commencing at the north-west angle of section CL. in the parish of Juka-juka; thence south to the northern boundary of section CXLII. in the said parish; thence west to the Moonee Ponds; thence southerly by the Moonee Ponds to the northern boundary of the municipality of Essendon; thence west by the northern boundary of the said municipality to the centre of the Deep Creek road; thence north-westerly by the centre line of the Deep Creek road to the western boundary of section VI., parish of Tullamarine; thence north by the western boundary of said section VI. and a right line to the Moonee Ponds; thence northwards by the Moonee Ponds, being the western boundary of the parish of Will-will-rook to the parish of Bulla-bulla; thence east by the southern boundary of the parish of Bulla-bulla to the parish of Yuroke; thence north by the western boundary of the parish of Yuroke to the parish of Mickleham; thence west by the southern boundary of the parish of Mickleham aforesaid to the Deep Creek; thence by the said creek north-easterly, being the western boundary of the parish of Mickleham aforesaid to the northern boundary thereof; thence by the northern and part of the eastern boundary of the said parish to the north-west angle of section XXIV. in the parish of Kalkallo; thence east by the northern boundary of the said section to the western boundary of the Sydney road; thence south by the western boundary of the Sydney road to the northern boundary of the parish of Yuroke; thence by part of the northern and by the eastern boundary of that parish to the parish of Will-will-rook; thence by part of the northern and by the eastern and southern boundaries of the said parish of Will-will-rook to the commencing point.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by a Proclamation under the Hand of the Governor and the Seal of the Colony, bearing date the nineteenth day of August, in the year One thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, the boundaries of "The Marong Road District" were defined as therein mentioned: And whereas it is deemed necessary and advisable that the boundaries of the said district should be altered: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby revoke so much of the said Proclamation as describes the said road district; and, with the advice aforesaid, I do hereby proclaim and declare that the boundaries of the said Marong Road District shall be the boundaries hereinafter specified, that is to say:—

Commencing at the south-western angle of the municipality of Sandhurst; thence by the western and northern boundary of the said municipality to the Bendigo Creek; thence northerly by the Bendigo Creek and the western boundary of the Campaspe Road District to the northern boundary of the parish of Huntley; thence by a line due west to the centre of the Loddon River; thence southerly by the centre of the Loddon River to a point opposite the south boundary of the parish of Laanacoorie; thence east by the south boundaries of the parishes of Laanacoorie and Shelbourne to the western boundary of the parish of Ravenswood; thence south to the south-west angle of block 2, parish of Ravenswood; thence east by a direct line to the west boundary of the Strathfieldsaye Road District; thence northerly by the western boundary of said Road District to a point in the southern boundary of the Sandhurst municipality, forty-one chains forty links, more or less, west of the south-east angle of the said municipality; thence westerly by the southern boundary of the said municipality to the commencing point.

—of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General
and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-
Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by a Proclamation under the Hand of the
Governor and the Seal of the Colony, bearing date the
twelfth day of August, in the year One thousand eight hundred
and sixty-one, the boundaries of the Strathfieldsaye Road
District were defined as therein mentioned: And whereas it
is deemed necessary and advisable to alter the boundaries of
such district: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor
of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby
revoke so much of the said Proclamation as defines the bound-
aries of the said district; and, with the advice aforesaid, I do
hereby proclaim and declare that from henceforth the said
Strathfieldsaye Road District shall be and comprise so much of
the colony of Victoria as is included within the area hereinafter
described, that is to say:—

Commencing at the north-east corner of the Sandhurst mu-
nicipality; thence east four hundred and ninety chains to the
west boundary of the parish of Axedale; thence north one
hundred and six chains to the north-west angle of allotment 10,
section XI, of the said parish; thence east by the north bound-
ary of the said parish to the north-east angle of the said
parish; thence south by the eastern boundaries of the parishes
of Axedale, Eppalock, and Lyell to the Myrtle Creek; thence
westerly by the Myrtle Creek to the south-west angle of the
parish of Lyell; thence north to the south-east angle of the
parish of Sedgwick; thence west by the southern boundary of
the said parish to the south-east angle of the parish of Mandu-
rang; thence by the southern and western boundary of the said
parish and a line north-westerly to a point in the southern
boundary of the Sandhurst municipality forty-one chains forty
links, more or less, west of the south-east angle of the said
municipality; thence east by part of the southern boundary to
the south-east angle of the said municipality; thence by the
east boundary of the said municipality to the commencing point.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the twenty-first year of the
reign of Her present Majesty, intitled, *An Act for
amending the Laws relative to the Gold Fields*, it was amongst
other things enacted, that it should be lawful for the Governor
in Council from time to time to erect any portion of the colony
into a mining district, and to give such district some distin-
guishing name, and to define the limits and boundaries thereof,
and also again to abolish any such district, and from time to
time to alter and vary such limits and boundaries: And whereas
by an Order of the Governor in Council, bearing date the fourth
day of January, in the year One thousand eight hundred and
fifty-eight, the several districts therein mentioned were erected
into mining districts: And whereas by another Order in Council,
made on the ninth day of September, 1861, the mining district
of Castlemaine was altered as therein mentioned: And whereas
it is expedient again to alter the said mining district: Now
therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice
of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order alter the
said mining district of Castlemaine, and doth define the limits
and boundaries thereof to be as follow, that is to say:—

