INTERCOLONIAL MONEY ORDERS BETWEEN VICTORIA AND NEW ZEALAND.

At the Government House, Melbourne: the twenty-second day of
October, 1862.

PRESENT:

His Excellency the Governor
Mr. Ireland | Mr. Wood

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the seventeenth year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled, *An Act to amend the Law relating to Post Offices*, it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for His Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, to make arrangements with the constituted authorities in separate colonies for the transmission, through the medium of the post office, of money between any separate colony and Victoria by order or otherwise, and for the delivery and payment of the same, the accounting for all money which shall be due and owing to any colony on account of such arrangements, for the transmission of any balance thereon; to make such rules and regulations; to defray such discounts and exchanges as may be necessary; and to establish such rates of payment as seem fit in such behalf respectively: And whereas by an Act passed in the twenty-first year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled, *An Act to enable the Postmaster General to issue Money Orders in the Colony of Victoria*, it is further amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, from time to time, to make such regulations as shall be needed relating to money orders; and to the persons by or through whom, and to the restrictions as to number and amount under which money orders shall be issued; and to the places where all money orders issued shall be payable; and to the length of time during which money orders shall be current, and after which they shall become void; and to the managing of credits, accounts, and other matters and things necessary to be forwarded, transmitted, or managed in reference to money orders; and relating to every other matter or thing necessary to be regulated or done for perfecting a system whereby the public may be enabled promptly and safely to remit small sums of money to all parts through the post office: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, doth by this present Order direct, that, on and after the first day of November now next ensuing, money orders may and shall be issued at all post offices in the colony of Victoria, to which the money order system is now or may hereafter be extended, on such post offices in New Zealand as the Postmaster General of Auckland shall from time to time notify as post offices at which such money orders can be made payable.

That on and after the date above mentioned, all money orders drawn in New Zealand, by postmasters and others duly authorized in that behalf, on the post offices in Victoria at which money order business is transacted, shall be payable under the money order regulations in force.

That the amount of premium to be charged on all money orders issued in the colony of Victoria on New Zealand, shall be as follows:—

For any sum not exceeding £5 ... One shilling.
Ditto above £5, and not exceeding £10 ... Two shillings.

That the largest amount for which any money order shall be issued in Victoria on New Zealand shall be (£10) Ten pounds.

And the Honorable George Samuel Evans, LL.D., Her Majesty's Postmaster General for Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

COURT OF MINES. RULE OF PRACTICE.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the twenty-first year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act for amending the Laws relating to the Gold Fields*, it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the several persons who for the time being shall be the Attorney General, Solicitor General, and Judges of the Courts of Mines, or any four of them, of whom the said Attorney or Solicitor shall be one, from time to time to frame such General Rules as to them shall seem expedient for and concerning the practice and proceedings of the courts holden under the said Act, either in their original or appellate jurisdiction, and for other purposes: Now therefore we do frame the following General Rules, that is to say:—In every suit, appeal, matter or proceeding before the Court of Mines, or any judge thereof, after the plaintiff, appellant, respondent, or applicant, his attorney or counsel, shall have stated his case or made his application, and before he shall have called any witness, the judge may, if he shall think proper, call upon the defendant, appellant, respondent, or person called upon to answer his attorney or counsel, to state the nature of his defence or answer; and neither party shall be permitted to depart from such opening statement, defence, or answer, without leave of the judge; and in no case shall such permission be given so as to enable any person to rely upon a purely technical defence or answer after he has stated a defence or answer upon the merits.

PROHIBITED.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Parliament of Victoria, passed in the twenty-fifth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled, *An Act to amend and consolidate the laws for the protection of the Fisheries of Victoria*, it is amongst other things enacted, that if any person shall set, lay down, use, or fish with any kind of net, in the Yarra Yarra, Plenty, Werribee, or Saltwater Rivers, in the colony of Victoria, or in any or either of their respective tributaries, or in any other river, lake, creek, stream, or pond, to which the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, shall, by proclamation duly published in the *Government Gazette*, extend the provisions of the said clause, he shall forfeit such net and also such sum not exceeding Ten pounds as the convicting justice shall think fit: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby extend the above recited provisions of the eleventh clause of the said Act to the Yan Yeau Reservoir, in the said colony of Victoria.

THE HEXHAM TOWN COMMON INCREASED.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency SIR HENRY BARKLY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Captain-General and Governor-in-Chief of the Colony of Victoria, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by *The Land Act*, 1862, it is amongst other things enacted, that the Governor in Council may at any time increase, diminish, alter, or abolish any common proclaimed before or after the passing of the said Act: And whereas by a Proclamation under the hand of the Governor and the seal of the colony, bearing date the eighteenth day of February, 1861, the Hexham Town Common therein described was proclaimed: And whereas it is expedient to increase the said common: Now therefore I, Sir Henry Barkly, the Governor of Victoria, with the advice of the Executive Council, do hereby increase the said Hexham Town Common by adding thereto 378 acres, more or less, in the county of Villiers, parishes of East and West Hexham, being the unappropriated Crown lands situate within the proclaimed boundaries of the town of Hexham aforesaid, as indicated on a plan deposited in the Crown Lands and Survey Office, Melbourne.—(62.E.7103.)

