REGULATIONS UNDER "THE LAND ACT, 1862," RESPECTING LICENSES TO SEARCH FOR ANY METAL OR MINERAL EXCEPT GOLD.

At the Government House, Melbourne, the thirteenth day of October, 1862.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act, 1862*, it is amongst other things enacted, that the Governor, or any person duly authorised by him in that behalf, may, from time to time, grant to any applicant a license to enter upon any Crown lands not under lease, to search for any metal or mineral except gold: And it is also enacted, that the Governor in Council shall have full power, from time to time, to make any rules and regulations for prescribing the form of licenses to be issued under the said Act, for imposing any reasonable charge or fee for any document issued thereunder, and for the more fully carrying out the objects and purposes of the said Act: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order make the following regulations respecting the granting of licenses to enter upon any Crown lands not under lease, for the purpose of searching for any metal or mineral except gold, that is to say:—

1. *Mode of application for a license.*—Every person desirous of obtaining a license to search for minerals or metals other than gold, shall apply for the same by delivering to the minister having for the time being charge of the mining interests of the colony, and addressed to him, an application containing the name and address of the applicant, a statement of the mineral or metal which he proposes to search for, and the precise locality, together with a plan or sketch showing the extent of the area of land for which he seeks to obtain a license; and every such application shall bear date the day of the delivery as aforesaid.

2. *Extent of the areas.*—The maximum areas to be occupied under such licenses shall be as follow:—

For lands supposed to contain coal, an area not exceeding six hundred and forty acres.

For lands supposed to contain the ores of iron, an area not exceeding one hundred acres.

For lands supposed to contain other minerals or metals (except gold), an area not exceeding fifty acres.

3. *The amount of fees.*—The amount of fee shall not exceed Ten pounds, or be less than One pound; and the fee payable upon any license shall be paid at the time of the issue of such license. No such license shall authorize the licensee named therein to use such land for any other purpose than that mentioned in such license; and if any such licensee shall, without being duly authorized thereto, use the said land for any other purpose than as aforesaid, the license granted to him shall be liable to be revoked.

4. *Form of license.*—The license shall be in the form herunto annexed, and shall have endorsed thereon a plan of the lands on and over which the licensee may search for the mineral or metal named in such license.

FORM OF LICENSE.

Know all men that I, the Governor of Victoria, do hereby in pursuance of *The Land Act, 1862*, give to _____ in consideration of the sum of £ _____ by him duly paid, full license and authority to enter upon the Crown lands shown on the map or plan hereon endorsed and therein colored red, for the following purpose, that is to say: For searching for _____ And this license shall be in force for _____ months from _____

the date hereof, and shall be subject to the restrictions, limitations, and conditions expressed in the memorandum endorsed hereon.

This license does not authorize the licensee to use the land described in the license for any purpose other than that specified therein; and if the licensee shall use the said land for any purpose other than as aforesaid, the license shall be liable to be revoked.

The license does not authorize the licensee to remove the _____ raised by him except in such reasonable quantities as may be necessary to enable him to test such _____

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act, 1862*, it is amongst other things enacted, that when any Crown land remains un-sold in or within five miles of any municipal district, or upon or within five miles of any gold field, or in or within five miles of any town not contained in any municipal district, or within any agricultural area of which at least one-fourth part has been selected, the Governor in Council may proclaim such land to be a municipal common, or a gold fields common, or a town common, or a farmers' common respectively, as the case may be; and it is also enacted that the Governor in Council may at any time increase, diminish, alter, or abolish any common proclaimed before or after the passing of the said Act: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim the lands hereinafter mentioned in accordance with the above recited provisions of the said Act, that is to say:—