THE MINING DISTRICT OF CASTLEMAINE.—Commencing at
the junction of the River Yarra and the Kooyong-koot Creek;
thence south to the main road leading to Gipps Land; thence
by that road to the Dandenong Creek; thence by that creek and
the northern margin of the Carrum Swamp to the sea-coast;
thence by the western, southern, and eastern boundaries of the
county of Mornington to the township of Bunyeep; thence by
the Gipps Land road to the sources of the River La Trobe;
thence by the Main Dividing Range to the Great Dividing Range
forming the basin of the River Yarra; thence by the Great
Dividing Range to the most western source of Mollison's Creek;
thence north-easterly by the Dividing Range to the source of the
McIvor on Patterson's Creek; thence north-westerly to the
junction of the Rivers Coliban and Campaspe; thence by the
River Coliban and the Myrtle Creek to the Mount Alexander
Range; thence by that range to the northern boundary of the
parish of Harcourt; thence by that boundary and a line west
to a point due south of the south-western angle of the parish of
Lockwood; thence north to the south-western angle of the
parish of Lockwood; thence west four miles; thence westerly

to the junction of the Deep Creek and the River Loddon;
thence by the Deep Creek to the parish of Carisbrook; thence
by the northern, eastern, and southern boundaries of that parish,
and again by the Deep Creek, to the junction of the Tullaroop
and Bullarook Creeks; thence by a line east and the range
separating the Bullarook and Joyce's Creeks to the source of
the Bullarook Creek in the Great Dividing Range; thence by
that range and the Bullarook Range to the source of the
Djerriwarrh Creek near Mount Bullarook; thence by the
Djerriwarrh Creek to a point due west of the southern bound-
ary of the village of Pentridge; thence east to the Darebin
Creek; and thence by that Creek and the River Yarra to the
commencing point aforesaid.

the necessary directions herein accordingly.

DEPOSITS BY CONTRACTORS FOR ROADS AND BRIDGES, ETC.

THE Governor in Council has confirmed the following
Regulation of the Board of Land and Works relative to
the payment of preliminary deposits by contractors under the
Department of Roads and Bridges, viz:—

Contractors tendering for works under this department, who
may reside in Melbourne or its vicinity, are requested to be in
attendance personally or by agent at the Board Room, La Trobe
street west, at the time of opening the tenders, for the purpose
of paying the preliminary deposits and signing the preliminary
agreements.

Persons resident in the country districts must transmit with
their tenders bank drafts, in favor of the Assistant Commissioner
of Roads and Bridges, for the amount of the requisite prelimi-
nary deposit, namely, for tenders under £1000, Ten pounds; for
tenders exceeding £1000, Twenty-five pounds; and for tenders
for annual maintenance of roads contracts, two and a half per
cent. on the amount of such tender.

It is requested that preliminary deposits may not be remitted
in cash.

Cheques, marked or unmarked, will not under any circum-
stances be accepted.

The attention of contractors is at the same time drawn to the
General Regulations of the Board of Land and Works, dated
13th May, 1858, respecting contracts.

DISTRIBUTION OF PLANTS, ETC., FROM THE MELBOURNE BOTANIC GARDENS.

THE Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has approved of the subjoined Regulations in reference to the distribution of Plants, Cuttings, and Seeds from the Botanic Gardens of Melbourne, viz.:

1. Government departments may be supplied with any plants, cuttings, or seeds (fruit trees excepted), as far as such can be made conveniently available without undue abstraction of labor from the general establishment.

2. For the gardens or reserves of public institutions, plants, cuttings, and seeds shall be supplied as far as they are conveniently available, but exclusive of avenue trees or fruit trees.

3. Donors, or gentlemen who have rendered services to the Botanic Garden, may, on their special request, be supplied in a proportion not exceeding the approximate value of their contribution, or in a ratio approximate to the service rendered, with plants, cuttings, seeds, or cut flowers, but cannot obtain plants of the ordinary kinds of florists' flowers, or pines, avenue and fruit trees, from the garden.

4. Cut flowers may be supplied for benevolent or artistic purposes, or for public festivals.

5. Plants needed in a fresh state may, when available, be supplied for medicinal purposes.

6. Plants or seeds of any species promising to be of extensive utility to the colony, may, when available, be distributed in small quantities to private gardeners, without restrictions.

7. Interchanges with public and private gardens beyond the colony may be carried on unlimited by the above rules.

THE Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of the petition hereinafter set forth, signed by two hundred and forty-one householders resident within the municipal district of Sandridge, praying that an adjoining area may be united with and may form part of the said municipal district.

The petitioners state that they are householders resident within the present limits of the municipal district of Sandridge, and that they are desirous of its limits and boundaries being altered.

They represent that the district comprises only about seven hundred and sixty acres, and is considerably less in extent than the other littoral municipalities of Brighton, St. Kilda, Emerald Hill, and Williamstown; and that while these municipalities enjoy the advantages of a large sea frontage, and two of them a good river frontage also, Sandridge has no river frontage, and only sixty-two chains of frontage to the Bay, of which about fifteen and a half chains are taken up by the reserve of the Melbourne and Hobson's Bay Railway Company and another part by military works.

Lastly, they urge that the restricted area of their district debars them from many advantages, such as the carrying out of needful sanitary measures and other matters of local importance, and subjects them to numerous disabilities, among which is their inability to project a road so as to establish direct communication with the metropolis independently of the control of any other district.