NORMAN ROCK AND CHILCOTT ROCKS, TORRES STRAITS.

WITH reference to the Notice to Mariners, issued from this Department, and published in the *Government Gazette* of the 8th July, 1862 (page 1182), the following Hydrographic Notice, which has been received from the Admiralty, is reprinted for general information.

Hydrographic Notice.—[No. 10.]

AUSTRALIA.—NORTH-EAST COAST.

The bearings are magnetic. Variation, 54° East in 1862.

INFORMATION has been received from the Colonial Government of Victoria, Australia, dated 23rd May, 1862, that Commander Norman, of H.M. Colonial Steam Sloop *Victoria*, on his passage through the Inner route of Torres Strait, discovered a dangerous rock about 8 miles northward of Cape Sidmouth; also that he has verified the existence of the Chilcott rocks which have hitherto been considered doubtful.

The Norman rock is about 30 yards broad, of coral formation, and has only 2 feet on it at low water. It lies about one-third of a mile off the west side of No. VIII. island, in a position

which passing vessels might choose for anchorage with easterly winds.

The Chilcott rocks, lying off the eastern side of the same island, near the fair-way of the Inner route, were found at low water, the southern one in the position marked in the Admiralty chart, and the northern one bearing north from it, it is stated at 150 yards apart (Lieut. Woods' plan which accompanied Commander Norman's report places them one-third of a mile apart); they are both flat topped, about 20 to 25 yards in extent, steep to all round, with 7 fathoms water between them; a small lump of coral was dry 1½ feet on the southern rock. The safest course to avoid them is to borrow to the eastward towards the Barrier reefs rather than towards No. VIII. island, until well north or south of the island.

PETITION UNDER THE MUNICIPAL ACT.

WANGARATTA.

THE Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has directed the publication of the substance and prayer of the petition herewith set forth, signed by one hundred and sixty householders resident within the town and suburbs of Wangaratta, praying that their locality may be incorporated as a municipal district.

The petitioners state that they are farmers, traders, and yeomen, and constitute the majority of the householders within the town and suburbs of Wangaratta, to which they desire the extension of municipal institutions.

They further state that the town contains a large trading and farming population, and is the centre of a very extensive agricultural district, comprising (amongst other localities) Oxley, Docker's Plains, Batcourt, and Tarrawingee, which are all thickly settled tracts; while the town itself is of twenty years' standing, is for the most part composed of substantial brick buildings, and contains 2 churches, 3 schools, 2 tanneries, 3 large steam flour-mills, 1 bank, 1 brewery, 12 stores, 1 steam bone-mill, 2 other steam-power works, 4 smithies, 3 wheelwrights' yards, 2 timber yards, and various other places of business.

And the petitioners pray as follows:—
"Your petitioners pray that the area contained within the following boundaries may be proclaimed a municipal district under the provisions of the Act of Council in that behalf: Commencing at the north-west angle of allotment 6 of section F, bearing north-easterly five miles to a point on south-east boundary of allotment 5 of section G; thence in a line bearing south-easterly to Reid's Creek Bridge two miles or thereabouts; thence in a line bearing south-westerly five miles and twenty chains to a point on the western side of the Fifteen-mile Creek; and thence by a line bearing north-westerly to the point of commencement; which area does not exceed nine square miles in extent, and no one point of which area is distant six miles from any other point thereof; and which area contains three hundred householders."

LANDS TO BE PERMANENTLY RESERVED.

IT is hereby notified, in pursuance of the 8th section of the Act No. 145, that it is the intention of the Governor in Council to permanently reserve from sale the lands hereinafter described, for the purposes specified in connection with each description, viz. :—

BEAUFORT PUBLIC CEMETERY.

**REGULATIONS MADE BY THE TRUSTEES OF THE PUBLIC
CEMETERY ESTABLISHED AT BEAUFORT.**

ALL charges must be paid when orders are given, or vault is opened.

2. Any person making a vault or erecting tombstone in the cemetery, by permission of the trustees, under these rules, and upon payment of the charges set forth in the schedule, is entitled to have, maintain, and keep a vault, monument, or tombstone, according to the tenor of such permission, to and for the sole and separate use of such person or persons, and his or their representatives for ever.

3. On application for such permission being made to the trustees, a certificate will be granted to the party applying for such permission, on payment of the charges in the schedule.

4. No charges will be made for permission to bury any poor person in such cemetery, on proof, to the satisfaction of the trustees, that such person was a pauper, or that his relatives are unable to pay the costs and charges; such applicants to sink all such graves in such ground that the trustees may appoint.

5. The trustees will cause all common graves to be dug, but parties wanting brick graves or vaults will be required to construct them under the direction of the trustees; and in case an interment is to be made in any private grave or vault, the consent, in writing, of the party entitled thereto must be left with the order.