THE BURKE AND LAURISTON GOLD FIELDS COMMON shall comprise so much of the Lauriston Farmers' Common (described in a Proclamation bearing date the fourth day of March, 1861) as is hereinafter described, viz:—At Burke, area about Five hundred and sixty-four acres, county of Talbot, parish of Bourke, allotments 8 and 9 of section 3: Commencing at the north-west angle of said allotment 9; thence bounded on the north by allotment 10 of said section, bearing east one hundred and eleven chains thirty-three links to the River Coliban; thence southerly by that river to the south-east angle of said allotment 8; on the south by allotment 7, bearing west eighty-seven chains sixty-seven links; and on the west by a road one chain wide, bearing north fifty-six chains to the point of commencement. At Lauriston, area about Two hundred and eighty-seven acres, county of Dalhousie, parish of Lauriston, allotments 297 and 298: Commencing at the north-west angle of said allotment 297; thence bounded on the north by a road one chain wide, bearing east sixty-one chains fifty links; on the east by a road one chain wide, bearing south forty chains; on the south by allotment 299, bearing west eighty-four chains fifty links; and on the west by the River Coliban, bearing northerly to the point of commencement.—(62.E.8307.)

THE CONEWARRIE FARMERS' COMMON, described in a Proclamation bearing date the fourth day of March, 1861, is hereby increased by adding thereto the following area, viz:—About Four hundred and eighty-three acres, county of Grant, parish of Puebla: Commencing on the coast line of Bass's Straits, at a point bearing about S. 32° E. thirteen chains from the south-east angle of Robert Zeally's pre-emptive section; thence bounded on the west by a line bearing about N. 33° W. thirteen chains to the said angle; thence by the east boundary of said section and by the east boundaries of allotments 60 and 59 section and by the north-easterly to the north-east angle of said allotment 59; thence by a line bearing south-easterly to the south-west angle of John Stoke's pre-emptive section; thence on the east by a line and allotment A of section 93 S. 22° E. forty-two chains to the most westerly bend of the north-east bank of Bream Creek; thence by the south-west bank of said creek to said coast-line, and on the south-east by that coast-line to the point of commencement.—(62.F.7499.)

THE MERINO TOWN COMMON, described in a Proclamation bearing date the ninth day of December, 1861, is hereby increased by adding thereto the unappropriated Crown lands situate within the township of Merino, described on a plan deposited at the Office of Lands and Survey, Melbourne.—(62.F. 8343.)

THE BANNOCKBURN ROAD DISTRICT.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Council of the colony of Victoria, passed in the sixteenth year of Her present Majesty's reign, intitled, *An Act for making and improving Roads in the Colony of Victoria*, it was amongst other things enacted, that it should be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor, from time to time, by notice in the *Government Gazette*, to proclaim and declare any such portion of the said colony as to him should seem meet, as and to be a road district for the purposes in the said Act contained, and also to define the boundaries of every road district thereby proclaimed and declared, and to give a specific name or designation to every such road district: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby proclaim and declare that the portions of the counties of Grenville and Grant hereinafter defined shall be a road district for the purposes in the said Act contained, that is to say:—

Commencing at the junction of the Barwon with the Moorabool River; thence northerly by the eastern boundaries of the parishes of Gheringhap and Darrivil to the north-east angle of the parish of Darrivil; thence west by the north boundary of said parish to the centre of the Moorabool River; thence southerly by the centre of said river to the north-east angle of the parish of Wabdallah; thence west by the north boundary of said parish to the north-west angle of said parish; thence south by the west boundary of said parish to the south-east angle of the parish of Burtwarrah; thence west by the south boundary of said parish and by part of the north boundary of Carrah to the eastern boundary of the Shelford Road District; thence southerly by portion of the east boundary of said road district to a point in the Warrambine Creek; thence easterly by the centre of said creek to its junction with the Barwon River; thence easterly by the centre of said river to the commencing point.

And I do hereby further proclaim and declare that the specific name or designation of such road district shall be "The Bannockburn Road District."

THE SHELFORD ROAD DISTRICT ALTERED.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by a Proclamation under the Hand of the Governor and the Seal of the Colony, bearing date the twenty-ninth day of June, in the present year, the boundaries of "The Shelford Road District" were altered as therein mentioned: And whereas it is expedient again to alter the said district: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby revoke the boundaries specified in the said Proclamation; and, with the advice aforesaid, I do hereby proclaim and declare that the said Shelford Road District shall comprise the area hereinafter described, that is to say:—