And the petitioners pray as follows:—

"Your petitioners therefore humbly pray that your Excellency will be pleased to exercise the powers vested in your Excellency by the clause aforesaid [§ 2 of 18 Victoria No. 15], and alter and vary the limits of the municipal district of Sandridge so as to include the area described below, that is to say: Commencing at the south-eastern angle of the present boundary line of the municipal district of Sandridge; thence following the said boundary line in a northerly and westerly direction until it strikes the banks of the River Yarra Yarra; thence along the south banks of the said river in a westerly direction as far as to the municipal limits of Footscray; thence following said municipal limits in a southerly and westerly direction until the banks of the River Yarra Yarra are again reached; thence following the banks of said river southerly to its junction with Hobson's Bay; thence following the high-water line of Hobson's Bay in an easterly direction as far as to the commencing point, as indicated upon the plan herewith forwarded."

WHEREAS by an Act of Council, 18 Victoria No. 15, intitled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted, that every work proposed to be executed by any municipal council by funds raised by aid from the Government; whether by endowment or otherwise, shall be the subject of a distinct and separate bye-law: And whereas the sum of £300 has been granted to the municipal council of Chiltern out of the public revenue for 1862: Be it therefore enacted by the council of the municipal district, that £118, part of the said sum of £300, shall be expended upon Main street, £100 upon Union street, £34 for a bridge over the Township Creek, £20 upon High street, £28 upon Conness street.

The foregoing Bye-law No. 3, made by the municipal council of Chiltern, has been assented to by the Governor in Council.

MUNICIPALITY OF DAYLESFORD.

BYE-LAW No. 17.—FOR THE ELECTION OF MANAGERS OF THE TOWN COMMON OF THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF DAYLESFORD.

WHEREAS by the Act 25 Victoria No. 145, intituled, *An Act to consolidate and amend the Laws relating to the Sale and Occupation of Crown Lands*, it is amongst other things enacted, that the municipal council of any municipal district, within or in the vicinity of which any town common, within the meaning of the Act of the Parliament of Victoria No. 117, is situated, shall elect annually, in such manner as they may by bye-law prescribe, three persons to be managers of such common: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council of Daylesford, on receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor in Council—

That the election of three persons to be managers of the Daylesford Town Common shall be held annually, on the first Tuesday of November in each year, at the hour of Seven o'clock in the evening of said day.

That at the annual meeting, or any subsequent meeting for the election of a manager or managers for the said common, any member of the municipal council may nominate, in writing, the names of not more than three persons to be managers thereof, with the consent of the person or persons so nominated; and in case there should be more persons nominated than vacancies, a ballot shall be taken of the chairman and members present at such meeting of council; and at the conclusion of the said ballot, if there shall be an equality of votes, the chairman shall have the casting vote; and the person or persons elected shall be declared to be the managers, or a manager, as the case may be, of the Daylesford Town Common, under the provisions of the Act aforesaid.

That should any manager be removed by order of the municipal council of Daylesford, a meeting for the election of a successor to the manager so removed shall be held within twenty-one days from the date of such removal; the day for holding such meeting to be appointed at the regular meeting of the council which shall be held next after the date of the removal of a manager as aforesaid; such meeting to be held at the same hour and place, and conducted in the same manner as hereinbefore provided.

The foregoing Bye-law No. 17, made by the municipal council of Daylesford, has been assented to by the Governor in Council.

BYE-LAW No. 24.—FOR AN ASSESSMENT OF HOUSES AND LANDS WITHIN THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF DUNOLLY FOR THE CURRENT MUNICIPAL YEAR 1862-63.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is authorised and empowered to make an annual assessment of all property in houses and lands within the limits of such municipal district according to its fair average annual value: And whereas the council of the municipal district of Dunolly has caused a valuation of all rateable property within the said district to be made, amounting to £10,147: And whereas all appeals against such valuation have been made and determined, and such valuation amended before a justice of the peace at a court of petty sessions held within the said district on the fifth day of September, One thousand eight hundred and sixty-two: And whereas such amended valuation amounts to the sum of £9382 15s.: Be it therefore ordered and enacted by the said municipal council of Dunolly, that all the several properties in houses and lands within the limits of the said district be and the same are hereby assessed for the current municipal year, commencing on the 12th day of June, 1863, and ending on the 12th day of June, 1863, according to the several amounts of annual value respectively affixed to the same in the aforesaid amended valuation or assessment, amounting in the aggregate to the aforesaid sum of £9382 15s.

BYE-LAW No. 25.—FOR LEVYING A RATE OF ONE SHILLING AND SIXPENCE IN THE POUND FOR THE CURRENT MUNICIPAL YEAR 1862-63.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, the council of any municipal district is empowered to levy a rate on the assessment of all property in houses and lands within the limits of such municipal district according to the fair average annual value thereof, such rate not to exceed the sum of Two shillings in the pound of such value: Be it therefore ordered and enacted by the municipal council of Dunolly, that a rate of One shilling and sixpence in the pound for the current municipal year be imposed and levied on the assessment of all properties in houses and lands within the limits of the said municipal district; one moiety thereof to be due and payable twenty days from the delivery of the notices, and the other on and after the 15th day of January, 1863.

The foregoing Bye-laws Nos. 24 and 25, made by the municipal council of Dunolly, has been assented to by the Governor in Council.

MUNICIPALITY OF HAWTHORN.

BYE-LAW No. 11.—FOR EMPOWERING THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF HAWTHORN TO CLOSE ANY STREET, ROAD, RIGHT-OF-WAY, OR FOOTPATH, DURING THE PROGRESS OF ANY WORKS AFFECTING THE SAME.