6. The time fixed for the funeral must be the time of arrival at the cemetery.

7. The hours fixed for the performance of funerals are to be from Eight o'clock a.m. to Six o'clock p.m., and orders must be given the day before.

8. The name, age, late place of residence, and probable cause of death, must be stated at the time of giving the order.

9. All monuments, vaults, graves, gravestones, and fencing, to be kept in repair and proper condition at the expense of the owners, and all wooden fencing not kept in repair may be removed by the trustees.

10. Every coffin in a brick grave or vault, to be bricked or cemented, and covered by a slab of freestone, slate, or iron.

11. The plans of all monuments and fences proposed to be erected must be first submitted to the trustees.

12. In the erection of tablets copper cramps must be used.

13. The ground will be open to the public daily from sunrise to sunset.

14. No person employed by the trustees will be permitted to receive any gratuity for the discharge of his duties.

15. A plan of the cemetery shall be kept, and may be inspected on payment of the charge set out in the schedule.

16. Any person destroying fences, or otherwise injuring the cemetery, will be prosecuted against as the law directs.

17. No dogs will be allowed to enter the cemetery.

18. The trustees reserve to themselves the right to make any alterations, from time to time, in these charges and regulations.

INGLEWOOD PUBLIC CEMETERY.

**RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE INGLEWOOD GENERAL
CEMETERY.**

ALL charges must be paid when orders are given, or before the ground or vault is opened.

2. By the 5th section of the Act, "Any person making a vault, or erecting and placing a monument in the cemetery, by and with the permission of the trustees, under these rules, and upon the payment of the charges therein mentioned, is entitled to have, maintain, and keep, a vault, monument, or tombstone, according to the terms of such permission, to and for the sole and separate use of such person or persons, and his representatives for ever."

3. Application for such permission to be made at the office of the trustees. A certificate of permission, in the form set out in the schedule, will be granted to the party applying for such permission, on payment of the charges in the schedule.

4. The charges will be remitted on the burial of any poor person in such cemetery, on a certificate of a minister of religion, or statutory declaration that such person was a pauper, and that the relations and friends of the deceased are unable to pay the costs and charges.

5. Orders for interment to be given at the office of the trustees; such notice to be given between the hours of Ten a.m. and Three p.m. the previous day.

6. The trustees will cause all common graves to be dug; but parties wanting brick graves or vaults will be required to construct them under the direction of the surveyor; and in case interment is to be made in any private grave or vault, the consent, in writing, of the party entitled thereto must be left with the order.

7. The name, age, late place of residence, and probable cause of death of the deceased, must be stated at the time of giving the order.

8. The time fixed for the funeral to be the time when the procession is to be at the cemetery, and the same must be punctually observed.

9. Until otherwise ordered, the usual hours fixed for the performance of funerals will be from Ten a.m. to Six o'clock p.m. in the months of September to April inclusive; and from Ten a.m. to Four o'clock p.m. in the other four months.

10. All monuments, vaults, graves, and gravestones, to be kept in repair and proper condition at the expense of the owner.

11. Every coffin in a vault or brick grave to be bricked in, cemented, and covered by a slab of freestone, slate, or iron.

12. A plan of every monument and tombstone proposed to be erected and placed shall be exhibited to the said trustees, before permission for the erection thereof is given; and the said trustees shall be at liberty to withhold such permission, and prevent the

erection of any monument or tombstone which shall appear to them inappropriate or unbecoming, and shall determine and fix the position of any monument or tombstone which may be proposed to be erected according to the description, size, and character thereof, having reference to the general plan for ornamenting the said cemetery in an appropriate manner.

13. No fencing allowed unless the same is sanctioned by the trustees.

14. No servant or other person employed by, or engaged in any duty on behalf of, the trustees, will be permitted to receive any gratuity for the discharge thereof.

15. The ground will be open daily to the public, from sunrise to sunset.

16. A plan of the cemetery, showing the situation of the purchased and other graves, is kept at the office, and may be inspected at the charge set out in the schedule; and registers of all grants are kept by the secretary.

17. Any person who shall wantonly and wilfully destroy, or do, or cause to be done, any damage to any monument, vault, tombstone, building, erection, railing, fence, shrubbery, tree, or plant, in the said cemetery, will be guilty of a misdemeanor, and, being convicted thereof, will be liable for every such offence to a penalty not exceeding £20, or, at the discretion of the justices, to imprisonment for any period not exceeding three months; and any person who shall do, or cause to be done, any injury to any such monument, vault, tombstone, building, erection, railing, shrubbery, tree, or plant, whether the same shall have been done wilfully or wantonly, or otherwise howsoever, shall be liable to pay damages and compensation, which shall be recoverable in any court of competent jurisdiction in the colony, by the trustees of said cemetery, or any person injured by such damage.

18. The trustees reserve the right to make any alterations, from time to time, in these charges and regulations.