Commencing at the south-east angle of the parish of Burtwarrah; thence north to the north-east angle of said parish; thence west by the north boundary of said parish and a direct line to the centre of the Yarrowee River; thence north-westerly by the centre of the said river to the north-east angle of the parish of Lawaluk; thence due west to the centre of the Little Woody Yalok Creek; thence southerly by the centre of said creek to the centre of the Woody Yalok River; thence by the centre of the Woody Yalok River southerly to the centre of the Cressy and Foxhow road; thence easterly by the centre of said road through Cressy to the centre of the Geelong and Cressy road; thence easterly by the centre of the Geelong and Cressy road to the western boundary of the parish of Wingeel; thence south by the western boundaries of the parishes of Wingeel and Hesse to the north boundary of the parish of Warracabarunah; thence east to the western boundary of the parish of Murdeduke; thence by the western boundary of the parish of Murdeduke northward to the centre of the Warrambine Creek; thence easterly by the centre of the Warrambine Creek to a point due south of the south-west angle of block 34, in the parish of Carrah; thence by a line north to the south-west angle of said block 34, in the said parish; thence by the west boundary of the said block 34 to its north-western angle; thence by a direct line north-easterly to the south-west angle of Russell, Bell, and Gray's pre-emptive right; thence north to the north-west angle of the said pre-emptive right; thence east by the north boundary of the

said pre-emptive right and a direct line to the north-west angle of the parish of Murgheboluc; thence east by part of the northern boundary of the parish of Murgheboluc to the commencing point.

WOODEND FARMERS' COMMON.

AT a meeting of the Managers of the Woodend Farmers' Common, on the 17th October, 1862, the alterations required by the Board of Land and Works in Rules 1 and 9 were made, and are now sent for approval.

1. The persons entitled to commonage on this common are the occupiers of farm lands in the district for which the common is provided.

2. The number of cattle each person entitled to commonage may depasture shall be determined by the following proportions of the land occupied being under cultivation, viz.:—If less than the whole, one head of cattle for every seven (7) acres, or one horse for every ten (10) acres under cultivation; when the whole farm is cultivated one head of cattle for every four (4), or one horse for every six (6) acres; and for grass land one head of cattle for every thirty (30), or one horse for every forty-five (45) acres.

3. Any person wishing to exercise their right to depasture must state in writing the number of acres occupied by them and the number under cultivation.

4. The charge for grazing on said common for one year or any part thereof shall be Six shillings per head for all cattle over six (6) months old, and the charge on all horses over six (6) months old shall be Nine shillings per head.

5. The fee for grazing must be paid in advance to one of the managers; and the year for which licenses will be issued shall date from the first of September.

6. No bull or entire horse over twelve months old will be permitted to depasture on this common.

7. That no cattle or horses be impounded off said common without an order signed by two managers.

8. All cattle to be mustered once in the month, or oftener, at the discretion of the managers, and all trespassers impounded.

9. Any person having a right to depasture cattle on said common may transfer that right to any other person or persons in the district for which the common is provided.

10. No diseased cattle, or cattle that have been on a run where diseased cattle have been depastured, or that have been in contact with diseased cattle within the previous three months, shall be permitted to depasture on the aforesaid common; and all such cattle must be removed within twelve hours after a notice signed by one manager shall have been served on the owners.

11. All poundage fees and fines to go into the same fund and to be appropriated in the same manner as the fees for depasturing, except any actual expenses connected with them.

12. All persons infringing or evading any of the foregoing rules and regulations will be proceeded against under the 129 clause of *The Land Act, 1862*.

BYE-LAW No. 11.—TO REGULATE THE ELECTION OF MANAGERS FOR THE TOWN COMMON OF CLUNES.

PURSUANT to the 69th section of *The Land Act, 1862*: Be it ordered and directed, that within fourteen days after the date of this bye-law receiving the assent of His Excellency the Governor, and also in each year after the expiration of this present year 1862, on the Wednesday on or first after the 13th day of November, the Municipal Council of Clunes shall proceed to the election by ballot of three persons, who shall be members of the said municipal council, to become the managers of the Town Common of Clunes, under the provisions of the Act above recited.

The petitioners state that they are householders resident within the present limits of the municipal district of Sandridge, and that they are desirous of its limits and boundaries being altered.