WHEREAS by the Act of Council 18 Victoria No. 15, intituled, *An Act for the establishment of Municipal Institutions in Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted, that every municipal council shall have the care and management of the roads, streets, paths, and public thoroughfares: And whereas it is expedient to make a bye-law for closing the streets and thoroughfares of the district of Hawthorn during the forming and repairing the same: Be it therefore ordered and directed, that during such time as any of the said streets, roads, lanes, highways, passages, or public places within the said district, shall be under repair, it shall be lawful for the surveyor of the said council to cause so many bars, posts, rails, and chains, or other obstructions, to be fixed, set up, and placed across or along any of the streets, lanes, highways, and passages, or other public places within the said district, to prevent the passing of carriages, carts and drays, horses and cattle, while such works are in progress, as to the surveyor may seem proper.

No person or persons shall throw down, break, remove, damage, or injure any of the said bars, posts, rails, chains, or other obstructions.

Any person or persons guilty of any neglect or breach of this bye-law shall, on conviction, forfeit and pay for every such offence a sum or penalty not exceeding Ten pounds.

The foregoing Bye-law No. 11, made by the municipal council of Hawthorn, has been assented to by the Governor in Council.

BYE-LAW No. 26.—FOR THE ELECTION OF MANAGERS FOR THE TOWN COMMON OF THE MUNICIPAL DISTRICT OF MALDON.

WHEREAS by the Act of His Excellency the Governor and Parliament of Victoria, 25 Victoria No. 145, intituled, *An Act to consolidate and amend the Laws relating to the Sale and Occupation of Crown Lands*, it is amongst other things enacted, that the municipal council of any municipal district, within or in the vicinity of which any town common, within the meaning of the Act of the Parliament of Victoria No. 117, is situated, shall elect annually, in such manner as they may by bye-law prescribe, three persons to be managers of such common: Be it therefore ordered and directed by the municipal council of Maldon, by and with the assent of His Excellency the Governor in Council—

1. That the election of three persons to be managers of the Maldon Town Common shall be held annually, on the first Tuesday of November in each year, at Two o'clock in the afternoon of the said day.

2. That at the annual meeting, or any subsequent meeting for the election of a manager or managers for the said common, any member of the municipal council may nominate, in writing, the names of not more than three persons to be managers thereof, with the consent of the person or persons so nominated; and in case there shall be more persons nominated than vacancies, a ballot shall be taken of the chairman and members present at such meeting of council; and at the conclusion of the said ballot the chairman shall have a casting vote; and the person or persons elected shall be declared to be the manager or managers, as the case may be, of the Maldon Town Common, under the provisions of the Act aforesaid.

3. That should any manager be removed by order of the municipal council of Maldon, a meeting for the election of a successor to the manager so removed shall be held within twenty-one days from the date of such removal; the day for holding such meeting to be appointed at the regular meeting of the council which shall be held next after the date of the removal of a manager as aforesaid; such meeting to be held at the same hour and place, and conducted in the same manner as hereinbefore provided.

The foregoing Bye-law No. 26, made by the municipal council of Maldon, has been assented to by the Governor in Council.

MARONG ROAD DISTRICT.

RULES FOR CONDUCTING THE BUSINESS OF THE MARONG DISTRICT ROAD BOARD.

THE business of the board shall be conducted with open doors; and if at any time interruption be caused by persons present who are not members of the board, the chairman shall require them to withdraw.

2. The regular meetings of the board shall be held at the board-room on the first and third Mondays in every month, at One o'clock p.m., and business shall commence as soon after that hour as a quorum of three shall be in attendance; but if in half an hour after the time named for meeting there be no quorum present, such meeting shall stand adjourned till the next usual day of meeting, and such circumstance, together with the names of the members present, shall be recorded on the minutes.

3. Special meetings may be called by the chairman, or by any two members, by giving not less than three days' notice to each member of the board residing within the district, and the business intended to be introduced at such special meeting shall in all cases be stated in such notice.

ORDER OF BUSINESS.

4. The first business at all meetings of the board shall be the reading of the minutes of any preceding meeting (not previously confirmed), in order to their confirmation, and no discussion shall be permitted thereon except as to their accuracy as a record.

5. The correspondence and memorials shall be read and ordered upon.

6. Memorials to be presented by members only; every such member presenting a memorial shall be responsible for its being in proper form and respectfully worded.

7. Reports of committees to be read.

8. The secretary shall report—

- 1st. Banker's balance.
- 2nd. Liabilities incurred since last meeting.
- 3rd. Amount of rates collected since last meeting.
- 4th. Balance in hands of collector.

9. Orders of the day shall include all business incomplete at a former meeting, all matters of which due notice has been given, and any business which the chairman shall see fit to introduce; and such orders of the day as arise out of former proceedings, or from notice of motion having been given, shall take precedence in the order in which they stand on the minute book and the notice book respectively.

10. When the business arising out of the orders of the day shall have been concluded, notices of motion for the next meeting of the board, containing the name of the proposer, may be handed to the secretary, who shall enter them in a book kept for that purpose.

11. Every member giving notice of motion shall read it aloud, and state the day of bringing on such motion.

12. No motion entered on the notice paper shall be proceeded with unless the member giving such notice, or some member authorised by him, be present when the business is called in order. Notices not so proceeded with shall be either postponed or struck out as the members present shall decide.

ORDER OF DEBATE.

13. The presiding chairman's ruling shall be final on all matters of order or practice, and he shall state the same without comment or argument, except by way of precedent or reading the rule applicable to the case.

14. Any member, except the chairman, desirous of proposing a motion or amendment, or of discussing any matter under consideration, must rise and address the chairman, and no member while speaking shall be interrupted unless called to order, when he shall sit down; in which case the member calling to order shall be heard thereon in preference to any other speaker, and the question of order shall be disposed of by the chairman before the subject be resumed or any other matter entered upon.

15. Any motion or amendment not seconded will not be entertained.

16. When two or more members rise to speak, the chairman shall call upon the member who, in his opinion, first rose in his place.

17. No member shall speak twice on the same motion or amendment, except by way of explanation or in reply upon any original motion of which he may have been the mover, or as the mover of the amendment last proposed; and the chairman shall, without waiting for the interposition of the board, call to order any member proceeding to speak a second time on the same motion or amendment.

18. Any member moving or seconding any motion or amendment shall be held to have spoken upon that motion or amendment.

19. As soon as the debate on any question shall be concluded, the chairman shall put the question distinctly and audibly.

20. No member shall speak to any question after the same shall have been put by the chairman to the meeting.

21. One amendment only shall be discussed at one time, but if lost, another may be moved before the original question is put to the vote; but upon any amendment being carried it shall be competent for any member to move one other amendment upon it but no more.

22. Every motion or amendment shall be entered upon the minutes with the names of the mover and seconder, and on a division thereon the votes shall be recorded.

23. The chairman shall, upon taking the vote upon any motion or amendment, put the question first in the affirmative and then in the negative, and he may do so as often as it may be necessary to enable him to declare his opinion, from the show of hands, as to which party has the majority.

24. The board shall vote in all cases by show of hands, except in the election of officers, in which case the voting shall be by ballot.

25. Upon the adoption of any amendment by the board such amendment shall be held to have quashed the original motion, and for all purposes of subsequent discussion the amendment so carried shall be acted upon as an original motion.

26. No motion, the effect of which, if carried, would involve the expenditure of a sum exceeding Ten pounds, can be entertained by the board, unless notice of the same has been given at a previous meeting.

27. Any member making a motion or amendment shall put it in form, sign it, and deliver it to the secretary, who shall add the name of the seconder; and the mover of any such motion or amendment may withdraw the same before it is seconded, by permission of the chairman; but should such motion or amendment be seconded, such leave can only be given if there be no negative voice.

28. No discussion shall be allowed on any motion for adjournment of the board, but if on the question being put the motion

be negatived, the subject then under consideration, or the next on the notice paper, shall be discussed, or any other that may be allowed precedence, before any other motion for adjournment shall be entertained; but if the motion for adjournment be carried, the business then undisposed of shall have precedence at the next meeting of the board.

29. No member shall digress from the subject-matter of the question under discussion, or impute improper motives to others; and all personal reflections upon any member shall be considered as highly disorderly, and the member making use of such offensive expressions shall make an apology, if required by the board to do so.

30. Any member may require the secretary to take down in writing any particular words used by a member immediately upon the same being used.

31. No motion, the effect of which, if carried, would be to rescind any motion which has already passed the board, shall be entertained for the same year, unless a call of all the members residing in the district has been made for that purpose; and no such motion for rescinding any resolution of the board which shall have been negatived by the board, shall be again entertained for the next six months.

32. It shall be competent for any member, without previous notice, to move for a call of all the members residing in the district for the consideration of any subject, on any day not sooner than ten days from the date on which such notice is made; and if the motion of call be passed by the board, the secretary shall give due notice to all the members of the board residing in the district, of the object of any meeting resulting therefrom, and the time and place at which such meeting shall be held.

33. Members may, of right, require the production of any of the documents of the board which may bear upon the subject under discussion.

34. Any member of the board may enter his protest against any resolution of the board, provided that such protest is not inconsistent with truth or disrespectful to the board; notice of intention to protest must, however, be given in every case on the adoption of the resolution protested against; and the protest, signed by the member or members protesting, and specifying the reasons for protesting, must be entered before the next regular meeting of the board, by the protesting member, in a book kept for that purpose at the board-room, and duly referred to in the minutes of the board, the same to be considered also a part of such minutes.

CONTRACTS AND WORKS.

35. All contracts shall be made by tender, advertised not less than twice in such local or other paper or papers as may be determined on by the board; and every tender shall be addressed to the chairman of the board, and not opened until the time for their consideration by the board arrives; the respective amounts, together with the names of the parties tendering, to be entered in every case on the minutes of the board. And when a tender is accepted, a contract bond shall be entered into, signed by the contractor and by two members of the board, one of whom shall be chairman of the board, or in his absence the chairman of the meeting at which such tender shall have been accepted; and the expense of preparing such bond shall in all cases be borne by the contractor.

36. The security in all cases of contract shall be Ten pounds per cent. on the amount specified in the tender, and shall be paid over by the contractor to the chairman, or to any one appointed by the board for that purpose; and the money so paid shall be lodged in the bank with the other moneys of the board, and shall not be repaid to the contractor until he has obtained a certificate from the surveyor of the board that the works under his contract are satisfactorily performed.

37. No member or officer of the board shall have any pecuniary interest either directly or indirectly in any contract or work under the board, nor be received as security for any contractor for such work, nor for any officer of the board.

PAYMENT OF MONEYS.

38. No payment of any account whatever shall be made unless it shall be first approved and ordered by the board.

39. All payments shall be made by cheque, signed by the chairman and one other member of the board.

LOCAL ASSESSMENT.

40. In all cases it shall be considered sufficient for the collector to call once for payment of any sum due on the assessment roll; and in the event of any such sum not being paid to him, a notice shall be left stating that unless the sum be paid before the expiration of fourteen days from the date thereof, legal proceedings will be taken for its recovery.