They represent that the district comprises only about seven hundred and sixty acres, and is considerably less in extent than the other littoral municipalities of Brighton, St. Kilda, Emerald Hill, and Williamstown; and that while these municipalities enjoy the advantages of a large sea frontage, and two of them a good river frontage also, Sandridge has no river frontage, and only sixty-two chains of frontage to the Bay, of which about fifteen and a half chains are taken up by the reserve of the Melbourne and Hobson's Bay Railway Company and another part by military works.

Lastly, they urge that the restricted area of their district debars them from many advantages, such as the carrying out of needful sanitary measures and other matters of local importance, and subjects them to numerous disabilities, among which is their inability to project a road so as to establish direct communication with the metropolis independently of the control of any other district.

ANNUAL ELECTION.

On the 30th day of August last Messrs. Courtin, Warnock, and Richards were elected councillors, in the places of Messrs. Courtin, Richards, and Marshall, who retired by rotation.

CHAIRMAN OF COUNCIL.

At the first meeting of council for the current year, held on the 4th day of September, Mr. Councillor James Warnock was unanimously elected chairman.

BYE-LAWS.

The following bye-laws have been made by the council during the past half-year—

No. 25. For the protection of the streets, footpaths, roads, and reserves within the municipal district of Maldon.

No. 26. For the appointment of managers for the Maldon Town Common, in accordance with the 69th clause of *The Land Act*.

PETITIONS AND MEMORIALS.

A petition to the Honorable the Speaker and Members of the Legislative Assembly, praying that the road from Castle-maine to Maryborough, *via* Maldon, may be proclaimed a main road.—Granted.

A memorial to the Honorable the Treasurer, praying for the re-establishment of a Receipt and Pay Office at Maldon.—Under consideration.

A memorial to the Chief Commissioner of Police, praying that the escort from Castle-maine to Maryborough may pass through Maldon, as formerly.—Granted.

A memorial to the Commissioners of Savings Banks, Melbourne, praying that the necessary steps may be taken for the establishment of a Savings Bank at Maldon.—Under consideration.

A memorial to the Commissioner of Trade and Customs, praying that a set of standard weights and measures may be apportioned for this district.—Under consideration.

PUBLIC WORKS.

The following public works have been satisfactorily carried out during the past half-year—

Kerbing, channelling, and forming 7 chains 83 links of footpaths, extending from Fountain street to the Post Office.

Formation of 12½ chains of footpath in Long Gully.

Formation of 5 chains of footpath on east side of High street.

Formation of about 5 chains of High street, extending southward from Francis street.

Erection of culvert and approaches at Porcupine Flat.

Erection of a bridge leading to Fountain street.

Repair of 3½ chains, of the Parkins' Reef road.

Formation of 28 chains of Templeton street.

Construction of pitched crossing at the junction of Union street and High street.

Together with repairs to roads in various parts of the municipality, where the same were most urgently required.

MISCELLANEOUS.

At the close of the last year, the question of the route of the main road, from Castle-maine to the north-west was supposed to have been definitely settled in favor of the same being proclaimed *via* Maldon, but owing to some unexpected influences being brought to bear on the question, there was great danger of Maldon being shelved in the matter; the council therefore took immediate steps (and were encouraged so to do by a large public meeting of ratepayers), to prevent such a calamity and injustice,

and is happy to add, that with the able and energetic assistance of John Ramsay, Esq., M.P., the claims of Maldon for prior consideration were recognised by a large majority of the Legislative Assembly in Parliament assembled, and votes were accordingly passed declaring the main roads to be:—From Castle-maine to Maldon, Maryborough, and Avoca; from Castle-maine to Maldon; Dunolly, and Inglewood; and from Maldon to Bendigo; thus making Maldon the point of divergence for three highly important main roads, the present and prospective benefits of which fully justified the council in expending the amount it did in bringing about a consummation of such vital interest to the district.