41. The collector shall pay into the Colonial Bank, Sandhurst, all moneys collected by him within ten days of such collection.

42. Collector's and treasurer's accounts shall be presented at each meeting of the board.

43. The collector shall in no case distrain without the order of the board.

44. Before the issue of rate receipts, they shall be signed by the chairman of the board, and the receipt books of the collector's receipt book shall be numbered consecutively; and at every investigation of his accounts he shall be required to produce receipts for the rates stated by him to be in arrears, and produce bank vouchers for the payments made by him.

45. No election of any officer shall take place until six clear days' public notice shall have been given by advertisement in a local newspaper, inviting applications from candidates properly qualified.

46. Any one or more of the foregoing rules, excepting 3, may be suspended *pro tem.* in cases of emergency, with the consent of the majority of the board. Any member may, however, require the enforcement of any standing order of the board not then suspended, by simply directing the attention of the chairman to the fact of such being disobeyed.

47. The foregoing rules were passed at a meeting of the Marong District Road Board, held on the 7th day of July, 1862, at which the undersigned members were present.

EUROA PUBLIC CEMETERY.

RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE EUROA PUBLIC CEMETERY.

ALL charges must be paid when orders are given, or before the ground or vault is opened.

2. Any person or persons making a vault or private grave, or erecting a monument or tombstone, in the cemetery, by and with the consent and formal permission of a quorum of the trustees, under these rules, and upon payment of the charges hereinafter set forth, is or are entitled to have, maintain, and keep such vault, grave, monument, or tombstone, according to the tenor of such permission, to and for the sole and separate use of such person or persons, and his or their sole representatives, for ever, from the date of such permission being given.

3. Applications for burial, or for permission to make a vault or grave, or erect a monument or tombstone, in the cemetery, must be made to the agent of the trustees, and subject to rules hereinafter mentioned. A certificate of permission will be granted to the person applying, on payment of the charges set forth in schedule A.

4. The charges for common graves will be remitted on the burial of any poor person in the cemetery, on receipt of a certificate of a minister of religion, or other evidence, proving to the satisfaction of a quorum of the trustees that the relatives or friends of the deceased are unable to pay the charges.

5. The trustees will cause all common graves to be dug, if required, at a uniform rate (see schedule A); parties causing private graves to be dug by their own assistants, or brick graves or vaults made ready, must dig or construct under the direction or approval of the trustees or the person appointed by them for that purpose.

6. Any person wishing to make an interment in any private grave or vault must obtain the consent in writing of the owner thereof, which document must be submitted to the trustees on making application for the interment.

7. The plans of all monuments, raised tombs, and fences, are to be submitted to the trustees previous to the placing of the same in the cemetery, and the approval of the same be obtained in writing; such as are erected, although not approved of, will be liable to be removed from the cemetery with or without notice to the owners or supposed owners.

8. Every monument, raised vault, grave, gravestone, and fence must be kept in repair and proper condition by and at the expense of the owner or owners, otherwise such may be removed from the surface of the cemetery after reasonable notice.

9. Orders for or notices of interment must be given to the agent of the trustees at least eight working hours prior to the hour fixed for the funeral, otherwise an extra charge will be made (see schedule A).

10. Until otherwise ordered the usual hours fixed for interments will be from Eight o'clock a.m. to Six o'clock p.m. from the first of September to the thirtieth day of April inclusive; and from Eight o'clock a.m. to Four o'clock p.m. in the other months.

11. A plan of the cemetery and a register will be kept, and may be inspected on application to the agent of the trustees and payment of the charge set forth in schedule A.

12. The name, age, denomination, late place of residence, and probable cause of death, together with other information as required per schedule B, must be stated at the time of giving the order for interment.

13. The trustees reserve to themselves the right to make any alterations, from time to time, in these charges and regulations; and at any summoned meeting of the trustees three shall form a quorum.

On the application of of and upon the payment of the sum of which is hereby acknowledged to have been received, the trustees of the Euroa Public Cemetery, in terms of and as authorised by the Acts of Council 14 Victoria No. 19 and 17 Victoria No. 12, have agreed to grant, and do hereby grant, unto the said permission to dig or make a grave or vault on that piece of ground feet long by feet broad, lying within the portion of the said cemetery appropriated for burials, and marked No. compartment on the map or plan of the said cemetery kept by the trustees, with permission to erect or place on the said piece of ground a monument, or raised tomb, or tombstone, or fence, on payment of such charges as may from time to time be established; and it is hereby declared that the said is and shall be entitled to have, maintain, and keep such vault or grave and erection, according to the terms of this permission, to and for the sole and separate use of the said and representatives for ever: Provided always, and it is hereby declared, that this grant is made subject to the terms and conditions following, viz.—

1. That the piece of ground shall be kept and used by the said and his near relations, solely as a burying-place, and that no other use shall be made thereof.
2. That no enclosing wall, fence, building, monument, or tombstone, shall be erected on the said piece of ground until a plan thereof shall have been exhibited to the said trustees, and their authority given to the erection thereof.
3. That the said grave or vault, and the said wall, fence, building, monument, or tombstone, shall be kept up by the said and heirs and near relations in proper repair to the satisfaction of the trustees of the said cemetery.
4. MELTON TOWN COMMON.

RULES FOR THE MANAGEMENT AND REGULATION OF THE MELTON TOWN COMMON.

ALL persons entitled to depasture cattle on the Melton Town Common shall be allowed to run four head of cattle in respect of his right as a resident of the township.

2. Should any of the residents of the township decline to take advantage of the common, the managers may increase the number to any of the other residents; but in no case will there be more than one hundred and forty head of cattle allowed to run on the common.

3. The fees to be charged for depasturing of cattle for every head above six months old, Threepence-halfpenny per week, payable monthly in advance.

4. All persons taking cattle to the common shall be required to deliver them into the charge of the herdsman, and produce an order from the secretary or one of the managers; the herdsman shall sign the same, and enter a copy of it in his book.

5. Each person, previous to taking his cattle to the common, must apply at the office or residence of the managers, between the hours of Two and Six o'clock p.m. each Saturday, to have his name and the brands and description of his cattle registered, and to pay the commonage fees; the secretary or managers will then give an order for the admission of the cattle to the common.

6. The herdsman will be required to see that travelling herds and flocks of sheep, &c., shall keep strictly within the bounds prescribed by the 78th clause of *The Land Act, 1862*.

7. Persons whose watering-places may be dried up in the summer months shall not be allowed to drive their cattle across the common to any water-hole or creek, without first making application to the managers for permission to do so. The managers may, if they think fit, grant their application, and lay off a roadway, which the applicants shall be strictly required to keep.

8. The herdsman shall be required to report immediately the slightest indication of disease in the cattle to the secretary or managers, and they will at once take steps to remove the same from the common, but in no case will the managers be responsible for any loss the owners of such cattle may suffer.

9. The managers shall give instructions to the herdsman, when they think fit, to impound all intruding cattle, and to put on the trespass fees according to law; and all such fees shall be handed over to the secretary at least once a week.

10. Should any cattle running on the common take up so much of the herdsman's time as would cause any danger to the other cattle under his charge, he will be required to report the same to the managers, who will require the owners of such cattle to take them in charge till they become manageable for the herdsman, but in no case will such cattle be allowed to run on the common unless the regular fees be paid for them.

11. Any person entitled to commonage who shall refuse or neglect to register the cattle at that time in their possession on the day the managers will make their first entries (of which day due notice will be given), shall not be allowed to register such cattle for six months from that date; and such cattle shall be liable to be impounded; but any cattle coming into possession of any of the residents of the township after that date, may be registered according to the bye-laws.

12. All persons entitled to commonage shall, at the time of registering his cattle, sign a declaration that such cattle are his or her *bona fide* property.

13. Should the fees collected be insufficient to pay the herdsman's wages and other contingencies connected with the management, an additional charge will be made upon each commoner in fair proportion to the number of cattle by him depastured; and each license granted will be under the condition that he can be sued for the same, and the amount be recovered before any justice of the peace.

14. The managers retain the right to alter or amend the foregoing rules when they consider it necessary.

BYE-LAWS FOR THE MANAGEMENT AND REGULATION OF THE MELTON TOWN COMMON.

1. The managers to elect a chairman, who shall be considered treasurer, and appoint a secretary. A meeting of the managers shall be held on the last Saturday of each month, between the hours of Six and Eight o'clock p.m., for the purpose of comparing the secretary and herdsman's books, to hear complaints (if any), and for the transaction of other business.

2. The secretary shall, on a day hereafter to be named, attend at Melton, to register the cattle and receive the fees from all persons entitled to depasture cattle on said town common; any person failing to pay the fees one week after they are due, will be liable to have their cattle impounded.

3. The situation of herdsman will be advertised; any person applying for same will be required to produce satisfactory testimonials of character and ability.

4. The managers to pay the herdsman from the fees derivable from the common and other sources connected with the same; the residue, if any, to be applied in making water-holes, the eradication of thistles, or for any other local purpose the managers may think fit for the benefit of the township, subject to the approval of the Board of Land and Works.

ONDIT FARMERS' COMMON.

BYE-LAWS, RULES, AND REGULATIONS OF THE ONDIT FARMERS' COMMON.

THAT all parties occupying purchased land previous to the passing of *The Land Act, 1862*, within five miles of the Ondit Farmers' Common, be entitled to depasture horses and cattle thereon.

2. That each commoner be allowed to depasture one head of cattle for each acre of land under cultivation, or one horse for every two acres, but in no case shall any person depasture more than forty head of cattle thereon.

3. That the following assessment per annum be paid quarterly in advance to the managers:—

4. That parties not entitled to commonage by the Act of the Parliament of Victoria No. 117, be allowed to depasture at the option of the managers, upon the payment of the following fees per annum, payable quarterly in advance:—

For each cow, ox, heifer, or steer	0	10	0

And the quarters in each case shall terminate on the 31st December, 31st March, 30th June, and 30th September in each year respectively; and any person failing to pay the assessment or fees within one week after they become due, shall be liable to have his cattle or horses impounded; and that all cattle be branded on the near loin with pitch.

5. That no entire horses or bulls be allowed on the common over nine months old without the permission of the managers, and that all foals and calves on arriving at that age be chargeable with the assessment or fees.

6. The managers shall appoint a herdsman, with power to remove or dismiss him if requisite, and appoint another in his stead.

7. The herdsman shall reside upon the common or within one mile thereof, enter into security to the managers for the safety of all cattle intrusted to his care, keep a registry of all cattle placed on or taken off the common, and report weekly to the managers the number of stock depasturing thereon; and upon the slightest indication of disease in any of the cattle under his charge, he shall immediately acquaint the managers thereof.