The disaster of a large fire in the town aroused the inhabitants to a sense of the great danger to property, from the fact that Maldon had no fire engine or fire brigade. A brigade was formed at a public meeting called for that purpose, and a petition forwarded to the council praying that a fire engine should be purchased. Acting on this, the council authorised Mr. Councillor Courtin (whilst in Melbourne on municipal business) to purchase an engine at a cost not exceeding £100, and although this was a low price, Mr. Courtin succeeded in obtaining one at the maximum sum mentioned, which remains the property of the council, who also have a direct control over the appointment of superior officers in the brigade.

An adequate water supply, by means of the Government reservoir, has unfortunately been delayed by defect in the construction of its embankment. The council, however, has taken such steps as will speedily bring the matter to an issue; a Government engineer, together with one appointed by the council, having received instructions to inspect and report upon the safety, or otherwise of the embankment. Should their report remove the apprehension felt by a portion of the ratepayers, a few weeks will suffice to complete the arrangements for opening the reservoir and laying down pipes to the centres of population.

HEALTH OF THE DISTRICT.

The health officer reports that during his residence of eight years on Maldon he has never known the district so totally free from any disease, only a few cases of colds having presented themselves for several months.

PUBLIC WORKS.

The contract for fencing the fish market reserve mentioned in the last report was cancelled on 5th April ultimo.

The following works have been completed:—
Laying and fixing hardwood kerbing in various streets.
Forming, installing, kerbing, and claying Liardet street from Bay street to Railway place.

Forming and kerbing footpaths and forming roadway and channel in Stokes street, from Beech street to Liardet street.

Verandah at the end of the Government Shipping Office for the use of boatmen.

Cutting open drain in Inglis street.
Erection of fourteen lamp-posts and lamps to be lighted with kerosene oil.

Sundry other minor and useful works have been completed.

BYE-LAWS.

The following bye-laws have been assented to and gazetted.
No. 13. For the suppression of nuisances caused by throwing deleterious matters into the Saltwater Lagoon.

No. 14. For the maintenance and management of a free public library at Sandridge.

No. 18. For prohibiting damage to the public footpaths and water-courses, and for regulating the formation of crossings over footpaths and water-courses.

MISCELLANEOUS.

The establishment of a sailors' home at Sandridge has occupied the attention of the council, and application was made to the Government for a site for that purpose; but the claims of Sandridge in this matter have not been favorably received.

The question of the proposed road between Sandridge and St. Kilda is still in abeyance. The construction of a bridge over the Yarra Yarra, opposite the end of Spencer street, has been brought before the Government. A promise was made that an estimate of the cost of construction, together with plans and specifications, should be prepared, and that an amount should be placed on the Parliamentary Estimates for 1863, for the consideration of the Legislature. The further extension of the Yan Yean water service to this district has been delayed by the Sewerage and Water Department, in consequence of the want of the necessary pipes. Negotiations have taken place between this council and that of Emerald Hill, relative to the Sandridge road, with a view to the said road being retained under the control of the two councils, and it was proposed to form a joint committee for the collection and distribution of a toll to be levied thereon; but as no understanding was arrived at that could be considered satisfactory to both parties, the result was, that the road was taken possession of by the Government, and a toll established thereon.

Allotments 10 and 11 of section 20, fronting Bay street, have been purchased by the council, in order to secure a reserve for drainage purposes. The necessity for further regulations relative to the town jetty was brought before the Hon. the Commissioner of Trade and Customs, who promised to incorporate most of the suggestions of the council, in certain new harbor regulations that were being framed. The United Insurance Company's Fire Brigade Committee have promised a subsidy of

£60 per annum in aid of fire expenses in the district. The question of establishing a post office savings bank at Sandridge, similar to the system in operation in England, has been brought under the notice of the hon. member for the district, and he promised to bring the matter before the Executive Council. A petition from the inhabitants of Fisherman's Bend, praying for annexation to Sandridge, was received by the council, and presented to the Government, but, in consequence of the number of signatures not being sufficient, the petition was not entertained. Certain alterations in the system of levels previously adopted have been made in that portion of the district between Bridge street and Ingles street.

ANNUAL ELECTION.

At the annual election, on 2nd August, 1862, Messrs. John Murphy, Charles Muirhead Ingles, and John Pickles, were duly elected as members of the council, to serve in the stead of John Murphy, Thomas Swallow, and John Pickles, who retired by rotation.