8. The herdsman shall require travelling herds and flocks of sheep to keep strictly within the limits of the boundaries in passing over the common, as provided in the 78th clause of *The Land Act, 1862*; and any resident of the district removing his cattle or sheep from one place to another shall give twenty-four hours' notice to the herdsman, and keep strictly to the road; but should any travelling cattle, horses, or sheep be required to remain on the common over twenty-four hours, the parties in charge shall pay to the herdsman, for and on account of the managers, Sixpence for each horse, Threepence for each head of cattle, and One penny for each sheep per diem.

9. That any commoner be permitted to withdraw his cattle depasturing during any part of the quarter, and replace them by others.

10. The managers shall meet at their office, at the herdsman's residence, the Monday before the full moon in each month, at One o'clock p.m., to examine the books of the herdsman and to transact all requisite business.

11. The managers shall cause the eradication of all thistles and Bathurst burrs, pay herdsman and all other parties necessarily employed for the due management of the common, and, if necessary, construct dams, stockyard, and fence in the common, out of the fees derivable from the same; and any residue shall be used for such other purposes as the managers may consider for the benefit of the commoners generally, subject to the approval of the Board of Land and Works.

12. That all assessments or fees received shall be paid into the Bank of New South Wales, Geelong, monthly, to the credit of the managers, and all payments shall be made by cheque thereon signed by each manager.

13. The managers shall have power from time to time to alter, amend, or add to these bye-laws, rules, and regulations, and also to increase or diminish the number of cattle allotted herein for each person to depasture on the said common.

On certificate that the contract has been completed to the satisfaction of the Engineer-in-Chief, Railways, the amount will be repaid to the contractor.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of New South Wales, 14 Victoria No. 20, intituled, *An Act for regulating the formation, drainage, and repair of Streets, Courts, and Alleys, on private Property within the City of Melbourne*, it is amongst other things enacted, that where any street, court, or alley on private property in the city of Melbourne shall not be, or shall not have been, sufficiently paved, flagged, macadamized, levelled, drained, or sewered, or

otherwise completed or repaired, to the satisfaction of the council of the said city, it shall be lawful for the said council at any time, and from time to time, by any order under the hand of the mayor or town clerk of the said city for the time being respectively, to order that any such street, court, or alley, or any part thereof shall be freed from obstruction, paved, flagged, macadamized, levelled, drained, and sewered, or otherwise completed or repaired, in such manner and within such time as to the said council may appear expedient, and thereupon the owners of the tenements adjoining or abutting upon such street, court, or alley, on each side thereof, shall in such manner and within such time as shall be expressed in such order, at their respective costs, charges, and expenses, remove all obstructions, and well and sufficiently pave, flag, and macadamize, level, drain, and sewer, or otherwise complete or repair so much of the said street, court, or alley, to the centre thereof, as may be opposite to and co-extensive with their respective tenements, adjoining or abutting on such streets, courts, or alleys respectively:

And whereas the street, court, or alley enumerated in the schedule to this order annexed marked A, has not been sufficiently paved, flagged, macadamized, levelled, drained, and sewered, or otherwise completed or repaired, to the satisfaction of the council of the city of Melbourne:

SCHEDULE B, REFERRED TO IN THIS ORDER.

Manner in which the Streets, Courts, and Alleys enumerated in Schedule A, referred to in this Order, are ordered to be freed from obstruction, paved, flagged, macadamized, levelled, drained, and sewered:—

The natural soil is to be reduced or made up as the case may require, so that the longitudinal section of the whole street, court, or alley, shall in no part have an inclination of less than 1 in 20, and where practicable, the entire length is to form one

incline. In laying on any stuff it is to spread in layers of not more than 1 foot thick. The transverse section of the street, court, or alley, is to show a roadway whose crown shall be 1 inch above the kerbs of the footways, and in the fall from the crown of the water-channels is to be at the rate of 1 in 25.

On either side of the roadway there is to be a water-channel 18 inches wide, consisting of two rows of bluestone pitchers, 9 inches deep, and not less than 9 inches by 14 inches on the surface, with upright sides, set in loam, and rammed with a rammer weighing 40 lb., so as to subside 4 inches.

The bottom of the channel is to be 7 inches below the top of the kerbs.

On either side of the roadway there is also to be a footway not more than 3 feet wide, and these are to be separated from the roadway by a redgum plank or kerb 10 inches by 3 inches, set on edge, and fastened with 5-inch spikes to piles 4 inches by 4 inches of redgum 3 feet long, driven into the soil.

The footways are to be covered with a coat of gravel 3 inches thick, and the surface is to fall towards the channel at the rate of 1 in 10. The roadway is to be covered with a coat of broken metal, broken to 2½ inch gauge, and laid on 7 inches thick at the channels, and 8 inches at the crown; and this, when necessary, is to be covered with a coat of loam 1½ inch thick.

Whenever private entrances lead from the streets, courts, or alleys, they are to be paved to the full width with bluestone pitchers, in the same manner as the channels. Paving is to be extended from the channels towards the line of houses or fences so as to cross the entire footway.

The whole of the work must be done under the inspection and subject to the approval of the city surveyor, who is authorised to order any deviation from these general principles which the particularities of any case may require. No. 1568

The works of the public well are completed—a pump fixed and opened for public use.

A "down-cast well" has been sunk in the "upper" swamp for the purpose of draining it, as well as receiving the drainage from Urquhart street.

The market reserve has been fenced in. A pathway has been made and gravelled in Bucknall street, from the town hall to the north-west corner of section 19.

A drain has been cut from the lower swamp to the creek, for the purpose of draining the swamp, and a barrel-drain built across Bucknall street and a street unnamed.
